Beverley Road Board.

By-laws for the Management, Use and Letting of the Beverley Town Hall Buildings and Equipment and Property.

P.W. 180/27.

IN pursuance of the powers vested in it by the Road Districts Act, 1919-1946, the Beverley Road Board do hereby make the following by-laws for the management, use and letting of the Beverley Town Halls buildings:—

1. Application for the hire of the Beverley Town Hall or any portion of the Beverley Town Hall building, equipment or property shall be made in writing to the Secretary of the Board not less than 24 hours before the hour at which hiring is desired.

2. Such application shall be on the prescribed form and shall furnish full details of all particulars required therein.

3. Hirings of the various portions of the Town Hall building and property, including furniture and equipment, shall be at rates set out in Schedule hereunder.

4. The hours for which hiring may be effected at day time rates shall be between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. Night time rate shall be between the hours of 7 p.m. and 4 a.m.

5. The Town Hall picture right lease shall not be affected or be governed by the Hall Hire Schedule.

6. The hire of hall shall not include the use of bio box.

7. The Board may at any time demand that the hirer shall, prior to term of engagement, deposit with the Secretary an amount estimated to cover hall hire and any damage that may occur during the term of engagement.

8. The Board reserves the right to refuse to let the Hall or any portion thereof to an applicant for hiring, without assigning any reason for such refusal.

9. The Board may at any time cancel any agreement for hiring of any portion of the Town Hall property.

10. In the event of two or more applications being received for the hire of any portions of the Town Hall property at the one and same time and date, the Board may, without considering priority of application, determine to which applicant the Hall hiring shall be granted.

11. The hirer of any portion of the Town Hall property shall comply with the provisions of Health Act, Entertainment Tax Act and any other Act in force for the time being, applicable to such hiring of building. If in the opinion of the Board all necessary actions have not been taken to comply with the requirement of above and all other relevant acts, the Board may, prior to, to during the term of engagement, forbid and prevent the use of such building.

12. In the event of the use of any portion of the Town Hall property being forbidden or prevented under the last preceding by-law, the hirer shall forfeit the full amount payable for the hire, as if the hire had been duly fulfilled, and the Board shall not be responsible to the hirer for any loss or damage incurred by the hirer.

13. No spirituous liquors, wine, ale or spirits shall be brought into or consumed upon any portion of the Beverley Town Hall property, except when permitted in writing by the Board.

14. No meal, supper, food or refreshments, solids or liquids, shall be served or consumed within the main hall portion of the Beverley Town Hall property.

15. No smoking of tobacco, cigarettes or cigars or other matter shall be permitted within the Town Hall building, except by permission from the hirer or the Board.

16. No Hall plant, furniture, fittings, or effects, cutlery, crockery, glassware, or other utensils or materials of any kind shall be hired or loaned for use off outside the Beverley Town Hall property.

17. The driving of nails, tacks or screws, etc., into any of the woodwork or walls of the Town Hall building is strictly forbidden. No internal or external decorations are permitted to be erected without special permission in writing from the Secretary.

18. No hirer or person shall be permitted to move any plant or furniture or effects from place to place within the Town Hall building without the permission of the Board and under the supervision of the hall caretaker or other person appointed by the Board.

19. No person whilst intoxicated shall be permitted to enter or remain upon any portion of the Beverley Town Hall property. Nor be guilty of misbehaviour whatsoever, nor be permitted to use profane or improper language, nor damage, mark or deface any wall or other part of the hall or property (any person who does, permits or suffers any such damage shall be liable to pay cost of all such damages in addition to any penalty imposed under these by-laws).

20. No offensive impersonations or representations of living persons, or anything deemed likely to produce disturbance, riot, or breach of peace, shall be permitted within this Beverley Town Hall building or property.

21. The hirer of any part or parts of this Beverley Town Hall building shall maintain and keep good order and decent behaviour, within the property, and shall be solely and entirely responsible for the carrying out and compliance with the requirements of these by-laws, and for any damage done to the buildings, fixtures, fittings, furniture, crockeryware, etc., and shall pay such damages as may be assessed by the Board.

Any article of glass or crockeryware, etc., broken, cracked or not accounted for shall be replaced or be paid for at current prices.

22. The Secretary of the Beverley Road Board or other person duly authorised by the Board shall be permitted free ingress to the Town Hall building and every part thereof, and shall be given every facility for the enforcing of these by-laws.

23. Every person who does, permits or suffers an act or matter or thing contrary to any of these by-laws, or commits, or permits, any breach, or neglects compliance therewith, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against these by-laws, and shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding £20 for every such offence.

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 10 of 1946.

(Registered 19/12/1946.)

THIS Agreement made this 17th day of December, 1946, between the West Australian Branch of the Australasian Meat Industry Employees Union Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, of the one part, and the Minister for Agriculture, on behalf of the Government of Western Australia of the other part, witnesseth as follows:—Whereas the parties hereto being the parties to an Agreement made on the 12th day of April, 1943, have mutually agreed that the said Agreement be varied: Now, the said Agreement shall be, and the same is, varied in the manner following, that is to say:—

Clause 6—Overtime.

Delete the words "and holidays" in line 5, and delete the words "and holidays" in line 6.

Clause 13—Holidays.

Delete this clause and insert:—

Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) (i) Subject to paragraph (11), when computing the annual leave due under this clause no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/or holidays: provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.

(ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service. Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them.

(g) "Ordinary wages" for the purpose of sub-clause (a) hereof shall mean the rate of wage the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(i) Annual leave rights under this clause shall commence to accrue as from 1st January, 1946.

Insert new clause No. 13A.

Clause 13A—Public Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Australian Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day. Provided that Union Picnic Day may be taken as a holiday by arrangement between the parties in lieu of King's Birthday.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it was an ordinary working day and shall, in addition, be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date if the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five-day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Payment for holidays shall be in accordance with the usual hours of work.

(e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker is on duty or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday or resumes duty, or is available on the working day immediately following a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays.

(f) A casual worker shall not be entitled to payment for any holiday referred to in this clause.

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 11 of 1946.

(Registered 19/12/46.)

THIS agreement made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this 18th day of December 1946, between the Minister for Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage (hereinafter referred to as "The Minister") of the one part, and the Coastal and E.G. Government Water, Sewerage, and Drainage Employees' Industrial Union of Workers (hereinafter referred to as "The Union") of the other part, witnesseth as follows: Whereas the parties hereto being the parties to the Industrial Agreement made on the 30th day of July, 1940 and Nod. 13 of 1940, have mutually agreed that the said Industrial Agreement be varied: Now the said Industrial Agreement shall be and the same is hereby varied in the manner following, that is to say:—

Clause 5.—Holidays

Delete the whole of the existing clause and insert in lieu thereof the following new clauses:—

Clause 5.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by the Minister after a period of twelve months' continuous service with the Department.

(b) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) A worker may be rostered off and granted annual leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed prior to his having completed a period of twelve months' continuous service, in which case should the services of such worker terminate or be terminated prior to the completion of twelve months' continuous service, the said worker shall refund to the Minister the difference between the amount received by him for wages in respect of the period of his annual leave and the amount which would have accrued to him by reason of the length of his service up to the date of the termination of his services.

(d) (i) Subject to paragraph (ii), when computing the annual leave due under this clause no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/or holidays: Provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.

(ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(e) In the event of a worker being employed by the Minister for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.

(f) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for speculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for speculation or theft no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(g) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them provided that nothing herein contained shall deprive the Minister of his right to retain such workers at work during the close down period as may be essential.

(h) "Ordinary wages" for the purpose of sub-clause (a) hereof shall mean the rate of wage the worker has received for the greatest proportion of the calendar month prior to his taking the leave.

(i) Annual leave rights under this clause shall commence to accrue as from 1st January, 1946.

5A.—Public Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof, shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day and Union Picnic Day, which shall be the last Monday in November.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday he shall be paid for the time worked as if it was an ordinary working day and shall, in addition be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date if the worker so agrees.

(c) In the case of workers working a five day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Payment for holidays shall be in accordance with the usual hours of work.

(e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker

is on duty or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday, or resumes duty, or is available on the working day immediately following a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays.

5B.—Sick Leave.

