### Additional Amended Regulation for the management of Goldfields.

Any Protection Area granted under the Regulations of 2nd February, 1888, which after the date of the grant thereof shall have come or shall come within the limits of a proclaimed goldfield, may, notwithstanding the proclamation of such goldfield, continue to be held under the terms of the said regulations, until the expiration of one year from the date of such grant or until the discovery of payable gold on such area, whichever shall first happen; in which latter case the Goldfields Regulations will immediately apply-provided that if the labor con-ditions requiring two men for each protection area, as provided by the Regulations of 2nd February, 1888, are not fully complied with, the above extension of time will cease and determine, and the protection area will be forfeited.

This Regulation is substituted for the Additional Regulation gazetted on October 1st, 1888, which is hereby cancelled.

Notice .- The attention of holders of Protection Areas is called to the above Regulation intended for their benefit, but they are warned that the Wardens of Goldfields are instructed not to grant any exemption from the labor con-ditions to persons availing themselves of this Regulation.

# By-Laws of Bunbury Municipal Council.

WHEREAS by the forty-ninth section of "The Municipal Institutions Act, 1876," it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for the Council to "make, publish, alter, modify, amend, or repeal such "By-Laws and Regulations as to them shall seem "meet for regulating their own proceedings," and for certain other purposes in the said section particularly named; and by the fiftieth section of the said Act it is further enacted "that such By-Laws should "not be inconsistent with or repugnant to any of "the provisions of that Act, or to any Law in force, "and when confirmed by the Governor with the "advice of the Executive Council, and published in "the Government Gazette, but not sooner or other-"wise, should have the force of Law:" Now, therefore, pursuant to the powers contained in such Act, it is ordered and directed by the Council of the Municipality of Bunbury that the following By-Laws shall, from and after confirmation and publication as aforesaid, be in force throughout the Municipality, all previously existing By-Laws being hereby re-pealed.

BY-LAW NO. 1.-INTERPRETATION.

In these By-Laws, unless the context otherwise requires :--

The word "Council" shall mean the Mayor Τ. and Council of Bunbury.

2. The word "Municipality" shall mean the town of Bunbury.

The word "Mayor" shall mean the Mayor of the Municipality.

4. The words "public street" shall mean and include every public street, road, footway, square,

thoroughfare, or other place within the Municipality. 5. The word "person" shall include a body corporate.

6. The word "owner" shall apply to every person in possession or receipt either of the whole or of any part of the rents or profits of any house,

building, land, or tenement. 7. The word "Act" shall mean "The Municipal Institutions Act, 1876."

### By-LAW NO. 2.-STANDING ORDERS.

### Order of Proceedings.

1. The Council shall meet at the Mechanics' Hall on the first Monday in every month, at the hour of half-past seven o'clock, p.m., for the trans-action of their ordinary business, and the business of the Council shall be conducted with open doors.

The Council shall commence business so soon after the above-mentioned hour as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum; but if, at the expiration of thirty minutes from the above-mentioned hour, there is not a quorum present, no business shall be transacted by the Council at that meeting.

Should the Mayor not be present, the meeting shall elect a Chairman from the councillors present, who shall preside during the absence of the Mayor.

4. At any meeting of the Council when there is not a quorum present, or when the Council is counted out (which counting out shall take place when-ever there shall be fewer than one-third of the members of the Council present, exclusive of the Mayor or councillor chosen to preside in his absence), such circumstance, together with the names of the members present, shall be recorded in the minute hook.

5. At all meetings of the Council the minutes of any preceding meeting not confirmed shall be read as the first business in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

6. Immediately after the confirmation of the minutes, the Mayor may make any communication to the Council which he may deem advisable, or bring under consideration any business he may think necessary, and it shall be competent for any member of the Council to ask a question or questions, but he shall confine himself to the question simply, and no debate shall issue thereon at that time.

7. The ordinary business shall then be proceeded with.

### Orders of Debate.

8. Any member proposing a motion or an amendment shall, if the Mayor so desire it, put it in writing and sign and deliver it to the Mayor, or other presiding Chairman for the time being, after it has been duly seconded, and the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall read the same before being discussed, and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the Council.

No member shall speak twice upon the same question, except by way of explanation or in reply, upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover or as the mover of the amendment last carried. Nevertheless, any member who may have been misrepresented or misunderstood may be allowed to explain. Immediately after the mover has replied, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

10. The Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the Council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply or in explanation as aforesaid.

