WHEREAS under section 2 of the Native Administration Act, 1905-1941, "Native Institution" means and includes any mission, reformatory, orphanage, school, home, station, reserve, or other institution for the benefit, protection, or care of the native inhabitants of the State declared by Proclamation to be a Native Institution for the purposes of the said Act: And whereas by Proclamation issued under the said section and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 24th day of December, 1937, it was declared, *inter alia*, that Violet Valley Cattle Station shall be a Native Institution for the purposes of the said Act: And whereas it is now deemed desirable and expedient that Violet Valley Cattle Station shall cease to be a Native Institution as aforesaid and that the Proclamation aforesaid shall be amended accordingly: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, do hereby declare that, as from the date of the publication of this proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, Violet Valley Cattle Station shall cease to be a Native Institution for the purposes of the Native Administration Act, 1905-1941, and that the Proclamation issued under the said Act and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 24th day of December, 1937, shall be and is hereby amended accordingly.

WHEREAS the Governor in Council, acting pursuant to section 39 of the Aborigines Act, 1905, by two Proclamations and a notice published in the *Government Gazette* on the 31st day of May, 1907, declared that the portions of the State therein specified, being land in and around the Townsite of Broome, should be an area in which it shall be unlawful for aborigines or half-castes not in lawful employment to be or remain: And whereas section 42 of the Native Administration Act, 1905-1941, enacts that the Governor may by Proclamation, whenever in the interest of the natives he thinks fit, declare any municipal district or town or any other place to be an area in which it shall be unlawful for natives not in lawful employment to be or remain: And whereas it is deemed desirable to cancel and revoke the original Proclamations aforesaid and to issue a new Proclamation in place of them: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and under section 42 of the Native Administration Act, 1905-1941, do hereby cancel and revoke the above-mentioned Proclamations and notice as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 31st day of May, 1907, and in place thereof do by this Proclamation declare that the land described in the Schedule hereunder, being portion of the Townsite of Broome, is an area in which it shall be unlawful for natives not in lawful employment to be or remain.

Schedule.

All that portion of the Broome Townsite as hereunder described:—Bounded on the westward by lines commencing at the intersection of the production southward of the eastern side of Dora street with the townsite boundary, and extending northward along said production and said side of Dora street to the southern side of Anne street; thence eastward along said side of

Anne street to the eastern side of Herbert street; thence northward along the eastern side of Herbert street to the southern side of Macpherson road and continuing to the western corner of Broome Lot 395; thence north-eastward along the north-western boundaries of Lots 395, 394, and 393 and their production north-eastward to a line parallel to and one chain distant from the eastern boundary of Lot 641; thence northward along said parallel line to the townsite boundary; on the northward and eastward by the townsite boundary from the last-mentioned point to the starting point.

WHEREAS by the Native Administration Act, 1905-1941, it is provided that the Governor is empowered by Proclamation to declare any Crown lands to be Reserves for Natives: And whereas it is deemed desirable that a Reserve for Natives should be declared near Mount Magnet: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare an area of about twenty acres, more particularly described in the Schedule hereto, to be a Reserve for Natives.

Schedule.

Warrambo (near Mount Magnet)—No. 22300 (Natives).—Bounded by lines commencing at a point situate about 12 chains 10 links east from Survey Mark K24 and extending north about 20 chains and east about 10 chains the opposite boundaries being parallel and equal (about 20 acres). (Plan 186/80.)

WHEREAS by section 9 of the Fisheries Act, 1905-1940, it is provided that the Governor may by Proclamation prohibit all persons from taking any fish whatsoever in every or any specified portion of Western Australian waters, by means of fishing nets and fishing lines, or either of such means of capture, or by any other specified means of capture, for any specified term: And whereas by section 10 of the said Act every such Proclamation may be revoked or varied at any time: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby, in exercise of the powers aforesaid and of every other power thereunto me enabling, vary the Proclamation dated the 21st day of November, 1940 (published in the *Government Gazette* of 29th November, 1940), by omitting the words "Bridge road" from Schedule C. thereto and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Beach road."

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section 33 of the Land Act, 1933-1939, it is made lawful for the Governor to direct that any reserve shall vest in and be held by any municipality, road board, or other person or persons, to be named in the order, in trust for any of the purposes set forth in section 29 of the said Act, or for the like or other public purposes to be specified in such order, and with power of subleasing: And whereas it is deemed expedient that Reserve A16713 (Rottnest Island) should vest in and be held by the Rottnest Board of Control in trust for Public Recreation: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby direct that the beforementioned reserve shall vest in and be held by the Rottnest Board of Control in trust for Public Recreation, with power to the said Rottnest Board of Control, subject to the Governor's approval, to lease the whole or any portion of the said reserve for any term not exceeding twenty-five (25) years from the date of the lease.

Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1941.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 10 of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1941, that it shall be obligatory for every employer to obtain from an incorporated insurance office, approved by the Minister, a policy of insurance for the full amount of the liability to pay compensation under this Act to all workers employed by him, but that if an employer proves to the satisfaction of the Minister that such employer has established a fund for insurance against such liability and has deposited at the Treasury securities charged with all payments to become due under such liability, the Governor may by Order in Council exempt such employer from the operation of the said section: And whereas The National Bank of Australasia, Limited, of St. George's terrace, Perth, being an employer within the meaning of section 10 of the said Act and as such subject to the provisions of the said section 10, has duly, in accordance with the regulations made under the said Act, made application for exemption from the operation of section 10 aforesaid, and has proved to the satisfaction of the Minister that it has established a fund for insurance against its said liability under the said Act and has deposited at the Treasury securities, to wit, a bond for £5,000, charged with all payments to become due under the said liability: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, doth hereby exempt the said The National Bank of Australasia, Limited, from the operation of section 10 of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1941, for a period of one year commencing on the 1st day of January, 1942.

Vermin Act, 1918-1938.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Orders in Council made under section 6 of the Vermin Boards Act, 1909, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 2nd day of December,

1921, the Nullagine Road District was constituted a Vermin District for the purposes of the said Act, to be known as Nullagine Vermin District, and a Board, consisting of seven members, to be known as the Nullagine Vermin Board, was constituted and appointed for the said Vermin District: And whereas the said Nullagine Vermin District as originally constituted still exists under and for the purposes of the Vermin Act, 1918-1938: And whereas it is enacted by section 14 of the last-mentioned Act that the Governor may by Order in Council *inter alia*, dissolve the Board of any Vermin District, and by section 45 of the same Act that the Governor may appoint the Board of any road district to be the Board of any Vermin District, the boundaries whereof are the same as those of the road district or which is comprised within the road district: And whereas it is now deemed desirable and expedient to dissolve the Nullagine Vermin Board heretofore

constituted and appointed as the Board of the said Nullagine Vermin District as aforesaid, and in lieu thereof to appoint the Nullagine Road Board to be the Board of the said Vermin District: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Vermin Act, 1918-1938, doth hereby dissolve the Nullagine Vermin Board as heretofore constituted under the Vermin Boards Act, 1909, for the said Nullagine Vermin District as aforesaid and in lieu thereof doth hereby appoint the Nullagine Road Board to be the Vermin Board for the said Nullagine Vermin District and to be known as the Nullagine Vermin Board.

Every parcel of skins so delivered shall be accompanied by a statutory declaration, made by the owner of the skins, indicating the locality where they were taken or killed. Any such skins received without such declaration, or delivered to any collector of royalty other than the collector of royalty at Geraldton, shall be charged with royalty in accordance with the rates prescribed for skins taken south of a line following the railway line from Dongarra to Mingenew and thence due east, and west, south-west and south of a line drawn from the mouth of the Murehison River to Norseman, and thence to Eucla from the point where such line intersects the line drawn due east from Mingenew.

(3) Regulation 31 is deleted and a regulation is inserted in lieu thereof as follows:—

31. All royalties payable on the skins of marsupials shall be paid to the chief collector of royalty or to a collector of royalty within thirty days of the date on which such marsupials are taken or killed.

made under the said Act and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 23rd day of
April, 1915, and amended by notice published in the *Government Gazette* on the 5th
day of November, 1915, in the manner mentioned in the Schedule hereunder.

Schedule.

The regulations made under the Industries Assistance Act, 1915-1940, as published
in the *Government Gazette* on the 23rd day of April, 1915, and as amended by notice
published in the *Government Gazette* on the 5th day of November, 1915, are further
amended by adding thereto a further regulation as follows:—

8. (1) This regulation is made for the purposes of subsection (6) of section 14
of the Industries Assistance Act, 1915-1940, and shall apply only in respect of advances
made out of or commodities supplied with moneys loaned to the State for purposes of
drought relief under the Commonwealth of Australia Loan (Drought Relief) Act, 1940
(No. 71 of 1940), after the commencement of the said subsection (6) of section 14
aforesaid.

(2) The said advances shall be made or the said commodities shall be supplied
under the provisions of the Industries Assistance Act, 1915-1940, by the Commissioners
of the Agricultural Bank of Western Australia for the purpose of drought relief out
of the moneys loaned to the State by the Commonwealth as aforesaid and made avail-
able to the said Commissioners by the Government of the State.

(3) The advances made or the moneys owing for the commodities supplied shall
be repayable to the said Commissioners in the following manner:—

(a) Where the Commissioners are of the opinion that the proceeds derived by
the borrower from the sale of his crops or wool or other sources of
income arising out of the agricultural farming, grazing, or other opera-
tions carried on by him during the 1941-1942 season on any land, his
estate and interest wherein is, by virtue of section 15 of the Act, charged
with the repayment of the said advances or moneys aforesaid, are
sufficient to repay in full the advances or moneys aforesaid and still
leave a balance sufficient to enable the borrower to carry on all or any
of the said operations during the 1942-1943 season, the Commissioners
may require the borrower to repay to the Commissioners in full the
advances or moneys aforesaid out of the said proceeds, and the borrower
shall be liable to make such repayment forthwith upon the Commissioners
making a demand for the same.

