Minister for Public Health, being the Minister administering the provisions of the Health Act, 1911-1944, has, under the provisions of section 230 of the said Act, authorised the Commissioner of Public Health, for a period of six months from the 4th day of May, 1947, to exercise within the districts specified in the Schedule hereunder, and to delegate to any Public Health Officer, the special powers specified in section 230 of the Act aforesaid, that is to say:—(a) All the powers specified in subsections (1) to (16), inclusive. (b) With the approval of the Min-ister, the power specified in subsections (17) and (17a), and (20) any other power specified in subsections (17) and (17a), and (c) any other power conferred upon him by the Governor under subsection (18).

MARKETING OF POTATOES ACT, 1946. Regulations for the Licensing of Growers.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Marketing of Potatoes (Licensing of Growers) Regulations.

2. In these regulations, unless the context shall otherwise require:---

"The Act" means the Marketing of Potatoes Act, 1946.

"The Board" means the Western Australian Potato Marketing Board as constituted by the Act.

"License" means a license granted by the Board to grow or produce potatoes. "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Board and includes any person appointed by the Board to act as Secretary during the absence of the Secretary.

(a) no license shall be granted unless and until an application to the Board is made therefor in Form A in the Appendix hereto;

(b) the applicant shall give full written particulars on each and every matter set out in the said Form;

(c) the applicant shall deliver to the Board his application in the said Form A duly completed, and shall, if and when required by the Board, verify the particulars given in, or in support of, such application by statutory declaration delivered to the Board;

(d) upon the approval by the Board of an application for a license, the Board shall grant a license to the applicant in the Form B in the Appendix hereto:

(e) where the Board grants a license to the applicant, the Board may, by endorsement on or attached to the ficense, limit and define the area or areas within which potatoes may be sown or produced for sale by or on behalf of the applicant under and by virtue of such license, and the Board may, by the like endorsement, define the period or periods within which the whole or any part of the said area or areas may be so sown with potatoes;

(f) the Board may from time to time add to, vary or revoke the whole or any of the conditions upon which it shall grant any license to an applicant.

4. No person shall grow or produce potatoes for sale except in accordance with the conditions of a license issued to him by the Board.

Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing regulations either by act or omission, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Memorandum of Agreement.

1.—Area.

This Award shall apply to all that portion of the State of Western Australia South of the 26th Parallel of South Latitude.

2.—Application.

This Award shall apply to Sub-Station Officers, Station Officers, and District Officers in the employ of the Western Australian Fire Brigades Board.

3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be a period of three years from the date hereof.

4.—Salaries.

(a) Basic Wage: The rates of salaries prescribed in sub-clause (c) hereof are based on the basic wage for males in the Metropolitan Area, as at the first day of January, 1936 of ± 3 10s. 6d. per week (deemed for the purpose of this Award to be equivalent to ± 185 per annum).

(b) Adjustment of Basic Wage: The rates of salaries so prescribed shall be subject to adjustment in accordance with the basic wage as declared from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia under the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, for the particular locality in which the officer is for the time being employed, provided that the basic salary payable for the purpose of this Award shall be the nearest multiple of five pounds $(\pounds 5)$ to the result obtained by multiplying the appropriate weekly basic wage so declared for the particular locality by fifty-two and one-sixth $(52\frac{1}{2})$.

(iii) District Officer (Fremantle) £440.

(d) The basic wage adjustments prescribed in sub-clause (b) shall be in addition to the rates set out in sub-clause (c) thereof, and are at the date of this Award as follows:--

(e) Officers shall advance from the minimum to the maximum of their respective ranges by annual incre-ments through the grades within such ranges subject to service during the year which is deemed to be satisfactory to the Board.

(f) In addition to the salaries and basic wage adjustments payable to Station Officers and District Officers, such officers shall receive an allowance of £26 per annum in compensation for their having to attend fire calls when required when they are off duty but available in their quarters.

(g) Sub-Station Officers shall be paid a rate of 5s. gr week of seven days over and above the highest rate of pay received by a Senior Fireman (other than a Senior Fireman in charge of a Station) from time to time. The words "highest rate of pay" for the purpose time. The words "inglest rate of pay" for the purpose of this sub-clause, shall mean the rate of pay of such Senior Fireman for the particular district in which such Sub-Station Officer is employed, including the ser-vice allowance payable, to such Senior Fireman after twenty (20) years' service, under Clause 11 of Award No. 13 of 1936, as amended from time to time.

