WESTERN AUSTRALIA, TO WIT. JAMES MITCHELL, Governor. [L.S.]

By His Excellency The Honourable Sir James Mitchell, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Dis-tinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor in and over the State of Western Australia and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS under the provisions of section 10, sub-WHEREAS under the provisions of section 10, sub-section 1, of the Mining Act, 1904-1945, it is enacted that the Governor may by proclamation constitute any lands to be a Goldfield: Now therefore, I, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers so vested in me, and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, with the advice and consent of the Executive Conneil, do hereby proclaim that on and after the date of this proclamation the portion of lands con-tained in the area bounded by lines starting from the North-West corner of the Pilbara Goldfield on the sea coast at the month of the Yule River; thence generally Sontherly along the Western boundary of generally Sontherly along the Western boundary of the Pilbara Goldfield to the North boundary of the Peak Hill Goldfield; thence Westerly along the North

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boundary of the Peak Hill Goldfield to its North-West corner at its junction with the North-Eastern boundary of the Ashburton Goldfield on Turee Creek; thence North-Westerly along the North-Eastern boundary of the Ashburton Goldfield to Trig. Station  $\uparrow$  10; thence about North-West by West along the aforesaid boundary of the Ashburton Goldfield to the summit of Mt. Wall; thence West by North to the summit of Mt. De Courcey; thence due North about 129 miles along the Eastern boundary of the Ashburton Goldfield and in its prolongation to the sea coast; thence generally North-Easterly along the sea coast to the starting point and including all islands off the coast; to be known and called by the name of the West Pilbara Goldfield.

AT a meeting of the Executive Council, held in the Executive Council Chamber, at Perth, this 15th day of September, 1949, the following Order in Council was authorised to be issued:—

Inspection of Machinery Act, 1921-1947.

# ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 82 of the Inspection of Machinery Act, 1921-1947, that the Governor may from time to time by Order in Council make regulations for any of the matters specified in the said section; and whereas the Governor in Council, by Order in Council published in the Government Gazette of the 1st day of July, 1922, made regulations under the said Act which have subsequently from time to time been amended; and whereas it is now deemed desirable and expedient further to amend the said regulations: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, hereby further amends the regulations made under and for the purposes of the said Act and published in the Government Gazette of the 1st day of July, 1922, and amended from time to time thereafter by notices published in the Government Gazette in the manner mentioned in the Schedule hereunder.

#### Schedule.

The abovementioned regulations are amended as follows:--

Winding Engine Driver's Certificate.

Delete regulations 17 and 18 under the above heading and insert in lieu thereof the following as regulations 17 and 18:---

17. An unrestricted winding engine driver's certificate shall entitle the holder to drive and have charge of any winding engine driven by steam, electricity, or other power, and of any engine or boiler to which a first class engine driver's certificate applies.

(1) An applicant for any winding engine driver's certificate must satisfy the Board of his respectability of character, that he can read and write the English language, and that he is conversant with the elementary rules of arithmetic.

(2) An applicant for an unrestricted winding engine driver's certificate shall satisfy the Board that for not less than nine months he has been the holder of either a first or second class engine driver's certificate granted under the Inspection of Machinery Act, 1921, or a certificate which in the opinion of the Board is equivalent thereto, and that during six months of that period he has been actually assisting to drive a steam winding engine under the supervision of a certificate dwinding engine driver; or of the holder of a certificate equivalent thereto issued in this State, for at least 12 hours in each and every week of such period of six months aforesaid.

(3) An applicant for an unrestricted winding engine driver's certificate shall, in addition to the qualifications required by the immediately preceding paragraphs (1) and (2), satisfy the Board that the steam winding engine on which he has practised was a first motion engine fitted with dead weight power operated brakes, and that for not less than a further period of three months and during that period for not less than 12 hours in each and every week, he has been actually assisting to drive under the supervision of a certificated winding engine driver, or of the holder of a certificate equivalent thereto issued in this State, an electric winding engine fitted with dead weight power operated brakes, which was operated by an electric motor of not less than 100 horsepower, and that he has a satisfactory knowledge of the operation of electric winding engines.

