With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 1st with reference to my Circular Despatch of the 1st September, 1904, I have the honour to transmit to you, for the information of your Government, copies of a notice issued by the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parlia-ment with regard to the nomination of candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize of 1906.

I have to request that your Government will take such action with reference to this document as may seem calculated to make the conditions of the Prize known to those bodies and persons who are qualified to nominate candidates.

It will be noted that names of candidates should be received by the Committee before the 1st of February next. I have, etc.,

NOBEL PEACE PRIZE.

All proposals of candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize, which is to be distributed December 10, 1906, must, in order to be taken into con-sideration, be laid before the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parliament by a duly qualified person before the first of Fe ruary of the same year.

Any one of the following persons is held to be duly qualified: (a) Members, acting and former, of the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parliament, as well as the advisers appointed at the Norwegian Nobel Institute; (b) Members of Parliament and Members of Government of the different States, as well as Members of the Interparliamentary Union: (c) Members of the International Arbitration Court at the Hague; (d) Members of the International Law; (f) Uni-versity professors of Political Science and of Law, of History and of Philosophy; and (g) Persons who have received the Nobel Peace Prize. The Nobel Peace Prize may also be accorded to institutions or associations

According to the Code of Statutes, § 8, the grounds upon which any proposal is made must be stated, and handed in along with such papers as may therein be referred to.

According to § 3, every written work, to qualify for a prize, must have appeared in print.

For particulars qualified persons are requested to apply to the office of the Nobel Committee of the Norwegian Parliament, Drammensvei 19, Kristiania.

BY-LAWS OF THE CUBALLING LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

WHEREAS by "The Health Act, 1898," the Local Board of Health has power to make By-laws: Now, therefore, in pursu-ance thereof, the following By-laws have been made, and shall come into operation from the date of their publication in the *Government Gazette*.

PART 1.

INTERPRETATION.

BY-LAW No. 1.

Cesspools to be cleansed and filled up.

All existing cesspools and cesspits within the area under the jurisdiction of the Local Board, excepting such cesspools and cesspits as are situated and are of such construction as shall be required by the Local Board, shall be cleansed and filled up to the satisfaction of the Inspector within a calendar month of notice to that effect being given to the owner or occupier.

BY-LAW No. 2.

Regulating the position and manner of construction of privics. No person shall erect within the district of the Local 1. No person shall erect within the district of the Local Board any earth-closet, privy, or urinal, the walls of which are not of stone, wood, wood and iron, or brick, and every closet shall be equipped with the sealed pan adopted by the Local Board. The doors of every closet shall be properly fitted, and shall at all times be kept in a state of thorough repair. The trap-door shall be so constructed as to readily admit the pan, and shall be placed facing the right-of-way.

2. All closets, privies, or urinals shall be erected in such position and in such manner as shall be approved of by the Local Board ; and all such closets, privies, and urinals shall be erected as near the right-of-way as conveniently can be, and every such structure shall be ventilated to the satisfaction of the Local Board : Provided always, that no such closet shall be erected at a less distance than 20 feet from any dwelling-house or place of business except by the express permission of the Local Board first obtained.

3. The occupier of every house or premises, whether public or private, shall cause to be kept in every closet or privy belonging thereto a box containing either dry earth, sawdust, carbolic powder, or other deodorant approved by the Local Board, and shall cause all nightsoil or other matter which may be deposited in such pan or receptacle in such closet or privy to be immediately deodorised or disinfected with a sufficient quantity of the deodorant kept in such box.

BY-LAW No. 3.

BY-LAW No. 3. Each closet shall be supplied with a sufficient number of receptacles for excrementitious matter which shall be inter-changeable with others in the same district, and shall be of the following size, shape, style, and materials, to be con-structed out of 22 gauge iron, $14\frac{1}{2}$ inches high, $13\frac{1}{4}$ inches diameter, inside measurement, when completed. The ring around the top to be made out of 1in. x $\frac{1}{4}$ in bar iron, with four holes punched at equal distances apart, and riveted to the body so as to fit same neatly and be level across the top. The seams of the body are to be folded and grooved, and sweated with solder. Two straps to be put across the bottom of pan, to be made of 20 gauge galvanised hoop iron, $1\frac{3}{2}$ in., and swadged and riveted to the bottom. The handles are to be made out of $\frac{3}{2}$ in. round bar iron. of §in. round bar iron.

·BY-LAW No. 4.

There shall be provided by the occupier two receptacles for every closet on the premises occupied by him.

BY-LAW No. 5.

Every nightman shall cause every receptacle for nightsoil, after the disposal of the contents, to be thoroughly cleansed and tarred.

BY-LAW No. 6.

Every contractor shall cause the nightsoil removed from any premises to be either rendered inoffensive or treated in a destructor, desiccator, or incinerator, or to be trenched or ploughed into the land.

BY-LAW No. 7.

That, failing the use of a destructor, desiccator, or incinerator, the contractor be compelled to obtain a receipt from the occupier of the land whereon deposit is made, or from the manager of some approved depot for nightsoil, for the number of pans there emptied or delivered.

