Reward for the Destruction of Eagle Hawks.

IIS Excellency the Administrator, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed that a Reward of 2s. (Two shillings) be offered for each and every Eagle Hawk destroyed, and such Reward is hereby offered under the following conditions:—

Every person who shall produce to any Justice of the Peace the head and talons of an Eagle Hawk, and shall prove to the satisfaction of such Justice that the same is the head and talons of an Eagle Hawk, shall be entitled to a Reward of Two shillings, to be obtained as hereinafter set forth: The said Justice shall forthwith cause the said head and talons to be entirely destroyed in his presence; and he shall give to the person producing the same a Certificate in writing, signed by the said Justice, and certifying that the said head and talons have been destroyed in his presence, and that the said person is entitled to the reward of 2s. for the destruction of an Eagle Hawk.

Upon the production of such certificate, as aforesaid, to the Clerk of any Court of Petty Sessions, the person therein named shall be paid by such Clerk the sum stated in the said Certificate, and the Clerk shall retain the said Certificate.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk of every Court of Petty Sessions to make monthly returns, to the Government Resident, Resident or Police Magistrate of the District, of all moneys paid for such Rewards, annexing to such returns the said certificates.

LEADING LIGHTS AT MACQUARIE HARBOUR, WEST COAST, TASMANIA.

IT is hereby notified for general information that, on and after Wednesday, the 1st of June, 1892, two Lights will be exhibited at the entrance of Macquarie Harbour, the position and characteristics of which are as follows:—A white fixed light of the fourth order dioptric will be exhibited from a tower erected on Entrance Island, 34 feet above the sea level, in lat. 42° 12' S. long. 145° 13' 30" E. (approximate), and will be visible in clear weather (where not intercepted by land) 11 miles, and a fixed green light of the fifth order dioptric will be exhibited from a tower erected on Bushy (Cap and Bonnet) Islets, 45 feet in height. These towers are on the site formerly occupied by the leading beacons.

POLICE ACT, 1892.

POLICE DISTRICTS.

1.—KIMBERLEY DISTRICT.

Bounded on the *East* by the Eastern boundary of the Colony; on the *South* by the parallel 19° 30' South latitude; and on the *North* and *West* by the Sea Coast.

2.-ROEBOURNE DISTRICT.

Bounded on the North by the parallel $19^{\circ} 30'$ South latitude and the Sea Coast; on the East by the East boundary of the Colony; on the South by the Tropic of Capricorn; and on the Westward by the Sea Coast.

3.-NORTH-EASTERN DISTRICT.

Bounded on the *North* by the Tropic of Capricorn; on the *East* by the East boundary of the Colony; on the *South* by a West line passing through Mt. Luke; and on the *West* by a North line passing through Trig. Station K 39 in the Kennedy Range.

4.---WESTERN DISTRICT.

Bounded by lines starting from the Sea Coast, and extending East along the Tropic of Capricorn to a spot due North of Trig. Station K 39 in the Kennedy Range, then South passing through said K 39 to a spot due West from Mt. Luke, then East passing through Mt. Luke to the East boundary of the Colony, thence South along the said boundary to a spot due East from Mt. Lesueur, and then West passing through Mt. Lesueur to the Sea Coast; and on the West by the Sea Coast.

5.—South Western District.

Bounded on the North by an East line from the Sea Coast, passing through the summit of Mt. William to the Murray River, and by that river upwards to the junction of the Hotham and Williams Rivers; on the East by a line extending in a South-South-Easterly direction to the junction of the Balgarup and Blackwood Rivers, and thence South-South-Easterly to a spot 16 miles West of the 175-mile mark on the Perth-Albany Road, thence Southerly to the Upper Yerriminup Pool, thence in a Southerly direction down the Frankland River to Muir's Bridge, thence Westerly by the Albany Road to the South-West corner of Nelson Location 6 at Topanup, and thence Westerly to the junction of the Wilgarup and Warren Rivers, thence South-South-Westerly to the extreme end of D'Entrecasteaux Point.

6.—Plantagenet District.

Bounded by lines starting from the extreme end of D'Entrecasteaux Point, and extending thence North-North-Easterly to the junction of the Wilgarup River with the Warren River, thence Easterly to the South-West corner of Nelson Location 6, at Topanup, thence Easterly by the road to Albany to Muir's Bridge at the Frankland River, thence in a Northerly direction up the Frankland River to Upper Yerriminup Pool, thence Northerly to a spot 16 miles West of the 175-mile mark on the Perth-Albany Road, thence North-North-Westerly to the junction of the Blackwood and Balgarup Rivers, thence in a Northerly direction to the junction of the Hotham and Williams Rivers, and thence Northerly to the 41-mile mark on the Perth-Albany Road; on the North by an East line from the said 41-mile mark, and passing through a spot about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles South of Brookton to the 125th parallel of longitude, thence North to a spot due East of Mount Lesueur on the West coast, and thence due East to the boundary of the Colony; on the *East* by the boundary of the Colony aforesaid; and on the South by the Sea Coast.

7.—EASTERN DISTRICT.

On the North by a due East line starting from the Sea Coast, and passing through Mount Lesueur; on the East by a South line along the 125th parallel of longitude to a spot due East from the 41-mile post; on the South by an East line starting from the 41-mile post on the Perth-Albany Road, and passing about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles South of Brookton; on the Westward

by lines starting from the 41-mile post aforesaid, and extending in a Northerly direction to Mount Dale, thence Northerly to the South-East corner of Helena Location 22, thence North to its North-East corner, thence due North to the Eastern Railway, thence North-Westerly to the South-West corner of Swan Location 95, at Bailup, thence Northerly to the 59-mile post on the road from Perth to New Norcia, thence by a Westerly line passing through a spot 30 chains North from Trigonometrical Station G.B. to the Sea Coast, and thence by the Sea Coast.

