WHEREAS by the Native Administration Act, 1905-1936, it is provided that the Governor is empowered by Proclamation to declare any Crown lands to be Reserves for Natives: And whereas it is deemed desirable that a Reserve for Natives should be declared in the Buningonia District: Now, therefore I, the said Lientenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Conneil, do hereby declare an area of approximately

20 acres, more particularly described in the Schedule hereto, to be a Reserve for Natives.

#### Schedule.

Buningonia (near Zanthus), No. 22146 (Natives):—Bounded by lines starting at the north-western corner of Location 2 and extending north 10 chains, east 20 chains, and south 10 chains to the northern boundary of said Location 2; thence west along said northern boundary to the starting point (about 20a). (Plan 26/300.)

Abattoirs Act, 1909-1931. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 11 of the Abattoirs Act, 1909-1931, that the Governor may by Order in Council, inter alia, extend to and confer upon any local authority, or any two or more local authorities jointly, the powers conferred on the Governor by the said Act, and that thereupon the powers conferred on the Governor by the said Act may be lawfully exercised by such local authority or local authorities jointly: And whereas, pursuant to the powers conferred by section 3 of the said Act, the Governor by Proclamation published in the Government Gazette on the 17th day of May, 1940, declared that all that portion of the State comprised within the Katanning Road District as constituted under and for the purposes of the Road Districts Act, 1919-1939, shall be a district within the meaning and for the purposes of the Abattoirs Act, 1909-1931, with the intent that the said last-mentioned Act shall have effect tent that the said inst-mentioned Act shall have effect in such district, which may be known as or referred to as the "Katanning Abattoirs District": And whereas the Katanning Road Board as constituted under the Road Districts Act, 1919-1939, is a local authority within the meaning of section 11 of the Abattoirs Act, 1909-1931, and it is deemed desirable and expedient that, in relation to the said Katanning Abattoirs District, the Governor shall extend to and confer upon the trict, the Governor shall extend to and confer upon the Katanning Road Board, as such local authority afore-Abattoirs Act, 1909-1931: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by section 11 of the Abattoirs Act, 1909-1931, doth hereby extend to and confer upon the said Katanning Road Board, in relation to the said Katanning Abattoirs District, the powers conferred on the Governor by the Abattoirs Act, 1909-1931.

Officers' Agreement. (No. 8 of 1940.)

(Registered 30th April, 1940.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-35, this Thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and forty, between the West Anstralian Midland Railway Employees' Industrial Union of Workers (hereinafter referred to as the "Union"), of the one part, and the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited (hereinafter referred to as the "Company"), of the other part, whereby it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:—

#### 1.—Term of Agreement.

The currency of this Agreement shall be three years from the third day of June, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine, subject to the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935. Provided that, at any time after the expiration of the first twelve months from the date of this Agreement and after the expiration of any subsequent period of twelve months, the provisions of this Agreement may by mutual agreement between the parties hereto be varied or rescinded.

#### 2.—Area and Scope of Agreement.

This Agreement shall apply to all officers employed in the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited, except Heads and Sub heads of Branches.

#### 3.—Interpretation,

For the purpose of this Agreement:-

- "Head of Branch" shall mean General Superintendent, Accountant, Engineer, Traffic Superintendent, Stores Superintendent, Locomotive Superintendent, or such other head of branch as may hereinafter be appointed.
- "Sub head" shall mean the following officers, or such other sub head as may hereinafter be appointed:—General Superintendent's Clerk, Assistant Engineer, Engineering Assistant (Locomotive, Workshops, and Per-Way), Audit Clerks (2), Assistant Superintendent Traffic and Stores.
- "Company" shall mean the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited.
- "Union" shall mean the West Australian Midland Railway Employees' Industrial Union of Workers.
- "General Superintendent" shall mean the General Superintendent of the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited.
  "Home station," wherever the words "home station"
- are used, they shall mean the station to which an officer is attached.
- "Married officer" does not include a married officer whose wife and family are neither resident with nor dependent upon him, but includes a single officer who has a parent or child solely dependent upon him and resident in the State of Western Australia.

#### 4.—Probation.

- (a) A junior male clerk who within the first two years of his service passes the prescribed examinations
  - (1) Pitman's Shorthand-80 words per minute; or
  - (2) Typewriting—40 words per minute; or
     (3) Telegraphy—15 words per minute sound, 20 words per minute transmission; or

words per minute transmission; or
(4) Timekeeping; or
(5) Railway Accounts,
or any subject suitable to the Branch he has been appointed to, shall be granted scale increase of salary three months prior to his birthday: Provided that, in respect to (1) and (2), the increase shall apply only to the ensuing scale increase, but in respect to (3), (4), and (5) shall apply to future service.

(b) In addition, a junior male clerk who holds certificates for railway accounts and telegraphy or time-keeping, as per (a), and qualifies in safe-working, or the qualifying examinations suitable to his Branch, on or before attaining the age of 21 years, shall be granted a further advance of three months on his scale increase, and such increase and the light months in this scale increase, and such increase shall apply to his future service.

#### 5.-Hours of Duty,

- (a) (i) The hours of duty of officers (other than transport officers) employed in the Head and District Offices shall be:-
  - Where a five day week is worked-Monday to Friday—8.45 a.m. to 5.6 p.m., with interval of three-quarters of an hour for lunch;
- Where a six day week is worked—Monday to Friday—9 a.m. to 5 p.m., with interval of one hour for lunch; Saturday, 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

  (ii) Officers required on duty on Saturday mornings in Head Office and District Offices shall, as far as practically a start of the - ticable, be booked off on the following Friday afternoon to adjust their hours.
- (b) Station-masters, assistant and night station-masters, and relief officers shall work forty-four hours per week, exclusive of Sundays.
- (c) The spread of shift for station-masters, assistant and night station-masters and relief officers shall not exceed ten hours over all, except at stations where the train service renders it impracticable, where the spread may be extended to twelve hours.
- (d) There shall be no fixed hours of duty for inspectors or other officers who are required to travel in the performance of their duties: Provided that this subclause shall not apply to pay officers.
- (e) All other officers shall work forty-four hours per week, exclusive of Sundays: Provided that, where the present custom is to work a lesser number of hours, such custom shall continue.
- (f) Any time taken by an officer in handing-over at change of shifts shall not be counted as time worked.
- (g) No officer shall be booked off for meals or adjustment of hours between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- (h) The recognised meal hours for all officers shall be between the following hours:—Breakfast—7.0 a.m. to 9.0 a.m.; lunch—11.45 a.m. to 2.0 p.m.; tca—5.0 p.m. to 7.30 p.m., with a minimum of 35 minutes for a meal.
- (i) Officers brought on duty outside their ordinary rostered hours shall, except when such duties exclusive of meal time is continuous with the ordinary shift, be paid for all such time, with a minimum of a quarter day's pay at ordinary rates where less than a quarter day is worked.
- (j) No junior clerk shall, except in case of emergency, be rostered for duty between the hours of 12 midnight and 6 a.m.

#### 6.—Travelling Time.

- (a) Officers in receipt of a salary less than the minimum of the first class will be credited with ordinary time when travelling on duty for the first eight hours, and at half-time thereafter up to a maximum of eight hours in any one day.
- (b) Any officer stationed in a suburban area who has to take up duty temporarily in such area, shall be credited with any time occupied in travelling to and from his place of temporary comployment in excess of that usually occupied in travelling from his home to his regular place of employment.
- (c) If travelling time is not adjusted during the week in which it is incurred, such time will be paid for at ordinary rates.
- (d) When a sleeping berth is occupied, travelling time between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m. shall not be counted.
- (e) When travelling by sea, time beyond ordinary day's hours shall not be counted.
- (f) This clause shall not apply to officers on transfer or to those who come under the provisions of subclause (d) of clause 5.

#### 7.—Overtime.

(a) Overtime shall mean all time worked in excess of the recognised working hours in any one week, and can only be claimed under the following conditions:-Less than thirty minutes-not to be paid for; thirty minutes and up to thirty-seven minutes-half an hour; thirty-eight minutes and up to fifty-two minutes-three quarters of an hour; fifty-three minutes and up to sixty-seven minutes—one hour; sixty-eight minutes and up to eighty-two minutes-one hour and a quarter; eighty-three minutes and up to ninety-seven minutesone hour and a half, and thereafter on similar basis.

- (b) Overtime shall be paid for at the ordinary rate of pay for all time worked in excess of the recognised working hours up to two hours per day; over that period time and a quarter. All time worked in excess of a spread of twelve hours shall stand alone and be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter.
- (c) All officers engaged on work which may be defined by the Company as special, in excess of the recognised working hours, shall be paid overtime at the rate of time and a quarter for the whole of such overtime.
- (d) The recognised hours of duty shall be as laid down in clause 5, subclause (a) to (f).
- (e) In computing the number of hours worked per week, time absent on sick leave and holidays, when paid for, shall be treated as time worked.
- (f) Any periods up to five minutes on any days are not to count in the week's total. The first two hours' overtime or any portion thereof in any one day may be adjusted in the week's total; such adjustment shall take place by being brought on later or booked off earlier, but any overtime beyond the two hours will stand alone and be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter.
- (g) The foregoing subclauses (a) to (f) shall apply to:—
  - (i) The Head and Administrative Officers;
  - (ii) Metropolitan and suburban station officers;
- (iii) Station and other officers at depot stations.
  (h) The foregoing subclauses (a) to (f) shall also apply to all other stations regarding overtime worked through:—
  - (i) the late or irregular running of trains;
  - (ii) the running of specials or conditional trains;
  - (iii) on account of the absence of other members of the staff; or
  - (iv) increased volume of traffic.
- (i) All other overtime worked shall be paid for at the discretion of the Company.
- (j) Any officer in receipt of a salary in excess of the maximum of the first class shall not be entitled to overtime pay.