BY-LAW No. 8.

Regulating deposit of nightsoil, etc., at depot.

No person shall deposit by highestic, etc., at depot. No person shall deposit any nightsoil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter, or bury any horse, cattle, or animal of large dimensions in any place whatsoever other than the sanitary depot provided by the Local Board of Health, and no person shall transport or deposit such nightsoil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter from any place within the district to the said depot unless he be a nightman, duly licensed as hereinafter provided provided.

BY-LAW No. 9.

All depots or places of deposit shall be subject to the stringent supervision of the Local Board, and the Inspector shall inspect such depots or places regularly at such intervals as the Local Board may direct.

BY-LAW No. 10.

1. The mode of removal of each receptacle in each closet shall be as follows:—The nightman shall remove each receptacle, and at once cover the same with a suitable tight-fitting lid, and upon every such removal shall carefully place a cleansed pan of the pattern approved by the Local Board in lieu of every pan so removed, and each pan shall be dealt with as prescribed in the next following clause hereof, that is to say :—

in the next following clause hereof, that is to say :--2. Each receptacle which shall have been removed from a closet, and sealed with a lid as prescribed in the foregoing clause, shall be then removed by the nightman in a cart or vehicle of a pattern to be approved by the Local Board, and the contents of all such receptacles shall be deposited at the depot provided by the Board for such purpose : and, if no such depot provided, then in such place or places as shall from time to time be fixed by the Local Board. 3. Until otherwise directed, the nightman shall deposit the contents of all such receptacles in trenches, to be excavated at his own expense, in such place or places as shall be fixed by the Local Board, and treated with disinfectant, and covered with earth to such depth as the Local Board may from time to time direct,

to time direct,

4. The nightman shall at least once in every week cause each

- 4. The hightman shart at least once in every over cause each closet pan with its contents to be removed.
 (a.) He shall, if more than six and not more than ten persons use such closet, cause each closet pan with its contents to be removed at least twice a week.
 - (b.) He shall, if more than ten and not more than fifteen at least three times a week.
 - (c.) He shall, if more than fifteen and not more than twenty persons use such closet, cause the pan to be removed nightly.

5. No occupier or owner shall permit any closet on his premises to be used by more than twenty persons.

BY-LAW No. 11.

Fixing the charge, etc.

Every nightman shall be entitled to charge and to receive from the occupier of any premises from which any nightsoil, trade or house refuse shall have been removed, such sum or sums of money as are specified in Schedule "A" hereto, and no nightman shall ask, demand, or receive more than the moneys mentioned in the said schedule.

BY-LAW No. 12.

Licenses to remove nightsoil.

1. No license shall be issued to any person not approved of by the Local Board.

2. No nightman shall remove nightsoil from any house or premises within the area under the jurisdiction of the Local Board unless he shall have first obtained from the Local Board a license authorising him so to do.

The license shall be in the form of Schedule "B" hereto, and subject to the conditions contained in the license, and to the provisions of "The Health Act, 1898," and of these By-laws.

BY-LAW No. 13.

Regulating removal of nightsoil from depot.

No nightsoil or any human urine, whether mixed with other substances or not, or any solution of nightsoil, shall be removed from any place or depot duly authorised for the reception, utilisation, or deposit of nightsoil or human urine, without having been first subjected to a heat of not less than 212° Fah-renheit for not less than 30 minutes.

The penalties for breach of any of the foregoing conditions shall be not more than the respective amounts set forth at the conclusion of each such condition.

BY-LAW No. 15.

For the mode of carriage of, and precautions, etc., to be observed— Mcat, bread, fruit, etc.

1. No person or persons shall bring or cause to be brought or carried through any street or lane, in any cart or vehicle, any butcher's meat, bread, or fruit, unless such meat, bread, or fruit be protected from the sun, dust, and rain.

2. Every cart or other vehicle and every construction covering for carrying and protecting meat, bread, or fruit shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state.

BY-LAW No. 16.

For the regulation of dairies-Registration.

1. No person shall carry on the trade of a cowkeeper within the district of the Local Board until he shall have first registered with the Local Board of Health. Applications in the Form of "C" in the Schedule hereto shall be made annually to the Local Board of Health. Every person applying for such regis-tration shall pay a fee of fifteen shillings for each annual regis-tration. tration.

Penalties. Every person offending against By-law No. 16 shall, for every breach thereof, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding 10s. per day during the continuation of such offence or breach against the said By-law, but no penalty imposed shall be less than 5c than 5s.

BY-LAW No. 17.

For securing the cleanliness of bakeries.

1. No person shall carry on any bakery or bread or con-fectionery store unless and until the premises have been examined and passed as suitable by the Inspector.

9 All bakeries and bread and confectionery stores shall 2. All bakeries and bread and contectionery stores shall be, at all reasonable times, open to the inspection of any of the officers of the Local Board; and all troughs, tanks, and all utensils and appliances used in such premises shall be kept in a thoroughly clean condition, to the satisfaction of the Local Board's officers,

3. Every bakehouse shall be properly floored and ceiled, and no part of the floor sh ll be below the surface of the ad-joining ground.

