### JETTY REGULATIONS.

### Colonial Secretary's Office, Perth, 4th November, 1881.

THE following General Regulations for the management and use of all Public Jetties at the several Ports of the Colony, which were framed by the Governor-in-Council, on the 29th September, 1881, in accordance with the provisions of the 42nd Victoria, No. 18, are published for general information.

General Regulations for the management and use of the Sea Jetties at the several Ports of the Colony of Western Australia, framed by the Governor of the said Colony, in Executive Council, in accordance with the provisions of the Act 42 Victoria, No. 18. 1. All Regulations heretofore made are

hereby repealed.

No vessels, boats, or flats shall be fastened to any part of such jetty or jetties, except to such ring bolts or other fastenings as are or may be provided for the purpose; and no vessels, boats, or flats shall be along. side such jetties, unless so fastened. All vessels, boats, or flats so fastened, shall also be anchored or moored in such manner as to relieve such jetties as much as possible from the weight of such craft; and in no case shall more than one tier of such vessels, boats, or flats lie alongside or be fastened to any such jetty or jettics, or be moored or fastened to other vessels, boats, or flats lying alongside any such jetty or jetties, except on special permission of the officer in charge of the jetty.

3. Such vessels, boats, or flats shall not be moored or so fastened as aforesaid, except for the purpose of loading or unloading, nor for any longer period during the authorised hours than shall be reasonably required for such purpose.

4. Passenger boats only may lie alongside the steps on any such jetty or jetties, and for no longer period than may be necessary to embark or disembark passengers.

5. All such vessels, boats, or flats lying alongside any such jetty or jetties shall, on the approach thereto of a passenger steamer, be hauled off to a sufficient distance to enable her to disembark or embark passengers.

6. No person shall fish on any such jetty or jetties, to the obstruction of the traffic.

. 7. Stones, bricks, clay, sand, lime, coals, coke, or other fuel (except in bags) shall not be landed or placed on any such jetty or jetties, except imported bricks or paving stone, which latter must be removed immediately. Firewood for the use of passenger steamers and other vessels or boats, shall be taken direct from the truck to the vessel. No goods shall be handed over the rails of any such jetty or jetties.

8. Tramways and trucks provided for the use of the jettics shall, where so provided, be used for the transit of goods, chattels, and merchandize, on, to, and from the jettics. Bullock or horse teams, or any wheeled vehicle drawn by any quadruped or quadrupeds, shall not be driven on or permitted to go on any such jetty. Persons riding on horseback on such jettics shall proceed at a foot's pace.

9. Gunpowder shall not be landed or left on such jetties without a keeper, nor without being well covered with a tarpaulin, and shall be removed with all possible despatch.

10. All goods trucked on such jetties must be carefully removed from the trucks, and not shot off them.

11. No stones or other kind of substance whatever, shall be thrown into the water from such jetties.

12. No person shall make fast any tackle, purchase, or other gear, to any part of the cranes placed at the ends of the jetties, except such gear as is furnished by the Government for the working of the crane.

13. Not more than one ton shall be lifted with single half-inch chain, or two tons with a single block added. On a single five-eighth chain not more than 33 cwt. shall be lifted, or 66 cwt. with one single block. For heavier weights the number of parts of the chain shall be increased in proportion to the weight to be lifted; but not more than five tons shall be put upon any crane without special arrangements with the officer in charge of the jetty.

14. Any steam vessel plying on the coast of this Colony shall be permitted to lie alongside any jetty for the purpose of discharging and taking in cargo at all hours of the day and night, consistently with the Regulations.

15. All steamers when lying at a jetty shall have and use two up-and-down fenders made of rope, and outside the up-and-down fenders a fore and aft rope fender of sufficient length and thickness to keep the guard streak entirely clear of the fender piles.

16. No goods are to remain on the jetties for more than 24 hours, or on the platforms for more than 48 hours.

17. In cases where special permission is granted by the Collector, or Principal Officer of Customs, for the landing of goods from beyond the seas on the beach, no wharfage charges will be levied as are chargeable on goods landed at the sea jetties.

18. When the officer in charge of the jetty may deem it unsafe, through stress of weather, for a vessel to remain alongside a jetty, he shall direct the immediate removal of such vessel.

19. All foreign-going vessels shall be moored alongside the jetties by the officer in charge of the jetty, in such position as may be indicated by such officer, who will, if necessary, direct the removal of other craft for that purpose. 20. Vessels shall unload in the order in which they arrive, and are placed in a list to be kept by the officers in charge of the respective jetties. Application, to be placed in turn on such lists according to arrival, must be made to the officer in charge on the day preceding that on which the vessel will unload. If such application be not made the next vessel on the list shall have precedence, but the vessel forfeiting her turn may be placed next in succession. Vessels will load according to the order of application to the officer in charge, and shall when required by him give place to vessels discharging cargo. Vessels arriving from or bound to foreign ports shall have precedence of coasting and other craft.

21. In the event of any vessel or vessels being moored alongside any of the jetties in such way as to exclude any other vessel or vessels whose owners or masters wish also to moor her or them alongside consistently with the Regulations, the officer in charge of the jetty has power hereby to order the removal of such vessel or vessels to another berth or berths, and thus afford a berth or berths for such vessel or vessels so wishing to moor alongside such jetties.

22. The approaches to the jetties shall be used only by persons to whom the land may be allotted for wharfage purposes, and the officer in charge thereof is empowered to order unauthorised persons to vacate the same forthwith. No goods shall remain on the approaches to the jetties for a longer period than 48 hours.

