THE STAMP ACT, 1921-1931.

Treasury Department, Perth, 5th January, 1942.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, acting pursuant to the provisions of section 120 of the Stamp Act, 1921-1931, has been pleased to amend the Stamp Regulations, 1922, as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 13th day of April, 1922, and amended by notice published in the *Government Gazette* from time to time thereafter, in the manner set forth in the Schedule hereunder.

Schedule.

The abovementioned regulations are amended as follows:-

1. Regulation 7 is amended by inserting after paragraph (4) thereof a new paragraph, to stand as paragraph (5), as follows:-

(5) Any company, firm, or person receiving approval to submit a monthly return in accordance with the provisions of regulation 7A.

2. A new regulation, to stand as regulation 7A, is inserted after regulation 7, us follows :----

Alternative to Individual Stamping of Instruments.

7A. (1) The Commissioner may approve of any company, firm, or person, making monthly payments of the stamp duty payable on instruments in lieu of the individual stamping of such instruments.

(2) When this method of payment is approved, a return in duplicate, containing such information as the Commissioner may require, and verified by statutory declara-tion, together with a remittance for the amount of stamp duty payable, shall be furnished to the Commissioner by the company, firm, or person to whom approval was given immediately after the close of each and every month.

(3) The Commissioner shall impress stamps, to the value of the remittance, on one copy of the return.

By-laws of the Moora Road Board relating to the establishment, maintenance and equipment of Bush Fire Brigades for the Road District of Moora.

Establishment of Brigade.

1. On the resolution of the Board to establish, main-1. On the resolution of the Board to establish, main-tain and equip a Bush Fire Brigade under the provisions of the Bush Fires Act, 1937, and regulations thereunder, the Brigade shall he formed in accordance with these by-laws; and a name shall he given to the Brigade and application accompanied by a copy of these by-laws shall be made to the Minister for Lands for its regis-tuation accordingly. tration accordingly.

A Bush Fire Brigade may be established for the whole A Bush Fire Brigade may be established for the whole of the road district or for any specified area thereof. Provided that, unless the resolution of the Board estab-lishing a Bush Fire Brigade specifies therein only a part of the district as the area for which such Brigade is established, the Brigade shall be deemed to be estab-lished for the whole of the suid road district.

Appointment of Officers.

2. The Board shall appoint a captain, a first lientenant, a second licatement and such additional licatem-ants as it shall deem necessary to act as officers of the Brigade, and who, in the Board's opinion, have the necessary qualification and knowledge of the district re-quired in such capacities.

3. The secretary of the Board or such other person as the Board may appoint, shall be the secretary of the Brigade.

4. The Board may appoint an Equipment Officer who shall be responsible for the custody and maintenance in good order and condition of all equipment and ap-pliances acquired by the Board for the purposes of the Brigade. Such afficer may station such equipment at a depot approved by the captain where, if possible, motor trucks can easily be called upon. If there are were then one such denots in the user, the Equipment more than one such depots in the area, the Equipment Officer shall appoint at each depot a person to look after the equipment and have it ready for immediate use when required.

5. The Board shall appoint Bush Fire Control Officers in accordance with the requirements of the district and may prescribe the area over which each such officer shall have jurisdiction. The employment, dismissal and payment for services of persons (other than officers) employed for duties under this Act, shall be vested in the chairman and secretary of the Board conjointly.

Duties of Officers.

6. The duties of all officers appointed under these by-laws shall be as laid down in the provisions of the Bush Fires Act, 1937, and each officer so appointed shall be supplied with a copy of the Act and regula-tions. The captain shall have full control over the members of the Brigades whilst engaged in fire fight-ing and shall issue instructions as to the methods to be edented by the former. Membership of Brigade.

7. (1) The membership of a Bush Fire Brigade may eonsist of the following:—(a) Subscribing members; (b) Fire fighting members; and (c) Associate members.

(2) Subscribing members shall be those persons who, being interested in forwarding the objects of the Brigade, pay an annual subscription to the funds of the Brigade at the following rates :-

of (3) Fire fighting members shall be those persons, being able-bodied men over 18 years of age who are willing to render service at any bush fire when ealled upon, and who sign an undertaking in the form con-tained in the First Schedule to these by-laws.

(4) Associate members shall be those persons who are willing to supply free motor transport for fire fighters or equipment, or are prepared to render other approved assistance, and who sign an undertaking in the form contained in the Second Schedule to these by-laws.

(5) No fees or subscriptions shall be payable either by fire fighting members or associate members, and the enrolment of persons as such members shall in every ease be subject to the approval of the Board.

(6) A subscribing member shall be eligible for en-rolment as a fire fighting member.

Finance.

8. The expenditure incurred by the Board in the c. The expenditure hearred by the Board in the purchase of equipment, etc., payment for services and generally for the purposes of this Acet, shall be a charge on the ordinary revenne of the Board, but the secretary shall keep a separate record of the expendi-ture incurred under this Act.

Meetings of Brigade.

BUSH FIRES ACT, 1937.

By-laws of the Bunbury Road Board relating to the Establishment, Maintenance, and Equipment of Bush Fire Brigades for the Road District of Bunbury.

Establishment of Brigade.

1. On the resolution of the Board to establish, maintain, and equip a Bush Fire Brigade under the provi-sions of the Bush Fires Act, 1937, and regulations thereunder, the Brigade shall be formed in accordance with these by-laws, and a name shall be given to the Brigade and application, accompanied by a copy of these by-laws, shall be made to the Minister for Lands for its registration accordingly.

A Bush Fire Brigade may be established for the whole of the road district or for any specified area thereof: Provided that, nuless the resolution of the Board establishing a Bush Fire Brigade specifies therein only a part of the district as the area for which such Brigade is established, the Brigade shall be deemed to be established for the whole of the said road district.

Appointment of Officers.

2. The Board shall appoint a captain, a first lieuten-ant, a second lieutenant, and such additional lieuten-ants as it shall deem necessary to act as officers of the Brigade, and who in the Board's opinion have the necessary qualification and knowledge of the district required in such capacities.

3. The secretary of the Board, or such other per-son as the Board may appoint, shall be the secretary of the Brigade.

of the Brigade. 4. The Board may appoint an Equipment Officer, who shall be responsible for the custody and mainten-ance in good order and condition of all equipment and appliances acquired by the Board for the purposes of the Brigade. Such officer may station such equipment at a depot approved by the captain, where, if possible, motor trucks can easily be called upon. If there are more than one such depots in the area, the Equipment Officer shall appoint at each depot a person to look after the equipment and have it ready for immediate me when reduired. nse when required.

5. The Board shall appoint Bush Fire Control Officers in accordance with the requirements of the dis-trict and may prescribe the area over which each such officer shall have jurisdiction. The employment, dis-missal, and payment for services of persons (other than officers) employed for duties under this Act shall be vested in the chairman and secretary of the Board conjointly.

