AT a meeting of the Executive Council held in the Executive Council Chambers, at Perth, this 19th day of January, 1939, the following Orders in Council were authorised to be issued:—

Road Districts Act, 1919-1934.

Rockingham Road District—Redivision into Wards.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

P.W. 990/31.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, under the provisions of section 8 of the Road Districts Act, 1919-1934, doth hereby redivide the Rockingham Road District (hitherto divided into three Wards) into four Wards, by severing portions of the Town and Central Wards and constituting such portions an additional Ward, to be known as Safety Bay Ward, the boundaries of which are described in the Schedule hereunder, and to alter the boundaries of the Town and Central Wards accordingly; and, consequent upon such redivision, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, acting by and with the said advice and consent, under the provisions of section 20 of the said Act, doth hereby determine that the number of members for each Ward of the said District shall be as follows:—Town Ward—2 members; Central Ward—2 members; East Ward—2 members; Safety Bay Ward—1 member.

Schedule.

All those portions of the Town Ward and Central Ward, and being portion of Cockburn Sound Location 16, bounded by lines commencing on the western boundary of the district at the south-western corner of Cockburn Sound Location 700 and extending east along the south boundary of said location and the south boundaries of Rockingham Lots 146 and 268 to a south-eastern boundary of the Rockingham Townsite at the south-eastern corner of said Lot 268; thence south-westward in prolongation of said townsite boundary to the western boundary of the district; thence westward and northward along the district boundary to the starting point.

FARMERS' DEBTS ADJUSTMENT ACT, 1930-1934.

NOTICE is hereby given that the following Stay Orders have been issued in accordance with section 7, subsection (1), of the Farmers' Debts Adjustment Act, 1930-1934, which reads as follows:—

A Stay Order shall direct that no action, execution, distress for rent, proceedings on default for breach of covenant under any mortgage or other security for money, or under an agreement for sale and purchase of lands, or other process or proceeding, shall be commenced or proceeded with or put in force against the farmer or any of the farmer's assets, whether utilised in connection with or forming portion of the assets comprised in his farming business or not, during the operation of such Stay Order: Provided that, by leave of a Judge, any action may, notwithstanding the Stay Order, be instituted and/or carried on against the farmer, but not beyond judgment.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 26 of 1937.

Between Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage, and Drainage Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and Hon. Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage, Respondent.

THE Industrial Board for the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage industry, in pursuance of the powers and duties conferred upon it by section 107 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, and in pursuance of a remission to it by the Court of Arbitration, doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the industrial dispute between the above-named parties:—

AWARD.

Part I.—Preliminary.

1.—Definitions.

- (1) "Bottom man" means a worker in the bottom of a trench or manhole excavation, other than a shaft, excavating, toeing laths, and knocking down sets.
- (2) "Braceman" means a worker engaged upon the brace of a shaft looking after the safety of men underground, and the securing of material going below, and the hauling, landing, and tipping of mullock and other material.
- (3) "Casual worker" means one for whom work over a period of six (6) consecutive working days, not counting holidays, is not provided by the employer.
- (4) "Chute hand" means a worker controlling the pouring of concrete at the extremity of chuting, and whose duties include the clearing, cleaning, and coupling and uncoupling of the chute, when chuting is suspended from cables.
- (5) "Chute and tower maintenance man" means a worker engaged on minor maintenance work to chutes, towers, ropes, blocks and tackle, of the Insley Chuting System at Canning Dam.
- (6) "Concretor (batching and mixing), Canning Dam" means a worker operating mechanical appliances for handling, weighing, and mixing dry and wet concrete components.
- (7) "Concretor" means a worker engaged in filling in gauge, mixing on the board, or machine mixing; wheeling from the board, or packing concrete (or trucking concrete in a tunnel) or engaged setting reinforcement for concrete, or distributing and packing concrete inside of box or forming, including cutting and bending reinforcements.
- (8) "Cut and cover man" means a worker—
- engaged sinking cuts with the use of horizontal box timbering, but not with the use of vertical timbers;
 - holing through between horizontal or vertical timber cuts, where steel shields are used;
 - removing horizontal box timbering while packing and refilling cuts.
- (9) "Cut and cover work" means excavation by a method in which series of vertical holes are sunk with horizontal holes excavated between, where the distance between vertical holes is not greater than eight (8) feet measured from the nearest side of the open cut to that of the adjacent one.
- (10) "Engineer" means the officer occupying for the time being the position of Engineer for Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage Department.
- (11) "Ganger" means a worker placed in charge of four (4) or more other workmen.
- (12) "Miner" means a worker employed sinking or driving in rock, or in any other material in a shaft or tunnel, and includes any such worker using a hammer and drill, hammer and gad, or explosives, or employed breaking through between open cut trenches where the worker is employed within the connecting tunnel, and, in "cut and cover" work, when holing through in rock, or by the use of timber sets in other material.
- (13) "Minister" means the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage.
- (14) "Packer" means a worker who packs sand or other material in a drive or tunnel.
- (15) "Pipe jointer" means a worker who joints concrete or stoneware pipes.
- (16) "Pipe setter" means a worker who sets concrete or stoneware pipes.
- (17) "Pipe setter's assistant" means any worker actually engaged assisting the pipe setter in laying sewerage or storm-water pipes thirty-six inches (36in.) in diameter or over.
- (18) "Pipe setter's attendant" means a worker engaged mixing mortar and supplying mortar, pipes, or other material to the pipe setter or jointer.
- (19) "Powder monkey" means a worker in charge of and engaged upon the preparation of a number of charges and/or the charging and firing of a series of holes in a quarry or excavation.
- (20) "Plant attendant (Canning Dam)" means a worker engaged in the starting of the secondary crusher motor, and all conveyor motors; the lubrication of the primary and secondary crushers, and the cleaning of the oiling wicks; the tightening of all bolts as required; the replacing of bolts on pulleys while plant is working; and reporting anything unusual to the foreman-fitter, and freeing stone doors as necessary.
- (21) "Platelayer (light tram tracks)" means a worker who performs the various operations of plate-laying (irrespective of the weight of the rail), but does not include a worker who merely shifts sets of rails from one place to another.
- (22) "Rigger" on concrete or masonry structures, where suspension cables are used for carrying chuting, means a worker responsible for the coupling of "block" tackle to main cable, and condition thereof.
- (23) "Rise" means a shaft excavated upwards from a tunnel or drive.
- (24) "Sewerage maintenance man" means a worker employed cleaning out and washing down manholes, sighting along and clearing blockages, flushing, scraping (by rodding or use of tackle) in sewers and drains, removing sand and debris from sewers through manholes, cleaning out stormwater drains, repairing and replacing broken pipes and fittings, altering manholes, pipes and other appurtenances and doing the necessary excavation incidental thereto, doing repair work generally of fittings, plant, sewers and drains, and at treatment works and pumping stations, doing concrete and cement work in connection with any of the foregoing types of work, and all other work incidental to the maintenance of sewers, drains and appurtenances.
- (25) "Shaft" means any hole sunk for the purpose of opening up a drive or tunnel, but does not include work known as "cut and cover."
- (26) "Timber cutter" means a worker employed cutting piles, laths, keels and sets, and includes a worker who prepares and places kerbing in position.
- (27) "Timberman" means a worker who hangs centres and fixes sets and poles off laths, lays keels, fixes frames, or lays decking, or who is employed handling timber in shafts when buildings are being underpinned.
- (28) "Tipman" means a worker directing the tipping of and levelling off to definite lines or pegs of spoil from any vehicle or other container.
- (29) "Treatment works attendant" means a worker employed at a sewerage treatment works with sedimentation tanks, detritus tanks, and sludge digestion tanks, whose duty is to keep the channels to and from sedimentation tanks free; clean screens; rod or clean out pipes or channels; skim tanks; break up the scum on the digesters; attend to work in connection with the sludge drying beds; and perform all other work necessary for the efficient operation of the system.
- (30) "Union" means the Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage, and Drainage Employees' Industrial Union of Workers.
- (31) "Wet places" means places where the splashing of water and mud saturates the worker's clothing in the performance of work, or where protection is not provided to prevent splashings or drippings sufficient to saturate his clothing, and includes wet material or wet ground in which it is impracticable for the worker wearing ordinary boots to work without getting wet feet.

Part II.—Application.

2.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to all workers employed by the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage in the construction and maintenance of water supply, sewerage, and drainage works under the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage Act, 1909.

3.—Area.

This Award shall have effect in the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage Area as defined under the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage Act, 1909.

4.—Contract of Service.

