WHEREAS by "The Municipal Institutions Act, 1876," power is given to the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to declare and proclaim any town to be a Municipality, and by the same Proclamation to define the boundaries of such Municipality : Now THEREFORE I, SIR WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, G.C.M.G., Governor of the said Colony, do hereby, under and by virtue of the provisions of the said Act, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, declare and proclaim the Town of Cue to be a Municipality under the style and title of "The Council and Bur.' gesses of the Town of Cue." And do also declare and proclaim the Boundaries of the said Municipality to be as follows :—

Bounded on the North-East and South-East by lines extending 319 degrees 54 minutes 40 chains, and 229 degrees 54 minutes 40 chains from a spot situate 28 chains 45 links East and 6 chains 25 links South from an angle post in the survey of proposed Murchison Telegraph Line, said angle post being situate 267 chains 51 links along said Telegraph Line in an Easterly direction from the 180 mile post; by opposite boundaries parallel and equal, and on the inner part by and exclusive of portions of Murchison Gold Mining Leases 157 and 110.

CIRCULAR⁽²⁾

SIR.

Downing Street, 12th March, 1894.

SIR, With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 29th November, 1892, I have the honour to transmit to you, for Rovember, 1852, 1 have the honour to transmit to you, for the information of your Government, a copy of a further letter from the Board of Trade respecting the revised Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea to be adopted by Great Britain.

With reference to the letter from this Department to the Colonial Office of the 24th October, 1892, transmitting a Parliamentary Paper containing reports of the Committee appointed to consider the alterations in the Regulations for

preventing Collisions at Sea recommended by the Washing-ton International Maritime Conference in 1889, I am directed by the Board of Trade to state, for the information of the Marquess of Ripon, that the majority of the foreign maritime States have expressed a general approval of the Regulations printed at pages 11 to 19 of the Parliamentary Paper above referred to, and that the Committee now recommend that these Regulations should be carried into effect by Great Britain.

The Board of Trade have accordingly decided, with the concurrence of the Admiralty, to promote an Order in Council substituting these revised Regulations for Articles 1 to 9, and 11 to 27 inclusive of the Rules contained in the Schedule to the Order in Council of the 11th August, 1884, Article 10 of that Order in Council of the 11th Adgust, 1884, Article 10 of that Order remaining in force until some more satisfactory arrangement can be made with regard to the complicated question of fishing vessels' lights with which it deals. It is proposed that the contemplated Order in Council prescribing the revised general Regulations shall be issued as soon as the Foreign Governments have definitely pignified their adhesion and their it should take offect on some signified their adhesion, and that it shall take effect on and after the 1st March, 1895. Copies of the Order will be sent to the Colonial Office immediately on issue.

I am to suggest, for Lord Ripon's consideration, that this I am to suggest, for Lord Ripon's consideration, that this decision may be communicated to the various Colonial Governments, and that the Colonies who objected to certain points in the Regulations submitted to them in 1891, may at the same time be informed that their views, together with those received from Foreign Governments and from British Shipowners, were carefully considered by the Rule of the Road Committee, and that, where they have not been adonted, this has been in a great measure due to the fear adopted, this has been in a great measure due to the fear that the adoption of amendments opposed to the decisions of the Washington Conference and to the known opinions of the Foreign Governments, would almost inevitably have led to further delay, and would not improbably have prevented any international agreement being arrived at on this important question.

Pearling Banks in Sharks Bay Opened.

The Treasury, Perth, April 4th, 1894.

April 4th, 1894. IS Excellency the Governor in Council, under the nowers conformed the powers conferred upon him by "The Sharks Bay Pearl Shell Fishery Act" (55 Vic., No. 9), notifies, for general information, that the Pearling Banks in Sharks Bay, closed by *Gazette* notice on 26th March, 1892, and numbered 3, will be opened for Pearl Shelling from the 1st of April to the 30th June, 1894.

The Area comprised on No. 3 is as follows :-

All that portion of Denham Sound lying inshore of a line extending West from Cape Lesueur 3 miles, then South-South-Easterly to a spot 3 miles West from Lagoon Point, and then East to the said Point.

No dredging will be allowed on any "pick-up" banks within the area, except on the edges of the shallow banks where it is impossible to pick up by hand at low tides, but permission in writing may be issued by the Inspector to use a dredge on such other portions of the area as he may approve of.

The Inspector shall have power to stop the work of collection or of dredging at any time, if in his opinion the industry is being injured.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any Foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such Foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any Foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts in thereof, so far as it relates to such Foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer :

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was directed that the operation of the Extraditions Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Liberia for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following :--

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Excellency the President of Liberia, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within their respective territories, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up; the said High Contracting Parties have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty for this purpose, that is to say;

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, the Right Honourable Archibald Philip, Earl of Rosebery, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; and

His Excellency the President of Liberia, Henry Hayman, Esq., Consul-General of the Republic of Liberia in London;

Who, having communicated to each other their respective Full Powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles :--

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime or offence committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

ARTICLE II.

