UNIVERSITY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA ACT, 1911-1944.

Amendments to Statutes.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Executive Council has been pleased under section 33 of the Uniof University Statute No. 1 of 1947 (amending Statute No. 8), University Statute No. 2 of 1947 (amending Statute No. 1), and University Statute No. 3 of 1947 (amending Statute No. 11), and University Statute No. 3 of 1947 (amending Statute No. 20), as passed by the Senate and Convocation of the University, copies of which are shown hereunder:-

Amending Statute No. 1 of 1947.

Amendment to Statute No. 8-Degree of Faculties.

Section 1 of the Statute to be amended to read:

The University shall give instruction and grant degrees in the following Faculties:—Arts, Science, Engineering, Law, Agriculture, Dental Science, and in such other Faculties as the Senate may from time to time determine.

Section 4 to be amended to read:-

The Chancellor, Pro-Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor and Registrar shall be ex officio members of every

Amending Statute No. 2 of 1947.

Amendment to Statute No. 11-Academic Dress.

Section 2, Clause dealing with Hoods to be amended

Hoods: Arts—royal blue; Science—emerald green; Engineering—gold; Law—Royal purple; Agriculture—bronze; Music—peacock blue; Medicine—ruby red; Surgery-ruby red; Dental Science-silver grey.

Amending Statute No. 3 of 1947.

Amendment to Statute No. 20-Guild of Undergraduates. Section 3 of the Statute to be repealed and a new section 3 substituted:-

3. The objects of the Guild shall be-

(a) to foster all that tends to the advancement of learning and the ennoblement of life;

(b) to afford means of social intercourse to

to alrow means of social intercourse to students at the University;

(c) to provide facilities for and to encourage amateur sport at the University and to promote and control sporting contests between teams representative of the University and other bodies;

(d) to exercise a general supervision and control over all student associations within the University

versity;

(e) to provide and or conduct or manage refectories, restaurants, hostels, boarding houses, halls, clubrooms and other like institutions;

(f) to purchase, take on lease or in exchange, hire or otherwise acquire any real or personal property and to sell, let, mortgage or dispose of the same;

(g) to borrow or raise or secure the payment of money for any of the purposes of the Guild from time to time and in particular by mortgaging or charging the property of the Guild or any part thereof:

(h) generally to further the common interest of students at the University;

(i) such other objects as the Guild shall by regulation adopt.

Section 7, subsection (c), paragraph (ii) to be amended to read:—

(ii) on behalf of any University Society affiliated to the Guild, to enter into contracts the terms of which have been duly approved by the Guild Council,

and for the purpose of carrying into effect decisions of the Guild Council (but not for any other purpose) to acquire and dispose of property provided that in the case of any contract the aggregate liability under which exceeds the sum of £40 and in the case of the disposal of property the aggregate value of which exceeds the sum of £40 for purposes other than those necessary for the normal conduct of the Hostel and Refectory the Guild Council Committee shall not exercise such authority without reference to the Vice-Chancellor who shall have power to suspend the proposed exercise of authority pending the decision of the Senate thereon and provided further that no action taken by the Guild Finance Committee in the exercise of any of the powers hereby conferred upon it shall be deemed to have imposed any legal obligation upon the Senate or the University.

When a proposal to enter into a contract involving a liability exceeding £40 or to dispose of property exceeding the same amount is referred to the Vice-Chancellor it shall be accompanied by a statement showing the full amount of outstanding obligations already incurred by the Guild or by the Guild Finance Committee on its behalf.

The Common Seal of the University of Western Australia has been affixed in pursuance of an order of the Senate by the undersigned being legally entitled to the custody thereof as the Chancellor of the said body Corporate.

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IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 15 of 1945

Between Western Australian Police Union of Workers, Applicant, and The Hon. Minister for Police, Respondent.

WHEREAS an Industrial Dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective

representatives and requested the Court to make the said agreement an Award of the Court: Now therefore the Court pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court;—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(NOTE.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Term.