Sick leave not exceeding six days in each year of service shall be granted to employees having not less than one month's continuous service, on production of an adequate medical certificate or other evidence satisfactory to the officer in charge.

2. By deleting clause 13 of the said Agreement and inserting in lieu thereof the following:—

Every worker shall be allowed, in addition to the public holidays prescribed in clause 4 hereof, a fortnight's holiday, including ten (10) working days, on full pay, once in each year. Such holidays shall not be allowed to accumulate.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

Such leave shall be given to and taken by the worker within three (3) months of becoming due.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(c) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(d) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(e) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(f) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(g) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (e) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(h) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(j) The quantum of annual leave to be allowed to a worker shall, for service prior to 1st September, 1946, be calculated in accordance with the provisions of the award applicable before that date and for service subsequent to 1st September, 1946 in accordance with the provisions of this amendment.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu shall, subject to Clause 7 hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(c) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

7.—Overtime.

Delete sub-clause (b) of this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

(b) Work done on the days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day shall be paid for at double time rate, except in connection with repairs to the employer's machinery which has broken down and has caused a stoppage of operations when the rate of time and a half shall apply to the work done on such days; provided that the employer may pay for work done on the abovementioned days at ordinary time rate and add one day (or in connection with repairs aforesaid, half a day) to the worker's annual leave for each day so worked.

8.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

8.—Annual Leave.

(e) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(g) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

5.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

5.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu shall, subject to sub-clause (b) hereof, be observed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) All work done on Sundays or the holidays prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof shall be paid for at the rate of ordinary time in addition to the weekly wage.

(c) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rate of pay shall apply.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 15 of 1946.

Between The United Furniture Trades Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, W.A., Applicant, and Barnett Bros. (1934) Limited, Western Glass and Mirror Works, Arcus Limited, W. Drabble Limited, and Hon. Minister controlling State Saw Mills, Respondents.

WHEREAS an Industrial Dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said agreement an award of the Court: Now therefore the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note: Wherever the word "award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "agreement.")

1.—Hours.

(a) Subject as hereinafter provided, the ordinary hours of work shall not exceed forty-four (44) in any one week and shall not exceed eight (8) hours daily, to be worked between the hours of 7.30 a.m. and 6 p.m., from Monday to Friday inclusive, and four (4) hours between 7.30 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday. Provided that the actual times at which work is commenced and finished shall be mutually agreed upon and arranged between the employer and the worker. The employer shall furnish the union with the name or names of any worker or workers who are required to commence work before the time mutually agreed upon as to the commencing time of his other workers. Where the employer so desires, the forty-four (44) hours may be worked in five (5) days, from Monday to Friday inclusive, and the ordinary working hours shall not exceed eight (8) hours forty-eight (48) minutes daily, to be worked between the hours of 7.30 a.m. and 6 p.m. No alteration of the starting and finishing times shall be introduced until seven (7) days shall have elapsed after notification of such alteration has been confirmed in writing to the union.

(b) A notice in terms of Schedule 1 hereof shall be posted up by the employer in each factory, setting out the starting and finishing times in operation for the time being in each factory.

(c) In the event of the court delivering a decision reducing the standard hours to be worked by industry in Western Australia, liberty is reserved to the union to apply for an amendment of this clause.

2.—Overtime.

(a) Overtime shall be prohibited, except where the union is notified by the employer that he intends to work one or more of his workers overtime, and in no case shall overtime be worked on more than two (2) days in any week without the permission of the secretary of the union. Provided that, should the secretary of the union withhold such permission the employer shall be entitled to apply to the Board of Reference for permission to work extra overtime; and the Board of Reference shall deal with his application in any manner it thinks fit. Provided further, that nothing in this subclause shall apply in the case of any worker sent to perform work in the country.

(b) When notice is given by telephone or otherwise orally, it shall be confirmed by written notice to the union within twenty-four (24) hours of overtime commencing.

(c) The notice signifying such intention shall state the day or days upon which the overtime is to be worked, the names of the men who will be working overtime, and when the overtime is to be worked in the factory, the hours in which overtime is to be worked.

(d) Subject to the provisos in subclause (a) hereof, no worker shall be permitted to work more than eight (8) hours overtime in any one (1) week without the permission of the Secretary of the union.

(e) In no case shall junior labourers be employed on overtime, unless the proportion of adult workers to juniors as provided in this award is maintained whilst such overtime is worked.

(f) Pay for overtime shall be at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter until the usual time of starting on the next ordinary working day.

(g) All work performed on a Saturday afternoon or Sunday shall be paid for at double time rates.

(h) All work performed on a holiday as prescribed in clause 3 shall be paid for at ordinary time rates in addition to the holiday pay, if any, to which the worker is entitled under the provisions of clause 3.

(i) In any proceedings for a breach of any subclause of this clause, proof of the person being found in any part of a factory, other than the office, shall be prima facie evidence that the person was then being employed in the factory.

(j) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one (1) hour, he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) in lieu thereof.

3.—Holidays.

(a) Subject to Clause 2 and Clause 4, the following days, or the days observed in lieu thereof, shall be observed as holidays:—New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day. Provided that a worker shall only be entitled to payment for such holidays at the rate of six and three fifths (6 $\frac{3}{5}$) hours' pay or six (6) hours' pay, depending on whether the establishment is working a five (5) or a five and a half (5 $\frac{1}{2}$) day week, for each month of continuous service and with a maximum payment for any holiday of one (1) day's pay. Provided further that where the employment of a worker is terminated he shall be paid holiday pay at the rate set out above less the amount paid to him for holidays which have already been taken.

(b) Except insofar as the worker is entitled by length of service the said days shall be observed as holidays without pay.

(c) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(d) Service as from the 1st day of September, 1946, shall be taken into consideration for the purpose of this clause.

4.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) Subject to sub-clause (f) of this clause such leave shall be granted at Christmas and notice in writing shall be given to the union by representatives of the employers not later than three (3) months before Christmas, showing the date on which the factories shall close down for the annual leave.

(c) If any Award holidays falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid; provided that at the option of the employer any of the Award holidays so falling within the period of annual leave shall be given in one of the following ways:—

(i) Added to the Easter holidays, in which case, the employer may, at his option, add one further day in lieu of Australia Day (26th January). Where it is the intention of the employer to adopt this method he shall, by notice posted in the factory at the time of closing down at Christmas, notify his employees of such intention.

(ii) By agreement between the employer and the worker, but not otherwise, another day shall be given in lieu of each of such Award holidays.

(d) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(e) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to holidays.

(f) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled (subject to sub-clause (d) of this clause) to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on holidays on full pay.

(g) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(h) Service as from the 1st day of September, 1946, shall be taken into consideration for the purpose of this clause.

5.—Country Work and Travelling Time.

(a) When a worker is engaged in outside work, the employer shall pay all fares, and a proper allowance, at current rates, shall be paid for all necessary meals. Fares shall be second-class, except when travelling by coastal boats, when saloon fares shall be paid.

(b) When a worker is engaged at such a distance that he cannot return home each night, suitable board and lodging shall be found at the employer's expense.

(c) Travelling time outside the ordinary working hours shall be paid for at ordinary rates up to a maximum of twelve (12) hours in any twenty-four (24) hour period from the time of starting on the journey: Provided that, when travelling is by boat, not more than eight (8) hours shall be paid for in any twenty-four (24) hour period.

(d) Where in the service of the employer the worker provides his own means of transport, the employer shall allow to such worker the ordinary train, tram, ferry or char-a-banc fare which would otherwise be paid by him.

6.—Mixed Functions.

Any worker carrying out work classified at a higher minimum than his usual rate shall be paid, whilst engaged on such work, at the rate prescribed therefor: Provided that, where no record of such work is kept, the worker shall be paid at the higher rate for the whole of the day on which the work was performed.

7.—Wages.

(d) A tradesman placed in charge of three (3) or more other tradesmen or six (6) other workers shall be paid two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per day above the minimum rate hereinbefore prescribed for his trade.

(e) Any worker employed for less than one (1) week, unless dismissed for inefficiency or leaves of his own accord, shall be deemed to be a casual worker and shall be entitled to be paid at the rate of two shillings (2s.) per day or part thereof, in addition to the ordinary rate prescribed by this Award for the time so employed.