5.—Semiority.

The order of seniority shall be as set out hereunder :---

(i) District Officer (at Fremantle).

(ii) District Officer (other than at Fremantle).(iii) Station Officer.

(iv) Sub-Station Officer.

The District Officer at Fremantle shall be the senior officer.

6.-Hours of Duty.

(b) Officers travelling or relieving within the Metropolitan Area shall be paid a flat rate of 8s. 6d. per day whilst on duty to cover all meals and fares.

(c) A Travelling Allowance and Relieving Allowance as prescribed in this clause, shall not be paid simultaneously.

8.-Meal Allowance.

Any officer who is obliged to partake of a meal when on duty away from his home station shall be paid an allowance of 2s. 6d. for each such meal; provided that an officer who is in receipt of a Travelling or Relieving Allowance under the provisions of clause 7 hereof shall not be entitled to any allowance under the provisions of this clause.

9.—Transfer.

When transferring from one station to another, all officers shall be granted first class rail fares, and sleepers, if applicable, for himself, his wife and for all children under 16 years of age.

10 .- District Allowance.

Officers stationed at Kalgoorlie and Boulder shall be paid a district allowance of £10 per annum.

11.-Quarters.

Station Officers and District Officers who are provided with quarters by the Board shall occupy the quarters free of rent. The valuation of such quarters shall be deemed to be £39 per annum.

Station Officers and District Officers not provided with quarters shall be paid a rent allowance of £1 2s. 6d. per week.

12.-Furnishings.

The Board shall provide good quality Holland roller blinds for all windows of quarters.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note: Wherever the word "award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "agreement".)

1.—Area.

This award shall apply over the area comprised within a radius of eighty (80) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

2.—Term.

The term of this award shall be three (3) years from the date hereof.

3.-Hours.

Except as otherwise provided in this award, the following shall apply:---

(a) Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute the ordinary week's work.

(b) The ordinary day's work shall not exceed eight (8) hours, Monday to Friday inclusive, and four (4) hours on Saturday.

(c) The hours of work, except where shifts are worked shall be performed as follows:—Monday to Friday inclusive—between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. Saturday—between 7 a.m. and 12.15 p.m.: Provided that, at the option of the employer, the ordinary week's work of forty-four (44) hours may be worked in five (5) days (from Monday to Friday inclusive) within hours mutually agreed upon between the employer and the union.

(d) In the event of the Court delivering a decision reducing the standard hours to be worked by industry in Western Australia, liberty is reserved to the union to apply for an amendment of this clause.

4.-Shift Work.

Where two (2) or more shifts in any one day are worked, the hours of shift workers shall be such as are mutually agreed upon between the employer and the union. Failing agreement, the hours of shift workers shall be fixed by the Board of Reference.

5.---Overtime.

Subject to the proviso in Clause 3 (c) hereof, work performed beyond eight (8) hours on Monday to Friday, inclusive, or beyond four (4) hours on Saturday, or beyond forty-four (44) hours in any one week, or, except in the case of shift work, before the prescribed starting or after the prescribed finishing time, shall be deemed to be overtime.

(a) Overtime shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter. Except in the case of Burners whose overtime shall be paid for at ordinary time rates.

(b) Work performed on Sunday, Good Friday, Anzae Day, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time: Provided that this shall not apply to Burners who shall be paid double time for work performed on Christmas Day and Boxing Day and time and a half for work performed on Sunday, Good Friday, Anzac Day and Labour Day. (c) Workers under the age of eighteen (18) years shall not, as far as practicable, be called upon to work between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m.

(d) As far as practicable when overtime is worked, any worker who is called upon to work such overtime shall be selected from amongst those workers performing the class of work that is required to be done during the time that such overtime is worked.

6.-Minimum Engagement.

Except as provided in Clause 15, any worker engaged, under the terms of this Award shall be paid a minimum of three (3) hours' pay.

7.—Holidays.

(a) Subject as hereinafter provided, twelve (12) days' holiday on full pay shall be granted to each worker per annum.

