7 HEREAS under and by virtue of the provisions of the 46th section of "The Scab Act, 1891," the Governor in Council is empowered, by Proclamation to be published in the Government Gazette, to appoint one or more places at or adjacent to the inland boundaries of any district, at some one or other of which places all sheep to be introduced by land into any such district, shall be crossed over such boundaries, and no sheep shall be introduced by land into any district unless at some one of such places: Now THEREFORE I, the said Governor in Council, do hereby appoint "Elizabeth Spring," situate on the Murchison River, within Pastoral Lease 67/284, as the place at which all sheep to be introduced by land from the Victoria District into the North District shall be crossed over the boundaries of the said North District, and do likewise appoint the "Eight-Mile Water" or Spring, situate about 8 miles south of the Irwin River and 3 miles from Milo, as the place at which all sheep to be introduced by land from the Victoria District into the South District shall be crossed over the boundaries of the said South District.

### CENTRAL DISTRICT.

That part of the Colony (and islands adjacent, including Houtman's Abrolhos) lying between the latitude of Elizabeth Springs, on the Murchison River, on the North—the latitude of the Eight-mile water Southward from Milo on the Irwin River on the South—and the longitude 117° East which passes through Coompacoonipera Hill, near Bilberatha Peak, on the East. [Of these boundaries, the Northern passes through Depuch loop, Sharks Bay, and about 100 chains Northward from Woogerong Well in Messrs. Tyson's lease  $\frac{4}{3}$ ; the Eastern passes about 2 miles West from Wheels' Hill, about 1 mile West from Buongnoo Hill, about  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile East from Nannowtharra Well, through Coompacconipera Hill, about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  miles West from Moogootherra Hill, about 5 miles West from Warriedar Hill Trigonometrical Station to a spot about 2 miles West from Weedagably (or Lucky Spring) on the shore of Lake Monger; the Southern boundary passes about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile Southward from Victoria Location 167 at Yuwarane, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile North of Mt. Scratch Trigonometrical Station, and about 1 mile North from Dar Spring].

### NORTHERN DISTRICT.

That part of the Colony (and the islands adjacent) lying Northward of the Central District described above, and a line drawn Eastward in continuation of its Southern boundary.

### SOUTHERN DISTRICT.

T is the intention of the Government to erect Dips and to supply all materials necessary for dipping Sheep, under supervision of an Inspector, at Elizabeth Springs and the Eight-mile Water; at a charge of Six pounds per thousand at the former place, from 1st February to 15th August, both inclusive, and Three pounds per thousand from 16th August to 31st January, both inclusive; Four pounds at Eight-mile Water, from 1st February to 15th August, both inclusive, and Two pounds from 16th August to 31st January, both inclusive. Owners of sheep must provide their own labor for dipping. No time will be lost in erecting these Dips; but until they are ready, owners of sheep will have to make their own arrangements.

Declaration between the Governments of Great Britain and France, with reference to proceeds of Wrecks.

THE following Correspondence respecting a Declaration between the Governments of Great Britain and France, with reference to the proceeds of Wrecks, and notifying the accession of this Colony to that Declaration is published, for general information.

CIRCULAR (1.)

Downing Street, 19th November, 1889.

SIR I have the honor to transmit to you, for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of a Declara-tion between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Government of the French Republic, signed at Paris on the 23rd of October, 1889, with reference to the disposal of the proceeds of wrecks on their respective coasts.

I have to call your attention to Article VI. of the Declaration, from which you will observe that, if it is desired that the stipulations of the Declaration should be made applicable to the Colony under your Government, notice to that effect must be given by Her Britannic Majesty's Representative to the French Republic within one year from the 23rd of October, the date of the signature of the Declaration.

I have, therefore, to request that you will be good enough to acquaint me as soon as possible of the wishes of your Government in the matter.

Declaration between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Government of the French Republic, with reference to the Disposal of the Proceeds of Wrecks on their respective Coasts.

THE Government of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and the Government of the French Republic, desiring to regulate by a new Agreement questions relative to the disposal of the proceeds of wrecks on the coasts of the two States, have agreed to replace the Declaration signed at London on the 16th June, 1879, by the following arrangements :--

### ARTICLE I.

TABLICUE I. When any ship belonging to the subjects of one of the two Con-tracting States is wrecked or stranded on the coast of the other, the competent local authorities shall, with as little delay as possible, bring the fact to the knowledge of the Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent nearest to the spot where the wreck or stranding has taken place.

