WHEREAS by the Transfer of Land Act, 1893, Amend-ment Act, 1896 (60 Vict., No. 22), the Governor is empowered by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* to revest in His Majesty as of his former estate all or any lands, whereof His Majesty may become the regis-tered proprietor: And whereas His Majesty is now the registered proprietor of Kununoppin Lot 187, registered in the Office of Titles in Volume 943, Folio 121: Now, therefore I, the said Lientenant-Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Conneil. do by this and consent of the Executive Council, do by this Proclamation revest in His Majesty, his heirs and successors Kununoppin Lot 187 aforesaid as of his former estate.

AT a meeting of the Executive Council held in the Executive Council Chambers, at Perth, this 7th day of July, 1943, the following Order in Council was auth-orised to be issued:---

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the Forests Act, 1918, it is provided that the Governor may by an Order in Council declare any Crown lands as State Forests, within the meaning and for the purpose of that Act: Now, therefore, His

WESTERN AUSTRALIAN AGED SAILORS AND SOLDIERS' RELIEF FUND ACT, 1932.

Regulations.

1. In these regulations-

"Application" means application for assistance or benefit.

"Eligible person" means any aged and/or invalid sailors, soldiers, and nurses eligible for membership of the League and widows of sailors or soldiers who fought in the Great War, 1914-1919: Provided always that such sailor, soldier, and widow is domiciled in the State of Western Australia.

2. Applications in writing may be made by eligible persons, addressed to the Western Australian Aged Sailors and Soldiers' Relief Fund Trust, c/o The Returned Sailors, Soldiers, and Airmen's Imperial League of Australia (W.A. Branch, Incorp.).

3. The Trust may submit any application to the League for investigation and the League shall thereupon make all necessary inquiries and shall advise the Trust accordingly.

4. Any eligible person who has made an application to the Trust shall supply all such information and render all such assistance as the League may request or require for the purpose of investigating the merits of the application.

5. A register of applications shall be prepared and maintained by the Trust, in which shall be recorded all relevant details, including the nature and amount of any assistance rendered to eligible persons.

Whenever the Trust grants assistance or benefit to any eligible person it o. whenever the frust grants assistance or benefit to any engine person it may notify the League of the nature and amount thereof and request the League to make the necessary payment. Payments made by the League upon request as afore-said shall be adjusted quarterly by arrangement between the Trust and the League.

- (b) "Cylinder man" whenever used in this Agreement, shall mean a worker who is generally employed at a majority of the undermentioned occupations, namely, filling, preparing, carbonising, and racking beer from a chilling cylinder, but shall not mean any employee who is casually employed in any one of the last-mentioned processes.

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- (c) "Bottle-washer" shall mean any person em-
- ployed washing bottles by hand or machinery. "Fireman" shall mean a person employed in a stokehole attending a steam boiler or gas-(d) producing plant. (e) "Night cellarman and night maltsters" shall
- (e) "Night centarinan and main mainsters" share apply only to cellarmen and mainsters who are employed on nightshift.
 (f) "Leading hands" are employees who are in charge of and responsible for the work of
- others.

2 .--- Wages Schedule.

The parties to this Agreement mutually agree that the minimum rate of wages that shall be paid by the employers respectively to the persons employed by such employers in the capacities undermentioned is as follows:

Workers in cold rooms or cellars with a temperature of less than 45 deg. Fah. shall be paid 3s. 3d. per week in addition to the minimum rate.

Maltsters working nightshift shall receive 1s. per shift as an extra allowance.

-Carters or others feeding and attending to Carters :-horses shall be paid at the rate of 2s, per horse for a week of six days and an extra 8d, per horse for attention given on Sundays.

Stablemen:-Forty-four hours shall constitute week's work from Monday to Saturday in each week.

Boiler cleaning, which shall include scraping, clean-ing, and painting cylinders. For all time which they may be employed at this class of work, workers shall be entitled to be paid at the rate of Is. per hour in addi-tion to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classification.

Ammonia coils :- For all time which they may be employed chipping, cleaning, scraping, or painting aumonia coils workers shall be entitled to be paid at the rate of 1s. per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classifications, and whilst so engaged shall be supplied free with goggles, pullovers, and respirators and allowed reasonable time before the end of each shift to cleanse themselves.

handling :--- Workers employed on breaking, Coal crushing, and handling coal in bunkers or bins shall, for all time whilst so employed, be entitled to be paid at the rate of 6d, per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classifications.

