WHEREAS by divers Acts of the Imperial Legislature, it is made lawful for the Governor of Western Australia, for the time being, to fix such place within any part of the said Colony, and such time for holding every Session of the Legislative Council of the said Colony, as he may think fit; Now THEREFORE I, SIR FREDERICK NAPLIER BROOME, K.C.M.G., being Governor as aforesaid, in exercise of the powers so in me vested, do hereby announce and proclaim that a SESSION OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA shall commence and be holden for despatch of business on WEDNESDAY, THE TWENTY-SECOND DAY OF JULY NEXT, at the hour of THREE o'clock in the AFTERNOON, in the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBERS, in the CITY OF PERTH, in the said Colony; and the Members of the Legislative Council are hereby required to give their attendance at the same time and place accordingly.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,—

We, the Chairman and Councillors of the Municipality of Albany, on behalf of ourselves and the inhabitants of the town and the Plantagenet District, most respectfully beg to offer you our cordial welcome on this your return to our Colony to resume your high official duties.