11. Any member moving a motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that question.

12. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to any member.

13. The Mayor or other presiding Chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision shall be final in that particular case.

One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but, if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote, but upon any amendment being carried it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon, but no more.

15. Upon the adoption of any amendment such amendment shall be held to have taken the place of the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be and be deemed to be an original motion.

16. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the Council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year unless a call of the whole of the

Council has been duly made for the purpose, and no motion for rescinding any resolution of the Council, which shall have been negatived by the Council, shall again be entertained during the same municipal year unless by consent of at least four members of the Council.

17. In case of equality of votes the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall, in addition to his ordinary vote, give a casting vote, and any reasons stated by him shall be entered in the minutes of proceedings.

18. No By-Law shall be finally passed or rescinded at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, but at the next or some subsequent meeting of the Council duly convened.

### By-Law No. 3.—Suspension of Standing Orders-

In case of urgent necessity any standing order or orders of the Council may be suspended on motion duly made and seconded without notice, provided that such motion has the concurrence of at least four members of the Council.

### By-LAW NO. 4.—ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

1. When any office is at the disposal of the Council, at least sixteen clear days notice shall be given by advertisement in one or more of the local newspapers of the intention of the Council to fill such vacancy, which notice shall invite applications for the office to be sent in to the next meeting of the Council.

2. The salary and allowance attached to all offices at the disposal of the Council shall be fixed for the Municipal year, and in all cases before proceeding to the election.

3. At the next meeting of the Council after the notice as before mentioned has been given, all letters of application for the office shall be opened and the names read aloud, and the appointment may then be made.

4. All elections for offices at the disposal of the Council shall be effected by voting by ballot, the two candidates polling the largest number of votes being again put to the ballot, until one of such candidates shall have polled the majority of the votes of the members present. Every member present shall record his vote.

5. No member of the Council, nor any auditor of the Municipality, nor any officer thereof, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the Council, or for any work to be done by the Council, and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the Council.

### By-LAW NO. 5.—MUNICIPAL RATES.

All municipal rates shall be payable half-yearly, and the Collector for the time being duly appointed by the Council shall, at the commencement of each half-year, leave with the person liable to pay the same, or at his residence, a notice of the amount due by such person and requiring payment within fourteen days, and shall afterwards apply personally for payment of the same, and if the amount be not paid at the expiration of fourteen days after such application, shall take legal proceedings for its recovery.

# By-Law No. 6.—OFFICERS OF THE COUNCIL.

The Collector.

1. The Collector for the time being duly appointed by the Council shall demand, collect, and receive all rates, assessments, license fees, fines, forfeitures, rents, tolls, and other moneys due to the Council, and his receipt shall be a full and sufficient discharge for any moneys paid to him. And all moneys so received by the Collector shall be paid by him to the Treasurer of the Council weekly.

### The Clerk to the Council.

2. The Clerk to the Council shall keep the books of the Council, and shall duly enter, in a proper minute book, minutes of all proceedings of the Council. He shall attend all meetings of the Council, issue notices of all meetings, and shall prepare for the Council or Mayor thereof, and in due time, the Voters' List for the Municipality, and cause them to be affixed as by the said Act required, and shall supply copies thereof as by the said Act required, and shall make up and complete under the direction of the Council the Rate Book, and shall under the like direction prepare the annual estimates as by the said Act required. He shall also keep such books of accounts as are required by the one hundred and twenty-fourth section of the Said Act. He shall also, under the direction of the Council, prepare the annual financial statement or summary, and shall do and perform all such other acts as the Council or Mayor thereof may lawfully require him to do under or by virtue of the said Act, and shall attend the Council office during such hours as the Council may direct.

3. The custody of the journals and all other documents whatsoever belonging to the Council (except such documents as are hereinafter expressed to be kept by the Treasurer) shall be in the care of the Clerk, who shall neither take away nor permit to be taken away any such journals or documents from the Council office, without the express leave or order of the Council.

### The Treasurer.

4. The Treasurer shall have the custody of the common seal, and all deeds and records of the Council, but he shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the Council.

5. The Treasurer shall receive weekly from the Collector all sums stated to be received by him under By-Law No. 6, Section 1, and give the Collector a receipt for such moneys.