The following shall continue to be observed:—

- (1) One (1) hour's notice of termination of contract shall suffice on either side, notwithstanding that, for the sake of convenience, wages are fixed on a weekly basis under this Award.
- (2) Subject to subclause (1) of this clause it is declared that, although the rates of pay are fixed on a weekly basis, if, during any portion of the working hours of any week, no work is available or performed, the Minister shall be liable only to pay the worker for the time actually worked at the rate of pay as above described (per week of forty-four (44) hours) apportioned to the time actually worked during the week.

5.—Term.

The currency of this Award shall be for three (3) years from the 1st day of January, 1939: Provided that at any time after the expiration of twelve (12) calendar months from that date, the Court may alter or amend same on the application of any party or person affected by its provisions.

6.—Preference to Unionists.

Preference of employment in respect of the classes of workers covered by this Award shall be given to financial members of the Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage, and Drainage Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, but any worker or applicant for employment who is a member of another recognised industrial Union, and who produces proof of such membership, shall be entitled to equal preference: Provided that such worker or applicant, unless a member of a craft Union not covered by this Award shall, within fourteen (14) days of the expiry of his current ticket with the other Union, make and complete an application for membership with the Union applicant for this Award: And provided further, that any worker approved for work by the Employment Department shall be given a period of fourteen (14) days in which to make and complete an application for membership with the Union.

7.—Wages.

- (1) The minimum rates of wages payable to workers under this Award shall be as set out in the Schedule.
- (2) Wages are set out for convenience' sake at weekly rates, and, where it is necessary to adjust wages on an hourly basis, adjustment shall be made to the nearest penny.
- (3) Casual workers, with the exception of casual watchmen (see clause 11(6)(a)) shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates otherwise payable under this Award.
- (4) When a worker is discharged before the usual pay day, he shall be paid his wages when he leaves work, or his wages shall be forwarded to his address the next day by registered post at the employer's expense.

Part III.

8.—Special Rates and Provisions.

Other Monetary Allowances.

- (1) Higher duties:—Any worker carrying out work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate for two (2) hours in any shift shall be paid at such higher minimum rate for such work for the whole of that shift. If he be employed for less than two (2) hours at work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate, he shall be paid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.
- (2) Leading hand tradesman:—Any tradesman placed in charge of three (3) or more tradesmen shall be classed as a leading hand tradesman, and be paid two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per day above the tradesman rate.

(3) Leading hand:—When less than four (4) men are working together away from the foreman or ganger, and instructions for them are given to one (1) of them, such worker shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day as a leading hand in addition to the rate prescribed for the work being performed by such worker.

(4) Concretors Packing Around Reinforcements in certain Cases:—Where, in the opinion of the Engineer, a concreter packing around reinforcements is called upon to exercise greater skill than ordinarily entailed in such work, the concreter shall receive sixpence (6d.) per day above his normal rate. In case of dispute, as to whether the concreter is entitled to the allowance under this subclause, the same may be determined by a Board of Reference.

(5) Labourers doing Lining or Marking-out:—Labourers lining or marking-out shall be paid sixpence (6d.) per day above their ordinary rate: Provided that this shall not apply when the foreman or ganger takes part in the operation.

(6) License for Motor Lorry Drivers:—A worker definitely employed as a motor lorry driver shall pay his own license fee, except where the driving of the truck is incidental to other duties, in which case the Minister shall pay the license fee.

(7) Trailer Allowance—Motor Lorry Drivers:—Motor lorry drivers, while driving a truck with trailer attached, shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day.

(8) Attending Horses:—Workers attending to and feeding horses, in addition to their other work, shall be paid an allowance of six shillings (6s.) per week for one (1) horse, and three shillings (3s.) per week for each additional horse up to and including four (4) horses.

(9) Platelayers (light Tram Tracks):—Workers, when employed on this class of work (irrespective of the weight of the rail) shall be entitled to be paid one shilling (1s.) per day over the basic wage.

(10) Watchmen Controlling Traffic:—Watchmen, or other workers, who regulate and control vehicular traffic in busy thoroughfares, shall receive an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per shift above their usual rate.

(11) Height Money (Canning Dam):—Workers at Canning Dam attending to the Insley Chuting System at a height of fifty (50) feet or more above the ground or concrete surface directly beneath them, shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day.

(12) Night Shift (Canning Dam):—Workers employed on night shift (from 5 p.m. to 7.30 a.m.) without rotation at Canning Dam, in dismantling the receptacles known as "cement boxes," or in preparing fresh boxes, to receive the concrete mixture, shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per shift above the basic wage.

(13) Offensive Allowance:—

(a) An allowance of three shillings (3s.) per day shall be paid to all workers, other than treatment works attendants, who come in contact with the filth during the operation of cleaning out septic tanks, sand pits, ripple chambers, suction chambers of sewerage pumping stations, and in the deragging of sewerage pumps.

(b) Workers other than sewerage maintenance men employed on offensive work in connection with old sewers, or excavating in ground where fumes arise from decomposed material, shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter during ordinary working hours.

(c) When working in excavation trenches, an allowance up to one shilling (1s.) per day shall be granted to workers working in water from which, in the opinion of the Engineer, obnoxious fumes or odours arise.

(14) Wet places:—Any worker working in "wet places" shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day, or part of a day: Provided that—

- (a) this allowance shall not be payable to treatment works attendants;
- (b) this allowance shall not be payable to workers working on natural surfaces made wet by rain;
- (c) where water-tight boots are provided by the Minister, no claim shall be allowed under this provision for wet feet;
- (d) where a worker attending a burst is compelled to work in water to the thighs, he shall receive the allowance, notwithstanding the previous subparagraph (c) of this proviso.

(15) Workers on Staging, etc.—Wet Pay:—Workers on staging when shovelling wet material shall be paid sixpence (6d.) per day, if and when the bottom men are being paid one shilling (1s.) per day for wet work. Such workers shall not be entitled to any allowance under subclause (14) of this clause.

(16) Dismantling Timbers in Wet Ground:—Workers engaged in dismantling timber sets in wet ground below a depth of six (6) feet from the natural surface shall receive an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day above the basic wage.

(17) Handling Cement and Lime:—

(a) All workers (other than treatment works attendants, concretors, or other workers receiving a margin for work which involves the use or handling of lime or cement) who are engaged—

- (i) tipping dry cement or lime into trucks, or handling cement or lime in machine mixing, shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day allowance;
- (ii) handling dry cement or lime in bags shall be paid an allowance of sixpence (6d.) per day;
- (iii) opening and emptying dry cement or lime on mixing board shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day, which shall include the allowance of sixpence (6d.) per day referred to above;
- (iv) handling ten (10) or more bags of cement or lime in the day, solely within the confines of a building, shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day, which shall include the allowance of sixpence (6d.) referred to in subparagraph (ii).

(b) Olive oil shall be provided for the use of concrete and cement workers.

(18) Concrete Drippings, etc.:—Where, in the opinion of the Engineer, any worker is unduly exposed to concrete drippings, such worker shall receive an allowance of sixpence (6d.) per day: Provided this allowance shall not apply to concretors in the boxes and men handling plums within the boxes at Canning Dam.

(19) Concrete Workers (Canning Dam) Receiving Concrete from Chute in Exposed Positions, etc.:—Concrete workers, engaged in receiving concrete from a chute in exposed positions in the boxes at Canning Dam, where they are subject to concrete drippings and splashing, shall receive one shilling (1s.) per day in addition to the ordinary wage.

(20) Tarring:—Workers engaged on tarring, except when employed tarring pipes under subclause (21) of this clause, shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day in addition to the ordinary wage.

(21) Tarring, Scraping or Brushing Pipes:—

(a) Workers employed on one or more of the operations of tarring, scraping, brushing, or cleaning cast-iron or steel pipes, other than pipes laid in position and connected shall—

- (i) if required to work wholly within the pipe be paid an allowance of two shillings (2s.) per day;
- (ii) if actually employed operating a mechanical rammer be paid an allowance of two shillings (2s.) per day;
- (iii) subject to paragraph (i), when operating by hand on the inside of pipes be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day.

(b) Workers engaged in tarring, scraping, brushing or cleaning the outside of cast-iron or steel pipes shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day.

(c) A worker actually working inside a water main (i.e., a main laid, connected and used as such) shall be paid the following margin:—

(22) Deep Shovelling:—Shovellers working on stages in trenches, shall, from the time the timber is stood, receive sixpence (6d.) per day allowance. This allowance shall also apply to shovellers in stone trenches when working more than six (6) feet from the surface.

