Surveyor General to His Excellency the Governor.

Since the publication of the new Land Regulations in last Wednesday's Government Gazette, it has been represented to me, by persons interested in the stock-ing and settlement of the Kimberley District, that No. 73 of these Regulations falls short of the request preferred by the Legislative Council and submitted to the Secretary of State with Your Excellency's des-patch No. 211, of 25th November, 1881 (see Govern-ment Gazette of 18th January, 1882); and further, that the Secretary of State's telegram of the 17th January, be bedreatly of blackets is constrained in the frank and any, published in the same *Gazette*, may be taken to have led the holders of pastoral leases to expect a fuller compliance with the recommendation of the Legis-lative Council than the Secretary of State's despatch of the 26th January last, now published, appears at first sight to fulfil.

first sight to fulfil. For my own parts, I do not share the apprehensions entertained by those who have spoken to me. When I read in conjunction Your Excellency's despatch of 25th November, 1881, the Secretary of State's tele-graphic reply of 17th January, 1882, and number 73 of the new Regulations, I am satisfied that bond fide settlers, or, as the Secretary of State has it in his telegram, "genuine occupiers," have nothing to com-plain of in the new Regulations; and I shall be glad if Your Excellency will allow me to inform all those persons who are interested in the Kimberley district, that it is the intention of the Government to interpret number 73 of the new Regulations in the light of the correspondence which preceded it, and that, on due cause being shown, the principle of moving stock from one block to another will be recognised in the case of "genuine occupiers," provided they possess in the district, within the prescribed time allowed, a sufficient number of stock to meet the allowed, a sufficient number of stock to meet the requirements of the Regulations in respect of the lands which they hold under pastoral leases.

SURVEYOR GENERAL,

I concur in the view which you take of this ques-tion. The genuine occupier has nothing to fear from the amended Regulation, and it was with a view of making this clear to the public that I ordered the publication of the Secretary of State's despatch simultaneously with the new Regulations.

There can be no doubt that Regulation No. 73, as amended by direction of the Secretary of State, affords a far better protection against land-jobbing than would have been afforded by the Regulation proposed by the Legislative Council, and I certainly think it a fortunate thing that the result desired by the Council has been substantially attained without at the same time opening the door to a danger which all well wishers of the Colony must be anxious to arvoid. This danger of encouraging land-jobbing was, as will be seen from my despatch of the 25th November, 1881, the one objection which I enter-tained to the proposal of the Legislative Council as it stood; and I think the thanks of the Colony are due to the Secretary of State for the careful consideration which he has given to the question, and for the wise arrangement which he has made for meeting the just requirements of the case.

Under the circumstances, it would perhaps be as well to publish your memo. and this minute in an early issue of the Gazette.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 211, of the 25th of November

last, enclosing, with other papers, an Address pre-sented to you by the Legislative Council, submitting Resolutions recommending certain modifications in the Regulations relating to Pastoral Leases in the Kimberley District.

2. I accept the recommendations of the Council in regard to the extension of the time which should elapse between the date of the issue of such leases and that at which they should become liable to for-feiture for the non-fulfilment of the conditions of stocking in the Regulations; and I am prepared to assent to a modification of the rules in this sense.

3. With regard to the suggestion of the Council that that portion of the Regulations (Revised Print Sec. 76) should be amended, which requires that the proportion of stock provided for therein shall be kept proportion of stock provided for therein shall be kept upon the land comprised in each and every lease; and that it shall be sufficient if the said stock shall be within the district; and further, that the possession of the stock by the lessee shall, for the purposes of the Regulations, be considered a sufficient com-pliance therewith, I would observe that the quantity of stock herewise here the Reserve that the quantity of stock herewise here the Reserve that the quantity of stock required by the Regulations is so small (100 cattle or 1000 sheep are sufficient to hold 78 square miles, while 5 square miles would possibly maintain them), that it would apparently not be worth while for a speculator to form a station with only the exact quantity of stock fixed by law; and that he would be obliged to maintain additional stock to a considerable amount in order to pay the expenses of the station; so that the result of requiring a small number of cattle or sheep on each block of land is practically to ensure the presence of a larger quantity and genuine occupation.