4. Every bakehouse shall be provided with sufficient means for natural light and ventilation.

BY-LAW No. 18.

For prescribing the time of and the precautions to be taken on the removal of piguash, etc.

1. No person shall remove any pigwash or other filthy matter unless such pigwash or filthy matter be carried in water-tight barrels or tanks, securely covered to prevent the escape of any of the contents thereof or any offensive smell therefrom.

2. Every tank or barrel and every receptacle used for the storage and reception of any pigwash or filthy matter, and every conveyance or vehicle used for the carriage or removal of any matter as above shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

3. No pigwash or filthy matter shall be removed from any place or premises between the hours of 10 o'clock in the morn-ing and 6 o'clock in the evening, except by permission of the Local Board.

BY-LAW No. 19.

For the prevention of the sale of diseased fruit, etc.

No person shall sell or expose for sale in any market, ware-house, shop, or other place, any fruit or fish which is diseased or unwholesome, and any fruit or fish which, in the opinion of any officer appointed by the Local Board or Central Board, is diseased or unwholesome shall be destroyed, and all cases or packing material which surrounded such fruit or fish shall be also destroyed as such officer may direct.

BY-LAW No. 20.

For the restriction of the storage and keeping of bonedust, etc. No person shall store or keep any bonedust or artificial or other manure so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

BY-LAW No. 21.

Regulating depositing of nightsoil, etc.

No person shall deposit, place, or put any nightsoil, offal, manure, or offensive refuse, dry rubbish, or other matter what-soever upon any place other than the authorised depot.

BY-LAW No. 22.

Regulating and keeping of cattle or other animals.

1. Every occupier or owner of a building wherein or whereon any horses, cattle, swine, or other animals may be kept shall provide, in connection with such building or other premises, a suitable receptacle for dung, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter which may be produced from time to time in the keeping of such animals.

2. Such receptacle shall be constructed in such a manner and of such material, and shall be maintained in such a manner so as to prevent the escape of any of the contents thereof or any leakage therefrom.

3. The owner or occupier of such premises shall regularly collect all dung, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter, and place the same in the said receptacle, and he shall not permit or suffer any receptacle to overflow or become offensive.

4. The owner or occupier of such premises shall, at least once a week, remove or cause to be removed, all dung or other offensive matter from such receptacle, and shall convey or cause to be conveyed such dung or offensive matter to the depot or place set apart for that purpose by the Local Board.

BY-LAW No. 23.

Defining an area within which swine may not be kept, etc.

1. No person shall keep any swine within 100 feet of any house.

2. No person shall keep any swine in any part of the district under the control of the Local Board, unless and until such premises or places to be used as a piggery have been examined and approved by the Inspector and licensed by the Local Board.

BY-LAW No. 24.

For the prevention of danger to the public from manufactories or places for the storage of inflammable materials.
1. No person shall permit on any premises owned or occupied by him any accumulation of straw, paper, shavings, empty cases, or other inflammable material.

2. Any person who, after two hours' notice from the Inspector, shall neglect to remove such inflammable material shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law, and, on conviction, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding ± 5 for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

BY-LAW No. 25.

For the disinfection of and the prevention of nuisance or injury to health from poultry yards, rags, or other materials used or stored in marine stores.

1.~ No person shall keep any premises as a poultry yard at a less distance than 25 feet from any dwelling.

2. Every poultry yard shall be kept in a clean condition, and disinfected at least once a week with lime, ashes, or other suitable disinfectant.

No rags or other materials used or stored in marine stores, fock or bedding or furniture manufactories shall be kept so as to cause a nuisance or to be injurious to health.

BY-LAW No. 26.

For the regulation of noxious or offensive trades

For the regulation of noxious or offensive trades. 1. The owner or occupier of any place, building, or premises used for the purpose of carrying on any offensive or noxious trade, business or manufactory, as above set forth, whether established before or after the passing of these By-laws, shall register the same at the office of the Local Board during the first week in January in each year, and shall pay to the Local Board an annual registration fee, as set forth in Schedule "E" hereto, of the amount of which fee the Local Board shall give notice to such owner or occupier; and if such owner or occupier fails to comply he shall be liable to a penalty not exceed-ing #2 per day for each day during which such provisions shall not be complied with. not be complied with.

2. All premises or places so registered shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state, and shall be limewashed as often as may be required by the Local Board or its officers.

BY-LAW No. 27

For the prevention of the use of steam whistles at factories, etc. No person or owner of any factory or other establishment shall use or cause to be used any steam whistle so as to be a nuisance to any person.

BY-LAW No. 28.

BY-LAW No. 29.

For preventing offensive matter running out of premises. 1. No owner, occupier, or employee shall permit any offensive sive matter from any manufactory, brewery, slaughter-house, knacker's yard, butcher's or fishmonger's shops, laundry, or dunghill to escape and flow upon any street, lane, thorough-fare, or land within the district of the Local Board.

2. All such offensive matter shall be placed in a suitable receptacle, and emptied as often as necessary, to the satisfaction of the Inspector.