(23) Shovelling Wet and Sticky Clay, etc.:—Workers employed shovelling clay which is wet and sticky, but does not come within the definition of "wet ground"

as contained in the Award, shall be paid eightpence (8d.) per day allowance.

(24) Dollying on Scaffolding:—Workers engaged using a dolly on scaffolding shall be paid sixpence (6d.) per day above their usual rate.

(25) Fares:—When instructed to travel on duty, workers shall be provided with necessary fares, except when the Minister provides the means of conveyance, or makes a bicycle allowance to the worker.

(26) Travelling Time:—

(a) (i) Subject to sub-paragraph (iii), when the work necessitates that the workers shall live in camp, and the camp site selected by the officer in charge is more than a quarter of a mile from the job, workers shall be paid full pay for the time taken in walking from camp to work one way only: Provided that when the distance exceeds two (2) miles a similar allowance shall be made for the distance in excess of two (2) miles for the return to camp.

(ii) A time limit shall be allowed at the rate of twenty (20) minutes per mile necessarily walked, but, where portion of the workers employed on a particular job live in camp and another portion of the workers travel from their homes to the job, the starting time for all workers on the job shall be uniform.

(iii) This provision shall not apply to the camp site at Canning Dam which has been fixed by agreement with the Union.

(b) Workers engaged on construction or reconstruction work situated more than one (1) mile by the shortest possible route from the nearest railway station or public transport facility shall receive sixpence (6d.) per day in addition to their ordinary pay, plus sixpence (6d.) per day for every additional half ($\frac{1}{2}$) mile walked, unless travelling in the Minister's time.

(c) Maintenance men at Fremantle, brought out to clean the tank opposite the Fremantle Railway Station, shall be allowed walking time to their homes, if the work is not completed in time to enable them to get home by train or tram.

(d) Where the Minister provides transport to the nearest railway station, or transport facility, workers (except maintenance men) shall travel in their own time, and receive no allowance.

(27) Camp Allowance:—

(a) Subject to paragraph (b), workers employed on construction or reconstruction work outside a radius of twelve (12) miles from the General Post Office, who are living in camps on the job, where the nature or location of the job necessitates their so doing, shall receive an allowance of five shillings and threepence (5s. 3d.) per week.

(b) When satisfactory accommodation is made available by the Minister, such allowance shall not be payable to any worker however short his occupation of the camp, where the camp location is fixed for a period of six (6) months or longer. Should any dispute or difference arise between the parties under this clause, the same shall be referred to a Board of Reference appointed pursuant to section 87 of the Act.

(28) Away-from-Home Allowance:—When a worker is instructed to proceed on duty from the place where he is then, or is usually employed, to any place where he cannot return to his abode at night, he shall receive as expenses an amount of one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per item per day, or reasonable expenses. "Item" means breakfast, dinner, tea and bed.

(29) Under-rate Workers:—

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as from time to time may be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the Minister.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

(30) Junior Storeman:—Where two (2) seniors are employed as storemen in a store, one (1) junior may be employed.

(31) Pitching and Striking Camp:—In cases where the nature of the work necessitates the pitching of a temporary camp, and when such camp is shifted to suit the requirements of the work, then the Minister shall allow full pay for the actual time reasonably taken in striking and pitching camp and the erection of bunks. The Engineer shall decide as to what is a reasonable time for the striking and pitching, and payment shall be made accordingly. In the event of any dispute arising under this sub-clause, the same may be decided by the Board of Reference.

(32) Broken Time:—

(a) Any worker on construction not notified before leaving work that his services will not be required next day shall be paid for that day if he duly presents himself for work at the appointed time: Provided that if he cannot be employed on account of causes beyond the control of the management, he shall be notified of the reason, and shall be entitled to two (2) hours' pay.

(b) When workers commence work, and are forced to knock off without having worked for more than two (2) hours in any day, they shall be paid as if they had worked for two (2) hours on such day.

(c) The decision as to whether it is too wet to work shall rest with the officer in charge of the job.

Other Special Provisions.

(33) Rubber Boots and Oilskins:—

(a) An oilskin coat and a pair of rubber boots, at the rate of one coat and one pair of boots every two (2) years shall be supplied to treatment works attendants, sewerage maintenance workers, and service layers and their assistants.

(b) A separate issue shall be made to each worker, who shall acknowledge receipt in writing and be responsible for the safe-keeping and condition thereof, reasonable wear and tear excepted: when the worker leaves his employment, or when the worker's services are terminated, he shall return the issue in a condition consistent with his observance of this sub-clause.

(c) No worker shall lend the issue, or any part of the issue, made to him to another worker, or borrow the issue made to another worker. Any breach of this clause shall be deemed to be serious and wilful misconduct, and render the worker committing the breach liable to summary dismissal.

(d) No worker shall be called upon to wear boots formerly issued to another worker unless and until the same have been effectively sterilised and fumigated.

(34) Overalls:—Overalls shall be provided by the Minister, where and when considered necessary by the Engineer, for sewerage maintenance men called upon to go into dirty manholes, tanks, pumping chambers or similar places.

(35) Handling Rock (Plums):—Where workers are engaged in the handling of rock (plums) and where such handling of rock goes with the ground or floor of rock or concrete, suitable leather or rubber protectors for the hands shall be supplied.

(36) Concrete Workers and Chutemen (Canning Dam)—Rubber Gloves:—At Canning Dam concrete workers and chutemen shall be provided with rubber gloves.

(37) Concrete Machine Mixer Men—Gloves:—Concrete machine mixer men shall be provided with suitable gloves.

(38) Crash Helmets:—Workers engaged in positions exposed to falling material shall be supplied with crash helmets.

(39) Respirators—Stone Crushing:—Men employed on stone crushing plant shall be supplied with respirators.

(40) Firewood at Camps:—Where workers are obliged to camp or reside on the job, the Minister shall provide a reasonable supply of firewood for the domestic requirements of such workers on the job, but the firewood shall be cut and stacked by the workers when it is obtainable within a radius of one mile from the camp.

(41) Water at Camps:—Water shall be supplied at camp location when considered necessary by the Engineer for cooking purposes, and for the washing of dishes and hands.

(42) Water Bags:—Water bags shall be provided by the Minister on each job, the number and type to be decided by the Engineer in each case.

(43) Electric Torches:—

(a) Workers working inside and cleaning out pipe mains shall be provided with electric torches for lighting purposes during and in connection with cleaning operations.

(b) Every worker shall sign for the torch issued to him and be responsible for its safe custody and return at the end of the shift.

(44) First-Aid Kits:—First-aid kits shall be kept at yard or depot, and when considered necessary by the Engineer on the job. The list of supplies to be modified according to circumstances at the discretion of the Engineer:—

- 1 set splints for treatment of fractured arm, forearm, legs and thigh;
- 6 triangle bandages;
- 6 1-inch roller bandages;
- 6 2-inch roller bandages;
- 6 2½-inch roller bandages;
- 6 3-inch roller bandages;
- 4 packets absorbent lint (2oz. packets);
- 2 4oz. packets cotton wool;
- 4 oz. sal volatile;
- 4 oz. picric acid;
- 4 oz. iodine;
- 4 oz. flavine;
- 1 tin boracic acid;
- 1 tourniquet;
- 1 spool 1-inch adhesive plaster;
- 1 pair surgical scissors;
- 1 small enamel basin;
- 1 packet safety pins and stretchers appropriate to the work.

Any dispute under this subclause may be decided by the Board of Reference.

(45) Accident Transportation:—In cases of accidents or sickness where the worker is camped on the job with his family, or lives in accommodation provided by the Minister, the Minister shall convey free of charge to the nearest hospital town, such injured or sick worker, or any member of his family.

(46) Men Working on Large Bursts—Meal Time:—Workers working on large bursts shall be permitted to partake of a meal every four (4) hours in their own time, and the Minister will provide hot soup between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m.

(47) Alteration of Time Plods:—Once a worker has filled in his time plod, no erasure shall be permitted. Alterations will be permitted provided the original entry is not rendered illegible, and the reason is explained to the worker.

(48) Time occupied in reporting from Job to Job:—The time occupied by workers when instructed to report from one job to another during ordinary working hours shall be paid for at ordinary rates.

Part IV.

Hours; Shift Work; Overtime; Leave.

9.—Hours.

(1) Except where otherwise provided, the week's work shall consist of forty-four (44) hours, and the normal hours of labour shall be eight (8) per day, from Monday to Friday inclusive, and four (4) on Saturday.