Boots:-The employers agree to supply boots to those workers employed at bottle-washing on the tanks, at the tube, at the filters, at the cask-washing shed, and to be supplied free of cost by the employers.

Oilers and aprons :--- The employers agree to provide oilskin coats and leather aprons for carters, to be used whilst doing the employer's work only.

3.-Hours.

Forty-four hours shall constitute an ordinary week's work for all workers (with the exception of night cellarmen, night maltsters, stablemen, and firemen) and such hours shall, at the option from time to time of each employer, be worked by a worker on either of the undermentioned bases :

- (a) Five and a half day week-Workers shall begin at eight a.m. and conclude at five p.m., on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, and shall work from eight a.m. to twelve noon on Saturday, with an allowance for meals of one hour on ordinary week days other than Saturdays.
- (d) Five day week-Workers shall work on Mondays to Fridays, inclusive, starting at 7.30 a.m. and concluding at 5 p.m., with an in-terval between twelve noon and twelve fortyfive p.m. for meals,

Whenever an employer proposes to alter employment from either one basis to the other, he shall cause notice to be given to workers concerned not later than on the pay-day in the week preceding the week in which the altered basis is to operate. The notice referred to shall the posted on a notice board in a conspicuous place on the premises, and shall apply to all workers alike cov-ered by this Agreement employed in or about any brewcry beer bottling works or malt house.

If in any week during which the employer is working a worker on basis (b) as above prescribed, such worker has fulfilled an ordinary week's work, he shall be paid for all time that he may be called upon to work and actually works on a Saturday at overtime rates of time and a half,

Stablemen and firemen:-Forty-four hours, consisting of eight hours a day, Monday to Friday inclusive, and four hours on Saturday, shall constitute a week's work for firemen and stablemen, who shall commence work not before 5 a.m. on any day, and the employer may require any fireman or stableman to start work at any time after that time, but such work shall not be less than eight hours on Monday to Friday inclusive and four hours on Saturday, and each fireman or stableman shall work forty four hours from Monday to Saturday in every week.

Night cellarman and night maltsters :-- Forty-four hours, consisting of not more than eight hours forty-eight minutes a day, shall constitute a week's work for night cellarmen and night maltsters, who shall commence work not before 5 p.m. or after 2 a.m. on any ordinary working day.

4.-Shift Work.

(Applicable to Topmen, Assistant Topmen, Cellarmen, and Assistant Cellarmen.)

(a) Shiftmen employed as topmen, assistant topmen, cellarmen, and assistant cellarmen shall be deemed to be two (2) or three (3) sets of men working shifts not exceeding eight (8) hours each, spread over a period of sixteen (16) or twenty-four (24) hours on the ordinary working days in each week. All shifts will begin on Sundays, the first at 11.30 p.m. and terminate on Saturdays in each week.

(b) Duty rosters :-- Rosters shall be posted on Fridays in each week showing the shifts for the following days in each week showing the shifts for the following week's work. Such roster shall show the starting and finishing time of each worker during such week. Par-ticulars relating to starting and finishing time displayed on the roster shall be rigidly adhered to. Rosters will provide that the week's work shall begin at 11.30 p.m. on Sunday night, the first shift to terminate at 7.30 a.m., the second shift, when three (3) shifts are worked— from 7.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m., and the third shift from 3.30 p.m. to 11.30 p.m. In order to complete 44 hours work per week, Saturday shifts to be from 8 a.m. to 12 noon. When two (2) shifts are worked work shall begin at 11.20 p.m. Surder wight and tempinets at begin at 11.30 p.m. on Sunday night and terminate at

7.30 a.m., and be from 7.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. on the first five of the second shifts of the week; work to finish at 12 noon on Saturday.

All rostered shifts shall be made to rotate.

(c) A crib time of thirty minutes on each shift shall be allowed to all workers on shift when two or more shifts are worked. Crib time shall be included in the working time.

(d) Workers employed on night or afternoon shift shall receive one shillings (1s.) per shift as an extra allowance.

(e) The provisions of this clause apply only to such topmen, cellarmen, and assistant cellarmen whose names shall be rostered in accordance with the foregoing.

5.—Overtime.

(a) If any worker works earlier than his starting time or later than his quitting time, he shall be paid overtime at the rate of time and a half. Each day shall stand alone.