### ARTICLE II.

ARTICLE II. All operations relative to the salvage of British ships which may be wrecked or stranded on the coasts of France shall be directed by the Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, or Consular Agents of Great Britain, and, reciprocally, the French Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents shall direct all operations relative to the salvage of ships of their nation wrecked or stranded on the coasts of Great Britain.

#### ARTICLE III.

If the owners of the ship and cargo, or their duly authorised repre-sentatives, shall be present and shall claim it, the Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents shall hand over to them the conduct of the salvage operations after requiring the deposit of the ship's papers, as well as the reimbursement of the expenses already defrayed, and a sufficient guarantee for those incurred before the opera-tions were handed over, and which may not have been already settled.

### ARTICLE IV.

ARTICLE IV. The intervention of the local authorities shall only take place in the two countries for the purpose of assisting the Consular authority, of maintaining order, of securing the interests of the salvors if they are strangers to the shipwrecked crews, and of assuring the due execution of the armagements to be carried out for the entry and departure of the merchandize saved. In the absence, and until the arrival of the Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, or Consular Agents, the local authorities shall, moreover, take all necessary measures for the protection of the persons, and for the preservation of the articles which shall have been saved from the wreck.

Wreek. This intervention shall not give rise to any charges, with the excep-tion of those which the salvage operations and the protection of the articles saved shall have rendered necessary, and those to which national ships would, under similar circumstances, be liable. These charges shall be paid according to the circumstances of the case, either by the agents of the Consular service, or by their owners or their provies.

In case absence, sickness, or any other cause should prevent the Agents of the Consular service from seeing to the operations and the management of the salvage, the local authorities who may be charged with the operations and management in question shall be bound to remit to the aforesaid Agents the ship's papers and the net proceeds of the ship and the cargo.

### ARTICLE V.

The merchandise and articles saved shall not be liable to any customs duties, unless they are intended for home consumption, in which case they shall pay the same duties as they would have had to pay if they had been imported in national vessels.

### ARTICLE VI.

The stipulations of the present Declaration shall be applicable to all the Colouies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, except-ing to those hereinafter named, that is to say, except to :--

e hereinafter named, that is India. The Dominion of Canada. Newfoundland. The Cape. Natal. New South Wales. Vietoria. Queensland. Tasmania. South Australia. Western Australia. New Zealand, New Zealand.

Provided always that the stipulations of the present Declaration shall be made applicable to any of the above-named Colonies or foreign pos-sessions on whose behalf notice to that effect shall have been given by Her Britannic Majesty's Representative to the French Republic within one year from the date of the signature of the present Declaration. The stipulations of the present Declaration shall be applicable to all the Colonies and foreign possessions of France.

ARTICLE VII.

# The present Declaration shall come into operation three months after the date of its signature, and shall remain in force until the ex-piration of one year from the day on which either Party may give notice of its intention to terminate it.

In witness whereof, the Undersigned Plenipotentiaries, His Excel-lency the Earl of Lytton, Ambassador of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Excellency M. Eugène Spuller, Minister for Foreign Affairs, have signed the present Declaration, and have affixed thereto their seals. Done at Paris, this twenty-third day of October, 1889.

### By-Law No. 7.

A By-Law to regulate, by means of Standing Orders, the Proceedings of the Council of the Town of Albany.

WHEREAS by "The Municipal Institutions Act, 1876," Section 49, it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for the Council to make, publish, alter, modify, amend, or repeal such By-laws and Regulations as to them shall seem meet for regulating their own proceedings;" And whereas it is expedient to make certain By-laws of the Town Council of Albany to regulate the conduct, proceedings, and business of the said Council; Be it therefore enacted that from and after the date of this By-law coming into operation, the proceedings and business of the said Council shall be conducted according to the following Regulations only, which shall be, and be called the Standing Orders of the said Council.

### Order of Proceeding.

1. The business of the Council shall be conducted on all occasions with open doors.

2. Any person not being a Councillor who shall have been admitted to any meeting of the Council, who shall be guilty thereat of any threat, improper or disorderly conduct, or who shall talk aloud or otherwise interrupt the business of such meeting, or who shall not leave when lawfully requested by the Mayor or Chairman so to do, may be forthwith removed by his order and shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

3. The Council shall commence business so soon after the time stated in the summons as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum; but if at the expiration of fifteen minutes from the time specified in the summons there is not a quorum present, the Council shall stand adjourned.