#### 8.—Sunday Time.

- (a) Officers who are called upon for Sunday duty shall, if the work is of such a nature that it cannot be carried out within the usual hours of duty, be paid for such duty at the rate of time and a half; Christmas Day and Good Friday to be considered as Sundays, insofar as this subclause operates.
- (b) The following shall be the scale for calculating Sunday time:-
  - (i) Less than a quarter of an hour worked in continuance of a shift beginning on a Saturday or in commencement of a shift terminating on a Monday, nil;
  - inating on a Monday, nil;

    (ii) Any officer brought on duty on Sunday shall be paid a minimum of a quarter day's pay at the rate applicable to the day: Provided that this shall not apply in the case of a shift starting on Sunday and continuing into Monday;
  - (iii) If an officer works a broken shift on Sunday, a minimum of a quarter day's pay at the rate applicable to the day shall be paid for each section. A shift shall be deemed broken when more than two hours clapse from first signing off to again signing on.
- (c) An officer who on Sunday works more than his ordinary week day rostered shift shall be paid for the actual time worked. A rostered shift shall be one sixth of the usual working hours for a week.
- (d) No break of shift shall be allowed between the hours of 12 midnight and 7 a.m. or 10 p.m. and midnight.
- (e) In computing Sunday time for Inspectors or such officers who have no set hours of duty, the ordinary hours of duty shall be deemed to be those worked at the head and district offices.
- (f) The meal hours as prescribed in subclause (h) of clause 5 shall apply as regards Sunday duty.

#### 9.—Leave of Absence, Annual.

(a) After twelve months' continuous service, all officers shall be entitled to annual paid leave of two weeks and public holidays, or days in lieu thereof.

- (b) Leave of absence shall be calculated to the close of each financial year, and shall be paid for at the salary the officer is in receipt of at the time such annual leave is taken.
- (c) The leave shall be applied for and taken ont at a time convenient to the Company before the 30th June following the year for which it fell due. At the expiration of that time the leave shall lapse unless such leave shall have been deferred by the Company, or permission of the Company obtained for its accumulation.
- (d) In urgent cases leave in addition to the foregoing may be granted, without pay, for a period not exceeding six months. Any public holiday falling due during the period in which an officer is on leave without pay shall not be paid for.
- (e) Subject to the proviso hereto, any officer with more than six months' service who may resign or be dismissed from the service, shall be entitled to receive payment for holidays pro rata up to the time of leaving the service: Provided that, if an officer be dismissed for being under the influence of liquor or for drunkenness, he shall be entitled to be paid for such leave (if any) as was due up to the thirtieth June previous, and if dismissed for peculation, tampering with ticket issues, or manipulation of the books of the Company, he shall not be entitled to payment for any holidays.
- (f) The next-of-kin of a deceased officer shall be granted payment of *pro rata* annual leave to the date of the decease of the officer.
- (g) Officers when working a five-day week shall, where clearing days in lieu of public holidays worked, be debited with days Monday to Friday.

#### 10 .- Absence without Pay.

Any term in excess of three months an officer is absent from duty from any cause without pay shall not for any purpose be included as part of such officer's period of service.

#### 11.—Long Service Leave.

- (a) The Company shall grant to any officer who has continued on the salaried staff for ten years, long service leave for three calendar months on full pay, or six calendar months on half pay. For the subsequent period of ten years, the same conditions shall apply, and thereafter, for every seven years, similar leave shall be granted.
- (b) Service prior to attaining the age of eighteen years shall not count in computing long service leave.
- (c) Any public holidays occurring during the period in which an officer is on long service leave will be calculated as portion of the long service leave, and extra days in lieu thereof shall not be granted.
- (d) If a deceased officer leaves a widow, dependent children, mother or invalid sister, payment pro rata of long service leave up to the date of such officer's death shall be granted to such dependant or dependants.
- (e) (i) Officers regressed to the wages staff and reappointed to the salaried staff, or appointees from wages to salaried staff, shall, for the purpose of this clause, be treated as if the whole of their service had been served on the salaried staff; subject to the proviso that officers who had less than ten (10) years salaried service but more than ten (10) years wages service and salaried service combined as at 1st January, 1927, shall be entitled to the first period of leave on that date.
- (ii) For the next period of leave the qualifying service will be ten years from the 1st January, 1927, and for subsequent leave the qualifying service will be seven years from the 1st January, 1937.
- (f) Any officer who resigns or is retired from the service, except as provided for in subclause (g) shall be paid for long service leave due at the time of resignation or retirement.
- (g) Any officer who retires or is retired upon reaching the retiring age, or through ill-health, shall be paid for long service leave *pro rata* to date of retirement.
- (h) An officer dismissed from the service shall not be entitled to payment in respect of long service leave other than for leave that had accrued due to him prior to the date of the offence for which he was dismissed.

(i) A female officer resigning from the service for the purpose of getting married, and who has been continuously employed for three years and over, shall be granted payment pro rata of her long service leave at the date of retirement, subject to the proviso in subclause (b).

#### 12.-Sick Leave.

- (a) Any officer who is incapacitated for duty in consequence of illness or injury shall, as soon as possible, advise his superior officer in sufficient time to admit of arrangements being made for the performance of his duties. Any such officer who fails to do so shall be treated as absent without leave.
- (b) Any officer so incapacitated for duty shall also notify his superior officer in sufficient time of the date on which he will be able to resume duty, to enable any necessary arrangements to be made.
- (c) Should the absence be prolonged beyond one day the officer shall, except as provided in paragraph (d), forward to his superior officer on the second day thereof a certificate from any legally qualified medical practitioner showing the nature of the illness and the probable duration.
- (d) Any such officer who resides more than five miles from a legally qualified medical practitioner shall intimate that fact to his superior officer, within whose discretion it shall lie as to whether a certificate is required or not.
- (e) Any officer who finds that he is unable to resume duty on the expiration of the period shown in the first certificate shall thereupon furnish a further certificate, and shall continue to do so on the expiration of the periods respectively covered by such certificates: Provided, however, that the maximum periods between the dates of furnishing any two medical certificates shall be fourteen days.
- (f) In cases where incapacity for duty is obvious to the Head of the Branch, he may relieve the officer of the necessity of providing medical certificates.
- (g) Any officer shall, if so directed, present himself for examination by a medical officer, at such time and place as may be fixed.
- (h) Any officer who has been absent for three days (not continuous) in one financial year shall, if so instructed by his superior officer, furnish a medical certificate for absences of one day only.
- (i) Officers who have conformed to the foregoing may be granted sick leave (exclusive of annual and long service leave), as follows:—Officers with six or less than six months' service—nil; officers with more than six months but less than three years' service—two weeks on full pay for each completed six months' service; officers with three years service and over—three months on full pay and three months on half pay.
- (j) Such leave may be granted in one or more periods, but the aggregate amount of leave on pay provided for must not be exceeded.
- (k) In no case shall an officer be granted more than three months on full pay and three months on half pay in any triennial period unless determined by the Company. The triennial period to be the three years preceding the date of illness for which payment is claimed.
- (1) No payment will be made for any absence due to an officer's own fault, neglect, or misconduct.
- (m) Indisposition not necessitating confinement to the house will not be regarded as illness in respect of which leave of absence will be granted under this section, excepting under special circumstances, to be approved by the Company.
- (n) When an officer is absent as the result of an necident which occurred on duty and is entitled to compensation in accordance with the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act, and is due for sick leave on full pay, half the period of absence only shall be debited against sick leave. Officers due for sick leave on half pay shall not be granted sick leave when in receipt of compensation.

#### 13.-Away from Home Allowances.

- (a) Allowances to meet the travelling expenses of officers will be paid as under:—
  - (1) Traffic officers engaged on regular relief duties:—
- (b) Daily allowance, for the first ten days—10s. per day; daily expenses after ten days' residence at the same place to be reduced 25 per cent.

