This is an increase of £200 over the amount provided last year.

Request the Colonial Surgeon (Dr. Waylen) to refer to the Resolution on the subject of Vaccination passed by the Legislative Council on the 4th of August, 1882, and to the question of Mr. Grant and the answer by the Colonial Secretary at page 41 of the Proceedings of last Session, and to favor me with his report and recommendation in connection with the expenditure of the £500 now provided. What additional steps shall be taken, and what instructions issue, in consequence of the promise made by Government?

TO THE HONORABLE THE COLONIAL SECRETARY,

The additional £200 for Vaccination on the estimates for the current year are, I presume, to provide means for vaccinating the natives on the North-West Coast—because, so far as the present requirements of the Vaccination Act go, £300 provided last year is a sufficient sum for the rest of the colony, say south of the Murchison river.

On the 4th of August, 1882, I wrote a minute relative to Mr. Grant's motion, wherein I stated "that the same machinery existed at Nicol Bay as in other districts for the vaccination of natives;" and it exists still—the only practical difficulty, and a great one, is to catch the wild natives in order to operate on them; it is only where there are gatherings of half civilised natives, such as exist on Mr. Grant's and other stations, that it is practicable to carry out the provisions of the Act. Where these centres do exist there is nothing to prevent the Public Vaccinator of the District travelling any number of miles he chooses, to vaccinate: he gets his mileage and a guinea for every day he is absent from home on this duty. And I would submit that this is the only outlet, besides 2s. 6d. fee for each successful case, for the expenditure of a portion of the £200. I have at various times sent Mr. O'Meehan vaccine lymph on his application, but the result does not appear to have been very satisfactory. The natives about the neighborhood of the Murchison might be reached by one of the Public Vaccinators of the Champion Bay District if the numbers were sufficient to warrant such a long journey. I might suggest that any settler in these remote districts wishing for a supply of vaccine lymph, and knowing how to use it, could be furnished with such on application to the Superintendent of Vaccination.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR,

After a conversation with the Colonial Surgeon on the subject, I do not see what more can be done than he suggests.

HONORABLE COLONIAL SECRETARY,

The Government Residents at Geraldton and Roebourne should receive a copy of the Colonial Surgeon's report of the 16th instant, and should confer with the Government Medical Officers and Public Vaccinators of their districts, with the view of concerting any practicable measures for vaccinating an increased number of natives during the present year.

On this service, and from the increased vote, an expense can be incurred of £130 in the Roebourne District and £70 in the Champion Bay District, the money being expended by or on account of the officers authorised under the Vaccination Act, in the usual manner, according to the regulations and instructions. The Public Vaccinators can supply any settler of position who may apply to them, and who may be sufficiently instructed, with some vaccine lymph for use amongst any natives who may consent to be vaccinated. But expenditure from the vote can only be incurred for work done by officers authorised under the Act.

It is scarcely necessary to observe that all proceedings in consequence of these instructions must be in conformity with the law, under which the vaccination of adults is not compulsory.

Having considered with the Government Residents what steps may be taken, the Public Vaccinators will apply for vaccine lymph, as necessary, to the Superintendent of Vaccination, who will generally control their proceedings, according to law.

The Superintendent of Vaccination should consider whether there are any additional persons in the Northern Districts who may properly be appointed Public Vaccinators under the Act, and who may so assist in carrying out these instructions.

This correspondence should be published in the *Gazette*, for general information.



Injuries to Buoys, Beacons, and Ship Marks.

WHEREAS by "The Shipping and Pilotage Consolidation Ordinance, 1855," it is en-acted that any person who shall wilfully injure or remove any buoy, beacon, or sea mark used for the convenience of navigation or security of shipping shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding fifty pounds.

And whereas about the end of November last certain beacons in the River Swan were riddled by rifle bullets, and there is good reason for believing that some person or persons did wilfully injure the said beacons: Notice is hereby given that a reward of £5 will be given to any one who shall give such information to the Police authorities at Perth, or elsewhere, as will lead to the conviction of the said offender or offenders.

