WHEREAS by divers Acts of the Imperial Legislature, it is made lawful for the Governor of Western Australia, for the time being, to fix such place within any part of the said Colony, and such time for holding every Session of the Legislative Council of the said Colony, as he may think fit; NOW THEREFORE I, SIR WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, K.C.M.G., being Governor as aforesaid, in exercise of the powers so in me vested, do hereby announce and proclaim that a SESSION OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA shall commence and be holden for the despatch of business on MONDAY, THE TWENTY-FIFTH DAY OF JULY, 1881, at two P.M., in the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBERS, in the CITY OF PERTH, within the said Colony; and the Members of the Legislative Council are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

AUSTRALIA—EAST COAST.

MORETON BAY—BRISBANE RIVER.

(1) ADDITIONAL LEADING LIGHTS AT LYTTON.

The Queensland Government has given Notice, that on 18th January, 1881, two leading lights would be exhibited from the beacons above the boat-shed, on the south shore at Lytton, Brisbane river:—

The upper light is a *white* light, the lower a *red* light. These lights in line lead through mid-channel between the red and black buoys off the Boat passage.

(2) UPPER FLATS—ALTERATIONS IN LIGHTS.

Also, that on 7th February, 1881, the leading lights previously exhibited on the beacons above Parker island, and below the Flats, would be transferred to the triangular beacons on the South shore above the Flats, Brisbane river.

These Lights kept in line lead through the new cutting, which is 100 feet wide, with a depth of 15 feet at low water spring tides.

Also, that lights would be exhibited from the beacons below Cairncross house, which lead through the cutting in Hamilton reach.

SOUTH-WESTERN PART.

The following hydrographic information relating to New Ireland, New Hanover, and the Solomon islands has been derived from a report made by Lieutenant Thomas de Hoghton, commanding H. M. Schooner *Beagle*, 1880.

[All Bearings are Magnetic. Variation in 1881.

New Hanover 5° 50' Easterly.]

NEW IRELAND.

SANDWICH ISLAND.*—The south coast of Sandwich island (situated off the west end of New Ireland) was examined by Lieutenant de Hoghton, and found to extend for about 12 miles in an E.N.E. and W.S.W. direction.

George Brown point, named after an English missionary resident in 1880 at the Duke of York group, is the easternmost point of Sandwich island. A barrier reef extends for about 100 yards eastward of George Brown point, and trending round to the south and west, again joins the shore reef at about a cable south-west of the same point.

Patchy bay, about a mile across, and half a mile deep, indents the coast immediately westward of George Brown point; it has a slight fringe reef around its shores, and several detached patches of coral scattered over it. Midway between the outside points of Patchy bay, no bottom could be found with 28 fathoms of line.

The coast from the south-west point of Patchy bay trends to the south-west for about 2 miles, having a fringe reef of coral extending along it, and then curves sharply back to the N.N.E., and sweeping round, forms a semi-circular bay.

Deep bay, which is 1½ miles across, is the name given to the bay just alluded to; it is full of coral patches, has a white sandy beach, and about 300 yards of its shore fringed with coral reef. No bottom at 25 fathoms could be found close up to the coral patches. Cocoa-nut trees were observed growing near the beach.

The coast from the west point of Deep bay trends W.S.W. for 8 miles, and at distances of one and two miles westward from that bay, has coral spits running out for a distance of three quarters of a mile from the shore. About two miles westward of Deep bay the shore becomes lined with mangroves, and the fringe reef extending along the shore becomes wider.

Beagle point forms the south-west extremity of Sandwich island. From it, the coral fringe reef increases in extent, and stretches to the southward for a distance of 3 miles. Several coral boulders are scattered over the reef, and remain uncovered, even at high water.

Redlands island is the larger of two islands, situated about a mile to the north-west of Beagle point. Cocoa-nut and bread-fruit trees were observed growing at the north-east end of this island, and signs of the former existence of a village.

