2. The purchases will be made in Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay by Remount Agents under the orders of the Director, Army Remount Department.

The Remount Depôts will be open for the reception of Horses from 1st November, 1893, to the end of the purchasing season.
 4. Horses and mares of all breeds will be received; but they must be within the prescribed age-4 to 6 years; and, in the case of Australian horses, 14 hands 3 inches to 16 hands high.

5. Greys will not be purchased for Horse and Field Artillery

6. The average price for an Australian or Cape remount has been fixed at Rs. 650, which will be paid at the Indian port of purchase. The average price for Arabs and Persians is Rs. 550, but every horse pre-sented for purchase will be valued separately, and higher or lower prices may be given, provided that the averages fixed above are not avccaded exceeded.

The Fishery Act, 1889.

Colonial Secretary's Office, Perth, 17th November, 1892.

W HEREAS in pursuance of the power vested in the Governor in Council by "The Fishery Act, 1889," the Governor in Council did, by Regulation published in the Government Gazette on the 9th June, 1892, declare it unlawful for any person to fish, by means of any net or fixed engine, within the following limits of the Canning River, that is to say :---

From the Lower Canning Bridge to the Upper Canning Bridge,

His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council doth hereby declare and prescribe that such Regulation aforesaid shall not, from the 1st day of December to the 30th day of April in any year, apply to the taking of Shrimps or Prawns, within the following limits of the Canning River, that is to say :-

Between the Lower Canning Bridge and a due East line from Mount Henry across the River.

WHEREAS by Section 6 of "The Fishery Act, 1889," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, by Regulations to be published in the Government Gazette, amongst other things, "to prescribe the limits in or about the "mouth of, or within any river, creek, stream, "estuary, or other inlet of the sea, within which it " shall not be lawful for any person to fish by means "of any net or fixed engine, and to impose such "reasonable penalties, not exceeding £20, and " forfeitures, as the Governor in Council may think "fit, for any breach of such Regulations:"

His Excellency the Governor in Council does by this Regulation declare it to be unlawful for any person to fish by means of any net or fixed engine in or about the mouth of the Swan River, that is to say:-

Between the Bar and the North Fremantle Road Bridge and a quarter of a mile from the Bar seaward, from the 1st day of December to the 1st day of March in every year.

Every person committing a breach of this Regulation shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty of $\pounds 10$ for the first offence, and $\pounds 20$ for every subsequent offence, and shall forfeit the net or engine used, and all fish which he shall have taken.

TENDERS will be received at this Office up to noon of Monday, the 19th December, 1892, from persons willing to undertake the Trucking on the Busselton and Dongara Jetties, during the year 1893, in accordance with the undermentioned terms and conditions.

Any necessary explanation will be afforded by the Collector of Customs, Fremantle, the Government Resident, Geraldton, and the Resident Magistrate at Busselton :---

> Busselton, Dongara.

Tender to be endorsed "Tender for Trucking at....." (as the case may be).

Conditions of the Work to be performed, and Rates to be charged by Contractor for Trucking.

1. The Contractor to perform all the trucking to and from the shore end of the Jetties, and to find labor for loading and discharging the trucks. Trucks will be found by the Government, and kept in repair except when damaged through carelessness.

2. The Contractor to be responsible for all loss or damage during transit, and in loading or discharging goods from the trucks.

3. The Contractor to place and stow all goods as directed by the Customs Officer in charge of the sea and shore end of the Jetty.

4. All the trucking to be charged per ton and be computed in accordance with the scale published in the *Government Gazette* of the 8th November, 1881.

5. When the trucking is ordered by the Principal Officer of Customs after the usual hours, during holidays, and on Sundays, the work must be performed by the Contractor.

6. Preference to be given to bonded goods so that none of such goods remain on the Jetties after 4 p.m. on all days except Saturdays, when they must be removed by noon.

7. The Contractor and his servants to be amenable to the existing Jetty Regulations.

8. The contractor not to be compelled to load trucks with goods placed more than three yards from the rails, nor to place goods discharged from trucks more than three yards from the rails; if a further distance is required, a special arrangement may be made with the owner of the goods.

