Amendment of Clause 60 of the Regulations for the Management of Goldfields (re Applications and Survey, Gold-mining Leases).

IS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, under the powers conferred upon him by Section 79 of the Goldfields Act (50 Vic., No. 18), has been pleased to amend Clause 60 of the Regulations thereunder, as shown below; to come into force on the 1st October, 1894.

That Sub-section (4.) read as follows:—

The applicant shall, previously to making application for a lease, mark the land intended to be applied for, at each corner, by a post standing three feet out of the ground, and four inches in diameter, such post to be kept uncovered, and set in L trenches three feet long and six inches deep along each boundary line; and shall at the same time post a notice in the form of No. 20A, hereto annexed, on a conspicuous part of the land intended to be applied for; and shall, at the time of lodging his appli-

cation at the Warden's Office, post a notice thereat in the form of Schedule 20. Applications for leases shall be heard by the Warden not less than thirty days after the date of lodging of the application at the Warden's Office.

That Sub-section (5.) read as follows:—

Each application must be signed by the party or parties applying for a lease, or by his or their accredited agent or agents, and must be accompanied by a sketch plan of the land intended to be applied for, showing its position and one boundary line thereof, which line shall be considered as the datum line.

That Sub-section (6.) read as follows:—

The applicant shall, within three months after lodging the application, or within such other extended period of time as the Warden may see fit to allow, furnish to the Warden a plan in duplicate and description showing the boundaries of the land as actually surveyed and marked. Such surveying and marking shall be performed by a licensed surveyor specially appointed by the Minister to perform mining surveys. The plan and description of a goldmining lease shall be executed in accordance with the general directions issued by the Minister, provided that the Minister may at at any time cancel the special appointment of any such licensed surveyor.

That Sub-section (7.) read as follows:—

In all cases where the land is so available, the mean length of the area applied for shall not exceed twice its mean breadth, but when, owing to the positions of adjoining boundaries or natural features, this is impossible, any irregularly shaped or intervening piece of land may be applied for, and a lease of such piece may be granted.

That Sub-section (8.) read as follows:—

All leases shall be marked by the surveyor according to the applicant's posts. Provided that should the area of the land marked by the applicant's posts be in excess of the area applied for, the applicant may either amend his application to include the excess area (provided that the total area of the land applied for does not exceed twenty-five acres), or in the event of the area of the land marked by his posts exceeding twenty-five acres, he may amend his application and retain twenty-five acres extending from the line shown in his application as the datum line; and should the area of the land marked by the applicant's posts be less than the area applied for, such less area only shall be granted. Should the applicant, however, show that by increasing the area to the quantity applied for there would be no interference with adjoining rights, the surveyor may make the required alteration.

IS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, under the powers conferred upon him by "The Sharks Bay Pearl Shell Fishery Act" (55 Vic., No. 9), notifies, for general information, that the Pearling Banks in Sharks Bay, known as "Red Cliff Bay Banks," and numbered 4, will be opened for Dredging and Picking up of Pearl Shell

for a period of six months from 1st October, 1894, subject to the special conditions named hereunder, and to the Regulations in force for the time being.

DIRECTIONS FOR SENDING SAMPLES.

- 1. Send from 3oz. to 4oz. of each sample.
- 2. Do not crush the sample unless you wish to send an average from a large quantity.
- 3. Wrap each sample separately in strong paper, enclosing a piece of white paper with the number of the sample and your own name.
- 4. Address the parcel to "The Government Assayer, Perth."
- Send a letter at the same time to the same address, stating for what metals you desire the samples to be assayed, and enclosing the fees.
- 6. Always retain duplicate samples of whatever you send, marked with the same numbers, and dated.
- N.B.—The rate of postage is one penny for every 2 ounces and under.

REGULATIONS FOR THE WORKING, MANAGEMENT, AND USE OF COSSACK WHARF, FRAMED BY THE GOVERNOR IN EXECUTIVE COUNCIL ON THE 1ST NOVEMBER, 1894, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF "THE JETTIES REGULATION ACT, 1878" (42 Vic., No. 18).

- 1. Cossack Wharf shall, in future, be under the control and Management of the Commissioner of Railways for Western Australia and the officer or officers duly authorised by him on that behalf, by whom all trucking will be performed. And for the purpose the said Commissioner is hereby authorised to run locomotives and railway trucks and carriages of every description upon the said Wharf.
- 2. Owners of vessels and lighters using Cossack Wharf for delivering or receiving cargoes will be required to pay to the Wharfinger in respect of berthing dues, on all cargo shipped or unshipped:

One penny per ton of 2,240lbs.

Minimum—5s. per vessel, 2s. 6d. per lighter.