(b) Where the Commissioners are of the opinion that the proceeds referred
to in subparagraph (a) hereof are not sufficient to repay in full the
advances or moneys aforesaid and still leave a balance sufficient to
enable the borrower to carry on his said operations during the 1942-1943
season, the Commissioners may, if they think fit—

(i) allow the repayment of the advances or moneys aforesaid to
be deferred wholly or in part until the proceeds derived by
the borrower from his said operations in the subsequent year
or years are sufficient to repay the deferred advances or
moneys aforesaid and leave a balance to enable the borrower
to carry on his said operations during the season next follow-
ing that in which the repayment in full of the advances or
moneys aforesaid is made in full; or

(ii) fund the advances or moneys aforesaid wholly or in part
and allow the borrower to repay the funded advances or
moneys aforesaid by annual instalments spread over a
period to be fixed by the Commissioners but not exceeding
seven years.

Provided that—

(a) in cases where the advances or moneys aforesaid
are funded as aforesaid and become repayable by annual
instalments over a period of years as hereinbefore provided
for, the Commissioners may require the borrower to execute
in their favour a mortgage of his lands and a bill of sale
over his stock and plant to secure the repayment of the
advances or moneys aforesaid by the said instalments; and

(b) in cases where the Commissioners merely allow the repayment of the advances or moneys aforesaid to be deferred and do not fund the same, section 15 of the Act shall continue to apply and have effect to secure the repayment in full of the advances or moneys aforesaid.

(c) Where the proceeds referred to in subparagraph (a) hereof are sufficient to repay in full the advances or moneys aforesaid but are not sufficient still to leave a balance sufficient to enable the borrower to carry on his said operations during the ensuing season or seasons, the Commissioners may from year to year, as often as they are satisfied is necessary, repay in full the advances or moneys aforesaid out of the proceeds derived by the borrower from his said operations and simultaneously re-advance moneys or again supply commodities to the borrower under and in accordance with this regulation, and this regulation shall apply as if the moneys re-advanced or the commodities again supplied were advances originally made or commodities originally supplied.

Provided that no such re-advances shall be made or no such commodities shall again be supplied to the same borrower after the expiration of the period of seven years computed from the first day of April, 1941.

(4) When for the purposes of paragraph (3) of this regulation the Commissioners are considering whether or not, after repayment in full of the advances or moneys owing by the borrower, the balance of the proceeds derived by the borrower from his operation aforesaid are sufficient to enable him to carry on his said operations during the next ensuing season, creditors' claims respecting goods supplied or to be supplied, for services rendered, or on any other account, not deemed by the Commissioners to be essential to the carrying on of the borrower's farming operations, shall not be taken into account by the Commissioners as being expenses incidental to the carrying on of his said operations by the borrower.

(5) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Act and in compliance with subsection (6) of section 14 of the Act, in relation to any advances or moneys aforesaid to which this regulation applies, where the Commissioners are of opinion that it is desirable to do so, they may at any time agree in writing with any applicant or with any creditor of an applicant for the waiver or postponement of any charge arising under the Act wholly or in part or to any basis or method of application or division of the proceeds of the realisation of any property of an applicant the subject of any such charge.

(6) The rate of interest which shall be charged in respect of advances or other moneys aforesaid to which this regulation applies shall be the same rate as that payable by the State to the Commonwealth of Australia in respect of the moneys loaned by the said Commonwealth to the State and made available by the State to the Commissioners for the purpose of enabling them to make such advances or to supply commodities to applicants under this regulation.

Provided that advances made and moneys owing for commodities supplied shall be free of interest during the period ending on the 31st day of March, 1942.

(7) Advances may be made or commodities may be supplied under this regulation during the period of seven years commencing on the 1st day of April, 1941, but not thereafter.

The Food and Drug Regulations are amended as follows:—

1. (a) By deleting from paragraph (2) of regulation 14 the words "an acid" where they appear in line five of the said paragraph (2) immediately below the subheading "Labelling" and inserting in lieu thereof the letter "A;"

(b) By deleting from paragraph (2) of regulation 14 the word "acid" where it appears in line 6 of the said paragraph (2) under the subheading "Labelling."

2. By deleting regulation 16 and inserting in lieu thereof a new regulation as follows:—

16.—Phosphate Powder.

(1) Phosphate powder is any suitable acid phosphate which, with or without starch or other wholesome farinaceous substance, can be used to replace cream of tartar in the preparation of a chemical leaven for baking purposes.

(2) Its available acidity shall be such that if 1.98 grammes of the powder are dissolved in 10 cubic centimetres of a normal solution of sodium hydroxide, the mixture shall have an acid reaction when tested with phenolphthalein. It shall not contain more than two parts per centum of sulphates, calculated as calcium sulphate (CaSO₄). It shall not contain more than three-tenths of one part per centum of any compound of aluminium, calculated as alumina (Al₂O₃).

Labelling.