8.—Junior Labourers.

(a) Male junior labourers shall be allowed in the following proportions:—

(b) Where the employer is himself a tradesman regularly and usually working at the trade, he shall be counted as a tradesman for the purpose of computing the number of junior labourers to be allowed.

(c) The number of junior labourers to be allowed shall be determined by the number of employers (as in (b) hereof) and tradesmen and apprentices (as in (a) hereof) actually employed at any time.

(d) Except when employed on cement work or lead casting and turning, male junior labourers may be employed on labouring work only.

9.—Wages in Cash.

(a) All wages shall be paid in cash, on or before Friday in each week, and shall be paid within ten (10) minutes of the usual time for finishing work.

(b) No charge shall be made against a worker for the use of bench, appliances, or tools of trade, supplied by the employer, and workers shall not be permitted to board or sleep on the employer's premises.

(c) Except as provided in subclause (d) hereof, when the engagement of a worker is terminated he shall be paid all wages and holiday pay due to him within ten (10) minutes of the expiration of the engagement.

(d) When the engagement of a worker is terminated for misconduct, he shall be paid all wages and holiday pay due to him within two (2) hours of the termination of his engagement.

10.—Contract of Service.

The contract of hiring of every worker, other than a casual worker, shall be deemed to be a contract of hiring by the day: Provided that no notice of dismissal or resignation shall be given on the last working day immediately preceding a holiday. This clause shall not apply to apprentices.

11.—Under-Rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

12.—Piecework.

A worker employed on piecework shall be paid not less than the minimum rate herein prescribed for a worker employed on the same class of work. A pieceworker under the provisions of this Award shall mean any worker who repairs, manufactures, or finishes articles made from material supplied by the persons for whom the work is being performed.

13.—Interviewing Workers.

The secretary or any duly authorised representative of the Union shall not be prevented from visiting or conversing with the members of the Union on any job or in any shop during meal hours. The secretary or any duly authorised representative shall have the right to visit and inspect any factory or works or any part thereof during the time that work is being carried on outside the ordinary working hours, and to interview workers therein. The employer shall provide all necessary facilities to assist the secretary or representative in carrying this power into effect.

14.—Provision of Appliances.

The employer shall provide the following tools or articles required on the jobs:—soldering irons, glass cutters and any machines required for the purpose of carrying out the work covered by this Award.

The employer shall provide boiling water for the midday meal.

15.—Posting of Union Notices.

The accredited Union representative shall not be prevented from posting a copy of this Award, or any notice of the Union, not exceeding fourteen (14) inches by nine (9) inches in a suitable place agreed upon between the employer and the Union. Failing agreement in this connection the Board of Reference shall decide where the copy of the Award or the said notices shall be posted.

16.—Clock.

One reliable clock shall be installed in each factory, and the starting and finishing time of workers shall be taken from that clock.

17.—Record.

(a) Each employer shall keep a time and wages record, wherein shall be entered:—

- (i) The name of each worker.
- (ii) The nature of his employment.
- (iii) The time he commences and finishes work each day.
- (iv) The total hours worked each day and each week.
- (v) The wages (and overtime, if any) received therefor.
- (vi) The ages of junior labourers.

(b) Any system of automatic recording by means of machines shall be deemed a compliance with this clause, to the extent of the information recorded.

(c) Such record shall be entered up each day in legible English characters, and shall be signed weekly only if correct by each worker.

(d) The record shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited official of the Union during the ordinary office hours, at the employer's office or other convenient place.

18.—Posting Award.

The notice referred to in Clause 1(b) and a copy of this Award shall be placed by the employer in a suitable place agreed upon between the employer and the Union. Failing agreement in this connection, the Board of Reference shall decide where the said notice and copy of the Award shall be placed.

19.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the area comprised within a radius of twenty (20) miles from the General Post Office, Perth except such portions thereof as are comprised within premises occupied by or worked in conjunction with the Railway Department or the Midland Railway Company.

20.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be three (3) years from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the 21st November, 1946.

21.—No Reduction.

This Award shall not in itself operate to reduce the wages of any worker who is at present receiving above the minimum rate prescribed for his class of work.

22.—Apprentices.

(a) The provisions of the Schedule hereto marked "Apprenticeship Regulations" are hereby embodied in and form part of this Award.

(b) The maximum number of apprentices to be employed in any branch of the industry by any employer shall be as follows:—

Apprentices		Tradesmen
1	to	1
2	to	3
3	to	5
4	to	7
5	to	9 etc.

Provided that any employer shall have the right to apply to the Board of Reference for a greater proportion of

apprentices, and the Board of Reference may grant such employer additional apprentices where the employer is able to justify his application before the Board.

- (c) The term of apprenticeship shall be as follows:—
- Glass silvering, 5 years.
 - Glass bevelling, 5 years.
 - Glass bevelling and silvering (excluding cutting), 5 years.
 - Leadlight glazing, 5 years.

23.—Breakdowns.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union, or the Unions affiliated with it, or because of any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

24.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court appoints for the purposes of the Award a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of:—

- (i) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
- (ii) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award;
- (iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time;
- (iv) allowing a greater proportion of apprentices or junior labourers to be taken on by an employer than the proportions prescribed in the Award; provided that the employer is able to justify his request to the Board for such greater proportion of apprentices or junior labourers;
- (v) acting as the "Apprenticeship Board" referred to in Clauses 7 and 8 of the Schedule—"Apprenticeship Regulations"—annexed to this Award.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

25.—Junior Labourer's Certificate.

(a) Junior labourers shall, if required, furnish the employer with a certificate showing the following particulars:—

- (i) Name in full;
 - (ii) age and date of birth.
- (b) The certificate shall be signed by the worker.
- (c) No worker shall have any claim upon the employer for additional pay in the event of his age being wrongly stated on this certificate. If any worker shall wilfully mis-state his age in the above certificate, he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

26.—Absence Through Sickness:

A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-half (½) day for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act. A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default. No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

27.—Scope:

This award shall apply to workers following the vocations set out in Clause 7—Wages, in the industries as carried on by the following Respondents:—

Arcus Ltd.
Barnett Bros. (1934) Ltd.
W. Drabble Ltd.
Western Glass and Mirror Works.
The Honorable, the Minister Controlling,
State Saw Mills.

Schedule II.

APPRENTICESHIP REGULATIONS.

Definitions.

1. (1) "Act" means "The Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935," and any alteration or amendment thereof for the time being in force.

(2) "Apprentice" means any person of either sex of any age who is apprenticed to learn or to be taught any industry, trade, craft, or calling to which these regulations apply, and includes an apprentice on probation.

(3) "Award" includes Industrial Agreement.

(4) "Court" means the Court of Arbitration.

(5) "Employer" includes any firm, company, or corporation.

(6) "Minor" means a person not less than fourteen years of age and not more than eighteen years of age who customarily works under the direction of or in association with an employer, master, or journeyman upon the material and with the tools or implements used in the industry.

Employment—Probation.

2. No minor shall (except where provision is otherwise made in this Award) be employed or engaged in the industry, except subject to the conditions of apprenticeship or probationership herein contained.

3. (1) Every apprentice shall be employed on probation for a period of three months to determine his fitness or otherwise for apprenticeship, and shall work only for such hours per day and for such remuneration as may be prescribed by the Award. In the event of his becoming an apprentice such probationary period shall be counted as part of the term of apprenticeship.

(2) The Court may in any case where it seems expedient to do so, order that the probationary period of employment be extended for a further period not exceeding three months.

4. (a) Any employer taking an apprentice on probation shall within 14 days thereafter register such probationer by giving notice thereof to the Registrar in the prescribed form. If at the date of the coming into operation of these regulations an employer is employing any apprentice or probationer who has not been duly registered as such, he shall forthwith apply for the due registration of such apprentice or probationer.

(b) At the end of the period of probation of each apprentice, if mutually agreed upon by the employer and the legal guardian of the boy, but not otherwise he may become an apprentice under an agreement.