This Award shall operate for a period of three (3) years form the date hereof.

2.—Area and Scope.

This Award shall apply to all members of the Western Australian Police Force and shall operate over the whole State.

3.—Definitions.

The definitions referred to hereunder shall apply only for the purpose of this Award, and shall not be taken to conflict in any manner whatsoever with the law and regulations and general orders dealing with the control and management of the Police Force of Western Australia. Provided that such regulations and general orders shall not be in conflict with any of the provisions of this Award.

- "Centre" means any station from which continuous duty is performed but does not include the Criminal Investigation Branch or the Training School.
- "Detective" means any inspector, 1st class sergeant, 2nd class sergeant, 3rd class sergeant or constable, who has been appointed a detective, and who is attached to the Criminal Investigation Branch of the Police Department in any part of the State.
- "Employee" means any person permanently appointed to the Western Australian Police Force and includes, except where the context otherwise shows, any commissioned officer, sergeant, detective sergeant, constable, detective constable, probationary detective, or police woman.
- "Plain clothes Constable" means a sergeant or constable performing police duties in plain clothes for seven consecutive days or over and who does not wear uniform while so employed.
- "Plain Clothes Duty" means duty carried out in plain clothes for seven consecutive days or more by members of the Force specially selected for the purpose of making inquiries or performing special duties as may be required, but shall not include the Enquiry Staff attached to the District Office or Central Station, Perth, members of the Force temporarily performing in plain clothes ordinary patrol duties of the same nature as are carried out by uniform constables on beat duty, or wireless patrol, or motor drivers.
- "Practicable" means practicable in the fair and reasonable opinion of the Commissioner of Police: Provided that if any dispute shall arise as to whether in any case such opinion is fair and reasonable, the matter in dispute shall be referred for determination to the Board of Reference.
- "Probationary Constable" means a person not permanently appointed but undergoing instruction and proving his or her suitability for permanent employment as probationary period not to exceed six months.

- "Probationary Detective" means a member of the Force attached to the C.I.B. on probation for a period of 12 months, and at the end of that period if reported on favourably he shall be designated detective constable. If not reported on favourably at the end of that period he shall revert to the uniform ranks at the discretion of the Commissioner.
- "Married Man" includes a single man who has a parent or child solely dependent on him and resident in the State of Western Australia, but does not include a married man whose wife and family are neither resident with nor dependent upon him.
- "North-West" means all that part of the State North of the 26th parallel of latitude.

(d) The rates prescribed in subclauses (a) (b) and (c) hereof are based on the basic wage for the Metropolitan Area in force as at the date of this Award. For the purpose of ascertaining the rates applicable in any other area of the State, there shall be added to or subtracted from the rates so prescribed the difference between the basic wage for the Metropolitan Area and the other area for which the calculation is made.

5.-Higher Duties.

Any employee called upon to perform work carrying a higher minimum than his regular pay for a period exceeding 28 days (continuous or broken) within any one financial year shall be paid such higher minimum for the whole time that he is acting in the higher position.

6 .- Lodging Allowances.

The following lodging allowances shall be payable where quarters are not provided:

7.—District Allowances.

District allowances shall be paid in accordance with the scale in force in the Public Service of Western Australia.

8.—Risk of Infection.

Employees engaged in escorting persons suffering from leprosy shall be paid a special allowance of 10s. per diem or part thereof whilst actually engaged in escorting such persons.

9.—Travelling Allowances.

- (a) The State shall, for the purpose of computing travelling allowances to members of the Force be divided into two divisions, to be known as No. 1 and No. 2 Divisions, the boundary being as at present accepted and acted upon.
- (b) When absent overnight on duty from the Home Station or travelling, except by boat, the following allowances shall be payable:—

(d) The recognised meal hours shall be-Breakfast: 7 a.m. to 9 a.m.

