Whereas by Clause 14 of the Letters Patent passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Western Australia and its Dependencies, bearing date the 25th August, 1890, it is provided that in the event of the Governor having occasion to be temporarily absent for a short period from the seat of Government or from the Colony, he may in every such case, by an Instrument under the Public Seal of the Colony, constitute and appoint Our Lieutenant Governor, or if there be no such Officer, then any other person, to be his Deputy during such temporary absence, and in that capacity to exercise, perform, and execute for and on behalf of the Governor during such absence, but no longer, all such powers and authorities vested in the Governor by these Our Letters Patent, as shall in and by such Instrument be specified and limited, but no others: Provided, nevertheless, that by the appointment of a Deputy as aforesaid, the

power and authority of the Governor shall not be abridged, altered, or in any way affected, otherwise than We may at any time hereafter think proper to direct;

AND WHEREAS I, the said Governor, purpose to absent myself temporarily from the said Colony as authorised;

AND WHEREAS there is no Lieutenant Governor of the said Colony:

Now therefore I, the said Governor, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in me as aforesaid, do by this Instrument under the Public Seal of the Colony constitute and appoint you, the Honorable SIR MALCOLM FRASER, from the date of my departure upon the said absence from the said Colony, and during such absence, to exercise, perform, and execute, for and on my behalf as such Governor, all the powers and authorities vested in me by the said Letters Patent.

53 & 54 VICTORIA, CHAPTER 26.

A.D. 1890.

An Act to enable Her Majesty to assent to a Bill for conferring a Constitution on Western Australia.

[25th July, 1890.]

WHEREAS a Bill for conferring a constitution on Western Australia has been passed by the Legislative Council of Western Australia and has been reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon:

And whereas it is provided by the said Bill that the provisions thereof shall have no force or effect until so much and such parts of the Acts of Parliament specified in the Second Schedule to this Act as relate to the colony and are repugnant to the Bill have been repealed:

And whereas it is expedient that Her Majesty be authorised to assent to the said Bill, subject to an amendment thereof as to the pension of the Attorney General:

And whereas the said Bill as so amended is set forth in the First Schedule to this Act and is in this Act referred to as the scheduled Bill:

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

A.D. 1890.

1. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty by Order in Council to assent to the scheduled Bill, notwithstanding anything contained in any of the Acts mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Act.

Power for Her Majesty to assent to scheduled Bill.

2. From the day of the proclamation of this Act in the colony of Western Australia so much and such parts of the several Acts mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Act as relate to the colony of Western Australia and are repugnant to the scheduled Bill shall be repealed.

Repeal of certain provisions in Acts of Parliament relating to Western Australia.

Provided as follows:—

(a.) The provisions of the Acts of the session held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-nine, and of the session held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy-six (being two of the Acts mentioned in the said schedule), which relate to the giving or withholding of Her Majesty's assent to Bills, and the reservation of Bills for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, and the instructions to be conveyed to Governors for their guidance in relation to the matters aforesaid, and the disallowance of Bills by Her Majesty, shall apply to Bills to be passed by the Legislative Council and Assembly constituted under the scheduled Bill and this Act, and by any other legislative body or bodies which may at any time hereafter be substituted for the said Legislative Council and Assembly:

(b.) So much of the two last-mentioned Acts as relates to the constitution, appointment, and powers of the Legislative Council of the colony of Western Australia shall continue in force until the first writs have been issued for the election of members to serve in the Legislative Assembly in pursuance of the provisions of the scheduled Bill, but no longer.

3. The entire management and control of the waste lands of the Crown in the colony of Western Australia, and of the proceeds of the sale, letting, and disposal thereof, including all royalties, mines, and minerals, shall be vested in the legislature of that colony.

Provision as to waste lands in Western Australia.

4.—(1.) Section seven of the Act of the session held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her present Majesty, chapter fifty-six, is hereby repealed, but all regulations made under that section, and in force at the commencement of this Act, shall continue in force until altered or repealed in pursuance of the powers conferred by this Act; and for the purposes of this section the Acts of the Legislative Council of Western Australia, entitled the Gold Fields Act, 1886, and the Gold Fields Act Amendment Act, 1888, shall have effect as if they were such regulations as aforesaid.

Repeal of existing power to make land regulations subject to savings.

(2.) Nothing in this Act shall affect any contract or prevent the fulfilment of any promise or engagement made before the time at which this Act takes effect in the colony of Western Australia on behalf of Her Majesty with respect to any lands situate in that colony, nor shall disturb or in any way interfere with or prejudice any vested or other rights which have accrued or belong to the licensed occupants or lessees of any Crown lands within that colony.

5. It shall be lawful for the legislature for the time being of Western Australia to make laws altering or repealing any of the

Power to repeal and alter scheduled Bill.

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provisions of the scheduled Bill in the same manner as any other laws for the good government of that colony, subject, however, to the conditions imposed by the scheduled Bill on the alteration of the provisions thereof in certain particulars until and unless those conditions are repealed or altered by the authority of that legislature.

Power to divide the colony.

