CIRCULAR.

Downing Street, 15th August, 1881.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit to you, for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of a Circular issued by the French Government, containing regulations with regard to the importation into France of provisions in soldered tins.

I have thought it advisable to send copies of this Circular to all Colonies, so that those Colonies which do not export, but may import, provisions in tins may be aware of the opinion expressed by the French Government with regard to tins soldered in the manner described.

CIRCULAR OF AUGUST 28TH, 1880, No. 1455.

Paris, August 28th, 1880.

The attention of the Department of Commerce has been called to the dangers that consumers may incur through using preserved foods enclosed in cases soldered on the inside, and manufactured with white metals not lined with pure tin.

The consulting Committee of Public Health, to whom the question has been submitted, have recognised the fact that the public health is seriously prejudiced when productions are offered for consumption which, by their contact with solder or with surfaces covered with an alloy containing lead, may cause poisonings of various degrees.

The Committee, in consequence, reported that it was expedient to forbid manufacturers to solder pre-served-food-boxes on the inside, or to employ in their manufacture white metals other than those which have been covered with pure tin.

The Committee of Health added that manufacturers who persist in wishing to employ solder within the cover should be compelled to use nothing but unalloyed tin.

This advice has been adopted by the Minister of Commerce, and Prefects of Departments have received instructions accordingly.

It has seemed necessary to take similar measures in respect of foreign preserve-cases, as well in the interests of public health as in the view of not placing French manufacturers at a disadvantage with foreign competitors.

Accordingly, on the 2nd of April last, the Minister of Finance decided that it was necessary to compel preserve-cases presented for importation to be in strict conformity with the regulations in question.

Those cases which may be found not to fulfil the conditions laid down should be provisionally detained by the authorities, whose duty it will be to communicate at once with the Procureur of the Republic of the jurisdiction.

In order to allow French manufacturers to dispose of cases they may have in stock, it is arranged that the new regulations shall not come into force until after August 1st, 1881, a date which will equally apply to foreign imports.

# Regulations for the Public Oyster Fisheries of Western Australia.

- 1. No oysters shall be taken or sold of less size than two inches in their smallest diameter.
- 2. All oysters that may be fished under the above size shall be at once returned to the
- 3. Before any license can be issued under "The Oyster Fisheries Act," each applicant, if approved by the Government Resident or Resident Magistrate, shall pay a license fee of One pound.
- 4. No person shall be allowed to fish for oysters unless holding a license in his own name.
- 5. All dead oyster shells, commonly known as "Cultch," which may be brought up by dredging, shall be at once returned to the bed.
- 6. Any person selling or having in his possession oysters of less size than two inches in the smallest diameter shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.
- 7. The season during which it shall be lawful to dredge for, take, and catch oysters in the natural oyster beds and fisheries of the Colony shall be between the first day of April and the thirtieth day of November inclusive.
- 8. Every holder of an oyster fishery license shall, upon demand, produce the same for the inspection of any Police Constable.

Accommodation must be provided in the conveyances for at least six passengers on the Eastern and seven on the Southern Line.

The time of arrival and departure of the Post Office Mails at and from the several Post Offices shall be on such days and at such hours as the Postmaster General shall from time to time appoint.

In the case of any failure on the part of the Contractor in carrying out the terms of his Contract, and observing the time appointed by the Postmaster General, it shall be competent for the Postmaster General to hire the necessary means of conveyance for such Mails, and to deduct from moneys due or accruing to the Contractor the cost of such service.

The Postmaster General shall determine the roads or routes by which such Mails shall be conveyed, and shall have the power to order any deviation that may appear to him desirable; compensation for increased distance, consequent upon any such deviation, shall be paid to the Contractor, at the Contract rate per mile.

The Contractor shall convey and deliver all Mails which may be intrusted to him under the authority of the Postmaster General or any of the Postmasters, and shall provide secure and watertight lockers for such Mails.

Men, vehicles, horses, and every person or thing employed in the conveyance of such Mails, shall be subject to the approval of the Postmaster General.

The Postmaster General shall be previously informed by the Contractor of the name of every driver or other person entrusted with the custody of such Mails.

In case any servant of the Contractor employed in connection with such Mail Service shall be dismissed for misconduct or neglect, the name of such servant shall be forthwith reported to the Postmaster General, and the servant so dismissed shall not be eligible for re-employment in such service without the sanction of the Postmaster General.

The Contractor shall not assign the benefit of any portion of his contract without the sanction of the Postmaster General. The Contractor shall be liable for the following penalty, which shall be deducted, on the authority of the Postmaster General, from any amount falling due to him on account of his contract:—For conveyance by his servants or passengers, or other person, of any correspondence or matter liable to postage charge, without the permission or direction of the Postmaster General (unless under instructions as to roadside correspondence and loose bags), any sum not exceeding £3 for such offence.

All journeys which ought to commence on a day previous to the conclusion of the Contract, as well as all other Mail services ensuing on the route, must be accomplished by the Contractor.

The Contractor must understand that no excuse for delay will be entertained unless supported by certificates from persons of known respectability as to the cause of delay, and that it is not attributable to the absence of ample provision for efficiently carrying out the terms of the Contract.

The Mails must be conveyed at the rate of at least seven miles an hour, inclusive of stoppages.

The Contractor is required to convey loose letters given to him by any Postmaster for delivery on the road; and, unless specially exempted, shall, when applied to by any person on the road, receive letters for conveyance to the nearest Post Office.

The flour to be warranted to keep good for six months after delivery.

Fresh Meat to be delivered daily, when the Government or its representative may consider it practicable, and in proportion of three days' supply of Mutton to four days' supply of Beef per week, or alternate days of each. When Beef is issued, fore and hind quarters,

or portions thereof, are to be delivered alternately; six inches at least to be cut off the hough and neck bones. Mutton to be delivered in carcasses, excluding heads, necks, shanks below the knee, and hough joints.

The supplies to be delivered at such places and times as may be required by the Government or persons deputed by it.

The ordinary ration of Vegetables to consist of 11b. of Potatoes; but when demanded by the Government, and in season, the following equivalents must be supplied twice a week: Pumpkins, 21bs.; or Turnips, Carrots, or Cabbage, 1½lb.; or Onions, ¼lb., for every pound of Potatoes.

All supplies must be delivered in good and sound packages; Corn and Flour sacks, and Oil casks, will be returned to the Contractors; other packages will be retained free of charge.

The Contractors will be liable for any expense which may be incurred by the Government in consequence of the non-performance of their contracts.

Payments to be made monthly, and for general supplies for the quantities actually consumed in the month.