- (e) Whilst on duty outside the State employees shall be paid an allowance equal to the scale paid for No. 2 Division.
- (f) Employees when travelling on duty by steamer or boat shall be paid an allowance computed at the rate of 15 per cent. of the fare paid by the Department or in the case of plane 5 per cent. On rail journeys when the cost of meals is included in the cost of rail ticket 15 per cent. of the fare shall be paid.
- (g) Any employee performing more than two hours' overtime duty after 11 p.m. shall be paid a meal allowance.
- (h) Subject to regulation, members of the Force travelling on patrol or other duty in the Western, Roebourne, Kimberley or other districts where means of transport and/or provisions are provided free by the Department, will not be entitled to travelling allowance if in receipt of district allowance. This will not apply to district officers or constables attending them when travelling in the districts named.
- (i) At any police station where a police officer is required to place a motor car at the disposal of the Department for the performance of his normal police duties, and who is authorised to receive a monthly hire allowance shall be paid in accordance with the scale and condition set out hereunder:

District No. 1-Within the South-West Land Division.

- (a) The sum of £4 shall be paid for each calendar month and such sum shall be regarded as full payment for all mileage up to an aggregate of 1,560 miles (an average of 130 miles per month) during any 12 con-Police Officer is transferred to another station where a Police Officer is transferred to another station where he is not required to use his own car for police duty and does not therefore complete the twelve months, or where for any other reason a police officer does not complete the twelve months he shall be paid for any wilescent of the twelve months he shall be paid for the twelve months he shall be p any mileage in excess of an average mileage of 130 miles per month.
- (b) For every mile in excess of an aggregate of 1,560 miles and up to an aggregate of 3,000 miles (an average of 250 miles per mouth) in any 12 consecutive calendar months, 6d. per mile shall be paid in addition to the sum of £4 prescribed in section (a).
- (c) For all mileage, in excess of an aggregate of 3,000 miles in any 12 consecutive calendar months. 5d. per mile shall be paid in addition to the sum of £4 prescribed in section (a), and the excess mileage payments prescribed in section (b).

District No. 2-All territory outside the South-West Land Division and within the 26 parallel of latitude.

- (a) The sum of £4 shall be paid for each calendar month, and such sum shall be regarded as full payment for all mileage up to an aggregate of 1,560 miles (an average of 130 miles per month) during any 12 consecutive calendar months. Provided that where a police officer is transferred to another station where he is not required to use his own car for police duty, and does not therefore complete the twelve months, or where for any other reason a police officer does not complete the twelve months he shall be paid for any mileage in excess of an average mileage of 130 miles per month.
- (b) Every mile in excess of an aggregate of 1,560 niles and up to an aggregate of 3,000 miles (an average of 250 miles per month) in any 12 consecutive calendar months, 7d. per mile shall be paid in addition to the sum of £4 prescribed in section (a).

(c) For all mileage in excess of an aggregate of 3,000 miles in any 12 consecutive calendar months, 6d. per mile shall be paid in addition to the sum of £4 prescribed in section (a) and the excess mileage payments prescribed in section (b).

District No. 3-All Territory North of the 26th degree

Parallel of Latitude.
The Commissioner shall make satisfactory mutual arrangements to recompense employees for motor car running within this territory but in no ease shall the payment be less than that set out under District No. 2 above.

(k) Accounts for travelling allowances shall be paid where practicable within seven days of receipt at Head or District Office.

10.-Relief Allowances.

(a) When relieving or on temporary duty at a station or elsewhere, employees shall be paid for the first ten days from time of arrival at the rate as per scale in clause 9.

After ten days from time of arrival until time of departure, married men will be paid the scale as per clause 9, less 25 per cent.

After ten days from time of arrival and for the succeeding eleven days, single men will be paid 1s. 6d. per meal, 1s. 6d. per bed.