4. Should the Mayor not be present the meeting shall elect a Chairman from the Councillors present, who shall preside during the absence of the Mayor.

5. At all meetings of the Council when there is not a quorum present or when the Council is counted out, which counting out shall take place whenever there is not a quorum present, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the Minute Book.

6. At all meetings of the Council the minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read as the first business of all meetings of the Council, in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

7. Immediately after the confirmation of the minutes, the Mayor may make any communication to the Council which he may deem advisable, or bring under consideration any business he may think necessary, and it shall be competent for any member of the Council to ask a question or questions, but he shall confine himself to the question simply and no debate shall ensue thereon at that time.

### LETTERS, PETITIONS, MEMORIALS.

8. Letters, petitions, and memorials shall then be read.

### ORDERS OF THE DAY.

9. "An order of the day" shall be taken to mean the report of a committee, a notice of motion, or any matter which the Council may have postponed or directed to be considered at the next or any subsequent meeting of the Council.

### Order of Business.

10. The Orders of the Day shall be numbered, brought on, and disposed of in the order in which they appear on the paper; correspondence, accounts for payment, and Reports of Committees being numbered as the first Orders of the Day.

11. Any member of the Council may bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in the form of a notice of motion; such notice to be given in writing to the Town Clerk at least four clear days previous to the meeting at which it is intended to consider the same, and the substance of such notice shall be communicated by the Town Clerk to the members of the Council in the summons for such meeting, and all such notices of motion shall be considered Orders of the Day.

12. Tenders for work shall be opened, considered, and dealt with immediately after the Orders of the Day have been disposed of.

13. If any Notice of Motion contains unbecoming expressions, the Council may order that it be expunged from the Council paper.

14. No Order of the Day shall be proceeded with when called on unless the member who gave the notice, or some member authorised by him to proceed thereon, be present; but it, as well as any Notice of Motion on the notice paper not moved when called on, shall lapse.

15. If at any adjournment of the Council any Orders of the Day on the notice paper have not been called on, such Orders of the Day or any adjourned debate shall be set down on the notice paper for the next sitting day, at the end of the regular business.

### ORDERS OF DEBATE.

16. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise in his place uncovered and address the Mayor or other presiding Officer, and no member when speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, in which case he shall sit down and the member calling to order shall in the first place name the standing order on the strength of which he rises, and if found to be correct by the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall be heard in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed or any other subject entered upon.

17. Any member proposing a motion or an amendment shall put it in writing and sign and deliver it to the Mayor or other presiding Chairman for the time being, after it has been duly seconded, and the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall read the same before being discussed, and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the Council.

18. Any member may require the enforcement of any Standing Order of the Council by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.

19. The members in speaking shall designate each other by their respective titles of Mayor or Councillor as the case may be, the Mayor or other presiding Chairman shall decide which is entitled to preaudience.

20. No member shall speak twice upon the same question, except by way of explanation or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover or as the mover of the amendment last carried, nevertheless any member who may have been misrepresented or misunderstood shall be allowed to explain immediately before the mover rises to reply; the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

21. The Mayor or other presiding chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the Council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same question unless entitled to reply or in explanation where he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

22. Any member moving a motion of amendment shall be held to have spoken on that question, but any member who may have signed the proposition paper, either as proposer or seconder, to enable the reports of the Committee of Council to be put to the vote for adoption or otherwise by the Council, shall not be held to have spoken thereon by such act, but may address the Council on matters contained in such reports.

23. Any member moving a suspension of the Standing Orders or any of them shall be entitled simply to state the grounds of such motion and the nature and objects of the motion which he may seek to make thereon, but no discussion shall take place upon any such motion.

24. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion nor impute improper motives to any other member, and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered highly disorderly.

25. Any member may require the Town Clerk to take down any particular words used by a member immediately upon the same being used, provided that every such demand shall be made at the time such word or words are used and not after any other member has spoken.

26. The Mayor or other presiding Chairman when called upon to decide a point of order or practice shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision shall be final in that particular case.

27. Any member who shall use any expression capable, in the opinion of the Mayor or other presiding Chairman, of being applied offensively to any other member, shall, if required by the Council, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the Council.