(3) The words "cream of tartar," or any contraction of them, or any words which resemble or suggest cream of tartar or tartaric acid, shall not appear in any label on a package containing a phosphate powder. Every package containing a phosphate for use in food, or containing any baking powder to which has been added a phosphate shall have as the first words in the label the word PHOSPHATE in bold-faced sans-serif capital letters of not less than twelve points face measurement.

Schedule.

MENTAL TREATMENT (WAR SERVICE PATIENTS) ACT, 1941.

Regulations.

1. For the purposes of these regulations, the terms "Minister," "Inspector General," and "Superintendent" shall have the meanings assigned to them respectively by the Lunacy Act, 1903-1920, or by the Mental Treatment Act, 1927, according as those Acts are applicable.

2. The hospitals for the insane, reception houses, or licensed houses under the Lunacy Act, 1903-1920, and the mental treatment hospitals and reception houses under the Mental Treatment Act, 1927, and the homes or houses into which war service patients may be received for treatment or to be taken charge of or cared for under the authority of section 4 of the Act, shall be only those of which the Minister shall approve, on the recommendation of the Inspector General.

3. The request for the reception of a patient into any institution, home, or house referred to in regulation 2 of these regulations shall be in writing, in Form No. 1 in the Appendix to these regulations, shall be signed by the appropriate medical officer, and shall be accompanied by a statement of particulars in the Form No. 2 in the said appendix.

4. When the request is for the reception of the patient into an institution aforesaid for treatment, then on production of the request and statement referred to in regulation 3 of these regulations, and subject to the necessary accommodation being available and the institution being approved by the Minister as required by regulation 2 of these regulations, the superintendent of the institution shall receive the patient, named in the request, into the institution for treatment accordingly.

5. (1) Where a patient is received into a hospital for the insane, reception house, or licensed house under the Lunacy Act, 1903-1920, all the provisions of that Act in relation to the period for which the patient may be received, and the treatment and care of the patient, and, in relation to transfer or removal, discharge, escape and other matters, shall apply to the said patient in the same manner and to the same extent as if the patient had been admitted under an order or certificate made or given under Part II. of the said Act, save and except that, where any of the provisions of the said Act require the order of a justice of the peace for the doing of any act, matter, or thing, such order shall not be necessary, but a direction in writing by the Inspector General shall be sufficient.

(2) Where a patient is received into a mental treatment hospital or reception house under the Mental Treatment Act, 1927, all the provisions of section 4 of that Act in relation to the period for which the patient may be received, and the treatment and care of the patient and any other relevant provisions of the said Act, shall apply to the patient in the same manner and to the same extent as if the patient had been received into the said hospital under an order of a justice of the peace under section 4 of the said Act, save and except that, where any provision of the said section 4 or of the said Act requires the order of a justice of the peace for the doing of any act, matter, or thing, such order shall not be necessary, but a direction in writing of the Inspector General shall be sufficient.

(3) Where a patient has been received in the first instance into a mental treatment hospital or reception house under the Mental Treatment Act, 1927, and, whilst detained therein, it is deemed desirable or expedient by the Superintendent thereof that the patient should, in his own interests, be transferred to a hospital for the insane or reception house or licensed house under the Lunacy Act, 1903-1920, the Inspector General may, upon the recommendation of such Superintendent, direct in writing that the patient shall be so transferred, and the patient may be transferred accordingly.

6. The administration and management of the estate or assets of a patient received into an institution aforesaid under the authority of the Act and other matters concerning the affairs of such patient shall be subject to the provisions of any Act or Acts applicable to patients received into such institution, either under order or certificate made or issued under Part II. of the Lunacy Act, 1903-1920, or section 4 of the Mental Treatment Act, 1927, as the case may be.

By-laws.

(1) The term "Board" in the by-laws shall mean the Manjimup District Road Board.

(2) The term "Permission" throughout these by-laws means permission in writing from the Board or its agent in writing first obtained.

(3) The term "Public well" shall mean any well or other water supply constructed or maintained by the Board within the boundaries of the Reserves 17495, 15776, and 20167.

(4) Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall fell, cut, injure, or destroy any tree, shrub, or plant within a radius of twenty (20) chains from any public well on these reserves.

(5) No person shall set fire to the bush on these reserves, nor light any fire, without clearing or seeing that there is already cleared, a sufficient fire-break to prevent the fire spreading.

(6) No person shall enter or remain on these reserves who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct, or who is in a state of intoxication.

(7) No person shall depasture, or permit or suffer to be depastured, or to remain in or upon these reserves any great stock without having obtained a license from the Board permitting him to do so, and paying the fees thereon.

(10) No person shall erect any tent or camp within a radius of one chain of any public well on these reserves.

(11) Campers are prohibited from bringing any domesticated animals, such as horses, cows, goats, pigs, dogs, or fowls into camp without permission.

(12) Campers must keep their camping area free from rubbish and in a clean and sanitary condition at all times.

(13) All campers must use the sanitary conveniences provided by the Board, and, in the absence of such conveniences, improvised arrangements must be provided such as are approved by the Board or its agent.

(14) Campers shall use sufficient sand or other approved deodorant to thoroughly cover all nightsoil or other excrementitious matter after using sanitary conveniences.