- (b) At the expiration of 21 days from time of arrival, single men will be paid only lodging allowance applicable to such employee, and, in the event of it being a station to which a district allowance is payable, such district allowance as is applicable to a single man for such station.
- (e) When relieving or on temporary duty at a station or elsewhere, and required to be absent therefrom on duty (except at the home station) an employee shall be paid the difference between the travelling allowance being paid for the time for such relief or temporary duty and the travelling allowance scale for the district.
- (d) An employee who has his Headquarters in Division No. 1 when relieving in Division No. 2 shall receive the rates applicable to No. 2 District.
- (e) When the actual and necessary expenses incurred by an employee engaged in relieving duties exceed the rates allowed, such allowance as may be deemed fair and reasonable shall be granted by the Commissioner.
- (f) An employee stationed at a place where a district allowance is payable doing relieving or temporary duty at a station where a higher district allowance is payable shall draw the difference between the two district allowsnall draw the difference between the two district allowances, in addition to the travelling and relieving allowances payable, and an employee stationed at a place in No. 2 Division which carries no district allowance, doing relieving or temporary duty at a station which carries a district allowance, shall draw in addition to the relief allowance the district allowance at the station where the duties are carried out.
- (g) Any employee relieving at any station where extraneous duties are performed shall, as relieving officer, perform such extraneous duties and shall receive all emoluments attached thereto for the time he is so relieving.
- (h) This clause does not apply to any employee who when relieving or on temporary duty is not required to reside away from his home or home station, or who is able to obtain his meal from his home or home station.

11.—Transfers.

- (a) Employees when travelling on transfer from one station to another shall be paid travelling allowances in accordance with clause 9.
- (b) A married employee, when transferred from one station to another shall, in addition to the said allowance for the other days of the journey, be paid at the same rates from time he must necessarily vacate his dwelling up to the time of his departure (if the same is proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioner) he shall also be paid in respect of the whole day of arrival and the whole day following on the completion of his transfer.
- (c) An employee after three years' continuous service in the North-West shall be transferred therefrom on making application for such transfer. Should any special case arise respecting an employee in the North-West transfer of such employee to the Sonthern Districts shall be dealt with by the Commissioner on its merits.

(d) Employees in receipt of motor car allowance shall, when on transfer to or from a station where the provision of a car to carry out police duties is necessary, and who transport themselves and families by car be paid a mileage rate of 6d. per mile.

ADDITIONAL ALLOWANCES.

12.—Inspectors attached to C.I.B. Detective Sergeants, and Detective Constables.

Inspectors attached to C.I.B., detective sergeants, and detective constables shall be paid an allowance of 3s. per day in excess of the salaries paid to the corresponding grades of commissioned officers, non-commissioned officers, and constables in the general police.

13.-Plain Clothes Duty Allowances.

Probationary detectives and plain clothes constables engaged on plain clothes duty for a period exceeding 21 days shall be paid an allowance of 1s. 6d. per day. will not apply to members of the Force temporarily performing, in plain clothes, ordinary patrol duties of the same nature as are carried out by uniform constables on beat duty.

14.—Clothing Allowance.

(a) Commissioned officers shall receive a uniform and

- boot allowance of £22 12s, per annum.
 (b) Every non-commissioned member of the Detective Force and non-commissioned officer and constable of the general Police Force doing continuous duty for 21 consecutive days or over in plain clothes shall receive an allowance at the rate of £20 per annum during the period so employed, for clothing, boots and mackintosh. vided that such pro rata clothing allowance will be paid to employees engaged on night patrol for 14 consecutive
- (c) Members of the Pillaging Staff shall receive an additional special clothing allowance of £3 10s. per annum.
- (d) Members of the Uniform Police who are supplied with uniform and mackintosh shall receive an allowance of £2 12s. as boot allowance.
- (e) Members serving in the North-West shall receive two tunics, or two shirts, three pairs of trousers and two felt hats éach year.
- (f) Employees engaged as mounted men shall be supplied with leggings and spurs.

15.—Prisoners' Rations.