(4) An applicant for a restricted winding engine driver's certificate available for steam winding engines, but not available for electric winding engines, shall comply with paragraph (1), and produce satisfactory evidence that he can comply with the provisions of paragraph (2).

(5) An applicant for a restricted winding engine driver's certificate, not available for steam winding engines, but which shall entitle the holder to drive and have charge of an electric winding engine—

- (a) shall comply with paragraph (1);
- (b) shall have been the holder of a first or second class engine driver's certificate for a period of not less than nine months, as required by paragraph (2);
- (c) as an alternative to paragraph (5) (b) above, but subject to the approval of the Board, shall have been the holder of an internal combustion engine driver's certificate for not less than 12 months and shall satisfy the Board that he has been employed as a driver in charge of an internal combustion engine of not less than 200 square inches of cylinder area driving an electric generator of over 100 kilowatts, for a period of not less than six months;
- (d) shall produce satisfactory evidence that during six months of the aforesaid period of nine months or 12 months, as the case may be, he has been actually assisting to drive for not less than 12 hours per week, under the supervision of a certificated winding engine driver or of the holder of a certificate equivalent thereto issued in this State, an electric winding engine

which was driven by an electric motor of not less than 100 horse power, and which was fitted with dead weight power operated brakes, and that he has a satisfactory knowledge of the operation of electric winding engines.

(6) As to the winding engine experience and general good conduct, supported by testimonials signed by his employer or the engineer, and by a certificated winding engine driver under whom the applicant has been practising. The testimonial from the certificated engine driver shall state the number and date of issue of his certificate, and shall be signed and declared by the said engine driver before a Justice of the Peace, or a Commissioner for taking affidavits, to be true and correct in every particular.

(7) That he is at the date of examination not under the age of twenty-two (22) years and not over the age of fifty (50) years.

A candidate over 50 years of age who satisfies the Board that the necessary experience in driving winding engines had been gained prior to attaining the age of 50 years may, at the discretion of the Board, be considered eligible for examination. Should any doubt exist as to the applicant's age, he will be required to produce a certificate of birth or baptism.

18. The applicant for an unrestricted certificate must pass a creditable examination as to the construction of winding engines and various stationary steam engines, condensers, electric motors and generators, and boilers in general use; the details of different working parts, external and internal; to be able to explain how to detect defects, and what action is necessary in the ordinary emergencies which may arise in connection with winding and steam engines, etc., and be able to work out certain elementary arithmetical questions.

(a) The applicant for a certificate restricted to a winding engine driven by an electric motor must pass

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(b) The applicant for a certificate restricted to a winding engine driven by an internal combustion engine must pass a creditable examination on the construction of winding engines generally and the construction of internal combustion engines and air compressors, and be able to work out certain elementary arithmetical questions.

#### INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT. No. 21 of 1949. (Registered 1/7/49.)

THIS Agreement made this 18th day of March, One Thousand nine hundred and forty-nine (1949), be-tween the West Australian Branch of the Aus-Union Meat Industry Employees' Union Industrial Union of Workers, Perth (hereinafter called "the Union") of the one part, and Broome Freezing and Chilling Works (hereinafter called the "Management") of the other part, witnesseth that, for the considerations hereinafter appearing, the parties hereto nutually covenant and agree the one with the other as follows:-

1. This Agreement shall apply in respect of the rates of wages and conditions of labour in connection with the tasks hereinafter mentioned at the Broome Meatworks for the 1949 season, for twelve months from the abovementioned date.

#### Definitions.

2. In this Agreement, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the meanings re-

(a) "Weck-days"—Mondays, Tuesdays, Weducsdays, Thursdays, and Fridays.
(b) "A weck" shall mean Monday to Friday in-

(c) At heat some second seco

by separate relays of employees. (c) "Mutually agreed" or "mutual arrangement" implies agreed between the Management of the Works and the Union or its representatives, in writing.