Duties of Officers.

6. The duties of all officers appointed under these by-laws shall be as laid down in the provisions of the Bash Fires Act, 1937, and each officer so appointed shall be supplied with a copy of the Act and regulations. (3) Fire-fighting members shall be those persons, being able-bodied men over 18 years of age who are willing to render service at any bush fire when called npon, and who sign an undertaking in the form con-tained in the First Schedule to these by-laws.

(4) Associate members shall be those persons who are willing to supply free motor transport for fire-fighters or equipment, or are prepared to render other approved assistance, and who sign an undertaking in the form contained in the Second Schedule to these bv-luvs.

(5) No fees or subscriptions shall be payable either by fire-fighting members or associate members, and the enrolment of persons as such members shall in every ease be subject to the approval of the Board.

(6) A subscribing member shall be eligible for enrolment as a fire-fighting member.

Finance.

8. The expenditure incurred by the Board in the generally for the purposes of this Act, shall be a charge on the ordinary revenue of the Board, but the secretary shall keep a separate record of the expenditure incurred under this Act.

Meetings of Brigade.

9. At least two meetings shall be held in each year, one in November and one in January.

BUSH FIRES ACT, 1937.

By-laws of the Nammp Road Board relating to the Establishment, Maintenance, and Equipment of Bush Fire Brigades for the Road District of Namup.

Establishment of Brigade.

1. On the resolution of the Board to establish, maintain and equip a Bush Fire Brigade number the provisions of the Bush Fires Act, 1937, and regulations therenumber, the Brigade shall be formed in accordance with these by-laws; and a name shall he given to the Brigade and application accompanied by a copy of these by-laws shall be made to the Minister for Lambs for its registration accordingly.

A bush fire brigade may be established for the whole of the road district or for any specified area thereof. Provided that, unless the resolution of the Board establishing a bush fire hrigade specifies therein only a part of the district as the area for which such brigade is established, the brigade shall be deemed to be established for the whole of the said road district.

Appointment of Officers.

2. The Board shall appoint a captain, a first licatemant, a second licatemant, and such additional licatemants as it shall deem necessary to act as officers of the Brigade, and who in the Board's opinion have the necessary qualifications and knowledge of the district required in such capacities.

3. The secretary of the Board, or such other person as the Board may appoint, shall be the secretary of the Brigade.

4. The Board may appoint an Equipment Offirer, who shall be responsible for the enstody and maintenance in good order and condition of all equipment and appliances acquired by the Board for the purposes of the Brigade. Such officer may station such equipment at a deput approved by the captain, where, if possible, motor trucks can easily be called upon. If there are more than one such depots in the area, the Equipment Officer shall appoint at each depot a person to look after the equipment and have it ready for immediate use when required.

5. The Board shall appoint Bush Fire Control Officers in accordance with the requirements of the district and may prescribe the area over which each such officer shall have jurisdiction. The employment, dismissal, and payment for services of persons (other than officers) employed for duties under this Act shall be vested in the chairman and secretary of the Board conjointly.

Duties of Officers.

6. The inities of all officers appointed under these by-laws shall be as laid down in the provisions of the Bush Fires Act, 1937, and each officer so appointed shall be supplied with a copy of the Act and regulations. The captain shall have full control over the members of the Brigade whilst engaged in fire-fighting, and shall issue instructions as to the methols to be allopted by the firemen. In the absence of the raptain, the first lientemant, and, in the absence of the first, the second lientemant or senior officer of the Brigale present at the fire, shall exercise all the power and duties of the captain. The captain shall, when so directed by the Board, instruct all land owners or occupiers to plough a break or breaks on all cleared land or land under pasture.

Membership of Brigade.

7. (1) The membership of a Bush Fire Brigade may eonsist of the following:—(a) Subscribing members;
(b) fire-fighting members, and (c) associate members.

(3) Fire-fighting members shall be those persons, being able-bodied men over 18 years of age who are willing to remier service at any bush fire when called upon, and who sign an undertaking in the form contained in the First Schedule to these by-laws.

(4) Associate members shall be those persons who are willing to supply free motor transport for firefighters or equipment, or are prepared to render other approved assistance, and who sign an undertaking in the form rentained in the Second Scheilnle to these by-laws.

(5) No fees or subscriptions shall be payable either by fire-fighting members or associate members, and the enrolment of persons as such members shall in every ruse be subject to the approval of the Board.

(6) A subscribing number shall be eligible for enrolment as a fire-fighting member.

Finance.

8. The expenditure incurred by the Bourd in the purchase of equipment, etc., payment for services and generally for the purposes of this Art, shall be a charge on the ordinary revenue of the Board, but the secretary shall keep a separate record of the expenditure incurred nuller this Act.

Meetings of Brighter.

9. To be called when deemed necessary.

These by-laws, number the Bush Fires Act, 1937, were passed by a resolution of the Nannup Road Board (a local authority number the provisions of such Act) at a numeting held at Nannup on 25th January, 1941.

Establishment of Brigade.

1. On the resolution of the Board to establish, main-1. On the resolution of the Board to establish, man-tain, and equip a Bush Fire Brigade under the provi-sions of the Bush Fires Act, 1937, and regulations thereunder, the Brigade shall be formed in accordance with these by-laws, and a name shall be given to the Brigade and application, accompanied by a copy of these by-laws, shall be made to the Minister for Lands for its registration accordingly. its registration accordingly.

A Bush Fire Brigade may be established for the whole of the road district or for any specified area thereof: Provided that, nuless the resolution of the Board establishing a Bush Fire Brigade specifies therein only a part of the district as the area for which such Brigade is established, the Brigade shall be deemed to be established for the whole of the said road district.

Appointment of Officers.

2. The Board shall appoint a captain, a first licutenant, a second lientenant, and such additional lienten-ants as it shall deem necessary to act as officers of the Brigade, and who in the Board's opinion have the necessary qualification and knowledge of the district required in such capacities.

3. The secretary of the Board, or such other per-son as the Board may appoint, shall be the secretary of the Brigade.

4. The Board may appoint an Equipment Officer, who shall be responsible for the custody and maintenance in good order and condition of all equipment and ance in good order and condition of all equipment and appliances acquired by the Board for the jurposes of the Brigade. Such officer may station such equipment at a depot approved by the captain, where, if possible, motor trucks can easily be called upon. If there are more than one such depots in the area, the Equipment Officer shall appoint at each depot a person to look after the equipment and have it ready for immediate use when required. use when required.

5. The Board shall appoint Bush Fire Control Officers in accordance with the requirements of the district and may prescribe the area over which each such officer shall have jurisdiction. The employment, dis-missal, and payment for services of persons (other than officers) employed for duties under this Act shall be vested in the chairman and secretary of the Board conjointly.

