HIS Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby makes the following order under the authority of section 48 of the Traffic Act, 1919-1941, namely, that in pursuance of clause (1) of paragraph (vii) of subsection (1) of section 46 of the said Act, the York Road Board is hereby empowered to make by-laws prohibiting the carriage by any vehicle on the roads or any specified roads in a prescribed area, of a load (including the weight of the vehicle) exceeding the weight prescribed in the maximum load that may be lawfully carried on such roads or specified roads.

(a) No person or local authority shall, except between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. any day, and then only by means of a hose, watercan or other non-mechanical contrivance held in the hand, use water supplied under the said Act for watering garden or grass plots in streets within the Scarborough and Hammersley Wards of the Perth Road Board District.

(b) No person shall, except between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 p.m., on any day use water supplied under the Act in any place within the area aforesaid, for watering any private lawn or garden by means of any mechanical or fixed sprinkler or any other mechanical contrivance or by means of any hose temporarily fixed at the outlet thereof.

2. This order shall continue in full force and operation until revoked by a subsequent order made by me under the said by-law 283A.

## Schedule.

## MARKETING OF BARLEY ACT, 1946.

## Regulations.

## Part I.

1. These regulations may be cited as the "Marketing of Barley Regulations."

## Preliminary.

2. In the regulations, unless the contrary intention appears, "the Board" means The Western Australian Barley Marketing Board constituted under the Act; "the Act" means the Marketing of Barley Act, 1946.

## Elective Members—Qualification.

3. No person shall be qualified for election as an elective member of the Board unless at the time when he is nominated as a candidate for election he is a producer within the meaning of that term as contained in section 4 of the Act, and is not—

- (a) of unsound mind; or
- (b) an undischarged bankrupt within the meaning of the laws relating to bankruptcy; or
- (c) a person who has been convicted of an indictable offence for which a sentence of imprisonment for twelve months or longer may be imposed.

## Elections.

4. For the purposes of elections of elective members of The Western Australian Barley Marketing Board—

- (a) There shall be a Returning Officer who shall be such person as the Board may from time to time appoint.
- (b) The Board may cancel the appointment of any person as Returning Officer.
- (c) The Board shall by public notice fix a day for the election by the producers of the first elective members of the Board.
- (d) The day so fixed shall not be less than two months nor more than three months after the date of the publication of the day fixed for the election.
- (e) The nomination day for the nomination of candidates for such election shall be not less than fourteen days nor more than one month preceding the day fixed for the said election.
- (f) Only persons who are producers within the meaning of the Act will be eligible to be registered as electors and unless and until so registered will not be entitled to vote at such election.
- (g) Within seven days after the said publication, the Returning Officer shall by Public Notice inform producers—
  - (i) of the intention to hold the election;
  - (ii) of the date fixed for the election;
  - (iii) of the nomination day fixed for such election; and
  - (iv) of the address of the Returning Officer.
- (h) As soon as reasonably may be after the said publication, the Returning Officer shall prepare a roll of electors for use at the elections.
- (i) Any person who is eligible for enrolment upon the said roll of electors and wishes to be enrolled thereon, shall make application for such enrolment in writing in accordance with Form No. 1 in Appendix I. to the Regulations, and shall send or deliver the same to the address of the Returning Officer as notified in accordance with paragraph (g) hereof; and so that such application shall be in the hands of the Returning Officer by 12 o'clock noon 21 days before the nomination day so fixed.
- (j) Such application shall be accompanied by evidence satisfactory to the Returning Officer of the eligibility of the applicant for enrolment as an elector upon the said roll of electors.
- (k) When the application is sent by post and sufficient postage has not been prepaid thereon, the Returning Officer shall reject the same; and, when any application is received by the Returning Officer after 12 o'clock noon 21 days before nomination day, the Returning Officer shall reject the same.
- (l) When the Returning Officer has prepared the roll of electors as aforesaid, he shall sign each page thereof, and thereafter such roll shall be the electoral roll to be used at the said election.
- (m) Only persons whose names appear on the said electoral roll shall be entitled to vote at the said election.

5. When, after the first elective members of the Board have been elected, any extraordinary vacancy arises or any vacancy is about to rise by effluxion of time in relation to the membership of an elective member of the Board, the following provisions shall apply:—

- (a) In the case of an extraordinary vacancy, the Returning Officer shall notify the Chairman of the Board thereof by writing under his hand as soon as possible after such extraordinary vacancy has arisen.
- (b) In the case of vacancies occurring by effluxion of time, the Returning Officer shall, at least three months before the term of office of an elective member will expire by effluxion of time, inform the Chairman of the Board by writing under his hand of the name of the elective member whose term of office is about to expire, and of the date upon which such term of office will expire.
- (c) As soon as reasonably may be after the receipt of a notification from the Returning Officer under paragraph (a) or paragraph (b) hereof, the Board shall fix the date for the holding of the election to fill the vacancy or vacancies of which it has been notified, and shall forthwith notify the Returning Officer of the date so fixed.
- (d) The date so fixed shall be not less than two months and not more than three months after the date of the publication by the Returning Officer of the notice to be published by him in accordance with paragraph (e) hereof.
- (e) Upon receipt by him of the notice from the Board fixing the day for the holding of the election, the Returning Officer shall by Public Notice inform the commercial producers—
  - (i) of the intention to hold the election;
  - (ii) of the date fixed for the election;
  - (iii) of the nomination day; and
  - (iv) of the address of the Returning Officer.
- (f) The nomination day shall be not less than fourteen days nor more than one month prior to the day fixed for the election.

#### Electoral Roll.

6. (1) For the purposes of elections to be held for the election of elective members of the Board, after the first elective members have been elected, the Returning Officer shall, on the 30th day of September next following the date of the election of the said first elective members, or as soon as reasonably may be thereafter, and on the 30th day of September in each succeeding year, or as soon as reasonably may be thereafter, prepare an electoral roll for use at all elections, whether to fill extraordinary vacancies or ordinary vacancies, during the currency thereof.

(2) Such electoral roll, when prepared, shall be signed on each page thereof by the Returning Officer, shall be the electoral roll for all the elections aforesaid, and shall continue current and in force until the next electoral roll has been prepared in accordance with these regulations: Provided that—

- (a) if during the currency of any electoral roll an extraordinary vacancy arises which renders an election necessary to fill such vacancy, such electoral roll may, for the purposes of such election, but in the manner authorised by these regulations, be amended by the Returning Officer by the enrolment thereon of persons who since the preparation thereof have become eligible for enrolment and registered as electors, and by the removal therefrom of the names of persons enrolled thereon who since the preparation thereof have ceased to be eligible for enrolment as electors or to vote at an election;
- (b) any person whose name is not enrolled as an elector on the electoral roll then in existence and who would be entitled to apply for enrolment on such electoral roll under these regulations, if a new electoral roll were then being prepared under these regulations and who desires to vote as an elector in any election about to be held to fill an extraordinary vacancy, may, at any time before 12 o'clock noon 21 days before the last day for the receipt of nominations of candidates for such election, make application in accordance with regulation 4 of these regulations for enrolment as an elector upon the said electoral roll, and, subject to the requirements of these regulations, the Returning Officer shall enrol the name of the applicant upon such electoral roll, and upon the applicant being so enrolled he shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges of a duly registered elector.

7. (1) Where any producer eligible for enrolment on the electoral roll is a limited liability company or other corporate body, the board of directors or other management authority thereof may authorise any director, trustee, or other member of such board or management authority or its manager, secretary, or other officer (being a person not already enrolled or entitled to be enrolled on the electoral roll) to represent the company or other body aforesaid as an elector, and, upon receipt of an application for enrolment from such representative, together with a certificate in writing of such authority aforesaid under the hand of the managing director of the company or the president or chairman of the management authority of such other corporate body, as the case may be, the Returning Officer may, subject to all other requirements of these regulations being satisfied, enrol such representative person on the electoral roll in accordance with his application.

(2) In the case of a partnership, either one of the partners, but not more than one, at any one time may apply for enrolment and be enrolled on the electoral roll upon which the partnership is entitled to be enrolled.

(3) No person shall be entitled to be enrolled on the electoral roll more than once, whether as an elector in his own right or as the representative of a limited liability company or other corporate body, or as a partner in a partnership, or otherwise.

(4) Every authority given under paragraph (1) hereof shall remain effective for all subsequent elections and electoral rolls until written notice of revocation is sent or delivered to the Returning Officer.

(5) Any company or other corporate body may cancel or revoke any authority given by it under this regulation by notice in writing under the hand of the said Board of Directors or other management authority, as the case may be, sent or delivered to the Returning Officer:

Provided that any such cancellation or revocation shall not invalidate any vote given by the representative person enrolled and voting by virtue of such authority at an election held previously to such cancellation or revocation.