(15) The presence of any cut or broken green timber or foliage at any camp will be held as evidence that the camper has done the damage, unless it was pointed out when taking over the camping area.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

(No. 2 of 1942.)

Between Australian Workers' Union, Westralian Branch,
Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and James
Hardie and Company, Pty., Limited, Respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties: And whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination: And whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference: And whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to declare the said agreement an Award: Now, therefore, the Court, pursuant to section 63 of the Act and all other powers therein enabling it, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note:—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

Clause 1.—Wages.

(a) The minimum rates of wages payable to adult workers shall be as follows:—

(b) Juniors:—Junior workers may be employed in the proportion of one junior to three (3) or fraction of three (3) adult workers employed.

The rates of wages payable to junior workers shall be:—

- 17 to 18 years of age—45 per cent. of basic wage.
- 18 to 19 years of age—60 per cent. of basic wage.
- 19 to 20 years of age—75 per cent. of basic wage.
- 20 to 21 years of age—90 per cent. of basic wage.

(c) Wages shall be paid during working hours.

Clause 2.—Casual Workers.

"Casual worker" means a worker employed for less than six (6) consecutive working days.

He shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates prescribed in this Award.

Clause 3.—Wet Places.

Workers working in wet places shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day extra.

Clause 4.—Hours.

(a) Day workers—Forty-four (44) hours, exclusive of meal times, shall constitute a week's work for ordinary day workers, limited to eight (8) hours, on Monday to Friday inclusive; worked between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5.15 p.m., with forty (40) minutes' recess for lunch, and four (4) hours on Saturday, worked between the hours of 7 a.m. and 12 noon; or such other hours as may be mutually arranged between the employer and the workers.

(b) Shift workers—The ordinary hours of shift workers inclusive of crib time, shall not exceed forty-four (44) hours in one week, or (when two (2) shifts are worked) eighty-eight (88) hours in two (2) weeks, or (when three (3) shifts are worked) one hundred and thirty-two (132) hours in three (3) weeks, at the option of the employer, to be worked in rotary shifts, and not exceeding eight (8) hours on Monday to Saturday inclusive.

(c) Shift workers shall be allowed twenty (20) minutes for crib in each shift without deduction of pay.

(d) Working in meal hours (day workers):—Work done in the meal hour or any portion thereof shall be paid for at the rate of double time, but this shall not apply to cases involving the completion of work commenced before the lunch period and not occupying more than fifteen (15) minutes from the commencement of the lunch hour, in which case the lunch period would be extended by fifteen (15) minutes beyond the ordinary time: Provided that this subclause shall not apply to work on the No. 1 machine (sheet-making).

(e) The meal time for workers shall be so arranged that, so far as possible, it will not cause a stoppage of work.

Clause 5.—Overtime.

All time of duty beyond forty-four (44) hours in any one week, or beyond those fixed for each shift, shall be deemed overtime, and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

Clause 6.—Holidays.

The following days shall be paid holidays, namely:—Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, and Labour Day.

Where the holiday falls on a Sunday, or where any day is observed in lieu thereof, a holiday shall be granted on that date.

In addition to the above, an annual holiday of six (6) days on full pay shall be granted once in each year to every worker: Provided that, where the worker's employment is terminated during the course of a calendar year, the employer shall pay him one day's wages for each calendar month of his service, in lieu of the holidays to which he would be entitled under this clause and has not received. In the event of a worker being employed for a portion only of the year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period, and, if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers are on holiday on full pay: Provided further, that where the worker is dismissed for wilful misconduct, he shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

Holiday pay shall not accrue during the worker's absence from his employment for any cause whatsoever.

Clause 7.—Record Book.

The wages book (or wages sheets) of the employer shall be open for inspection by the secretary, or an accredited representative of the union, at the office of the Company during working hours, upon reasonable notice being given of the desire to inspect same.

Clause 8.—Contract of Service.

For the sake of convenience, the rates of pay are set out on a weekly basis, but this Award doth hereby declare that:—

(a) except in the case of casual workers, one day's notice on either side shall be deemed to be sufficient notice of termination of the contract of service; and

(b) the employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery, or any stoppage of work from any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

Clause 9.—Sick Pay, etc.

A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance, on the ground of personal ill-health, for one half-day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

Clause 10.—Junior Workers' Certificate.

Junior workers, upon being engaged, shall, if required, furnish an employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—(i) Name in full; (ii) Date of birth.

In the event of the age of the worker being wrongly stated in the certificate, a breach of this Award shall not be deemed to have been committed by the employer, and the worker shall have no claim upon the employer for additional pay.

Clause 11.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court hereby appoints, for the purpose of the Award, a Board of Reference in each branch of the industry.

(b) The Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

(c) In the event of a disagreement between the parties bound by the Award in any of the matters herein-after mentioned, the Board has hereby assigned to it the following functions:—

(i) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and conditions for any machine, occupation, or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award, but so as not to contravene any of the provisions herein;

(ii) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;

(iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(d) An appeal shall lie from any decision of the Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

Clause 12.—Term of Award.