BY-LAW No. 30.

Regulating the deposit of rubbish, etc.

1. The occupier of every house or premises shall, on written notice from the Inspector, and within the time specified in such notice, provide such and so many receptacles or boxes of the material and of the dimensions as may be required by the Local Board for the temporary deposit of house refuse.

2. The occupier of such house, or if there be no occupier, then the owner shall regularly collect all refuse or rubbish from such premises and place the same in the receptacles : and he shall not permit or suffer such receptacles to overflow or become offensive, and shall, when necessary or directed by the Inspector or officer of the Local Board, thoroughly disinfect the same forthwith.

3. Every receptacle as aforesaid shall be kept in such place or position as the Inspector may point out and so as to be con-venient for the removal of the contents thereof.

Every owner or occupier, or if there be no occupier, then the owner of every house or premises to which a receptacle as aforesaid is attached or used, shall cause the same to be emptied at least once a week, or as often as the Inspector may direct.

The owner or occupier of such premises shall, after notice from the Inspector, and within the time limited in such notice, replace by a new and approved receptacle any receptacle that the Inspector may deem worn out or unfit for use.

BY-LAW No. 31.

Receptacles to be kept in an inoffensive condition.

All receptacles required by "The Health Act, 1898," or under these By-laws, shall be kept in an inoffensive condition by the householder or occupier.

BY-LAW No. 32.

Regulating the removal of offensive matter.

Regulating the removal of offensive matter. 1. Every person who shall convey any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil collected, placed, or found in or about any house, stable, cowhouse, pigsty, lane, yard, street, or place whatsoever, through or along any street or lane, shall, previous to and during the whole time of such conveyance, cause such dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil collected to be covered with lime or suitable substance, or shall adopt such other precautions as respectively may be necessary to prevent the emission of noxious or offensive odour or effluvia therefrom ; and the same shall not be deposited in any place within the district other than the place set apart by the Local Board for that purpose. 2. The occupier of any premises who shall remove, or cause

2. The occupier of any premises who shall remove, or cause to be removed, any filth, dust, paper, or vegetable matter, ashes, rubbish, or any offensive matter produced upon his premises shall not, in the process of such removal, deposit such filth, dust, rubbish, ashes, or offensive matter, or cause or allow such filth, dust, rubbish, ashes, or offensive matter to be deposited upon any footway, pavement, or carriage-way.

3. For the purpose of such removal, such person shall, in every case, use or cause to be used a suitable vessel or receptacle, cart, or a carriage properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents thereof.

4. If, in the process of such removal, any person shall slop or spill, or cause or allow to fall upon any pavement, footway, or road or carriage-way any such filth, dust, ashes, rubbish, or any offensive matters, he shall forthwith remove the same, and immediately after such removal thoroughly sweep or other-wise thoroughly cleanse such place.

BY-LAW No. 33.

Regulating the disposal of the carcasses of dead animals.

In the event of death or any accident necessitating the slaughter of any horse, cattle, sheep, or other animal, the carcase of such animal shall be removed to such place as the Local Board may direct, and there thoroughly burned and destroyed or buried to the satisfaction of the Inspector, by the owner or person in charge of such animal, as the case may be.

BY-LAW No. 34.

Regulating the burning of offal and other offensive matter.

No person shall burn any offal, rags, clippings, or parings of leather, or any offensive matter, so as to be offensive to any person or resident in the neighbourhood of such burning.

BY-LAW No. 35.

Regulating the removal of slops.

Regulating the removal of stops. 1. Any person who shall be ordered by the Local Board or its Inspectors shall provide and maintain proper water-tight vehicles or receptacles, fitted with close-fitting covers or lids, for the purpose of carting or receiving any slops or suds, house refuse, waste, or other matter or substance used in any laundry which is likely to become a nuisance or offensive by reason of exposure

2. All such vehicles or receptacles shall be kept in such con-venient places so as to be readily removed, as may be directed by the Inspector, so as not to be a nuisance to any person, and shall be kept in a thoroughly sanitary condition, and removed at least once a week and cleansed and disinfected both inside and out.

BY-LAW No. 36.

Regulating the deposit of offensive liquid, etc.

No foul or offensive water or other offensive liquid, and no garbage, sweepings, or other offensive matter or thing shall be pumped, emptied, swept, thrown, or otherwise discharged or deposited into or upon any street, lane, yard, vacant land, or other place, whether public or private, within the district other than the place set apart by the Local Board for that pur-pose. pose

BY-LAW No. 37.

Restricting contracts.

No individual householder shall contract for the removal of nightsoil or any other refuse or offensive matter whatever, except with the person licensed by the Local Board, and in accordance with these By-laws.

BY-LAW No. 38.

Regulating the carrying off of storm or rain water.

Every owner shall cause all buildings to be provided with spoutings, downpipes, and drains sufficient to carry off all storm or rain water.

BY-LAW No. 39.

To regulate the registration and management of private hospitals.