4. Consignees and shippers will be required to pay a charge of Two Shillings per ton on all goods landed or shipped at the Wharf, such charge in-

cluding all labour in trucking on the Wharf, the tonnage to be computed according to the undermentioned scale:

- 10. No goods shall be landed or placed on the Wharf without written authority from the Wharfinger.
- 11. If it shall appear that goods are being landed and cannot, in the opinion of the Wharfinger, be removed in time to prevent a "block," the Wharfinger may give notice, in writing, to the masters or persons in charge of vessels or lighters from which goods are being discharged, to stop discharging cargo, and upon such notice being given, no further cargo shall be discharged until such time as the Wharfinger may direct.
- 12. The official hours for trucking will be from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. between the 1st October and the 30th April, with an interval of one hour for breakfast and one and a half hours for dinner, and on Saturdays the hours will be from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m. From the 1st of May to 30th September, 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., with an interval of one hour only for dinner. Saturdays, 7.30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- 13. On goods trucked after hours, on Holidays, or on Sundays, at the request of Shipping Agents or others, the Wharfinger will levy, in addition to the ordinary rates, the amount of overtime charges incurred.
- 14. Cargoes which are partly Free and partly for Bond shall be taken to the Depôt, where they will be tallied by Officers representing respectively the Customs and Railway Departments.
- The hours of duty of Officers fulfilling the duties referred to in Regulation No. 14 shall be the same as those enumerated in Regulation No. 12.
- Should the Wharfinger consider it necessary to work overtime, his order will be absolute, and the Officers named in Regulation No. 15 shall adhere strictly to his instructions.
- 17. If *Free* goods are not removed from the Depôt within 24 hours from the time they are placed thereat, a storage charge of 6d. per ton or 1d. per package per day will be made.
- 18. Goods not cleared at the Customs House will be kept at the "Depôt" for 24 consecutive hours after delivery ex ship, to enable consignees to have time to clear or enter them for bond. - 23. The Wharfinger will have the entire control of berthing and removing all ships, boats, or vessels coming to the Wharf under the following Regulations:
 - a. No vessels, boats, or flats shall be fastened to any part of the Wharf, except to such ringbolts or other fastenings as are or may be provided for the purpose; and no vessels, boats,

or flats shall lie alongside such Wharf unless so fastened. All vessels, boats, or flats so fastened shall also be anchored or moored in such manner as to relieve the Wharf as much as possible from the weight of such craft; and in no case shall more than one tier of such vessels, boats, or flats lie alongside or be fastened to any such Wharf, or be moored or fastened to any other vessels, boats, or flats lying alongside any such Wharf, except by special permission of the Wharfinger.

- b. Such vessels, boats, or flats shall not be moored or so fastened as aforesaid, except for the purpose of loading or unloading, nor for any longer period during the authorised hours than shall be reasonably required for such purpose.
- c. Passenger boats only may lie alongside the steps at any such Wharf for such time as may be necessary to embark or disembark passengers.
- d. All such boats, vessels, or flats lying alongside any such Wharf shall, on the approach thereto of a passenger steamer, be hauled off to a sufficient distance to enable her to disembark or embark passengers.
- e. Vessels shall unload in the order in which they arrive, and are placed in a list to be kept by the Wharfinger. Application to be placed in order on such lists according to arrival must be made to the Wharfinger on the day preceding that on which the vessel will unload. If such application be not made, the next vessel on the list shall have precedence, but the vessel forfeiting her turn may be placed next in succession. Vessels will unload according to the order of application to the Wharfinger, and shall, when required by him, give place to vessels discharging cargo. Vessels arriving from or bound to foreign ports shall have precedence of coasting and other craft.
- f. When the Wharfinger may deem it unsafe, through stress of weather, for a vessel to remain alongside a Wharf, he shall direct the immediate removal of such vessel, and the Master or other person in charge of such vessel shall remove such vessel accordingly.
- 24. No person shall fish on such Wharf to the obstruction of the traffic.
- Stones, bricks, clay, sand, lime, coals, coke, or other fuel shall not be landed or placed on the floors of the Wharf. Firewood or coal for the use of passenger steamers and other vessels or boats shall

be taken direct from the truck to the vessel. No goods shall be handed over the rails of the Wharf.