(b) Any worker, except as provided in clauses 3 and 4 hereof, on day shift, who is required to work before 8 a.m. shall not be called upon by the employer to cease work until 5 p.m. and shall be paid overtime rates for the time worked previous to 8 a.m.

(c) Any worker, except as provided in clauses 3 and 4 hereof, starting work at the request of the employer at a time during the day later than 8 a.m., shall continue his employment without a break, other than for meals, until he has completed on the first five days of each week a service of eigth hours per day and a term of four hours on the sixth day. During each shift so worked such worker shall be paid overtime rates after 5 p.m.

(d) All workers on day shift engaged in or about a brewery or bottling works shall, if required to work more than one hour's overtime after five p.m., knock-off between 5 p.m. and 6 p.m. for refreshments.

(e) Saturday afternoon work shall be avoided as much as possible and eliminated entirely, if possible.

6.-Tea Money.

Tea money shall be paid at the rate of two shillings (2s.) where notice of overtime is not given at least twenty-four hours previously.

7.-Lunch Hour.

Lunch hour shall be taken between 12 o'clock noon and 1 o'clock p.m. or between 1 o'clock p.m. and 2 o'clock p.m.

8.--Smoke-O.

Ten minutes shall be allowed at 10 o'clock a.m. and again at 3 o'clock p.m. This concession, however, does not apply to men working on shifts.

9.-Casual Hands.

All casual hands employed by the employers shall be paid at the rate of 2s. 10d. per hour.

10.—Record.

Each employer shall keep a record of the name of each worker, except stablemen, the time he starts and finishes each day, total number of hours worked, overtime worked, and wages paid to each worker, and such record shall be open to the inspection of the sceretary of or any other person appointed by the union during working hours. Each worker shall sign the record kept for all moneys received by him.

11.-Sundays.

All work performed by workers in any department on Sunday shall receive payment for same at the rate of double time.

Workers who are required to work shift work shall be allowed one Sunday off per fortnight.

12.-Holidays.

All work performed by workers in any department on the undermentioned holidays shall be paid for at double time rates, with a minimum of four hours' pay. All holiday shifts shall rotate. If no work be done, the ordinary rate shall be paid for holidays.

The days to be observed as holidays according to the provisions of this Agreement are Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Anniversary Day (in January), Annual Picnic Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day (in June), Show Day, and Sovereign's Birthday. In case any of the above holidays fall on a Sunday

In case any of the above holidays fall on a Sunday the following Monday shall be observed in lien thereof.

13.—Annual Leave.

Two weeks' annual leave on full pay shall become due to workers with twelve months' service, such leave to be taken at times, to be mutually agreed on between the workers and the employers, between the thirtieth of April and thirtieth of September in each year, in addition to the holidays mentioned in clause 12 hereof. Temporary hands with less than twelve months' service on retirement shall receive a proportion of two weeks' holiday equivalent to seven and one-third hours' pay per month of service.

14.-Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the board of reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the board, and pending the board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for or be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

15.—Engagement.

(a) The engagement between employer and worker, except casual hands, shall be weekly, and may be terminated by a week's notice from either party, except in the case of the worker absenting himself without leave, not obeying lawful commands, or being gnilty of other misconduct, or of the works of the employer being stopped through fire or tempest, when such engagement may be terminated immediately.

16.-Absence through Sickness.

(a) Any worker being unable, through sickness or accident, to attend to his duties, shall notify the employer not later than 10 a.m. on the day he first absents himself from duty, and he shall also satisfy the employer that he is unable to attend to his duties and, if called upon, shall provide a medical certificate that he is unfit to perform his work through sickness.

(b) A worker shall be entitled to payment for nonattendance, on the ground of personal ill-health, for onehalf $(\frac{1}{2})$ day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such illhealth shall be limited to six (6) days in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. Except as aforesaid, a worker shall not be entitled to payment for time lost through sickness. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

17.—Contractors.

All work of any employee in the capacity as mentioned in this Agreement in or about a brewery or bottling works, or in connection with the business of brewing or beer bottling, shall be carried out departmentally by bona fide brewery employees engaged and paid direct by the brewery proprietors and not by agents or contractors. This clause shall not apply to contractors creeting, repairing, or making alterations to buildings or machinery, or to carriers being engaged for the delivery of goods other than beer as has been the practice or custom prior to this date. But when contractors are employed delivering beer the brewery company shall undertake to see that whilst employed on such work the contractors pay to both the drivers and offsiders the same wages and work under the same conditions as is provided in this Agreement.

