ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 19 of the Health Act, 1911-1944, that the Lieutenant-Governor may constitute any portion of the State, not being a Municipal District, to be a Health District, with such boundaries and by such name as may be specified in the order: and whereas by Order in Council dated 26th May, 1931, published in the Government Gazette of the 29th May, 1931, all that land comprised within the townsites of Meckering, Cunderdin and Tammin, were declared to be the Meckering Health District; and whereas it is desired to extend the boundaries of the said Health District: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Western Australia, by and with the consent of the Executive Conneil, doth hereby declare that all that land comprised within the boundaries of the Cunderdin Road Board shall be a Health District to be known as the Cunderdin Health District under the provisions of the Health Act, 1911-1944.

Sussex Road Board—Resolution.

WHEREAS under the provisions of section 321 of the Health Act, 1911-1944, the Governor may cause to be prepared Model By-laws for all or any of the purposes for which by-laws may be made by a local authority under any of the provisions of the Act; and whereas a local authority may of its own motion by resolution adopt the whole or any portion of such by-laws with or without modification; and whereas Model By-laws described as Series A have been prepared in accordance with the said section and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 8th day of April, 1927, and amended by notice published in the *Government Gazette* from time to time thereafter; and whereas the said Model By-laws were adopted by the Sussex Road Board by resolution dated the 9th day of November, 1935, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 6th of December, 1935; and whereas the Model By-laws were further amended by the addition to Part I. of a further Model By-law to be known as 4a, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 3rd of March, 1939: Now, therefore, the said Sussex Road Board, being a local authority within the meaning of the Act, doth hereby resolve and determine that its by-laws shall be amended in the following manner:—

(a) By the adoption of Model By-law 4a published in the *Government Gazette* of the 3rd of March, 1939, with the words ''or by the provision of a water supply by wells and equipment, or by storage tanks from roof catchment, or by storage tanks from roof catchment facilities'' added after the word ''available'' in clause 1 thereof.

(b) By the adoption of a new by-law made under the provisions of the Health Act, section 133, subsection 14 (1), (11), and (III) as follows:—

No person shall erect, rebuild, maintain or use any honse, or keep or use or suffer to be kept or nsed any public place or private place within the townsite of West Busselton without providing for the same a supply of water for sanitation purposes from (1) established public water supplies; or (2) wells and equipment, or (3) water storage tanks with catchment facilities from roof of buildings. Provided that where a supply of water is maintained by storage tanks from roof catchment, the storage tank provided for each separate building, or dwelling house shall be not less than one thousand gallons capacity. Provided also that where a supply of water is required under this by-law the owner and the occupier shall maintain all wells and equipment, pipes, pumps, fittings and tanks used in maintaining a supply of water in good working order and to the satisfaction of the inspector.

HEALTH ACT, 1911-1944.

Fremantle District Road Board-Resolution.

WHEREAS under the provisions of the Health Act, 1911-1944, a Local Health Authority may make or adopt by-laws and may amend, repeal, or alter any by-laws so made or adopted: Now, therefore, the Fremantle District Road Board, being a Local Health Authority and having adopted the Model By-laws Series A published in the *Government Gazette* on the 4th December, 1944, hereby amends the said Model By-law by adding to Part IX. thereof a new by-law to be known as By-law 18A, as follows:---

By-law 18A.

No person shall establish or carry on any obnoxions or offensive trade, business or manufacture within the area hereinafter defined, that is to say:—All that area contained in Fremantle District Health District and bounded on the North side by the Northern boundary of the said Health District; on the East by Arthur Road and O'Connell Road; on the South by Forrest Road to the intersection of Cooke Road and further on the East by Cooke Road and Hamilton Road, to the intersection of Goodginmiddie Road; on the South again by Goodginmiddie Road to intersection between Naval Base Road and Rockingham Road, inclusive of that subdivisional area fronting Davilak Road, Quarry Road, Sonth End Road, Beach Road and Rockingham Road.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 8 of 1943.

Between the Food Preservers' Union of Australia, Western Australian Branch, Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, Applicant, and G. Wood Son and Company Limited, D. and J. Fowler Limited and Bushells Proprietary Limited, Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court: Now therefore, the Court, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers following the vocations mentioned in clause 7 hereof in the manufacture, preparation, packing or putting up of spices, condiments, coffee, chicory, eocoa, tea, jelly crystals, farinaceous foods, polishes, honey and other similar lines generally manufactured, packed or put by manufacturing grocers.

2.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of fourteen (14) miles from the General Post Office, Perth, but excluding the area occupied by the works and nudertakings owned and controlled by Australasian Conference Association Limited, trading as ''Sanitarium Health Food Company.''

3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the next pay period commencing after the date hereof.

4.—Definition.

"Casual Worker" shall mean a worker who is employed for one (1) week or less.

ployed for one (1) week or less. "Leading Hand" means a worker who, in addition to his ordinary duties, is required by the employer to supervise the work of other workers.

5.-Hours of Work.

(a) Subject to clause 8 hereof, forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked in five (5) or five and a half $(5\frac{1}{2})$ days at the option of the employer.