- (c) Where an officer is engaged at one station for one continuous period for four weeks or more, an amount of £2 2s. 6d. per week shall apply in lieu of the foregoing, and shall operate from the first day of taking up duty at such station.
  - (2) Officers not on regular relief staff:
- (d) Officers in receipt of £383 per annum and under £542 per annum—15s, per day; officers in receipt of £322 per annum and under £377 per annum—12s, 6d, per day; officers on less than £322 per annum—10s, per day; daily expenses after ten days' residence at the same place to be reduced by twenty-five per cent.
- (e) Where an officer is engaged at a station for one continuous period of four weeks or more, the following scale allowance shall apply in lieu of the foregoing, and operate from the first day of taking up duty at such station—Officers in receipt of £383 per annum and over—£2 10s. per week; officers on £322 per annum and under £377—£2 2s. 6d. per week; officers on less than £322 per annum—£2 2s. 6d. per week.
  - (3) General (applicable to all officers):-
- (f) The daily rate shall represent in equal portions the expenses for three meals and a bed. For the purpose of computing expenses, in the case of arrival at home station, breakfast shall be allowed for if arrival is later than 8.0 a.m., lunch, if later than 1.0 p.m., tea, if later than 6.0 p.m., and bed, if later than 11.0 p.m. Where an officer does not incur expense in obtaining sleeping accommodation, the bed allowance shall not be payable unless approved by the Head of the Branch.
- (g) An officer absent from his home station (not temporarily lodging away from his home station) shall be paid 1s. 6d. in suburban areas and 2s. 6d. ontside suburban areas for his second and each succeeding meal: Provided that any officer who in fact incurs expense in procuring his first meal, shall be entitled to be paid 1s. 6d. in suburban areas and 2s. 6d. ontside suburban areas in respect thereof.
- (h) When a sleeping berth is provided the bed allowance will not apply, except when a bed has been paid for elsewhere for a portion of the night.
- (i) An officer on a weekly rate of expenses sleeping at a barracks where no other accommodation is available shall be charged the sum of seven shillings and sixpence per week.
- (j) Incidental expenses, such as cab fares and cartage of personal luggage, will be allowed: Provided the time away from home station is sufficient to warrant such expenditure.
- (k) Where an officer required to work after his usual finishing time cannot reasonably be expected to go to his home or lodging for a meal, he shall, subject to approval of the Head of the Branch, be allowed any expense incurred in obtaining a meal, up to a maximum of 1s. 6d. in suburban areas and 2s. 6d. outside such areas. This clause shall not operate where the excess time does not exceed one hour.
- (1) In cases where an officer is engaged at other than his home station in receipt of weekly rate of allowance, and is temporarily away from such station, the daily allowance will be paid in lien of the weekly rate for the period of such temporary absence for twenty-four hours or over: if the absence is less than twenty-four hours, reasonable actual expenses will be paid.
- (m) Where an officer is relieving on expenses for a period of less than twenty-eight days, he shall not receive greater payment for relieving expenses than he would have received if he had been relieving for twenty-eight days.
- (u) Any unmarried officer who is required to undertake duties away from his headquarters, and who remains at one foreign station for a period exceeding twenty eight days, will not be granted away from home allowance, but will be paid any reasonable expenses incurred in travelling to and from his headquarters.
- (o) Subclauses (c), (e), (in), and (in) will not apply until an officer has received information that his stay at one place will be of such duration as to bring him under the provisions of these subclauses.
- (p) In special cases the above scale may be increased by the company.

#### 14.—Lodging Allowance.

(a) Any junior under 17 years of age who in the opinion of the Head of the Branch is obliged to reside away from home, owing to the requirements of the Com-

pany, shall be granted a board and lodging allowance equivalent to the difference between his annual salary and that provided for a junior aged 17 to 18 years.

(b) No allowance under this clause will be con-

tinued:-

(i) during absence from duty without pay;

- (ii) during any period of annual leave; (iii) during any period of other absence from duty with pay, unless the officer concerned continues to reside away from his home;
- (iv) during any period (after the expiration of one month) in which the officer is continuously in receipt of travelling or away from home allow-

#### 15.-Transfer Allowance.

- (a) Any officer transferred from one station to another over one mile distant, involving a change of residence, shall:
  - (i) be paid not less than £4 for a married officer and 15s. for a single officer. (A married officer who does not transfer his family shall be treated as a single man: Provided that, should be subsequently transfer his family, he shall be entitled to the difference between the rates for single and married men).

(ii) be paid such further out-of-pocket expenses (if any) as the Company in its discretion shall decide to have been reasonably incurred;

- (iii) be granted free passes for self and family and free railway transport of his furniture and effects, including one cow and not more than two goats and one dog.
- (iv) No officer shall lose time by reason of being transferred.
- (b) Any officer who is transferred from one place to another to suit himself, or who is transferred by way of punishment, shall be entitled to the provisions of subclause (iii) only.
- (c) Married officers (if necessary) shall be allowed one day for packing and one day for unpacking.
- (d) The granting of an allowance in excess of that provided to meet special cases shall be at the discretion of the Company.
- (e) Officers transferred to districts necessitating travelling a full night shall be supplied with sleeping berths for themselves and families on trains which have the accommodation: provided such berths are available.
- (f) No married officer shall be transferred for a less period than three months. If required to work temporarily away at another depot or station for relief or other purposes for a less period, he shall be paid away from home allowances as per clause 13.

#### 16.—Free Passes, Privilege Tickets, etc. Free Passes:-

(a) After twelve months' continuous service an officer shall be allowed three first-class passes per annum as under:-

One station to station pass on the occasion of the annual or long service leave to cover the full term of leave due; two privilege passes from

term of leave due; two privilege passes from one given station to another and return.

In addition to the officer, the passes shall be available for his wife and members of his family under eighteen years of age unmarried, unmarried daughters over eighteen years of age, and the parents of an officer: provided they are resident with and dependent upon him for any parent. him for support.

A widower with his child or children resident with him, and who regularly employs a housekeeper, may at the discretion of the Company, be granted passes for such housekeeper; in like manner an unmarried officer supporting younger brothers and/or sisters may be granted such passes for such housekeeper.

- (b) Upon request an officer may be granted a separate station to station pass for his wife and dependants as mentioned in subclause (a) hereof, where it is inconvenient for both to travel at the same time.
- (c) After six months' continuous service an officer shall be entitled to the passes mentioned in subclause (a) in proportion to length of service; should any officer through illness be unable to use his station to station pass on the occasion of his annual leave, he shall be entitled to the use of such pass on the occasion of taking leave without pay during the year in which same is due.

- (d) An officer who resigns or is retired from the service, and has leave due, shall be granted a free pass, station to station, for the term of such holidays.
- (e) Officers in isolated parts may be issued free passes, at the discretion of the Head of the Branch, for the purpose of obtaining medical attention.
- (f) Free passes shall not apply to race specials, gnaranteed specials, or special excursion trains within a fifty-mile radius, or when in the opinion of the stationmaster at the station where the officer desires to commence his journey there is not ample room on the train. Market Passes:-
- (g) Officers stationed outside suburban areas will be issued market passes once per month to the most convenient market town. The passes may be issued in favour of the officer, his wife, or his housekeeper, and children between the ages of five and fourteen years. An officer's wife or housekeeper may be granted a market pass, which may include a perambulator or go-cart, once per fortnight, if required.

Free Freight:

for children.

- (h) Domestic supplies up to a maximum weight fortnightly of 2 cwt. for married men and 1 cwt. for single men shall be carried free by rail to home station from the most convenient market town, and, in addition, meat, bread, vegetables, and dairy produce, when not obtainable locally, shall be carried free from the nearest town where same are procurable. All such supplies must be for the sole use of the officer and his family.
- Market Towns:-(i) The following shall be approved market towns:—Midland Junction, Moora, Walkaway.
- Privilege Tickets:-(j) After six months' continuous service an officer shall be allowed privilege return tickets for himself, wife, and members of his family under eighteen years of age, also unmarried daughters over 18 years of age and his parents: Provided they are resident with and dependent upon the officer's earnings. The charge for privilege tickets to be half the single fare for the return journey, with a minimum of 1s. for adults and 6d.
- (k) For the purpose of this clause a member of the family shall be deemed to be dependent: Provided such member's income does not exceed 15s. per week, exclusive of old age or invalid pension, but a member of the family temporarily ont of employment shall not be deemed to be dependent.

#### 17.—Privilege Season Tickets.

- (a) First class season tickets at one-half the ordinary season ticket rates will, on application and on production of the Company's certificate, be issued to an officer to enable him to travel between his place of occupation and the station nearest his place of residence on the Company's residence on the Company's residence of the Company's the Company's railway. To an officer in receipt of 45 per cent. of the basic wage or under, one-quarter of the ordinary season ticket rates shall be charged.
- (b) These season tickets shall be available only whilst the holder is in the employ of the Company.
- (c) Should the holder resign or change his place of residence, a refund of the unexpired value of the ticket will be made, if handed in at the time.

#### 18.—Resignations and Retirements.

- (a) No officer shall leave the Company until the expiration of one month's written notice of his intention so to do, without the approval of the Company.
- (b) One calendar month's notice shall be given by the Company to any such officer whose services are no longer required: Provided that this subclause shall not apply to cases of summary dismissal for misconduct or to officers for whom the Company is unable to find work, or whom it may deem unnecessary to employ by reason of any action on the part of any section of its employees, or for any other cause beyond its control.

#### 19.—Promotions.

(a) Promotion and the selection of any officer to act in a higher position shall be governed by relative ability, suitability, record, and experience. If everything else is deemed equal, the senior officer shall be selected for promotion.

(b) As a general rule officers and employees of the Branch in which the vacancy occurs will be promoted to the higher position, but the Company may, when it considers it advisable for the good of the service, select an officer from one Branch for position in another, either in the same or in a higher class.

- (c) When considered necessary a person from outside the service may be appointed to any position in the service: Provided that there is not an officer in the service capable of filling the position.
- (d) No officer shall refuse compliance with any order directing his transfer from one position to another, but if on appeal the Company is satisfied that the objection is sound, then such officer shall not be penalised.
- (e) An officer desiring to be passed over in the event of promotion being offered shall, if his request be acceded to, forfeit all claims to promotion for two years, but if good and sufficient reason be given the Company it may restore such claims.
- (f) All officers promoted to a higher position shall be subject to a probationary period of six months and paid the minimum rate of salary assigned to the class to which they are promoted. At the end of such period the Head of the Brauch shall report to the Company as to the fitness of the officer for the higher grade; if the report is satisfactory, the appointment will be confirmed as from the date of taking up duty; if unsatisfactory, the officer will be provided for at the same salary as he was in receipt of prior to the period of probation in the higher position.
- (g) When a vacancy occurs in the service, if the senior officer is not selected for promotion, applications shall be called from officers in the class lower to that in which the vacancy exists.
- (h) A list of promotions shall be published within 14 days of approval, and any officer who considers that he has been unjustly passed over may appeal, in the first place to the Head of his Branch, and, if not satisfied with the latter's reply, may then appeal to the General Superintendent, whose decision shall be final; but no appeal will be considered nuless forwarded so as to reach the Head of the Branch within fourteen days after receipt of the advice and the General Superintendent within fourteen days after the date of receipt of the reply from the Head of the Branch.
- (i) Preference shall be given to unionists with regard to employment, except in the case of juniors.

