WHEREAS by divers Acts of the Imperial Legislature, it is made lawful for the Governor of Western Australia, for the time being, to fix such place within any part of the said Colony, and such time for holding every Session of the Legislative Council of the said Colony, as he may think fit; NOW THEREFORE I, FREDERICK NAPIER BROOME, C.M.G., being Governor as aforesaid, in exercise of the powers so in me vested, do hereby announce and proclaim that a SESSION OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA shall commence and be holden for despatch of business on WEDNESDAY, THE EIGHTEENTH DAY OF JULY, 1883, at the hour of THREE o'clock in the AFTERNOON, in the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBERS, in the CITY OF PERTH, within the said Colony; and the Members of the Legislative Council are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

By His Excellency FREDERICK NAPIER BROOME, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Territory of Western Australia and its Dependencies, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain, passed in the 18th and 19th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to repeal the Acts of Parliament now in force respecting the disposal of the Waste Lands of the Crown in the Australian Colonies, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof," it is provided that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by instructions under Her Sign Manual, or through one of Her Principal Secretaries of State, to regulate the sale, letting, disposal, and occupation of Waste Lands of the Crown in Western Australia, and the disposal of the proceeds arising therefrom, until Parliament shall otherwise provide; AND WHEREAS, in pursuance of instructions received from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, certain Regulations theretofore made as aforesaid for the sale and disposal of the Waste Lands of the Crown within the Colony were published on the 7th day of October, in the year of our Lord 1882; AND WHEREAS it has appeared to Her Majesty expedient to amend such Regulations, and Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies has accordingly authorised and instructed me to proclaim in the usual manner the following additional Land Regulations, which are to be supplementary to and

considered a part of the said Regulations proclaimed on the 7th day of October, 1882; Now THEREFORE I, the said Governor, pursuant to the authority vested in me in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and issue the following Regulations, to be supplementary to and considered as part of the said Regulations published as aforesaid, and which are to take effect on and after the first day of August, 1883.

LAND REGULATIONS.

COMMONAGES.

Sub-Section 6 to Clause 56 of existing Regulations.

6. With respect to lands now occupied or to be occupied within the boundaries of the Greenough and Irwin Commonages, the Licensee shall, within the term of his license or before he can claim the Crown grant either by payment or otherwise, enclose the land described in his license with a good and substantial fence.

GENERAL CONDITIONS.

The Commissioner of Crown Lands is authorised to give to any holder of Fee Simple Lands not exceeding in the aggregate two hundred (200) acres, permission to cut from any unimproved Crown Land such timber as may be required for domestic uses, for the construction of buildings, fences, stockyards, or other improvements on the land so held, but not for any other purpose.

JETTY REGULATION.

42nd Victoria, No. 18.

ADDITIONAL Regulation made by the Governor in Executive Council for the management and use of all Public Jetties at the several Ports of the Colony, in accordance with the provisions of "The Jetties Regulation Act, 1878"—

I, FREDERICK NAPIER BROOME, Esq., Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor of the Colony of Western Australia and its Dependencies, do, by this Regulation made in pursuance of "The Jetties Regulation Act, 1878," direct and declare as follows, that is to say:—

"No person or persons shall land or place, or cause to be landed or placed upon the Public Jetties at the several Ports of the Colony, or upon the approaches to any such Jetties, any decayed or decaying vegetable matter or other thing whatsoever which is, or which is likely to become, a nuisance."

Surveying Schooner "Meda,"
Port Roebuck, 16th June, 1883.

I have the honor to inform Your Excellency of our arrival here from the Fitzroy river last night.

2. The "Meda" arrived in King Sound on the 24th May, and anchored in Port Osborne on the following day; but in consequence of not finding fresh water (our supply being nearly exhausted) proceeded without delay to the Fitzroy river, where we arrived on the 28th May.

Arriving during the night, we fired rockets to inform Mr. Fairbairn, but no fires or other indications were seen of the situation of the Resident and his party.

3. We remained in the locality until the 31st May, when we proceeded to Port Cunningham to try and obtain fresh water; at which place, by digging wells, we obtained a moderate quantity of very brackish water. The natives were friendly. Having returned to the Mary Isles on 3rd June, we observed a boat at anchor some 4 miles up the river, and upon pulling up to her found a police constable, who informed us that a party, consisting of the Surveyor General, the Resident (Mr. Fairbairn), and other gentlemen, had proceeded to Roebuck Bay to meet the mail steamer expected by them to arrive there on or about the 5th June. They had only taken a small supply of provisions, and as the mail steamer would not arrive for a fortnight, would be placed in difficulties. I therefore suggested to the police that it would be advisable to communicate with them forthwith and if possible carry over a further supply of provisions, which suggestions were, I believe, acted upon.