(6) Upon receipt of notice of cancellation or revocation of authority as aforesaid, the Returning Officer shall forthwith remove from the electoral roll the name of the representative person whose authority has been so cancelled or revoked.

#### Nominations.

8. (1) Every nomination of a candidate for election as a member of the Board shall be made in writing, in the Form No. 2 in Appendix I, to these regulations and shall be signed by the candidate himself and also by a proposer and seconder, both of whom shall be persons enrolled on the electoral roll to be used at the election.

(2) Every nomination of a candidate shall be sent or delivered to the Returning Officer so as to be in his hands not later than 12 o'clock noon of the nomination day for the election.

(3) Every nomination form received by the Returning Officer after the time aforesaid shall be rejected by him.

(4) Where any nomination is sent by post, but the postage thereon is wholly unpaid or insufficiently prepaid thereon, the Returning Officer shall refuse to accept such nomination, and such nomination shall be deemed not to have been sent or delivered to the Returning Officer within the meaning of these regulations.

(5) Forthwith, after 12 o'clock noon of the nomination day, the Returning Officer shall examine all the nominations received by him and satisfy himself that the candidates whose names appear on the nomination forms are eligible for election, and that the persons who have signed the said forms as proposer and seconder are entitled under these regulations so to sign the same.

(6) The Returning Officer shall reject any nomination form which, in his opinion, is not in order as required by these regulations, and any such rejection shall be final and conclusive as against the candidate.

(7) An election shall be held for the first elective members, but in subsequent elections where the number of candidates nominated does not exceed the number of candidates to be elected, the Returning Officer shall forthwith certify that fact, together with the names, addresses and occupations of the candidates nominated in accordance with Form No. 3 in Appendix I. to these regulations to the Board, and such certificate, when received by the Board, shall be the final and conclusive evidence of the election of the said candidates as members of the Board.

(8) As soon as reasonably may be after the receipt by him from the Returning Officer of the certificate mentioned in paragraph (7) hereof, the Chairman of the Board shall cause a copy thereof to be published in the *Government Gazette* and in a newspaper published in Perth.

(9) When the number of candidates nominated exceeds the number to be elected, the Returning Officer shall hold an election in accordance with these regulations, as hereinafter provided.

#### Polling.

9. (1) When after the receipt of nominations of candidates an election is necessary to elect an elective member or elective members of the Board, the Returning Officer shall, as soon as practicable after the closing time for the receipt of such nominations, but within seven days thereafter, cause ballot papers to be printed in accordance with Form No. 4 in Appendix I. to these regulations containing the names of all the candidates in alphabetical order.

(2) The ballot paper shall set forth in a space provided for the purpose notice of the day fixed for the closing of the poll.

10. (1) When the ballot papers have been printed as aforesaid, the Returning Officer shall send by prepaid letter post to each person, whose name appears as an elector on the electoral roll, to his postal address as shown on his application for enrolment, one ballot paper, with the initials of the Returning Officer, or of some other person authorised in that behalf by the Returning Officer, indorsed on the back thereof, together with an envelope marked "Ballot Paper Envelope," and another envelope addressed to the Returning Officer and a form of statement in the Form No. 5 in Appendix I. to these regulations, to be completed and signed by the elector.

(2) The Returning Officer may, before sending the statement aforesaid to an elector, fill in the particulars to be furnished therein so that the same will be ready for signature and completion by the elector when marking his ballot paper.

11. (1) For the purpose of casting his vote at the election, the elector shall mark his vote on the ballot paper received by him as aforesaid in the manner hereinafter provided, and shall then place the same in the envelope marked "Ballot Paper Envelope," and seal the envelope. He shall then sign and complete the statement in accordance with the directions stated therein and then place the sealed envelope, with the ballot paper enclosed therein and the statement signed and completed in the envelope addressed to the Returning Officer, and seal such last-mentioned envelope.

(2) The elector may then send by prepaid letter post or may deliver the envelope addressed to the Returning Officer, with its said enclosures, to the Returning Officer at his address shown on the envelope, but so that such envelope shall be in the hands of the Returning Officer not later than 12 o'clock noon of the day fixed for the closing of the poll.

(3) Where any envelope containing the ballot paper is sent by post to the Returning Officer, but the postage thereon is wholly unpaid or insufficiently paid thereon, the Returning Officer shall refuse to accept the same, and such envelope, with its enclosures, shall be deemed not to have been sent or delivered to the Returning Officer within the meaning of these regulations.

12. If, prior to the closing of the poll, an elector satisfies the Returning Officer that he has not received a ballot paper and is entitled to vote at the election, or that the ballot paper or envelopes received by him have been lost or destroyed, and that he has not already voted at the poll, the Returning Officer may post or give personally to such elector a ballot paper and envelopes or a further ballot paper and envelopes, as the case may be.

#### Preferential Voting.

13. (1) Voting shall be by means of a preferential ballot.

(2) When only one candidate is to be elected and there are not more than two candidates, the elector shall mark his vote on the ballot paper by placing the numeral 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he votes.

(3) When only one candidate is to be elected and there are more than two candidates, the elector shall mark his vote on the ballot paper by placing the numeral 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he votes as his first preference, and he shall give contingent votes for all the remaining candidates by placing the numerals 2, 3, and so on (as the case requires) opposite their names, so as to indicate by such numerical sequence the order of his preference.

(4) When two candidates are to be elected, the elector shall mark his vote on the ballot paper by placing the numeral 1 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he votes as his first preference and the numeral 2 opposite the name of the candidate for whom he votes as his second preference, and he shall give contingent votes for all the remaining candidates by placing the numerals 3, 4, and so on (as the case requires) opposite their names so as to indicate by such numerical sequence the order of his preference.

#### Ballot Papers.

14. (1) The Returning Officer shall keep a locked and sealed ballot box, with the words "Barley Marketing Board Ballot Box" marked thereon, and, as and when the envelope containing the ballot paper and the statement is received by him from an elector, he shall open the outer envelope and extract therefrom the statement and the sealed envelope containing the ballot paper.

(2) He shall thereupon examine the statement and satisfy himself that the same is in order and that the elector who signed the statement is enrolled on the electoral roll and entitled to vote.

(3) If and when he is so satisfied, he shall place the statement in some place of security for safe keeping and shall immediately place the envelope containing the ballot paper unopened in the said ballot box and so leave the same until the close of the poll.

(4) If, upon examining the statement as aforesaid, the Returning Officer is not satisfied that the statement is in order, or that the person who signed the same is enrolled on the electoral roll and entitled to vote, he shall retain such statement and the envelope containing the ballot paper unopened in a safe place and at once notify the elector in writing that his ballot paper has not been accepted for the reasons to be stated in the notice.

(5) If, before the closing of the poll, a voter who has received notice as provided for in paragraph (4) hereof satisfies the Returning Officer that he is an elector and entitled to vote at the election, the Returning Officer shall forthwith place the sealed envelope containing such voter's ballot paper unopened in the said ballot box and so leave the same until the closing of the poll.

(6) If a voter who has received notice as provided for in paragraph (4) hereof fails to satisfy the Returning Officer in the manner required by paragraph (5) hereof, the Returning Officer shall reject the ballot paper received from such voter. Upon such rejection he shall indorse on the envelope containing the ballot paper the word "rejected," and sign the same, and then place such envelope unopened in some place of security for safe keeping until after the election.

#### Scrutineers.

15. (1) Each candidate at an election shall be entitled to appoint, in writing, one scrutineer to be present when the envelopes containing ballot papers relating to such election are being opened at the commencement of the scrutiny and to remain during the scrutiny.

(2) Every scrutineer shall, before he acts, make and sign, before the Returning Officer, declaration in accordance with Form No. 6 in Appendix I.

#### The Scrutiny.

16. (1) The counting of the votes cast at an election shall be carried out by the Returning Officer, in the presence of the scrutineers, at the office of the Board, and shall not commence until after 4 o'clock on the election day. The Returning Officer may from time to time adjourn the scrutiny to a day and hour fixed by him and notified to the scrutineers.

(2) The Returning Officer may appoint such officers as he deems necessary to assist in the conduct of an election and count thereof.