This Award shall come into operation as from the date hereof and remain in force for three years.

Clause 13.—Area.

This Award shall apply to the premises of James Hardie and Company, Limited, situated at Rivervale (Burswood).

“Junior workers may be employed as:

Rivet boys, power hammer boys helping apprentice blacksmith, cleaning and sweeping shops, messenger boys, gathering bolts and rivets and screws, etc., which may have been dropped by tradesmen, assisting in tool shop, nutting bolts, sorting bagging and weighing bolts, and nuts, rivets and spikes, holding up rivets up to half inch in diameter (providing the junior is not under 18 years of age), assisting ladlemen in daubing ladles, washing meters, and also in the following operations: (provided that there are no apprentice machinists in their first six months available): namely,

operating bolt and spike finning machine, operating pointing machine, operating nut burring machine, operating nut tapping machine, scraping and cleaning wheels and other parts of rolling stock, or any other occupations for which apprenticeship is not provided, except by agreement with the parties concerned. Failing such agreement, the matter shall be referred to a Board of Reference.”

Clause 6.—Special Rates and Conditions.

Add the following new subclause (11):—

“Goggles—(a) Goggles, glasses, and gloves, or other efficient substitute therefor, shall be available for the use of any worker engaged in welding or other work in which their use is required for the protection of the worker.

(b) Every worker shall sign an acknowledgment on receipt thereof, and on leaving employment shall return the same to the Minister.

(c) During the time the same are on issue to the worker he shall be responsible for any loss or damage thereto, fair wear and tear attributable to ordinary use excepted.

(d) No worker shall lend another worker the goggles, glasses, or gloves or substitutes issued to such first-mentioned worker, and if the same are lent both the lender and the borrower shall be deemed guilty of wilful misconduct.

(e) Before goggles, glasses, and gloves or any such substitutes which have been used by a worker are re-issued by the Minister to another worker, they shall be effectively sterilised.”

Clause 7.—Definitions.

Insert new definition as follows:—

“(i) ‘Process worker’ means a worker engaged on repetition work on any automatic, semi-automatic, or single purpose machine, or any machine fitted with jigs, gages, or other tools rendering operations mechanical, or in the assembling parts of mechanical appliances or other metallic articles so made, or any repetitive hand processes whilst employed on munitions of war as defined in National Security Regulations.

Clause 9.—Absence Through Sickness.

Add the following new subclause:—

“(e) An apprentice entitled to the tradesman’s rate by National Security Regulations, shall be paid ‘sick pay’ in accordance with the apprenticeship regulations No. 36.”

Clause 17.—Term.

Strike out the present clause and insert the following:—

“This Award shall remain in force for a period of three years, or for the duration of the present war, whichever shall be the shorter.”

Clause 22.—Apprentices.

Add the following proviso to subclause (c):—

“Provided further, that any Minister adequately equipped to teach apprentices may, with the consent of a committee consisting of a representative of the Minister concerned, a representative of the unions concerned, with the Industrial Registrar as chairman, take on new apprentices up to the proportion of one to each journeyman employed.”

Add new subclause:—

“(f) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award to the contrary, if through lack of work any Minister is unable at any time to find employment and training for an apprentice, and if a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged, the obligations and duties imposed by the indenture may, with the concurrence of the apprentice, his guardian, and the union be suspended for a period agreed upon or if no such agreement is arrived at, may be cancelled by the Committee as stated in subclause (e) of this clause. The onus of proof of circumstances justifying such cancellation shall be on the Minister.

This provision shall be deemed to be included in all contracts of apprenticeship now existing and also in all future contracts entered into.”

Insert new clause 23 as follows:—

“No new designation shall be introduced during the currency of this Award so as to reduce the status of any worker covered thereby.”

Insert new clause 24 as follows:—

“This Award shall not in itself operate to reduce the wages of any worker who is at present receiving above the minimum rate prescribed for his class of work.”

Add a new clause:—

Clause 25.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court appoints, for the purposes of the Award, Boards of Reference. The Boards shall each consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives nominated by the parties. There are assigned to such Boards, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of:—

(i) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and conditions for any machine, occupation, or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award, but so as not to contravene any of the provisions herein;

(ii) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;

(iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time;

(b) separate boards may be appointed for different sections corresponding to the occupations, callings, or avocations referred to in this Award and/or for different districts.

(c) The provisions of regulation 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935 (Appeal from Board), shall be deemed to apply to any Board of Reference appointed hereunder.

SCHEDULE.

Apprentice Regulations.

Regulation 24.—Technical Education Classes.

Add a new subclause (d) (i):—

“An apprentice entitled by National Security Regulation to be paid the full tradesman’s rate shall, when absent from the workshop during working hours for the purpose of attending technical school classes, only be paid for such portion of the time he is so absent as is represented by the proportion that the fifth-year apprenticeship rate, as prescribed by this Award, bears to his full tradesman’s rate.”

Regulation 36.—Lost Time.