(b) Such hours shall be worked between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. Monday to Friday inclusive and 7 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday.

(c) A meal break of not less than forty-two (42) minutes shall be allowed between 12 noon and 1.30 p.m.

6.-Meal Interval.

No worker shall work more than five (5) hours without a suitable interval for a meal, but this provision shall not apply where the worker finishes work for the day at or before 1 p.m. on Saturday, or where on Monday to Friday inclusive, a female worker ceases work at or before 6 p.m. and a male worker finishes work at or before 6.30 p.m.

7.—Wages.

8.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in excess of eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes per day or before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) All time worked on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) If a worker is required to work during his recognised meal time, and the commencement of his or her meal time is postponed for more than one hour, he or she shall be paid at overtime rates until he or she gets his or her meal.

(d) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one hour, he or she shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence in lieu thereof: Provided that such payment need not be made to a worker living in the same locality as the factory, who could reasonably return home for a meal.

9.-Holidays.

(b) All work performed on any of the foregoing days shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

10.—Annual Leave.

(a) A holiday of one week on full pay shall be granted to each worker on completion of each year of service. A worker not completing a year of service shall be granted pay in lien of holidays, in proportion to the length of his or her service.

(b) This clause shall not apply to a worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his or her contract of service.

11.-Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for nonattendance on the ground of personal ill-health for onehalf $(\frac{1}{2})$ day for each completed month of service; Provided that payment for absence through such illhealth shall be limited to forty-four (44) hours in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at

Margin over

the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Work-ers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident, wherever sus-tained, arising ont of his own wilful default or for siekness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his em-ployer of sickness, but the employer shall not be en-titled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay under the preceding provision shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

12.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Award than that which he or she usually performs shall be entitled to the higher rate whilst so employed.

13.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of a casual worker, whose cngagement shall be by the hour, the contract of hiring of every worker shall be a weekly contract, terminable on either side by one (1) week's notice given on any day.

(b) Any worker not attending for duty shall lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance, subject to the provisions of clause 11 hereof, as to payment for absence on account of illness.

(c) This clause does not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct.

(d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

14.-Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep or cause to be kept, a re cord containing the following particulars :-

(a) The name of each worker;(b) the class of work performed;

(c) the hours worked each day;
(d) the wage (and overtime, if any) paid;

(e) the age of each junior worker.

Such record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the union once in each week.

15.-Aged and Infirm Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time he agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

16.—Posting of Award.

The employer shall, upon request of the union, post a copy of this Award in a conspicuous place in the factory, where it is easily accessible to the workers.

17 .- Board of Reference.

For the purposes of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chair-man and two (2) other representatives, one to be nom-nated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute the functions of :--

(a) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of the Award or any of them.

(b) Classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award.

(c) Dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

18.- Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers, upon being engaged shall, if required furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars :-

- Name in full.
 Age and date of birth.
- (3) Name of each previous employer and length of service with such employer.
- (4) Class of work performed for each previous employer.

Such of the foregoing particulars as are within the knowledge of an employer shall be endorsed on the certificate and signed by the employer, upon request of

the worker. No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay, in the event of the age or length or service of the worker being wrongly stated on the certi-ficate. If any junior worker shall wilfully misstate his age in the above certificate he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

19.-Representative Interviewing Workers.

In the case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the union shall be per-mitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal interval, on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer, more than once in any one week.

20.-No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the wage of any worker who at the date of this Award was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

21.-Excessively Wet Work.

Where the conditions of work are such that workers are unable to avoid their clothing becoming excessively wet, they shall be supplied with protective clothing or material

22.—Seating Accommodation.

Seating accommodation shall be provided for female workers where practicable.

23 --- Uniforms.

Where the employer requires a worker to wear a cap, overalls or uniform of any description, such shall be provided by the employer free of charge, and shall be kept lanndered by the employer.

24 .-- Limitation of Weight.

No female worker shall be required to carry more than thirty (30) pounds in weight.

Between the Food Preservers' Union of Australia, Western Australian Branch, Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, Applicant, and Plaimar Limited, Respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now therefore, the Court pursuant to section 65 of the industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

Memorandum of Agreement.

1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers following the vocations mentioned in clause 6 hereof in the manufacture, distillation or preparation of essences, essential oils and synthetic aromatic chemicals.

2.—Arca.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the next pay period following the date hereof.

4.—Definitions.

(a) "Casual Worker" shall mean a worker employed for one (1) week or less.

(b) "Plan Operative (2nd Class)" means a worker who attends to and operates any plant.

(c) "Plant Operative (1st Class)" means a worker who in addition to attending to and operating any plant, is required by the management to do special duties involving greater responsibility than a plant operative (2nd class).

5.—Hours.

(a) Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work.

(b) Where only one (1) shift is worked daily in the establishment such shift shall be worked in the day time between the hours of 7.30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday to Friday inclusive and between 7.30 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday.

(c) Where only one (1) shift is worked daily in the establishment, lunch interval shall not be less than forty-two (42) minutes duration or more than one (1) hour.