28. No member shall converse aloud except to call to order, or make any noise or disturbance whilst any member is speaking, or whilst any other matter is being read or opened, and in case of such noise or disturbance being persisted in after the Mayor or Chairman has called to order, the Mayor or Chairman shall call upon the members making such disturbance by name, and every such person will incur the displeasure and censure of the Council.

29. When the Mayor or Chairman is putting a question no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor when a member is speaking shall any member hold discourse to interrupt him except to order, nor pass between him and the Chair.

30. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the Corporation relating to the question or matter under discussion.

31. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon but no more.

32. Upon the adoption of any amendment such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

33. The Mayor or other presiding chairman shall, in taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as it is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion from the show of hands as to which party has the majority.

34. The Council shall vote by a show of hands but any member of the Council may call for a division upon any question, in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall until the vote is recorded stand up, and those in the negative retain their seats; all division lists shall be entered on the minutes.

35. No member shall speak to any question after the same has been put by the Mayor or chairman, except to call for a division.

36. No member shall reflect upon any vote of the Council except for the purpose of moving such vote to be rescinded.

37. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Council, but if on the question being put the motion be negatived the subject then under discussion or the next on the notice paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained.

38. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the Council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole Council has been duly made for the purpose; and no motion for rescinding any resolution of the Council which shall have been negatived by the Council shall again be entertained during the same municipal year, unless by consent of at least six members of the Council.

39. A motion, "that the Council do now divide," moved and seconded, shall take precedence of all other business, and shall be put by the Mayor or Chairman without any discussion taking place; provided that no such motion shall be made so as to interrupt a Member while speaking, and on the motion for division being lost the discussion on the original question shall be resumed where it was interrupted; and no motion to divide shall again be entertained until one or more Members have addressed the Chair.

40. A debate may be adjourned, on motion, without any previous notice of motion duly seconded and without discussion, either to a later hour of the same day, or to any other day.

41. The Member upon whose motion any debate shall be adjourned by the Council shall be entitled to pre-audience on the resumption of the debate.

42. If a debate on any motion, moved and seconded, be interrupted by the Council being counted out, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted, on motion with notice.

43. Every Member present in the Council when the question is then put will be required to remain and vote.

44. In case of any equality of votes, the Chairman shall give a casting vote, and any reasons stated by him shall be entered in the minutes and proceedings.

### SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.

45. In cases of urgent necessity any standing order or orders of the Council may be suspended on motion duly made and seconded without notice, provided that such motion has the concurrence of at least three members of the Council. 46. Every member of the Council who shall commit a breach of any section of this part of these Bylaws, or who shall move or attempt to move any motion or amendment embodying any matter as to which the Council has no legal jurisdiction, or who shall in any other way raise or attempt to raise any question, or shall address or attempt to address the Council on any subject which the said Council has no legal right to entertain or discuss, or who shall use any other language which, according to the common usage of gentlemen, would be held disorderly, or who shall say or do anything calculated to bring the Council into contempt, shall be deemed to be out of order.

47. The Mayor may, without the interposition of any other member of the Council, call any Councillor to order whenever in the opinion of such Mayor there shall be a necessity for so doing.

48. Every member of the Council shall have the right of calling the attention of the Mayor to any motion, amendment, statement, argument, or observation moved, raised, or made by any other member which such first-named member may consider out of order.

49. A Councillor called to order shall withdraw while the question of order is being discussed and decided on, unless specially permitted to offer an explanation, retraction or apology; but on obtaining such special permission such Councillor may explain, retract or apologise for the matter or remark alleged to have been out of order. And if such explanation, retraction or apology be deemed satisfactory, no further discussion on the question of order shall be permitted.

50. If any Councillor on being called to order shall ask such permission to explain, retract or apologise as aforesaid, the Mayor may of his own authority grant or refuse such permission as he may think fit, unless any Councillor shall require the sense of the Council to be taken on this question. In such case it shall be the duty of the Mayor to take the sense of the Council at once, without discussion as to whether such permission shall be granted. And when any such explanation, retraction or apology shall have been made or offered by permission of the Mayor, the latter shall in like manner decide, or if required so to do shall take the sense of the Council as to whether such explanation, retraction or apology is considered sufficient. If such permission be refused, or if such explanation, retraction or apology be considered insufficient, the question of order shall be considered and decided before any further business is proceeded with. Provided that if such Mayor shall have decided the question of order, before any Councillor shall have required the sense of the Council to be taken in reference thereto, such question of order shall not be re-opened. And provided further that nothing herein contained shall be held to affect the right of such Mayor or Chairman to decide finally as hereinbefore provided upon any such point of order after the same shall have been discussed.