Duties of Officers.

6. The duties of all officers appointed under these by-laws shall be as laid down in the provisions of the Bush Fires Act, 1937, and each officer so appointed shall be supplied with a copy of the Act and regulations. The captain shall have full control over the members The captain shall have full control over the members of the Brigade whilst engaged in fire-fighting, and shall issue instructions as to the methods to be adopted by the firemen. In the absence of the captain, the first lieutenant, and, in the absence of the first, the second lieutenant or senior officer of the Brigade present at the fire, shall exercise all the power and duties of the captain. The captain shall, when so directed by the Board, instruct all hand owners or occupiers to plough Board, instruct all land owners or occupiers to plough a break or breaks on all cleared land or land under pasture.

Membership of Brigade.

7. (1) The membership of a Bush Fire Brigade may consist of the following:—(a) Subscribing members;
(b) fire-fighting members, and (c) associate members.

(4) Associate members shall be those persons who arc willing to supply free motor transport for fire-fighters or equipment, or are prepared to render other approved assistance, and who sign an undertaking in the form contained in the Second Schedule to these by-laws.

(5) No fees or subscriptions shall be payable either by fire-fighting members or associate members, and the enrolment of persons as such members shall in every case be subject to the approval of the Board.

(6) A subscribing member shall be eligible for enrolment as a fire-fighting member.

Finance.

8. The expenditure incurred by the Board in the purchase of equipment, etc., payment for services and generally for the purposes of this Act, shall be a charge on the ordinary revenue of the Board, but the secretary shall keep a separate record of the expenditure incurred under this Act.

Meetings of Brigade.

9. To be called when deemed necessary.

(c) "Timberman" shall mean a worker who hangs centres and fixes sets and poles off laths, lays keels, fixes frames, or lays decking, or who is employed hand-ling timber in shafts when buildings are being underpinned.

2.-Area and Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers who are chigible for mem-Lins Award shan apply to workers who are englole for mem-bership in the applicant union and who are employed by the respondents throughout the State on the following classes of work ; provided it shall not apply to workers covered by any other Award of the Court of Arbitration or any Industrial Agreement registered under the Inclustrial Arbitration Act, 1912-35 :--

- (a) Railway construction.
- (b) Roads and bridges construction.
- (c) Country water supply, drainage and irrigation construction, excepting any work comprised in or connected with the Mundaring-Kalgoorlic water supply undertaking, or the Metropolitan water supply, sewerage, and drainage undertaking.
- (d) Land clearing.

3.-Payment of Fares and Sustenance Allowance.

(a) The department shall pay railway and other transport fares, or shall provide transport free of charge from the place of engagement to the place of work, and when the workers' services are terminated because there is no further work available return fares or transport to place of engagement shall also be paid or be provided by the department; pro-vided that, in the event of any worker leaving the work of his own accord, or being dismissed on account of misconduct or musatisfactory work, within six (6) weeks of time of engage-ment, the amount of the fare to the job may be deducted from any amounts due to such worker at the time of dis-missal, and he shall forfeit privileges of free return to place of engagement. (a) The department shall pay railway and other transport of engagement.

(b) Notwithstanding the above, the transport conditions now operating in regard to part-time sustemance workers shall continue in regard to such workers whilst the present working conditions of such workers are in force.

4.—Accidents, Transportation, etc.

In cases of accident the department shall pay the railway and any other transportation fare of the injured worker to the nearest hospital town : Provided that, when it is deemed nearest nospital town: provided that, when it is declined necessary by the officer in charge or garger that an attendant shall accompany an injured person, the department shall not only pay him the transportation fare but also pay his wage, not exceeding eight (8) hours per day, for the actual time occupied on the journey.

5.—Payment of Wages.

(a) Workers when discharged or who resign during or on completion of the work shall be paid wages due by eash or cash order, and, as far as practicable, the wages shall be paid at the particular place where such worker has been working.

(b) When a worker has been discharged or has resigned, he shall be paid the wages due within twenty-four (24) hours after the timekeeper has been notified of such discharge or ro-signation, or twenty-four (24) hours after the worker has ar-rived at the main camp, and for all working time during which workers are kept waiting for their wages beyond such twenty-four (24) hours they shall be paid at ordinary rates.

6.-Hours.

Subject, and except as hereinafter provided, the ordinary working hours shall not exceed eight (8) hours on Monday. Thesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and four (4) on Saturday: Provided that, with the approval of the parties. the working week of forty-four (44) hours may be worked from Monday to Friday inclusive.

Provided that, at the discretion of the officer in charge, Provided that, at the discretion of the onder in charge, the hours to be worked on railway construction during the time a locomotive is in use shall be spread over six (6) days of eight (8) hours each and five (5) days of eight (8) hours each, in alternate weeks; Saturday to be the off day in the five (5)-day week. This proviso shall apply only to workers whose work is dependent upon the work of the loco.

7.-Overtime.

(a) All time worked outside of or in excess of the usual hours shall be paid, for the first four (4) hours after the usual stopping time-time and a half, and thereafter double time ; provided that workers called to start work within one hour and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ of the usual starting time shall be paid at time and a half nutil the usual starting time.

(b) Double time shall be paid for work required to be done on Sundays, excepting to seven-day a week men, and excepting shift workers commencing not earlier than 11 p.m. on Sunday night to suit transport facilities.

(c) Double time shall be paid for all work done on Good Friday, Labour Day, and Christmas Day, and there shall be no deduction from accrued holidays in regard to workers required to work on any of the said holidays.

(d) Except as hereinafter provided, all work performed during the recognised meal hour shall be paid at time and a half, and such rate shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.

- (c) The exceptions referred to above are as follows :----(1) Powder-monkeys and their assistants.
 - (2) Workers engaged not more than 15 minutes immediately after the commencement of the usual hunch period on some process in course (e.g., concreting).
 - (3) Workers engaged on emergency repairs to plant, etc., or other essential emergency work, to enable the job to restart at the expiration of the hinch hour.
 - (4) Shift workers.
 - (5) Horse hivers performing duties covered by their attendance allowance.
 - Workers who ordinarily have their hinch whilst working (e.g., pumpers unwatering trenches).
 - (7) Workers on ballast or material trains. (8) A worker who is engaged continuously for more than five (5) consecutive days between the hours of 12 noon and 1 p.m. or any usual meal hours on afternoon or night shifts : Provided the hinch hour is taken between 11 a.m. and 2

p.m., at the same regular hour each day.

8.-Hohdavs.