9. For performing the above services the Contractor will be permitted to charge one shilling and sixpence per ton, as per scale published in the *Government Gazette* of the 8th November, 1881, on all goods trucked to and from the sea and shore end of Jetties.

10. For goods trucked after hours, on holidays (on permission being obtained for so doing from the Principal Officer of Customs or Officers in charge of Jetties) the Contractor will not be allowed to charge more than 2s. 6d. per ton, but he will be permitted to make special arrangements with parties requiring his services.

11. The Contract to terminate at any time on the Government giving one month's notice.

12. When a Jetty needs repair such as to interfere with the traffic the trucking must be done in a way most advantageous under the circumstances, and no remission of rent will be made.

13. The Principal Officer of Customs to have the right to settle all disputes between truckers and owners of goods, and to fix and determine charges for trucking such goods on which dispute may hereafter arise, whether fixed or not by any previous scale for calculating tonnage.

14. The Principal Officer of Customs' decision in all such matters to be final, so far as they do not interfere with the laws existing in the Colony.

15. That any tender accepted for the service during 1893 will not commence until these conditions are signed by the tenderer and his sureties.

HE Revised Programme of Instruction for the year 1893, approved by the Central Board of Education, August 22nd, 1892, and by His Excellency the Governor in Council on August 30th, 1892, together with various Appendices, in which slight amendments have been approved, are hereby published for general information.

REVISED PROGRAMME OF INSTRUCTION, 1893.

This Revised Programme of Instruction will come into force on the First of January, 1893, except in the Ι. following subjects :-

(a.) English in Standard I., which will be introduced on January the First, 1895.

English in Standard II., and Geography in Standard I., which will be introduced on January the First, (b.)1894.

TT. At the First Examination under the Revised Programme, the questions given will be comparatively easy, allowance being made for the advanced requirements.

- III. Payments as "Results" Grant :-
- 1. For every child present at the Examination who has attended not less than 120 half-days in the School Year there will be paid :-
 - (a.) Between the ages of four and seven, the sum of Six shillings.
 - (b.) Between the ages of seven and sixteen, the sum of Twenty-six shillings, to be paid pro rata, subject to passing the prescribed Standards of Examination, viz., Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic,
 - Six Shillings per pass; Grammar and Geography, Four shillings per pass. Note.—The sum paid to Assisted Schools under Nos. III. 1 (a) and III. 1 (b) will be one-half of the sums stated therein.

do.

- (c.) Two shillings and sixpence for every girl between the ages of six and sixteen who passes the Examination in Needlework.
- 2. A payment of One shilling, One shilling and sixpence, or Two shillings per head, on the average attendance, if the Inspector reports the Schools to be Good, Very Good, or Excellent. (See Appendix A.)
- A payment of Six shillings per pass for every Scholar (who has in a previous year passed the Seventh Standard) who passes in the subjects specified in Schedule V. (not more than three subjects may be taken). 3.
- The sums earned under Regulations III. (1) a, and III. (1) b, will be paid in monthly instalments with the 4. Capitation Grant.
- The sums earned under Regulations III. (1) c., III. (2), and III. (3) will be paid direct to the Teacher in one sum as early as possible in the year succeeding the Examination. 5.
- 6. Assistant Teachers will each receive, as Bonus, one-fifth of the Total Amount of the "Results" Grant.

IV. The Grant for teaching Pupil Teachers will be awarded according to the following scale :-

- In all Infants' Schools and large Infants' Classes, in Mixed or Girls' Schools, more attention must be given to Disciplinary Exercises and Useful Employments, thus :--Marching, Physical Exercises, Singing, including Action Songs, Lessons in Form and Color, Simple Object Lessons, Recitations, Sewing, Knitting, or any other Useful Employment suitable for Infants will be considered in determining the "Merit" Grant. In fact any exercise which cultivates the perceptive powers and trains the fingers will be recognised. The main object of the Inspectors will be to discover whether the little ones have been interestingly and usefully employed, and taught to observe and to think.
- 2. (a.) In Schools where the number of Infants is below twelve but above six, all the Children may be examined in Classes I. and II.
 - (b.) In Schools where the number of Infants is below six, the Children may all be examined in Class II.
 - (c.) In Schools where the number of Infants is twelve or above, the Children must be arranged according to Age and Attainments in one or other of the three Classes.
- 3. Children must not be kept in Infants' School or Class after they are seven years old, without special permission in writing by the Inspector.