23. Consignees and shippers will be required to pay a charge of one shilling and sixpence per ton on all goods landed or shipped at the jetties, such charge including all labor in trucking on the jetties and platforms. The tonnage to be computed according to the following scale of measurement:—

Passengers embarking or disembarking at any jetty will not be required to pay jetty dues on any articles of personal baggage carried in the hand.

### CUSTOMS REGULATIONS, 24th Victoria, No. 5.

Additional Regulation made by the Governor for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of "The Customs Ordinance, 1860," and for the purpose of appointing proper places for the unloading of Goods, in accordance with the provisions of the said Ordinance.

SIR WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor of the Colony of Western Australia and its Dependencies, Do by this Regulation, made in pursuance of "The Customs Ordinance, 1860," direct and declare as follows, that is to say :--

"All goods landed from the sea shall be "landed at the Sea Jetties, and no goods shall "be landed at any other place without first "obtaining the permission of the Collector or "Sub-Collector of Customs, as the case may "be."

Regulations made by the Collector of Customs, and approved by His Excellency the Governor, in Executive Council, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of "The Customs Ordinance, 1860," and for the purpose of regulating the unloading of Goods, in accordance with the provisions of the said Ordinance.

LEONARD WORSLEY CLIFTON, Collector of Customs of the Colony of Western Australia, do by this Regulation, made in pursuance of the said Act, order and direct as follows, that is to say:---

1. All Boatmen landing goods or packages shall expose to view the marks and numbers of all packages so landed.

2. No vessel, cargo, or other boat or flat shall discharge or take in cargo after sunset or before sunrise, except by special permission from the Collector or Sub-Collector of Customs, as the case may be.

SIR,—I have the honor, by desire of the Com-mander-in-Chief in India, to report, for the infor-mation of Government, that it having been represented that the present system and place of branding Waler Remounts by the breeders, viz., on the back, and on the point of the shoulder, are objectionable.

Officers commanding mounted corps were called upon for their opinions, which are herewith for-warded for perusal, and from which it will be seen that they are unanimous as to the unnecessary size and depth of the brand mark, while many attribute the timidity of Waler horses to this cruel treatment.

2. It appears to His Excellency that, as India is a large field for purchase, the subject requires but representation by the Government of India to the Australian Government, to ensure a more careful system of branding being instituted in the latter country, and Sir Donald Stewart suggests, should Government concur in this view, that the necessary action be taken to this end.

3. As an inducement to small and neat branding it might be well to notify that after a certain date, ance with the wishes of Government will, provided they fulfil all other conditions, have priority of choice over horses not so branded.

4. The Commander-in-Chief suggests that the horses be branded on the neck under the mane, and very slightly.

T is hereby notified, that on application of the Canning Roads Board, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to declare the undermentioned Roads to be Minor Roads in accordance with the provisions of the 34th Vict. No. 26, subject to the conditions of all claims that may arise for damage, fencing or other improvements or liabilities incurred or likely to be incurred consequent on resumption, or to the notification of the establishment thereof.

Road A.—Starting from the most Eastern corner of Canning Location 7, and extending North-west along that location's N.E. boundary 44 chains 16 along that location's N.E. boundary 44 chains 16 links; thence S.W. 25 chains 60 links along that location's N.W. boundary; thence 287° 3' about 36 chains; thence 291° 3' about 51 chains; thence 280° 6', about 145 chains; and thence 272° 7' about 73 chains to a spot on the Perth-Albany road, near the four mile post from Perth. All bearings true. The road to be one chain wide on the most Northern side of the line described. The last 196 chains passes through Canning Location 2.

Tenders for Convict Service are required for Fremantle Station only.

The Government does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender for any of the above-named services, and reserves to itself the right of accepting a portion of a tender.

The whole of the supplies to be of unexceptionable quality, and subject to approval or rejection by officers or persons duly deputed by the Government.

The flour to be warranted to keep good for six months after delivery.

Fresh Meat to be delivered daily, when the Government or its representative may consider it practicable, and in proportion of three days' supply of Mutton to four days' supply of Beef per week, or alternate days of each. When Beef is issued, fore and hind quarters,

or portions thereof, are to be delivered alternately; six inches at least to be cut off the hough and neck bones. Mutton to be delivered in carcasses, excluding heads, necks, shanks below the knee, and hough joints.

The supplies to be delivered at such places and times as may be required by the Government or persons deputed by it.

The ordinary ration of Vegetables to consist of 11b. of Potatoes; but when demanded by the Government, and in season, the following equivalents must be supplied twice a week: Pumpkins, 21bs.; or Turnips, Carrots, or Cabbage,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb.; or Onions,  $\frac{1}{4}$ lb., for every pound of Potatoes.

All supplies must be delivered in good and sound packages; Corn and Flour sacks, and Oil casks, will be returned to the Contractors; other packages will be retained free of charge.

The Contractors will be liable for any expense which may be incurred by the Government in consequence of the non-performance of their contracts.

Payments to be made monthly, and for general supplies for the quantities actually consumed in the month.

No Transfer of any Contract will be permitted, without the *previous consent* of the Government.

Each Tender must bear the bonâ fide signatures of two responsible and approved sureties, who will be required to be bound for the due performance of the Contract, under a penalty of about one-fourth of the estimated sum to be paid under each Contract.
