R EFERRING to Government Notice, No. 3197, of the 15th September last, His Excellency the Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following Telegram, received by him on the 11th inst., from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State.

By Command, OCT. BURT, for Colonial Secretary.

"Case of Chief Justice. Committee of Privy Council report that the first charge was not sufficient ground for formal charge, though the Chief Justice acted indiscreetly in deferring restoration of papers. Second charge. Conduct imputed to Chief Justice apparently arising from irritation produced by first charge, and, although letter marked by much improper language towards Governor, yet, inasmuch as this letter was not then published, it did not in itself afford adequate grounds for a charge intended to lead to suspension. The third charge is more serious, inasmuch as the letter last referred to, as well as the letter to the Secretary of State, couched in language of great animosity to the Governor of Western Australia, were given to the newspapers by the Chief Justice for publication, together with confidential information which the Chief Justice had not the right to give. On this charge, the Committee of the Privy Council had some hesitation in not recommending the confirmation of the suspension ; but, as no misconduct of a moral character, or connected with judicial duties is imputed to the Chief Justice, the Governor of Western Australia and the Chief Justice must have been prejudicial to the Colony, and that a continuance thereof must lead to deplorable results. The Order-in-Council confirming the report of the Committee orders that the suspension be removed. Communicate this to the Chief Justice at length, informing him that the suspension is removed. Publish this telegram.

LIGHT ON JARMAN ISLAND, COSSACK, NORTH-WEST AUSTRALIA.

N OTICE is hereby given that from the 16th May, 1888, a fixed white light of the third order Dioptric will be exhibited on Jarman Island, Cossack, N.W. Australia, on the spot where a beacon has hitherto been standing. The light will be shown from sunset to sunrise from a circular iron tower in Latitude 20° 39' 06" South, Longitude 117° 13' 21" East, and will be visible all round the horizon for a distance in clear weather of fifteen miles.

The tower is painted, the lower half red, and the upper half white, the centre of lantern being elevated ninety-six feet above high water. The height of the tower from base to vane being fifty-one feet. The light hitherto shown on Reader Head will be discontinued from the same date.