#### 20.-Acting in Higher Capacities.

- (a) When an officer other than relief officers performs the duties of a position higher than that in which he is classified for a term exceeding 14 days (continuous or broken) within any one financial year, he shall be paid from the end of that period, while performing any such duties, at the minimum salary attached to such higher position.
- (b) An officer called upon to occupy a higher position temporarily shall be entitled to increments as though he had been permanently promoted to such position: Provided that, in the case of the first increment, the officer shall have performed the higher duties for twelve mouths continuous or broken period: Provided further, that the officer shall be entitled to receive a second increment if he shall have performed the higher duties for two years' continuous or broken period. Absence on annual leave, long-service leave, or sick leave on pay shall be counted as service: Provided the officer resumes in the same or another higher position.

#### 21.—Temporary Clerks.

- (a) Temporary clerks shall not be engaged without the approval of the Company in any position classified above the rates shown for adult male officers, clause 26.
- (b) The provisions of clauses 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 12, 13, 15, 16, and 17 will apply to temporary clerks.
- (c) The provisions of clause 18, provided that the notice to leave received and given shall be one week in lieu of one calendar month, shall apply to temporary clerks.
- (d) The rate of pay shall be:—First six months—basic rate, plus 21/ per week; after six months—basic rate, plus 24/ per week.

#### 22.—General Regulation.

An officer who is required to attend any medical or departmental examination shall be granted pay and expenses in accordance with clause 13, for any period for which he is necessarily absent from his ordinary duties in connection therewith.

#### 23.—Classification.

- (a) All positions set out in clause 26 are in their respective proper classes, and shown in alphabetical order.
- (b) The Company shall, as soon as possible, and not later than three months after the coming into force of this Agreement, issue a typed classification for each officer, showing the officers in their order of seniority, position occupied, and salaries in Branch and Section Groups.
- (c) Officers performing postal duties shall be paid fifty per cent. of the allowance received from the Postal Department, in addition to their salary, but such shall not in any case be deemed part of the salary of such officer, nor shall the officer claim Sunday time or overtime caused through postal duties.
- (d) Nothing in this classification shall lower the rate of salary any officer was in receipt of at the coming into force of the Agreement.

#### 24.—Alterations and Additions.

If during the currency of an Award or Agreement between the Company and the Union or Unions representing its employees, any alteration or addition to an existing Award or Agreement between the Commissioner of Railways and a Union or Unions representing his employees is agreed upon, the Union shall notify the Company within ten days after any alteration or addition has been agreed to, and such alteration or addition shall automatically apply to the employees of the Company from the same date as it applies to the employees of the Company notify in writing the Union or Unions concerned that the Company objects to being bound by such alterations or addition, and within the same period of twenty-one days submits the question or questions involved for the decision of the Court of Arbitration, the mestion of whether the Company shall be subject to the determination of the Court, whose decision, if in the affirmative, shall operate as from the date the alteration or addition became operative in the Government service.

#### 25.—Payment of Salaries.

- (a) Salaries shall be paid fortnightly.
- (b) A day's salary shall be calculated as one three hundred and thirteenth of the yearly rate of salary.
- (c) The salary for a fortnight shall be computed by dividing the yearly rate by three hundred and thirteen and multiplying the result by 12.
- (d) The provisions of the Agreement shall be suspended during any period in which by reason of any action on the part of all or of any section of the Company's employees, or for any other cause beyond its control, it is mable wholly or partially to carry on the running of trains, or the Workshops, and the Company will not be liable for payment of salary to any officer whom it does not call upon for duty during any such period.

#### 26.—Rates of Pay.

(g) Officers occupying the positions set forth above shall be paid a salary not less than the minimum provided for the class in which such position has been classified.

- (h) Officers (other than juniors) occupying all other positions will be paid the salary set forth in subclause (c) hereof.
- (i) Advancement from minimum to maximum of any class shall be by yearly increment: Provided that such advancement shall be approved by the Company upon satisfactory report from the Head of the Branch in which the officer is employed, of his conduct, diligence, and efficiency, and provided also, that the advancement in salary shall not be granted to an officer if the Company determines that such officer has not performed his duties satisfactorily for the preceding twelve months, or that such officer has been guilty of misconduct which in the opinion of the Company justifies the postponement or refusal of the advancement.
- (j) An officer who is unable from any cause to perform the duties of his position, and is in consequence provided with employment in another position in a lower class shall, unless the Company directs otherwise, be paid the maximum rate for the class in which he has been provided.
- (k) Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to limit the power of the Company to pay any officer at a higher rate than that prescribed in any case where it may consider the same to be merited or warranted by the officer occupying the position.
- (1) If a male officer is retained on the maximum of adult clerks or the maximum of the sixth class for assistant station-masters, night station-masters and night officer, Midland Junction, or the maximum of the fifth class for station-masters and assistant goods agent, Midland Junction, for five years, and has not refused promotion to a higher class, and the Head of his Branch certifies that such officer is eligible and would be recommended for promotion on the grounds of good conduct and efficiency, he may be paid, on the approval of the Company, an allowance of £10 per annum.

If such officer is subsequently promoted to class four—station-master—he will be entitled to advancement to the maximum of that class twelve months from the date he received the allowance.

Engine-drivers, Firemen and Cleaners' Agreement. No. 7 of 1940.

(Registered 30th April, 1940.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, this twenty-ninth day of March, One thousand nine hundred and forty, between the West Australian Midland Railway Employees' Industrial Union of Workers (hereinafter referred to as the "Union"), of the one part, and the Midland Railway Company of Western Australia, Limited (hereinafter referred to as the "Company"), of the other part, whereby it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:—

#### 1.—Term of Agreement.

This Agreement shall operate from the third day of December, 1939, and shall remain in force for three (3) years from that date: provided that, at any time after the expiration of the first twelve (12) months from that date, and after the expiration of any subsequent period of twelve (12) months, either party shall have the right to approach the Court of Arbitration to amend or vary the Agreement.

#### 2.-Area and Scope of Agreement.

This Agreement shall apply only to members of the Union employed by the Company in and about the working of the Midland Railway, and shall be binding upon the abovenamed parties, and shall operate over the whole of the Midland Railway. If electric or other power is installed as a substitute for steam haulage, members of the Union shall be employed to operate under the new power.

#### 3.—Interpretation.

"Worker" means a member of the Union employed as driver, fireman, cleaner, washout-man, washout-man's assistant, packer, or trimmer.

"Attended barracks" means any building attended to by a whole or part-time caretaker, appointed for that purpose, which is provided with bed, clean bedding, cooking utensils, and light, and lighting facilities, water, and fuel. This shall include a van used to supplement the building accommodation, when such is not sufficient to accommodate the weakers. cient to accommodate the workers.

"Unattended barracks" means any van used as a barracks provided with the accommodation mentioned in the previous definition, and any building which, whilst provided with the accommodation mentioned therein, is wholly unattended.

"Main depot" means a depot where six (6) or more locomotives are stationed.

"Married man" includes a single man who has a parent or child solely dependent on him and resident in the State of Western Australia, but does not include a married man whose wife and family are neither resident with nor dependent upon him.

"The Union" means the West Australian Midland Railway Employees' Industrial Union of Workers.

#### 4.—Promotion.

Promotion from cleaner to fireman and from fireman to driver shall be made:-

- (a) automatically by reason of acting work, in accordance with the next succeeding clause;
- (b) independently of acting work, as vacancies arise, according to seniority, combined with proficiency and good conduct: provided that the necessary examinations have been passed.

#### 5.—Acting Work.

- (i) A fireman or cleaner who has acted in the capacity of a driver or fireman respectively for 313 days, shall be appointed to the higher grade, and the date of such appointment shall, notwithstanding subsequent regression, be taken for the purpose of determining when advancements from class to class become due. To ascertain the number of days acting work performed by a worker, all acting work heretofore or hereafter shall be counted, and the total number of hours worked by him in the higher capacity shall be divided by seven and one-third.
- (ii) For the purpose of maintaining the present order of seniority amongst the workers, the following provisions shall obtain:-
  - (a) The Company shall, so far as practicable, arrange that firemen and cleaners shall have the benefit of acting work according to seniority, and to that end shall transfer them from one depot to another, as may be neces-
  - (b) Subject as hereinafter provided, when a fire-man or cleaner has qualified by acting work and is appointed to the higher grade under subclause (i) of this clause, each fireman or cleaner, as the case may be, above him on the classification shall be deemed to have on the classification shall also be appointed to the higher grade: Provided, however, that the foregoing provision shall not apply to any fireman or cleaner who during the preeding twelve (12) months has lost the opportunity of himself getting the benefit of acting work by reason of his failure to accept a transfer from one depot to another.
- (iii) A driver or fireman may, when traffic conditions so require, be temporarily employed as a fireman or cleaner respectively, but whilst acting in the lower grade shall be paid the rate which he was receiving as driver or fireman respectively.