(3) Subject as hereunder provided, the method of conducting the count shall be the same as that prescribed under the Electoral Act, 1907-1936, for the counting of the votes taken at an election of members of the Legislative Assembly. Provided that—

(a) When two candidates are to be elected the count of the votes will proceed until one candidate has received an absolute majority, when he shall be declared elected. The first elected candidate shall then be eliminated from the count, and to proceed with the election of the second candidate, all the ballot papers, including those which have been set aside as exhausted, shall be brought into operation and again sorted into first preference votes. The first preference votes of the eliminated successful candidate shall be distributed according to the second preference markings shown thereon to the remainder of the candidates, and when added to their respective first preference votes shall constitute the first count for the second candidate. The procedure from then on shall be the same as in the counting of votes for the election of one candidate.

(b) Votes shall not be deemed to be informal except in the case hereinafter mentioned.

(4) As soon as practicable after the closing of the poll, the Returning Officer shall, in the presence of the scrutineers—

(a) open the ballot box and remove therefrom the envelopes containing the ballot papers; and

(b) open the envelopes containing the ballot papers and extract the ballot papers therefrom; and

(c) examine every ballot paper and satisfy himself that the same bears the authorised officer's initials indorsed thereon and decide whether such ballot paper is formal or informal; and

(d) count all formal ballot papers and reject all informal ballot papers.

(5) The Returning Officer shall be the sole and final judge as to whether a ballot paper is informal.

(6) Any candidate may attend and be present at the counting of the votes.

17. (1) A ballot paper shall be informal—

(a) if it is not initialed by the Returning Officer or the other officer authorised in that behalf; or

(b) if, subject as hereinafter provided, it is marked in any other manner than prescribed in regulation (11) of these regulations; or

(c) if it has upon it any mark or writing not authorised by these regulations, which in the opinion of the Returning Officer will enable any person to identify the elector; or

(d) if it does not indicate the elector's vote, or, if when there are more than two candidates it is not marked so as effectively to indicate the elector's preference as regards all candidates; or

(e) if no mark is indicated on it.

(2) A ballot paper shall not be informal for any reason other than the reasons stated in paragraph (1) hereof, but shall be given effect to according to the elector's intention so far as his intention is clear, and, in particular when only one candidate is to be elected and there are only two candidates, a ballot paper shall not be informal by reason only of the elector having indicated his vote or first preference by a cross instead of the numeral 1.

18. As and when the Returning Officer shall have completed the counting of the votes, he shall declare the result of the election in the presence of the scrutineers and of any candidates who may be present at the time.

19. (1) When the result of an election has been ascertained and declared, the Returning Officer shall forthwith furnish to the Board a certificate of such result in accordance with Form No. 7 in Appendix I. to these regulations, and state therein the names, addresses, and occupations of the candidates who have been elected; and such certificate, when received by the Board, shall be final and conclusive evidence of the election of the said candidates as members of the Board.

(2) As soon as reasonably may be after the receipt by the Board from the Returning Officer of the certificate mentioned in paragraph (1) hereof, the Board shall cause a copy thereof to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and a newspaper published in Perth.

20. Where any person whose name appears on the electoral roll to be used at any election has since such enrolment ceased to be a producer within the meaning of the Act, such person shall not be entitled to vote at any election held subsequently to his ceasing to be a producer as aforesaid merely because his name appears as an elector on the said electoral roll, and in any such case the Returning Officer, upon it coming to his knowledge that the person is no longer a producer shall cause his name to be struck off such roll.

21. The Returning Officer shall retain all ballot papers and statements received by him in connection with any election held under these regulations until the expiration of three months after the declaration of the result of such election, and may then cause the same to be destroyed.

22. Any person who, not being entitled to be enrolled as an elector for the purpose of an election held under the Act and these regulations, makes a claim to be enrolled, and any person who makes any statement which is to his knowledge false in any application for enrolment, or in any statement accompanying a ballot paper verifying the voter's right to vote, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

23. Subject to subsection (2) of section 7 of the Act, all costs, charges, and expenses as incurred by the Returning Officer in connection with the publication of notices, the receipt of nominations of candidates for election, application for enrolment by producers, preparation of electoral rolls, and the conduct of elections, including any fee that may be allowed, or in connection with any other matters incidental thereto and as certified in writing by the Returning Officer under his hand, and communicated by the Returning Officer to the Board, shall be borne and paid by the Board or reimbursed to the Returning Officer by the Board out of moneys from time to time in its hands: Provided that the Board may at its own expense have the accounts of the Returning Officer audited by the Auditor General, whose decision thereon shall be final as between the parties concerned.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 12 of 1946.

Between Australian Workers' Union Westralian Branch Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and Sydney Atkinson Motors Limited and others, Respondents.

WHEREAS an Industrial Dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941 and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to all workers employed in—

- (a) the retail selling of petrol and/or oil;
- (b) washing and/or cleaning and/or polishing and/or greasing motor vehicles, sweeping up, and/or cleaning and/or tidying up the employer's premises;
- (c) changing tyres and/or tyre inflating and/or tube patching and/or wheel changing and/or lamp globe changing and/or servicing motor vehicles, where no mechanical knowledge is required;
- (d) car parking in service stations and/or places where a fee for same is charged.

2.—Area.

This Award shall apply to that area of the State of Western Australia South of the 26th parallel of latitude and West of the 123rd degree of longitude.

3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be a period of three (3) years from the beginning of the next pay period commencing after the date hereof.

5.—Casual Workers.

(a) A casual worker shall mean a worker who is employed for less than six (6) days and who may be discharged or leave the employer's service at any time without notice.

(b) A casual worker shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the ordinary rate prescribed.

6.—Living-in, Boarding, Etc.

(a) Where a male worker is required to sleep on the employer's place of business, he shall be provided, free of charge, with reasonable accommodation.

Time spent by such worker in sleep on the employer's place of business shall not be regarded as time of duty to be paid for. He shall, if "called out" attend to the requirements of any late customer without any extra pay: Provided that, for all "calls out" in excess of five (5) in any one week, ten (10) minutes for each call shall be allowed and paid for at the rate of time and a half.

Should any dispute arise as to the sleeping accommodation provided for male workers, same shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

(b) Except in the case of members of the employer's family, no worker shall be permitted to board with his employer, except by permission in writing of the union.

7.—Hours.

(a) Except as provided in Clause 6, forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, which may, subject to sub-clause (e) of this clause, be worked in seven (7) days.

(b) The spread of shift for each worker shall not exceed twelve (12) hours.

(c) The daily hours of work may be divided into three (3) periods of work.

(d) Subject to Clause 6, the minimum period of work to be paid for shall not be less than two (2) hours.

(e) On two days in any one week the employer shall be entitled to work the worker up to but not exceeding twelve (12) hours on each of these two days, and if the provisions of this subclause are availed of by working the worker for more than ten hours on one or both of the two days, such worker shall be allowed one full day off during that week on full pay.

8.—Overtime.

Except as provided in Clause 7 (e), all work performed beyond nine (9) hours on any one day, or beyond forty-four (44) hours in any one week, shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

Should overtime become payable on account of a relieving worker coming on duty late, the employer shall be entitled to make a deduction from the relieving worker's pay for the time that such worker was absent from duty.

9.—Sunday and Holiday Work.

Work done on Sundays by junior workers should be paid for at the rate of double time, and work done by all workers on holidays as prescribed in Clause 11 of this Award shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

10.—Roster.

A roster of the working hours shall be exhibited in each establishment, in such a place as it may be conveniently and readily seen by each worker concerned. Such roster shall denote the hours to be worked by each worker and shall be open for inspection on the premises of the employer by a duly accredited representative of the union, at any reasonable time during working hours. Such roster shall be drawn up in such a manner as to show the hours of each worker for one day in advance, and may only be altered on account of the sickness or absence of a worker or on account of any contingency that the employer could not reasonably foresee.

11.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu thereof, shall be observed as holidays—New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day.

Provided that if work be done payment shall be made in accordance with Clause 9 hereof.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under the Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

## 12.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive week's leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

(e) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (c) of this section, to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on holidays on full pay.

(f) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(g) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

## 13.—Time and Wages Book.

Each employer shall provide a Time and Wages Book, to be kept in a place where it is easily accessible to both the employer and the worker. Such book shall show the name of the worker, his occupation and age, if under 21 years of age, the time he starts and finishes each period of work each day, the number of hours worked by and the wages and overtime paid to each worker, and the worker's signature for same.

The employer and the worker shall be severally responsible for the proper posting of such book daily. Such book shall be open for inspection by the secretary-treasurer or any other person authorised by him between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday to Friday, inclusive; and 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday: Provided that an employer may, at his option, in lieu of a time book, provide a mechanical clock for the purpose of recording the starting and finishing times of workers, in which case a record of the number of hours worked each day by each worker and the wages and overtime paid to such worker shall be entered on a card or check (used in connection with such clock) which shall be signed by the worker on receipt of wages each week.