#### General Conditions.

3. Clauses under this heading are to be operative except where otherwise provided herein.

Any worker carrying out work classified at a higher rate than the rate pertaining to his recognised task shall be paid for that day at the highest rate of such tasks.

5. Wages shall be paid weekly in cash on Friday afternoon at "smoko."6. The Management shall give the delegate reason-

able notice of workers required to work overtime. The delegate shall be then responsible on behalf of the Union for supplying such workers. Overtime shall be distributed on a roster system, but any employee shall have the right to forego his place on the roster except for work in his own department, if required by the Management for work in that department. In all cases of overtime sufficient men for the job required must be supplied.

7. The employment and rates of pay of boys shall be a matter of mutual agreement.

8. Employees shall be provided without charge with accommodation in the quarters creeted for that pur-pose, including stretchers, mattress, and pillow.

9. All delegates shall be officially recognised by the Management.

10. Shifts of eight hours may be worked in departments where operations are continuous or where they require attention for more than twelve hours in the twenty-four.

11. Except as provided in this clause shift workers (other than engine room employees) shall be entitled to the prescribed overtime rates for the work done during Sundays and holidays, anything to the coutrary notwithstanding shift workers shall only be entitled to rate and a half for any time worked in excess of eight hours per shift, but in any case where such excess is caused through sickness, non-arrival, or late arrival of relieving shiftmen or in connection with the change over or rotation of shifts, ordinary rates shall apply.

12. Notwithstanding that the rates of pay are set forth on a weekly basis, there shall be no obligation on the part of the Management or the employees to give a week's or any other notice to determine the since a week of a subject to here to determine the same as if the employee was employed at a daily wage.

# Preference.

13. Preference of employment in respect of tasks for which rates of wages are specified in this Agreement, shall be given to members of the Union who are parties to this Agreement provided they are com-petent workmen for the task for which they are selected and do their work to the satisfaction of the Management.

14. Subject to preference to members of the Unions who are parties to this Agreement, the Management shall have the right-

- (a) to select employees with due regard to their
- qualifications for their respective tasks; to allot to employees their respective tasks; to (b) dispense with the services of any employee for incompetence, drunkenness, misconduct.
- (c) In the event of the work of an employee being unsatisfactory at a task to which he has been transferred the Management shall have the right to place such employee on waiting time in accordance with clause 33

Employees engaged in Perth shall be selected from the lists supplied by the Unions that are parties to this Agreement.

### Transfer.

15. The Management may transfer employees from one department to another. In this case the rates payable shall be those specified for the task performed, subject to clause 4 of General Conditions. In the case of alleged unreasonableness, the local joint delegates can discuss with the Management.

# Minimum of Overtime.

27. Subject to any mutual arrangement, employees called back to work after the meal time following ordinary ceasing time shall be provided with a minimum period of two hours' work, or shall be entitled to payment for such. Employees called out on Sun-days or holidays shall be provided with a minimum period of two hours' work or shall be entitled to payment for such, payment for such minimum periods to be at overtime rates as appearing in clauses 25 . and 28.

# Holidays and Holiday Rates.

28. (a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the 28. (a) Except as hereinarter provided, each of the following days or the days observed in lieu thereof shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely, New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Broome Picnic Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not re-quired to work on such day he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. Work performed on these days and on Sundays shall be paid for at double ordinary rates.

(c) In the case of workers working a five-day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Payment for holidays shall be at the rate pertaining to each employee's task.

(e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave with-(e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave with-out pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, and holidays falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker is on duty or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday, or resumes duty, or is available on the working day immediately follow-ing a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays. (f) A casual worker shall not be entitled to payment for any holiday referred to in this clause

for any holiday referred to in this clause.

# Annual Leave.

29. (a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve months' continuous service with such employer.
(b) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which

in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such day observed as aforesaid.