Add a new subclause (d):—

“An apprentice entitled by National Security Regulation to be paid the full tradesman’s rate

shall when entitled to sick pay in accordance with this clause, only be paid for such portion of each day as is represented by the proportion that the rate of wage prescribed in this Award for the year of apprenticeship in which the apprentice is serving when the sickness occurred bears to his full tradesman's rate for that day."

Add after "fire control work" in subclause (b) (i) the following:—"except that the margin provided for controlled burning in clause 47 'Wages Schedule' will apply to this work when carried out in Spring and Autumn as a regular job during ordinary working hours."

Strike out subclause (b) (ii) and substitute in lieu thereof:—

"With the exception of men engaged upon 'top disposal' work, fire service outside ordinary hours shall be paid for at the rate of three shillings (3s.) per hour on a basic wage of £4 8s. 0d. per week, the rate to be varied by 3d. per hour with every rise or fall of 11s. in the basic wage. If circumstances beyond the control of the Department render it necessary for a worker to be on the job for a period of more than twelve (12) hours in any one (1) day, such worker shall not be required to work until after the mid-day meal on the following day."

Clause 39.—Lookout Man.

Strike out subclause (a) and substitute in lieu thereof:—

"Any worker detailed for work on a lookout shall receive a margin of one pound five shillings (£1 5s. 0d.) over the basic wage, exclusive of camp allowance, for a week of seven (7) days, including payment for any overtime worked."

Clause 47.—Wages Schedule.

Strike out "Tractor driver, including light motor driven grader units," and add:—

"Tractor drivers—18s. 6d. margin over the basic wage.

Drivers of internal combustion motor graders—£1 10s. 0d. margin over the basic wage."

Add the following:—

"Clearing tracks and fire-lines embracing the following operations:—

Crosscutting logs, working rock culvert and light bridge construction, grubbing, sucker-bashing, cutting down interfering or dangerous trees, forming and gravelling.

4s. margin over the basic wage.

Clause 47.—Wages Schedule—continued.

The margins for individual items as listed in the Award will remain and have effect when carried out as a separate and continuous job.

Controlled burning 4s. margin above the basic wage.

This item will apply when controlled burning is carried out in Spring and Autumn months as a regular job during ordinary working hours. Clause 24(b) will continue to apply to all other fire control work."

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

(No. 4/1942.)

(Reg. 27/1/42.)

THIS Agreement, made this sixteenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1937, between the Bank of New South Wales (hereinafter called "the Bank"), of the one part, and the Bank Officials' Association of Western Australia Union of Workers, Perth (hereinafter called "the Association"), of the other part, whereby it is agreed as follows:—

1.—Scale.

That the minimum rates of salary payable to officers employed by the Bank in the State of Western Australia, except that portion of the State within the twentieth and twenty-sixth parallels of latitude and the one hundred and twenty-fifth and the one hundred and twenty-ninth meridians of longitude, shall (subject to any deductions for guarantee provident and similar funds) be as follows:—

Provided always, that the minimum rate to be paid to any clerk (male or female) and to any male typist upon the attainment of the age of twenty-one years shall be the sum of two hundred and twenty-nine pounds per annum, and the minimum to be paid to any female typist upon the attainment of the age of twenty-one years shall be the sum of one hundred and sixty-eight pounds per annum: Provided nevertheless, that the amount payable to any such clerk or typist (male or female) as aforesaid shall not be less than the

amount for the time being declared by the Court of Arbitration pursuant to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1937, as being the basic wage for male and female workers respectively: Provided further, that in the case of a male officer who joins or has joined the service of the Bank when over the age of nineteen years his salary on reaching the age of twenty-eight years shall be not less than that prescribed for an officer in his twelfth year of service, and shall be increased thereafter as though he had completed eleven years' service on reaching his twenty-eighth birthday.

2.—Branch Managers.

Minimum salaries to be paid to branch managers shall be similar to those obtaining in New South Wales.

3.—Overtime.

The provisions of clause 8 of the Award of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, number 12 of 1941, and published in the *Government Gazette* of Western Australia on the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, shall apply to this Agreement: Provided, however, that no overtime shall be paid to any manager or to any other officer in receipt of a salary in excess of that prescribed in clause 1 hereof for the eighteenth year of service.

4.—General Conditions.

Save as hereby altered, all the provisions contained in the Award of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia referred to in paragraph 3 preceding shall apply to the conditions of service between the Bank and its officers until amended or varied by an Award of the Court of Arbitration pursuant to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1937, by which the parties to this Agreement shall be bound.

5.—Privileges.

Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement, no officer shall suffer loss by way of salary, allowance, position, and/or any other privileges existing at the date hereof, and of existing practices in regard to allowances, privileges, and rights, on the date mentioned, shall not be diminished by this Agreement.

6.—Period of Agreement.

This Agreement shall take effect as on and from the first day of November, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, and shall remain in force for a period of three months, and thereafter, until all or any of its clauses are terminated by notice in writing given by either party to the other, or by authority of both parties to this Agreement: Provided, nevertheless, that the term of this Agreement shall not in any event extend beyond the thirty-first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and forty-four.