(b) Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, or the days observed in lieu, and Union Picnic Day (on a date to be agreed upon between the parties, about the middle of February in each year) shall constitute five (5) of such (12) holidays. 'The remaining seven (7) days' holiday shall be taken between the 23rd day of December and the 2nd day of January, inclusive: Holiday pay for all workers shall be limited to twelve (12) days per annum.

(c) A worker whose employment has continued for more than one week shall be entitled each year, to holiday pay in proportion to his length of service in each year.

(d) Where a worker is dismissed for wilful misconduct or dereliction of duty, he will not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(e) Holiday pay shall not accrue during a worker's absence from duty for any cause whatsoever, except as provided in Clause 19 of the Award.

(f) In the event of the Court delivering a decision increasing the standard holidays to be granted by industry in Western Australia, liberty is reserved to the Union to apply for an ameudment of this Clause.

(i) An employer may make a contract with a drawer for payment by results by piecework.

(ii) The rate of payment shall be fixed on the basis that it shall be sufficient to yield to a drawer of average capacity for a full week's work of the ordinary hours, at least the minimum time rate of pay recognised by custom for such week's work: Provided that, where a drawer works part of a full week at piecework rates, and part at time rates, he shall be paid so much as he is entitled to receive under such piecework rates, plus the proportionate amount which he is entitled to receive at time rates of pay recognised by enstom.

(iii) A drawer working under any system of payment by results shall receive at least the time rate

9.-Lower Duties.

A worker called upon to do work carrying a lower rate than his usual rate of pay, for less than one half of a day, shall be paid for such work at his usual rate of pay.

10.-Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or in-firmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

11 .--- Payment of Wages.

All wages shall be paid on the job within twenty (20) minutes of the close of the day's work at least once a fortnight.

12.--Engagement.

One day's notice on either side shall (with the exception of sand and bag boys, in whose case one week's notice shall be required) be necessary to terminate the engagement of all workers: Provided that an employer may at any time dismiss a worker for refusal or neglect to obey orders, for misconduct, or if after receiving the prescribed notice he does not carry out his duties in the same manner as he did prior to such notice.

13.—Notices.

Notices relating to meetings in connection with the Union shall be allowed to be exhibited in each yard. A printed copy of the conditions of this Award shall be kept posted by the employer in a conspicuous position in each yard.

14.-Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a record containing.— (a) The name of each worker to whom this Award

(e) The ages of junior workers.

Such record shall be open to inspection by a repre-sentative of the Union not more than once weekly, between the working hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

15.-Breakdowns, etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or any other Union or Association, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

16.—First-Aid Outfit.

Every yard shall be equipped with a First-Aid outfit, and such outfit shall be kept in a suitable place not more than three hundred (300) yards from the place of employment.

17.—General.

(a) Except where rubber-tyred vehicles are used plates or planks shall be provided for all wheelers wheeling into the kiln in all places except where the ground to be wheeled on is hard.

(b) It shall be optional on the part of the employer to provide oilskins.

18 .- Board of Reference.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 22 of 1945.

Between Australian Workers Union, Westralian Branch Industrial Union of Workers, Applicant, and Dun-brik (W.A.) Limited, Respondent.

WHEREAS an Industrial Dispute existed between the abovenamed parties, and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference, and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective re-presentatives and requested the Court to make the said agreement an Award of the Court: Now therefore the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitra-tion Act, 1912-1941 and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same affect as and be deemed an award of the Court :-

Memorandum of Agreement. (Note: Wherever the word "award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "agreement.")

1.-Scope.

This award shall apply to all workers employed by the employer in the Cement Brick Manufacturing Industry: Provided that it shall not apply to workers who are at present provided for in any award of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia or in any Industrial Agreement registered in accordance with the provisions. of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941.

2.-No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the wages of any worker who at the date of this award was being paid a higher rate of wages than the minimum prescribed for his class of work.

3.—Definitions.

(a) "Casual Hand" shall mean a worker who is engaged for a period of less than six (6) days. Casual hands shall be paid for the particular work upon which they may be employed at an hourly rate calculated on the rate of pay prescribed by clause 23 hereof, plus ten per centum (10 per cent.). Casual workers shall be paid within one (1) hour of their services being terminated.

