# PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Western Australia and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

HEREAS a certain Townsite has been duly proclaimed a Townsite under the name and style of Marble Bar Townsite, such Townsite consisting of land bounded as hereafter mentioned in the Schedule hereto: And whereas such Townsite is included in and forms a portion of the Pilbarra Goldfield: AND WHEREAS under the provisions of "The Goldfields Act, 1886," power is given to the Governor of the said Colony, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to except from occupation for mining purposes, or for residence or business under any Miner's Right or Business License, any specific portion of Crown lands within a Goldfield: Now THEREFORE I, SIR WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS Robinson, G.C.M.G., Governor as aforesaid, do, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, except such Townsite from occupation for mining purposes, or for residence or business under any Miner's Right or Business License, such Townsite being a specific portion of Crown lands within a Goldfield, to wit, the Pilbarra Goldfield; and I do order all persons, from and after the date of the publication of this my Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to take notice hereof and govern themselves accordingly.

HEREAS by "The Destructive Insects and Substances Act, 1880," power is given to the Governor in Executive Council, from time to time to make such orders as he may think expedient for preventing the introduction into Western Australia of insects or of matter destructive or prejudicial to vegetation, and by any such order to prohibit or regulate the landing in or other introduction into Western Australia of any tree, shrub, plant, or any portion thereof, or any substance, or any other article; whether vegetable or mineral, which may appear to the Governor in Council likely to introduce any such insect or matter into Western Australia; And whereas, by an Order in Council dated the 10th day May, 1892, His Honour Alexander Campbell Onslow, Administrator of the Government of Western Australia, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, did thereby order and direct that it should not be lawful for any person to introduce into the Colony of Western Australia any grapes or grape vines, nor should it be lawful to introduce any grape vine cuttings except such as were the produce of the Province of South Australia: And further, that before any such grape vine cuttings were landed in the Colony a certificate

from some duly qualified person or a statutory declaration by the proprietors, declaring that the vineyard from which the cuttings were procured was free from disease, should be produced to the Collector or Sub-Collector of Customs at the port of importation: And whereas it is expedient to further regulate the landing of grape vine cuttings from the Province of South Australia, and also the introduction and landing of fruit trees and grafts, scions or cuttings of or from fruit trees. Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered by His Excellency Sir WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, G.C.M.G., Governor of the said Colony, acting herein by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, that in addition to the regulations contained in the hereinbefore recited Order in Council relative to the landing of grape vine cuttings from the Province of South Australia, all grape vine cuttings and also all fruit trees and scions, grafts, and cuttings of or from fruit trees, and also all packages, wrappings, earth, and other coverings in which the same may be carried or contained, shall, immediately after being landed at any Port or place in Western Australia, be disinfected by the importer or consignee thereof, at his own cost, by being dipped in a solution of not less than one pound of commercial concentrated lye to every two gallons of water, or in a solution of 1lb. of soft soap and one pint of kerosene, dissolved in one gallon of boiling water, and diluted with 15 gallons of cold water; such disinfection to be performed under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs, or one of his officers or agents.

The Order in Council, dated 4th July, 1893, is hereby revoked.

# PART IX.—PROTECTION AREAS AND REWARD CLAIMS.

Size of protection area.

80. A miner desirous of prospecting may mark off and hold a protection area of the following dimensions, viz.:—

Beyond the limits of a Mining District, 400 yards by 400 yards.

Within the limits of a Mining District and more than three miles from the nearest mineral working, 300 yards by 300 yards; not more than three miles, and more than two miles from such workings, 250 yards by 250 yards; not more than two miles, and more than one mile, 200 yards by 200 yards.

#### Must be marked and registered.

81. All protection areas must be marked at each corner with a post standing three feet above ground, and four inches in diameter, such posts to be kept uncovered and set in L trenches three feet long and six inches deep along each boundary line, and such marking shall be deemed a sufficient title for thirty clear days, subject to the labour conditions; after which all protection areas within the limits of a Mining District must be registered in the manner prescribed in Clauses 9 and 54 of the regulations under the Mineral Lands Act, gazetted 4th July, 1892, and the prescribed fee of five shillings paid for such registration: the form of application is prescribed in Schedule No. 12, annexed to the said Regulations. A notice shall be posted on some conspicuous part of the area with the names of the holders, the numbers, and dates of their Mining Licenses, the date on which the area was marked, and the date of registration thereof.

#### Labour conditions.

82. Every protection area must be worked continuously in accordance with Clause 55 of the regulations under "The Mineral Lands Act," gazetted 4th July, 1892, every ordinary working day after seven clear working days after marking, with at least two miners. Any area not so worked shall be liable to forfeiture. Any work other than bona fide prospecting shall render such protection area or share therein liable to forfeiture.