Workers, including part-time workers but excluding casuals, shall receive, inclusive of all public holidays taken, holiday pay equivalent to one (1) days' pay of eight (8) hours for each month of continuous service, and the proportion of a day's pay for a broken period of a month, including any Sundays occurr-ing in such broken period, calculated on the basis of the days in the month in which payment is made. At each Christmas time all paid holidays then due shall be taken. Absence from work for any of the following reasons shall not break contin-nity of service and the periods shall be considered as service uity of service and the periods shall be considered as service for the purpose of this clause only :

(a) Temporary stoppage of work for the Christmas or Easter holidays: Provided the worker reports for duty on the date fixed for resumption of work.

- (b) Inelemency of the weather, provided the worker is ready and willing to work, if easied upon.
- (c) Leave granted by the officer in charge or ganger on account of illness or special necessity up to a period not exceeding six (6) days in any one year or absence up to one (1) month whilst drawing compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.
- (d) Periods occupied in proceeding from job to job as provided in clause 12 (h) of this Award.
- (e) Gangers shall be paid at ordinary rates for enforced idleness at Christmas or Easter. Those whose length of service entitled them to holiday pay at the Christmas closing down shall only be paid for such accrued holidays and for the period idle in excess of such holidays. Holidays shall accrue in accordance with this clause : Provided, however, that Good Friday, Labour Day, and Christmas Day only shall be deducted from accrued holidays.
- (f) Workers specifically engaged on a seven-day week basis shall have their holidays calculated on a basis of two (2) weeks of seven (7) days at the completion of twelve (12) months' continuous service, and pro rata for lesser service.

9.-Horse Drivers.

Workers engaged as horse chivers shall, if required, in their own time feed and groom their horses, grease their drays, and attend to the harness, and for so doing they shall be entitled to an allowance at the rate of 6s, per week for the first horse and 3s, per week for each additional horse up to a maximum of 15s, per week, provided :---

- (a) that any horse driver engaged for less than a week shall receive proportionate payment for the extra time allowed for grooming and feeding his horses, and for greasing his dray, and for attending to his harness;
- (b) that when a stableman is employed the allowance to horse drivers shall be reduced to an amount equal to two-thirds of the above allowance per week, and a proportionate amount for a lesser period at ordinary rates;
- (c) a stableman's duty shall consist of feeding and watering the horses and of attending to the supply of fodder and other horse and stable requisites.

For any wet day on which a horse driver performs duties other than those specified in the first paragraph of this clanse he shall be paid on the following hosis :--

Time actually worked—ordinary rate.

Time prior to and after ceasing work-half ordinary rate.

Provided the total hours paid for shall not exceed those comprising the ordinary working hours for the particular day worked.

10.-Wet Places.

Workers while working in wet places shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day in addition to the rate prescribed. Wet places shall mean places where the water is over the worker's ankles or top of gnm hoots when provided, or where in performing the work the splashing of the water and nud saturntes their clothing. or where protection is not provided to prevent splashing or drippings sufficient to saturate their clothing. The officer in charge, foreman or ganger shall decide whether a place is a " wet place" within the meaning of this clanse.

11.-Walking Time.

(a) Workers shall be paid at ordinary rates for time occupied in walking from camp to work : Provided that time so allowed shall not exceed twenty (20) minutes per mile : Provided also that during the months of September to April, inclusive, when the distance exceeds two (2) miles, and during the months of May to Angust, inclusive, when the distance exceeds one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ miles, a similar allowance shall be allowed for the distance in exceess of the two (2) miles and the one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ miles respectively for return to camp.

(b) Pokers ont on ballast train shall be paid at ordinary rates from the time the train leaves the camp until it returns thereto, less the time allowed for the mid-day meal : Provided that, in the event of the train not returning to the camp within a reasonable time, the department reserves to itself the right to return the men by trolley or other means.

(c) Workers who are required to propel the trolley on which they ride to and from work shall travel both ways in the department's time.

12.—Payment for Pitching, Striking, and Removing Camp. (a) Workers shall be paid at ordinary rates for actual time taken in pitching (including the first pitching), striking, and removing camp. (b) Provided that, when a worker on a work is paid off and is offered and accepts re-engagement on another work, he shall be paid for the time taken in getting to the new job up to a maximum of eight (8) hours at the rate he was receiving at the time he finished the old job, and further, provided that the worker shall travel to the new work as directed by the department.

13.-Medicine Chest.

The department shall provide an efficiently equipped medicine ehest for each work, and a first aid chest shall be kept at the place where work is proceeding.

14.-Water Supply.

The department shall provide potable water for workers and for anthorised hoarding houses. Tanks shall be fitted with taps. Boiling water shall also be provided by the department for workers' mid-day meal.

15.-Delivery of Stores.

The respective department shall cart and deliver to camp the workers' stores as required by the workers : Provided that when such stores are delivered by local storekeepers at the request of the department, the cost of delivery, if any, to the workers shall be paid by the department. The department shall not be liable for loss or damage of stores during transport.

16.-Tools.

All tools required by labourers and necessary for the work shall be provided at the cost of the department, and such tools shall be satisfactorily accounted for when required.

17.—Accommodation.

(a) Where workers in the performance of their work have to camp out, the department shall supply sufficient tent accommodation on each job to properly house the men employed.

Rent for tents shall he as under :---

- Size 6 x 8 (one man only) ... 6d. per week Size 8 x 10 (occupied by one man at his
- own request) 8d. per week Size 8 x 10 (if two men) each ... 4d. per week Size 10 x 12 (for married comples only) ... 1s. per week

Sizes of tents—The principle of supplying each worker with a 6 x 8 tent and married couples with a 10 x 12 tent is approved, and will be given effect to as fresh supplies of tents are obtained.

(b) On construction works where ten (10) or more men are employed outside cities or towns, the department shall on the application of not less than ten (10) employees, supply, free of charge, sufficient tarpanlins, trestles, 12 in. boards for tables, stools, or forms, and cooking and dining utensils for a ranch.

(c) Every such ranch shall have a committee of management, appointed by the workers, whose names shall be notified from time to time to the officer in charge of the particular work, and such committee shall be personally responsible for the loss or damage to any of the articles supplied to the ranch by the department, fair wear and tear excepted, and the committee shall return them.

(d) The ercetion of ranches shall be done in the department's time.

(c) Where no boarding honse or ranch is provided the department shall supply, if required, one sheet of 8 ft. galvanised iron for the use of each worker.

18.—Sanitary Service.

An efficient sanitary service shall be instituted and maintained by the department on each work.

19.-Mixed Functions.

(a) Any worker carrying ont work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate for two (2) hours in any shift shall be paid at the minimum rate for such work for the whole of that shift: Provided that such minimum is not lower than such worker's regular rate of pay. If he be employed for less than two (2) hours at work classified at a higher minimum than his ordinary rate, he shall be puid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.

(b) A worker's regular rate of pay shall not be reduced whilst he is temporarily employed at work classified with a lower minimum, owing to shortage of material occasioned by the department's default, or for any other cause within the control of the department.

