HEREAS it is provided by "The Game Act, 1874, Amendment Act, 1878," that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by proclamation, to declare what shall be the Close Season in any portion of the Colony, to be named in such proclamation, in regard to any bird or animal therein named; Now THEREFORE I, the said Governor, do hereby, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that in the following portions of the Colony, viz., within a radius of ten miles of the Post Offices of the following places—Northampton, Geraldton, Greenough, Dongarra, Newcastle, Northam, York, Beverley, Guildford, Perth, Fremantle, Rockingham, Pinjarrah, Bunbury, Vasse, Albany—the Close Season for the following birds shall be the periods marked against each respectively, viz.:—

Wild Duck and Teal and do. Rottnest Snipe Emu do. do. Gnou do. do. Bustard ... do. do. Quail do.

Vaccination Act. 1878.

N accordance with the provisions of the 42nd Victoria, No. 13, Clause 5, the Urban Districts for the purposes of "The Vaccination Act, 1878," are declared by the Governor in Council to be within a radius of five miles, and the Suburban Districts within a radius of twenty miles, from the places of residence of the Public Vaccinators appointed by notice in the Government Gazette of this date.

The said districts are shown on a map lodged in the office of the Colonial Secretary, a copy of which can also be seen at the residence of each Public Vaccinator.

It will be observed that where the radii intersect, the boundary is a straight line drawn between the points of intersection, and that the Suburban Districts of Perth, Fremantle, and Guildford are defined by a single boundary line colored green.

Persons failing to comply with this Notice render themselves liable to severe penalties under the 19th Clause of the Act.

THE following Rules and Scale of Fees, adopted by the Board of Management of the Moorumbine Commonage, have been approved by His Excellency the Governor.

By His Excellency's Command ROGER TUCKED. GOLDSWORTHY, Colonial Secretary.

- 1. Every householder within the boundaries of the Moorumbine Commonage, or whose land extends partly within the boundaries, will have the right of depasturing stock, either by hobbling, tethering, or turning loose upon the said Commonage, by first obtaining a license from the Chairman and paying the fees as follow, viz. :-
 - 2. For large stock of any description above six months of age, to the number of forty, per head per 2 6 Sheep clean from disease for the express purpose of killing (to the number of twenty) per head ...
 Goats the same as sheep (as to number) at per head ...
 Pigs above the age of three months, 0 2 0 3 per head
- For large stock licenses for six months will be issued, dated as from the first of January and the first of July.
- 4. No person allowed to take in stock to keep, except it be the property of a resident upon the Common.
- All unlicensed stock found upon the Common will be treated as trespassers.
- 6. Occupiers of land adjoining or near the Common will be allowed to provide against unavoidable or accidental trespass of large stock, by applying to the Chairman for a license.

An overseer will be appointed by the Board at a monthly salary, with authority to destroy wild

- 7. Any licensee keeping stock without a license, will be subject to a fine for trespass, and double fees for such unlicensed stock.
- 8. Any person requiring to cross the Common with sheep, must have permission from the overseer, who will decide as to the line such sheep shall follow, and if the said crossing appear to be for an unfair purpose, such privilege may be refused.

 9. Any person who shall in any way in the opinion of the Board attempt to prevent the carrying that he have Parley and Populations will be lighted.
- out the above Rules and Regulations will be liable to a fine of not less then Ten shillings nor more than Forty shillings, or will be treated according to law as the case may appear to require.

 The above Rules will be subject to amendment

whenever the Board may believe it to be necessary.

PORT WESTERN.

(1) PROHIBITED ANCHORAGE NEAR TELEGRAPH CABLE.

The Government of Victoria has given notice that, to afford protection to the submarine telegraph cable at port Western:—Vessels are not to anchor off Flinders within the area comprised between the following bearings of Flinders jetty head, viz.—N.W. \{\} N. and W. \{\} S.; at night, this area is marked by the white light shown from Flinders jetty.

(2) PILOT STATION AND BEACON LIGHTS AT MANAWATU RIVER ENTRANCE.

The Government of New Zealand has given notice, of the establishment of a Pilot station and Beacon lights at Manawatu river entrance:—

The Pilot Station, situated on the northern side of the river entrance, is distinctly seen from seaward. The International code, the Colonial Tide and Danger or Bar signals, may be used.

Two moveable Beacons have been erected, which kept in line lead over the bar, and may be seen from a distance of 2 or 3 miles. The outer beacon is painted red; the inner, black.