4. Having determined to return to Roebuck Bay, we sailed from the Fitzroy River on the 6th June, expecting to arrive here on the 10th, but light winds and calms retarded us. When leaving King Sound, the wind suddenly failed us when abreast of Sunday Island, and the vessel was carried towards the Roe Islands by the ebb tide at the rate of 5 knots an hour, and narrowly escaped being wrecked upon a ledge of sunken rocks and rocky islets which connects the east and west Roe Islands, the tide having carried the vessel within fifty feet of the danger—the great depth of water (fifty fathoms, with the "Meda's" jibboom touching the south shore of Roe Islands) rendering it impossible to anchor. Thence we experienced calms and baffling winds until our arrival last night.

5. We fired rockets and burnt blue lights as a signal to Mr. Forrest, but were surprised not to see bush fires or other signals made in reply. Upon communicating with the natives this morning, we received intelligence that Mr. Forrest and his party had left some days ago for La Grange Bay, their provisions having run out. After searching in the neighborhood of their camp, a note was found attached to a pole, from the Surveyor General, dated 13th June, addressed to the captain of the mail steamer, stating that himself and four other intending passengers by the steamer had left for La Grange Bay, in consequence of their supply of food being nearly exhausted. Mr. Forrest expressed a hope that the steamer would be able to call at La Grange Bay for him. A postscript had been added to Mr. Forrest's note by the mate of the cutter "Gertrude," for the information of the captain of the mail steamer, in the following words:—"Have gone to La Grange Bay to pick up Mr. Forrest. Buried Captain Walcott this morning, who died yesterday morning on board. [Date 15th June, 1883.] Chief Officer (signed) K. L. Randal." We presume the deceased was buried in Roebuck Bay, having died on the day before the vessel's arrival; but not having sighted the "Gertrude," or seen any grave in the neighborhood of the camp, we are in doubt.

6. Determined to proceed to La Grange Bay to render Mr. Forrest assistance should he need it, and detached Lieut. Dixon and a party to communicate with the mail steamer.

7. We have traced and surveyed a navigable channel into the Fitzroy River as far up as the proposed site for the township of Derby. Under ordinary circumstances, it is available at low water for vessels of 12 feet draught, and with the aid of buoys could be rendered available for vessels of 20 feet draught as far up as the Mary Isles. A stranger should anchor when distant half-a-mile from the north Mary Isle, with its north extreme bearing due West, having approached that island on the bearing of South. Beyond that point she must take advantage of the great rise and fall of tide (36 feet at springs and 20 feet at neaps), and be thus enabled to anchor in a small but deep hole (Amur Pool) abreast of the proposed township. The channel will require periodical examination. From a nautical point of view, (in consequence of the mud flat fronting the shore, and the swampy land extending back for $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the site of the township), the position of the townsite of Derby cannot be regarded as quite satisfactory. In due course, the landing difficulties can be doubtless overcome by building a jetty and causeway from the river's bank to the townsite. But Your Excellency will understand that I do not consider myself qualified to form a correct and trustworthy judgment upon those latter points.

8. Port Roebuck, so far as a cursory examination enables us to judge, appears to be a safe and practicable harbor; and when the survey is completed the necessary sailing directions will be forwarded, together with those for entering the Fitzroy River.

SIR,—I have the honor to forward, herewith, a letter addressed to me by Capt. O'Grady, of the Barque "Amur," with reference to the anchorage near Mary Island.