- (iv) (a) A review of work performed in the advanced capacity during the previous three (3) months will be held at the close of March, June, September, and December in each year. Any adjustment of the staff, as provided for hereunder, to date from the eighth day after the close of each review period.
- (b) The margin of acting time permissible in any quarter, without involving the question of promotion for the next quarter, shall be:-
  - (1) Half full time, viz :- 286 hours per quarter
  - for one fireman acting as driver;
    (2) Full time, viz.:—572 hours per quarter for one cleaner acting as fireman.
- (c) The promotion of firemen to drivers and cleaners to fireman respectively, when the permissible margin of acting time for the previous quarter has been exceeded, shall be made at the rate of one man for every unit of 572 hours (i.e., full time) over the margin in each class. Fifty (50) per cent. or over of a broken unit to be reckoned at 572 hours; under 50 per cent. to be dropped.
- (d) Regression of drivers to firemen and firemen to cleaners respectively, when the permissible margin of acting work for the previous quarter has not been reached shall be made on the basis of-

one driver to fireman, when acting time is less than 286 hours per quarter;

one fireman to cleaner, when acting time is less than 572 hours per quarter.

(e) In the event of an abnormal decrease in the traffic to be handled in any one year, the margins provided for in paragraphs (iv) (b), (1) and (2), and (e) and (d), may be referred to a Board of Reference for review, and the Board shall have power to amend those margins, as it may deem fit.

(f) Each fortnight a return, showing the acting work performed during the previous two (2) weeks, shall be

supplied to the secretary of the Union.

- (v) Workers appointed under subclause (i) and (ii) hereof may be regressed: Provided the total amount of advanced capacity work performed during the two (2) weeks preceding that in which such appointments become due is less than the margin stipulated in subclause (iv); should the advanced capacity work performed for the same period be in excess of the margin provided in subclause (iv), appointments equal to such excess shall be retained; regressions under this subclause to be made within a fortnight of such appointments becoming due.
- (vi) No driver or fireman in any class shall be regressed until all the drivers and firemen respectively in the classes (if any) below him shall have been similarly regressed. After such regression, and whilst doing work in the lower grade, the drivers and firemen so regressed shall be paid the maximum rates provided for firemen and cleaners respectively; notice of intention to regress to be served on the Union.

#### 6.—Retirement and Dismissal.

- (a) No worker after six months' continuous service shall leave the service of the Company until the expiration of fourteen (14) days' written notice of his intention to do so, without the approval of the Company
- (b) Except in the case of summary dismissal for misconduct, fourteen (14) days' written notice shall be given by the Company to any worker whose services are no longer required, and the reason for his dismissal shall be included in such notice.

- 7.—Qualifications.
  (1) Engine-drivers:—No person shall be employed as a driver on the Midland Railway without the approval of the Head of the Branch. Such driver shall pass a satisfactory examination and hold a certificate from Head of Branch that he is competent. He must also have served as a fireman on the Midland Railway, or been employed as a driver or acting driver on other railways, either within or outside the service of the State railways, unless in the opinion of the Head of the Branch there is no fully qualified worker available in the employ of the Midland Railway, when he shall report to the Company, who may therenpon authorise the appointment of such person or persons, as may be deemed necessary; always provided that the Union shall receive due notice of any
- such proposed appointments.

  (2) (a) Firemen:—No person shall be employed as a fireman on the Midland Railway without the approval of the Head of the Branch. Such fireman must pass a

satisfactory examination and hold a certificate from the Head of the Branch that he is competent; he must also have served as a cleaner on the Midland Railway, or have been employed as a driver, fireman, or cleaner on other railways within or outside the State of Western Australia: provided always, that no person from outside the service of the Midland Railway shall be employed as fireman unless in the opinion of the Head of the Branch there is no worker in the employ of the Midland Railway fully qualified and available, when he shall report to the Company, who may thereupon authorise the appointment of such person or persons, as may be deemed necessary: always provided that the Union shall receive due notice of any such proposed appointments.

- (b) No worker shall be permitted to act as fireman until he is twenty-one (21) years of age, unless in the opinion of the Head of the Branch the requirements of the service otherwise demand it.
- (3) (a) Cleaners:—No candidate for the position of cleaner shall be admitted under eighteen (18) years of age or over nineteen (19) last birthday.
- (b) Each candidate for the position of cleaner shall require:—
  - (i) to pass the Company's education test;
  - (ii) to pass an examination by the medical officer of the Company that he is free from bodily or mental infirmity, the cost of such examination to be borne by the candidate;
  - (iii) to pass the Company's test for vision, hearing, and colour-sense;
  - (iv) to supply three (3) testimonials of character from persons of good repute, Registrar's certificate of birth or extract of birth entry.

#### 8.—Rates of Pay.

#### 9.—Workers Performing Higher Duties.

- (a) A worker engaged for more than one half (½) of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift; if employed for one half (½) or less than one half (½) of one day or shift, he shall be paid the higher rate for the time actually worked: Provided, however, that acting time of less than twenty (20) minutes in any one day or shift shall not be counted: Provided further, that the conditions applicable to such higher duties shall apply.
- (b) Should any worker be required to perform work in a lower grade, his wage shall not be reduced whilst employed in such capacity.
- (c) At main depots cleaners shall not be employed on fucling or labouring work, except in cases of emergency. The raking out of aslipans of engines going on traffic on Sundays at main depots may be performed by cleaners: Provided that the work of raking out and tubing shall be done by the shed staff where such labour is now available.
- (d) Should a cleaner at a running shed be called upon to assist in washing out engines he shall be paid the minimum rate prescribed for a fireman under the conditions in subclause (a) and all time so worked shall be classed as acting firing.
- (e) A cleaner employed at an out depot who is regularly required to do raking out and tubing for 50% or more of his working time in any one year shall be supplied with one suit of overalls per annum. "Any one year" shall mean twelve (12) months from date of transfer to any out depot where this condition would apply.

#### 10 .- Agreement Not To Affect Present Wage.

Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to reduce the wage of any worker below the rate actually received by him on the date this Agreement is issued.

#### 11.-Lodging Allowance.

The following allowance shall be paid to workers covered by this Agreement booked off or temporarily lodging away from their home station:

- (a) For the first thirty (30) hours or part thereof, the sum of five (5) shillings, where attended, and six (6) shillings, where musttended barracks, are provided and seven (7) shillings where there are no barracks.
- (b) After the first thirty (30) hours and up to seven (7) days, the sum of fourpence (4d.) per hour, and thereafter threepence (3d.) per hour; provided that the reduction from fourpence (4d.) to threepence (3d.) shall only be made in eases where the worker shall be stationed for over seven (7) days in one place: Provided that a deduction of one (1) shilling per day or night, with a maximum of five (5) shillings per week, shall be made where attended barracks are provided, and a deduction of sixpence (6d.) per day or night, with a maximum of two (2) shillings and sixpence (6d.) per week, shall be made where mattended barracks are provided. No such deduction shall be made if the worker returns to his home station within forty-four (44) hours.
- (c) The allowance shall be calculated from the time of booking on to the time of booking off at home station.
- (d) A worker booked off or temporarily lodging in a district carrying an allowance shall be granted such allowance, or if already in receipt of a district allowance, shall be granted the difference between such allowance and any higher allowance applicable to the district in which he is booked off or lodging. A day's allowance to be granted for the first thirty (30) hours or any part thereof, and each subsequent twenty-four (24) hours or part thereof; time to be calculated from time of departure from home station to time of departure from foreign station.
- (e) Married workers temporarily transferred for a period exceeding three (3) months, but which is not expected to exceed six (6) months, for the purpose of meet-

ing seasonal or exceptional or temporary traffic, and not moving their permanent homes, will be paid a weekly allowance of twenty-five (25) shillings in lieu of transfer or lodging allowance to cover the excess cost of living away from their homes.

Provided that, should any other lodging allowance become due to a worker whilst transferred, such allowance, together with the allowance provided for in the foregoing paragraph, shall in no case exceed the allowance payable under subclauses (a), (b), and (d).

- (f) Where workers under the preceding subclause are employed on a series of works up and down the line and are provided with sleeping accommodation in vans, the removal of vans from one place to another will not be deemed to have altered their headquarters.
- (g) The Company may in its discretion make any allowance in addition to those provided in the foregoing subclauses, and the Head of the Branch shall also have discretion to make any such additional allowances as may under the circumstances be justified.
  - (h) The foregoing allowances will not be paid:-
  - (i) during any period of absence from duty without pay, nuless such absence is due to sickness of the worker and does not exceed one week.
  - (ii) during any period of annual leave.

#### 12.—Hamper Allowance

- (a) A driver or fireman attending at a depot with a hamper for a trip for which he is booked and which is cancelled, or who shall have received less than two (2) hours' notice of the cancellation of a trip requiring a hamper, shall be allowed 3s. in respect of such hamper.
- (b) Any worker having to proceed on an "away from home" job with less than four (4) hours notice shall be paid an amount of 3s. in addition to ordinary expenses.
- (c) Any worker notified between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. of a "book off" job requiring him to come on duty between those hours shall receive an allowance of 3s. in addition to ordinary expenses. This provision shall also apply to any worker notified of a "book off" job between 6 p.m. Saturday and 8 a.m. Monday requiring him to come on duty between these hours, and, similarly, between 6 p.m. preceding and 8 a.m. following any public holiday on which grocery and butchers' shops are closed.
- (d) When any worker is rostered for a local shift and such shift is extended by not less than one (1) hour beyond the time rostered when booking on duty, such worker shall be paid 1s. 6d. for meal allowance.

#### 13.—Sunday Away From Home Station

Workers shall not be booked away from their home station for two (2) Sundays in succession, where it can be avoided by any reasonable arrangement.