Where employees are called upon to ration prisoners they shall be allowed 1s. per meal for every meal supplied at all stations except where the contract system is in force, and (for aboriginals) in the Northern Police District.

16 .- Trackers' Allowance.

Where employees are obliged to supply rations to native trackers they shall be paid 4s. per day at all stations, with the exception of Hall's Creek, where the allowance shall be 5s.

17.—Clerks.

(a) Every employee engaged as District Office Clerk shall receive an allowance of 1s. per diem.

(b) Clerk in Liquor Inspection Branch and the Staff Clerk at Head Office shall receive an allowance of 1s. per diem.

18.-Liquor Inspection Branch.

A sergeant or constable qualified to perform liquor inspection duties and primarily engaged on liquor inspection shall receive an allowance of 3s. per diem, plus a clothing allowance of £20 per annum.

19.—Traffic.

(a) There shall be paid to employees permanently engaged in the Traffic Branch and who, on an evening in addition are called out for traffic work, an allowance of 1s. 6d. per diem for constables and 2s. per diem for sergeants, but these allowances shall be paid only whilst the present conditions continue.

(b) The motor vehicle examiner shall receive a special allowance of £25 per annum.

20.—Pointsmen.

Pointsmen shall receive an allowance of 1s. per diem.

21.—Chauffeurs.

Motor driver employees in plain clothes shall receive the recognised clothing allowance, and a special allowance of 1s, per diem shall be paid to chauffeur in charge

22.—Eugineer of Launch.

There shall be paid to the engineer of police launch 1s. 6d. per diem over grade rates, and this allowance shall remain in force whilst the present conditions exist.

23.—Finger Print and Photographer.

24.-Wireless Branch.

The following allowances shall be paid:-Officer in charge £50 per annum employees qualified 1s. per day

25.-Gold Stealing Staff.

Members of the Gold Stealing Staff shall receive an allowance of 2s. per diem.

26.—Prosecuting Sergeant.

Prosecuting sergeants at Perth and Fremantle shall be First Class Sergeants and such sergeant at Perth shall receive a special allowance of 5s, per diem and at Fremantle 2s. 6d. per diem. The assistant prosecuting sergeant at Perth shall receive a special allowance of 2s. 6d. per diem.

27.-Hours.

- (a) The working hours at a centre shall be, for beat and office duty, eight continuous hours per day, but not more than 96 hours per fortnight. Provided that these hours shall apply to police work generally where circumstances permit, but where duties are light and intermittent, such as watch-house or garage duty, mounted duty, orderly work or escort, or any duty for which travelling allowance is paid, they need not be adhered
- (b) The ordinary working hours at a centre shall consist of three shifts or reliefs as follows, and shall as far as practicable, be worked fortnightly in rota-

First relief, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Second relief, 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. Third relief, 11 p.m. to 7 a.m.

At outside towns or at other places, shifts of eight hours, as required according to local conditions, shall be worked. Where two foot-constables are employed in addition to a mounted constable and the officer in charge

of the station, alternate weekly shifts shall be worked.
(c) Each shift or relief shall be allowed 30 minutes for a meal, at a time to be arranged by the non-com-missioned officer, except in the case of men on night duty, who shall be allowed 20 minutes for crib, but such refreshment must be taken on beat.

(d) The ordinary working hours at a place not a centre shall be, as far as practicable, the same as above-

mentioned.

(e) The Commissioner shall give his employee at least one day's notice of all Sunday duty and leave, and at least seven days' clear notice of all annual leave, and there shall be posted in the day room at all police centres a return showing the particulars of such duty and leave; provided that each employee shall be entitled to one day's leave in each seven days, or, alternatively, to two days' leave in every 14 days; also provided that whenever practicable one of such days' leave shall be on a Sunday

(f) Employees due for Sunday leave and having completed their ordinary tour of duty on the previous day may then be granted leave; provided that the circumstances are normal and that they inform their immediate superiors where they may be found if required before they are due for duty.