occupation.
4. Under the proposed modification a man who fully stocked one frontage block of 50,000 acres, which is 78<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> square miles, with 1,500 cattle or 15,000 sheep, which it would probably carry if really good country, might hold unoccupied 14 other frontage blocks, amounting to 700,000 acres or 1093<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> square miles of country, which at the above rate might be occupied by 21,000 cattle or 210,000 sheep. This calculation allows 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> acres for one sheep, but even conceding that five acres or more must be allowed per head, it will be seen that a speculator occupying and working one block would still be able to hold without using a very considerable extent of country which otherwise might be profitably used by other persons. It is evident, therefore, that it will not be advisable to accept the proposal of the Legislative Council as it stands.
5. I recognise, however, the force of the argument

I recognise, however, the force of the argument contained in paragraph 4 of your Despatch, that if a contained in paragraph 4 of your Despatch, that if a lessee holds several non-contiguous blocks in the district, it is hard to compel him to keep his stock separated, in the proportions required by the Regulations, when it might otherwise be almost necessary for the proper management of his stock that he should be able to move it from one locality to another; and I think the desired object may be obtained by empowering the Governor to authorise a settler to leave a block unstocked during a portion of the year without incurring a forfeiture of his lease. the year without incurring a forfeiture of his lease.

6. This may be effected by altering the ninth line of Regulation 76, so as to read "shall not, without "the consent of the Governor in Council, be diminish-"ed, &c., &c.;" and I am prepared, therefore, to approve such modifications in the Regulations as are indicated in this Despatch.

I addressed you shortly on this subject in my telegram of the 16th instant.

## Hawkers Act, 1882.

HEREAS by section thirteen of "The Hawkers Act, 1882," the Colony has been divided, for the purpose of the said Act, into three Districts, designated the Northern, the Central, and the Southern; and whereas by the same section of the said Act it is directed that the limits of the said Districts, as set forth in the sixth schedule of the said Act, shall be published in the Government Gazette, the said limits are hereby published, for general information, viz.:

- The Northern District shall consist of that portion of the Colony lying North of latitude 23° 28' South.
- The Central District shall consist of that portion lying between latitude 23° 28' South and 31° 30' South.
- The Southern District shall consist of that portion lying between latitude 31° 30' South and 35° 15' South.



- No. 3. CENTRAL DISTRICT. Within the jurisdiction of the Resident Magistrates of York, Northam, and Toodyay. Inspector of Sheep-Mr. J. M. CRAIG.
- No. 4. IRWIN DISTRICT.-Bounded on the South by the North boundaries of the South-west and Central Districts. THE following Instructions, for the guidance of Inspectors of Sheep in the performance of their duties under "The Scab Act, 1882," are published for general information.

## Instructions to Inspectors of Sheep.

#### 1.—Correspondence.

1. All Correspondence and communication with the Government will be carried on through the Colonial Secretary.

## 2.—Act and Regulations.

2. The Inspector will be bound to keep copies of "The Scab Act, 1882," and of all duly authorised Regulations or Instructions under the same, which he will produce when required by the owner of any sheep which he may be inspecting.

#### 3.—Accounts and Returns.

3. The Inspector will make all his communications to owners and others in writing whether in the shape of notices, instructions, or decisions, copies of which he will in all cases retain; and he will deliver all such notices and decisions to the parties interested, personally, or at their residences, or transmit them to their respective addresses by letter through the post.

4. In replying to official correspondence, the Inspector will give not only the date of such communication, but also the numbers and letters (if any) which it may bear; and when any enclosure to be returned is received, he will note and attend to its contents, and return it without delay to the person by whom it was forwarded, keeping copies, if necessary.

5. All correspondence and reports by him should be expressed in clear and concise terms, and should be written in a legible hand, on foolscap paper, with one third margin.