6. The Treasurer shall (if required by the Council at any time to do so) give a bond with two sureties in a sum to be named by the Council, conditioned for the honest, fair, and diligent discharge of his duties.

7. The Treasurer shall, out of the moneys received by him as Treasurer of the Council, pay all accounts duly and lawfully passed by the Council at its ordinary monthly meetings, and shall make all other payments which the Council may lawfully order.

8. The Treasurer shall pay all moneys received by him to the credit of the Council's general account at the Western Australian Bank, once at least in every week.

### The Supervisor.

9. The Supervisor for the time being duly appointed by the Council shall have the immediate care, management, and direction of all buildings, lands, streets, paths, jetties, wharves, markets, bathhouses, trees, posts, fences, works, drains, culverts, and all other property belonging to or in charge of, or under the possession, control, or power of the Council, and shall from time to time report to the Council the state of and condition as to repair of the same, and the progress of any works, going on therein or thereon, and the breach or violation of any By-Law in connection therewith.

### BY-LAW NO. 7.-SLAUGHTER HOUSES.

No slaughter houses shall be erected within the boundaries of the Municipality, and no person shall be allowed to slaughter any cattle or sheep within such boundaries. Any person offending against this By-Law shall forfeit and pay on conviction a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 20$ .

### BY-LAW No. 8.-PIGS.

No person shall keep any kind of living swine within a distance of 50 feet from any inhabited dwelling house, or within a distance of 75 feet from any public street. Any person offending against this By-Law shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding £5.

### BY-LAW NO. 9.—DAMAGING PROPERTY, &C., OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

Any person who shall (without first having obtained the sanction of the Council) break up, cut down, damage, destroy, or injure, or remove any footpath, tree, plant, post, fence, gate, drain, watercourse, culvert, jetty, wharf, bath-house, building, or other property belonging to or in charge of, or under the possession, control, or power of the Council shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding £20.

BY-LAW NO. 10.-TO PREVENT DANGER FROM FIRE.

Any person who shall (without first obtaining the permission of the Mayor), anywhere within the limits of the Municipality, light any unguarded fire or set fire to any straw, wood or rubbish, or make any bonfire, or let off any fire-works within the Municipality shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding £5.

### By-Law No. 11.-Danger from Firearms.

Any person who shall wantonly or without lawful excuse discharge any firearms in, near to, or across any public street within the limits of the Municipality shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 2$ .

### By-LAW NO. 12.—INFLAMMABLE MATERIALS.

Any person stacking any straw, hay, or other inflammable material (unless the same is in a building), within the boundary of the Municipality, shall upon conviction forfeit and pay a penalty of £5.

### By-Law No. 13.—Danger from Unbroken Horses and Cattle.

It shall not be lawful for any person to drive unbroken horses and cattle (other than milch cows, going to or returning from depasturing or watering) through any street or inhabited portion of the town, except between the hours of ten o'clock at night and eight o'clock in the morning, nor to break in or ride any unbroken horse in any street or thoroughfare, until the same shall have become tractable and manageable; and any person offending herein shall upon conviction forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 5$ .

By-Law No. 14.-Quarries and Timber.

1. Any person who shall quarry or remove stone on the lands belonging to or in charge of or under the possession, control, or power of the Council, without a license therefor, shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 2$ .

2. Any person who shall cut or remove any timber or bush on the lands belonging to or in charge of or under the possession, control, or power of the Council, without a license therefor, shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 5$ .

### BY-LAW NO. 15.-DANGER FROM VEHICLES.

Any person who, having the care of any vehicles in the public streets shall be at such a distance from such vehicle as not to have the complete control over every horse drawing the same, and shall not have one wheel of such vehicle chained, or the horse securely tied, shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 1$ .

### By-Law No. 16.—Danger to Passengers.

Any house or building the roof whereof shall overhang or project over, or from which any water may fall and flow across any public street, without having a proper gutter and pipe to carry off the rain, or shall have any cornice, crane or hoist or any other fixture or projection overhanging or projecting over any public street, without the sanction in writing of the Council therefor, shall be deemed to be a nuisance, and any owner of any such house or building or land who shall neglect or refuse to remove or abate such nuisance, within seven days after due notice by the Mayor, shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding £5.

### BY-LAW NO. 17.—DEPASTURING STOCK.

1. Any person who shall keep cattle, horses, sheep or goats for seven days, within the limits of the Municipality, or depasture the same on the lands belonging to, or in charge of or under the possession, control, or power of the Council, without a license therefor, shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 2$ .