In addition to the permanent light (fixed white) exhibited from the flagstaff, which should be visible in clear weather from a distance of about 9 miles: there will also be shown when there is sufficient water on the bar, a fixed green light from the outer beacon, and a fixed red light from the inner

CHANGES IN HOKIANGA RIVER BAR.

The Government of New Zealand has published the following Sailing Directions for Hokianga river bar, the result of a recent survey (1878) made by the Colonial steam-vessel Stella:—

recent survey (1878) made by the Colonial steam-vessel Stella:—
The shoals forming the bar at the river entrance extend as formerly, in a north-west and south-east direction for about 2 miles, at the distance of from 1½ to 1½ miles from the Heads, with two channels (North and South), in both of which a least depth of 18 feet was found at low water spring tides. In the former main channel, a depth of only 9 feet was found;—consequently, the beacons for this channel have been removed, and will not again be erected.

The soundings close outside the bar, decrease suddenly from 8 to $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms. Monganui bluff in line with a low point about 6 miles south-east of Outer South head, leads close outside the bar shoals.

Leading mark for North Channel.—Andrews store (the southern house on the beach in Martins bay) in line with the extreme of South head, bearing E. ½ N.

Leading mark for South Channel.—The Schoolhouse (a conspicuous sincle white building on the rising ground northward of the old Filot's house) in line with the extreme of South head, bearing N.E. ½ E.

DIRECTIONS.—South head, 150 feet high, has a large white signal staff on it, from which the International code and General signals for New Zealand ports are shown. Mariners should be guided by these signals, especially the Semaphore arm (see page 13, New Zealand Pilot) by which vessels are directed over the bar, to a position within the Heads where a pilot will board them.

Note.—From the frequent changes of the bar, mariners are cautioned not to place reliance on the leading marks for the channels, but should follow the above directions:—

Vessels should not attempt to cross the bar, except with a leading wind and moderate weather; and never unless directions are signalled.

IMPORTATION OF CATTLE AND SHEEP FROM GREAT BRITAIN, IRELAND, CANADA, AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

ORDERS IN COUNCIL.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.

Importation of Cattle and Sheep from Great Britain, Ireland, Canada, and the United States of America.

WHEREAS by an Act intituled An Act to amend the Laws relating to or affecting the Public Health, and numbered 310, among other things the Governor in Council is empowered to make, alter, vary, or in Council is empowered to make, after, vary, or revoke orders for purposes therein mentioned: And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 21st day of February, 1876, made in pursuance of the said Act, the landing in Victoria of cattle, sheep, or pigs shipped at any place or places beyond the limits of the Australian Colonies was thereby prohibited until the said order should be revoked: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Excenting Council dath by this prepart order. of the Executive Council, doth by this present order, in exercise of the power conferred by the above recited Act, and every other power enabling him in that behalf, order as follows, that is to say:—

- 1. The said order of the 21st February, 1876, so far as the same relates to cattle or sheep shipped at any place or places in any of the countries following, that is to say, Great Britain, Ireland, Canada, or the United States of America, shall be and is hereby
- 2. The introduction of cattle or sheep shall not take place from any of the said countries in which any infectious or contagious disease not known in

Australia, other than foot and mouth disease, exists, or in which there are more than one hundred centres of that disease.

And the Honorable Graham Berry, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

REGULATIONS UNDER THE DISEASES IN STOCK ACT 1872 (No. 451).

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the 6th day of November A.D. 1878.

PRESENT.

WHEREAS by The Diseases in Stock Act 1872, it is among other things enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make such regulations as may be deemed expedient for all or any of the purposes mentioned in the fourth section of the said Act, and may rescind the same: And whereas by divers orders the Governor in Council has from time to time made regulations for the purposes aforesaid: And whereas it is desirable to make further regulations for such purposes: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby, in exercise of the power conferred by the above recited Act, and of every other power enabling him in that behalf, order as follows, that is to say :-