5. The employer of every apprentice shall keep him constantly at work and teach such apprentice or cause him to be taught the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound apprentice, or competent instruction in a gradual and complete manner, and shall give such apprentice a reasonable opportunity to learn the same, and receive, during the period of his apprenticeship, such technical, trade, and general instruction and training as may be necessary. An every apprentice shall, during the period of his apprenticeship, faithfully serve his employer for the purpose of being taught the industry, craft, occupation, or calling in relation to which he is bound, and shall also conscientiously and regularly accept such technical trade, and general instruction and training as afore said, in addition to the teaching that may be provided by his employer.

6. The employer and the apprentice respectively shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform as a duty enforceable under an Award of the Court.

Apprenticeship Board.

7. (i) The Court may on its own motion or on the application of any of the parties, or on the recommendation of an Industrial Board, appoint a Board for the purpose of dealing with all matters affecting apprentices assigned to the determination of the Board by the Court and in particular to perform and discharge all powers and duties in these regulations and therein to be performed and discharged by the Court, except such powers and duties as are specially assigned to the Court by the Act.

(ii) The Board shall consist of the following:—

(a) A chairman, to be appointed by the Court, and

(b) Representatives of the employers and workers respectively, one or two on each side, as may be decided by the Court.

(iii) The Board shall be invested with the following powers and functions in addition and without prejudice to those mentioned in (i):—

(a) to endeavour to promote apprenticeships under this Award;

(b) to draw up syllabi of training and to arrange for the periodical examination of apprentices;

(c) to permit in any special circumstances the taking or employment of an apprentice by an employer, notwithstanding that the quota fixed by the Award in any particular case may be exceeded;

(d) to enter any factory, workshop, or place where an apprentice is employed or appoint any other person for that purpose and inspect the conditions under which any apprentice is employed;

(e) to require any employer to furnish the Board with any specified information relating to any trade or industry subject to this Award, or any of the workers engaged therein, with a view to determining whether there is a sufficient number of apprentices being trained to meet future requirements and in the interests of the community;

(f) to advise the Court as to all matters appertaining to apprentices.

(iv) A majority of the members of the Board, one of whom must be the chairman, shall constitute a quorum.

(v) The decision of the Board shall be the decision of the majority of the members and shall be signed by the chairman and forwarded to the Registrar.

(vi) Either party, with the consent of the Court, may at any time alter its representative.

8. (a) No employer shall refuse employment to any person, or dismiss any worker from his employment, or injure him in his employment or alter his position to his prejudice, by reason merely of the fact that the worker is a member of the Board, or by reason merely of anything said or done or omitted to be done by any such person or worker in the course of his duty as such member.

(b) In any proceeding for any contravention of this subclause it shall lie upon the employer to show that any person proved to have been refused employment, or any worker proved to have been dismissed or injured in his employment or prejudiced whilst acting as such member was refused employment or dismissed or injured in his employment or prejudiced for some reason other than that mentioned in this subclause.

Agreement of Apprenticeship.

9. (a) All agreements of apprenticeship shall be drawn up on a form approved by the Court, and signed by the employer, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, and the Registrar. No employer, guardian, or apprentice shall enter into any agreement or undertaking purporting to add to, vary, alter or amend any such agreement without the approval of the Court.

(b) There shall be three copies of each agreement, of which one copy shall be held by the employer, one shall be held by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one copy shall be retained by the Registrar.

(c) The apprenticeship agreement shall be completed within one month of the termination of the probationary period.

(d) Every agreement of apprenticeship shall be subject to the provisions of the Award in force for the time being applicable to apprenticeship in the industry.

10. Every agreement entered into by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice shall be for a period of five years, or such other period as may be prescribed by the Award, but this period may be reduced in special circumstances with the approval of the Court.

11. Every agreement of apprenticeship entered into shall contain—

- (a) The names and addresses of the parties to the agreement.
- (b) The date of birth of the apprentice.
- (c) A description of the industry, craft, occupation or calling or combination thereof to which the apprentice is to be bound.
- (d) The date at which the apprenticeship is to commence and the period of apprenticeship.
- (e) A condition requiring the apprentice to obey all reasonable directions of the employer and requiring the employer and apprentice to comply with the terms of the industrial Award so far as they concern the apprentice.
- (f) A condition that technical instruction of the apprentice, when available, shall be at the employer's expense, and shall be in the employer's time, except in places where such instruction is given after the ordinary working hours.
- (g) A condition that in the event of any apprentice, in the opinion of the examiners, not progressing satisfactorily, increased time for technical instruction shall be allowed at the employer's expense to enable such apprentice to reach the necessary standard.
- (h) The general conditions of apprenticeship.

Transfer of Apprentices.

12. (a) The Court shall have power to transfer an apprentice from (a) one employer to another and/or (b) from one trade to another, either temporarily or permanently—

- (i) if the employer does not provide the necessary facilities for the apprentice to become proficient in his trade; or
- (ii) upon the application of the employer or the apprentice for good cause shown.

(b) The transfer of every agreement shall be made out in quadruplicate and shall, unless the Court otherwise directs, be signed by the late employer or his assigns, the legal guardian of the apprentice, the apprentice, the Registrar, and the new employer. The transfer form shall be completed within two months of the date on which the transfer is effected.

(c) One copy of the transfer agreement shall be held by the late employer, one shall be held by the new employer, one shall be held by the legal guardian of the apprentice, and one shall be retained by the Registrar.

13. Should an employer at any time before the determination of the period of apprenticeship desire to dispense with the service of the apprentice he may with the

consent of the apprentice and guardian transfer him to another employer carrying on business within a reasonable distance of the original employer's place of business; willing to continue to teach the apprentice and pay the rate of wages prescribed by the Court in its Award or otherwise according to the total length of time served, and generally to perform the obligations of the original employer.

14. On the transfer or termination of any apprenticeship, from whatever cause, the employer shall give the apprentice a statement in writing setting forth the time he has served, full particulars of the branches of the trade or industry in which he has received instruction and the proficiency attained (see Form B hereof); and he shall also notify the Registrar stating the cause of such transfer or termination. On any such transfer the original employer shall be relieved from all obligations under the contract.

15. In the event of an employer being unable to provide work for the apprentice or to mutually agree with the legal guardian of the apprentice to cancel the agreement or to arrange a transfer, application may be made to the Court to arrange for such transfer or to have such agreement cancelled.

16. Where a person is apprenticed to partners his agreement of apprenticeship shall upon the retirement or death of any partner be deemed to be assigned to the continuing partner or partners.

Cancellation of Agreement.

17. Every agreement shall include a provision that it may be cancelled, by mutual consent, by the employer and the legal guardian of the apprentice giving one month's notice in writing to the Court and to the parties concerned that such apprenticeship shall be terminated.

18. If the apprentice shall at any time be wilfully disobedient to the lawful orders of the employer, his managers, foremen or other servants having authority over the apprentice, or be slothful, negligent, or dishonest, or shall otherwise grossly misbehave himself, or shall not conduct himself as a good and faithful apprentice should do, or shall not faithfully observe and keep his part of his agreement, then it shall be lawful for the employer, with the consent of the Court, to discharge the apprentice from his service.

19. The Court may in its discretion for any cause which it may deem sufficient on the application of any party to an apprenticeship agreement vary or cancel the agreement, either unconditionally or subject to such terms and conditions as it may deem advisable.

20. No apprentice employed under a registered agreement shall be discharged by the employer for alleged misconduct until the registration of the agreement of apprenticeship has been cancelled by order of the Court on the application of the employer.

Provided, however, that an apprentice may be suspended for misconduct by the employer, but in any such case the employer shall forthwith make an application for cancellation of the agreement of apprenticeship, and in the event of the Court refusing same the wages of the apprentice or such portion thereof, if any, as the Court may order shall be paid as from the date of such suspension, and, in the event of the application for cancellation being granted, such order may take effect from the date when the apprentice was suspended.