(c) (i) Subject to para. (ii) when computing the annual leave due under this clause no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that the worker is on annual leave and/or holidays: Provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.

(ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accidents sustained in the course of employ-ment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year he shall be entitled only to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft no claim for annual leave shall be recognised.

Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to

# Hours of Labour.

16. Unless otherwise specifically mentioned, forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work, divided into five (5) working days as follows: Five week days each eight (8) hours = 40 hours. 17. (b) When loading out meal times shall be in accordance with the schedule of the vessel's meal times, but may be given within one hour either before or after such meal times.

(c) This clause shall not apply to engine and boiler room shift workers.

#### Smokos.

21. Except as provided in clause 22 or otherwise mutually agreed, smokos of fifteen minutes each shall mutually agreed, smokos of hiteen minutes each shall be allowed and paid for as working time, as follows: 9 a.m. to 9.15 a.m.; 2 p.m. to 2.15 p.m., and one smoko after every two hours' continuous work done outside ordinary working hours. This clause shall not apply to engine and boiler room shift workers. 22. For employees when loading out the smokos shall unless otherwise mutually agreed, be: 9.30 a.m. to 9.50 a.m.; 2 p.m. to 2.20 p.m.; 7.20 p.m. to 7.50 p.m.; 9.45 p.m. to 10.5 p.m.; 2.15 a.m. to 2.35 a.m.; 4.55 a.m. to 5.15 a.m.

ir respect of his ordinary hours of work. (i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(j) Annual leave rights under this clause shall commence to accrue as from 1st February, 1946. 30. Each employee (excepting those engaged at

Broome) shall be entitled to :-

(a) Passage from place of engagement to Broome and travelling time allowance.
(b) Passage (and travelling time allowance) by first available steamer or plane at discretion of Management from Broome to place of engagement after termination of work in his department, or when his services are not further rerequired by the Management; provided that his duties have been performed to the satisfaction of the Management.

31. Travelling time allowance referred to in clause 30 shall be at the rate of 12s. per day.

Waiting Time Allowances.

32. When no employment is available for an employee at his usual task such employee shall if so required by the Management do any other work available and be paid which ever rate shall be the highest, for the task performed or the worker's recognised usual task.

33. If for any reason no employment is available to an employee, waiting time allowance of half his recog-nised task rate shall be paid for such waiting time, in which case the minimum rate shall not apply to the period of such waiting time.

# INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 17 of 1949. (Registered 4/7/1949.)

THIS Agreement made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941, this 27th day of June, 1949, between the Swan Brewery Company Limited, the Emu Brewery Limited, the Redcastle Brewery Limited, D. Curtis Limited, and the West Australian Glass Manufacturers Limited, and Union Maltings Pro-prietary Limited, all of Perth and Fremantle (herein-after in these presents called "the employers"), of the one part, and the Breweries and Bottle Yards Emone part, and the Breweries and Bottle Yards Em-ployees Industrial Union of Workers, of Western Australia, of Perth, being an industrial union of workers registered under the provisions of the Indus-trial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941 (hereinafter in these presents called "the Union") of the other part; whereby it is mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto that the several stipulations, conditions, and provisions set out herein shall, in all cases, be binding upon and shall be faithfully and promptly binding upon and shall be rainfully and promptly carried out, observed, performed and complied with, according to the true intent and meaning thereof by the parties hereto and it is also hereby mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto that this Agreement shall apply to the whole of the employees embraced in the schedule herein contained. 1.-Interpretation.

For the purpose of this Agreement-

(a) "Casual hand" shall mean any person who is not working hours, 7.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. (b) "Cylinder man" whenever used in this Agree-

(b) "Cylinder man" whenever used in this Agree-ment, shall mean a worker who is generally employed at a majority of the undermentioned occupations, namely, filling, preparing, carbonating, and racking beer from a chilling cylinder, but shall not mean any employee who is casually employed in any one of the last-mentioned processes.