(c) Tool sharpeners, powder-monkeys, and plonghmen when employed intermittently on such classes of work shall receive the wage prescribed for tool sharpeners, powder-monkeys, and plonghmen, as the case may be; provided they are employed on such classes of work during any portion of a week (Monday to Saturday). If not employed on such classes of work for any portion of a week they shall be paid for the class of work actually performed.

20.-Water Bags and Firewood.

The department shall provide, free of charge, on each work, water bags which in the opinion of the officer in charge are suitable. Firewood shall be supplied free of charge, where considered necessary by the officer in charge.

21.-General Application of Wages Schedule.

The rate to be paid for any class of labour omitted from the Schedule or any section of work covered by this Award shall be that provided under any other Schedule of this Award for similar work.

22.-New Classifications.

The future rate for any class of labour not specifically mentioned in any of the Schedules of this Award shall be fixed by mutual arrangement between the parties hereto, and, failing agreement, by the Board of Reference : Provided, however, that the rate so fixed shall, if the date from which it is to take effect has not been agreed upon, be determined by the Board of Reference.

23 -Van for Plate-Laying.

The department shall provide a van for conveying platelayers to and from work.

24.—Protection from Weather.

Suitable tarpaulins shall be supplied by the department for men travelling to and from camp to work per motor truck during winter months.

25.-Casual Workers.

A "casual" worker is one for whom less than one (1) week's continuous work is provided by the department. Cas-nal workers shall be entitled to receive ten per cent. (10%) in excess of the rate prescribed for their class of work : Pro-vided that no penalty rate shall be payable in cases where the worker is employed regularly for less than one (1) week continuously, owing to his being employed under the part-time or rationed system.

26.-Shift Work.

(a) In connection with shift work jobs the first shift in two-shift work shall work eight (8) hours, not including any crib-time; all other shifts shall be of eight (8) hours, including half $(\frac{1}{2})$ an hour crib-time, *i.e.*, $7\frac{1}{2}$ hours actual working time.

(b) Workers employed on night shift (from 5 p.m. to 7.30 (b) workers employed on light sink (non 5 p.m. to 7.50 a.m. without rotation) in dismantling the receptacles known as "cement boxes," or in preparing fresh boxes to receive the concrete mixture shall be paid one shilling (1/-) per shift above the basic wage.

27.-Preference.

Preference of employment in respect of the classes of workers covered by this Award shall be given to financial members of the A.W.U.: Provided that any worker or applicant for employment who is a member of another re-cognised industrial union and who produces proof of such membership, shall be entitled to equal preference: Provided that such worker or applicant shall, within fourteen (14) days of the expiry of his current ticket with the other union, make and complete an application for membership with the A.W.U.

28.-Union Representative.

The duly appointed local representative of the union shall be recognised by the ganger and departmental officers as the official of the union on the job.

29.-Inspection of Wages Sheets.

The wages sheets of the department shall be open for inspection at the local or head office by the sceretary or other authorised member of the union, upon reasonable notice being given of his desire to inspect same.

30.-Pieceworkers.

(a) The rate of payment for any system of piecework shall be fixed on the basis that it shall be sufficient to yield to a worker of average capacity for a full week's work of the or-dinary hours at least ten (10) per cent above the minimum time rate of pay as prescribed herein for such week's work: Provided that, where a worker works part of a full week at piccework rates and part at time rates, he shall be paid so much as he is entitled to receive under such piccework rates plus the proportionate amount which he is entitled to receive under this Award at time rates of pay.

(b) All disputes between the department and the union, as to any matters relating to payment by results, including any question as to whether the rates or prices are properly based on the capacity of an average workman, and as to the extension of any system of payment by results by the department to workers, shall, in default of agreement between the depart-ment and the umon, be referred to the Board of Reference.

(c) As far as reasonably practicable the provision of this Award, relating to accommodation, tent allowance and holiday Awaru, rename to accommodation, tent allowance and holiday pay, fares, accident transportation, pitching, striking, and removing earnp, medicine chest, water supply, stores, sanitary service, and preference shall apply to pieceworkers. Tent allowance and holiday pay shall only be payable when the officer in charge is satisfied that the pieceworker has qualified for such navments. for such payments.

31.-Contract of Service.

1. Subject to the provisions of sub-clause 2 the following provisions shall apply :--

(a) If for any reason whatever during any portion of the working hours of any week no work is available or performed, the worker will only be paid for the time actually worked at the rate of pay as above prescribed (per week of 44 hours) apportioned to the time actually worked during the week.

(b) There shall be no obligation on the part of the employer or the worker to give a week's or any other notice to determine the employment, the position being in this respect the same as if the worker were employed at an hourly wage.

2. If a worker is not notified before he leaves the job 2. If a worker is not notified before he leaves the job at the end of the day or shift that his services will not be required on the next day or shift, and such worker presents himself for work at the appointed starting time, he shall be paid for that day: Provided, however, that if the unemploy-ment is on account of causes beyond the control of the manage-ment he shall be entitled to only two (2) hours' pay and be notified of the cause why he cannot be employed: Provided for that that when the worker lives our worker is such about the such a bar further, that when the worker lives or resides in such close proximity to the work that he is under no necessity to incur any extra expense by a delayed notification of his services not being required, then such notice shall be deemed sufficient if given at least one (1) hour before the usual starting time.

3. A worker who has actually commenced work and is knocked off from any cause whatsoever shall be entitled to a minimum of two (2) hours' pay for the day or shift.

4. The decision as to whether it is too wet to work shall rest with the officer in charge of the job.

32.-Long Service Leave.

The conditions governing the granting of long service leave to full-time Government wages employees generally shall apply to workers covered by this Award.

33.-District Allowances.

District allowances calculated on the rates specified below shall be paid in the undermentioned areas :---

The above allowances cover a week, whether of six or seven days. For periods of less than six days, one seventh of the above shall be payable for each day, or part thereof: Pro-vided that workers who have worked at least half a week shall be given the benefit of Sunday in the calculation of district allowance.

34.-Tent Allowance.

Workers required to live in tents at or in the neighbourhood of the job shall be paid an additional allowance at the rate of 5s. 3d. per week.

The above allowance covers a week, whether of six or seven days.

For broken periods this particular allowance shall be calculated at one-sixth, viz. $10\frac{1}{2}d$. per day.

35.—Cement Allowance.

Workers handling dry cement shall be paid an allowance of sixpence per day. This allowance shall not apply to workers receiving a margin for work which involves the use or handling of cement.

36.-Allowances-General.

The special, district, and tent allowance shall not be treated as "wages" in the computation of overtime, holiday pay, or for other similar purposes.

37.-Distant Jobs-Metropolitan District.