1. Every person keeping, or intending to keep, or open any private hospital within the district of Cuballing Local Board, shall make application in writing for the registration thereof to the Local Board, stating :

- (a.) The manner and address of the applicant, and the qualifications possessed by him or her.
- (b.) The locality of the premises proposed to be regis tered.
- (c.) The number of patients to be accommodated, and the number of nurses to be constantly employed.

Such applications must be accompanied by a plan of 2 \geq . Such applications must be accompanied by a plan of the premises proposed to be registered, and also a certificate signed by the Officer of Health that the premises are in every way fit to be registered, and also accompanied by a certificate signed by the Inspector that the sanitary arrangements are satisfactory.

3. Within seven days after such application is lodged with the Secretary, the applicant shall advertise notice of such application in a local newspaper, as set forth in Schedule "F" hereto.

4. If the application be granted by the Local Board, the Secretary shall issue to the applicant a certificate of registration as set forth in Schedule "G" hereto, subject, however, to such conditions as the Local Board may impose.

5. No alteration shall be made to any registered premises, or any part thereof, unless with the approval of the Officer of Health, and the consent, in writing, of the Local Board.

6. Any person in charge of a private hospital shall forth-with carry out all such orders and directions as the Local Board may from time to time give relating to sanitation and drainage of the premises.

7. Any person in charge of a private hospital shall, at the request of the Officer of Health of the Local Board, provide for the isolation or removal of any patient suffering from any infectious or contagious disease.

8. In every such hospital there shall be at least two nurses to every ten patients, whose qualifications shall be approved of by the Local Board of Health.

9. The Secretary shall keep a register as set forth in Schedule " H " hereto.

10. Every person applying for registration, or for renewal of registration, shall pay 10s. on each application.

of registration, shall pay 10s. on each application. 11. The said Local Board shall have the power at any time to cancel or revoke any such license and registration if, in the opinion of the Local Board, such private hospital endangers health by reason of any drainage connected or adjacent thereto, or by reason of any default in the observance of any By-law or order for the time being in force in the said district, or here-after to come into force; or if, in the opinion of the said Local Board, either the building or the conduct or management thereof is undesirable to the interest of the public health, or if any complaint is made against any such registered hospital.

12. Any building or premises licensed as by this By-law directed shall, at all times, be open to the inspection of the Inspector or other officer of the Board, who may make any order or direction for the destruction or removal of refuse and as to the appliances to be used in connection therewith, and any other order or direction regarding the sanitation or the management of the premises as he or they may think fit.

BY-LAW No. 40.

Penalties.

Penalties. Any person guilty of any offence against any of these By-laws, not otherwise specially provided for, shall be liable for every such offence, besides any costs or expenses that may be incurred in the taking of proceedings against such person, as well as any costs and expenses which may be incurred in remedying such default, as provided for in "The Health Act, 1898" (Sections 35 and 242), or these By-laws, to a penalty not exceeding the sum of £10, and to a penalty not exceeding the sum of £5 for each day during which such offence shall be continued; and such penalty or penalties shall be recovered as provided in the said Act; Provided always, that no penalty imposed hereunder for continuing the offences shall be less than 5s. than 5s.

III IS Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Amendments and Additions to the Regulations under "The Mining Act, 1904," to come into force throughout the State on the 1st day of December, 1905.

AMENDMENTS AND ADDITIONS.

1. In Regulation 41, the word "five" is struck out and the word "six" is inserted in place thereof; and after Subclause (e) a Subclause is inserted, as follows :—

- (f.) A Race or Pipe Track Water Right shall mean the right to occupy, for the purpose of cutting a race or for laying a water-pipe on or underneath the surface of Crown land, such area as may be fixed by the Warden on the granting of the right.
 - A Race Water Right shall entitle the holder to cut, construct, and maintain a water race or use as a water race any natural channel on such land as may be fixed by the Warden on the granting of a right.
 - When a Race Water Right has been granted for the purpose of a tail-race it shall, during its currency, entitle the holder to cut, construct, maintain, and use the race in order to carry off water, tailings, sludge, and other refuse from mining operations, or to serve as a ground-sluice or race for saving gold or minerals, provided that the holder shall not be entitled to treat any portion of such tail-race as a ground-sluice or race for saving gold or minerals excepting such portion as may be approved by the Warden on the granting of the application.
 - Such area shall not be fenced except with the approval of the Warden first obtained.
 - The course of any Race or Pipe Track Water Right may at any time be deviated, and the Warden may make an order for such deviation should he consider the same necessary in the public interest.

2. After Regulation 62 a regulation is inserted, as follows :---

RACE OR PIPE TRACK WATER RIGHTS.

Method of taking possession.

62A. Before making application for a Race or Pipe Track Water Right the applicant, or some person authorised on his behalf, shall erect a substantial post or cairn of stones projecting not less that three feet above the surface at each end of the proposed race or pipe track, and on each of such posts or cairns there shall be affixed a notice, signed by the applicant or his agent, setting forth the date and hour at which such land was taken possession of, the approximate length of the proposed race or water-pipe, and the course thereof.