(2) The week's work may by agreement between the Minister and the Union be worked in five (5) days, Monday to Friday inclusive, in which event the normal hours of labour shall be eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes on each working day.

(3) The following special provisions shall apply:—

(a) For stablemen a week's work shall consist of seven (7) shifts of eight (8) hours when required by the Engineer. (See clause 12 for leave provisions.)

(b) Caretakers provided with residence rent free shall be on duty as required. (See clause 13 for leave provisions.)

(c) Caretakers at Loftus street and Fremantle yards shall be on duty as required. (See clause 12 for leave provisions.)

(d) For watchmen a week's work shall consist of seven (7) shifts in a week's work of fifty-six (56) hours. (See clause 12 for leave provisions.)

- (e) Septic tank attendants and treatment works attendants shall work thirteen (13) shifts of seven (7) hours twenty (20) minutes each in a fortnight. The shift shall include thirty (30) minutes for crib, and the fortnight's shifts shall include one shift on alternate Sundays.
- (f) Sewerage pumping station attendants shall work twelve (12) shifts of eight (8) hours per fortnight, Monday to Saturday inclusive, and shall work one shift on a rotation system continuous process on Sunday. In arranging shifts for these workers, the Minister shall endeavour to so adjust the rotation that each worker is called on for Sunday work at as long intervals as are practicable.
- (g) The working hours of workers working continuously underground in tunnels or shafts shall include crib time not exceeding thirty (30) minutes in each shift.
- (h) On construction jobs, where shift work is worked in two (2) shifts, the first shift shall work eight (8) hours exclusive of crib time, but the second shift shall work eight (8) hours inclusive of a period not exceeding thirty (30) minutes for crib.
- (4) Starting and Finishing Places:—Workers shall start and finish their day's work at the depot or on the job as required. For maintenance workers "depot" shall mean the Department's yards or "stores."

10.—Shift Work.

- (1) The work may be done in shifts, but work shall not be recognised as shift work, but shall be regarded as overtime, unless at least five (5) consecutive afternoon or night shifts are worked.
- (2) The sequence of shifts shall not be deemed to be broken by a holiday.
- (3) Workers shall be permitted to rotate shifts.
- (4) The starting and stopping times of shifts may be fixed to suit the efficient working of the particular job: Provided transport facilities are available or arranged.
- (5) No alteration shall be made in the starting and stopping times, until at least one rotation cycle has been worked.

11.—Overtime.

- (1) Except where otherwise specified, all work performed by any worker outside the usual working hours of such worker shall be regarded as overtime, and the rates payable for overtime shall be as follows:—
- (a) where the worker commences the overtime within the period of one and a half (1½) hours prior to his usual starting time; time and one half for the time worked in such one and a half (1½) hour period;
- (b) where the worker works overtime in any portion of the period commencing five (5) hours or more after his usual stopping time, but commences the overtime prior to one and a half (1½) hours before his usual starting time; double time for all time worked up to the usual starting time;
- (c) subject to the preceding paragraphs, time and one half for the first four (4) hours, and double time thereafter.
- (2) A worker called back after completing a day's work, or called out on a Sunday (subject to the exceptions specified in subclauses (5) and (6)), shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at overtime rates, but if he is called out more than once within any period of two (2) hours of a call, he shall not be entitled to any further payment for time worked within the period of two (2) hours from when he commenced work in response to his first call.

(3) A caretaker called back to work on his Sunday off shall be paid double time for the time he works.

(4) Except as hereinafter provided, all work performed during the recognised meal time shall be paid at time and a half, and such rate shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.

The exceptions before referred to are as follow:—

- (a) powder monkeys and their assistants;

- (b) workers engaged not more than fifteen (15) minutes of the meal time on some process in course (e.g., concreting).
- (c) workers engaged on emergency repairs to plant, etc., or other essential emergency work to enable the job to restart at the expiration of the lunch hour;
- (d) shift workers;
- (e) horsedriviers performing duties covered by their attendance allowance;
- (f) pump attendants;
- (g) a worker who is engaged continuously for more than one week between the hours of 12 noon and 1 p.m.: Provided the lunch time is taken between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. at the same regular hour each day.

(5) Regular Saturday afternoon and Sunday work on continuous process shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half: Provided that this subclause shall not apply to septic tank attendants and to treatment works attendants in respect of whom it is declared that the margins prescribed by this Award (see Item No. 27 of the Schedule) include an allowance for work done on continuous process.

(6) Subject to the preceding provisions, for all work done on a Sunday, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and New Year's Day, double time rates shall be paid: Provided that this subclause shall not apply to—

- (a) casual watchmen on Saturdays and on Sundays, when they shall receive ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the ordinary watchman's rate, and on Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, and Labour Day, twenty-five per cent. (25%) in addition to the ordinary watchman's rate;
- (b) septic tank attendants, treatment works attendants, stablemen, caretakers, and watchmen who shall take such days as ordinary shift days or as otherwise specifically provided in this Award.

(7) In the case of bursts in water mains, workers called out during working hours, who continue working after the usual stopping time, and workers called out more than five (5) hours after their usual stopping time, shall be paid overtime at the prescribed rates until they reach the yard or depot and sign off.

(8) In the case of a worker who works a five (5)-day week, Monday to Friday inclusive, under an agreement made pursuant to subclause (2) of clause 9, and who works overtime on a Saturday, for the first four (4) hours of overtime, time and a half rate, and thereafter double time rate, shall be paid, but if the worker works in any period after 5 o'clock p.m. on Saturday, he shall be paid double time rate for all time worked after that hour.

12.—Annual Leave Rights.

(1) Subject to subclauses (2) and (6), two weeks' annual leave shall be granted to each worker, but Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, and Labour Day shall be taken as they come and form portion of the annual leave.

(2) Septic tank attendants, treatment works attendants, sewerage pumping station attendants, stablemen, caretakers and watchmen, after twelve (12) calendar months' continuous service, shall be granted fourteen (14) working days' holiday with pay each year.

(3) Workers who have not served the full calendar year shall be entitled to the same proportion of two (2) weeks' holiday leave as their period of service bears to one (1) calendar year.

(4) If a worker entitled to a holiday on any of the above six (6) specified holidays, works on any of these days, he shall be granted another holiday in lieu without prejudice to his right to penalty rates for the holiday on which he works.

(5) Casual workers are not entitled to holiday rights.

(6) Holiday pay shall be at the rate the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.

13.—Special Leave for Certain Workers.

(1) Caretakers who are provided with residence rent free, and who are obliged to be on duty as required shall be allowed one (1) full Sunday off a fortnight,

(2) Caretakers at Loftus street, and Fremantle, who under this Award are obliged to be on duty as required, shall be granted two (2) days' special leave on pay at the completion of each calendar month's service. Such leave shall not be allowed to accumulate.

(3) Workers relieving the caretakers at Loftus street and Fremantle on any of the six (6) specified holidays shall be granted a day in lieu of any such holiday if qualified by service to take such holiday on pay.

(4) Watchmen shall be granted two (2) days' special leave with pay at the completion of each calendar month of service. Such leave shall not be allowed to accumulate.

14.—Sick Leave.

(1) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one half (½) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default, or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to the Minister or his agents of sickness, but the Minister shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(2) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

(3) In the event of a national insurance scheme coming into operation, liberty is reserved to the Minister to apply for a review of the provisions of this clause.

Part V—General.

15.—Inspection of Wages Sheets.

The wages sheets of the Minister will be open for inspection at Head Office by the secretary of the Union upon reasonable notice being given of his desire to inspect same.

16.—Change and Mess Room.

(1) When a change room is reasonably required for the workers, it shall be provided on the job at its commencement.

(2) When in the opinion of the Engineer, a mess room is necessary for the convenience of the workers, it shall be provided.

17.—Living Quarters.

Reasonable living quarters shall be provided for the caretakers at Loftus street yard, and at Fremantle yard, within six (6) calendar months from the date of this Award. The Union may apply to the Court at any time after the expiration of six (6) calendar months from the date of this Award for further directions in regard to the carrying-out of this clause, if the Union considers it necessary to do so.

18.—Union Stewards.

Union stewards appointed by the Union shall be recognised by the Engineer of the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage Department, or his deputy; the Union shall notify in writing the name of steward and any subsequent alteration. The Union representative shall not be paid for any time occupied on Union business during working hours.

19.—Board of Reference.

(1) A Board of Reference is hereby appointed for the purposes of this Award.

(2) Such Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) members, one nominated by the Minister, and one nominated by the Union.