The employer and the worker shall be severally responsible for the correct keeping of such card or check, which shall be open for inspection in the same manner as the Time and Wages Book before-mentioned.

## 14.—General.

(a) A copy of this Award shall be kept by each employer where the industry is carried on, where it is easily accessible to the workers.

(b) The employment of females is hereby prohibited.

(c) The employer shall provide a wash-basin and towels for the employees' use, free of charge.

(d) All wages shall be paid at least weekly, and no employer shall hold more than two (2) days' wages in hand.

(e) Three (3) junior workers may be employed before an adult is employed; thereafter two (2) additional junior workers may be employed to each adult worker employed under this Award.

(f) Notices: The secretary-treasurer of the union may post notices.

(g) The contract of service shall be on a weekly basis: Provided that one day's notice of the termination of service may be given on either side. Such day's notice cannot be continued from day to day.

(h) Time allowed for meals shall be mutually arranged between the employer and the worker: Provided that no deduction from the daily hours of work shall be made for the time occupied by any worker in having a meal, if such meal is partaken on the employer's premises.

## 15.—Payment for Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(b) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

## 16.—Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers shall furnish the employer with a certificate showing the following particulars:—

- (1) Name in full;
- (2) age and date of birth.

(a) The certificate shall be signed by the worker.

(b) No worker shall have any claim upon the employer for additional wages, in the event of his age being wrongly stated on this certificate: Provided that this subclause shall operate only for the first three (3) months from the date of the worker's first engagement, thereby enabling the employer, if he so desires, to obtain proof of the junior worker's age.

## 17.—Under Rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who, by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

## 18.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court appoints for the purpose of this Award, a Board of Reference.

The Board shall consist of a chairman and two other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

There are assigned to the Board in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Award, the functions of—

(i) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of this Award; or any of them.

(ii) Deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.  
No. 17 of 1943.

Between The Food Preservers' Union of Australia, Western Australian Branch, Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, applicant, and Peters American Delicacy Co. (W.A.) Limited, respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said agreement an Award of the Court: Now therefore the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers following the vocations mentioned in clause 7 hereof in the Ice Cream Manufacturing Industry.

2.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the next pay period following the date hereof.

4.—Definition.

“Casual worker” shall mean a worker employed for one (1) week or less.

5.—Hours of Work.

(a) Subject to Clause 8 hereof, forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work to be worked in five (5) or five and a half (5½) days at the option of the employer.

(b) Such hours shall be worked between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. Monday to Friday inclusive and 7 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday.

(c) A meal break of not less than forty-two (42) minutes shall be allowed between 12 noon and 1.30 p.m.

6.—Meal Intervals.

No worker shall work more than five (5) hours without a suitable interval for a meal, but this provision shall not apply where the worker finishes work for the day at or before 1 p.m. on Saturday, or where on Monday to Friday inclusive, a female worker ceases work at or before 6 p.m. and a male worker finishes work at or before 6.30 p.m.

7.—Wages.

The minimum rates of wages payable under this Award shall be as set out hereunder:—

(f) Casual Workers—

Casual workers shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. above the minimum rates prescribed herein.

8.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in excess of eight hours forty-eight minutes per day or before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) All time worked on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) If a worker is required to work during his recognised meal time, and the commencement of his or her meal time is postponed for more than one hour, he or she shall be paid at overtime rates until he or she gets his or her meal.

(d) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one hour, he or she shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof: Provided that such payment need not be made to a worker living in the same locality as the factory, who could reasonably return home for a meal.

9.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be allowed as holidays and paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) All work performed on any of the foregoing days shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

10.—Annual Leave.

(a) A holiday of one week on full pay shall be granted to each worker on completion of each year of service. A worker not completing a year of service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays, in proportion to the length of his or her service.

(b) This clause shall not apply to a worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his or her contract of service.

## 11.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to forty-four (44) hours in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

## 12.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this award than that which he or she usually performs shall be entitled to the higher rate whilst so employed.

## 13.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of a casual worker, whose engagement shall be by the hour, the contract of hiring of every worker shall be a weekly contract, terminable on either side by one (1) week's notice given on any day.

(b) Any worker not attending for duty shall lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance, subject to the provisions of Clause 11 hereof, as to payment for absence on account of illness.

(c) This clause does not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct.

(d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

## 14.—Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record containing the following particulars:—

- (a) The name of each worker;
- (b) the class of work performed;
- (c) the hours worked each day;
- (d) the wage (and overtime, if any) paid;
- (e) the age of each junior worker.

Such record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the union once in each week.

## 15.—Aged and Infirm Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

## 16.—Posting of Award.

The employer shall, upon request of the union, post a copy of this Award in a conspicuous place in the factory, where it is easily accessible to the workers.

## 17.—Board of Reference.

For the purposes of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said board shall have assigned to it in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute the functions of:—

(a) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of the Award or any of them;

(b) classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award;

(c) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

## 18.—Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers, upon being engaged shall, if required, furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

- (1) Name in full;
- (2) age and date of birth;
- (3) name of each previous employer and length of service with such employer;
- (4) class of work performed for each previous employer.

Such of the foregoing particulars as are within the knowledge of an employer shall be endorsed on the certificate and signed by the employer, upon request of the worker.

No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay, in the event of the age or length of service of the worker being wrongly stated on the certificate. If any junior worker shall wilfully misstate his age in the above certificate he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

## 19.—Representative Interviewing Workers.

In the case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal interval, on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer, more than once in any one week.

## 20.—No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the wage of any worker who at the date of this Award was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

## 21.—Excessively Wet Work.

Where the conditions of work are such that workers are unable to avoid their clothing becoming excessively wet, they shall be supplied with protective clothing or material.

## Memorandum of Agreement.

## 1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers following the vocations mentioned in clause 6 hereof in the Ice Manufacturing Industry, including the handling of ice from tanks into store.

## 2.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

## 3.—Terms.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the next pay period following the date hereof.

## 4.—Definition.

A "casual worker" shall mean and include a worker competent to do the work he is engaged to do and who is, without any fault of his own, dismissed or refused work (as it is hereby agreed he may be) before the expiration of six (6) days from and including the day he starts work.

## 5.—Hours of Work.

Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work. For the sake of convenience in the rostering of shifts an eighty-eight (88) hour fortnight may be worked if the employer so desires.

## 6.—Wages.

The minimum rates of wages payable under this Award shall be as set out hereunder:—

## (d) Casual Workers—

Casual workers shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. (10%) above the minimum rates prescribed herein.

## 7.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in excess of eight (8) hours in any one day shall be deemed overtime and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(b) All time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(c) Work done on New Year's Day, Labour Day, Christmas Day or Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(d) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one hour, he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof: Provided that such payment need not be made to a worker living in the same locality as the factory, who could reasonably return home for a meal.

## 8.—Holidays.

(a) Each worker, other than a casual worker, shall be entitled to twelve (12) days' annual leave each year on full pay, or should the period of continuous employment be less than one year, the worker shall be paid holiday pay in proportion as his length of service is to the full year's employment. Annual leave shall be taken at a time suitable to the convenience to the employer.

(b) Holidays without deduction of pay shall be limited to twelve days per annum as aforesaid.

(c) The following shall be the days upon which, if the employer's establishment be closed, payment may be deducted, namely—New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(d) If Christmas Day falls on a Sunday, the following Monday shall be kept.

(e) If the employer's establishment remains open on any of the abovenamed ten days, ordinary rates shall apply except in the case of New Year's Day, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(f) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct, or who illegally severs his contract of service, shall not be entitled to the benefits of this clause.

## 9.—Rotation of Shifts.

(a) Where a worker works afternoon shift only or afternoon and night shifts in rotation, but does not work day shift one week out of three, he shall receive one shilling (1s.) per shift in addition to the rates prescribed in Clause 6 hereof.

(b) Where a worker is called upon to work night shift continuously, such worker shall be paid five per cent (5%) in addition to his ordinary rate, plus one shilling (1s.) per shift.

## 10.—Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one half (½) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to forty-four (44) hours in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.



## 11.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of a casual worker, the contract of hiring of every worker shall be a weekly contract, terminable on either side by one (1) week's notice given on any day.

(b) This clause does not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct.

## 12.—Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep or cause to be kept, a record containing the following particulars:—

- (a) The name of each worker;
- (b) the class of work performed;

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

## 14.—Posting of Award.

The employer shall, upon request of the union, post a copy of this Award in a conspicuous place in the factory, where it is easily accessible to the workers.

## 15.—Board of Reference.

For the purposes of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute the functions of:—

- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
- (b) classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award;
- (c) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

## 16.—Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers, upon being engaged shall, if required, furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

- (1) Name in full;
- (2) age and date of birth;
- (3) name of each previous employer and length of service with such employer;
- (4) class of work performed for each previous employer.