Before granting any Water Race or Pipe Track Water Right which passes over any public road, the Warden shall require from the applicant sufficient proof that the local authority consents thereto, and it shall be a condition precedent to the granting of any Water Race or Pipe Track Water Right that wherever the race or water-pipe crosses any mining tenement it shall be constructed in such a manner as not to interfere with the working, use, or enjoyment of such tenement, and wherever any such race or water-pipe crosses any road or footway used by the public, there shall be constructed and kept in repair a good and substantial bridge over the same. Every such bridge shall, when crossing a road, be not less than 12 feet in width, and when crossing a footway, not less than 6 feet in width. The holder of any Water Race or Pipe Track Water Right shall be entitled to a width of 10 feet of land on each side of the race or water-pipe for the protection thereof. Provided that when it is proved to the satisfaction of the Warden that a greater width than 10 feet on each side of a race is necessary he may, in his discretion, grant the same. Provided further, that any such land may be mined upon on compensation to the holder, or upon providing an equally good and convenient race or water-pipe, to the satisfaction of the Warden, in lieu thereof.

It shall be lawful for the Warden from time to time, by order in writing, to authorise any person or persons lawfully engaged in mining operations to use or enlarge, for the purpose of such operations, any tail-race held by any other person (excepting such portion thereof as may lawfully be used as a ground-sluice for saving gold or other minerals), subject to the conditions following :--

- (a.) That the persons in whose favour the order is made pay to the holder of the tail-race a proportionate share of the original cost of the construction of such tail-race, or a periodical payment in advance as a rent for the use thereof; and also,
- (b.) That if it is proposed to enlarge such tail-race, such enlargement shall be at the sole expense of the persons in whose favour the order is made, and shall be so carried out as not to unduly interfere with the mining operations of the holder of the tail-race; and also,
- (c.) Such other conditions as the Warden thinks equitable.

Where an order pursuant to the foregoing regulation has been made, the persons in whose favour it is made shall at all times, on receiving notice in writing from the holder of the tail-race, forthwith assist in clearing the race whenever it is reasonably necessary so to do, and if any such person makes default in so assisting it shall be competent for the holder of the race to clear the same and to recover from the person in default his proportionate share of the cost thereof.

The proportionate share of the cost of construction, the amount of the rent, and any dispute between the parties in in respect of the premises shall, if not settled by the parties, be determined by the Warden.

All gold or minerals discharged into such tail-race shall belong to the parties, in shares to be settled by them, or in case of dispute, to be determined by the Warden.

A Water Race or Pipe Track Water Right shall be deemed to be forfeitable when from any cause the race or waterpipe be not used for the space of three consecutive months, provided always that water be available to be run through the same, or that exemption from the use of such race or water-pipe has not been granted by the Warden and registered, or for non-compliance by the holder with any of the conditions upon which the same may have been granted.

3. The following words are added to Regulation 145:---"In the event of an application being refused, the applicant shall be entitled to a refund of the fees paid by him on lodging his application, less a recording fee of 2s. 6d."

- 4. The following words are added to Regulation 192:---
 - At the end of Subclause (2) :-- " Exclusive of their own wages."
 - At the end of the said Regulation :--" Provided that in any case in which the Warden may refuse registration he shall, if requested, forward to the Secretary for Mines, for submission to the Minister, a report giving his reasons for such refusal, together with a copy of the agreement, and the Minister may, if he think fit, order registration."

5. In Form No. 59, "Rents and Royalties," the words "Water right, water race, or pipe track, per annum, \pounds 1" are inserted before the words "royalty per ounce."

6. In Form 59, "Survey Fees," the words "Water right, water race, or pipe track, such special fee as may be arranged with the approval of the Warden or Inspecting Surveyor" are added at the end thereof.

THE ROADS ACT, 1902.

Port Hedland Road Board By-Laws

The Port Hedland Road Board, in pursuance of the powers vested in the said Board, under and by virtue of "The Roads Act, 1902," do hereby make and publish the following By-laws :---

WHEREAS by "The Roads Act, 1902," the Board in any district is empowered to make By-laws for all and any purposes in the said Act mentioned: It is hereby resolved by the Board of the Port Hedland district, by and with the approval of His Excellency the Governor in Council, that the following By-laws shall be enforced within the said district from the date of the publication thereof in the Government Gazette :—

INTERPRETATION.

1. In these By-laws the following terms shall, unless the context otherwise indicates, bear the meaning set against them respectively, that is to say :--

(a.) The interpretations of the various terms used throughout these By-laws shall be those as defined in Clause 4 of "The Roads Act, 1902," with additional terms defined hereunder.

- (b.) "The Act"—The Roads Act of 1902, and all amendments thereto which may come into force thereafter.
- (c.) "Secretary"—The Secretary of the Board.
- (d.) "Animal"—Shall include horse, mare, filly, gelding, bull, cow, calf, heifer, steer, mule, donkey, camel, goat, sheep, or foal.
- (e.) "Water Supply"—Any public well or works for the conservation of water constructed by or under the control of Board.
- (f.) "Month"-Shall mean calendar month.

Appointment.

