occasion to direct His Excellency the Governor to call attention to that portion of the Colonial Regulations which requires that communications to the Secretary of State from gentlemen in the Colonies should be made through the Governor of the Colony in which they may happen to reside, His Excellency deems it advisable that the following extract from the Regulations should be published for general information:—

"217. Persons in a Colony, whether Public "Functionaries or private individuals, who have any "representations of a public or private nature to "make to Government, should address them to the "Governor of the Colony; or, if the Colony be a "dependency of a Governor-in-chief, then to the "Officer in the immediate administration of its Gov-"ernment.

"218. The duty of the Governor or Administrator of the Colony is to receive and act upon each such representation as public expediency or justice to the individual may appear to require, with the assistance in certain cases of his Executive Council; and if he doubts what steps to take thereupon, to fipublic advantage may appear to require it, or consult or report to the Secretary of State. Every

"individual has, however, the right to address the "Secretary of State, if he thinks proper. But in "this case he must transmit such communication, "unsealed, and in triplicate, to the Governor or "Administrator, applying to him to forward it in "due course to the Secretary of State.

"219. Every letter, memorial, or other document "which may be received by the Secretary of State "from a Colony, otherwise than through the Governor, will, unless a very pressing urgency justifies "a departure from the rule, be referred back to the "Governor for his report."

"220. This rule, requiring transmission of corres"pondence with the Secretary of State through the
"Governor, is based on the strongest grounds of
"public convenience, in order that all communi"cations may be duly verified, as well as reported
"on, before they reach the Secretary of State. It
"extends, therefore, to communications relating to
"public affairs as well as the concerns of the writer;
"to those of all Public Functionaries of whatever
"rank, and to those from public bodies."

IS Excellency the Governor directs the publication of the following letter from the Government Resident at Roebourne, with reference to a line of Road recently travelled by Sergeant Houlahan on his journey to Lagrange Bay.

By His Excellency's Command, GIFFORD, Colonial Secretary.

> Resident's Office, Roebourne, 15th October, 1881.

My Lord,—With reference to Sergeant Houlahan's report of his journey to Lagrange Bay, I have the honor to call especial attention to the satisfactory experiences of the party as regards water and pasture. This line of road \* must become of considerable importance as connecting this district with the Kimberley, and it appears that at least as far as Lagrange Bay there will be no difficulty in securing permanent wells at short intervals. The accompanying sketch of the route taken, with certain positions fixed by Captain Walcott, indicate the watering places lately used, and so far as we can judge from the weather at the DeGrey, it has been an unusually dry season. I would submit for the consideration of His Excellency the Governor whether it might not be well to open up this road by sinking a few wells at public expense. There are parties in the District, I believe, who would do the work for a reasonable equivalent in the form of free pastoral leases; or the Government cruiser might be utilized after the pearling season in conveying the necessary timber and a couple of laborers to sink wells at the spots selected. Such a course would, I think, expedite the settlement of a considerable tract of country.

Extracts from Sergeant Houlahan's Report of his Journey to Lagrange Bay.

August 4th.—Left the Station at Roebourne on the 4th August, and travelled 10 miles; camped at Eastern Hardey; plenty of feed and water for horses.

5th.—Travelled to a well on the other side of Withnell's Station; distance 23 miles; plenty of feed and water.

6th.—Camped at Balla Balla Spring; plenty of water, feed scarce; distance 27 miles.

8th.—Camped at McKay Bros'. Station; plenty of water, feed scarce; distance 20 miles.

9th.—Travelled 10 miles and watered the horses, then travelled on to the Turner River; had to dig in the bed of the river for water; very good feed; distance 30 miles.

11th.—Reached Peter Marra; country dry, also the creeks; no feed; had to dig for water for the horses and party; water not good, but plentiful, at 2 feet from the surface; distance travelled 25 miles.

12th.—Reached Ridley River; plenty of water, but no feed; distance 36 miles.

13th.—Travelled to a well about 8 miles beyond the DeGrey, feed and water good and plentiful; distance 26 miles.

14th.—Went to Condon; good feed and water; distance 10 miles.

15th.—Left Condon and went to Pardoo Spring; distance 18 miles; the best camp for feed and water since leaving Roebourne.

16th.—Travelled to Bannangarra to meet schooner Ruby; saw two fine springs of splendid water close to the edge of the creek; at high tide both springs are covered with salt water, but when the tide goes out the springs are fresh again; distance 13 miles.

18th.—Left Bannangarra, passed through grazing country and camped at a native well; after 3 hours good work got plenty of water for the horses; several members of the party got taken sick from eating a very tempting looking bean which grows plentifully up here; distance 15 miles.