#### 14.—Payment For Travelling Time.

- (a) A worker travelling as a passenger going to work away from or returning to his home station shall be paid at ordinary rates for the actual travelling or waiting time for the first eight (8) hours and thereafter at half the ordinary rates in any one period of twenty-four (24) hours
- (b) Any fireman travelling as a passenger going out to act as a driver, or returning after having acted as a driver, and any cleaner going out to act as fireman or returning after having acted as a fireman, shall receive payment for travelling time or waiting time at the minimum rate for the higher grade.
- (c) Any worker who travels as a passenger from home depot to another depot, or *vice versa*, and is then booked off duty, and who has not been on duty prior to travelling, shall be allowed a minimum of two (2) hours from the time of booking on to the time of booking off duty.
- (d) Sunday travelling time shall be paid at the same rates and on the same conditions as on week days.
- (e) In respect of a worker who is provided with a sleeping berth in a passenger train, travelling time shall not count between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.: Provided this shall not operate to reduce the travelling time to be paid for below four (4) hours in any one day.
- (f) A worker when travelling by sea shall be entitled to first class accommodation on the boat, and to one-fourth only of the usual away-from-home allowance; travelling time shall be paid at ordinary rates; provided that not more than eight (8) hours shall be paid for his travelling time in any one period of twenty-four (24) hours.

- 15.—Payment when booked on duty and not required.

  (a) Any driver or fireman booked on duty but informed before leaving the shed with his engine that he is not required for work, and who is only called upon to attend to his engine, shall be paid one-quarter day's pay at the rate applicable to that day, but may be called upon for further duty without any further prescribed period of rest as provided for in clause 16 of this Agreement. Any driver or fireman who is booked on duty and is called upon to perform work other than attending to his engine, or who has to go out on traffic, shall be allowed not less than four (4) hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day.
- (b) Any driver or fireman booked up for duty shall not be entitled to any allowance when at least two (2) hours' notice that he is not required has been left at his place of residence or barracks, as the case may be. Written notice left with person in charge of worker's place of residence will be deemed to be notice under this subclause.
- (c) If a cleaner is brought on duty and it is found necessary before he has worked two (2) hours to book him off so that he may be available to take up duty as a fireman, he shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at the rate applicable to that day, but may be called upon for duty as fireman without the period of rest prescribed in subclause (f) of clause 16.
- (d) Any worker brought on duty shall receive four (4) hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day, except as provided for in subclauses (a), (b), and (c) hereof.
- (e) No worker shall be brought on duty on a Sunday for less than four (4) hours' work.
- (f) Any worker rostered for duty on Sunday and informed he is not required, shall be paid two (2) hours at ordinary rates: provided, however, this provision shall not apply when notice that he is not required has been left at the worker's place of residence at least two (2) hours before his rostered time for duty.

#### 16.-Minimum time off duty.

- (a) Each driver and fireman shall be allowed off duty at home station for a minimum of twelve (12) hours, and at foreign stations for a minimum of eight (8) hours, except as provided hereunder.
- (b) Enginemen leaving home station for a foreign station which may entail booking off at a number of other stations before returning to home depot, shall be booked off for twelve (12) and eight (8) hours alternatively: provided that the first booking-off may be for a minimum of eight (8) or twelve (12) hours, as the Company may require: Provided further, that unless the worker is notified to the contrary prior to leaving his home station, the first booking off shall be for a period of twelve (12) hours.
- (e) When enginemen are required to do anything apart from their rostered run, the Company to apply the alternating rest period.
- (d) In the event of a crew having been booked off at a foreign station for eight (8) hours and the Company finds it necessary to again book the same crew off on the return journey, the rest period on the second occasion to be twelve (12) hours, so that no crew will be booked off eight (8) hours twice in succession.
- (e) When relieving at a foreign station or temporarily transferred, the temporary station will, for the purpose of this clause, be treated as the home station for the first and each subsequent booking off thereat.
- (f) After a cleaner, wash-out man, wash-out man's assistant, or worker acting in that capacity has gone off duty, he shall be allowed ten (10) hours before coming on duty again: Provided that, if a worker has been employed during part of the shift as a fireman, he shall be allowed rest period specified for fireman.
- (g) When a worker is brought on duty without the prescribed period of rest, he shall be paid continuous duty as from the time he booked on on the previous shift till booking off on the shift for which he had less than the stipulated rest period, excepting where the time by which the rest period falls short of the prescribed time does not exceed sixty (60) minutes, in which case he shall be paid at the rate of double time for the time between the actual rest period and

the minimum period of rest prescribed in this Agreement: Provided that, in either case, he shall be deemed to have been booked off duty insofar as the computation of lodging allowance is concerned.

- (h) The foregoing conditions shall not apply in cases of emergency, when the attendance of a worker is required before the prescribed rest period has elapsed.
- (i) (i) The only recognised cases of emergency shall be:
  - (1) washaways or damage to the roads of such an extent as to bring about delays to trains;
  - (2) breakdown of engine or failure of engine parts, or hot boxes or ends, in which delays to traffic therefrom affects other trains;
    (3) special trains, provided there is not another worker available to work the train who has
  - had sufficient rest;
  - (4) in any cases where men booked up for duty are unable through illness to work a train and do not give sufficient notice to the foreman to enable him to get men who have had their proper period of rest.

(5) in the event of men being removed from the foot-plate for any reason, such as suspen-

sion from duty, etc.
(ii) The shed foreman shall determine as to the nature of such emergency and direct the worker concerned accordingly in writing. He shall also report each case to his next superior officer.

(iii) At out depots where there is no Loco, running section officer stationed, the station-master or other officer in charge, after consultation with a Loco. running representative at the depot station, shall direct the worker concerned in accordance with the preceding paragraph of this subclause.

(j) No worker shall be called or booked up for duty, without having the prescribed period of rest, while there is another qualified worker available who has had the prescribed rest.

(k) Each driver and fireman booked on duty after 9 p.m. and before 7 a.m. shall be called sufficiently long before coming on duty to enable him to get to the shed at the time booked.

(1) Drivers and firemen booked off duty at a foreign station where there is a caretaker at the barracks shall be called for duty irrespective of the hour booked on; at stations where there is no caretaker, they shall be called if it can be conveniently arranged.

(m) Each driver and fireman, on being booked off duty on arrival at any shed, shall come on duty again at such time, as provided hereinbefore, as he may be directed before leaving the shed, either verbally by the foreman, or by the running sheet posted at the shed, except in cases of emergency, when drivers and firemen may be called upon to resume duty at any time.

(n) Drivers and firemen booked on rostered working between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. shall, when time permits, be given four (4) hours' notice of any alternation in their warding. of any alteration in their working.

(o) Should a driver or fireman not be able to ascertain before leaving the shed at his home station, either from the foreman or from the running sheet, when he shall next be required for duty, he shall be free to assume that he will not be required for twelve (12) hours, and may make his private arrangements accordingly.

(p) Between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., each driver and fireman, after being booked off duty for twelve (12) hours, shall make personal inquiry at the shed as to when he is next required for duty, except, when booked adjusting, in which case he shall be noti-

Outside these hours he shall be notified at his place of residence at least two (2) hours before being required for duty: provided that he shall have the specified period of rest, viz., twelve (12) hours before commencing duty. Written notice left with the person in charge of worker's place of residence will be deemed to be notice under this subclause.

#### 17.—Transfers.

(a) When any transfer is ordered by the Company, the worker transferred shall not lose his right of appeal against the transfer, and if on inquiry it is found that a transfer can be arranged with another worker to suit the convenience of the Company, then he shall be retransferred. A worker transferring from one station to another over one mile distant involving a change of residence shall:-

(1) be paid not less than £4 for a married man and 15s. for a single man. (A married man who does not transfer his family shall be

paid as a single man.)

(2) be paid such further out-of-pocket expenses (if any) as the Company in its discretion shall decide to have been reasonably incurred:

- (3) be granted free passes for himself and family (including those dependents mentioned in the interpretation of "married man," and also the mother of a married man permanently residing with and wholly dependent upon him) and free railway transport of his furniture and effects, including one (1) cow and not more than two (2) goats. Where the train is provided with appropriate sleepers and the worker's journey extends through the night, he and his family shall be supplied with sleeping berths, if sleeping berth space is available;
- (4) be paid actual travelling and waiting time up to a maximum of eight (8) hours per day; no overtime rates shall apply;
- (5) married workers shall, if necessary, allowed one day for packing and one day for unpacking. (A married man who does not transfer his family shall be treated as a single man.)
- (b) Any worker who is transferred from one place to another to suit himself shall be entitled to the provisious of subclause (a), (3) only.
- (e) At least ten (10) days' notice shall be given to a worker required to permanently transfer from one station to another. A worker may be transferred without such notice: Provided that expenses as per clause 11, subclauses (a) and (b), are paid for each day by which the period of notice is less than ten (10) days. Provided, however, that the ten (10) days' notice of transfer shall not be waived unless the worker concerned is agreeable.
- (d) A worker shall not be transferred for a lesser period than three (3) months. If required to work temporarily at another depot for relief or other purposes for a lesser period, he shall be paid lodging allowance as per clause 11.

#### 18.-Holidays.

- (a) Unless by mutual agreement between the Company and the Union to the contrary, every worker shall, after twelve (12) months' continuous service, be granted two (2) weeks' leave on full pay each year, the whole of which shall be taken at the one time in each year: Provided always that, with the consent of the Company, holidays may be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years.
- (b) Drivers and firemen after twelve (12) months' service shall be allowed an additional four days' holidays
- in each year, on full pay.