Such of the foregoing particular as are within the knowledge of an employer shall be endorsed on the certificate and signed by the employer, upon request of the worker.

No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay, in the event of the age or length of service of the worker being wrongly stated on the certificate. If any junior worker shall wilfully misstate his age in the above certificate he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

## 17.—Breakdowns, Etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

## 18.—No Reduction.

Nothing herein shall in itself operate to reduce the wage of any worker below the rate actually received by him at the date hereof.

## IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 19A of 1943.

Between the Food Preservers' Union of Australia, Western Australian Branch, Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, Applicant, and Purina Grain Foods (W.A.) Limited, Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941 and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

## Memorandum of Agreement.

## 1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to the workers following the vocations mentioned in clause 7 hereof in the cereal foods manufacturing industry.

## 2.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of fourteen (14) miles from the General Post Office, Perth, but excluding the area occupied by the works and undertakings owned and controlled by Australasian Conference Association Limited trading as "Sanitarium Health Food Company."

## 3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the next pay period commencing after the date hereof.

## 4.—Definition.

"Casual Worker" shall mean a worker who is employed for one (1) week or less.

"Leading Hand" means a worker who, in addition to his ordinary duties, is required by the employer to supervise the work of other workers.

## 5.—Hours of Work.

(a) Subject to clause 8 hereof, forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked in five (5) or five and a half (5½) days at the option of the employer.

(b) Such hours shall be worked between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. Monday to Friday, inclusive, and 7 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday.

(c) A meal break of not less than forty-two (42) minutes shall be allowed between 12 noon and 1.30 p.m.

(d) When more than one (1) shift is worked, the starting and finishing times shall be such as to suit the convenience of the employer's business.

(e) When three (3) shifts are worked, the following provisions shall apply:—

(i) the ordinary hours may be worked on the basis of one hundred and thirty-two (132) hours spread over a period of three (3) weeks, with not more than forty-eight (48) ordinary hours of work in any one week;

(ii) such shifts shall be worked between 11 p.m. on Sunday and noon on the following Saturday.

#### 6.—Meal Intervals.

No worker shall work more than five (5) hours without a suitable interval for a meal, but this provision shall not apply where the worker finishes work for the day at or before 1 p.m. on Saturday, or where on Monday to Friday inclusive, a female worker ceases work at or before 6 p.m. and a male worker finishes work at or before 6.30 p.m.

#### 8.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in excess of eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes per day or before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

#### 9.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be allowed as holidays and paid for, namely:— New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) All work performed on any of the foregoing days shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

#### 10.—Annual Leave.

(a) A holiday of one week on full pay shall be granted to each worker on completion of each year of service: A worker not completing a year of service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays, in proportion to the length of his or her service.

(b) This clause shall not apply to a worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his or her contract of service.

#### 11.—Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to forty-four (44) hours in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

#### 12.—Higher Duties.

(d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

## 22.—Uniforms.

Where the employer requires a worker to wear a cap, overall or uniform of any description, such shall be provided by the employer free of charge and shall be kept laundered by the employer.

## 23.—Limitation of Weight.

No female worker shall be required to carry more than thirty (30) pounds in weight.

No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay, in the event of the age or length of service of the worker being wrongly stated on the certificate. If any junior worker shall wilfully misstate his age in the above certificate he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

## 18.—Representative Interviewing Workers.

In the case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal interval, on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer, more than once in any one week.

## 19.—No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the wage of any worker who at the date of this Award was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

## 20.—Seating Accommodation.

Seating accommodation shall be provided for female workers where practicable.

## 21.—Uniforms.

Where the employer requires a worker to wear a cap, overall or uniform of any description, such shall be provided by the employer free of charge and shall be kept laundered by the employer.

## 22.—Limitation of Weight.

No female worker shall be required to carry more than thirty (30) pounds in weight.

## IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 20 of 1943.

Between the Food Preservers' Union of Australia, Western Australian Branch, Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, Applicant, and Plaistowe and Company Limited, Respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now therefore the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941 and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

## Memorandum of Agreement.

## 1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers following the vocations mentioned in clause 7 hereof in the confectionery manufacturing industry.

## 2.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

## 3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the next pay period following the date hereof.

## 4.—Definitions.

(a) "Casual worker" shall mean a worker employed for one (1) week or less.

(b) "Confectioner" means an adult male, not expressly included in the definition of a machinist or general hand employed—

(i) handling or dealing with confectionery in any process of manufacture from raw materials such as sugar, glucose, gelatine, gum or licorice, chocolate, or similar material to the finished article, and includes a worker who runs by hand with any kind of funnel or bag, jubes, jellies, cream fondant, snowballs, or other articles which are run into stamped or moulded starch trays or other moulded receptacles; or

(ii) operating or controlling any of the following machines—

chocolate dipping or covering machine;  
licorice making or shaping machine;  
depositing machine;  
cocoa bean roaster;  
milk chocolate condenser;  
lozenge stamping machine;  
lozenge cutting machine;  
mogul depositing machine.

Provided that where the operator of a licorice shaping machine or the depositing machine or the lozeuge stamping machine or the lozeuge cutting machine or the mogul depositing machine is a worker who is neither qualified nor able to do the work of a confectioner but is merely the operator of the machine, machinists' rates only shall be paid.

(c) "Machinist" means an adult male employed operating any one or more of the following machines:—  
combined refiner and melanguer;  
melanguer;  
refiners;  
conchers;  
cocoa mill;  
cocoa butter press;  
neat work mill;  
liquor mill;  
gum refining.

(d) "General hand" means an adult male worker engaged on one or more of the following operations:—  
grinding nuts;  
stirring gum or syrup;  
smoothing, emptying, sieving starch trays;  
cleaning confectionery;  
washing tins or bottles with a capacity of over 4 lbs.;  
stamping lozenges;  
marking toffee on slabs;  
rolling confectionery sticks or balls;  
blanching nuts by machine;  
cutting confectionery by hand or vertical or circular cutting machine;  
grinding figs, acids, and other ingredients used in the trade;  
weighing confectionery and ingredients (over 30 lbs.);  
straining syrup or other material used in the trade;  
all handling of confectionery or ingredients in the manufacture of confectionery;  
up-ending sugar or lumping sugar;  
glazing confections;  
cutting neat work;  
coating boiled goods with such ingredients as dry sugar or cocoanut, etc.;  
feeding Forgrove and similar machines (except universal type).

#### 5.—Hours of Work.

(a) Subject to clause 8 hereof, forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked in five (5) days Monday to Friday, inclusive.

(b) Such hours shall be worked between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. with a meal break of not less than forty-two (42) minutes between 12 noon and 1.30 p.m.

(c) When more than one shift is worked, the starting and finishing times shall be such as to suit the convenience of the employer's business.

(d) When three shifts are worked, the following provisions shall apply:—

(i) The ordinary hours may be worked on the basis of one hundred and thirty-two (132) hours spread over a period of three (3) weeks, with not more than forty-eight (48) ordinary hours of work in any one week;

(ii) such shifts shall be worked between 11 p.m. on Sunday and noon on the following Saturday.

#### 6.—Meal Intervals.

No worker shall work more than five (5) hours without a suitable interval for a meal, but this provision shall not apply where the worker finishes work for the day at or before 1 p.m. on Saturday, or where on Monday to Friday inclusive, a female worker ceases work at or before 6 p.m. and a male worker finishes work at or before 6.30 p.m.

#### 7.—Wages.

The minimum rates of wages payable under this Award shall be as set out hereunder:—

(f) Casual Workers—Casual workers shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. above the minimum rates prescribed herein.

(g) Any worker employed on afternoon or night shift shall be paid for such afternoon or night shift at the rate of five (5) per cent. in addition to the ordinary rate.

#### 8.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in excess of eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes per day or before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time or on Saturdays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) All time worked after twelve (12) noon on Saturday and all time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time, except for shift work commencing at or after 11 p.m. on Sunday.

(c) If a worker is required to work during his recognised meal time, and the commencement of his meal time is postponed for more than one half-hour, he or she shall be paid at overtime rates until he or she gets his or her meal.

(d) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one hour, he or she shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof: Provided that such payment need not be made to a worker living in the same locality as the factory, who could reasonably return home for a meal.

#### 9.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall be allowed as holidays and paid for, namely:—  
New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) All work performed on any of the foregoing days shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

#### 10.—Annual Leave.

(a) A holiday of one week on full pay shall be granted to each worker on completion of each year of service. A worker not completing a year of service shall be granted pay in lieu of holidays, in proportion to the length of his or her service.