#### $Prospector\ must\ report\ finding\ minerals.$

83. Within seven clear days after the finding of minerals in apparently payable quantities within any protection area, the holder shall report the said finding at the Registrar's office, or if the protection area is outside the limits of a Mining District, at the office of the Minister or his agent, under pain of forfeiture of such area. The Registrar, Minister, or Agent shall then, if sufficient mineral has been found to warrant it, allot the prospector a reward claim in addition to the number of ordinary claims to which he would otherwise be entitled, and the protection area shall then cease and determine.

#### Reward claims.

84. The size of reward claims which shall be given for the discovery of payable minerals in any creek, river, or ordinary alluvial ground shall be in pro-

portion to the distance from the nearest occupied workings of the same description, and as follows:—

If distant over one mile ... Two claims of one

two miles ... Four ditto.

" three miles ... Six ditto.

If beyond the limits of a

Mining District ... Ten ditto.

The above reward shall be in addition to the number of claims to which the party would be otherwise entitled in ordinary alluvial claims, and may be marked off in one block in any rectangular shape at the option of the prospectors. Provided that no side of the block shall be less than 4 chains.

Amendment of Clauses 65 and 76 of the Regulations for the management of Goldfields.

II IS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, under the powers conferred upon him by the Goldfields Act (50 Victoria, No. 18), has been pleased to amend Clauses 65 and 76 of the Regulations under the said Act, gazetted 4th October, 1892, so as to read as follows:—

Term and payment of rent.

65. The term of all Leases granted under these Regulations shall be computed from the 1st of January preceding the date of the application.

The rents of all Leases shall be calculated as from the 1st of January to the 31st of December, and shall be paid in advance to the Minister, at the Land and Survey Office, Perth, or to his Agents at the various Resident Magistrates' Courts in the Colony, or to the Warden of the Goldfield, on or before the 1st of March in each year, and if the rent for any lease is not paid within thirty days from that date the lease shall be voidable at the will of the Governor. Leases applied for during the year will be charged rent from the beginning of the quarter previous to the date of application

What considered a sufficient working.

76. A lease, claim, or protection area shall be considered. as effectively worked when eight hours' bonû fide work is performed thereon by the complement of miners required by these Regulations, on every working day except Saturday, when four hours' work shall be considered sufficient.

In any case where machinery has been erected upon any lease or claim, and is kept constantly at work, the Warden may, in his discretion, dispense with such portions of the labour conditions as to him may seem fit.

#### Bonus for Deep Sinking.

OTICE is hereby given that the Government offers a Bonus to any person or company who, during the year 1893, shall sink on any of the declared Goldfields of the Colony a Shaft as hereinafter mentioned, and according to the following conditions,

from a depth previously attained of not less than 100 feet :=

For a shaft to be sunk from below the depth of 100 feet to a depth of 200 feet, @ £2 10s. per foot.

For a shaft to be sunk from below the depth of 200 feet to a depth of 300 feet, @  $\pounds 5$  per foot.

#### CONDITIONS.

Each shaft to be vertical throughout, with a superficial area of not less than 27 feet in the clear when completed, and a minimum width of not less than 3 feet, to be sunk and timbered where necessary, to the satisfaction of the Warden or his Deputy.

Provided, that if any shaft has been already sunk of a less superficial area than 27 feet, the bonus shall be paid in proportion; but in no case shall any bonus be paid for a shaft having a less area than 20 feet, or less than 3 feet in width.

All measurements of depth to be taken from the surface of the ground.

Payments will be made monthly as the work progresses. No payments will be made for less than 10 feet, and all work shall be measured and passed by the Warden or his Deputy before payment, and the decision of the Warden or his Deputy shall be final.

No payment will be made in respect of the first 100 feet from the surface.

With regard to existing shafts, no payment will be made in respect of work done before the date hereof.

Any person intending to deepen any existing shaft of or exceeding the depth of 100 feet shall give notice in writing to the Warden or his Deputy of the depth of the said shaft, and of his intention to deepen the same.

The Warden or his Deputy shall ascertain and certify the depth of such shaft, and payment shall be made only in respect of the work done beyond the depth certified by the Warden or his Deputy.

Any person intending to sink a new shaft with the intention of claiming a bonus shall give notice in writing of such intention before the commencement of the work, or before the shaft is down 100 feet.

No company or person shall receive assistance for more than one shaft on the same mining property.

- 1. Send from 3oz. to 4oz. of each sample.

- 3. Wrap each sample separately in strong paper, enclosing a piece of white paper with the number of the sample and your own name.
- 4. Address the parcel to "The Government Assayer, Perth."
- 5. Send a letter at the same time to the same address, stating for what metals you desire the samples to be assayed, and enclosing the fees.
- 6. Always retain duplicate samples of whatever you send, marked with the same numbers, and dated.

- 3. The applicant will be required to show that he is conversant with the Transfer of Land Act so far as it refers to surveys, with the rules in force that have been made under that Act for the guidance of Surveyors, and any other Acts of the Legislature that deal with surveys.
- 4. The Surveyor General reserves to himself the right to subject the applicant to any examination, or to any other conditions he may consider necessary.