6. The Inspector shall keep a journal or record of the employment of his time, and of the state of the health of the flocks in his district, from which he will, at the end of each month, make up a return to the Colonial Secretary in the form of Schedule E hereof.

7. Every Inspector, where necessary, will receive a book of license forms, with corresponding butts, which, on the granting of a license, he will fill up and retain; and he will also be furnished with a like book of renewed license forms, which he will fill up when required, in the same manner as that of license forms and butts.

8. On the receipt of any fees for a renewed license, or of any moneys paid to him under the Act, on public account, the Inspector shall make the necessary entries in his cash book, and he will, at the end of every calendar month, transmit the amount of such fees and moneys direct to the Resident Magistrate of the District in which he is located, who will forward the same to the Colonial Treasurer.

9. Immediately after the 30th of June and 31st of December in each year, the Inspector,

to whom such renewed license forms have been sent, will prepare and transmit to the Colonial Secretary a balance sheet, in the usual form, showing the number of license forms received, and the number of licenses and renewed licenses issued by him during the past half-year, and the number of forms on hand for the ensuing half-year.

10. On retirement or removal from his appointment, the Inspector will hand over to his successor, or to the nearest Resident Magistrate, all public records, books, acts, regulations, or other documents or papers in his possession, relating to the duties of his office.

#### 4.—Inspections.

11. The Inspector will provide himself with a proper "Scab glass," and will make himself thoroughly acquainted with its use and the best mode of detecting the *acarus*, or scab, if present.

12. In examining sheep the Inspector will exercise the greatest vigilance and care; 1st— That he makes all possible inquiry as to the probability of the infection reaching the sheep which he is examining; 2nd—That all the sheep belonging to the flocks which he is inspecting are presented to him for examination; 3rd— That every such sheep comes under his eye during the inspection; 4th—That he stops and examines every sheep showing the slightest symptoms of the disease; and 5th—That on handling any suspected sheep he carefully examines, both with the naked eye and with the "Scab glass," every portion of such sheep on which the disease is likely to show itself.

13. The first and most important duty of the Inspector, after that of preventing the spread of the disease, is to detect its existence immediately on its outbreak; and he should for this purpose not only endeavor to gain the earliest possible information of its doing so from third parties (which, as well as the names of such parties, must be kept strictly private), but he must keep up such a systematic round of inspection of the flocks in his district as would render it impossible for the disease to exist for any length of time without his detecting it.

#### 5.—Information of Disease.

14. The Inspector will likewise, so far as lies in his power, obtain reliable information as to the state of the flocks in other districts in the Colony; and he will convey any information of importance he may obtain in this respect to the neighboring Inspectors.

15. On becoming aware of the outbreak of the disease in any new locality, the Inspector will at once communicate the fact to the Colonial Secretary, and he will also convey to him any other information or suggestion connected with the duties of his office which he considers would be for the benefit of the public.

#### 6.—Infected Carcasses, Skins, or Wools.

16. In and around those districts where the infection exists, it will be the duty of the Inspector while it does so, and for some months afterwards, to be especially careful that no carcasses of sheep are left on runs or roads undestroyed, and that sheepskins and wool, on being conveyed from these districts, are, during the period stated, properly packed and secured.

## 7.—Outlay and Expenses.

17. He will in no case incur any outlay or expense, not expressly permitted by the Act or

these Regulations, without having first asked and obtained the sanction of the Governor thereto.

## II.-ENFORCEMENT OF PENALTIES.

18. As it is the duty of the Inspector to see that the provisions of the Act are carried out in their integrity, he will be vigilant to detect any breach or evasion of these provisions, and, on his doing so, he will at once lay an information before the Resident Magistrate of the district in which he is located, against the offender, with a view to enforce the penalties that may be incurred.

19. On laying an information for the recovery of any penalty or sum of money under the Act, the Inspector will, without delay, communicate the fact of his doing so to the Colonial Secretary, and will transmit to him, at the same time, a full statement of the case.

