PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS under and by virtue of the provisions of "The Magisterial Districts Act, 1886," the Governor is empowered, by Proclamation, to declare any portion of the Colony to be a Magisterial District, and to name the same, and define the boundaries thereof: Now THEREFORE I, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the said Act, do hereby declare that portion of the Colony comprised within the following boundaries to be a Magisterial District, under the name of the "Ashburton Magisterial District."

Bounded on the North and East by a South-South-East line from the Sea-coast to the Trigonometrical Station on Pedamullah Hill, thence East-South-Easterly to the Trigonometrical Station on Mount Darnell, thence East-South-Easterly to the Trigonometrical Station on Mount Rica, thence East-South-Easterly to Trigonometrical Station Y 13, thence South-South-Easterly to the Trigonometrical Station on Mount Lionel, thence due South to the Tropic of Capricorn; on the West by the Sea-coast, including the Islands adjacent; and on the South by the Tropic of Capricorn.

The Magisterial Districts of North-West and Gas. coyne are amended accordingly, by reducing the area of the said Districts, respectively, by so much of the areas thereof as is comprised in the Ashburton Magisterial District.

COSSACK LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

By-law.

Under the provisions contained in Section 24 of "The Public Health Act" (50 Vic., No. 19), and by virtue of the powers vested in them in that behalf under Section 6 of the 55 Victoria, No. 22, the Municipal Council of Cossack doth hereby make the following By-law for the further abatement and prevention of nuisances, and for securing the healthfulness of the Town of Cossack :--

(1.) That all householders residing within the boundaries of the Cossack Municipality shall, on or before the 1st day of March, 1894, be required to have Latrines to be approved of by the Inspector of Nuisances for the said Municipality;

the contents of such Latrines to be removed and deposited at least once in every week at such place or places as may from time to time be appointed by the Council by persons to be appointed by the Council for that purpose, and each householder shall pay to the Municipality the sum of One shilling per week for Private houses and Two shillings per week for Hotels and Licensed Boarding Houses. Every such householder committing or allowing his servant or servants to commit a breach of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

"The Constitution Act Amendment Act, 1893," and "The Electoral Acts 1889 and 1893."

THE special attention of Returning Officers, Resident, Police, and other Magistrates, Electoral Registrars, District Registrars of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, Clerks of Municipal Councils and District Roads Boards, Inspectors, Sub-Inspectors, and Sergeants of Police, Officers in charge of Police Stations, Postmasters, and Headmasters of Government Schools is drawn to the duties imposed upon them, respectively, by the above mentioned Acts, and also to the Notices appearing in the *Government Gazette Extraordinary* of the 13th November, 1893.