3. Any person who shall depasture any sheep or goats within the limits of the Municipality, without first having obtained a license therefor, shall forfeit and pay upon conviction a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 5$ .

### BY-LAW NO. 18.—TRESPASS BY LIVE STOCK.

1. Any owners or other persons who shall wilfully or negligently allow any horse or other live stock to stray, or be at large within the limits of the Municipality, shall forfeit and pay, for every such offence, the following fines in addition to pound fees and damage by trespass:

For every Entire Horse or Bull, not less than £3, not more than £5.

For every other head of Cattle, within the meaning of the Act 47th Vict., No. 7, not exceeding £2.

### By-Law No. 19.—BATH HOUSE.

Any person who shall commit any nuisance within any public bath belonging to or in charge of the Council, or shall fish therefrom, or shall loiter about such bath to the annoyance of bathers therein shall upon conviction forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding  $\pounds 5$ . BY-LAW NO. 20.-LIGHT AT NIGHT ON BUILDING MATERIAL, &C., IN STREET.

When any building material, rubbish, or other things shall be laid or any hole or excavation shall be made in any of the streets or footpaths within the Municipality, the person depositing or causing such materials or other things to be so laid or the said hole or excavation to be made, shall at his own expense cause a sufficient light to be placed in a proper place upon or near the same and continue such light every night from sunset to sunrise during the time such materials, hole, or excavation shall remain, and in case such person shall refuse or neglect so to light and keep lighted such materials and other things as aforesaid, the person so offending

shall for every such offence forfeit and pay upon conviction any sum not exceeding £5.

### By-Law No. 21.

Any person who shall, without first obtaining the consent of the Council, deposit any rubbish or other things on any of the streets within the limits of the Municipality, except at such places appointed by the Council, shall on conviction pay a penalty not exceeding  $\pounds 2$ .

### PEARL SHELL FISHERY.

Instructions for the guidance of the Inspector of Pearl Shell Fisheries, and all other Officers concerned.

a. The executive operations of the Inspector of Pearl Shell Fisheries and of the Revenue Schooner are to be strictly limited to Colonial waters, that is, to waters within three miles of the coast of the Colony, or of the coast of any island being a dependency of the Colony. In the case of bays, gulfs, and estuaries, Colonial waters are bounded by a line drawn between headlands in sight of each other. Sharks Bay, Exmouth Gulf, King Sound, and Cambridge Gulf, are, however, to be treated as entirely Colonial waters.

b. There is nothing to prevent the Inspector of Pearl Shell Fisheries from visiting and boarding pearling vessels outside Colonial waters, provided this be done with the consent of the master of the pearling vessel; but, if any magisterial or other executive action be required, it can only be taken inside Colonial waters, and the vessel must enter Colonial waters before the Inspector can act.

c. Vessels fishing wholly beyond Colonial waters are not to be charged with export duty on pearl shells raised beyond such waters. Such pearl shells are to be allowed, when required, to pass through the Western Australian Customs, for export, in bond without payment of duty.

d. Vessels fishing wholly beyond Colonial waters are not to be charged duty on unlanded stores, &c., brought by them from beyond the Colony. Such stores may pass the Western Australian Customs in bond, when required for sea consumption, without payment of duty.

e. The Pearl Shell Fishery Acts and Regulations are to continue to be fully applied, as at present, to all pearling vessels fishing wholly or partly within Colonial waters, but not to vessels which, while fishing wholly beyond such waters, enter the ports of the Colony or otherwise come within Colonial waters, for shelter, supplies, or for any purpose other than fishing.

f. The Pearl Shell Fishery Acts and Regulations are to be applied to any vessel in respect of which a license has been issued and is current under "The Pearl Shell Fishery Act, 1886," provided that executive action in respect of any such vessel shall not be taken outside Colonial waters. Masters of vessels holding a license, but desiring to cease fishing within Colonial waters, may return the license to any issuing officer.

g. No aboriginal native of this Colony is to be permitted to be engaged for service under the Pearl Shell Fishery Regulation Acts of 1873 and 1875, on board any pearling vessel not licensed as such under "The Pearl Shell Fishery Act, 1886."

h. Unlicensed vessels should be warned that the full penalties provided by law will be enforced against them, if at any time they raise pearl shells within Colonial waters.