8.-CENTRAL DISTRICT.

Bounded by lines starting from the Sea Coast near Cape Leschenault, and extending East, passing through a spot 30 chains North from Trigonometrical Station G.B., and along the North boundarv of Swan Location 479 to the 59-mile post on the road from Perth to New Norcia, thence in a Southerly direction to the South-West corner of Swan Location 95, at Bailup, thence South-Easterly to a spot on the Eastern Railway due North from the North-East corner of Helena Location 22, thence South to the South-East corner of said Location, thence Southerly to the summit of Mount Dale, thence Southerly to the 41-mile post on the road from Perth to Albany, and thence in a South-South-Easterly direction to the junction of the Hotham and Williams Rivers, thence Westerly along the Murray River downwards to a spot due East from the summit of Mount William, then due West passing through said summit to the Sea Coast, and thence Northward along the Sea Coast to the starting point.

MINERAL LANDS.

THE attention of Lessees of Mineral Lands, under Clause 82 of the Land Regulations of 1887, is called to Clause 2 of "The Mineral Lands Act, 1892," now in force, and to Regulation No. 62 under said Act, published in the Government Gazette of 4th February, 1892, which are as follows :-

Clause 2-Mineral Lands Act, 1892.

Clause 2—Mineral Lands Act, 1892. 2. (1.) So much of the Land Regulations proclaimed on the 2nd day of March, 1887, as are comprised in Part VI., Sections 80 to 92, inclusive, "Mineral Lands," are hereby repealed, but such repeal shall not affect any rights, claims, or liabilities already accrued or incurred under those Re-gulations. Provided, however, that all mineral leases issued under those Regulations shall be subject in all respects to the labor conditions prescribed by this Act and the Regulations made under this Act.

Regulation 62, under "The Mineral Lands Act, 1892." Labor Conditions.

62. All ground held under a mineral lease shall be worked by not less than one man for every five (5) acres or fraction of five (5) acres, unless exemption or partial exemption from work has been granted.

HIS Excellency the Administrator in Executive Council, under the provisions of "The Sharks Bay Pearl Shell Fishery Act, 1892" (55 Victoria, No. 9), has been pleased to direct that on and after the date hereof the following portions of the Sharks Bay Pearling Grounds shall be closed until further notice:

No. 1.—All that portion of Denham Sound lying between the shore of Dirk Hartog Island and a line drawn from Quoin Bluff to a headland lying South by West half South from Cape Bellefin.

No. 2.—All that portion of Useless Inlet and Freycinet Reach which lies inshore of a line extending Northwards from Cape Bellefin to the edge of the Three-fathom Bank on the 26th parallel South latitude, and along it East to a point about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles North-North-East from Cape Heirisson, and thence about South-North-East from Cape Heirisson, and thence about South-South-East half South in direction of Lefevre Island to a spot 1_{2}^{1} miles East from a headland lying about 5 miles North-Westerly from said island, and thence West to that headland.

No. 3.—All that portion of Denham Sound lying inshore of a line extending West from Cape Lesueur 3 miles, then South-South-Easterly to a spot 3 miles West from Lagoon Point, and then East to the said point.

No. 4.—All that portion of Hopeless Reach, Sharks Bay, lying between the shores of Faure Island, Peron Peninsula, and lines drawn from the North-Eastern shore of Faure Island to Cape Peron, and from the South end of Faure Island to the end of the Cliffs about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles South from Dubaut Point.

WESTERN AUSTRALIAN RAILWAYS.

REGULATION.

Private Siding Access.

IN pursuance of the powers vested in me under the Railways Amendment Act, 1879, and "An Act to further amend 'The Railways Act, 1878'" (55 Vict., No. 34, 1892), I, Harry Whittall Venn, Commissioner of Railways for the Colony of Western Australia, with the approval of the Governor in Council, do hereby make the following Regulation, such Regulation to come into force forthwith :--

1. A limited number of private sidings only will be granted, and such sidings only will be granted as the Railway Department, after full consideration, finds can conveniently and safely be allowed.

2. No siding access will be permitted without formal application is made, and without the consent of the Commissioner of Railways, in writing, is first obtained thereto; and no consideration will be accorded to applicants upon the plea that they have incurred expense in anticipation of obtaining such consent.

3. The applicants shall pay to the Commissioner the whole cost of constructing the siding and its connections.

4. The applicant shall pay rental, quarterly in advance, at the following rates per annum :---

- (a.) For any siding access granted on to the Eastern railway, not being at a railway station, £25;
- (b.) For any siding access at either of the chief stations—Fremantle, Perth, Geraldton—£20;
- (c.) For any siding access at any other railway station, £10;
- (d.) For any siding access granted on to the Northern Railway or on to the Bunbury-Boyanup Railway, not being at a railway station, £15.

5. Upon the expiration of the term for which any existing rights have been granted by the Commissioner of Railways, the grantees may renew their tenure under these regulations at the option of the Commissioner, but, failing the Commissioner's approval thereto, the siding will be removed by the Commissioner.

6. Such persons as have heretofore been using siding access without the formal authorisation of the Commissioner shall have three months' notice given them by or on behalf of the Commissioner to terminate the use of such access, or to make application in the form prescribed hereinafter, and the Commissioner may, at his option, grant the application; but, failing the Commissioner's approval thereto, or in event of the person heretofore using the siding neglecting to apply within the prescribed time, the siding will be removed by the Commissioner.

7. Every application shall be made upon the printed form, which shall be accompanied by a cheque for the proper premium.

8. The form of application may be obtained from the officers of the Working Railways Department.