The crimes or offences for which the extradition is to be granted are the following :-

1. Murder, or attempt, or conspiracy to murder.

2. Manslaughter.

3. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

4. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grevious bodily harm.

5. Counterfeiting or altering money, or uttering counterfeit or altered money

6. Knowingly making any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for counterfeiting coin.

7. Forgery, counterfeiting, or altering or uttering what is forged, or counterfeited, or altered.

8. Embezzlement or larceny.

9. Malicious injury to property, if the offence be indictable.

10. Obtaining money, goods, or valuable securities by false pretences.

11. Receiving money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen, embezzled, or unhawfully obtained. 12. Crimes against bankruptcy law.

13 Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director or member or public officer of any Company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.

14. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.

15. Rape.

16. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge, of a girl under 16 years of age.

17. Indecent assault.

18. Administering drugs, or using instruments, with intent to pro-cure the miscarriage of a woman. 19. Abduction.

- 20. Child stealing.

21. Abandoning children, exposing or unlawfully detaining them.

- 22. Kidnapping and false imprisonment.
- 23. Burglary or Housebreaking.
- 24. Arson.
- 25. Robbery with violence.

26. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person in a railway train.

27. Threats by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort.

28. Piracy by law of nations.

29. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

30. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to destroy life, or do grievous bodily harm.

31. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas, against the authority of the master.

32. Dealing in slaves in such a manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

Extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both the Contracting Parties.

ARTICLE III.

Either Government may, in its absolute discretion, refuse to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the British Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Liberian Government, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial, within the territories of the two High Contracting Parties respectively, for the erime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of the British Government, or if the person claimed on the part of the Liberian Government, should be under examination, or is undergoing sentence under a conviction, for any other crime within the territories of the two High Contracting Parties respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until after he has been discharged, whether by acquittal, or on expiration of his sentence, or otherwise.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the com-mission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution, or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime or on account of any other matters than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored or had an opportunity of returning to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made in the following manner :—

Application on behalf of Her Britannic Majesty's Government for the surrender of a fugitive criminal in Liberia shall be made by Her Majesty's Consul at Monrovia.

Application on behalf of the Liberian Government for the surrender of a fugitive criminal in the United Kingdom shall be made by the Diplomatic Representative of Liberia in London, or in the absence of such Representative, by the Consul-General for Liberia in London.

The requisition for the extradition of the accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed in contumaciam, is not to be deemed a conviction but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

ARTICLE X.

If the fugitive has been arrested in the British dominions he shall forthwith be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the British dominions.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the British dominions shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in Liberia, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of, a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows: follows :---

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of Liberia.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of Liberie, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be the true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of Liberia.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certifi-cate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of Liberia; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law in that part of the British dominions where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing. for the foregoing.

ARTICLE XI.

If the fugitive has been arrested in Liberia his surrender shall be granted if, upon examination by a competent authority, it appears that the documents furnished by the British Government contain sufficient primá facie evidence to justify the extradition.

The Authorities of Liberia shall admit as valid evidence records drawn up by the British authorities of the depositions of witnesses, or copies thereof, and records of conviction or other judicial documents, or copies thereof, provided that the said documents be signed or authoriticated by an authority whose competence shall be certified by the seal of a Minister of State of Her Britannic Majesty.

ARTICLE XII.

The extradition shall not take place unless the evidence be found ${\mathfrak s}{\mathfrak a}$ flicient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify

the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime has been com-mitted in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to. The fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered until the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his being committed to prison to await his surrender.

ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other arimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within three months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper Tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered, at the time of his apprehension, shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place, and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to every-thing that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XVI.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in such Colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions may be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by any person authorised to act in such Colony or possession as a Consular officer of Liberia, or if there is no such Consular officer in the Colony, by the Diplomatic Representative of Liberia in London, or in his absence by the Liberian Consul-General.

Such requisitions may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender, or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of criminals from Liberia who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVIII.

The present Trenty shall come into force ten days after its publica-tion, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties at any time on giving to the other six months' notice of its intention to do so.

The Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Done at London, the sixteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

And whereas the ratifications of the said Treaty were exchanged at London on the thirty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council and in virtue of the authority committed to her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the twenty-third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Liberia, and of the said Treaty with the Republic of Liberia.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that the operation of the said Extraditon Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to Liberia and to the said Treaty and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer.