18.—Area.

This Agreement shall apply to the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth, and to the township of Geraldton.

19.-Term.

This Agreement shall, as to the wages prescribed herein, be retrospective to the first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and forty-three, and shall remain in force for the period of one year from the date hereof.

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT No. 8 of 1943. (Reg. 9/6/43.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this eighteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and forty-three, between the one thousand nine hundred and forty-three, between the West Australian Shop Assistants and Warehouse Em-ployees' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth (herein-after called "the union"), of the one part, and the Shell Company of Australia, Limited; The Vacuum Oil Company Proprietary, Limited, and Caltex, Limited (hereinafter called "the employers"), of the other next, witnesseth that for the considerations hereinafter part, witnesseth that, for the considerations hereinafter appearing, the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree the one with the other as follows:-

Clause (1)-Scope.

This Agreement shall apply to all workers whose vocations prior to the date hereof were covered by any in-dustrial Award or Agreement to which the union was a party in respect of the receiving, handling, or dispatching of oil and/or petroleum products or their containers, but shall not apply to depot-keepers, depot superintendents, officers in charge, or checkers, or any worker who is at present provided for in any Award of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, or in any Industrial Agreement registered in accordance with the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, to which the main is not a party. Nothing in this Agreement shall union is not a party. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to cover workers employed as:—Pipe line attendants, general labourers, gardeners, rubbishmen, head blenders, manufacturers in charge.

Clause (2)—Area.

This Agreement shall be limited in its effect to the South-Western Land Division of the State of Western Australia.

Clause (3)-Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be three years from the twenty-sixth day of March, 1943.

Clause (4)-Definitions.

(a) "Leading haud" shall mean a worker who is appointed in writing as a leading haud by the officer in charge of the depot, installation, and/or warehouse.

(b) "Casual hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the hour and who may be put off or leave the employer's service at any moment without notice: Provided that the minimum engagement for a casual hand shall not be less than four (4) hours in any one day, to be worked

in one continuous period. A casual hand engaged and not permitted to com-mence work shall receive two (2) hours' pay at the prescribed rate of pay for casuals. (c) "Weekly hand" shall mean a worker engaged by

the week and whose employment shall be terminable by not less than one week's notice on either side. Such week's notice cannot be continued from week to week: Provided that any worker employed from week to week: Provided that any worker employed for a period of four (4) consecutive weeks or less shall be classed as a casual hand, and paid not less than the appropriate minimum rate of wages herein prescribed for casual hands, but this proviso shall not apply in cases where a worker employed as a weekle hand here here d' a worker employed as a weekly hand has been dismissed for incompetence or unsuitableness or for any cause referred to in clause (14) hereof.

(d) "Adult": For the purposes of this Agreement the word "adult" shall mean a worker twenty-one (21) years of age and over, or a worker who is in receipt of the prescribed adult rate of pay.

Clause (5)—Hours.

(a) Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked in five and one half days.

(b) Such hours shall be worked between 7.30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday to Friday, inclusive, and between 7.30 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday.

(c) No day's work shall exceed eight (8) hours Monday to Friday, inclusive, to be worked in one continuous shift. Four hours shall constitute a day's work on Sat-urday, also to be worked in a continuous shift. The intervention of the luncheon period shall not be deemed to break a shift.

Clause (6)-Overtime.

(a) Work performed after 12 noon on Saturday or on Sundays or prescribed holidays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(b) Except as provided in subclause (a) hereof, all overtime worked shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(c) Where a worker is required to work continuously after the first four (4) hours of overtime have been worked, he shall be paid for all such work performed at the rate of double time until his usual starting time the next day.

(d) In the computation of overtime each day shall stand by itself.

Clause (7)-Meal Time.

(a) One hour shall be given and taken for a meal.

(b) Lunch hour shall be taken between 12 noon and 2.15 p.m.

(c) Tea hour shall start, in respect of each individual worker, within thirty (30) minutes after his finishing time.

(d) Where work is performed outside the ordinary working hours, breaks of one hour each for meals shall be allowed between 12 o'clock midnight and 1 o'clock a.m. and between 7 a.m. and 8 a.m. (e) The meal hours referred to in this clause shall be taken in one continuous period.

Clause (8)-Meal Money.