(b) "Wet Places" shall mean places where the nature of the work necessitates a worker getting his boots or clothing thoroughly wet.

4.-Wet Places.

(a) Workers while working in wet places and/or those

(a) workers while working in wet praces and/or those engaged in mixing concrete shall be provided by the employer with gum boots or military boots.
(b) If any dispute shall arise as to whether a place is a "wet place" within the meaning of this clause the dispute shall be referred to the Board of Reference, where a decision there are shall be final. whose decision thereon shall be final.

5.—Hours.

(a) Day Workers: Forty-four (44) hours shall con-stitute a week's work, viz. eight (8) hours on Monday to Fridare inclusion and four (4) hours on Monday to Fridays inclusive, and four (4) hours on Saturdays: Provided that the time for beginning and ceasing work may be arranged by mutual agreement between the Union and the employer with the intent that the workers in the various sections of the industry may

be usefully and economically employed within their hours of duty. If no agreement is arrived at the matter shall be referred to the Board of Reference for determination: Provided further that at the option of the employer the week's work may be performed in five (5) days (Monday to Friday inclusive) in which case the ordinary daily hours of work shall not exceed eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes. (b) Shift Workers: The ordinary hours of shift

workers, inclusive of crib time, shall not exceed fortyfour (44) hours in one week, or (when two (2) shifts are worked) eighty-eight (88) hours in two (2) weeks, or (when three (3) shifts are worked) one hundred and thirty-two (132) hours in three (3) weeks at the option of the employer, to be worked in rotary shifts and not exceeding eight (8) hours on Monday to Saturday inclusive.

(d) Working in Meal Hours (Day Workers): Work done in the meal time or any portion t done in the meal time or any portion thereof shall be paid for at the rate of double time, but this shall not apply to cases involving the completion of work commenced before the lunch period and not occupying more than fifteen (15) minutes from the commencement of the lunch period, in which case the lunch period would be extended by fifteen (15) minutes beyond the ordinary time. In the event of a mishap the said period of fifteen (15) minutes may be increased to forty-five (45).

(e) The provisions of this clause shall remain in abeyance for a period of one (1) month from the date here-of, during which period the existing provisions shall

apply. (f) In the event of the Court delivering a decision reducing the standard hours to be worked by industry in Western Australia, liberty is reserved to the Union to apply for an amendment of this clause.

6.—Overtime.

(a) All work performed outside the ordinary hours of duty shall be deemed to be overtime and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.(b) Work performed on Sundays or on any of the

holidays specified in clause 7 hereof, shall be paid for at double time rates.

7.-Holidays.

(a) The following days shall be paid holidays, namely:-Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day,

Good Friday, Easter Monday, and Labour Day. (b) Where the holiday falls on a Sunday, or where any day is observed in lieu thereof, a holiday shall be granted on the date upon which the holiday is observed.

(c) In addition to the above, an annual holiday of six (6) days on full pay shall be granted once in each year to every worker; provided that where the worker's employment is terminated during the course of a calendar year, the employer shall pay him one day's wages for each calendar month of his service in lieu of the holidays to which he would be entitled under this clause, and has not received. In the event of a worker being eniployed for a portion only of the year, he shall only be entitled at Christmas or Easter to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period, and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers are on holidays on full pay: Provided, further, that where the worker is dismissed for wilful misconduct, or when the worker illegally severs his contract of service he shall not be entitled to the benefits of the provisions of this clause.

(d) Holiday pay shall not accrue during the worker's absence from his employment for any cause whatsoever.

(e) These provisions shall not apply to casual workers. (f) In the event of the Court delivering a decision increasing the standard holidays to be granted by in-dustry in Western Australia, liberty is reserved to the Union to apply for an amendment of this clause.

8 .- Time and Wages Record.

The Wages Book (or Wages Sheet) of the employer shall be open for inspection by the Secretary or an accredited representative of the Union at the office of the Company during working hours upon reasonable notice being given of the desire to inspect same:

9.-Higher Duties.

Any worker carrying out work classified at a higher rate than his ordinary rate up to four (4) hours in any shift shall be paid such higher rate for the actual time so employed. If more than four (4) hours is occupied on such work in any one shift then the worker shall be paid such higher rate as for the whole shift.