(3) The chairman shall be some other person agreed upon by the parties, but if the parties are unable to agree upon an appointment, the parties hereby agree to accept as chairman any person nominated by the Court of Arbitration.

(4) On the chairman and members being appointed, the Board shall be deemed to be constituted.

(5) There are assigned to the Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of:—

- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
- (b) deciding any dispute which under the terms of the Award may be decided by the Board of Reference;
- (c) classifying and fixing wages and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award, or in any other Award binding on the Minister;
- (d) deciding any other matter that the Minister may refer to such Board from time to time.

(6) The Union agrees that there shall be no interruption in the work of the Minister over any matter within the jurisdiction of the Court or the Board.

(7) The decisions of the Board shall be recorded in writing, and such decisions shall be conclusive. A signed copy of the decisions shall be forwarded to each of the parties hereto.

(8) The Board shall sit at such times and places as the chairman shall direct.

(9) The decision of the Board shall be the decision of the majority.

(10) With the consent of the chairman either party may at any time vary its nomination of representative member.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 26A of 1937.

Between Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage, and Drainage Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and Hon. Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage, Respondent.

THE Industrial Board for the Goldfields Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage industry, in pursuance of the powers and duties conferred upon it by section 107 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, and in pursuance of a remission to it by the Court of Arbitration, doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the industrial dispute between the abovenamed parties:—

AWARD.

Part I.—Preliminary.

1.—Definitions.

(1) "Bottom man" means a worker in the bottom of a trench or manhole excavation, other than a shaft excavation, toeing laths and knocking down sets.

(2) "Casual worker" means a worker for whom work over a period of six (6) consecutive working days, not counting holidays, is not provided.

(3) "Caulker" means a worker who caulks, or recaulks joints on all pipe lines.

(4) "District officer" means any person administering the affairs of the Minister in the section where a worker is working.

(5) "Engineer" means the officer occupying for the time being the position of Engineer, Goldfields Water Supply.

(6) "Ganger" means any worker placed in charge of a gang of four (4) or more other men.

(7) "Home station"—
(a) in the case of a fireman or greaser means the pumping station where he is usually employed;

(b) in the case of a caretaker means the reservoir or premises where he is usually employed;

(c) in the case of a worker employed in a store or depot or permanent workshop, means the store, or depot, or workshop, where he is usually employed;

(d) in the case of a leading maintenance man or a maintenance man, means the store, depot or yard ordinarily regarded as his base, or where there is no such store, depot, or yard, the place of residence of the worker.

(8) "Leading maintenance man" means a worker whose duties include service laying, meter reading, installing and removing meters, oiling meters, stopping leaks in mains or extensions, and keeping the time of, and directing not more than three (3) maintenance men, and includes any worker in charge of a section of any water main or extensions thereof.

(9) "Maintenance man" means any worker whose duties are to read meters; oil meters; effect repairs to water mains; to patrol and give attention to the preservation and maintenance of the main conduit, and all extensions reticulating therefrom.

(10) "Minister" means the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage, and Drainage.

(11) "Platelay light tram tracks" means a worker who performs the various operations of platelaying (irrespective of the weight of the rail), but shall not include a worker merely shifting sets of rails from one place to another.

(12) "Union" means the Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage, and Drainage Employees' Industrial Union of Workers.

(13) "Wet places" means places where in the performance of the work the splashing of water and mud saturates the worker's clothing, or places where protection is not provided to prevent splashing or drippings sufficient to saturate his clothing, and includes wet material or wet ground in which it is impracticable for the worker wearing ordinary boots to work without getting wet feet.

Part II.—Application.

2.—Scope and Area.

This Award shall apply to all workers throughout the State employed by the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage, except workers—

(a) whose wages and conditions are governed by the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Award (No. 26 of 1937).

(b) whose wages and conditions are governed by any other industrial Award or Agreement now in force.

3.—Contract of Service.

The following shall continue to be observed:—

- (a) One (1) hour's notice of termination of contract shall suffice on either side notwithstanding that, for the sake of convenience, wages are fixed on a weekly basis under this Award.
- (b) Subject to paragraph (a) of this clause, it is declared that, although the rates of pay are fixed on a weekly basis, if, during any portion of the working hours of any week, no work is available, or performed, the Minister shall be liable only to pay the worker for the time actually worked at the rate of pay as above described (per week of forty-four (44) hours) apportioned to the time actually worked during the week.

4.—Term.

The currency of this Award shall be for three (3) years from the 1st day of January, 1939: Provided that, at any time after the expiration of twelve (12) calendar months from that date, the Court may alter or amend same on the application of any party or person affected by its provisions.

5.—Preference to Unionists.

Preference of employment in respect of the classes of work covered by this Award shall be given to financial members of the Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage, and Drainage Employees' Union of Workers: Provided that any worker or applicant for employment who is a member of another recognised industrial Union, and who produces proof of such membership shall be entitled to equal preference, but such worker or applicant, unless a member of a craft Union not covered by this Award, shall, within fourteen (14) days of the expiry of his current ticket with the other Union, make and complete an application for membership with the Union applicant for this Award: And provided further, that any worker approved for work by the Employment Department shall be given a period of fourteen (14) days in which to make and complete an application for membership with the Union.

6.—Wages.

- (1) The minimum rates of wages payable to workers under this Award shall be as set out in the Schedule.
- (2) Wages are set out for convenience' sake at weekly rates, and where it is necessary to adjust wages on an hourly basis adjustment shall be made to the nearest penny.
- (3) Casual workers shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates otherwise payable under this Award.
- (4) When a worker is discharged before the usual pay day, he shall be paid his wages when he leaves work, or his wages shall be forwarded to his address the next day by registered post at the employer's expense.

Part III.—Special Rates and Provisions.

7.—Special Rates and Provisions.

Division 1.—Monetary Allowances in Addition to Wages.

- (1) Higher Duties:—Any worker carrying out work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate for two (2) hours in any shift shall be paid at such higher minimum rate for the whole of that shift. If he be employed for less than two (2) hours at work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate, he shall be paid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.
- (2) Leading Hand Tradesman:—Any tradesman placed in charge of three (3) or more tradesmen shall be classed as a leading hand tradesman, and be paid two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per day above the tradesman's rate.
- (3) Maintenance Men doing Caulking:—A maintenance man who caulks at odd times in the ordinary course of keeping joints tight shall not be entitled to caulker's rate.
- (4) Cleaning out Septic Tanks:—Workers engaged cleaning out septic tanks shall be paid double time rates.
- (5) Cleaning out Deaerating Plant:—Workers working inside the deaerating chamber at Mundaring Weir shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day extra.
- (6) Handling Cement or Lime:—
- (a) All workers (other than concretors, or other workers receiving a margin for work which involves the use or handling of lime or cement) who are engaged—
- (i) tipping dry cement or lime into trucks or handling cement or lime in machine mixing shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day allowance;

- (ii) handling dry cement or lime in bags shall be paid an allowance of sixpence (6d.) per day;
- (iii) opening and emptying dry cement or lime on mixing board shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day, which shall include the allowance of sixpence (6d.) per day referred to above;
- (iv) handling ten (10) or more bags of cement or lime in the day, solely within the confines of a building, shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day, which shall include the allowance of sixpence (6d.) referred to in subparagraph (ii).

(b) Olive oil shall be provided for the use of concrete and cement workers.

(7) Tar Work:—Workers engaged on tarring, except when employed tarring pipes under subclause (8) of this clause, shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day in addition to the ordinary wage.

(8) Tarring, etc., of Pipes:—

(a) Subject to the provisions of subclause (b), workers employed on one or more of the operations of tarring, seraping, brushing or cleaning cast-iron or steel pipes, shall be paid an allowance of—

- (i) one shilling (1s.) per day when operating by hand on the inside of pipes;
- (ii) two shillings (2s.) per day when required to work wholly within the pipe;
- (iii) one shilling (1s.) per day when employed on the outside surface of pipes.

(b) No allowance shall be made to maintenance men for tarring joints of mains on the outside, when such work is part of their duties.

(9) Cement Washing Pipes:—

(a) Workers cement washing the inside of thirty-inch (30") main pipes shall receive two shillings (2s.) per day above the labourer's rate.

(b) Workers cement washing the outside of pipes shall receive one shilling (1s.) per day above the labourer's rate.

(10) Lowering Pipes:—Any worker placed in charge of block and tackle where pipes in long lengths are being lowered shall receive one shilling (1s.) per day in addition to his usual rate.

(11) Old Pipes—30-inch Main:—A worker pulling out old pipes on the thirty-inch (30") main shall be paid sixpence (6d.) per day extra.