(d) Where more than one (1) shift is worked daily, the working hours shall not exceed one hundred and thirty-two (132) in three (3) weeks excluding Sundays.

(e) Where more than one (1) shift is worked crib time shall not exceed twenty (20) minutes and shall be taken in relays at such time as not to cause a stoppage of work and no deduction shall be made therefor from the workers' wages.

(i) Workers grinding capsicum and pepper shall be paid at the rate of threepence (3d.) per hour extra whilst so employed.

7.—Overtime.

(a) All work performed before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours, and double time thereafter.

(b) All time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one hour, he or she shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence in lieu thereof. Provided that such payment need not be made to a worker living in the same locality as the factory, who could reasonably return home for a meal.

(d) These overtime rates shall not apply to excess time due to private arrangement between the workers themselves, or which is necessary for effecting periodical rotation of shifts, or which is owing to a relieving man not coming on at the appointed time. The time for which any worker may be paid at ordinary rates infor which any worker may be plot at ordinary factor in stead of overtime, due to a relieving man not coming on at the proper time, shall not exceed two (2) hours, after the expiration of which overtime rates shall apply for the whole shift.

8.—Holidays.

(a) Twelve paid holidays per annum shall be granted to each worker after tweeve months' continuous service: Provided that New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day, or the days observed in lieu, shall be taken as they come as portion of the holidays. Work performed on those days shall be paid for at the rate of ordinary time in addition to the weekly or casual wage. The balance of six days shall be granted as one week's annual leave at the convenience of the employer. As far as practicable such leave shall be granted at Christmas time.

On any other public holidays an employer's establishment or place of business may be closed in which case a worker need not present him or herself for duty and payment for that day may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates shall apply.

(b) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he or she shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his or her length of service, during that period with such employer and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers of such employer, he or she shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on holidays on full pay.

(c) Holiday pay shall not accrue during a worker's absence from his or her employment for any cause whatsoever.

(d) Any worker dismissed for misconduct or dereliction of duty, or who illegally severs his or her contract of service shall lose all rights under this clause.

9.—Absence through Sickness.

A worker shall be entitled to payment for nonattendance, on the ground of personal ill-health for onehalf $(\frac{1}{2})$ day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to forty-four (44) hours (one week's pay) in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compen-sation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his or her employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his or her employment, or for any accident wherever sustained, arising out of his or her own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his or her own wilful default.

No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he or she produces proof satisfactory to his or her employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

10 .--- Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of casual workers, one week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the engagement.

(b) Workers must be available and ready and willing to work on the days and during the hours required. A worker shall not be cutilled to payment for absence from employment except as provided for in clause 9 hereof.

(c) Provided that an employer may at any time dismiss a worker for refusal or neglect to obey orders or for misconduct.

11 .- Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record containing the following particulars :---

(a) The name of each worker;

(b) the class of work performed;(c) the hours worked each day;

(d) the wage (and overtime, if any) paid;

(e) the age of each junior worker. Such record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the union once in each week.

12 .- Aged and Infirm Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

Such of the above particulars as are within the knowledge of an employer shall be endorsed on the certificate

and signed by the employer upon request of the worker. No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay, in the event of his or her age being wrongly stated in the certificate, and he or she alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

Any such certificate shall be open for inspection by the union representative during his inspection of the time and wages record.

16.—Breakdowns, Etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

17 .--- Shift Work.

(a) Any worker working a quick shift shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.

(b) A quick shift shall mean a shift where a worker is brought on to work before having had at least eight (8) hours off.

(c) No worker under sixteen (16) years of age shall be employed on afternoon or night shift.

18.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which is entitled to a higher rate under this Award than that which he or she usually performs shall be entitled to the higher rate whilst so employed.

19 .- No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the wages of any worker who at the date of this Award was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum prescribed for his or her class of work.

20.-Protective Clothing.

Where necessary for the performance of their duties, workers shall be provided with suitable rubber boots, goggles, masks, gloves or other adequate substitutes.

21.-Exclusions.

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to apply to Works Supervisors, Shift Foremen or to the members of the Laboratory Staff.

Delete the whole of this clause and insert the following in lien thereof.

(a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work for all workers, to be worked in five (5) days, Mondays to Fridays, inclusive.

(b) The daily spread of hours shall not exceed nine (9) inclusive of not more than one (1) hour for a meal.

(c) All time worked to make up the hours of duty on any one (1) day shall be worked in a continuous shift.

(d) The hours of work of all workers whose ordinary duties are carried out during daylight hours shall be performed between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m., provided that these hours may be varied by agreement between any employer and the union.

(e) A driver required by the employer to drive any vehicle from or to any permanent yard or depot shall be paid for such time as he is actually driving.

(f) Liberty is reserved to the Board to apply for an amendment of rates of pay if and when casual workers are employed or any system of overtime is likely to be worked.

14.-Payment for Sickness.

Delete subclause (a) and insert the following in lieu thereof:—

. (a) A worker, other than a casual hand, shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for five-twelfths (5/12ths) of a day for each completed month of service; provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to five (5) days (one (1) week's pay) in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This elause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.