And notice is hereby further given that all offenders against the said Ordinance will be prosecuted according to Law.

The Commissioner will not receive Live Stock, Parcels, or Goods on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, Queen's Birthday, Queen's Coronation, Foundation of Colony, Prince of Wales Birthday, or any proclaimed Holiday.

All Live Stock must be loaded and unloaded by the sender and consignees respectively, by whom also the truck doors must be secured and opened, fastenings attended to, &c. Live Stock must be unloaded within three hours after arrival, otherwise it will be unloaded by the Commissioner at a charge of 2s. per truck.

Under no circumstances will the Commissioner be responsible for loss or injury to Live Stock, occurring during loading or unloading, whether such services be performed by either the servants of the Department or the owner, nor will he under any circumstances be responsible for loss of or any injury to any Live Stock during transit, arising from fear or restiveness, or through any of the animals being suffocated or trampled upon.

The Commissioner does not guarantee the arrival of Live Stock at any particular time nor for any particular market.

Powder and all Explosives double 2nd Class rates. Goods of a Dangerous Nature.

The Commissioner is not a common carrier of gunpowder, blasting powder, gun cotton, dynamite lithofracteur, fireworks, cartridges, aquafortis, mineral acids, petroleum, or lucifer matches, or any other goods which in the judg-ment of himself or his officers may be of a dangerous nature, and when the conveyance of such goods is under-taken it must be distinctly understood that it is *entirely at* the owner's risk, and that the Commissioner will not be responsible for any loss or damage occurring to or caused by same during transit, or while being loaded or unloaded, or at any time while in the custody of the Railway Department.

Eastern Railway-Goods, &c., Tariff (Continued.)

In order that all necessary precautions may be taken to ensure safety, no such goods are to be taken to the Railway unless their nature is made known, either by a conspicuously printed notice of contents exhibited on the outside of each package, or by a written notice of contents being handed to the receiving officer to whom the goods are made over. Any person disregarding this regulation will be liable under the Railway Acts, By-Law 5, (44 Vic., No. 17, Sec. 15), to a penalty not exceeding £50.

(See Special Regulations for conveyance of Gunpowder and other explosives).

Special Regulations for the Conveyance of Gunpowder and other Explosives.

All Gunpowder or other explosives must be packed in barrels closely joined and hooped, or in copper, zinc, or tinned cases or canisters enclosed in wooden boxes or barrels, and so secured that no part of the explosive can escape. Casks or other packages of blasting or loose powder must also be placed in bags or sacks to be provided by sender.

No barrel or package is to contain more than 100 bs.

On the outside of each barrel or package the contents must be distinctly specified in conspicuous letters of not less than 1 inch in length, and each barrel or package must also be addressed.

No explosive of any kind exceeding 100fbs. is to be taken to a Railway Station for despatch unless accompanied by a permit from the Traffic Manager authorising the same to be received and forwarded. In Fremantle these permits are to be obtained direct from the Traffic Manager by application at his office, but at other stations they may be procured through the Station-master. Station-masters are empowered to arrange for the conveyance of quantities of 100fbs. and under, without reference to the Traffic Manager; but under no circumstances is the smallest quantity of any kind of explosive to be brought to the Railway unless permission is first obtained from the officer in charge of the station from which it is to be despatched.

Any consignments of explosives not taken delivery of at destination and removed from the Railway premises within 24 hours after arrival, will be forfeited to the Commissioner, and when the quantity exceeds 100Hs., in addition to forfeiture the owner or consignee will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £50. Before a permit for despatch will be granted by the Traffic Manager the sender will be required to sign an agreement, undertaking to have the consignment removed at destination in accordance with this regulation.

Powder or other explosives will not be left at any place where there is not an officer in charge unless there is some one present to take delivery, but will be taken on to the next station and left there at owner's risk and expense.