#### III.-INFECTED SHEEP.

#### 1.—Examination and Quarantine.

20. The Inspector, on finding that any sheep are infected, will see that the requisite notices are given by the owner, and that the caring for and branding of the sheep are attended to; and he will then, without delay, declare the run of the owner of such infected sheep whereon the same are for the time being depasturing as and to be the boundary within which the whole of such infected sheep shall be kept in quarantine, and deliver the requisite notice in the form of Schedule A hereof.

#### 2.-License and Supervision of Cleansing.

21. On application being made to him by the owner of infected sheep, the Inspector will, without fee, grant such owner a license in the form of Schedule B hereof, if issued in the months of May or June, for 16 weeks; if issued in the months of July or August, for 12 weeks; if issued in the month of September, for 8 weeks; if issued in the month of October, until 1st December; if issued at any time between 1st November and 1st May, for 4 weeks; and on a like application and payment by the owner of the authorised fees to the Inspector, he may grant a renewed license, also in the form of Schedule B, for a period of eight weeks; and it will be his duty not only to attend and see that the process of cleansing such sheep is properly carried out, but also to visit the sheep thus under license at intervals, and especially when the weather is such as would cause the disease, when present, to show itself.

#### 3.—Avoidance of License.

22. The Inspector, in serving any owner with notice of the avoidance of his license or renewed license, will do so in the form of Schedule C hereof, and should he think such a step to be necessary, he will apply to two Justices of the Peace for authority to destroy the sheep named in such license or renewed license.

## $4.-Clean \ Certificate.$

23. On receiving notice from the owner of any sheep which had been infected, that they are then clean, and that they have not exhibited any symptoms of Scab since they were last dipped, with an application from such owner for a certificate declaring his sheep to be now free from infection, the Inspector will, if he is not already acquainted with the correctness of such notice, make a thorough inquiry into the case, and will carefully inspect the sheep, for which such application is made, in the manner hereinbefore directed, and if he be then satisfied that the facts are as therein stated, he will, but not otherwise, grant the necessary certificate declaring such sheep to be clean in the form of Schedule D hereof.

## IV.-TRAVELLING SHEEP.

#### 1.—Inspection and Notice to next Inspector.

24. It will be the duty of the Inspector to examine all sheep travelling through or near his district, and to see not only as to the state of their health but also that all the requirements of the Act are fully complied with.

#### 2.—Examination on detention and disposal of

#### Sheep.

25. On the Inspector receiving notice from their owner of the detention of any travelling sheep he will at once proceed to examine them, and if he should decide that such sheep are infected he will immediately take the following steps, namely :—

- 1.—He will destroy all such as are actually infected with the disease.
- 2.—He may, if he thinks it proper so to do, direct that such of the sheep as may not be actually infected with the disease be driven back to the run from whence they came, or he may, in his discretion, permit them to proceed to their original destination, provided that by so doing he is certain that no risk whatever will be incurred of infecting sheep depasturing in the districts through which they may travel.
- 3.—The Inspector may, in the event of the owner of the sheep failing to comply with the direction to drive them back to the run from whence they came, destroy the same.

#### V.-IMPORTED SHEEP.

#### Inspection and Clean Certificate.

26. On receipt of a report from any person who may import sheep into the Colony, the Inspector will at once examine the sheep so imported, and if it should appear to him, after a thorough inspection of the same, that they are not infected, he will, but not otherwise, grant a Certificate accordingly in the forms of Schedule D hereof.

#### VI.-CONTRIBUTIONS.

#### Check on Returns by Owners.

27. The Inspector will ascertain and enter in his journal the actual number of sheep on the several stations in his district, and the names of their respective owners; and he will compare the returns made by such owners to the Clerks of Petty Sessions with the actual numbers thus ascertained by him; and if it should appear on such comparison that any owner failed to make a return, or to do so at the appointed time, or made an incorrect return, the Inspector will at once lay an information against such owner, and enforce payment of the correct amount of contribution, with expenses and penalties.