2. No permanent appointment shall be made of an officer under the Board until an advertisement has been published in one or more local newspapers calling for applications from persons competent to fill such appointment. All appointments shall be made by resolutions passed by the Board.

DUTIES OF SECRETARY.

- 3. The duties of the secretary shall be-
 - (a.) To attend all meetings of Board and committees.
 - (b.) To take note of all minutes and prepare reports of committees.
 - (c.) To conduct all correspondence and give the other officers instructions as directed by the minutes.
 - (d.) To answer all questions on Board's business.
 - (e.) To see that all accounts are audited once a year and the balance-sheets prepared and printed yearly.
 - (f.) To supervise the preparation of the rate book and Board's electoral lists, examine proofs of the latter, and arrange for distribution of copies prior to the elections; also to attend all courts of revision or appeal, making the necessary arrangements for the elections, and preparing papers, etc., for the clerks.
 - (g.) To summon the members to Board and committee meetings.
 - (h.) The secretary shall keep the cash and other books as may be issued by Minister, as well as any and all other books required to show the receipts and expenditure made by the Board. The said books shall be kept written up every fortnight ready for the inspection of the Board or any member of the Board who may at any time during office hours desire to see them.
 - (i.) He shall check all accounts sent in to the Board, and see that all accounts for works have stated on them the authority under which such works have been done, and shall check all returns made by the collectors or other of the Board's officers, and shall see that, with all the returns made, the heels of the receipt books accompany the returns. He shall supervise and attend to the due payment of all money coming through the hands of the Board's officers and payable to the credit of the Board; he shall report to the Board, at their next meeting, any officer neglecting to make his return as provided, with the necessary vouchers attached thereto.
 - (j.) He shall pay to the bank, within 48 hours after receipt, any sum or sums of money that may be received by him on behalf of the Board.
 - (k.) He shall have the cash book and bank pass-book made up in readiness for the meeting of the Board, and shall produce them at each meeting thereof if requested. Should any member of the Board desire to see them at any time during office hours, the Secretary shall produce them for his inspection. No money shall be paid into the bank to the credit of the Board by any officer of the Board except by or through the Secretary.
 - (l.) The Secretary shall give all receipts on printed forms.
 - (m.) The Secretary shall cheerfully and readily obey all lawful commands or orders of the Board, and shall attend to all matters affecting the finances of the Board and not herein specified.

MEETINGS.

- - (b.) An ordinary meeting of the Board shall be held on the first Saturday in each and every month.

Order of Business.

5. The ordinary business of all ordinary meetings shall be as follows, that is to say :---

- (a.) Reading and confirmation of minutes of last ordinary or special meeting, if any.
- (b.) Consideration of business arising out of minutes.
- (c.) Reading of correspondence received and despatched, and taking such immediate action as may be deemed expedient in regard thereto.
- (d.) Passing accounts for payment.
- (e.) Presentation of petition or memorials and committee reports, and consideration thereof.
- (f.) Consideration of tenders, ratification of contracts.
- (g.) General business of Board.
- (h.) No discussion shall take place upon the minutes except as to their accuracy or for the rectification of any clerical errors.
- (i.) Immediately after confirmation of the minutes, the Chairman may make any communication to the Board which he may deem advisable, or bring under consideration any business that he may think necessary; and it shall be competent for any member of the Board to ask a question simply, and no debate shall ensue thereon at the time.

TENDERS.

6. Tenders for work shall be opened and dealt with when the subject matters of the tenders come on to be considered at the meeting of the Board, or by a Committee appointed for that purpose.

MOTIONS AND AMENDMENTS.

- 7. (a.) A motion once moved at a meeting cannot be withdrawn unless by consent of the Board.
 - (b.) One or more amendments may be proposed on a motion before the Board. When more than one amendment is moved the question shall be first put on the last amendment, then on the next in succession, and then on the original motion, in the reverse order in which they are moved.
 - (c.) A motion or amendment not seconded cannot be discussed by any member or put by the Chairman.

Appointment of Committees.

8. The Board may at any meeting appoint one or more members as a Committee to inquire into matters and make a report and recommendation thereon, but no committee shall incur any financial liability or in any way commit the Board to any responsibility whatever without express and specific authority conferred by the By-laws or by resolution of the Board.

FINANCE ACCOUNTS.

- 9. (a.) All accounts, bills, and vouchers shall be submitted to the Board by the Chairman at the ordinary meetings, and, after being certified as correct, shall be so initialled by him and paid by cheque.
 - (b.) An account shall be opened with such bank as the Board may direct, and all money received from whatever source (with the exception of money granted by the Government) shall be paid into such bank to the credit of the Board, and no account shall be paid except by cheque, signed by the Chairman and countersigned by another member of the Board.
 - (c.) All moneys shall, within two days after they have come into the hands of the Board, or of any officer, servants, or clerks, for the use of the Board, be paid as defined by Section 171.

URGENT WORK.

10. The Chairman, with one member, may, in the case of urgency, authorise the expenditure of a sum not exceeding Ten pounds, but shall, in every case, report the same at the next meeting of the Board.

ELECTIONS.