21. Subject to the provisions of the Acts relating to Bankruptcy and Insolvency and the Winding-up of Companies, the following provisions shall apply:

- (a) The Trustee or Liquidator, as the case may be, may give written notice to the apprentice and his parent or guardian of his intention to discontinue the employment of the apprentice from a date to be named in such notice, and thereupon the agreement shall be deemed to be terminated from the said date.
- (b) Neither the apprentice, his parent or guardian, shall have any right of action against the employer unless the Court specifically authorises the same after consideration of the circumstances, and in any event, any proceedings for damages hereunder authorised by the Court must be commenced within six weeks after the service on the apprentice of the notice referred to in subclause (a) hereof, otherwise any claim for damages shall be deemed to be waived and forfeited.
- (c) If the contract of apprenticeship is transferred on the bankruptcy or insolvency of the employer, to another employer, the apprentice

named in such contract shall not be counted in calculating the proportion of apprentices to other labour.

Extension of Term.

22. Subject to regulation 38, time lost by the apprentice through sickness or any other cause whatsoever may, with the consent of the Court on the application of any party, be added to the original term in the apprenticeship agreement at the end of the year of service in which the time has been lost or at the termination of the apprenticeship period.

23. The term of apprenticeship may be extended by the Court on the failure of an apprentice to pass two successive periodical examinations, either by ordering a continuation of any particular year of the apprenticeship, in which case the next year of service shall not commence until after the expiration of the extended period, or by adding the period of extension to the last year of service. It shall be the duty of the examiners to make any recommendation they see fit to the Court for the purpose of such extension. Any extension of the term of apprenticeship shall be subject to all the conditions and stipulations in the original agreement, except as to rates of wages, which shall be such amount as the Court may determine. (See also regulations 34 and 35.)

Technical Education Classes.

24. (a) Every apprentice shall attend regularly and punctually a Government or other approved technical school vocational classes or classes of instruction, for instruction in such subjects as are provided for his trade. This clause shall be deemed to have been complied with if the apprentice takes a course in an approved correspondence school: Provided, however, that attendances shall not be compulsory when the apprentice is resident outside a radius of 12 miles from the place where instruction is given, or in the case of illness of the apprentice the proof whereof lies on him. Provided also that if technical instruction is not available in the locality in which the apprentice is employed and is available by correspondence, at reasonable cost to be approved by the Court, the Court may prescribe such correspondence course as the technical instruction to be taken by the apprentice and paid for by the employer.

(b) The fees for the classes attended by the apprentice shall be paid by the employer.

(c) The period during which apprentices are to attend such technical school or classes if any shall be four hours per week.

25. Any apprentice who:

- (a) fails without reasonable cause, the proof whereof lies on him, to attend any technical school or class punctually when such is available for instruction, at the time appointed for the commencement of the school or class, or leaves school or class before the time appointed for leaving, without the permission of the teacher; or
- (b) fails to be diligent or behaves in an indecorous manner while in such school or class; or
- (c) destroys or fails to take care of any material or equipment in such school or class

shall be deemed to commit a breach of the Award and shall be liable for each such breach to a penalty not exceeding two pounds.

26. Where in any case it is shown to the satisfaction of the Court that any apprentice, by reason of his engagement on country work or other good cause, cannot conveniently attend a technical school or other prescribed classes, such of these regulations as relate to attendance at a technical school or other prescribed classes, and to examinations, shall not apply to such apprentice, but he shall be subject to such conditions as the Court may direct.

27. If the examiners or the industrial union or employer concerned make representations to the Court that the facilities provided by the technical school or other place of vocational training for the teaching of apprentices, are inadequate, the Court may make such investigations and such report to the Minister controlling such technical school, or such other place, as it deems necessary.

28. When an apprentice attends a technical school, vocational classes, or other class or classes of instruction during his ordinary working hours, where such is prescribed, the time so occupied shall be regarded as part of the term of his apprenticeship, and the employer shall not be entitled to make any deduction from the wages of the apprentice for such time.

Examinations.

29. (a) Every apprentice shall be bound to submit himself to examination at the places and times appointed by the Registrar after consultation with the examiner.

(b) Every apprentice shall, prior to submitting himself to examination, if required by the examiners, produce to the examiners a certificate that he has made at least 70 per centum of attendances at the technical school or other place of instruction, unless he is exempted from such attendance for good cause.

(c) The Registrar shall notify the examiners of the names and addresses of the apprentices required to submit themselves to examination and the attendances made by them at the technical school, should such information be in his possession.

(d) The employer shall place at the disposal of the examiners such material and machinery on his premises as may be required by them, and shall in all ways facilitate the conduct of the examination.

30. (a) The examiners shall be persons skilled in the industry and appointed by the Court. In the event of a disagreement between the examiners, the matter in dispute shall be referred to a third person agreed to by them or nominated by the Court or the President, at the request of any of the examiners, and the decision of such person shall be final and conclusive.

(b) It shall be the duty of the examiners to examine the work, require the production of the certificate of attendance, inquire into the diligence of each apprentice and as to the opportunities provided by the employer for each apprentice to learn, and to submit a report to the Court in writing as to the result of the examination within one month from the date of holding the examination, but this period may be extended by the Court.

(c) Such examination shall, where possible, include theory and practice as applied to the trade, industry, craft, occupation, or calling to which the apprentice is indentured.

31. The Registrar shall, after each examination, issue a certificate to each apprentice indicating the results at the term of apprenticeship served. A duplicate of such certificate shall be forwarded by the Registrar to the employer and the secretary of the union, each of whom shall keep the same in safe custody and produce for inspection by the Industrial Inspector whenever demanded by the latter to do so.

32. Whenever it is possible so to do, the examiner before entering upon the examination, shall draw up a syllabus showing what, in their opinion, is the stage of proficiency which an apprentice should attain at each of the examinations prescribed. The syllabus shall be subject to review by the Court at any time, and shall be kept as a record by the Registrar and a copy handed to the examiners before each examination. The same syllabus may be subject to alteration from time to time by the examiners, who shall forthwith notify the Registrar thereof.

33. In lieu of, or in addition to, examiners above referred to the Court may appoint, wholly or partly, examiners to be recommended by the Superintendent of Technical Education for the whole or any portion of the subjects of instruction.

34. On the failure of an apprentice to pass any of the examinations, the employer may, if the examiner so recommend, withhold the increase in wages accruing to the apprentice in accordance with the scale set forth in the Award, for such period as may be recommended by the examiners, but not exceeding twelve months. (See also regulation 23.)

35. Upon the failure of an apprentice to pass two consecutive examinations, it shall be the duty of the examiners to report same to the Court, with a recommendation as to the extension of the apprenticeship agreement, the cancellation of the apprenticeship agreement or such other remedial measures (i.e., increased time for technical instruction) as they may deem advisable. The Court, after notice to all parties concerned, may cancel the agreement or make such other order in the circumstances as it may deem necessary. (See also regulation 23.)

36. Upon completion of the period of training prescribed or any authorised extension thereof, each apprentice shall, if he has passed the final examination to the satisfaction of the examiners, be provided with a certificate to that effect by the Registrar. This certificate shall also be signed by the examiners.

Lost Time.

37. The employer shall pay the apprentice for all time lost through sickness or the holidays prescribed by this Award: Provided—

- (a) payment for such sickness shall not exceed a total of two weeks in each year;
- (b) where the time lost through sickness exceeds four consecutive working days, the employer may demand from the apprentice the production of a medical certificate, and a further certificate or certificates may be required if any time is lost through sickness within seven days from the date of resumption of duty, the cost if any of such certificate or certificates not exceeding 5s. to be borne by the employer.

38. The employer shall pay the apprentice, in respect of time lost through compulsory military or naval training (but not exceeding two weeks in any year of service), the amount by which the wages prescribed by the industrial award for the trade, calling, craft, occupation, or industry exceeds the amount received by the apprentice from the Department of Defence: Provided, however, that this clause shall not apply to military or naval training imposed through failure to attend compulsory parades.

All time lost by reason of compulsory military or naval training other than the additional training mentioned in the above proviso shall count as part of the apprenticeship.

39. When an apprentice is absent from work for any cause other than sickness or in pursuance of the provisions of these regulations, the employer shall be entitled to deduct from the wages of the apprentice an amount proportionate to the time so lost.

40. When an apprentice cannot be usefully employed because of a strike the employer shall be relieved of his obligations under the apprenticeship agreement during the period of the strike.

Part-time Employment.