(g) The ordinary working hours of members of the C.I.B. shall not exceed 96 hours per fortnight, and shall, as far as practicable, be worked as follows:—9 a.m. to 1 p.m., 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.; 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., 7 p.m. to 11 p.m.

On Sundays, one detective shall do duty from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.; one detective from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.; and two detectives from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Office staff hours of the C.I. Branch shall be 8.30 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 5.30 p.m. Other shifts shall be 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m.; 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.; Sunday duty, 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

The hours of work for the night motor patrol shall be as follows:—9 p.m. to 5 a.m. or 10 p.m. to 6 a.m.

- (h) In the case of riots or disturbances or for the preservation of peace, or the protection of human life, or the pursuit of criminals, or for any sufficient reason, the Commissioner or any officer or non-commissioned officer may call upon employees for duty at any hour of the day or night or to remain continuously on duty.
- (i) The Commissioner may suspend the eight hours' provision in this clause when the circumstances, in his discretion, call for such action in the public interest.

28.—Overtime.

- (a) Subject to subclause (g) of clause 27, every member attached to a centre or the C.I.B. or a station, where at least two men are employed on foot patrol or town duty (other than members of the Pillaging Staff) who perform more than 96 hours per fortnight shall be given equivalent time off in lieu thereof as soon as practicable or shall be paid overtime in accordance with the scale contained in subclause (g) hereunder.
- (b) Members of the Pillaging Staff who perform more than 96 hours in any one fortnight shall be paid overtime in accordance with the scale contained in subclause (g) hereunder.
- (c) Any employee who performs escort duty involving a continuous period of 16 hours shall be granted at least 24 hours' leave in lieu of every such period and may, if practicable, be allowed to spend such leave at the city or town nearest the place where he relinquished charge of the prisoners or property escorted. Provided that if he takes his leave where he relinquished charge of the prisoners or property escorted, and he could begin his return to his station before the expiration of such leave, he shall only be paid travelling allowance up to the time at which he would ordinarily return to his station.
- (d) At each centre a record shall be kept showing the amount of overtime worked by each employee working thereat. Such record shall be available at all reasonable times for inspection by any employee concerned, and a copy shall be forwarded to the Chief Office to arrive by midday on the Monday of each alternate fortnight, so that such overtime, if to be paid for, can be included on the fortnightly pay sheet.
- (e) No overtime is to be worked without the permission first obtained of the inspector in charge of the district or branch.
- (f) Work performed as escort or other light duty where travelling allowance is payable shall not be claimed or paid for as overtime but the prevailing practice of time off shall continue.
- (g) The scale of allowance in consideration of duty in excess of 96 hours per fortnight shall be as follows:

Such above rates are based on the basic wage prevailing at the 28th February, 1947, and any variation in such rate shall be taken into consideration in calculating the allowance in question.

29-Annual Leave.

- (a) All employees shall be granted annual leave of 28 days, including four rest days, on full pay during each year of service. Those members of the Police stationed in the North-West and Kimberley Districts and who desire to commence their leave in the South shall not commence such leave until after arrival at Fremantle. Provided that those officers stationed in places where prior to the issue of this Award one calendar month's leave is at present allowed, shall receive 35 days' annual leave, inclusive of five rest days.
- (b) Where any member on leave is recalled to attend at Court or perform other duties for a period of eight hours or part thereof, he shall be paid witness fees where the Court allows them, or be granted one day's leave for each such period.

30-Board of Reference.

- (a) A Board of Reference is hereby appointed for the purpose of this Award. Such Board shall consist of a chairman and two other representatives—one to be nominated by each of the parties, and the chairman to be selected by the representative of the parties if they can agree, otherwise to be nominated by the President of the Court.
- (b) There are assigned to such Board the functions
 - (i) deciding matters specifically referred to in this Award as being the subject matter of a decision of the Board;
 - (ii) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of this Award or any of them;
 - (iii) deciding all matters and questions referred to in the Award as being the subject of mutual agreement between the parties if not agreed upon;
 - (iv) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.
- (c) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, which for this purpose are embodied in and form part of this Award.