SIR,—Agreeably with your request, to report on the approach and suitability of the entrance to the Fitzroy as a safe anchorage for ships, I have the honor to report as follows:—That having carefully sounded both at low water, spring tides, and neaps, I found not less than two fathoms on the shoalest part at low water springs. This, with a rise of 30 feet, which I found would bring in any sized ship with the greatest safety, when she could anchor with the pole on shore, bearing S.E. by S., and the S. end of North Mary Island W. by S. in 7 fathoms low water spring tides. This is a convenient pool, being in extent about one mile and about 500 yards wide, sloping gradually towards the sides. The bottom is composed of stiff dark mud; the estimated distance from the shore being about one third of a mile. I also found an excellent anchorage directly opposite the pole or landing with 3½ fathoms at low water spring tides, with stiff dark mud at bottom, and measuring distance from shore at low water 156 yards. This latter anchorage is better protected from the strong tides, and perfectly safe as regards the tides. I have had no difficulty in going backwards and forwards between the ship and shore. I recommend Volume 3 of the Australian Directory (to which I can add nothing) to ship masters entering the Sound; but when once inside with a fair wind and flood tide, steer direct for Torment Point; after bringing the point to bear E. and 4 miles distant, steer S. by E.: the Mary Islands will be seen on the starboard bow; haul close in to distance of ½ a mile of the main land, and skirt along at this distance off until the opening between the N. and S. Mary Islands is seen. The ship will be then about 1½ miles from the landing or pole. This opening between the Mary Islands, close again very quickly, and by bringing the pole on shore and South end of North Mary Island to bear as before stated, the ship can anchor in the deep anchorage, which there is no difficulty to find. I would have no hesitation in putting a large ship on the ground for the purpose of discharging stock, the bottom being muddy and level; also being beyond the influence of the tides. I consider this a splendid place for landing stock. As this must now become the settled Port of the Fitzroy, I beg to offer a few suggestions about the landing. The landing place at high water spring tides is covered to the depth of 2 feet. I recommend there should be a platform erected, about, say, 3 feet high, and about 21 feet square. This would for the present hold all the cargo there is likely to be landed for some time. A small jetty run out about 50 yards from the level of the platform could be done with very little expense and trouble. The piles, say 5 x 5, could be driven through the stiff mud by a heavy hammer at low water; this would then answer for both neap and spring tides. I would also recommend there being an obelisk or land mark erected on shore for the better marking the place. I would recommend this should be in the shape of a tripod, about 24 feet high, boarded up and painted white.

Perth Poor House,
July 6th, 1883.

SIR,—I have the honor to report having, on the 18th ultimo, visited and inspected the Perth Protestant Orphanage for girls. Number of Government inmates, 28; infant boys, 3; maintained by private funds, 4; total number, 35.

The children were clean, neatly clothed, and appeared well fed and treated.

Miss Duffield, the matron, informed me that two of the inmates were suffering from an attack of low fever, and that they were under the care of the Colonial Surgeon; with this exception, the health of the children, during the quarter, has been good.

Since my visit, one of the above children has died; the other was removed to the Colonial Hospital for treatment.

The food supplied is of good quality, and the children are not stinted.

They attend school, which is conducted on the premises by Miss Duffield, and assist in the routine work of the Institution.

The same day I visited and inspected the Native and Half-Caste Mission, Perth. Number of boys, 9; girls, 15; total number, 24.

They were in good health, and neatly clothed, and appeared well fed and treated.

The provisions were good, and the children are allowed sufficient for their wants.

They receive a plain education, and assist in the work of the home, instructed by the matron, Mrs. Ford.

June 19th.—Visited and inspected the Roman Catholic Orphanage for girls, Perth. Number of Government inmates, 53; maintained by private funds, 18; total number, 71.

The children were clean, neatly clothed, and appeared well fed and healthy looking.

Their health, during the past quarter, has been good.

The food supplied is of good quality, and the children are allowed sufficient for their wants.

They are educated in the schools attached to the Convent, and are also trained to habits of industry.

June 20th.—Visited and inspected the Roman Catholic Orphanage for boys at Subiaco. Number of Government inmates, 55; maintained by private funds, 8; total number, 63.

The children were clean, neatly clothed, and healthy looking, and appeared well fed and treated.

Their health, during the past quarter, has been good.

The food supplied is of good quality, and they are allowed sufficient for their wants.

They attend school, which is conducted on the premises by the Sisters of Mercy. They are also taught various industrial pursuits, and also assist in the routine work of the Institution.

June 23rd.—Visited and inspected the Swan Protestant Orphanage (boys). Number of Government inmates, 28; maintained by private funds, 4; total number, 32.

The Venerable Archdeacon Brown, who was present, informed me that the health of the children, during the quarter, had been good; also, that Miss Guerin had been appointed by the Orphanage Committee matron in charge of the boys.

The children were clean, neatly clothed, and appeared well fed and treated.

The provisions were good, and they are allowed sufficient for their wants.

The boys assist in the routine work of the Institution; they are also brought up to habits of industry.