41. Where in any case an employer is temporarily unable to provide work to employ an apprentice for his full time, application may be made by the employer to the Court for permission—

- (a) to employ the apprentice for such lesser time per week or per month and at such remuneration as the Court may determine, being not less than the proportionate amount of the rate of wages prescribed by the industrial Award or Agreement for the trade, calling, or industry; or
- (b) to suspend the contract for such period and on such terms as the Court thinks fit.

If the Court grants the application, holidays will be reduced *pro rata*.

Miscellaneous.

42. (1) The Registrar shall prepare and keep a roll of apprentices containing—

- (a) a record of all apprentices and probationers placed with employers;
- (b) a record of all employers with whom apprentices are placed;
- (c) a record of the progress of each apprentice, recording the result of the examiners' reports;
- (d) any other particulars the Court may direct.

(2) These records shall be open to inspection by employers and the union of workers interested upon request.

43. (1) (a) For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices allowed at any time the average number of journeymen employed on all working days of the 12 months immediately preceding such time shall be deemed to be the number of journeymen employed.

(b) Where the employer is himself a journeyman regularly and usually working at the trade he shall be counted as a journeyman for the purpose of computing the number of apprentices allowed. In the case of a partnership each partner shall be deemed a journeyman for the purpose of this subclause.

(c) Where a business is in operation for less than 12 months the method of ascertaining the number shall be as agreed by the union and the employer, or if no agreement is arrived at, as determined by the Court.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (1) hereof the Court may in any particular case—

- (a) In special circumstances permit the taking or employment of an apprentice by an employer notwithstanding that the quota fixed by the Award may be exceeded.
- (b) Refuse the registration of an agreement of apprenticeship or the taking of an apprentice in any case when in the opinion of the Court the circumstances are such that the apprentice is not likely to receive the instruction and training necessary to qualify him as a tradesman.

44. Every industrial inspector appointed in pursuance of the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, shall have the power to enter any premises, make such inspection of the premises, plant, machinery, or work upon which any apprentice is employed or could be employed, interview any apprentice or employee, examine any books or documents of the business relating to the wages and conditions of apprentices, interrogate the employer in regard to any of the above-mentioned matters.

45. With a view to determining whether the number of apprentices being trained is sufficient to meet the future requirements of the industry in the matter of skilled artisans, the Registrar may require any employer to furnish him with any specified information relating to the said industry, or relating to the workers engaged therein.

46. In every application under clauses 15, 18, 19, 20, and 41 hereof, the union of workers registered may intervene and make such representations at the hearing as it may deem necessary. Similarly, in the case of an application under clause 22, the employer may intervene and, in an application under clause 23, both the employer and the union may intervene. Where such intervention is made, a representative or agent shall be appointed in the manner laid down by section 65 of the Act.

2. The parent (or guardian) and apprentice hereby for themselves and each of them and their and each of their respective executors, administrators, and assigns covenant with the employer as follow:—

(a) That the apprentice shall and will truly and faithfully serve the employer as his apprentice in the said trade at.....aforesaid, and will diligently attend to his work at the said trade, and will at all times willingly obey the reasonable directions of the employer, his managers, foremen, and overseers, and will not during the apprenticeship, without the consent in writing of the employer, sell any goods which the employer makes or employ himself in the service of any other person or company in any work, or do any work which the employer undertakes, other than for the employer, and will not absent himself from the employer's service without leave, and will comply with the provisions of the regulations and of all Awards and Agreements made under the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, or any other Act in force so far as the same shall relate to his apprenticeship.

(b) That the apprentice will not do or knowingly suffer any damage to be done to the property of the employer.

3. The employer for himself, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns HEREBY COVENANTS with the apprentice as follows:—

(a) That the employer will accept the apprentice as his apprentice during the said term, and will during the said term, by the best means in his power, cause him to be instructed in the trade of.....and will provide facilities for the practical training of the apprentice in the said trade.

(b) That the technical instruction of the apprentice when available, shall be at the expense of the employer and shall be in the employer's time, except in places when such instruction is given after the ordinary working hours.

(c) In the event of the apprentice, in the opinion of the examiner or examiners appointed by the Arbitration Court, not progressing satisfactorily, increased time for technical instruction shall be allowed at the employer's expense to enable the apprentice to reach the necessary standard.

(d) That the employer will observe and perform all the conditions and stipulations of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1935, or any Act or Acts amending the same and any regulations made thereunder, as far as the same concern the apprentice, AND ALSO the conditions and stipulations of any relative Award or Industrial Agreement for the time being in force.

4. IT IS FURTHER AGREED BETWEEN THE PARTIES HERETO:—

(a) That the apprentice shall not be responsible for any faulty work or for any damage or injury done to materials, work, or machinery, tools, or plant other than wilful damage or injury during the course of his work.

(b) That the apprentice shall not be required to work overtime without his consent.

(c) This Agreement may, subject to the approval of the Court, be cancelled by mutual consent by the employer and parent (or guardian) giving one month notice in writing to the Court and to the parties concerned that this Agreement shall be terminated, and such mutual consent being given the apprenticeship shall be terminated without prejudice to the rights of any of the parties hereto in respect of any antecedent breach of the provisions of this Agreement.

(d) Other conditions.

5. This Agreement is subject to amendment, variation, or cancellation by the Court pursuant to the power to that effect contained in or implied by the provisions relating to apprentices contained in the Award.

HAVING heard Mr. H. M. Sweeney on behalf of the applicant and Mr. F. S. Cross on behalf of the respondents, and by consent, the Court, in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, doth hereby order that Award No. 25 of 1935, as amended by Order No. 413 of 1938, made between the abovenamed parties be, and the same is hereby further amended in the manner following:—

13—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

13—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall, subject to clause 15 hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely, Anzac Day and Labour Day.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(c) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave at Christmas time and also Good Friday, Easter Saturday and the week immediately succeeding such days, with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed, shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(d) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(e) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid twelve (12) hours' pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(f) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(g) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (e) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(h) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(j) Pieceworkers whose holiday pay is provided for under clause 4 of this Award shall not be entitled to payment in respect of any holidays or annual leave prescribed herein.

(k) Watchmen, feeders and grooms may, in lieu of the holidays or annual leave prescribed in subclauses (a) and (c) hereof, be allowed leave at such time as may be mutually agreed upon between the employer and the worker.

(l) Workers engaged on essential work during the period or periods referred to in subclause (c) hereof shall be allowed equivalent time off at such time as may be mutually agreed upon between the employer and the worker.

(m) The quantum of annual leave to be allowed to a worker shall, for service prior to 1st September, 1946, be calculated in accordance with the provisions of the Award applicable before that date, and for service subsequent to 1st September, 1946, in accordance with the provisions of this amendment.

15—Overtime.

Delete subclause (c) of this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

(e) Except where it is otherwise prescribed, all time worked by workers other than grooms, feeders or night watchmen on the holidays prescribed in clause 13 (a) hereof, shall be paid for at the rate of ordinary time in addition to the weekly wage, and on Sundays at the rate of double time. Provided that on such days a minimum of two (2) hours' work shall be paid for.

Delete subclause (g) of this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

(g) All time worked on Sundays or on the holidays prescribed in clause 13 (a) hereof, in maintaining or effecting repairs or renewals to plant or machinery, including the washout of boilers, which it is necessary to effect to enable work to proceed on the next working day, shall be paid for in the case of such holidays at the rate of ordinary time in addition to the weekly wage, and in the case of Sundays, at the rate of time and a half.

WHEREAS an Industrial Dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said agreement an Award of the Court supplementary to Award, No. 18 of 1941, made on the 8th day of December, 1941, between the abovenamed parties: Now therefore the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an award of the Court supplementary to the said Award, No. 18 of 1941:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note: Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Area and Scope.

This award shall apply to workers who are eligible for membership in the applicant union and who are employed by the respondents throughout the State on the following classes of work; Provided it shall not apply to workers covered by any other award of the Court of Arbitration or any Industrial Agreement registered under the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941:—

- (a) railway construction;
- (b) roads and bridges construction;
- (c) country water supply, drainage and irrigation construction, excepting any work comprised in or connected with the Mundaring-Kalgoorlie water supply undertaking, or the metropolitan water supply, sewerage, and drainage undertaking;
- (d) land clearing.