(b) This clause shall not apply to a worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his or her contract of service.

## 11.—Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) day for each completed month of service; Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to forty-four (44) hours in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

## 12.—Mixed Functions.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Award than that which he or she usually performs shall be entitled to the higher rate whilst so employed.

## 13.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of a casual worker, whose engagement shall be by the hour, the contract of hiring of every worker shall be a weekly contract, terminable on either side by one (1) week's notice given on any day.

(b) Any worker not attending for duty shall lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance, subject to the provisions of clause 11 hereof, as to payment for absence on account of illness.

(c) This clause does not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct, in which case wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

(d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

## 14.—Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record containing the following particulars:—

- (a) The name of each worker;
- (b) the class of work performed;
- (c) the hours worked each day;
- (d) the wage (and overtime, if any) paid;
- (e) the age of each junior worker.

Such record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the union once in each week.

## 15.—Aged and Infirm Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

## 16.—Posting of Award.

The employer shall, upon request of the union, post a copy of this Award in a conspicuous place in the factory, where it is easily accessible to the workers.

## 17.—Board of Reference.

For the purposes of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute the functions of:—

(a) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of the Award or any of them;

(b) classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award;

(c) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

## 18.—Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers, upon being engaged shall, if required, furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

- (1) Name in full;
- (2) age and date of birth.
- (3) name of each previous employer and length of service with such employer.
- (4) class of work performed for each previous employer.

Such of the foregoing particulars as are within the knowledge of an employer shall be endorsed on the certificate and signed by the employer, upon request of the worker.

No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay, in the event of the age or length of service of the worker being wrongly stated on the certificate. If any junior worker shall wilfully misstate his age in the above certificate he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

## 19.—Representative Interviewing Workers.

In the case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal interval, on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer, more than once in any one week.

## 20.—No Reduction.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 35 of 1945.

In the matter of an Award made on the 21st day of December, 1938, Nos. 5 and 6 of 1937, between Coastal District Committee Amalgamated Engineering Union Association of Workers and State Executive Australasian Society of Engineers' Industrial Association of Workers (hereinafter called "the unions") applicants, and the Commissioner of Railways (hereinafter called "the employer") respondent and in the matter of an application by the unions for amendment of the said award.

HAVING heard Mr. G. Keating on behalf of the unions and Mr. E. McKenna on behalf of the employer the Court in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, doth hereby order and declare that Award, Nos. 5 and 6 of 1937, be and same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

8.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

“8.—Annual Leave and Holidays.

(1) Annual Leave—

(a) Every worker shall, after twelve (12) months' continuous service, be entitled to two (2) weeks' leave on full pay each year the whole of which shall, except by agreement between the Commissioner and the union to the contrary, be taken at one time in each year; provided always that with the consent of the Commissioner annual leave may be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years.

Two (2) days' extra annual leave shall be granted to workers stationed at Yalgoo and Goongarrie, and North and East thereof and to those workers stationed on the Hopetoun-Ravensthorpe Railway, and at Norseman and Southward thereof.

Two (2) weeks' extra leave on full pay shall be granted to workers stationed on the Port Hedland-Marble Bar Railway when clearing annual leave, such leave to be counted from the time of booking off duty at home station.

(b) Workers shall be paid for annual leave at their graded rates of pay when such annual leave is taken; provided that if immediately before such annual leave is taken the worker is acting in higher capacity, and has been so acting for a period of not less than two (2) months continuously, the annual leave shall be paid for at the rate applicable to such higher capacity position.

(c) Every worker after one (1) month's continuous service shall be entitled to the foregoing two (2) weeks' annual leave in proportion as the length of service is to the appropriate period of annual leave.

(d) No deduction shall be made from annual leave for the period any worker is off duty through sickness unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months.

(e) At depots and stations where it can be conveniently done a roster shall be posted showing the approximate dates on which each worker will go on his annual leave and resume duty. Such roster will be subject to alteration to meet the exigencies of the service; provided always that with the approval of the head of the branch any worker may change dates with another.

(f) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service; provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft, no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(g) Unless at his own request no worker shall be booked off for annual leave at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(h) If a worker is booked off for annual leave when away from his permanent home station he shall be allowed travelling time to and from the place he is working at and such home station; the leave to count as starting and finishing at his permanent home station.

(i) When work is closed down over Christmas and New Year for the purpose of annual leave, workers with less than a full year's leave due will only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them.

(j) Workers in Midland Junction workshops required for duty during Christmas holidays shall be given at least one (1) month's notice in writing of their services being required, unless such notice is waived by the worker.

(11) Holidays—

(a) In addition to their annual leave, the following days shall be observed as holidays—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day and any other day proclaimed as a general public holiday.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it were an ordinary working day and shall in addition be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date if the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five-(5)-day week, no payment or day in lieu shall be granted for any holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Unless at his own request no worker shall be booked off for a holiday at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(e) When any holiday falls on a Sunday, workers shall not be granted a paid holiday except where that holiday is observed on the following Monday.

(f)

(i) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker, however, is on or is available for duty on the working day immediately preceding a paid holiday or resumes or is available for duty on the working day immediately following a holiday the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on such holiday.

(ii) In accordance with the long service leave agreement any holiday occurring during the period in which a worker is on long service leave shall be calculated as portion of the long service leave and extra days in lieu shall not be granted.

(g) A worker who returns to his home station, or finishes a shift at his home station, not later than 4 a.m. on a holiday, and is not again booked on duty for that day, shall be treated as having had a paid holiday.

(h) If a worker is called on duty on an emergency job on a holiday outside his ordinary hours of duty for a short period he shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at ordinary rates. In such event the worker shall be deemed to have had a holiday and shall be paid in full for such holiday.

(i) A holiday which falls on a day on which a worker is on paid annual leave shall be treated as if it fell on a worker's ordinary working day.

(j) If a worker is rostered for a short shift on a holiday but is not required to work on that day he shall be paid for such rostered hours only.

(k) A casual worker (i.e. a worker who is paid ten per cent. (10%) casual allowance) shall not be entitled to any paid holidays.”

15.—Overtime, Sunday Time and Holiday Time.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

“15.—Overtime and Sunday Time.

(a)

(i) All time worked in excess of or outside of the usual working hours in any one (1) day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter for the first two (2) hours and time and a half for the next two (2) hours and thereafter double time.

(ii) Extra rates shall be computed at the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked; provided that double time (i.e. twice the ordinary rate) shall be the maximum.

(iii) Double time shall be paid for overtime on all work other than work for any department of this State or Commonwealth.



(b) Subject to subclause (a) (ii), all time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(c) All time worked during the usual meal time shall be paid for at overtime rates and such rates shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.

(d) Travelling time shall not be construed time worked within the meaning of this clause.

(e) Junior workers or apprentices under eighteen (18) years of age shall not be required to work overtime without their consent.

(f) Workers when called on to do duty on any Sunday shall be paid for not less than four (4) hours at the rate applicable to that day; provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the four (4) hours if the job for which he was brought on has been completed in less time.

(g) When a worker without being notified on the previous day is required to continue working after knock-off time for more than one (1) hour, he shall be provided with any meal required, or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof."

In the matter of an Award made on 21st day of December, 1938, Nod. 13 of 1937, between Boilermakers' Society of Australia Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, W.A. (hereinafter called "the union"), applicant, and the Commissioner of Railways (hereinafter called "the employer") respondent, and in the matter of an application by the union for amendment of the said Award.

HAVING heard Mr. G. Keating on behalf of the union and Mr. E. McKenna on behalf of the employer the Court in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941. doth hereby order and declare that Award, Nod. 13 of 1937, be and the same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

9.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

"9. Annual Leave and Holidays.

(I.) Annual Leave—

(a) Every worker shall, after twelve (12) months' continuous service, be entitled to two (2) weeks' leave on full pay each year, the whole of which shall, except by agreement between the Commissioner and the union to the contrary, be taken at one time in each year; provided always that with the consent of the Commissioner annual leave may be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years.

Two (2) days' extra annual leave shall be granted to workers stationed at Yalgoo and Goongarric, and North and East thereof, and to those workers stationed on the Hopetoun-Ravensthorpe Railway, and at Norseman and Southward thereof.

Two (2) weeks' extra leave on full pay shall be granted to workers stationed on the Port Hedland-Marble Bar Railway when clearing annual leave, such leave to be counted from the time of booking off duty at home station.

(b) Workers shall be paid for annual leave at their graded rates of pay when such annual leave is taken, provided that if immediately before such annual leave is taken, the worker is acting in higher capacity, and has been so acting for a period of not less than two (2) months continuously, the annual leave shall be paid for at the rate applicable to such higher capacity position.