Workers not in camp and employed within the Metropolian District on work situated more than one (1) mile from the nearest tram, bus, railway station, or other public trans-port facility shall receive an allowance of sixpence (6d.) per day in addition to their ordinary pay, unless travelling in the department's time,

39.—Owner Drivers.

Persons driving vchicles or horses owned by them and hired to the department shall be deemed "workers," so far as wages and any conditions which are reasonably applicable to them are concerned. The matter of the hiring of the vehicles or horses is to be left entirely between the owner and the departments : Provided that this clause shall not operate within a twenty (20) mile radius of the G.P.O., Perth. Should any owner-driver be dissatisfied with the rate fixed by the local engineer or officer in charge for the hite attended by the local engineer or officer in charge for the hite of his vehicle or horses, such person shall have an appeal to the Director of Works, Commissioner of Main Roads, or Commissioner of Railways, whose decision shall be final.

40.-Term.

This Award shall have effect for three (3) years from the eighth day of December, 1941 : Provided that any of the parties at the expiration of 12 months from that date shall have the right to apply to the Court to amend, alter, or review any of the provisions hereof.


41.-Board of Reference.


- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise

No. 21 of 1941.

Between Western Australian Municipal Road Boards, Parks and Racecourse Employees' Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and Carnarvon Munici-pal Council; Ashburton Road Board, and other Respondents, as per Schedule annexed hereto, Resnondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties: And whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination: And whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference: And whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective repre-sentatives and requested the Court to declare the said agreement an Award: Now, therefore, the Court, pur-suant to section 63 of the Act and all other powers therein enabling it, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note:-Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement").

1 — Definitions

(d) "Permanent yard or depot" shall be deemed to (d) remainent yard or depot shart be declined to mean and include a permanent place wherein are stored or kept plant, equipment, and materials, or a place where vehicles are parked or horses stabled. The ex-pression shall also he deemed to mean and include a place wherein are stored plant, equipment, and materials, or where vehicles are parked or horses stabled, away from a permanent yard or depot, when workers are engaged on work which necessitates their camping on the joh.

(e) "Road board worker" or "mnnicipal worker" shall, for the purpose of clause 6, and without limiting the rights of the parties under clause 16 (a) (ii) in respect of any class of worker which is not now existing in the industry, mean a worker engaged in all or any of the following classifications:---

2.-Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers clightle to belong to the applicant union and employed in any of the classifications mentioned in clause 6 hereof.

3.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the areas com-prised within that portion of the State outside the South-West Land Division over which the Municipal Council and Road Boards who are respondents to this Award have local governing anthority.

4,---Term.

The term of this Award shall be for three (3) years as from the 1st January, 1942.

5.-Contract of Service.

The contract of service of all workers in clause 6 shall be a daily one.

Should any worker not be notified before leaving work that his services will not be required on the next day, he shall be paid for that day, if he duly presents him. self for work at the appointed time: Provided that, if she cannot be employed on account of wet weather, he shall be notified accordingly, and shall be entitled to two hours' pay. The decision as to whether it is too wet to work shall rest with the Chief Excentive Officer, or such other person as may be authorised by him.

7.—Conditions.

(i) One shilling (1s.) per day extra shall be paid to the following workers :-

- (a) Casual workers.
- (h) Concretors, other than slab, kerb or pipe makers.
- (e) Men engaged on tar or bitumen work and who come into contact with the tar or bitumen.
- (d) Men working in wet ground. Nm serymen. (e)
- (f) Men camped on the job—maximum 6s. per week, except where a worker is required to attend to horses on a Sunday, when his maximam shall be 7s, per week.

(ii) Two shillings (2s.) extra per day shall be paid to the operator of the power car-spraying pressure machine: Provided that such worker shall not be entitled to be paid in addition the allowance prescribed by clause 7 (i) (c).

(iii) Three shillings (3s.) extra per day shall be paid to workers cleaning bitumen tank or boller, when so employed: Provided that such worker shall not be entitled to be paid in addition the allowance prescribed hy clause 7 (i) (c).

(iv) Leading hands in charge of not less than three

- (3) other workers shall: (a) where the leading hand is himself performing the work of a "'road board worker," be entitled to be paid at the rate of fifteen shil-lings (15s.) per week in addition to the rate prescribed for a ''road board worker.''
 - (b) Where the leading hand is himself performing any class of work other than that of a 'road board worker'' be entitled to be paid at the rate of six shillings (6s.) per week in addi-tion to the rate prescribed for the class of work he is performing. work he is performing.

(v) Attendance on horses: Drivers who, in addition to the hours of which the working week is composed, are required to attend to horses, shall do so in their own time and shall be paid the following rates in addition to the weekly wage :-

One or two horses-1s, per day and 1s, for Sunday, More than two horses-2s, per day and 2s, for Sunday.

8 --- Payment of Wages.

(a) When a worker has been discharged or has resigned before the usual pay day, he shall be paid all wages due within twenty-four (24) hours of the time when he has been discharged or has resigned.

(h) Payment of wages shall be made once weekly or once fortnightly, at the discretion of the employer. (c) No employer shall keep more than two (2) days' pay in hand.

9.-Piecework.

(a) An employer may make a contract with any worker or group of workers for payment by results by piecework.

(b) The rate of payment shall be fixed on the basis that it shall be sufficient to yield to a worker of average capacity for a full week's work of the ordinary hours at least ten per cent. (10%) above the minimum time rate of pay as prescribed herein for such week's work.

(e) A worker working under any system of payment by results shall receive at least the time rate of pay as prescribed herein.

(d) Any dispute under this elause shall, in default of agreement between the employer and his workers or the employer and the union, be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

10.-Special Provisions.

(a) Camping on the job-

(i) On work which necessitates camping on the job, all reasonable goods and camping outfits to be collected at the depot and returned to the depot on completion of the job. (ii) Shifting eamp: All shifting of camp to be done

in the employer's time. (b) Travelling: Where workers are engaged on a job which is more than one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ miles from a permanent yard or depot, such workers shall be provided with travelling facilities or reimbursed any fares necessarily investigation.

sarily incurred. (c) Sanitary arrangements: Proper sanitary arrangements shall be made on each job for the convenience of all workers.

(d) Supplying tools: All tools required by the worker in the performance of his work shall be supplied with-

(c) Workers working in isolated places: A driver of a roller, grader, or tractor shall not work alone on

- (f) Medicine chest and first aid cquipment:
 (i) When workers are engaged on work which necessitates camping on a job, a medicine chest and first-aid equipment shall be sup-
 - (ii) First-aid equipment shall be kept in a per-manent yard or depot.

11.-Hours.