2.—Shift Work.

(a) The loading on the ordinary rates for shift work shall be as follows:—

Afternoon Shift: 5 per cent.

Night Shift: 5 per cent.

A worker employed on shift work who is not allowed to rotate day shift with afternoon and/or night shift shall be paid a loading of 25 per cent. on the ordinary rates of pay for afternoon and/or night shift; Provided however that this provision shall not apply in cases where the period for which afternoon and/or night shift is worked without rotation with day shift does not exceed two (2) weeks.

(b) Work shall not be recognised as shift work but shall be regarded as overtime unless at least five (5) consecutive afternoon and/or night shifts are worked.

(c) The sequence of shifts shall not be deemed to be broken by a holiday.

(d) Any shift starting before 6 a.m. or after 10 a.m. shall be deemed to be an afternoon or night shift.

(e) Starting and finishing times of shifts may be fixed to suit the efficient working of the particular job; Provided transport facilities are available or arranged.

(f) On construction jobs where shift work is worked in two (2) shifts the first shift shall work eight (8) hours exclusive of crib time, but the second shift shall work eight (8) hours inclusive of a period not exceeding thirty (30) minutes for crib. Provided however that where work is performed in five (5) days per week the hours of shift workers shall be increased by forty-eight (48) minutes; Provided however that where two (2) shift work is in operation the ordinary hours of commencing shall not apply to the first shift.

Provided further that where for the convenience of the Department the two (2) shifts are confined within a total spread of sixteen (16) hours in the case of five and a half (5½) day week workers and seventeen and three-fifths (17 3-5ths) hours in the case of five (5) day week workers each shift shall be entitled to a half an hour crib time within the eight (8) or eight and four-fifths (8 4-5ths) hour shift.

3.—Variation of Award No. 18 of 1941.

This award shall be deemed to annul clauses 25 and 34 (2) of Award, No. 18 of 1941, as amended.

4.—Term.

The term of this award shall be one (1) year from the date hereof.

Cross on behalf of the respondents the Court in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, doth hereby order that Award, No. 17 of 1939, made between the abovenamed parties be and the same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

20.—Annual Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

20.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer; provided that the period of leave shall, in the case of ice, ice-cream, pastrycook and cordial factory carters, be three and two-thirds ($3\frac{2}{3}$) weeks or where such workers work a five (5) day week, three and three-fifths ($3\frac{3}{5}$) weeks; provided also that the period of leave shall, in the case of milk and/or cream carters if required, generally speaking, to work continuously seven (7) days in the week, be three and four-sevenths ($3\frac{4}{7}$) weeks.

(b) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid; provided that this sub-clause shall not apply to milk carters, cream carters, ice-carters, ice-cream carters, pastrycook carters, and cordial factory carters.

(c) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service; provided that, in the case of ice, ice-cream, pastrycook, and cordial factory carters, such payment shall be eleven-thirty-sixths ($11/36$ ths) of a week's pay at the ordinary rate of wage; provided also that, in the case of milk and/or cream carters, such payment shall be twenty-five-eighty-fourths ($25/84$ ths) of a week's pay at the ordinary rate of wage.

(d) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(e) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under the award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(f) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to sub-clause (e) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

Amendment of No. 16 of 1938, Registered 23rd June, 1938.

THIS Agreement made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this 22nd day of November, 1946, between the Chairman and Members of the Kalgoorlie Road Board, hereinafter termed the employers of the one part, and the Eastern Goldfields Municipal and Roads Board Labourers' Union of Workers, hereinafter termed the employees of the other part: Whereas by an Agreement made in pursuance of the said Act between the employers of the one part and the Eastern Goldfields Municipal and Roads Board Labourers' Union of Workers of the other part, bearing date the 4th day of May, 1938, and numbered 16 of 1938, and whereas it has been agreed between the employers and the Eastern Goldfields Municipal and Roads Board Labourers' Union of Workers that an additional clause to be known as clause 17 (a)—Long Service Leave shall be inserted in the said Agreement No. 16 of 1938. Whereby it is mutually agreed between the parties hereto as follows:—

Clause 17 (a).—Long Service Leave.

1. All full time workers after serving the Chairman and Members of the Kalgoorlie Road Board continuously for ten (10) years will be entitled, subject to the following conditions, to three (3) months' long service leave on full pay, to be granted at the convenience of the employer.

In regard to workers engaged at the date of this Agreement, with the Kalgoorlie Road Board, continuous service as from 1st January, 1936, shall be deemed to be service for the purpose of this Agreement, provided also that full time service with the Armed Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia between the 3rd day of September, 1939, and the date of this Agreement shall be deemed to be service for the purpose of this Agreement. Provided also that any employee leaving the service of the employer, who has served continuously for at least three (3) years next before his retirement, shall be paid for long service leave pro rata to the date of retirement. Provided also that any employee leaving the service of the Kalgoorlie Road Board at any time subsequent to the initial period of ten (10) years shall be entitled to payment for long service leave pro rata for such period. Such period or periods of continuous service shall not count for the purpose of calculating long service leave if the worker is out of the employ of the Kalgoorlie Road Board for any period exceeding six months at any one time.

2. Workers will be similarly entitled to a further period of three months' long service leave for every subsequent ten years' service.

3. Long service leave is granted solely for recuperative purposes. During long service leave no worker shall undertake any form of employment for hire or reward. Contravention of this condition will be followed by dismissal.

4. Workers shall be paid their salary in advance at the rate of pay equal to the average daily rate over the preceding twelve (12) months.

5. Any worker who is eligible for long service leave and who resigns or is retired from the service of the employer, shall be paid for such long service leave due.

6. If a deceased worker would have been entitled to long service leave at the date of his death the amount of payment in lieu thereof shall be paid on claim to the next of kin.

7. District allowances will not be paid during the period of long service leave, except when the worker or abovementioned dependants of the worker remain in the district.

Now this Agreement witnesseth that in consideration of the premises the parties hereto mutually covenant agree the one with the other as follows:—From and after the date hereof, clause 17 (a)—Long Service Leave shall be deemed to be embodied in the recited Agreement.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 1 of 1947.

Between Western Australian Nurses' Association Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and Minister for Health, Respondent.

WHEREAS an Industrial Dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement in all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to declare the said agreement an award. Now therefore the Court, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an award of the Court.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note:—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Scope.

This award shall apply to all Infant Health Nurses employed by the respondent.

2.—Term.

The term of this award shall be for a period of three (3) years as from the date hereof with the right of either party hereto to apply to the Court for amendment after twelve (12) months.

3.—Area.

This award shall have effect throughout the State of Western Australia.

4.—Hours.

The ordinary working hours shall be thirty eight (38) per week, to be worked in not more than five and a half (5½) days per week, provided that the hours may be worked in five (5) days in any one week at the option of the employer.

5.—Holidays.

(a) Employees shall be entitled to two weeks' annual leave on full pay for each twelve months completed service.

(b) An employee with more than one month's service who may resign or be dismissed, except the dismissal due to misconduct, shall be entitled to pay for holidays pro rata up to the time of her leaving the service in such proportion as her period of employment bears to the number of days in the year.

(c) Leave shall not be allowed to accumulate except with the consent of the employee, and in no case shall accumulate for more than two years' service.

(d) In addition to the holidays prescribed in such clause (a) hereof employees shall be granted Public Service Holidays; provided that an employee called up to work on such holidays shall receive a day in lieu thereof.

6.—Sick Leave.

(a) Sick leave with pay will be granted on the following scale on production of an adequate medical certificate or, in regard to leave not exceeding two (2) days other evidence of ill health satisfactory to the employer:—

(i) Under three (3) years' service—one and quarter (1¼) days for each calendar month of continuous service under this award: Provided that payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the employee leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the employee being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(ii) Over three (3) years' service—two (2) months on full pay.

(b) Sick leave may be granted in one or more periods but the aggregate amount of leave on pay shall not in any one (1) triennial period exceed the time provided for in the foregoing scale.

(c) A "triennial period" shall be three (3) years preceding the date of the commencement of absence through illness in respect of which leave is claimed.