10.-Board of Reference.

(a) The Court hereby appoints for the purpose of the Award a Board of Reference in each branch of the industry.

(b) The Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

(c) In the event of a disagreement between the parties bound by the Award, in any of the matters hereinafter mentioned, the Board has hereby assigned to it the fol-(i) Classifying and fixing wages, rates and condi-

tions for any machine, occupation, or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award, but so as not to contravene any of the provisions herein.

(ii) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of

the Award, or any of them. (iii) Deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(iv) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act 1912-1941 which for the purpose are embodied in the Award.

11.—Overalls.

Workers working in the vard during wet weather shall be supplied with waterproof coats or provided with shelter sheds.

12.-Change Room Etc.

The employer shall provide all necessary sanitary accommodation, change room for workmen, bathroom, and shelter shed or other suitable accommodation, and a sufficient supply of boiling water for workers at meal times. Insofar as this clause may involve any structural alterations or additions, it shall remain in abeyance for three (3) months from the date hereof.

13-Protection for Hands.

Rubber gloves or other suitable hand protectors shall be supplied when required to workers working as moulders. Leather gloves shall be provided for mixers. The worker shall be required to exercise care in the use and custody of these articles and to deliver them

at the end of the shift at such place and in such manner

as may be required by the employer. A sufficient supply of kerosene and waste shall be provided by the employer for the use of the workers.

14.—Payment of Wages.

Wages shall be paid weekly and during working hours.

15.—Area.

This Award shall apply to the area comprised within radius of thirty (30) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

16.—Term.

The currency of this Award shall be for three (3) years from its date, subject to the right of any party bound by its terms to apply to the Court for a review of any of its provisions pursuant to the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941.

17.-First Aid Kit.

A fully equipped first aid kit shall be provided in each factory by the employer.

18.-Contract of Service.

(a) Subject to any provisions to the contrary herein contained the contract of service shall be a weekly one. (b) Unless otherwise herein provided, a worker shall not be entitled to payment for any day during which he is absent from his employment.

(c) This clause shall not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct, and in such case wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

19.-Breakdowns Etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or Union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery, or any stoppinge of work from any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

20.-Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for nonattendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one half-day for each completed month of service, provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to six (6) days in each calendar year. Pay-ment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default, or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

21 .- Junior Workers' Certificate.

Junior workers, upon being engaged shall, if required, furnish an employer with a certificate containing the following particulars :-

(i) Name in full.
(ii) Date of birth.
In the event of the age of the worker being wrongly stated in the certificate a breach of this Award shall not be deemed to have been committed by the employer, and the worker shall have no claim upon the employer for additional pay.

22 .--- Under .- rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infimity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the Employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note: Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to all workers employed on classifications prescribed in Clause 8 hereof by the Minister on or in connection with the Rabbit Proof Fences.

2.—Area.

This Award shall operate over the whole of the State of Western Australia. 111

3.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of three years from the date hereof.

4.-Hours of Labour.

(a) Forty-four (44) hours shall constitute a week's work.

(b) In the event of the Court delivering a decision reducing the standard hours to be worked by industry in Western Australia, liberty is reserved to the parties to apply for amendment of this clause.

5.—Overtime.

(a) Any work which from its character, or from special circumstances cannot be performed during the worker's usual working hours, and which is approved by the Inspector-in-Charge prior to being worked, shall be regarded as overtime work. (b) Overtime shall be paid for at the rate of time

and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter until the usual time of starting on the next working day; provided that by agreement between the Department and the worker concerned, any overtime worked may, in lien of payment, be offset by allowing time off at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

6.-Animal Allowance.

(a) Any worker who is required to attend to an animal outside his ordinary working hours, and who is not provided with a native boy attendant, shall be paid an allowance of 6s. per week, provided that in the case of a camel the allowance shall be 7s. per week.

(b) Where a worker is required to attend to two or more animals and is not provided with a native boy attendant, he shall be paid an allowance of 10s. per week in the case of camels and 9s. per week in the case of other animals.

(c) Any worker engaged for less than a week in attending to animals outside his ordinary working hours shall receive payment of the allowance referred to in sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof proportionately to the time worked.