Permits will not be granted in Fremantle after 4 p.m. on the day preceding despatch, nor after 12 noon on Saturdays.

The only time at which the Department will receive explosives is between 7 a.m. and 12 noon: and when the quantity exceeds 100lbs., only on Tuesdays and Thursdays (holidays excepted) in Fremantle, and at other stations on days to be specially arranged with the Traffic Manager or Station-master.

The Commissioner does not guarantee to receive explosives at any time, either on appointed days or otherwise, unless the necessary vans are available in which to place the same, and he reserves to himself the right to delay the despatch of any consignment, after received, as long as he may think proper, in order that other consignments may be forwarded in the same van. To secure despatch by first available train after received by the Department a minimum charge of 1 ton must be paid.

General Conditions.

Platforms and Sidings.—Goods will not be receive for delivery at platforms or sidings except under specagreement that the consignor will relieve the Commissioner of all responsibility in regard to any loss or damage occurring in unloading or arising from any cause whatever after arrival at destination, and the sender will be required to sign a special agreement to that effect. All goods for platforms and sidings must be prepaid at sending stations.

Marking and Packing.—All goods must be fully and distinctly addressed or marked, and well and securely packed.

Demurrage on Trucks.—When the loading or unloading of trucks has to be performed by the sender, consignee, or owner, a demurrage charge of 5s. per truck per day, or part of a day, will be made for all trucks not loaded up within twelve working hours after supplied, or unloaded within twelve working hours after arrival at destination (exclusive of Sundays or proclaimed holidays). Should the loading or unloading of trucks be delayed beyond the prescribed time when the goods have to be handled by the sender, consignee, or owner, as the case may be, the Commissioner may, instead of charging demurrage,

Should the loading or unloading of trucks be delayed beyond the prescribed time when the goods have to be handled by the sender, consignee, or owner, as the case may be, the Commissioner may, instead of charging demurrage, do the loading or unloading by his own servants, or men specially employed for the purpose, charging the person concerned the rates fixed by the rate sheet, or the actual cost of the work, where no rate is given. The Commissioner does not, however, guarantee to undertake the loading or unloading of any trucks, it being optional with him to handle the goods or not.

to handle the goods or not. Small consignments (less than a truck load) of special class goods will always be loaded or unloaded by the Department in the absence of the sender or consignee, and a charge of 1s. per ton made for each service.

Tarpaulins.—A charge of 2s. 6d. per day or part of a day will be made for each Tarpaulin used beyond twelve working hours (exclusive of Sundays or proclaimed holidays) in covering any goods (whether in the trucks or otherwise).

Storage on Goods.—All special class traffic and returned empties must be removed from the Railway premises within twelve working hours; 1st and 2nd class goods within twenty-four working hours after arrival at destination, exclusive of Sundays or proclaimed holidays. Such goods not removed within the times specified will remain on the Railway premises at the owner's risk, and be subject to a storage charge of 6d. per ton, or 1d. per package per diem, at the option of the Commissioner.

All other traffic will be subject to a charge of 6d. per ton per day if not removed from the railway premises within twelve working hours after arrival (exclusive of Sundays or proclaimed holidays).

Weighing of Goods.—A charge of 6d. per weighing will be made on all traffic passed over the Railway cart weighbridges.

Consignees to give Receipt.—A written receipt must be given by consignees for all goods received from the department; and the Commissioner may demand proof of ownership or an indemnity-note, signed by two approved sureties, should there be any doubt as to the person appling for the goods being the actual consignee or owner.

Claims for loss of goods will not be recognised unless lodged with the Commissioner within fourteen days after date of consignment, and no claim will be recognised after removal from the Railway premises of the goods alleged to have been damaged.

Unclaimed Property.—All goods or other property unclaimed for the space of six months after arrival will be sold by the Commissioner, and after deducting from the proceeds what may be due to the department for freight, storage, or other charges (including expenses of sale), the surplus, if any, will be held to the credit of the own, = and paid to him on demand.