7.—Termination of Previous Agreement.

It is hereby mutually agreed and declared that a certain Agreement bearing date the eighteenth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, and made between the parties hereto, shall, as from the thirty-first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, be determined and cease to be of further effect.

Schedule of Amendments.

Clause 2.—Interpretations.

Insert—"Process worker" means a worker engaged on repetition work on any automatic, semi-automatic, or single purpose machine, or any machine fitted with jigs, gauges, or other tools rendering operations mechanical or in the assembling of parts of mechanical appliances or other metallic articles so made, or any repetitive hand processes, whilst employed on munitions of war as defined in National Security Regulations.

Insert New Clause 2 (a):—"Liberty is reserved to either party bound by this Award to apply to the Court at any time for any variation or addition to the wages schedule."

Clause 7.—Payment for Sickness.

Add as follows at end of clause—

"Note—An apprentice entitled to tradesmen's rate by National Security Regulation is to be paid sick pay in accordance with apprenticeship regulation 6 of Apprenticeship Regulations applying to this Award."

Clause 13.—Hours of Duty.

Add new subclause—

(e) The ordinary hours of duty in the Midland Junction Workshops, other than for shift work shall be between 7.0 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. except—

(i) on Saturday, when the work shall finish at noon;

(ii) where the Commissioner and the union mutually agree on some other starting and finishing time.

Add new subclause—

(d) By agreement between the Commissioner and the union the hours for shift work may be worked on the basis of eighty-eight (88) hours per fortnight, with one week of forty (40) hours and one week of forty-eight (48) hours.

Clause 16.—Shift Work.

Delete subclauses (a), (b), (c), and (d) of present Award and insert the following in lieu thereof:—

(a) The Commissioner may, if he so desires, work any part of his establishment on shifts, but before doing so shall give notice of his intention to the union.

(b) Work other than day shift shall not be recognised as afternoon or night shift, unless in either case five (5) consecutive afternoons or nights are worked, but shall be deemed to be overtime; on completion of the fifth (5th) consecutive afternoon's or night's work, the worker shall be deemed to have been employed on afternoon or night shift, as the case may be, during the preceding four (4) afternoons, or nights, and thereafter during any subsequent consecutive afternoons or nights he is so employed.

(c) The loading on the ordinary rates of pay for shift work shall be as follows:—

(i) Where the worker concerned is not in receipt of a war loading.

All shifts except the day shift, shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter. For the purpose of this subclause day shift shall be construed to mean the ordinary working shift ending at or before 6.0 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays and 1.0 p.m. on Saturdays.

(ii) Where the worker concerned is in receipt of a war loading.

Except as provided in subclause (f) the loading on the ordinary rates of pay for shift work shall be on afternoon shift ten per cent. (10%) and on night shift fifteen per cent. (15%).

(d) The sequence of shift work shall not be deemed to be broken under the preceding paragraphs (b) and (c) by reason of the fact that the works are closed on a Sunday or on any public holiday.

(e) Overtime on afternoon or night shifts shall be calculated on the basis of the rate paid for afternoon or night shift respectively.

(f) Workers employed on shift work shall, as far as practicable, change shift every alternate pay period. Any worker employed on shift work who does not change to day shift within four weeks shall thereafter be paid at the rate of time and a quarter while continuing to work other than day shift.

- (vi) An apprentice entitled by National Security Regulations to be paid the full Tradesmen's rate shall, when absent from the Workshop during working hours for the purpose of attending technical school classes only be paid for such portion of the time he is so absent as is represented by the proportion that the fifth-year apprenticeship rate as prescribed by this Award bears to his full tradesman's rate.
- (vii) An apprentice entitled by National Security Regulations to be paid the full tradesman's rate shall, when entitled to sick pay in accordance with this clause, only be paid for such portion of each day as is represented by the proportion that the rate of wage prescribed in this Award for the year of apprenticeship in which the apprentice is serving, when the sickness occurred bears to his full tradesman's rate for that day.

Clause 20—Add new subclauses:—

- (b) Provided that the Commissioner may, with the consent of a Committee of three consisting of a representative of the Commissioner, a representative of the union concerned, and the Industrial Registrar as Chairman take on new apprentices up to the proportion of one to each journeyman employed.
- (c) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award to the contrary, if through lack of work the Commissioner is unable at any time to find employment and training for an apprentice, and if a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged, the obligations and duties imposed by the indenture may, with the concurrence of the apprentice and his guardian and the union, be suspended for a period agreed upon, or if no such agreement is arrived at, may be cancelled by a Com-

mittee, consisting of the Industrial Registrar as Chairman, and one representative of the Commissioner and one representative of the union. The onus of proof of circumstances justifying such cancellation shall be on the Commissioner.

This provision shall be deemed to be included in all contracts of apprenticeship now existing and also in all future contracts entered into.

The wartime loading shall apply as from 30th June, 1941, and all other amendments shall apply as from 15th December, 1941, and shall continue in operation during the currency of the award or for the duration of the present war, whichever shall be the shorter.