7.-District Allowance.

(a) District allowances shall be paid in accordance with those operating under clause 32 of the Construction and Land Clearing Workers' (Government) Award, No. 18 of 1941, or any amendment thereof or any award which supersedes such Award.

(b) Employees working in more than one district shall be paid the allowance prescribed for the district in which the major portion of their time is occupied.

(c) Any worker employed as a leading hand shall be award rate for the class of work being performed by such worker. "Leading hand" shall mean a worker who is a member of a gaug of not less than three (3) men and who is instructed by the Inspector-in-Charge to exercise control over the other workers with respect to the time of commencing and finishing work.

9.—Casual Workers. A ''casual worker'' shall mean one for whom work over a period of six (6) consecutive working days, not including holidays, is not provided by the Department. A casual worker shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) over the rate provided by this Award for the particular worker's occupation.

10.-No Reduction.

Any worker who may be at the date of this Award in receipt of a higher rate of pay for his particular class of work than is herein prescribed, shall not suffer by reason of this Award any reduction in the amount which such worker was receiving above the rate prescribed herein.

11.-Expenses.

Employees engaged on Court proceedings shall be reimbursed any out-of-pocket expenses necessarily in-curred by them in connection with such proceedings.

12.-Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of three consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by the Minister after a period of twelve months' continuous service with the Department, provided that employees stationed north of Meekatharra shall be entitled to four consecutive weeks' leave annually.

(b) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) (i) Subject to paragraph (ii), when computing the annual leave due under this clause no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/or holidays: Provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only. (ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by the Minister for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with the Department.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein "eferred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) If required, reasonable travelling time to and from the railway station or port nearest to a worker's headquarters shall be allowed to such worker when proceeding upon or returning from annual leave.

(g) Workers regularly working for the Department North of South Latitude 26 shall be allowed to accumulate annual leave for two years, subject to the convenience of the Department.

(h) "Ordinary wages" for the purpose of sub-clause (a) hereof shall mean the rate of wage the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.

(i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(i) Annual leave rights under this clause shall commence to accrue as from 1st January, 1946.

13 .- Public Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof, shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely: New Year's Day, Good Friday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, and Christmas Day.
(b) Whorever, and holiday follow an an applement.

been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it was an ordinary working day and shall, in addition, be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date if the worker so agrees.

(c) Payment for holidays shall be in accordance with the usual hours of work.

(d) When a worker is off duty owing to leave with. out pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker is on duty or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday, or resumes duty, or is available on the working day immediately following a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays.

(e) A casual worker shall not be entitled to payment for any holiday referred to in this clause.

14 .- Long Service Leave.

The conditions relating to full time Government wages employees generally as in force as at the date of this Award, or as amended from time to time, shall apply to all workers employed under the provisions of this Award.

15.-Contract of Service.

(a) One week's notice at any time on either side shall be required before the engagement of a worker (other than a casual worker) shall be terminable. Provided that a worker may be dismissed at any time without notice for neglect of duty or misconduct, or inefficiency in which case the worker shall be entitled to wages up to the time of dismissal only.

(b) The engagement of casual workers shall be by the hour.

16.-Camp Allowance.

(a) When a worker is required to live in a tent or hut away from his central depot or away from his headquarters, where such headquarters are at or within a reasonable distance from a town, an allowance at the

reasonable distance from a town, an anowance at the rate of 15s, per week shall be paid.
(b) The above allowance covers a week, whether of six (6) or seven (7) days.
(c) For broken periods the allowance shall be calculated at one-sixth, namely 2s. 6d. per day.
(d) The central depots mentioned in subclause (a) of the control of the form (4) recting of

this clause shall be for each of the four (4) sections of the Rabbit Proof Fence as follows:---

No. 1 Section—Burracoppin. No. 2 Section—Cunderdin. No. 3 Section—Yalgoo. No. 4 Section—Jigalong.

And any other places mutually agreed upon between the Minister and the Union.

(e) The worker's headquarters at or within a reasonable distance from a town mentioned in subclause (a) of this clause shall be at Nyabing on the No. 2 section of the Rabbit Proof Fence and any other place mutually agreed upon between the Minister and the Union.

17.-Payment for Sickness.