- 1. No cattle or sheep brought by sea to the colony from any place other than one of the Australasian colonies or New Zealand shall be introduced at lasian colonies or New Zealand shall be introduced at any other place than the port of Melbourne, or without the authority in writing of an inspector of stock, and except in accordance with the conditions of such authority; and no inspector of stock shall grant any such authority until he is satisfied that all the provisions of any law and of any regulation of the Governor in Council for the time being in force with respect to the introduction of such cattle or sheep respect to the introduction of such cattle or sheep have been complied with.
- 2. Any person intending to introduce cattle or sheep into Victoria other than cattle or sheep to be used as ship's stores shall give 60 days' notice in writing of his intention to the Chief Inspector of Stock, stating the kind and number of stock intended to be introduced, the country and place from which the same are to be introduced, and the ages and sexes thereof.
- All such cattle or sheep intended to be introduced into this colony shall be taken direct from the duced into this colony shall be taken direct from the place from which they start to the port of shipment, and if they do not travel on foot they shall be conveyed in a goods waggon or horse-box, and shall not be put into any stable, conveyance, or other place where cattle, sheep, goats, or pigs have been within the next preceding sixty days; and the shipper of such cattle or sheep shall, if called upon, make a statutory declaration that the requirements of this regulation have been duly complied with.
- 4. All such cattle or sheep, prior to their being shipped for this colony, as well as all cattle, sheep, goats, pigs, or other animals, put or to be put on board the same vessel as the first-mentioned cattle or sheep, for the use of the passengers or crew, shall be carefully inspected by a duly qualified veterinary surgeon appointed by the Governor or by some person authorized in that behalf by the Governor. son authorized in that behalf by the Governor.
- 5. The exporter of such cattle or sheep shall produce and deliver to the veterinary surgeon inspecting the same a certificate from the seller or owner of such cattle or sheep to the effect:-
 - 1st. That they had been in the country from which it is intended to ship them for a period of sixty days.
 - 2nd. That they are free from infection.
 - 3rd. That they had not within the sixty days next preceding been in contact with infection, and such certificate shall be endorsed as correct by the inspector or other officer charged with the execution of the law relating to the prevention of diseases among cattle or sheep in the district in which such cattle or sheep were when sold for exportation or from which they started from the port of shipment.

- 6. If the veterinary surgeon be satisfied that the cattle or sheep intended to be introduced into this colony, and the cattle, sheep or other animals put on board or to be put on board for the ship's use, are free from infection, and that all the other requirements of these regulations have up to that time been duly complied with, he shall grant a certificate to that effect, in the form of Schedule A hereto, and shall deliver the same to the master of the vessel, together with the certificate required by clause No. 5 of these regulations.
- 7. The skins of all cattle, sheep, or other animals which may have died or been slaughtered on board any such vessel during the voyage, and not destroyed or thrown overboard before the arrival of the vessel in Victorian waters, shall be salted and securely packed in cases or casks, and no such skins shall be landed in this colony.
- 8. The master of the vessel on which such cattle or sheep are and their attendant shall during the voyage make a daily entry, in books to be kept by them for that purpose, of the state of the healths of such cattle or sheep and of those put on board for the ship's use, and shall deliver over the same at the office of the Chief Inspector of Stock forthwith after the arrival of such vessel at her anchorage in Hobson's Bay, together with a statutory declaration in the form or to the effect of Schedule B hereto, and the certificates and all other documents relating to such cattle or sheep hereinbefore mentioned.
- 9. On the arrival of a vessel from any of the said countries at a port in this colony with cattle, sheep, or other animals on board, the master shall give the inspector of stock for such port immediate notice of their arrival. And when it is desired that any such cattle or sheep should be landed, application for authority to remove the same to the quarantine ground shall be made to the Chief Inspector of Stock, in writing, under the hand of an owner or consignee of such stock, in the form in Schedule C hereto.
- 10. All cattle, sheep, or other animals on board such vessel shall forthwith be examined by a veterinary surgeon, approved by the Governor in Council in that behalf, and by the inspector of stock, and such surgeon and inspector shall determine whether or not such cattle, sheep, or other animals are infected, and if satisfied that none of such cattle or sheep are infected shall grant a certificate accordingly: and no such cattle, sheep, or other animals shall be landed until such certificate be granted, but such certificate shall not of itself be deemed an authority to land such cattle or sheep.
- 11. No inspector shall authorize the introduction of any cattle or sheep until a sum of money has been deposited with him by or on behalf of the owner thereof, which shall be deemed by such inspector sufficient to meet all the expenses of such sheep and cattle hereinafter set out. Such sum of money to be applied in manner hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, in defraying the cost of inspection, food, disinfection, dressings for scab (if made use of), medicine, attendance, housing, transhipment or conveyance to and from quarantine ground of such cattle or sheep, disinfecting the vessel or conveyance in which such cattle or sheep have been so transhipped or conveyed, fees incurred in veterinary inspection thereof, and all costs and charges of every kind and sort in connection with the introduction of such cattle or sheep, and the balance, if any, of such sum of money shall be returned to the person by whom the same is deposited.
- 12. If any cattle, sheep, or other animals, whether on board any vessel on which they may be introduced, or after they may be landed, and whether or not they may be intended to be landed, be found to be diseased, they may be forthwith destroyed by any inspector of stock or any person acting under the authority of an inspector of stock.
- 13. All such cattle, sheep, or other animals found on inspection to be free from infection shall, before leaving the vessel, be washed and disinfected as the Chief Inspector shall direct, and shall be conveyed by water to the quarantine ground set apart for imported stock.
- 14. Imported cattle or sheep intended to be landed in this colony shall remain in quarantine for a period of not less than ninety days, during which they shall be washed and disinfected as the Chief Inspector may direct, and such cattle or sheep shall not leave the quarantine ground until an inspector