  (c) Workers shall be paid for holidays at the rate of pay they are drawing at or immediately before the time when such holidays are taken,
- (d) Every worker, after one (1) month's continuous service, shall be entitled to the foregoing holidays in proportion as the length of service is to the full number of holidays for the twelve (12) months.
- (e) Every year prior to the 31st July a statement shall be posted in each shed showing the date on which each worker will go on his annual leave and resume duty, The annual leave for such worker shall be calculated up to the 30th June each year, and only leave up to that date shall be granted each year, except in cases where leave has been allowed to accumulate.
- (f) Workers are not to be booked on holidays for more than one (1) year in succession between 30th April and 1st September, except at the request of the worker. Holiday lists are not to be departed from, except for reasons of sickness, accident, or traffic requirements not foreseeable at the date of preparing lists.
- (g) With the approval of the Head of the Branch any

worker may exchange dates with another.

(h) Sunday conditions shall apply to Good Friday, Christmas Day, Labour Day (i.e., first day of May or first Monday thereafter), and one day shall be added to

the annual leave for each Good Friday or Christmas Day so worked: Provided that a worker who returns to his home station or finishes a shift at his home station not later than 4 a.m. on either of those two (2) days and is not again booked on duty that day, shall be treated as having had a paid holiday.

- (i) Unless at his own request, no worker shall be booked off for a holiday at a foreign or at his temporary home station.
- (j) No deduction shall be made from annual holidays for the period a worker is off duty, through sickness, unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months.
- (k) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause other than for peculation, shall be entitled to receive payment for any holidays which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always, that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation, no claim for holidays shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated holidays or payment therefor.

#### 19.-Extended Leave of Absence.

Any worker who has been two (2) years or more in the service of the Company may, on application be granted, in addition to annual leave, extended leave of absence without pay for a period not exceeding twelve (12) months. Failure on the part of a worker to return to his duty within the specified period of leave granted shall be regarded as a resignation and shall be so treated.

#### 20 .- Absence through Sickness.

- (a) Any worker being unable to attend to his duty through sickness, shall notify the locomotive officer on duty at least three (3) hours before the time he is booked for duty, and he shall also satisfy the locomotive officer that he is nufit to attend to his duties, and, if called upon, shall provide a medical certificate that he is unable to perform his duties through sickness.
- (b) Any worker so absent shall not again be booked up for duty, unless he notifies the locomotive officer not later than noon on any day that he is fit to resume.
- (c) Any worker losing time through sickness or special leave shall be reduced in wages only to the extent of the time actually lost through sickness or actually granted as special leave.

#### 21.—Free Passes, Privilege Tickets, etc.

#### 1. Free Passes:-

(a) After twelve (12) months' continuous service workers shall be allowed annually free passes as specified hereunder:-

All drivers and any ex-driver who has been regressed (either through reduction in the number of drivers or for physical disability) and firemen who hold drivers? certificate-

- one (1) first-class station to station pass on the occasion of the annual and/or long service leave, to cover the full term of leave due;
- two (2) first-class privilege passes from one given station to another and return.

#### All other workers-

one (1) second-class station to station pass on the occasion of the annual and/or long service leave, to cover the full term of leave due: Provided that this pass may be changed to first-class on payment by the worker of half the additional fare at ordinary rates;

two (2) first-class privilege passes from one given station to another and return, except during the Christmas and Easter holidays, when at the option of the Company the passes may be issued as second-class: Provided, however, that in the event of the worker, owing to domestic arrangements, desiring to return to his home, leaving his family at the holiday destination, the pass will be considered as available for return of the family, or a separate pass issued therefor.

In addition to the worker the passes shall be available for his wife and members of his family under eighteen (18) years of age unmarried, unmarried danghters over eighteen (18) years of age and his parents: Provided they are resident with and dependent upon him for support.

- A widower with his child or children resident with him and who regularly employs a housekeeper may, at the discretion of the Company, be granted passes for such housekeeper; in like manner, an unmarried worker supporting younger brothers and/or sisters may be granted passes for such housekeeper.
- (b) Upon request a worker may be granted a separate station to station pass for his wife and dependants as mentioned in subclause (a) hereof, where it is inconvenient for both to travel together.
- (c) Workers who have not had an opportunity of allowing their holidays to accrue owing to having taken leave on individual public holidays shall be granted their station to station pass when on special leave up to fourteen (14) days.
- (d) After six (6) months, continuous service, a worker shall be entitled to the passes mentioned in subclause (a) in proportion to length of service.

Should a worker, through illness, be unable to use his station to station pass on the occasion of his annual leave, he shall be entitled to the use of such pass on the occasion of taking leave without pay during the year in which same is due.

- (e) A worker who resigns or is retired from the service and has leave due shall be granted a free pass, station to station, for term of such holidays: Provided that, should a worker not have given the requisite notice or obtained the consent of the Company to leave the service as provided for in clause 6, he shall forfait the service as provided for in clause 6, he shall forfeit all claims to any passes he would otherwise have been entitled to under the provisions of this clause.
- (f) Workers in isolated parts may be issued free passes, at the discretion of the Head of the Branch, for the purpose of obtaining medical attention.
- (g) Workers working away from home station shall be entitled to a free pass to enable them to visit their home station at intervals of not less than once per fortnight: Provided that the work upon which they are engaged will permit of their doing so. No travelling time shall be paid: Provided also, that this clause shall not operate to increase or decrease the rate of expenses the worker would otherwise be entitled to.
- (h) Free passes shall not apply to race or hired special, guaranteed specials, or special excursion trains within a fifty (50) miles radius, or when in the opinion of the station master at the station where the worker desires to commence his journey there is not ample room on the train.

#### Market Passes:-

Workers stationed outside suburban areas will be issued market passes once per month to the market town most convenient to the Company and the worker. The passes may be issued in favour of the worker, his wife, or housekeeper, and children between the ages of five (5) and fourteen (14) years. A worker's wife or house-keeper may be granted a market pass once per fortnight, if required: Provided that the maximum number of passes granted under this subclause shall be two (2) per mouth.

#### 3. Free Freight:-

Domestic supplies up to maximum weight fortnightly of two (2) ewt. for married men and one (1) ewt. for of two (2) ewt. for married men and one (1) cwt. for single men shall be carried free by rail to home station from the market town most convenient to the Company and the worker, and, in addition, meat, bread, and vegetables, and dairy produce, when not obtainable locally, shall be carried free from the market town most convenient to the Company and the worker, where same are procurable. All such supplies must be for the sole use of the worker and his family: Provided that this concession shall not apply when any member of the worker's family conducts a boarding house or store at the home station. store at the home station.

#### 4. Market Towns:-

- (a) (i) The following shall be approved market towns:—Midland Junction, Moora, Walkaway.
  (ii) By agreement between the parties, any of the towns on the list may be omitted and any other town may be added.
- (b) A Board of Reference, appointed pursuant to the provisions of clause 37 of the Agreement, may amend or vary the above list by the omission therefrom of any town mentioned, or the addition of any other town. Such amendment or variation may be made at the request of either party and upon proof to the satis-

faction of the Board that it is just and reasonable, upon a consideration of the following facts and circum-

- (i) The price of ordinary household commodities, including clothing, ruling in the town, as compared with other places conveniently situāted :
- (ii) The number of storekeepers operating in the town or district and the competition amongst
- (iii) The district allowances, if any, of the workers
- concerned;
  (iv) Any other fact or circumstances, to be specifically set forth in the decision, which in the opinion of the Board renders an alteration desirable or necessary.

5. Privilege Tickets:-

After six (6) months' continuous service, a worker After six (6) months' continuous service, a worker shall be allowed privelege return tickets (first or second class) for himself, wife, and members of his family moder eighteen (18) years of age, also numarried daughters over eighteen (18) years of age, and his parents; provided they are resident with and dependent upon the worker's earnings. The charge for privilege tickets to be half the single fare for the return journey, with a minimum of our chilling (1s) for adults and sixpense. minimum of one shilling (1s.) for adults and sixpence

(6d.) for children.
6. For the purpose of this clause a member of the family shall be deemed to be dependent, provided such member's income does not exceed fifteen shillings (15s.) per week, exclusive of old age or invalid pension, but a member of the family temporarily out of employment shall not be deemed to be dependent.

#### 22.—Season Tickets.

Second-class season tickets at half the ordinary season ticket rates shall on application be issued to any worker to enable him to travel between the place of occupation and the station nearest to which he resides on the Company's railway.

#### 23.-Hours of Duty and Overtime Payment.

- (a) All time (exclusive of Sunday time) worked in excess of forty-four (44) hours in any one week shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.
- (b) All time worked in excess of eight (8) hours in any one shift shall be paid for as under:-

First two (2) hours—time and a quarter. Next two (2) hours—time and a half.

Thereafter-double time.

- (c) Time on which overtime rates as per subclause (b) is payable will not be subject to the extra rate provided for in subclause (a).
- (d) Time up to eight (8) hours worked between midnight on Saturday and midnight on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half, and time in excess of eight (8) hours shall be subject to subclause (b) hereof, computed according to the rate applicable to the day.
- (e) The Company shall arrange, as far as practicable, that shifts shall not exceed eight (8) hours, and, except in cases of emergency where relief cannot be provided, a worker shall not be required to remain on duty at his home or temporary home station for more than ten (10) hours. (10) hours.
- (f) Workers other than enginemen shall not be required to work more than five (5) hours without being booked off for a meal or allowed a crib time.
- (g) In the case of enginemen working on shunting engines, an interval of twenty (20) minutes for crib shall be arranged between the third and fifth hours of duty, without deduction of pay, except at Midland Junction, when shunters and enginemen work conflicting shifts, in which case the crib time shall be arranged to suit the Company.
- (h) In the case of enginemen on the road, it shall be understood that, when the running of their own train is not unduly delayed and the running of other trains which their own train may meet or cross is not interfered with, an interval of not exceeding twenty (20) minutes for crib between the third and fifth hours of duty may be taken without deduction of pay.
- (i) The Company shall guarantee to each worker a full week's work of forty-four (44) hours, exclusive of Sunday work, except during such period as by reason of any action on the part of any section of its workers, or for any other cause beyond its control, it is unable wholly or partially to carry on the running of the trains. Each week shall stand by itself.