Clause (8)—Meal Money. Each worker shall, if required to work after his finishing time from Monday to Friday, or after his finishing time on Saturday, be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) for meal money: Provided that meal money shall not be payable where a worker continues to work on after his finishing time for one half hour or less.

Clause (9)-Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be granted to weekly hands as paid holidays:— New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzae Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(b) A holiday of two weeks on full pay shall be granted to each weekly hand on completion of each year of service. A weekly hand not completing one year of service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays, in proportion to the length of his service.

(c) Where a worker is entitled to holidays under this clause he shall receive at least two (2) weeks' notice from his employer of the date when it will be convenient to the employer for such worker to take his holidays.

(d) Subclause (b) of this clause shall not apply in the case of any worker summarily dismissed for misconduct or dereliction of duty.

Clause (11)-Change Room.

Where an employer usually has more than six (6) workers engaged under the terms of this Agreement, he shall provide his workers with a suitable room for keeping their lats and clothing and to use as a room in which to partake of their meals. Such room shall be situated within a reasonable distance of the employer's place of business and shall be kept in a proper state of cleanliness.

Clause (12)-Higher Duties.

A worker engaged on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for the time so employed.

Clause (13)-Proportion of Juniors.

The number of male juniors shall not exceed the proportion of one to one for the first five male adults and thereafter one junior to every two (2) or fraction of two (2) male adults.

Clause (14)-Engagement.

Except in the case of casual hands, one week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the contract of service: Provided that an employer may at any time dismiss a worker for refusal or neglect to obey orders or for misconduct, or if, after receiving one week's notice, such worker does not carry out his duties in the same manner as he did prior to such notice.

Clause (15)-Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a record containing the following particulars:-

- (a) The name of the worker.
- (b) The class of work performed by him.
- (c) The wages and overtime (if any) paid to each worker.
- (d) The age of each junior worker.
- (e) The hours worked each day.

Any system of automatic recording by means of machines shall be deemed a compliance with this pro-vision to the extent of the information recorded.

Such record or records shall be open to inspection by a representative of the nnion, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on any working day, from Monday to Friday, inclusive.

Clause (16)-Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for or be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

Clause (17)-Board of Reference.

The Court may appoint, for the purpose of the Agreement, a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Agreement, the functions of-

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Agreement or any of them;
- (ii) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Agreement;
- (iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in this Agreement.

Clause (18)-Country Work and Travelling Time

(a) When a worker is engaged on outside work, the employer shall pay all fares, and a proper allowance at current rates shall be paid for all necessary meals. Fares shall be second-class, except when travelling by coastal boat, when saloon fares shall be paid.

(b) When a worker is engaged at such a distance that he cannot return at night, suitable board and lodging shall be found at the employer's expense.

(c) Travelling time outside ordinary working hours shall be paid for at ordinary rates up to a maximum of twelve (12) hours in any twenty four (24) hour period, from the time of starting on the journey: Provided that, when the travelling is by boat, not more than eight (8) hours shall be paid for in such period.

Clause (19)-Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers shall furnish the employer with a certificate showing the following particulars:-

(i) Name in Full. (ii) Age and date of birth.

(a) The certificate shall be signed by the worker. (b) No worker shall have any claim upon the employer for additional wages, in the event of his age being wrongly stated on this certificate: Provided that this subclause shall operate only for the first three (3) months from the date of the worker's first engagement, thereby enabling the employer, if he so desires, to obtain proof of the junior worker's age.

Clause (20)-Special Conditions for Casual Hands referred to in Clause (10) (f).

(a) Work performed during the tea hour :--- When a casual hand is required for duty during his tea hour, whereby his meal is postponed, he shall be paid at the rate of double time until he gets his meal.

(b) Pick up:-

- (i) The engagement places shall be at the em-ployers' stores.
- (ii) A casual hand, shall, as from the time of being picked np, be paid the rate prescribed in clause (10) (f) of this Agreement: Provided that a casual hand, having been picked up and turned to work, which is outside the scope of clause (10) (f), shall be paid the rate provided in that clause, as for four (4) hours, at the least, but thereafter, and until turned to work within the scope of the said subclause, he may be paid such lesser rate as may be elsewhere prescribed for work outside such scope.

Clause (21)-Absence through Sickness.

A worker other than a casual worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance, on the ground of personal ill-health, for one half $(\frac{1}{2})$ day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be be limited to six (6) days (i.e., one week's pay) in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

The worker shall, if required by the employer, produce proof satisfactory to the employer of sickness.