(12) Shovelling Wet and Sticky Clay:—Workers employed shovelling clay which is wet and sticky, but does not come within the definition of "wet ground" as contained in the Award, shall be paid an allowance of eightpence (8d.) per day.

(13) Shovellers on Stages:—Shovellers working on stages in trenches shall, from the time timber is stood, receive sixpence (6d.) per day above the basic wage. This allowance shall also apply to shovellers in trenches when working more than six (6) feet from the surface without stages.

(14) Firemen and Greasers—Dirt Allowance:—

(a) When brushing out and seraping boiler drums, when scraping soot off outside of diagonal tubes, when removing soot from combustion chambers and flues shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day extra.

(b) When working in confined spaces with workers who under the Engineers' Award are entitled to receive dirt money shall also receive dirt money.

(c) When cleaning down pots and between engine frames from underneath shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day extra.

(d) None of these allowances shall be cumulative in any one (1) day.

(15) Firemen and Greasers—Extra Payment for Work done after mid-day on Saturday in certain cases:—A fireman or greaser who works after mid-day on Saturday in order to make up his full complement of forty-four (44) hours for the week's work shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for all time worked after mid-day on that day in making up his full forty-four (44) hours for the week.

(16) Wet Places:—Any worker working in water and/or "wet places" shall be paid an allowance of one shilling (1s.) per day, or part of a day, unless his classification expressly includes allowance for wet pay: Provided that—

- (a) the allowance shall not apply in the case of workers working on natural surfaces made wet by rain;

(b) when water-tight boots are provided by the Minister, no allowance shall be made for wet feet.

(17) Overhead Welding in Wet Places:—Oxywelders and electric welders engaged on overhead welding in wet places shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day extra.

(18) License for Motor Drivers:—The Minister shall pay the motor driver's license fee for any worker whose principal duties are other than motor driving, and who is occasionally required to drive a motor: Provided such person does not hold such a license for his private use.

(19) Attending Horses:—Workers attending to and feeding horses in addition to their other work shall be paid an allowance of six shillings (6s.) per week for one (1) horse and three shillings (3s.) per week for each additional horse up to and including four (4) horses.

(20) Stacking Firewood:—Firewood shall be stacked as close to the boilers as the Machinery Superintendent considers practicable.

(21) Delivery of Stores:—On construction works only, the Minister shall cart and deliver to camp the workers' stores as required from the nearest accessible town or siding as the Minister may decide.

(22) First-Aid Kits:—First-aid kits shall be kept at pumping stations, yards or depots, and when considered necessary by the Engineer on each job. List specified hereunder may be modified at the discretion of the Engineer:—

- 1 set splints for treatment of fractured arm, forearm, leg, or thigh;
- 6 triangle bandages;
- 6 1-inch roller bandages;
- 6 2-inch roller bandages;
- 6 2½-inch roller bandages;
- 6 3-inch roller bandages;
- ¼ oz. sal volatile;
- 4 packets absorbent lint (2 oz. packets);
- 2 4 oz. packets cotton wool;
- 4 oz. picric acid;
- 4 oz. iodine;
- 4 oz. flavine;
- 1 tin boracic acid;
- 1 tourniquet;
- 1 pair surgical scissors;
- 1 spool 1-inch adhesive plaster;
- 1 small enamel basin;
- 1 packet safety pins.

Any dispute under this clause may be decided by the Board of Reference.

(23) Accident Transportation:—Where a worker camped on the job in a construction camp, or any member of his family living with him in the camp, becomes sick or sustains an accident, the Minister shall convey such sick or injured person, free of charge, from the camp to the nearest hospital town.

(24) Pitching and Striking Camp:—In cases where the nature of the work necessitates the pitching of a temporary camp, and when such camp is shifted to suit the requirements of the work, the Minister shall allow full pay for the actual time reasonably taken in striking and pitching camp, and the erection of bunks. The officer in charge shall decide as to what is a reasonable time for the striking and pitching and the erection of bunks, and payment shall be made accordingly. Any dispute under this subclause may be decided by the Board of Reference.

(25) Broken Time:—

(a) Should any worker on construction work not be notified before leaving work that his services will not be required next day, he shall be paid for that day if he duly presents himself for work at the appointed time: Provided that, if he cannot be employed on account of causes beyond the control of the management, he shall be notified of the reason and shall be entitled to two (2) hours' pay.

(b) When workers commence work, and are forced to knock off without having worked for more than two (2) hours in any day, they shall be paid as if they had worked for two (2) hours on such day.

(c) The decision as to whether it is too wet to work shall rest with the officer in charge of the job.

Division 2—Other Special Provisions.

(26) Rubber Boots and Oilskins:—

(a) An oilskin coat and a pair of rubber boots at

the rate of one coat and one pair of boots every two (2) years shall be supplied to maintenance men.

(b) A separate issue shall be made to each worker, who shall acknowledge receipt in writing, and be responsible for the safe-keeping and condition thereof, reasonable wear and tear excepted; when the worker leaves his employment, or when the worker's services are terminated, he shall return the issue in a condition consistent with his observance of this subclause.

(c) No worker shall lend the issue, or any part of the issue made to him to another worker, or borrow the issue made to another worker. Any breach of this clause shall be deemed to be serious and wilful misconduct, and any worker committing a breach shall be liable to summary dismissal.

(d) No worker shall be called upon to wear boots formerly issued to another worker unless and until the same have been effectively sterilised or fumigated.

(27) Cleaning Tanks:—Any worker working in water while cleaning out tanks shall be provided with rubber boots.

(28) Water at Camp:—The Minister shall provide potable water for workers at each construction camp site, and for authorised boarding houses. Boiling water shall also be provided by the Minister for the workers' mid-day meal.

(29) Accommodation:—

(a) Where workers in the performance of their work have to camp out, the Minister shall supply sufficient tent accommodation on each job to properly house the men employed.

Rents for tents shall be as under:—

(b) On construction works where ten (10) or more workers are employed outside cities or towns, the Minister shall, on the application of not less than ten (10) workers, supply free of charge sufficient tarpaulins, trestles, twelve-inch (12in.) boards for tables, stools or forms, and cooking and dining utensils for a ranch.

(c) Every such ranch shall have a Committee of Management appointed by the workers, whose names shall be notified from time to time to the officer in charge of the particular work, and such committee shall be personally responsible for the loss or damage to any of the articles supplied to the ranch by the Minister, fair wear and tear excepted, and the committee shall return them.

(d) The erection of ranches shall be done in the Minister's time.

(e) Where no boarding house or ranch is provided, the Minister shall supply, if required, one sheet of eight (8) foot galvanised iron for the use of each worker. An efficient sanitary service shall be instituted and maintained by the Minister on each job.

(30) Water Bags:—Water bags shall be provided by the Minister on each job, the number and type to be decided by the Engineer in each case.

(31) Soft Soap:—Soft soap shall be supplied to pumping station workers, also yards and workshops.

(32) Sweat Rags:—An adequate supply of sweat rags or material suitable for use as sweat rags shall be supplied free to pumping station workers.

(33) Hot Coffee:—Where practicable workers working overtime on bursts in mains shall be supplied with hot coffee at least once every four (4) hours.

(34) Fares and Sustainance Allowance:—

(a) The Minister shall pay railway and other transport fares, or shall provide transport free of charge from the place of engagement to the place of work, and on completion of the job return fares or transport to place of engagement shall also be paid or be provided by the Minister: Provided that in the event of any worker leaving the work of his own accord, or being dismissed on account of misconduct, or unsatisfactory work, within six (6) weeks of time of engagement, the amount of the fare to the job may be deducted from any amounts due to such worker at the time of dismissal, and he shall forfeit privileges of free return to place of engagement.

(b) Notwithstanding the above, the transport conditions now operating in regard to part-time sustenance workers shall continue in regard to such workers, whilst the present working conditions of such workers are in force.

(35) Travelling Time:—When the work necessitates that the workers shall live in camp, and in cases where the site for the camp selected by the officer in charge is more than a quarter of a mile from the job, then the Minister shall allow workers full pay for the time taken in walking from camp to work, one way only: Provided that when the distance exceeds two (2) miles a similar allowance shall be made for the distance in excess of two (2) miles for the return to camp, and a time limit shall be allowed at the rate of twenty (20) minutes per mile necessarily walked, but where portion of the workers employed on a particular job live in camp and another portion of the workers travel from their homes to the job, the starting time for all workers on the job shall be uniform.

Where the Minister provides transport, workers shall travel in their own time and receive no allowance.