(a) Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work for all workers, to be worked in five and one-half $(5\frac{1}{2})$ days, except in the case of workers men-tioned in clause 6 (b), when the forty-four (44) hours shall be worked as mutually agreed between the employer and the workers concerned: Provided that this subclause shall be deemed to have been complied with if an eighty-eight (88) hours fortnight is worked: Pro-vided further, that the eighty-eight (88) hour fortnight vided further, that the eighty-eight (88) hour forthight referred to herein shall only be applied after written permission to work same has been granted by the union. (b) By agreement between the employer and the workers employed in any particular establishment, a week's work may be worked in five (5) days. (c) The daily spread of hours shall not exceed ten (10), inclusive of not more than one (1) hour for a meal.

(d) All time worked to make up the hours of duty on any one day shall be worked in a continuous shift. (e) The hours of work of all workers whose ordinary

duties are carried out during daylight hours shall be performed between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.: Provided that these hours may be varied by agreement between any employer and the union.

(f) A driver required by the employer to drive any vehicle from or to any permanent yard or depot shall be paid for such time as he is actually driving.

12.—Overtime.

(a) When a worker is recalled to work after leaving the job, or on any of the named holidays prescribed in clause 13, or on Sundays, he shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at penalty rates.

(b) If a worker who is required to work during the during the shift a full continuous meal period, or loses any portion of the meal period, he shall be paid at double time rates for the period not obtained, or any portion lost.

(c) All time worked before the usual starting time or after the usual fullshing this shall be paid for at the rate of time and one-half.

(d) Any worker called upon to work on any of the holidays mentioued in clause 13 shall be paid at the rate of double time, except where the employer and the worker mutually agree that any of such days shall not be observed as a holiday, in which case work may be done at ordinary rates, and an extra day added to the annual leave, as prescribed by clause 14 for each day so worked.

(c) All work performed on Sunday, except in the case of sanitary employees, shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(f) Any sanitary work performed on Saturday night shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.
(g) When computing overtime, the district allowances shall not be computed as an addition to the day's pay.

13.-Holidays.

Subject to clause 12 (d) the following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be paid holidays, namely: New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Mouday, Anzae Day, Labour Day, local Show Day (or, alternatively, King's Birthday), Christmas Day, and Boying Day Boxing Day.

14.—Annual Leave.

(a) In addition to the holidays prescribed in clause 13 hereof, one (1) week's leave on full pay shall be allowed to all workers on completion of each twelve months' continuous service: Provided that, should the period of continuous service be less than twelve months, the worker shall be entitled to pay in lieu of leave in the proportion that his length of service bears to the full year's employment.

(b) Where practicable, annual leave shall be granted at Christmas time.

(c) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay in accordance with clause 15, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

(d) This clause does not apply to easual hands.

15.—Payment for Sickness.

(a) A worker, other than a casual hand, shall be of personal ill-health, for non-attendance, on the ground of personal ill-health, for one-half (1/2) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days (one (1) week's pay) in each calendar year. Pay-ment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the scrvice of the employer, in the event of the worker be-ing entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sick-ness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act. absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6)

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default, or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

16 .- Board of Reference.

(a) The Court may appoint, for the purpose of this Award, a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other repre-Arbitration Act, 1912-1935. There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Award, the functious of:

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award, or any of them;
- (ii) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and condi-tions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award;
- (iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbi-tration Act, 1912-1935, which, for this purpose, are embodied in this Award.

17.---- Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

18.--Record.

(a) A readily intelligible record shall be kept by each employer, containing the following particulars :----(i) The name of each worker.

- (ii) The time he starts and finishes work each day.
- (iii) All overtime worked.
- (iv) The total number of hours worked.
- (v) The wages (and overtime, if any) paid to each worker.
- (vi) The amount of fares and special allowances (if any) paid.

(b) Such record shall be signed by the worker and shall be open for inspection, during office hours, by the secretary or accredited representative of the union, and such person may take extracts therefrom.

19.-Posting Copy of Award and Union Notices.

The accredited union representative shall not be prevented from posting a copy of this Award, or any notice of the union not exceeding fourteen (14) inches by nine (9) inches, in a suitable place agreed upon between the employer and the union. Failing agreement in this connection, the Board of Reference shall decide where the copy of the Award or the said notice shall be posted.

20.-Leave of Absence.

For the purpose of this Award, leave of absence from duty, without prejudice, shall be granted to the president of the union or the president or sceretary of any branch of the union, or any steward duly authorised by the union, without pay: Provided that they shall first find satisfactory substitutes, if so required by the employer.

21.—Higher Duties.

A worker engaged on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for the time so employed.

22.—District Allowances.

Payments shall be made in accordance with the provisions contained in Schedule I annexed hereto, so far as applicable.

23.—Terms of Award.

It is understood that all the terms of this Award have been arrived at in view of all the eircnustances surrounding this dispute, and are not to be regarded as a precedent for this or any other industry.

SCHEDULE I.

District Allowances.

In addition to the wages prescribed in clause 6 of this Award, the following allowances shall be paid by the various respondents:---

Where a six (6) day week is in operation, the worker shall be entitled to one-sixth (1-6th) of the weekly allowance for each day worked; and where a five (5) day week is in operation, to one-fifth (1-5th) of the weekly allowance for each day worked.

AGREEMENT 21/41. (Reg. 24/11/41.)

(Reg. 24/11/41.) THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, this eighteenth day of November, one thonsand mine hundred and forty-one, between the Swan Wool Scouring Company of W.A., Ltd.; the Jandakot Wool Scouring Company, Ltd.; the Hulne Wool Scouring Co. (1938), Ltd.; the West Australian Meat Exports Company, Ltd.; A. V. Rhodes & Co., and the Fremantle Fellmongery Company (hereinafter called "the employers"), of the one part, and the Metropolitan Wool Scouring and Fellmongery Employees' Industrial Union of Workers (W.A.), (hereinafter called "the nuion"), of the other part, witnesseth that, for the considerations hereinafter appearing, the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree the one with the other, as follows:—

Clauses Applicable to both Sections. 1.—Area.

This Agreement shall apply to the wool-scouring industry and the fellmongering industry carried on within a radius of thirty (30) miles from the General Post Office in the city of Perth.

2.—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be one (1) year from the date hereof.

3.—Holidays.

(a) Twelve (12) paid holidays per annum shall be granted to each worker after twelve months' continuous service: Provided always, that New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day, or the days observed as such, shall be taken as they come as portion of the holidays. The balance of six (6) days shall be granted as annual leave, at the convenience of the employer, but shall in any event be taken within six (6) months after becoming due.

(b) On any other public holiday the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case the worker need not present himself for duty, but, if work be done, ordinary rates shall apply. If no work is done, payment for such day may be deducted.

(c) In the event of a worker being employed by an (c) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on holidays on full pay.
(d) Holiday pay shall not accrue during a worker's absence from his employment, for any cause whatsoever.
(c) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall lose all rights under this clause.

under this clause.