Archway islet, about 2 cables north-west of Redlands island, is small, and has a natural archway through its north-east end. The estimated height of Archway islet was 20 feet above the sea.

Barrier reef, having contained within it, deep water, with numerous scattered coral patches, extends from the south point of Redlands island for about 3 miles to the southward, then curving round, in convex form, to about 3 miles north-westward of the same island, nears the coast of Sandwich island, passing close to the northward of Archway and Redlands islands.

A channel, about 1½ miles in width, divides the coral reef extending southward of Beagle point from the east side of the barrier reef which runs to the southward from Redlands island. This channel was found to contain numerous coral patches, and though possibly navigable by a small steamer, should not be made use of before a closer examination has taken place.

The West point of Sandwich island has an extensive barrier reef girding it; this reef extends between the west point and Archway islet, from thence, was seen to stretch to the northward for 2 miles, and to trend round to the eastward and south-eastward, but it was not further traced.

Current.—Off the south coast of Sandwich island a westerly set was experienced, of about three quarters of a knot an hour.

Natives.—The south coast of Sandwich island did not appear to be inhabited, except near Beagle point, where smoke, probably arising from a village, and a few natives were seen.

At Sandwich island, and along the New Ireland coast, catamarans as well as outrigger canoes were used by the natives.

A generally understood sign of amity in this vicinity was found to be patting the top of the head with the palm of the hand.

Supplies of cocoa-nuts and taro were brought off by the natives of New Ireland, Sandwich, New Hanover, and Portland islands, which were eagerly exchanged for hoop iron and beads.

Tobacco appeared to be unknown to these natives.

NEW HANOVER.

NORTH COAST.—North Islands.—The easternmost four of these islands are situated upon a barrier coral reef having deep water inside.

The third island from the eastern is larger than the remainder, and has several dead trees upon it. The western island is small, and has growing on it, a clump of tall trees.

Westward of North islands, the reef bordering the north shore of New Hanover was also observed to be of a barrier nature. To the westward of the third island from the easternmost of North islands, is a break or channel through this barrier reef, from a half to three quarters of a mile in width, and apparently carrying deep water. This was noticed to extend close up to the north shore of New Hanover, which consisted of fairly high land.

PORTLAND ISLANDS are three low, wooded, islands, extending N.E. and S.W., on a reef of coral, with a fourth small islet to the westward. From the south-west island the reef stretches about 2 miles to the south-west, and from the N.E. island, about half a cable to the north-east; on its eastern side this fringe reef appeared steep to.

Landing may be obtained at the north-east end of the northern of the Portland islands, in a break of the fringing coral reef.

Natives appeared peaceable and without weapons of any description; the total number inhabiting the Portland islands was estimated at 100.

SOLOMON ISLANDS.†

BOUGAINVILLE ISLAND.—A sand bank extending about a quarter of a mile N.W. and S.E., with a small tree growing on its south-east end, whence also a reef runs off, was observed by the *Beagle*, to be in latitude 6° 10' S., longitude 154° 32½' E. . . .

ELLICE ISLANDS.

Coral Bank.‡—The master of the cutter *Rose* reports that he passed over a large coral bank to the south-east of Sophia island. Approximate position as given, latitude 11° 3' S., longitude 179° 50' E. Several soundings were obtained in from 13½ to 15 fathoms. The bottom was visible and seemed level. No land was in sight from aloft.

Section 22.

"That in each case of the birth of any child in the said Colony, the parent shall, within thirty days, and in case of the death of any person, the tenant of the house or place shall, within fourteen days next thereafter respectively, inform the District Registrar of such Birth or Death, and of all the particulars concerning the same, according to the form of registration hereinbefore referred to."

Section 30.

"That every person who shall offend against this Ordinance by refusing or neglecting to give any notice or information required by any of the foregoing sections, or by knowingly registering any birth or death contrary to the provisions of any of the said sections, shall, for every such offence, forfeit a sum not less than Two pounds nor exceeding Twenty pounds."