31-Fares While Travelling.

- (a) All members of the Force when travelling on duty or on transfer by coastal boat or train (except when actually escorting prisoners) shall be provided with saloon accommodation on boat and first-class accommodation on train. Similar accommodation shall be provided for the wives and families of members on transfer.
- (b) When travelling overnight on trains, first-class sleeping accommodation shall be provided by the Department if available. Provided that when a sleeping berth is provided the bed allowance will not apply.

32-Long Service Leave.

- (a) Commissioned officers shall be granted similar long service leave as enjoyed by members of the Public Service under the Public Service Act, 1904. Other employees will be granted three months' long service leave for each 10 years' continuous service, provided the qualifying period for the third term shall date from the 1st January, 1922. Provided further, however, that as from the 1st January, 1947, all officers who have had seven years' service or over in respect of their third or subsequent term of long service leave shall be entitled to such third or subsequent term as from such date.
- (b) Any employee who resigns or is retired from the Service, except as provided for in subclause (c) shall be paid for long service leave due to him at the time of resignation or retirement.
- (c) Any employee who retires or is retired upon reaching the retiring age, or through ill-health, shall be paid for long service leave *pro rata* to date of retirement.
- (d) If a deceased employee who had served continuously for at least 12 months next before his death leaves a widow, dependent children, mother or invalid sister, payment pro rata of long service leave up to date of such employee's death shall be granted to such dependent or dependents.

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- (e) An employee dismissed or removed from the Service shall not be entitled to payment in respect of long service leave other than for leave that had accrued due to him prior to the date of the offence for which he was dismissed or removed.
- (f) A female employee resigning from the Force for the purpose of getting married, and who has been continuously employed for three years and over, shall be granted payment pro rata of her long service leave at the date of retirement.

33-Drill Instruction or Parades.

Drill instruction or parades shall be given or held during working hours. If an employee is detailed to attend a drill or parade outside the ordinary working hours, he shall be allowed time off equivalent to the time occupied in and travelling to or from such drill or parade.

34-Vacancies to be Advertised.

(a) When any station becomes vacant, or when a vacancy occurs in the plain clothes section of the Uniform Branch, Pillaging Detection Staff, Water Police, Clerks of District Offices, Probationary Section of Criminal Investigation Branch, Traffic Branch, Liquor Inspection Branch, Weights and Measures Branch, Firearus Branch, Aliens Branch, Fingerprint and Wireless Branch, Clerical Section of C.I.B., Enquiry Branch and Staff Clerk at Chief Office, the Commissioner of Police, before filling such vacancy, shall cause a notice to be published in the Police Gazette, inviting applications from employees who are desirous of their claims being considered for such vacancy. Provided that if a vacant station or position is filled by transfer of an employee from another station, the consequential vacancy may be offered to the applicants for the first vacancy.

35-Sanitary and Water Rates.

(a) Water rates shall be borne by the Department where members of the Force are compelled to occupy quarters

(b) Members of the Force shall pay sanitary rates when the sanitary conveniences are solely for the private use of employees and their families, otherwise these shall be paid by the Department.

36-Furnishing of Quarters.

Employees occupying quarters shall be supplied with blinds, fly-proof doors and windows, coppers and troughs or tubs

37-Typewriters.

Employees using their own typewriters in connection with departmental work of any kind shall be supplied by the Commissioner with ribbons for the use of such machines.

38-Torches.

Every man on afternoon or night relief shall be supplied with an efficient electric torch, where practicable.

39-Conditions.

This Award is given without prejudice to any of the conditions and privileges at present existing where not specifically affected by this Award.

40-Posting of Award.

A copy of this Award shall be posted up at each station.