(c) Every worker, after one (1) month's continuous service, shall be entitled to the foregoing two (2) weeks' annual leave in proportion as the length of service is to the appropriate period of annual leave.

(d) No deduction shall be made from annual leave for the period any worker is off duty through sickness, unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months.

(e) At depots and stations where it can be conveniently done, a roster shall be posted showing the approximate dates on which each worker will go on his annual leave and resume duty. Such roster will be subject to alteration to meet the exigencies of the service; provided always that, with the approval of the head of the branch, any worker may change dates with another.

(f) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service; provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft, no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(g) Unless at his own request, no worker shall be booked off for annual leave at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(h) If a worker is booked off for annual leave when away from his permanent home station, he shall be allowed travelling time to and from the place he is working at and such home station; the leave to count as starting and finishing at his permanent home station.

(i) When work is closed down over Christmas and New Year for the purpose of annual leave, workers with less than a full year's leave due will only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them.

(j) Workers in Midland Junction Workshops required for duty during Christmas holidays shall be given at least one (1) month's notice in writing of their services being required, unless such notice is waived by the worker.

(II.) Holidays—

(a) In addition to their annual leave, the following days shall be observed as holidays—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day and any other day proclaimed as a general public holiday.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it were an ordinary working day and shall in addition be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date where the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five-(5)-day week, no payment or day in lieu shall be granted for any holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) When any holiday falls on a Sunday, workers shall not be granted a paid holiday except where that holiday is observed on the following Monday.

(e) (i) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker, however, is on or is available for duty on the working day immediately preceding a paid holiday or resumes or is available for duty on the working day immediately following a holiday the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on such holiday.

(ii) In accordance with the long service agreement any holiday occurring during the period in which a worker is on long service leave shall be calculated as portion of the long service leave and extra days in lieu shall not be granted.

(f) Unless at his own request a worker shall not be booked off for a holiday at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(g) A worker who returns to his home station, or finishes his shift at his home station, not later than 4 a.m. on any holiday and is not again booked on duty for that day shall be treated as having had a paid holiday.

(h) If a worker is called on duty on an emergency job on a holiday outside his ordinary hours of duty for a short period he shall be paid a minimum of two

(2) hours at ordinary rates. In such event the worker shall be deemed to have had a holiday and shall be paid in full for such holiday.

(i) If a worker is rostered for a short shift on a holiday but is not required to work on that day he shall be paid for such rostered hours only.

(j) A casual worker (i.e. a worker who is paid the ten per cent. (10%) casual allowance) shall not be entitled to any paid holidays."

16.—Overtime, Sunday Time and Holiday Time.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

"16. Overtime and Sunday Time.

(a) (i) All time worked in excess of or outside of the usual working hours in any one day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter for the first two (2) hours, and time and a half for the next two (2) hours, and thereafter double time.

(ii) Extra rates shall be computed at the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked; provided that double time (i.e. twice the ordinary rate) shall be the maximum.

(iii) Double time shall be paid for overtime on all work other than work for any department of this State or Commonwealth.

(b) Subject to subclause (a) (ii), all time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(c) All time worked during the usual meal time shall be paid for at overtime rates and such rates shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.

(d) Travelling time shall not be construed time worked within the meaning of this clause.

(e) Apprentices under eighteen (18) years of age shall not be required to work overtime without their consent.

(f) Workers when called on to do duty on any Sunday shall be paid for not less than four (4) hours at the rate applicable to that day; provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the four (4) hours if the job for which he was brought on has been completed in less time.

(g) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after knock-off time for more than one (1) hour, he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof."

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 37 of 1945.

In the matter of an Award made on the 21st day of December, 1938, Nod. 7 of 1937, between Federated Moulders' (Metals) Union of Workers, Perth (hereinafter called "the union"), applicant, and the Commissioner of Railways (hereinafter called "the employer"), respondent, and in the matter of an application by the union for amendment of the said Award.

HAVING heard Mr. G. Keating on behalf of the union and Mr. E. McKenna on behalf of the employer, the Court, in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, doth hereby order and declare that Award Nod. 7 of 1937, be and the same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

9.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

9.—Annual Leave and Holidays.

(I.) Annual Leave—

(a) Every worker shall, after twelve (12) months' continuous service, be entitled to two (2) weeks' leave on full pay each year, the whole of which shall, except by agreement between the Commissioner and the union

to the contrary, be taken at one (1) time in each year; provided always that with the consent of the Commissioner annual leave may be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years.

(b) Workers shall be paid for annual leave at their graded rates of pay when such annual leave is taken; provided that if immediately before such annual leave is taken, the worker is acting in a higher capacity, and has been so acting for a period of not less than two (2) months continuously, the annual leave shall be paid for at the rate applicable to such higher capacity position.

(c) Every worker after one (1) month's continuous service shall be entitled to the foregoing two (2) weeks' annual leave in proportion as the length of service is to the appropriate period of annual leave.

(d) No deduction shall be made from annual leave for the period any worker is off duty through sickness, unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for pecculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any holidays which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service; provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for pecculation or theft no claim for holidays shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated holidays or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down over Christmas and New Year for the purpose of annual leave, workers with less than a full year's leave due will only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them.

(g) Workers in Midland Junction Workshops required for duty during Christmas holidays shall be given at least one (1) month's notice in writing of their services being required, unless such notice is waived by the worker.

(II.) Holidays—

(a) In addition to their annual leave, the following days shall be observed as holidays—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day and any other day proclaimed as a general public holiday.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it were an ordinary working day and shall in addition be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date where the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five (5) day week, no payment or day in lieu shall be granted for any holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) When any holiday falls on a Sunday, workers shall not be granted a paid holiday except where that holiday is observed on the following Monday.

(e) A holiday which falls on a day on which a worker is on paid annual leave shall be treated as if it fell on the worker's ordinary working day.

(f) (i) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker, however, is on or is available for duty on the working day immediately preceding a paid holiday or resumes or is available for duty on the working day immediately following a holiday the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on such holiday.

(ii) In accordance with the long service leave agreement, any holiday occurring during the period in which a worker is on long service leave shall be calculated as portion of the long service leave and extra days in lieu shall not be granted.

(g) If a worker is rostered for a short shift on a holiday but is not required to work on that day he shall be paid for such rostered hours only.

(h) A casual worker (i.e., a worker who is paid the ten per cent (10%) casual allowance) shall not be entitled to any paid holidays.

## 16.—Overtime, Sunday Time and Holiday Time.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

## 16.—Overtime and Sunday Time.

- (a) (i) All time worked in excess of or outside of the usual working hours in any one (1) day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter for the first two (2) hours, and time and a half for the next two (2) hours, and thereafter double time.
- (ii) Extra rates shall be computed at the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked; provided that double time (i.e., twice the ordinary rate) shall be the maximum.
- (iii) Double time shall be paid for overtime on all work other than work for any department of this State or Commonwealth.
- (b) Subject to subclause (a) (ii), all time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.
- (c) All time worked during the usual meal time shall be paid for at overtime rates, and such rates shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.
- (d) Travelling time shall not be construed time worked within the meaning of this clause.
- (e) Junior workers, or apprentices, under eighteen (18) years of age shall not be required to work overtime without their consent.
- (f) Workers, when called on to do duty on any Sunday, shall be paid for not less than four (4) hours at the rate applicable to that day; provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the four (4) hours if the job for which he was brought on has been completed in less time.
- (g) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after knock-off time for more than one (1) hour, he shall be provided with any meal required, or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof.

## IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 37A of 1945.

In the matter of an Award made on the 21st day of December, 1938, Nod. 19 of 1937, between West Australian Amalgamated Society of Railway Employees' Union of Workers (hereinafter called 'the union'), applicant, and the Commissioner of Railways (hereinafter called 'the employer'), respondent, and in the matter of an application by the union for amendment of the said award.

HAVING heard Mr. G. Keating on behalf of the union and Mr. E. McKenna on behalf of the employer, the Court, in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, doth hereby order and declare that Award, Nod. 19 of 1937, be and the same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

## 15.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

## 15.—Annual Leave and Holidays.

## (I.) Annual Leave—

(a) Every worker shall, after twelve (12) months' continuous service, be entitled to two (2) weeks' leave on full pay each year, the whole of which shall, except by agreement between the Commissioner and the union to the contrary, be taken at one time in each year; provided always that with the consent of the Commissioner holidays may be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years.

Two (2) days' extra annual leave shall be granted to workers stationed at Yalgoo and Goongarrie and North and East thereof, and to those workers stationed on the Hopetoun-Ravensthorpe Railway, and at Norseman and Southward thereof.