19th.—Arrived at a native well about 18 miles distant with little water, but feed in abundance.

20th.—Proceeded on and stopped at a well called "Native Wash," where after removing 3 feet of rubbish found plenty of water (there is also a water hole between this and the shore); feed good; distance 22 miles.

22nd.—Put up a post to mark water hole. Visible from sea about  $\tilde{5}$  miles and from land about 2.

23rd.—Left camp and came to native well; after extracting 3 feet of dirt, &c., plenty of water obtainable; distance 18 miles, dry well intervening.

24th.—After travelling about 20 miles, came to a water hole with plenty of water subsequent to clearing, &c., but water rather brackish; good feed and abundant.

25th.—Travelled 16 miles and came to a native well with plenty of water; good feed for horses.

26th.—Proceeded on and came to a well with but little water, travelled on and came to another well where we managed to procure enough water to suffice our wants; distance 18 miles.

27th.—Left camp and arrived at a well of splendid water; distance about 20 miles.

29th.—Started afresh and travelled 13 miles towards sea coast, found native well with plenty of good water, after cleaning out the same.

30th.—Travelled about 12 miles along sea coast, found well with little water.

31st.—Left camp and journeyed about 20 miles, when we came upon a well with plenty of water, where horses could drink with their own accord; abundance of feed.

September 12th.—Started on our return; travelled 40 miles close to the coast, camped at "Chain Mangrove;" plenty of water.

14th.—Started for well marked out by Mr. Brockman; arrived here, found little water, but plenty of feed; distance 30 miles.

15th.—Left early for a well 22 miles off, with plenty of feed surrounding.

18th.—Left at 8 a.m., and reached a well we had passed on our way up; distance 20 miles.

19th.—Arrived at a well we knew to exist, having passed it on our journey up; plenty of water after digging; distance 20 miles.

23rd.—Arrived at Bannangarra after short stages. 25th.—Left for the DeGrey Station, which was safely reached.

The Government of New South Wales has given Notice, dated 30th April, 1881, that on 1st August, 1881, the two fixed white lights hitherto exhibited from Baranjo head, south side of entrance to Broken bay, will be discontinued, and a red light substituted for them.

This light will be a fixed light of the second order, elevated 370 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 15 miles, between the bearings of N.N.W. through west to S.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S.

The New Zealand Government has given further Notice, dated 14th June, 1881, that this light would come into operation on 1st August, 1881.

The light is a fixed white light of the second order, elevated 103 feet above the sea, and visible seaward in clear weather from a distance of about 15 miles, between the bearings of N. 23° W. and S. 5° W.

The light tower is situated 259 yards within the high water mark of cape Egmont, and is 67 feet high, constructed of iron, and painted white.

Position approximate, lat. 39° 17′ S., long. 173° 46′ E.

Also, that on 18th July, 1881, a light would be exhibited from the eastern pier at port Napier, in place of the two fixed green lights and the fixed red and white light formerly exhibited at the entrance to that port, which have been discontinued.

This light is a fixed light of the fifth order, elevated about 27 feet above the sea, and visible in clear weather from a distance of about 7 miles; it shows white when bearing from S.W. ½ W. to S.W. ½ S.; red from S.W. ½ S. to S.S.W. ½ W. over Paniarock: white from S.S.W. ½ W. to S. ½ E.; green from S. ½ E. to S.S.E. ½ E. over the anchorage; and white westward of the anchorage.

The light is exhibited from an over weedow structure resisted.

The light is exhibited from an open wooden structure, painted black, and situated about 190 feet within the outer extremity of the eastern pier.

Note.—Vessels approaching port Napier from the southward should have the white sector of this light well open before rounding Ahuriri bluff, in order to avoid Auckland rock.

The supplies to be delivered at such places and times as may be required by the Government or persons deputed by it.

The ordinary ration of Vegetables to consist of 1lb. of Potatoes; but when demanded by the Government, and in season, the following equivalents must be supplied twice a week: Pumpkins, 2lbs.; or Turnips, Carrots, or Cabbage, 1½lb.; or Onions, ¼lb., for every pound of Potatoes.

All supplies must be delivered in good and sound packages; Corn and Flour sacks, and Oil casks, will be returned to the Contractors; other packages will be retained free of charge.

The Contractors will be liable for any expense which may be incurred by the Government in consequence of the non-performance of their contracts.

Payments to be made monthly, and for general supplies for the quantities actually consumed in the month.

No Transfer of any Contract will be permitted, without the previous consent of the Government.