- of stock, by writing under his hand, shall authorize their removal, and until they shall have been examined by a veterinary surgeon and inspector of stock, and declared by them, by writing under their hands, to be free from infection.
- 15. All cattle or sheep put on board any vessel for the use of the passengers and crew and removed to the quarantine ground, and all other animals removed from any vessel to the quarantine ground, shall remain there until the vessel is about to leave the port, when they may be re-shipped on the order of the Chief Inspector of Stock.
- 16. No fodder or fittings brought to the colony by any vessel carrying cattle, sheep, or other animals, shall be landed in this colony without the written authority of an inspector of stock, and except in accordance with the conditions of such authority, and any fodder or fittings otherwise landed may be seized by any inspector of stock or any person acting under the authority of any such inspector, and may be sold or destroyed as an inspector of stock may direct.
- 17. All fittings used for, with, or about such cattle, sheep, or other animals, and all effects belonging to their attendants, shall be disinfected as the Chief Inspector shall direct.
- 18. Whenever any cattle or sheep at any quarantine ground shall be found to be suffering from any contagious or infectious disease, the Chief Inspector of Stock shall report the same, in writing, to the Chief Secretary, who shall lay such report before the Governor in Council.
- 19. No article of clothing used at any quarantine ground by any person in charge of or attending any sheep or cattle placed in quarantine, no covering for such sheep or cattle, and no fodder, fittings, or other article or thing which may have come in contact with or been in use about such sheep or cattle, shall be removed from the quarantine ground without the written authority of an inspector of stock, and in accordance with the conditions of such authority; and no inspector of stock shall grant such authority when he is of opinion that the removal might lead to the introduction into or spread of disease in the colony.
- 20. That the following words in these regulations shall have the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them:—
 - "Sheep" shall mean any ram, ewe, wether, or lamb.
 - "Cattle" shall mean any bull, cow, ox, or calf.
 - "Fittings" shall mean any sheep-pens, cattleboxes, and any materials used for penning, yarding, or confining stock, as also any halters, brushes, clothes, buckets, or other articles whatever which may have been brought into contact with any diseased stock.
 - "Fodder" shall mean any food or bedding used or which shall have been brought in contact with any imported stock.
- 21. No person shall do or cause to be done or assist in doing any act forbidden by these regulations, or obtain or endeavor to obtain or assist any one in obtaining or endeavoring to obtain by fraud any certificate or authority under these regulations, or make use of any such fraudulent or forged certificate or authority, or fraudulently grant or issue any such certificate or authority, or obstruct or refuse to carry out the directions of any inspector or other person acting under the authority of these regulations.
- 22. Clauses 8 and 9 of the regulations of the Governor in Council made under *The Diseases in Stock Act*, 1872, and bearing date the 13th January 1873, so far as the same relate to cattle and sheep introduced from Great Gritain, Ireland, Canada, or the United States of America, and so much of clause 6 of such regulations as relates to the receipt of or for the charge therein mentioned, shall be and are hereby rescinded.
- 23. The foregoing regulations shall relate to the introduction of cattle and sheep from Great Britain, Ireland, Canada, and the United States of America.
- 24. Anything required to be done by any regulations in force under *The Diseases in Stock Act, 1872*, by the Chief Inspector of Stock may, in the absence of the Chief Inspector, be done by any officer performing the duties of the Chief Inspector.