6.—(1.) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if at any time or times Her Majesty so thinks fit, by Order in Council, to divide the colony of Western Australia by separating therefrom any portion thereof, and either to erect that portion or any part thereof into a separate colony or colonies under such form of government and legislature as Her Majesty may think fit to establish therein, or to unite the same or any part thereof to any other Australian colony, and further to sub-divide any separate colony so created as aforesaid and to establish in such sub-division any form of government and legislature which her Majesty may think fit, and to re-unite to the colony of Western Australia any part of any colony so created.

(2.) In the event of any such separation or other proceeding the provisions of the scheduled Bill and of this Act shall apply as far as practicable to the colony of Western Australia as for the time being existing.

(3.) If under the powers conferred by this section any portions of electoral districts are separated from the colony of Western Australia, the remaining portions not separated shall, until the Legislature of Western Australia otherwise provides, continue to return to the Legislative Assembly of that colony the same number of members as if the separation had not taken place, and the said Assembly shall retain, so far as concerns the colony of Western Australia as constituted after the separation, all the powers and functions vested in it, though it may not thereafter consist of the same number of members as before.

(4.) By any Order in Council made in pursuance of this section power may be given to the legislature of any colony thereby created to make further provision with respect to the government of that colony.

Commencement of Act.

7. This Act and the Order in Council signifying Her Majesty's assent to the scheduled Bill shall be proclaimed in Western Australia by the governor or other person lawfully administering the government of Western Australia within three months after he has received a copy thereof, and this Act and the scheduled Bill shall, except as provided in section forty-two of the scheduled Bill, take effect in the colony from the day of such proclamation.

Short title.

8. This Act may be cited as the Western Australia Constitution Act, 1890.

DIRECTIONS FOR No. 3 CUTTING.

AS the dredge "Saurian" has completed the first half-width of 100 feet of the above Cutting (i.e., the up-stream or Western half), giving a depth of 10 feet at low-water ordinary spring tides, after this date, and until the completion of the second half of the Cutting, the present

line of Leading Beacons and Lights will be shifted 50 feet up stream, and parallel to the present line, or in the centre line of that part of the Cutting just completed.

It will therefore be necessary for vessels passing up the river to leave the Dredge on the starboard hand instead of the port hand, as at present. The Dredge will be moored about 25 feet only above the line of Lights, consequently vessels must be prepared to keep a little below, or on the line, and not get on the upper side of it.

TRINITY HARBOUR.

DIRECTIONS FOR NEW CUTTING.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the New Cutting into Trinity Harbour is now open for navigation. It is 200 feet wide, and is marked by six piles carrying square black beacons driven 50 feet from the edge on the eastern side of the Cutting; the shoalest water in the Cutting being 13 feet at low-water ordinary spring tides. After passing through the Cutting the water gradually deepens from 3 to 5 fathoms, the depth at the anchorage off the wharves.

DIRECTIONS.

By Day.—After passing the Fairway Buoy steer about S.S.W., keeping two white triangular beacons, which are erected on the masts on which the leading lights are exhibited, in line, which will carry in mid-cutting until within a ship's length of the outer leading light mast; then steer mid-stream until abreast the wharves, when a vessel may anchor in mid-channel in 4 to 5 fathoms of water.

By Night.—Two white leading lights and one red light are exhibited, which enable vessels to enter the Port, and reach the wharves by night. The back light is at an elevation of 96 feet, and the front light of 37 feet, above high water, and are at a distance apart of 5,000 feet. The red light which is at the wharves, is distant half a mile above the outer white light. When making for the Fairway Buoy the two leading lights will be seen, which, when brought in line, will bear about S.S.W. and will lead in mid-cutting. Steer with the lights in line to within one or two ship's lengths of the outer light, when haul more to the eastward, keeping the red light, which is placed on the outer end of Burns, Philp, and Company's wharf, on the starboard hand. When abreast of the red light a vessel may anchor in from 4 to 5 fathoms.

The old Channel is still marked by seven black beacons on the port hand, and seven red beacons on the starboard hand.

A tide-guage, showing the depth of water in the Cutting, is placed on the outer pile marking the eastern side of the Cutting.

The education is exclusively secular, and, in order to meet modern requirements, and to fit boys for Colonial life or for mercantile pursuits, it has been decided to make the study of dead languages optional. Parents of boys may however feel not less sure than heretofore of finding thorough classical instruction for their sons. The University Exhibitions, open for competition throughout the Colony, have in each case been awarded to a High School boy.

Fees.

The present scale of fees is as follows:—

For each boy over 12 years of age on the first day of the term, £3 6s. 8d. per term.

For each boy under 12 years of age on the first day of the term, £2 13s. 4d. per term.

In the case of two or more brothers attending the school, a reduction of 10 per cent. will be allowed in the fees for tuition.

The fees for each resident boarder are at the rate of £60 per annum for a boy over 12 years of age, and £50 per annum under 12 years, inclusive of the tuition fee.

Boys are received from the age of eight years and upwards.

Scholarships.

There are two High School Scholarships of the annual value of £50, open to competition by boys from any of the Elementary Schools.

Terms and Vacations.

The year is divided into 3 terms, with vacations of 6 weeks at Christmas; 1 week at Easter, during which it is optional for boarders to remain at the School without additional charge; and 5 weeks at Midwinter.

The School reassembles for the September term this day.