(d) If sickness is due to the wilful neglect or default of the applicant, the proof whereof lies upon the employer, it shall, if granted be without pay.

7.—Transfer.

(a) Where a Sister is engaged for service in a place other than the place where she is employed at the time of such engagement, she shall be entitled to first-class travelling accommodation from such place of engagement to the place of employment in order to enter upon such employment: In addition she shall be entitled to a travelling allowance of 10s. per day or 2s. 6d. per item, including breakfast, dinner, tea and bed. No allowance shall be made for journeys completed between ordinary meeting times, which shall be 8 a.m., 1 p.m. and 6 p.m.

(b) If an employee remains in the service of the employer for the period for which she was engaged, or none is stipulated then for six months, she shall receive in respect of the return journey to her place of engagement first class travelling accommodation, and in addition such travelling allowance as prescribed in subclause (a) hereof, provided that if her services are terminated before the periods aforesaid have expired (except in the case of dismissal for misconduct or neglect of duty) she shall only be entitled to the travelling allowance so prescribed.

(c) Any employee whose duties require her to travel shall be entitled to first-class travelling accommodation at the expense of her employer.

8.—Preference.

All other qualifications being equal preference shall be given in matters of employment and promotion, subject to the Government Employees (Promotions Appeal Board) Act, 1945 shall be given to Unionists.

9.—Award not to Affect Present Salaries or Privileges.

Nothing herein contained shall entitle an employer to reduce the salary of any employee who at the date this award is being paid a higher rate of salary than the minimum prescribed for her class of work.

10.—Accommodation.

In addition to the salaries prescribed in clause 1 hereof, all employees shall receive a weekly allowance equivalent to the difference between thirty seven per cent (37%) of the basic wage for females and fifty two p

cent. (52%) of the basic wage for females applicable in the locality in which the worker is employed, to the intent that the salaries of employees under this award shall be equivalent to the appropriate salary (and living out allowance) according to years of experience of "A" Class Sisters as prescribed in Award, No. 39 of 1945.

11.—Uniforms.

The employer shall supply an employee with all uniforms required, made in accordance with her measurements on a printed or typewritten chart, provided however that in lieu of supplying uniforms the employer may make an allowance of 2s. per week.

12.—Motor Car Allowance.

Where an employee maintains a motor car and is authorised in writing by her employer to use her car in the performance of her duties, she shall be paid for each mile she so uses her car, the rates applying under the appropriate agreement or award relating to officers of the Public Service.

13.—District Allowance.

District allowances as specified herein shall be paid to employees stationed at:—

14.—Long Service Leave.

Long Service Leave privileges as may be decided by the Government for their wages employees shall apply to the employees covered by this award provided that the commencing date for qualifying service shall not be earlier than the 1st July, 1945.

15.—Special Allowances.

In addition to the salaries prescribed herein special allowances as set out in this clause shall be paid:—

(a) Salaries shall be paid at least twice per calendar month, or fortnightly, at the option of the employer. Provided that, by arrangement between the employer and the union, the salary may in any particular case be paid once per calendar month.

17.—Casuals.

(a) A nurse employed for a period of less than two (2) weeks shall be deemed a casual employee and be paid ten per cent. (10%) over the rate specified in this award provided that if a casual employee is still required at the end of two (2) weeks she may be re-employed as a casual with payment as aforesaid for another two (2) weeks.

(b) Casuals shall not be entitled to be paid for public holidays.

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 6 of 1947.

(Registered 14/2/47.)

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1945, this 31st day of December, 1946, between Municipality of Boulder (hereinafter called "the Employers"), of the one part and the electrical Trades Union of Workers of Australia (Western Australian Goldfields Sub-branch), Kalgoorlie (hereinafter called "the Union") of the other part, witnesseth that for the considerations hereinafter appearing the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree the one with the other as follows:—

Area and Scope: This Agreement shall operate over that area comprised within the boundaries of the Municipality of Boulder and shall apply to Electrical Workers Employees of the said Municipality, who are members of the said Union.

Term: The Term of this Agreement shall be Three Years from the date hereof:—

Clause 1.—Annual Leave and Holidays.

(a) 1. Each worker shall be entitled to two consecutive weeks' leave on full pay, or should the period of continuous employment be less than one year the worker shall be paid holiday pay at the rate of 1/6th of a week's pay for every completed month of continuous service, or if employed for less than one month he shall be paid holiday pay in proportion as his length of service is to the full year's employment. Annual leave shall be taken at a time suitable to the convenience of the employer provided that full annual leave must be granted within six months of falling due.

2. In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (a) 1 of the clause, to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such holidays are not equal to the holidays given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on holidays on full pay.

3. If any of the prescribed holidays fall during a worker's annual leave and are observed on what would be an ordinary working day of such worker, there shall be added to the period of annual leave one day for each holiday observed.

(b) 1. The following shall be paid holidays:—Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Easter Monday, Boulder Cup Day, Labour Day, Kalgoorlie Cup Day, Good Friday, Anniversary Day, Foundation Day. If Christmas Day falls on a Sunday the following Monday shall be kept and the same provision shall apply to other prescribed public holidays or the days observed in lieu thereof.

2. Any worker required to work on any of the days prescribed in sub-clause (b)1 of this clause shall be paid for such days at double time rates.

1912-1941, doth hereby order that Award, No. 1A of 1942, made between the abovenamed parties be and the same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

5.—Overtime.

Delete sub-clause (b) of this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

(b) Work done on the days observed as Christmas Day and Good Friday shall be paid for at the rate of double time. Work done on the days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, and Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

6.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

6.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) Seven-day shift workers, that is shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed one week's leave in addition to the leave prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof. Where a worker with twelve (12) months' continuous service is engaged for part of a qualifying twelve monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the period of two (2) consecutive weeks' annual leave prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof increased by one-twelfth of a week for each month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

(c) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(d) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each complete month of continuous service, or in the case of a worker referred to in sub-clause (b) hereof, such payment shall be one-quarter of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each such month he is engaged.

(e) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(f) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct and who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(g) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(h) The quantum of annual leave to be allowed to a worker shall, for service prior to 1st September 1946, be calculated in accordance with the provisions of the Award applicable before that date, and for service subsequent to 1st September, 1946, in accordance with the provisions of this amendment.

6.—Overtime.

Delete sub-clause (b) of this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

(b) Work done on the days observed as Christmas Day and Good Friday shall be paid for at the rate of double time. Work done on the days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day and Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

7.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

7.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) Seven-day shift workers, that is shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed one week's leave in addition to the leave prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof. (f) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(g) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(h) The quantum of annual leave to be allowed to a worker shall, for service prior to 1st September, 1946, be calculated in accordance with the provisions of the award applicable before that date, and for service subsequent to 1st September, 1946, in accordance with the provisions of this amendment.

Between Federated Moulders (Metals) Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and The Kalgoorlie Foundry Limited, Respondent.

HAVING heard Mr. A. E. Hewitt on behalf of the applicant and Mr. F. S. Cross on behalf of the respondent and by consent the Court in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, doth hereby order that Award, No. 4 of 1939, made between the abovenamed parties be and the same is hereby amended in the manner following:—

6.—Overtime.

Delete sub-clause (c) of this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

(c) Work done on Sundays or on the holidays prescribed in clause 7 (a) hereof shall be paid for at the rate of double time. With respect to workers under this award working more than one shift, any worker whose ordinary rotation shift falls on a Sunday or on any of the prescribed holidays, may be employed at ordinary time. Any shift worker required to work more than six (6) shifts consecutively shall be paid for the seventh shift at double time.

7.—Holidays.

Delete this clause and substitute in lieu thereof the following:—

7.—Holidays.

(a) The following days or the days observed in lieu shall, subject to clause 6 (c) hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day: Provided that an employer may allow Kalgoorlie Cup Day and Boulder Cup Day as holidays without deduction of pay in lieu of Australia Day and State Foundation Day in which event Australia Day and State Foundation Day shall not be holidays under this sub-clause. Provided further that in any district or any undertaking where any of the foregoing days is not generally observed as a holiday, an employer may notify his workers that some other day will be observed in lieu of such day in which case the substituted day shall be deemed to be the holiday accordingly.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(c) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.