(36) Camp Allowance:—When the nature of the work necessitates men living on the job or the location of the work makes it inconvenient for them to return to their homes every night, camp allowance of five shillings and threepence (5s. 3d.) per week shall be payable to workers employed on construction and reconstruction work, except along the pipe track between Ghooli and Ubini, where the camp allowance shall be three shillings (3s.).

(37) Travelling and Away-from-Home Allowance:—

(a) The time necessarily occupied by all workers in travelling on duty (including waiting time) shall be paid as from the time of the departure of the train to the arrival of the train at destination at the ordinary rate of wages attached to the departure station, but not to exceed eight (8) hours per day. Overtime rates shall not apply.

(b) In addition the scale of travelling allowance shall be—Coastal District and Goldfields, two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per item for meals necessarily purchased on a train, and if the charge exceeds two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) the actual cost of the meal shall be paid by the Minister. "Item" shall mean the expenses of breakfast, dinner, tea and bed, necessarily incurred whilst travelling from headquarters on duty.

(c) Away-from-Home Allowance:—Firemen and greasers, when relieving away from home station, shall be paid five shillings (5s.) per day at stations Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, and six shillings (6s.) per day at other stations.

(d) Workers other than Firemen and Greasers:—For each night necessarily absent from home station on duty, the following allowance shall be paid—reasonable out-of-pocket expenses for meal and bed, with a minimum of one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per item.

(e) Clause 20 and the preceding subparagraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this subclause (37) shall not apply—

(i) to workers who are mainly employed in travelling about and engaged upon the work of maintaining and constructing water supplies on stock routes, or elsewhere away from the Goldfields Water Scheme, except when travelling by rail and without their usual equipment;

(ii) to workers on construction or reconstruction.

(38) District Allowances:—

(a) For the purpose of this clause a map and a description of the several areas marked 1, 2 and 3 are set out in the Second Schedule.

(b) District allowances shall be payable as under:—

(i) For that portion of the State situated within the area marked No. 1 and delineated on the map in the Second Schedule hereto, the sum of five shillings and threepence (5s. 3d.) per week, except within a radius of five (5) miles of the towns of Southern Cross, Coolgardie, Kalgoorlie and Boulder, where the allowances will be two shillings and fourpence (2s. 4d.) per week, and except along the main conduit between Ghooli and Ubini where the allowance will be nine shillings (9s.), other than at pumping stations.

(ii) For that portion of the State situated within the area marked No. 2 and delineated on the map in the Second Schedule hereto, the sum of seven shillings (7s.) per week.

(iii) For that portion of the State situated within the area marked No. 3 and delineated on the map in the Second Schedule hereto, the sum of ten shillings and sixpence (10s. 6d.) per week.

(39) Under-rate Workers:—

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as from time to time may be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the Minister.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

Part IV.—Hours, Shift Work, Overtime, Leave.

S.—Hours.

(1) Except where otherwise provided, the week's work shall consist of forty-four (44) hours, and the normal hours of labour shall be eight (8) each day, from Monday to Friday inclusive, and four (4) on Saturday.

(2) The week's work may, by agreement between the Minister and the Union, be worked in five (5) days, Monday to Friday inclusive, in which event the normal hours of labour shall be eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes on each working day.

(3) The following special provisions shall apply to firemen and greasers:—

(a) the normal week's work shall be forty-four (44) hours;

(b) the total number of shifts shall be six (6) worked from Monday to Friday inclusive, and four (4) hours on Saturday;

(c) the average shift for the week shall not exceed eight (8) hours for any day; payment shall be made for the full period of forty-four (44) hours, notwithstanding that the fireman or greaser may not have been required to work the full forty-four (44) hours of the week's work, if, in fact, he was available for work;

(d) all shifts shall be worked continuously, but in the following cases the hours need not be continuous—

(i) breakdown of machinery;

(ii) interruption in connection with the thirty-inch (30in.) main;

(iii) valve operations referred to in paragraph (3) (d) of clause 10;

(iv) mutual arrangement between the parties to suit the requirements of any particular station.

(See clause 7, subclause (15), for special rates for work on Saturday after mid-day in making up the full week's work.)

(4) Caretakers at West Northam and Mt. Charlotte and at any other place where the Minister may from time to time employ workers in any similar capacity shall be on duty as required.

9.—Shift Work.

(1) The work may be done in shifts.

(2) Workers shall be permitted to rotate shifts.

10.—Overtime.

(1) Except where otherwise specified, all work performed by a worker outside his usual working hours shall be regarded as overtime.

(2) With the exception of firemen and greasers, whose rates are defined in subclause (4), and with the exception of the caretakers at West Northam and Mt. Charlotte, or any other caretaker employed elsewhere in a similar capacity from time to time, overtime rates shall be as follow:—

(a) Where the worker commences the overtime within the period of one and a half (1½) hours prior to his usual starting time, time and one half for the time worked in such one and a half (1½) hour period.

(b) Where the worker works overtime in any period commencing five (5) hours or more after his usual stopping time, but commences the overtime prior to one and a half (1½) hours before his usual starting time, double time for all time worked up to his usual starting time.

(c) Subject to the preceding paragraphs, time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(3) With the exception of firemen and greasers, whose rights are defined in sub-clause (4), and with the exception of caretakers at West Northam and Mt. Charlotte, or any other caretakers employed elsewhere in a similar capacity from time to time, for all time worked on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day, double time rates shall be paid.

(4) The following special provisions shall apply in the case of firemen and greasers:—

(a) All time worked in excess of the normal number of working hours of each week shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours, and double time for the balance.

(b) All time worked on Sundays shall stand by itself, and be paid for at time and one half. All time worked on Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day shall be paid for at double time rates.

(c) Subject to the next paragraph (d), if a fireman has completed his continuous shift for the day and is called back for any purpose (other than a valve operation) he shall receive a minimum of two (2) hours' overtime for each call-out.

(d) If a fireman or greaser is required for valve operation not later than two (2) hours after his station is shut down, including a Sunday, the Engineer may arrange for one (1) hour of his shift for the day to be held over for the purpose without penalty, but if the period between the shutting down and the valve operation exceeds two (2) hours, the fireman or greaser shall work his full shift, but shall receive two shillings (2s.) for each call-out.

(5) Except as provided in this sub-clause, all work performed during the recognised meal time shall be paid at time and a half, and such rate shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal. The exceptions hereafter referred to are as follow:—

(a) powder monkeys and their assistants;

(b) workers engaged not more than fifteen (15) minutes of the lunch time on some process in course (e.g., concreting);

(c) workers engaged on emergency repairs to plant, etc., or other essential emergency work to enable the job to restart at the expiration of the lunch time.

(6) Workers working overtime in link-ins and bursts shall be allowed half an hour for a meal every four (4) hours at overtime rates.

(See clause 7, subclause (37): travelling in overtime.)

11.—Annual Leave Rights.

(1) With the exception of firemen and greasers and of the caretakers at West Northam and Mr. Charlotte Reservoirs or any other caretakers from time to time employed in a similar capacity, whose holiday rights are defined in subclauses (2) and (3) of this clause, all workers shall be entitled for each year of service to holiday leave on full pay aggregating two (2) weeks and two (2) days, being the equivalent of one hundred and four (104) working hours, based on a forty-four (44) hour week.

(2) Firemen and greasers shall be entitled to two (2) weeks and two (2) days' leave with pay each year, being the equivalent of one hundred and four (104) working hours based on a forty-four (44)-hour week. Where any such worker is permitted, as an act of grace, to have Christmas Day, Good Friday or Labour Day, as holidays with pay, those days shall not be deducted from the annual leave, but other public holidays shall be deducted. If the worker works on any of the three (3) holidays specially mentioned in this subclause he shall receive double time rates for the time worked, but shall not be entitled to another holiday in lieu.

(3) Caretakers at the West Northam and at Mt. Charlotte Reservoirs or any other caretakers from time to time employed in a similar capacity elsewhere, shall be entitled to four (4) weeks' leave with pay after each completed year of service.

(4):—

(a) If any worker (other than a fireman or greaser or caretaker) works on Christmas Day, Good Friday, or Labour Day, he shall be entitled to another paid holiday in lieu of the day worked without prejudice to his right to penalty rates for the holiday on which he works.

(b) Any public holiday granted to a worker in any year shall be deducted from the annual leave, with the exception however of Christmas Day, Good Friday, or Labour Day, when granted to a fireman and greaser.

(c) The dates on which annual leave is to be taken shall suit the convenience of the work, except during July and August.