SCHEDULE V.

EX-SEVENTH STANDARD.

1. All children, who have successfully passed the Seventh Standard, may continue their studies in not more than three (3) of the following subjects :--

Drawing. Domestic Economy (Girls). Animal Physiology. French.

Advanced Arithmetic (including Euclid, Book I., and the four simple Rules in Algebra). History.

2. Girls must take Domestic Economy as one of these special subjects.

3. The Grant for a successful pass in each of these subjects will be Six shillings (6s.) per pass.

4. Notice of the intention to teach these subjects must be given to the Inspector of Schools on or before the last day in March in each year, otherwise no examination will be held. Such notice must state the subjects chosen and the probable number of candidates.

5. No scholars can be examined for two successive years in the same subject without special permission from the Inspector of Schools.

6. Course of Study-

(a.) Drawing.—Freehand (from the flat) from copies, and from the blackboard.

(b.) Domestic Economy.—Food: Its composition and nutritive value. The Dwelling: Cleaning and Ventilation. Rules for health.

- (c.) Animal Physiology.—The Build of the Human Body. Names and position of the internal organs. The organs and functions of alimentation and circulation.
- (d.) French.—Grammar to the end of Regular Verbs. Ten pages of an easy Reading Book (a sufficient number of exercises may be substituted by permission of the Inspector).
- (e.) Advanced Arithmetic.—Arithmetic generally. Euclid (Book I. to Prop. 26). Algebra: Notation, Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication, and Division.
- (f.) History.—List of Sovereigns since Egbert, with dates of accession and death of each, and the chief events in each reign. Special knowledge of the Roman, Saxon, Danish, and Norman Conquests of England. Provisions of Magna Charta and Petition of Right, with the circumstances which led to their adoption.

Appendix A.

MERIT GRANT.

1. The 'Merit" Grant will consist of a payment of 1s., 1s. 6d., or 2s. per head on the average attendance, if the Inspector reports the School as Good (1s.); Very Good (1s. 6d.); or Excellent (2s.)

2. This "Merit" Grant is intended to be a reward for Superior Teaching, and will only be granted when the Inspector is satisfied "good," "very good," or "excellent" work has been done.

3. In awarding this Merit Grant the Inspector will take into account;-

(a.) The "quality" of the passes in the ordinary subjects of School Instruction.

- (b.) The fitness of the classification, according to the age and capability of the scholars.
- (c.) The behaviour of the children under examination, especially their honesty in their work; and the general "tone" pervading the School.
- (d.) The neatness and cleanliness of the Schoolroom and all appliances; also of the playground and out-buildings.
- (e.) The neatness and accuracy of the School Registers.
- (f.) The intelligence of the methods of instruction.

4. The Inspector will bear in mind, in recommending a "Merit" Grant, the results of the visit for Inspection, as well as that for Examination.

5. No School will obtain a "Merit" Grant where one, at least, of the Class Subjects (Geography and Grammar) is not taken.

APPENDIX B.

HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS.

1. Two Scholarships of the value of Fifty pounds each per annum, tenable for three years, at the High School, Perth, are annually offered to boys attending the Government and Assisted Schools of the Colony.

2. Candidates for the Scholarships must-

- (a.) Be over eleven years of age, and not more than fourteen years old on the 31st July of the year in which the Examination for the Scholarship is held;
- (b.) Have attended one or more of the Government or Assisted Schools continuously for at least two years immediately preceding the above-named July 31st, and have made not less than three hundred half-day attendances (unless prevented by illness) in such schools, during their last school year;
- (c.) Have passed satisfactorily in all the subjects prescribed for the Fifth Standard in the Revised "Programme of Examination."
- (d.) Produce a certificate of industry and good conduct from the head teacher of the last school attended.