- 26. No bullock or horse teams, or any wheeled vehicle other than a railway truck drawn by any quadruped or quadrupeds, shall be driven on or permitted to go on, and no riding on horseback will be permitted on the Wharf.
- 27. No stones or other kind of substance whatever shall be thrown into the water from such Wharf, or from vessels moored alongside such Wharf.
- 28. No person shall make fast any tackle, purchase, or other gear to any part of the crane, or place or use any private derrick, crane, or other lifting machine without special permission obtained from the Wharfinger.
- 29. Not more than one ton shall be lifted with single half-inch chain, or two tons with a single block added. On a single five-eighth chain not more than 33 cwt. shall be lifted, or 66 cwt. with one single block added. For heavier weights the number of parts of the chain shall be increased in proportion to the weight to be lifted; but not more than five tons shall be lifted by any crane without special arrangements with the Wharfinger.
- 30. No person or persons shall land or place, or cause to be landed or placed upon the Wharf, or upon the approach to the Wharf, any decayed or decaying vegetable or other thing whatsoever likely to become a nuisance.

THE following Sections of "The Defence Forces Act, 1894," and Notes thereon, are published for general information:-

Unlawfully disposing of Arms, etc.

Section 74. (1.) Every person who-

- (a.) Unlawfully disposes of or removes any arms, accoutrements, or other articles belonging to the Crown or any corps; or
- (b.) Refuses to deliver up the same when lawfully required; or
- (c.) Has the same in his possession, except for lawful purposes (the proof of which shall lie upon him);

shall be liable to a penalty of Five pounds for each offence; but this shall not prevent such offender from being indicted and punished for any greater offence if the facts amount to a greater offence, instead of being subjected to the penalty aforesaid.

Any person charged with any offence mentioned in this section may be arrested by order of the justice before whom the complaint is made, upon information on oath showing that there is reason to believe that such person is about to leave Western Australia carrying with him any such arms, accoutrements, or articles.

Offences connected with Desertion.

Section 76. Every person who-

- (1.) Procures or persuades any man who has been enlisted to serve in any corps to desert; or(2.) Attempts to procure or persuade any such man
- to desert; or
- (3.) Knowing that any such man is about to desert aids or assists him in deserting;

(4.) Knowing any such man to be a deserter, conceals such man, or aids or assists him in concealing himself, or aids or assists in his rescue;

shall be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a period not exceeding six months.

NOTES:

- (a.) Any persons unlawfully in possession of articles of soldier's uniform are liable to prosecution under Section 74; and any person finding uniform or other articles of soldier's appointments concealed or deposited on his premises should immediately report the fact to the police or military authorities for his own protection.
- (b.) Soldiers of the Permanent Force are not allowed to assume civilian dress without special permission in writing signed by their Commanding Officer; such permission is always placed in the possession of the soldier, and unless it can be produced he has no authority to be otherwise dressed than in uniform.
- (c.) Any person assisting in any way a soldier of the Permanent Force, who has not written permission to wear plain clothes, to change his uniform for such plain clothes would be liable to prosecution under Sec. 76, in the event of such soldier deserting.

PERTH CITY COUNCIL.

By-Laws.

ADE in pursuance of the provisions of "The Public Health Act, 1886," and Amendment Act, 1893.

Such of the by-laws passed on 14th November, 1888, as are repugnant to the following are hereby rescinded, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

- 1. No person shall enter any premises within the boundaries of the City of Perth for the purpose of removing or burying, nor shall remove from off any premises, whether his own or otherwise, any nightsoil or the contents of any cesspool or cesspit, without first being licensed by the Council as a nightman. Any person offending against this by-law shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence.
- 2. Licenses granted to nightmen shall be revocable at the will of the Council.
- 3. After the first November, One thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, all premises within the boundaries of the City of Perth shall, when required by the Council, be provided with closets, and shall have, in accordance with this by-law, earth-closets or privies only, and each seat of such closets or privies shall be of such height and width

as shall be approved of by the Health Inspector. Persons neglecting to comply with this by-law, within seven days after written notice under the hand of the Mayor has been served on them, shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty of not less than Five shillings for each day they neglect to comply with such notice.

- 4. After the first November, One thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, no water-closets shall be erected in any house, nor shall any cesspools be constructed on any premises. Persons offending against this by-law shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.
- 5. If any person shall erect any water-closet or construct any cesspool, and on written notice being given by the Health Inspector for its removal shall for a period of seven days neglect to comply with such notice, in addition to the penalties set forth in by-law 4 they shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each day they neglect to comply with such notice.
- 6. Every bucket or pan kept for the reception of nightsoil shall be emptied and cleansed at least twice every week. Every occupier or owner offending against this by-law shall be liable to a penalty of Five shillings for each such offence.
- 7. The charges which it shall be lawful for any licensed nightman to make for work done by him shall be in accordance with the following scale:—

For cleansing and removing the contents of any bucket or pan kept for the reception of nightsoil 0 0 4

For cleansing and removing the contents of any cesspool, per cubic yard ... 1 0 0