(d) Not less than fourteen (14) days' notice shall be given to a worker of the date on which he is required to take his annual leave.

(e) Any worker failing to take his leave on the days so fixed, and advised to him, shall be deemed to have forfeited same.

(f) Payment for holidays shall be made in accordance with the usual hours of work.

(g) A worker shall not be obliged to take his annual leave whilst he is incapacitated through sickness, but in such case the Minister may require a medical certificate to his satisfaction certifying the fact of such sickness.

(h) Workers who have not served a full calendar year shall be entitled to the same proportion of two (2) weeks and two (2) days' holiday leave as their period of service bears to one calendar year.

(5) Casual workers are not entitled to holiday rights.

(6) Holiday pay shall be at the rate the worker has received for the greater proportion of the calendar month prior to taking the leave.

12.—Sick Leave.

(1) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one half (½) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default, or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof of sickness satisfactory to the Minister or his agents, but the Minister shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(2) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

(3) In the event of the national insurance scheme coming into operation, liberty to apply for a review of the provisions of this clause is reserved to the Minister.

13.—Long Service Leave.

The conditions governing the granting of long service leave to full time Government wages workers generally shall apply to workers covered by this Award.

Part V—General.

14.—Appeals.

(1) When a transfer is ordered by the Minister, the worker shall have the right of appeal to the Engineer, and may be represented by the secretary of the Union. If found after inquiry that a transfer can be arranged with another worker to suit the convenience of the Minister, it shall be done.

(2) Any worker reduced to a lower grade, or dismissed, shall have the right of appeal to the Engineer, and may authorise the secretary of the Union to act as his agent.

15.—Inspection of Wages Sheets.

The wages sheets of the Minister shall be open for inspection at the local or head office by the secretary, or other authorised member of the Union, upon reasonable notice being given of his desire to inspect same.

16.—Recognition of Union Secretary.

The Minister shall recognise the secretary of the Union, and confer with him on matters affecting the members of the Union and its Award or Agreements.

17.—Union Stewards.

Union stewards appointed by the Union shall be recognised by the Engineer Goldfields Water Supply or his deputy. The Union shall advise in writing the name of steward, and any subsequent alteration.

18.—Leave Without Pay to Union Delegates.

Provided three (3) days' notice is given to the local officer in charge that leave is required, and the work of the Minister is not interfered with, leave of absence without pay shall be granted to members of the Union to attend as delegates conferences for Union business.

19.—Sanitary Services.

An efficient sanitary service shall be instituted and maintained by the Minister on each job.

20.—Removals and Transfers.

(1) All workers shall be prepared to remove to any locality where their services may be required.

(2) When a removal or transfer involves a train journey, second-class fares shall be allowed to workers, and, if married, their wives and children under sixteen (16) years of age; also freight charges for the conveyance of a reasonable quantity of furniture and personal effects.

(3) The time occupied by travelling by any worker transferred from one locality to another to suit the requirements of the Minister, shall be paid for as for ordinary working hours only, but no more than eight (8) hours' pay at ordinary rates of wages attached to the station of departure shall be allowed for each day's travelling: Provided that, when travelling time immediately follows on working time the worker shall be paid for such travelling time at ordinary rates up to but not exceeding eight (8) hours on any single journey.

(4) No worker shall lose any time by a transfer.

21.—Transferred Tradesmen.

Tradesmen temporarily transferred shall be paid the ruling rate in the district subject to the conditions therein applying.

22.—Board of Reference.

(1) A Board of Reference is hereby appointed for the purposes of this Award.

(2) Such Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) members, one nominated by the Minister and one nominated by the Union.

(3) The chairman shall be some other person agreed upon by the parties, but if the parties are unable to agree upon an appointment, the parties hereby agree to accept as chairman any person nominated by the Court of Arbitration.

(4) On the chairman and members being appointed, the Board shall be deemed to be constituted.

(5) There are assigned to the Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of:—

- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
- (b) deciding any dispute which under the terms of the Award may be decided by the Board of Reference;
- (c) classifying and fixing wages and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award, or in any other Award binding on the Minister;
- (d) deciding any other matter that the Minister may refer to such Board from time to time.

(6) The Union agrees that there shall be no interruption in the work of the Minister over any matter within the jurisdiction of the Court, or the Board.

(7) The decisions of the Board shall be recorded in writing, and such decisions shall be conclusive. A signed copy of the decisions shall be forwarded to each of the parties hereto.

(8) The Board shall sit at such times and places as the chairman shall decide.

(9) The decision of the Board shall be the decision of the majority.

(10) With the consent of the chairman either party may at any time vary its nomination of representative member.

THE NOXIOUS WEEDS ACT, 1924.

Greenough Road Board.

GREENOUGH Road Board, being a Local Authority within the meaning and for the purposes of the Noxious Weeds Act, 1924, hereby makes the following by-laws, in exercise of the powers in that behalf conferred by section 26 of the said Act, such by-laws to be in addition to the by-laws already made, in exercise of the said powers, and numbered (1) to (6) inclusive:—

(7) The local inspector appointed by the Board under the said Act may by notice in writing served on the owner or occupier of land upon which any noxious weeds are growing or present declare such land to be land from which noxious weeds may be likely to be spread.

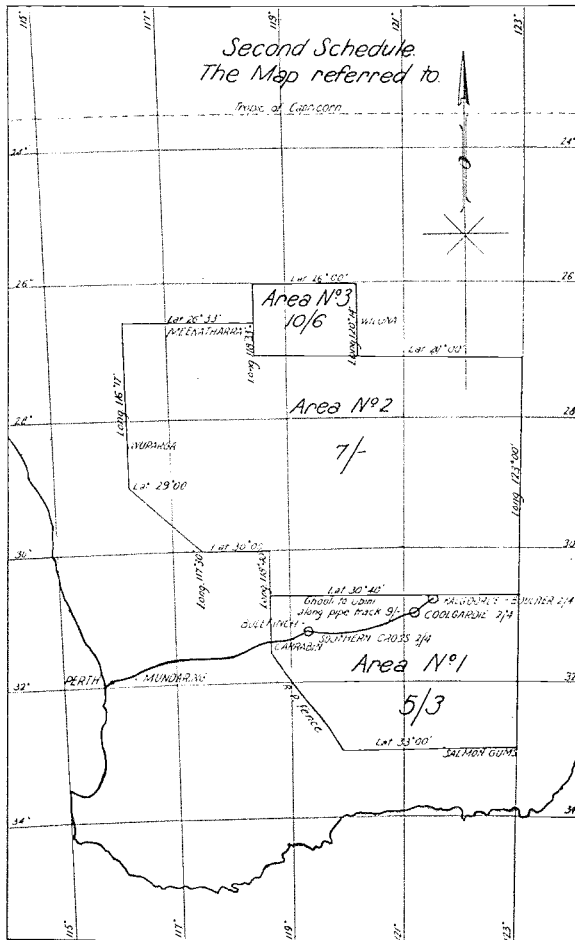
(8) After service of such notice and during such time as any noxious weeds or the seeds of noxious weeds shall remain growing or present on such land, or until such time as the said inspector shall otherwise direct (whichever shall be the shorter period), the owner or occupier so served shall take each and all of the following measures (in addition to any others which he shall be under liability to take) to prevent the spread of noxious weeds:—

(a) He shall retain on such land all livestock which shall be upon the same at the time of service of such notice, and shall not remove or permit the removal or escape from the said land of any of such livestock or any wool or skins of any such livestock: Provided, however, that it shall not be an offence against this by-law if such owner or occupier (as the case may be) removes any such livestock, wool, or skins in strict accordance with the provisions of any permit in writing given by the said inspector and deals with the same in manner directed in such permit.

(b) He shall retain on the said land all wheat and other cereals and all produce and sacks which shall be upon the same at the time of the service of such notice (whether the same, being wheat, cereals, or produce shall then have been harvested or gathered in or not), and he shall not remove or permit the removal from the said land of any such wheat, cereals, produce, or sacks; provided, however, that it shall not be an offence against this by-law if such owner or occupier (as the case may be) removes any such wheat, cereals, produce, or sacks in strict accordance with the provisions of any permit in writing given by the said inspector and deals with the same in manner directed in such permit.

(c) He shall prohibit and prevent the bringing or straying on to such land of any livestock not thereon at the time of service of such notice, and shall take all such precautions and steps as shall reasonably be necessary for the purpose of preventing the entry of livestock upon such land.

(9) At any time and from time to time after the giving of the notice provided for in the last preceding by-law, the said inspector may enter upon the land the