- 11. (4.) In the event of a vacancy occurring in the Board arising from any cause except annual retirement, the Chairman shall give at least one month's public notice of the day upon which the election shall be held to fill such vacancy.
 - (b.) The chief polling place for the holding of election of members to the Board shall be the office of the Board at Port Hedland.
 - (c.) Immediately upon the Chairman fixing a day for an election the Secretary shall forward proxy or absentee voters' forms to all persons entitled to vote at such election who shall reside more than five miles from the chief polling place.

GENERAL TRAFFIC, ETC.

12. The Board may from time to time notify any places on the road as dangerous. Such a notification may be given by advertisement in the *Pilbarra Goldfields News*, or by posting placards at the approaches to the places notified as dangerous, such placards to bear the word "Dangerous."

13. The person in charge of came's on arriving at a place on any road notified as dangerous, shall, before entering or passing over with his camels any such place, send a man at least three hundred yards ahead of such camels to warn any person who may be on the piece of road notified as dangerous of the approach of the camels.

14. In all cases of camels meeting or overtaking a horse or bullock team, or a vehicle of any description, the person in charge or the driver of such camels shall, when within two hundred yards of the team or vehicle, take the camels off the road and at least twenty yards from the centre thereof.

15. The person in charge of any camels shall not keep, or permit to be kept, the camels in any street of or any road within the boundaries of any town within the district for any longer time than actually necessary to load or unload the camels; neither shall any camels be brought into any street of any town for the purpose of being loaded until all the loading shall be actually ready and packed to be placed on the camels.

16. Every camel-driver shall, whenever requested by a constable, member of, or Secretary to the Board, produce for inspection his license.

17. Every person having the charge of any camels shall, whenever requested by a constable, member of, or Secretary to the Board, produce the certificate of registration of all the camels under his charge.

18. No camel-owners or persons in charge of camels shall allow the camels to remain at a well or pool more than half an hour for the purpose of watering, or allow any camels to camp within a quarter of a mile of any well or natural surface water, nor allow any camels to camp less than 300 yards from any road.

19. That camel-owners be allowed to travel their camels over the whole length of the causeway, either way, between the hours of 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., only of each day.

20. No camel-drivers' licenses to be issued to aboriginals.

21. No person, without having first obtained the permission of the Board, shall allow any horses, cases, coal, sand, firewood, goods, ware, merchandise, or other articles or effects to remain on any part of any street or road within the district after sunset, nor in any case for a longer period than shall be necessary for housing and removing same.

22. No person shall place, lay, deposit, shoot, or discharge any rubbish or materials whatsoever on the surface of any street, road, footway, or public reserve within the district without having first obtained the permission of the Board.

23. Every person shall, after having received from the Board, as in the last preceding section provided, a permit to deposit rubbish or materials on the surface of any street, road, footway, or public reserve, have sufficient and continuous light burning thereon from sunset to the following sunrise during the time such rubbish or material shall remain and continue so deposited.

24. No person shall turn loose or suffer any animal belonging to him or under his charge to stray, or go about, or be tethered, or depasture in any street or road inside the boundary of a town within the district.

25. No teamster or person in charge of a horse or bullock team shall, without good cause, delay on any road or street when loaded or unloaded.

PRESERVATION OF TREES.

26. No person shall-

- (a.) Injure, destroy, carry away, or remove from any public road any tree, shrub, or plant standing in any of the streets.
- (b.) Injure, destroy, carry away, remove out of its place, or ride or drive against any of the treeguards, fences, or other protection to any such trees, shrubs, or plants as aforesaid. Any person or persons offending against this by-law shall forfeit for every such offence a penalty not exceeding £10.

PENALTIES.

27. Where any person by these by-laws, or any part of them, is required to do or perform any act, and such act is not done, or remains undone or unperformed, it shall be lawful for the Board to perform the same and charge the cost and expenses against such person, and the amount thereof may be recovered summarily.

28. Every person who does, permits, or suffers any act, matter, or thing contrary to any of these by-laws, or commits or permits any breach or neglect thereof, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against these by-laws, and be liable, when not otherwise provided for, to a fine or penalty not exceeding £10 for each offence.

WHEREAS by virtue of the provisions of "The Roads Act, 1902" (2 Edward VII., No. 48), the Road Board of every district is empowered to make, publish, alter, modify, amend, or repeal By-laws for any purposes of the said Act mentioned: It is therefore ordered by the Bayswater Road Board that from and after the publication of the special By-laws dealing with the control and management of Roads same shall take effect.

Special By-laws dealing with the Control and Management of Roads.

4. No permission will be granted by Board for any verandah or balcony unless built to the following specifications :---

Roof, bull-nosed or flat.

Height from ground, 8ft. 6in. to plate.

Width, 12ft. from building line.

Posts to be of jarrah of a minimum measurement of 5in. x 5in., or iron of approved pattern, and placed not more than 10ft. apart.

Rafters, 4in. x 2in.; not more than 3ft. apart.

Purlines, 3in. x 12in.; not less than five to be put in. Suitable guttering and arm pipes.