4.-Overtime.

Except as provided in clauses 16 and 20, all time worked prior to the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be regarded as overtime and paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

5 .--- Sunday and Holiday Work.

(a) Except as provided hereunder, and also in clauses 16 and 20, all work performed on Simday, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christ-mas Day, and Boxing Day shall be paid for at double time rates.

(b) All time worked beyond eight (8) hours on Sun-day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, or Labour Day shall be deemed overtime and shall be paid for at the prescribed overtime rates, calculated at the special rate prescribed for ordinary work on the particular day on which such overtime is worked.

6 .- Proportion of Juniors.

The employer shall be entitled to employ one junic and, thereafter additional juniors may be employed in the proportion of one junior to every four (4) or frac-tion of four (4) workers in receipt of the full adult rate of pay.

7.-Higher Duties.

A worker required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Agreement than that which he usually performs shall be entitled to payment at the higher rate whilst so employed.

S .- Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a record containing the following particulars:-

- (a) The name of the worker.
 (b) The class of work performed by each worker.
 (c) The wages and overtime (if any) paid to each
- worker. (d) The time during which the worker has been employed.

(e) The ages of junior workers. Such record shall be open to inspection by a repre-sentative of the nuion, not more than once weekly, dur-ing the business hours of 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

9.-Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity (a) Any worker who by reason or old age or infimity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage, as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the minor and the employer.
(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the General Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

10 .--- Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers shall furnish the employer with a certificate showing the following particulars:-(a) Name in full.

(b) Age and date of birth.

The certificate shall be signed by the worker. No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional wages, in the event of his age being wrongly stated on the certificate.

11.—Payment for Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance, on the ground of personal ill-health, for one half $(\frac{1}{2})$ day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days (one week's pay)

in each calendar year. Payment herennder may be ad-justed at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sus-tained, arising ont of his own wilful default or for sick-ness mising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be emtitled to a medical certificate miless the absence is for three (5) days or more.

12 .- Board of Reference.

The Court appoints, for the purpose of the Agreement, a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall Each Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Agreement, the functions of :-

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Agreement or any of them;
- (ii) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Agreement;
- (iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from my decision of such Board, in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, which for this purpose are embodied in this Agreement.

13.-Meal Money.

When a day shift worker is required to work after 6.30 p.m. on Monday to Friday, inclusive, or after 1 p.m. on Saturday, he shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) for a meal, in addition to payment for overtime.

14.-Notice Board.

An accredited representative of the union shall not An accreated representative of the much shall not be prevented from posting a copy of this Agreement or any notice of the union, not exceeding fourteen (14) inches by nine (9) inches, in a suitable place agreed upon between the employer and the union. Failing agreement in this connection, the Board of Reference shall decide where the copy of the Agreement or the said notice shall be noted notice shall be posted.

Scouring Section.

15.—Definitions.

(a) "Casual hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the hour and who may be put off or leave the employer's service at any moment without notice. The minimum engagement for a casual hand shall be four (4) hours.

A casual hand engaged and not permitted to commence work shall receive two (2) hours' pay at the prescribed rate.

(b) "Weekly hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the week and whose employment shall be terminable by not less than one (1) week's notice on either side: Provided that, in the case of a breakdown of the employer's machinery or through the failure of electric power operating same, or no wool being available for scoming, the employer shall be entitled to dednet pay-ment of wages for any day or portion of a day on which the worker emnot be employed.

This provise shall only apply when, owing to any of the foregoing reasons, work is suspended for more than one (1) hom.

16.-Hours.

(a) Day work:-Forty-four (44) hours shall consti-tute a week's work, to be worked as follows:--

 (i) Where only one shift per day is worked, workers employed on the wool breaker, scouring machine and/or dryer, shall work eight (8) hours forty eight (48) minutes per day, from Monday to Friday, inclusive.

- (ii) Except where a five-day week is "orked, all other workers shall work eight (8) hours per day, on Monday to Friday, inclusive, between 7.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m., and four (4) hours on Saturday, between 7.30 a.m. and 12 noon.
- (iii) Where a five-day week is worked, all other workers shall work eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes per day, between 7.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m.

(b) Shift work :- Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be paid for at ordinary rates. Whenever the shift commences at 11 p.m. on Sunday, ordinary rates for the honr's work on Sunday shall be payable. All shifts payable at ordinary rates shall firsh not later than 11 a.m. on Saturday. Crib time shall be taken in the employer's time, when shift workis worked.

(c) The week's work may be performed in five (5) ar five and one half (51/2) days, at the option of the employer.

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18.—Special Provisions.

19.—Definitions.

(a) "Casual hand" shall mean a worker engaged by (a) "Cashai hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the honr and who may be put off or leave the employer's service at any moment without notice. The minimum engagement for a cashal hand shall be four (4) hours. A cashal hand engaged and not permitted to com-mence work shall receive two (2) hours' pay at the pre-

scribed rate.

(b) "Weekly hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the week and whose employment shall be terminable by not less than one week's notice on either side: Provided that, in the case of a breakdown of the employer's machinery or through the failure of electric power operating same, or no wool or skins being available for treatment the employer shall be entitled to deduct payment of wages for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot he employed.

This proviso shall only apply when, owing to any of the foregoing reasons work is suspended for more than one (1) hour.

20.-Hom's.

(a) Day work:-Forty-four (44) hours shall consti-tute a week's work, to be worked as follows:--

- (i) Where the week's work is performed in five and one-half days:-Eight (S) bours per day, Monday to Friday inclusive, between the bons of 7.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m.; form (4) nours or 1.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m.; four (4) nours on Saturday, between the hours of 7.30 a.m. and 12 noon.
- (ii) where a five-day week is worked :- Eight (8) hours forty eight (48) minutes per day, be-tween the hours of 7.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m., Monday to Friday, inclusive.

(b) Shift work:-Forty-four (44) hours shall consti-Whenever the shift commences at 11 p.m. on Snuday, orunary rates for the hour's work on Sunday, shall be payable. All shifts payable at ordinary rates shall mish not later than 11 a.m. on Saturday. Crib time shall be taken in the employer's time when shift work is worked. (c) The week's work may be performed in five (5) or five and one-half (5½) days, at the option of the

employer.

(d) The day's work prescribed in this clause shall be worked in a continuous shift, but in the event of he introduction of pelt preservation in the industry in Western Australia, the provisions of this clause may be reviewed and, if necessary, altered or modified by agree-ment between the parties. Failing agreement between the parties, the Board of Reference is hereby anthorised to adjudicate on the dispute and to alter or modify all or any of the provisions of this clause.

21.-Tools of Trade.

The employer shall provide all necessary tools of trade used in the industry of fellmongering, as well as goggles, aprons, gloves, and (where pit work is done) rubber boots.