Two (2) weeks' extra leave shall be granted to workers stationed on the Port Hedland-Marble Bar Railway when clearing annual leave, such leave to be counted from the time of booking off duty at home station.

(b) Workers shall be paid for annual leave at their graded rates of pay when such annual leave is taken; provided that if immediately before such annual leave is taken the worker is acting in higher capacity, and has been so acting for a period of not less than two (2) months continuously, the annual leave shall be paid for at the rate applicable to such higher capacity position.

(c) Every worker, after one (1) month's continuous service, shall be entitled to the foregoing two (2) weeks' annual leave in proportion as the length of service is to the appropriate period of annual leave.

(d) No deduction shall be made from annual leave for the period any worker is off duty through sickness, unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months.

(e) At depots and stations where it can be conveniently done, a roster shall be posted showing the approximate dates on which each worker will go on his annual leave and resume duty. Such roster will be subject to alteration to meet the exigencies of the service; provided always that with the approval of the head of the branch any worker may change dates with another.

(f) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service; provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(g) Unless at his own request, no worker shall be booked off for annual leave at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(h) If a worker is booked off for annual leave when away from his permanent home station, he shall be allowed travelling time to and from the place he is working at and such home station; the leave to count as starting and finishing at his permanent home station.

(i) When work is closed down over Christmas and New Year for the purpose of annual leave, workers with less than a full year's annual leave due will only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' annual leave due to them.

## (II.) Holidays—

(a) In addition to their annual leave, the following days shall be observed as holidays—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and any other day proclaimed as a general public holiday.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it were an ordinary working day and shall in addition be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date where the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five-day week, no payment or day in lieu shall be granted for any holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) When any holiday falls on a Sunday, workers shall not be granted a paid holiday except where that holiday is observed on the following Monday.

(e) A holiday which falls on a day on which a worker is on paid annual leave shall be treated as if it fell on the worker's ordinary working day.

(f) A worker who returns to his home station, or finishes a shift at his home station, not later than 4 a.m. on any holiday and is not again booked on duty for that day shall be treated as having had a paid holiday.

(g) (i) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker, however, is on or is available for duty on the working day immediately preceding a paid

holiday or resumes or is available for duty on the working day immediately following a holiday the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on such holiday.

(ii) In accordance with the long service leave agreement, any holiday occurring during the period in which a worker is on long service leave shall be calculated as portion of the long service leave and extra days in lieu shall not be granted.

(h) Unless at his own request, no worker shall be booked off for a holiday at a foreign or at his temporary home station.

(i) If a worker is rostered for a short shift on a holiday but is not required to work on that day he shall be paid for such rostered hours only.

(j) If a worker coming within the provisions of Parts III. or IV. of this award is called on duty on an emergency job on a holiday outside his ordinary hours of duty for a short period he shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at ordinary rates. In such event the worker shall be deemed to have had a holiday and shall be paid in full for such holiday.

(k) A casual worker (i.e., a worker who is paid the ten per cent. (10%) casual allowance) shall not be entitled to any paid holidays.

#### 28.—Overtime, Sunday Time and Holiday Time.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

##### 28.—Overtime and Sunday Time.

(a) All time, exclusive of Sunday time, worked over the hours fixed for a week's work, shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter.

(b) (i) All time worked in excess of ten (10) hours (and, in the case of special class signalmen, eight (8) hours) in any one shift shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first two (2) hours and thereafter double time. This paragraph shall not apply to conductors.

(ii) The time on which penalty rate has been paid for on a daily basis will not be subject to the penalty rate on a weekly basis.

(iii) The overtime rates shall be computed on the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked; provided that double time (i.e., twice the ordinary rate) shall be the maximum.

(iv) This subclause shall not apply to conductors whose overtime shall remain as at present.

(c) Subject to subclause (b) (iii), the time worked on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(d) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to office cleaners (female), whose hours of duty and conditions shall remain as they are at present.

(e) Any worker brought on to work outside his ordinary hours shall, except when such work, exclusive of meal times, is continuous with his ordinary shift, be paid a minimum of two (2) hours' pay at ordinary rates; and provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the two (2) hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.

(f) Any worker brought on duty on Sunday shall be paid a minimum of four (4) hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day.

(g) The provisions of subclauses (b) to (f), both inclusive, shall not apply to watchmen or waiting room attendants, who shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for all time worked in excess of ten (10) hours in any one (1) shift, and for all time worked on Sundays.

#### 35.—Overtime, Sunday Time and Holiday Time.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

##### 35.—Overtime and Sunday Time.

(a) (i) All time worked in excess of the usual working hours in any one (1) day shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for the first two (2) hours and time and a half for the next two (2) hours, and thereafter double time; provided that double time shall be paid for overtime on all work other than work for any department of the State or Commonwealth.

(ii) Extra rates shall be computed on the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked. Provided that double time, i.e., twice the ordinary rate, shall be the maximum.

(b) Subject to subclause (a) (ii), time worked on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(c) All time worked during the usual meal time by any worker at his home station shall be paid for at overtime rates, and such rates shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.

(d) Any worker brought on to work outside his ordinary working hours shall, except when such work, exclusive of meal time, is continuous with his ordinary shift, be paid a minimum of two (2) hours' pay at ordinary rates, and provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the two (2) hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.

(e) Junior workers and apprentices under the age of eighteen (18) years shall not be required to work overtime without their consent.

(f) Any worker brought on duty on Sunday shall be paid a minimum of four (4) hours at the rate applicable to that day, and shall not be required to work for the four (4) hours if the work for which he is brought on duty does not last that period.

(g) The provisions of subclauses (a) to (f) (both inclusive) shall not apply to watchmen, who shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for all time worked in excess of ten (10) hours in any one (1) shift, and for all time worked on Sundays.

#### 40.—Overtime, Sunday Time and Holiday Time.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

##### 40.—Overtime and Sunday Time.

(a) (i) All time worked in excess or outside of the usual working hours in any one (1) day shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for the first two (2) hours, and time and a half for the next two (2) hours, and thereafter double time; provided that double time shall be paid for overtime on all work other than work for any department of the State or Commonwealth.

(ii) Extra rates shall be computed on the rate applicable to the day on which the time is worked; provided that double time (i.e., twice the ordinary rates) shall be the maximum.

(b) Subject to subclause (a) (ii), time worked on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(c) All time worked during the usual meal time by any worker at his home station shall be paid for at overtime rates, and such rates shall continue until the worker knocks off for his meal.

(d) Any worker brought on duty for any purpose outside his ordinary working hours shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours; provided that such work, exclusive of meal time, is not continuous with his shift; and provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the two (2) hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.

(e) Junior workers or apprentices under eighteen (18) years of age shall not be required to work overtime without their consent.

(f) Any worker brought on duty on a Sunday shall be paid a minimum of four (4) hours' pay at the rate applicable to that day, and he shall not be required to work for the four (4) hours, if the work for which he is brought on does not last that time.

(g) The provisions of subclauses (a) to (f), both inclusive, shall not apply to watchmen, who shall be paid at rate of time and a quarter for all time worked in excess of ten (10) hours in any shift, and for all time worked on Sundays.

THE RAILWAYS CLASSIFICATION BOARD  
ACT, 1920-1945.

Between the West Australian Railway Officers' Union (Applicant), and the Commissioner of Railways (Respondent).

APPLICATION having been made to the Railways Classification Board by the West Australian Railway Officers' Union under the provisions of regulation 18 (3) of the National Security (Economic Organisation) Regulations for variation of clause 22 (Temporary Clerks) of Railways Classification Board Award No. 1 of 1939, and the Board having heard the parties, the majority of the members of the Board formed the opinion that the grounds upon which alterations to rates of remuneration were sought provided prima facie evidence that alterations were necessary to remove anomalies and to compensate for changes in circumstances. In pursuance therefore of the regulation hereinbefore referred to the Board reported on the matter to his Honour the Chief Judge, Commonwealth Court of Arbitration and Conciliation.

An order issued by his Honour the Senior Judge, dated the 15th November, 1946 (Reference—Commonwealth Court of Arbitration and Conciliation No. 425 of 1946) authorising the Board to proceed and determine the said matter has been received and the Board having further deliberated delivers its decision in the following terms:—

Determination.

Award No. 1 of 1939, amended 3rd May, 1946, shall be further amended by deletion of subclause (d) of clause 22 and the insertion in lieu thereof of the following subclause:—

(d) The rate of pay shall be—

First six months—Basic rate, plus margin 28s. 8d. per week.

After six months—Basic rate, plus margin 31s. 8d. per week.