51. The Mayor when called upon to decide points of order or practice shall state the provision, rule or practice which he shall deem applicable to the case, without discussing or commenting upon the same.

52. Whenever it shall have been decided as aforesaid that any motion, amendment or other matter before the Council is out of order the same shall be rejected; and whenever anything said or done in Council by any Councillor shall be similarly decided to be out of order, such Councillor shall be called upon by the Mayor to make such explanation, retraction, or apology as the case may require.

53. Any Councillor who shall have been called to order and who after having been twice directed to withdraw as aforesaid shall refuse to do so, or who shall persist in any line of conduct or argument or of observations which shall have been decided as aforesaid to be disorderly, or who shall refuse to make such explanation, retraction, or apology as aforesaid when required so to do, or who shall be guilty of any other act of disorder as defined in section 46 shall refuse to make such explanation, retraction, or apology as a majority of the Councillors then present shall consider satisfactory, shall be liable, on conviction before two Justices of the Peace, for the first offence to a penalty of not less than Ten shillings nor more than Five pounds; and on second conviction for the like offence he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than One pound nor more than Ten pounds; and on a third conviction and for every further conviction for the like offence he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Two pounds nor more than Twenty pounds.

54. Whenever any Councillor shall have committed an offence under this By-law, the Mayor, or in case of his absence the Chairman presiding at the meeting when such offence was committed, may forthwith lay or cause to be laid an information before a Justice of the Peace, for the purpose of summoning the offending Councillor, and shall afterwards appear and prosecute the charge.

### MISCELLANEOUS.

### Committees.

55. There shall be three permanent Committees of the Council called the Public Works, Finance, and By-laws, which shall be appointed annually; such committees shall consist of the Mayor and not less than three Councillors each, and the quorum of each committee shall be three.

56. No person except a member of the committee shall be admitted at any meeting of such committee without the consent of the members then present.

57. The Town Clerk shall convene each committee whenever there is business to report or to act upon, and also when requested by the Mayor or any two members of the committee.

58. The Standing Orders of the Council shall be observed in committees, except the rule limiting the number of times of speaking and except the rule as to divisions, which shall not be taken in Committee.

### SEAL.

59. The Town Clerk shall have the charge of the Common Seal of the Corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same. And shall affix the seal to any corporate document other than contracts for works to be executed and entered into by and with the Corporation without the express orders of the Council, but in cases of powers of attorney and other legal instruments not relating to the Corporation, the signatures to which require to be verified by declaration or otherwise before the Mayor, the Seal shall and may be affixed by the Town Clerk to the Mayor's certificate accompanying the same on receipt by him of a fee of halfa-guinea for each such attestation, and such fee to be paid into the general revenue of the Municipality.

The above By-Law No. 7, Standing Orders of the Corporation of the Town of Albany, was duly made and passed this tenth day of March, 1891.

> Clause 10 (Penalty for non-compliance with Act): 'Any occupier or person in charge as aforesaid "who shall refuse or wilfully neglect to fill up, "to the best of his knowledge or information "and belief, the form left at his dwelling, or to "sign and deliver the same, or if any such "occupier or person being unable to read or "write shall, on the application of a sub-"enumerator or collector, refuse to afford him "the necessary information for the purpose of "enabling such sub-enumerator or collector to "fill up such form on behalf of any such occupier " or person, or shall refuse or wilfully neglect to "answer, or untruly answer any inquiry made "by a sub-enumerator or collector, or wilfully "make, sign, or shall deliver, or cause to be "made, signed, or delivered any false return or "statement of any particular in such form, or "shall obstruct any person in 'the performance "of any duty under this Act, shall be liable to a "penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds."

> Clause 13 (Penalty for divulging contents of form): "If any enumerator, sub-enumerator, collector, "clerk, or other officer employed by the Super-"intendent of Census shall divulge the contents " of any form, except as required by this Act, "he shall, for every such offence, be liable to a "penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds."