(a) (i) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ day for each completed month of service. (ii) The liability of the Minister shall in no case exceed one (1) week's wages during each calendar year in respect of each worker. (iii) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaver

of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the Minister, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sick-ness occurred.

(b) This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1944.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefit of this clause unless the produces proof satisfactory to the Minister or his representative of sickness but the Minister shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three consecutive working days or more.

(d) No payment shall be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect or misconduct.

(e) (i) Periods of service of less than one month shall not be included as service for the computation of sick leave.

(ii) Periods of one month and over shall be totalled and payment for sick leave computed on the total of such service during the year.

18.—Preference of Employment.

Preference of employment in respect of the classes of workers covered by this Award shall be given to financial members of the respondent Union; provided always :-

(i) That if any worker or applicant for employment is a member of any recognised industrial union and produces proof of such membership he shall be entitled to equal preference during the currency of his current union ticket with the other union;

(ii) that if any person is not a member of any recognised industrial union such worker shall make and complete an application for membership with the respondent Union within one month of commencing employment.

19.-Board of Reference.

(a) For the purpose of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute, the func-tions of the same set of the set tions of :-

(i) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time, except such as involve inter-pretation of the provisions of this Award or any of them;

(ii) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(iii) classifying and fixing wages, rates and con-ditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of the above Board in the manner and subject to the conditions pre-scribed in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and the regulations thereunder, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award,

20.-Interpretation.

For the purposes of this Award :--

(a) A casual worker shall not be entitled to payment for any holiday referred to in this clause.

11 .--- Holiday Pay.

Delete this clause.

19.-Annual Holidays.

Delete this clause and insert in lieu thereof the following:-

19 .- Annual Leave and Public Holidays.

(1) Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer, and shall be given to and taken by the worker within three (3) months of becoming due.

(3) months of becoming due.
(b) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would liave been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them: Provided that the subclause shall apply only to workers employed ex-clusively in connection with the construction of new buildings and/or the construction of roads.

(g) "Ordinary wages" for the purpose of sub-clause (a) hereof shall mean the rate of wage the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(i) Annual leave rights under this clause shall commence to accrne as from 1st January, 1946.

(2) Public Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof, tonowing days, or the day observed in heu thereof, shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Founda-tion Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day and Box-ing Day ing Day.

4.-Apprentices.

(a) The provisions of the schedule marked 'Appren-ticeship Regulations,' in Award No. 3 of 1940 are hereby embodied in and form part of this Agreement.

(b) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to an employer shall be in the proportion of one apprentice to the first two or fraction of two journeymen, and thereafter one apprentice to two journeymen employed by him in that branch. For the purpose of this clause "Branch" shall be deemed to be the "Iron Bedstead Making'' Industry.

(c) The term of apprenticeship shall be five years to "Iron Bedstead Making."

5.—Junior Workers,

The work of junior workers shall be confined to labouring work except that :-

(a) Junior workers under the age of 17 years may be employed :- Operating link mesh machines, assembling link mesh, assembling plates and fabrics, weaving springs, cutting wire and making elips, branding and stamping.

(b) Junior workers of 17 years of age and over may, in addition to the work prescribed in sub-clause (a) of this clause, be employed on assembling and removing work from casting frames, operating drilling machines, general chipping work and hand painting of gates and similar articles.

6.—Overtime,

Pay for overtime shall be at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter until the usual time for starting on the next ordinary working day; provided that all work performed on a Saturday afternoon, Sunday or holiday as prescribed shall be paid for at double time rates.

7.-Provision of Appliances.

All tools and appliances shall be provided by the employer; provided that this shall not apply to the following tools required by Chill Fitters:-1-4 inch Square, 1-6inch Square, 1—12 inch Straightedge, 1—2 foot Steel Rule, 1—pair 6 inch Odd Legs, 1—pair Inside Calipers 6 inch or 8 inch, 1—pair Outside Calipers, 1—Hack Saw Frame.

8.-General Conditions.

The following clauses of Award No. 3 of 1940 (Furniture Award) shall apply, provided that should another Award supersede Award No. 3 of 1940 or it be subscquently amended the relative clauses of such subsequent Award or amendment shall apply in lieu of those referred to below.