3. The Scholarships are awarded upon a competitive examination. (See Course of Study for 1893.) The Course of Study may be altered from time to time at the discretion of the Central Board.

4. No candidate is eligible for a Scholarship who fails to obtain a minimum of $\frac{3}{3}$ (two-thirds) of the maximum number of marks.

5. A Preliminary Examination will be held in the month of September in the various Districts in which the candidates live, and presided over by the Secretaries of the District Boards, or other persons appointed by the Central Board.

The most successful candidates at this preliminary examination shall submit to a *Final Examination* at *Perth* in the month of *December*. The railway or steamer fares of these selected candidates shall be paid by the Central Board. This final examination may be either a written or *viva voce* examination.

6. Application for admission to the Scholarship examination must be made on the prescribed Form, to the Secretary Central Board of Education, on or before the 15th of August of each year.

7. The conditions upon which the Scholarships are tenable are :--

the Advanced Reader.

- (a.) That the successful scholar shall, at the commencement of the first term following the award of the Scholarship, become a pupil of the High School, Perth.
- (b) That he shall continue to attend the said school, and must at the end of each term obtain from the authorities of the school a certificate, stating that his conduct and attendance have been satisfactory. If an unfavorable report be received, or if at any time his conduct shall be disorderly, or immoral, the Scholarship and the advantages connected therewith shall, with the consent of the Governor, thereupon cease and determine.
- 8. A Bonus of Five Pounds will be paid to the Head Teacher of the School at which the successful candidate has been taught.

APPENDIX C.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BURSARIES FOR GIRLS.

Five Bursaries of the value of Ten Pounds each will be annually offered to girls attending the Government 1. and Assisted Schools of the Colony.

2. Canditates for these Bursaries must-

- (a.) Be over twelve and not more than fifteen years of age on the 31st July of the year in which the examination for the Bursary is held.
- (b.) Have attended one or more of the Government or Assisted Schools continuously for at least two years immediately preceding the above-named July 31st, and have made not less than three hundred half-day attendances (unless prevented by illness) in such schools, during their last school year, ending on the above-named July 31st.
- (c.) Have passed satisfactorily in all the subjects prescribed for the Sixth Standard in the Revised "Programme of Examination."
- (d.) Produce a certificate of industry and good conduct from the head teacher of the last school attended.

The Bursaries are awarded upon a competitive examination. The course of study is the same as that prescribed for the High School Entrance Scholarships, and may be altered from time to time at the discretion of the Central Board.

4. No candidate is eligible for a Bursary who fails to obtain a minimum of $\frac{2}{3}$ (two-thirds) of the maximum number of marks.

5. An examination of candidates will be held annually in Perth in the month of September, and should it be found expedient for the convenience of candidates residing in the distant parts of the Colony, the Central Board of Education may arrange for examinations being also held in "local centres." In the latter case, copies of the examination questions will be forwarded, under seal, to the Chairman or Secretary of the District Board of Education of such "centre," to be opened at the commencement of the examination, which shall be held simultaneously with and in the same manner as that held in Perth.

6. Application for admission to the Bursary examination must be made to the Secretary Central Board of Education, on or before the 15th of August of each year.

7. One moiety of the Bursaries will be paid to the successful candidates on the last day of June in the year succeeding the date of examination, and the other moiety on the last day of December of the same year, if the following conditions have been fulfilled :-

- (a.) That the successful candidate shall have attended a Government or an Assisted School regularly (making, at least, three hundred half-day attendances).
- (b.) That such scholar shall pass successfully the examination for the Seventh Standard at the annual examination of the school.
- (c.) That such scholar produce certificates of good conduct from the teacher of the said school.

-The parents of the successful candidates shall have the right to choose the Government or Assisted School in which their children shall be educated during the twelve months of holding the Bursary.