(j) An employee of the Company (such worker to be a member of and to be nominated by the Union) shall be permitted to attend the Company's half-yearly Timetable Conferences as representative of the Union, and may take part in any discussion as to whether any particular piece of night work involved in the proposed timetable could be avoided. The worker so acting shall be paid by the Company his ordinary wages, travelling time, and expenses, as provided in this Agreement.

#### 24.—Seventh Shifts.

- (a) Six (6) shifts will constitute a week's work, except in special cases of unavoidable short runs, such special cases to be arranged between the Company and the Union.
- (b) If less than forty-four (44) hours have been worked in the six (6) shifts, the time for the six (6) shifts will be made up to forty-four (44) hours, and the seventh (7th) shift will be paid for at:—

(i) ordinary rate for time equivalent to time made up;

(ii) overtime rate for balance.

(c) Where train crews (excepting those employed on shunting engines) work a continuous shift—Sunday into Monday—such shift, unless it extends into four (4) hours on Monday, will not be counted as one of the six (6) week-day shifts.

#### 25.—Duty in Excess of Eight Hours.

Each month the Head of the Branch will, on receipt of a request from the general secretary of the Union, supply a statement showing all instances where workers have been kept on duty longer than eight (8) hours continuously.

#### 26.-Knowledge of Roads.

Should the requirements of the service necessitate that a driver shall run over a road with which he is not fully acquainted, he shall be provided with a pilotman. Such pilotman shall be either a locomotive superintendent (provided he has been a driver in the Company's railway service), a locomotive inspector, driver, or fireman authorised to drive. In cases where a driver is removed from one depot to another, he shall be given facilities to learn the road without loss of his driver's pay.

#### 27.—Examination.

- (a) Each driver, fireman, or cleaner who is called on for examination shall have fourteen (14) days' notice of the date on which he will be examined and sample questions given for each subject.
- (b) Each candidate shall be allowed to try three (3) times, at intervals not exceeding four (4) months. If he does not pass, a further trial shall be allowed at the expiration of twelve (12) months from the previous examination. If then unsuccessful he shall be considered to have finally failed.
- (c) All questions shall be put clearly and without ambiguity, and each candidate shall be allowed all reasonable latitude in asking the examiner to make each question clear; and a driver (a member of the Union) shall be present at all viva voce examinations, but he shall not in any way interfere with or interpose in the conduct of the proceedings.
- (d) The candidate who fails to pass his examination shall be furnished with a copy of the questions he failed to answer correctly.
- (e) A worker who has lost his seniority through failing to pass the examination shall, on subsequently passing, be classified next to the worker who passed examination previously to him.
- (f) The examiner shall be appointed by the Head of the Branch, to whom he shall report fully the result of such examination, and the decision of the Head of the Branch shall be final.

#### 28.—Preparing and Stabling Engines.

(a) Each driver and fireman shall, if required to do the work, be granted the following allowance for preparing and stabling engines over and above the time required by the Traffic Branch:—

Preparing:

Main line engines—45 minutes. (To apply to shunting engines prepared for running on main lines.)

Where engines have been prepared by workers other than the enginemen who are booked to work them—15 minutes.

Shunting engines-30 minutes.

Stabling:

All engines-30 minutes.

- (b) When stabling engines at out stations (that is, where less than six (6) engines are stabled), a half-hour extra shall be allowed the fireman for banking fire, or cleaning fire, ashpan, and smoke-box.
- (c) When a fireman has to raise steam in a boiler at a foreign depot, he shall be allowed two (2) hours in addition to ordinary preparing time, in the case of a cold boiler, and one (1) and a half (½) hours in the case of a warm boiler; a boiler which has been out of traffic for twenty-four (24) hours shall be regarded as a cold boiler.
- (d) Provided, that the Company may relieve drivers and firemen from duties of preparation and stabling and employ other workers, who are qualified drivers and firemen, to carry out such duties.

#### 29.-Special Shed Duty.

- (a) At sheds where six (6) or more engines are stabled, the duties of cleaners shall be to clean engines, clean fronts, light up engines, attend to water and steam as may be arranged and directed by the officer in charge.
- (b) The duties of drivers and firemen where six (6) or more engines are stabled, when stabling engines, shall be to turn engines, examine engines over pit, take water, lock away all tools, and place engine for coal or in shed, as the case may be, and leave boiler and fire in a safe condition. The fireman shall keep all cab fittings, etc., on the foot-plate in a clean condition from the time of leaving the shed until return thereto.
- (c) At sheds where less than six (6) engines are stabled, the duties of cleaners shall be to clean engines, light-up, attend to water, and steam. Cleaners may also be used for fueling or other work, subject to the conditions of cleanes 9 (a).
- (d) Cleaners working with shed drivers employed in marshalling engines at principal depots shall be paid fireman's rate of pay; this duty to be called "shed firing."
- (e) At sheds where less than six (6) engines are stabled, the duties of the fireman will be to clean out smoke-boxes and ashpans, clean fronts, and keep all fittings, etc., on the foot-plate clean, take coal and water, bank fires. After a fireman has been on duty for more than eight (8) hours, he shall be relieved of the duty of cleaning fires, smoke-boxes, and ashpans, unless the case is one of emergency and it is not possible, in the circumstances, for other arrangements to be made to carry out such work.
- (f) At sheds where less than six (6) engines are stabled the duties of the drivers will be to turn engines, examine engines over pits, put engines in position to take coal and water, and stable engines.
- (g) In addition to the foregoing, drivers and firemen, when stabling engines may, provided they have not been on duty in excess of eight (8) hours, be called upon to perform any other duty appertaining to their respective grades, and time allowance shall be made for so much of work as cannot be performed in the period allowed for stabling.
- (h) The work of cleaning fires and ashpans of engines going into locomotive depots shall be done by the shed staff where such labour is now available.

#### 30.—Discipline.

The Head of the Branch shall have power to reprimand, fine, suspend from duty, reduce in grade, or dismiss any worker, and to remove any driver or fireman from a locomotive foot-plate: Provided always, that the notification to a worker of any such action shall be in writing, and shall state the reason for same being taken.

#### 31.—Charges against Workers.

(a) Each worker shall himself provide, when called upon, with the least possible delay, any report or statement which may be required by the officer in charge.

- (b) When a worker against whom a charge is pending has made a statement to an officer in charge, and which statement the officer in charge has taken down in writing, such worker shall either be furnished with a copy of such statement or be allowed to take a copy of it.
- (c) If in the opinion of the foreman the action of any worker should be reported to the Head of the Branch, it shall be done:—
  - (i) where a worker is stationed at a main depot—within seven (7) days of the foreman's first knowledge of the occurrence; for the purpose of this clause a main depot shall be any depot where a loco. superintendent or loco. shed foreman is stationed:

foreman is stationed;

(ii) where the worker is stationed at a sub-depot—
within ten (10) days of the first knowledge
of the occurrence by the person in charge of
such sub-depot.

The worker shall at the same time be notified by the foreman that he is reported, otherwise such report shall be null and void: Provided that, when a worker reports on his daily running sheet an irregularity or other occurrence in which he is concerned to the Company, it shall not be necessary for the foreman to notify such worker that he has been reported to the Head of the Branch, but if the worker in such cases is to be charged, the foreman must so notify the worker within twenty-one (21) days of the receipt of the daily running sheet. When a charge has been made against any worker, he shall be supplied with a copy of such charge and any reports upon which it is based.

(d) If a final decision in any case in which a charge has been made against a worker be not given within three (3) calendar months of the occurrence first coming to the knowledge of the Head of the Branch, the charge in question shall lapse.

#### 32.—Secretary's Leave and Passes.

The Company will grant leave, without pay, for a continuous period or otherwise of thirty (30) days in each year to the secretary (should such secretary be a railway servant) to enable him to attend exclusively to the Union work, and a free pass will be issued to the secretary, whether a railway servant or not, for that period, but may be withdrawn at the Company's discretion, such pass to be used exclusively for Union work and not for political purposes.

#### 33.—Union Notices.

Notices relating to meetings or classes in connection with the Union shall be allowed to be exhibited at such places as may be approved by the Company.

#### 34.—Seniority List.

The seniority of the workers is in accordance with the position in which their respective names appear on the list submitted by the petitioners with their petition.

#### 35.—Appeal.

Any worker fined, reduced to a lower class, grade, or dismissed, shall have the right of appeal, and such appeal shall be dealt with by the Appeal Board, constituted as follows:—His immediate head and an employee of his particular Branch, with the general superintendent as chairman, and at the hearing of such appeal the Union shall be represented by the general secretary.

#### 36.—Preference to Unionists.

Preference shall be given to Unionists with regard to employment, except in the case of cleaners, who shall be required to make application for membership of the Union immediately on being engaged by the Company.

#### 37.-Board of Reference.

The Court may appoint for the purpose of this Agreement, a Board or Boards of reference. A Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) representatives, one nominated by each party. The function of a Board of Reference shall be:—

- (a) to settle disputes at to matters under this Agreement, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the agreement;
- (b) classifying and fixing wages of any designation, occupation, or calling not specifically provided for in the Agreement;

(c) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

Separate Boards may be appointed where deemed necessary or advisable, for different branches of the industry or for different districts.

#### 38.—Alterations and Additions.