(c) "Bottle-washer" shall mean any person employed (d) "Fireman" shall mean a person employed in a

stokehold attending a steam boiler or gas-producing plant.

(e) "Night cellarmen and night maltsters" shall apply only to cellarmen and maltsters who are em-(f) "Leading hands" are employees who are in

charge of and responsible for the work of others.

#### 2.-Wages Schedule.

The parties to this Agreement mutually agree that the minimum rate of wages that shall be paid by the employers respectively to the persons employed by such employers in the capacities undermentioned is as follows :-

Workers in cold rooms or cellars with a temperature of less than 45 deg. Fal, shall be paid 3s. 3d. per week in addition to the minimum rate.

Maltsters working on night duties shall be paid an allowance of eight shillings (8s.) per week in addition

to the ordinary rate of pay. Boiler cleaning which shall include scraping, cleaning and painting cylinders. For all time which they may be employed at this class of work, workers shall be entitled to be paid at the rate of one shilling (1s.) per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein

for their ordinary classification. Ammonia Coils: For all time which they may be employed chipping, cleaning, scraping, or painting ammonia coils workers shall be entitled to be paid at the rate of one shilling (1s.) per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classifications, and whilst so engaged shall be supplied free with goggles, pullovers and respirators and allowed reasonable time before the end of each shift to cleanse themselves.

Coal Haudling: Workers employed on breaking, crushing, and handling coal in bunkers or bins shall, for all time whilst so engaged be entitled to be paid at the rate of 6d. per hour in addition to the rates prescribed herein for their ordinary classifications.

Boots: The employers agree to supply boots to those workers employed at bottle washing on the tanks, at the tubs at the filters, at the cask-washing shed, and at the bottlers, to be worn during working hours, same to be supplied free of cost by the employers.

Oilers and Aprons: The employers agree to provide oilskin coats and leather aprons for carters, to be used whilst the employer's work is being done only.

#### 3.--Hours.

Forty hours shall constitute an ordinary week's work for all workers. Such hours shall (except as to shift workers) be worked on the following basis:--

(a) All workers other than those mentioned in subclauses (b) and (c) hereunder: Five-day week, Mou-days to Fridays inclusive, 8 hours per day, to be worked within a spread of hours of 7.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. with one hour for lunch.

(b) Stablemen and Firemen: Five-day week, Mondays to Fridays inclusive, 8 hours per day, starting time not before 5.0 a.m. on any day. The employer may require any stableman or fireman to start work at any time after 5 a.m.

(c) Night Cellarmen aud Night Maltsters: Five-day week, Mondays to Fridays inclusive, 8 hours per day, starting time not before 4.30 p.m. nor after 2 a.m. on any ordinary working day.

#### 4.-Shift Work.

(a) Shift work may be done in two or three sets of working shifts not exceeding eight (8) hours each, spread over a period of sixteen (16) or twenty-four (24) hours respectively on the ordinary working days in each week. The first shift of the week will begin on Sunday at 11.30 p.m. and the last shift of the week is to finish at 11.30 p.m. on Friday.
(b) Determine the last done for a being a b

(b) Duty rosters shall be posted on Fridays in each week showing the shifts for the following week's work. Such rosters shall show the starting and finishing times of each worker during each week. Pardisplayed on the roster shall be rigidly adhered to. times Rosters will provide that the first shift on each day will be from 11.30 p.m. to 7.30 a.m., the second shift from 7.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. and, when three shifts are worked, the third shift from 3.30 p.m. to 11.30 p.m. All rostered shifts shall be made to rotate. This subclause may be varied by mutual agreement between any employer and the Union.

(c) A crib time of thirty minutes on each shift shall be allowed to all workers on shift when two or more shifts are worked. Crib time shall be included in the working time.

(d) All rostered shift workers shall be paid an allowance of eight shillings (8s.) per week in addition to their ordinary weekly rate of pay.

(e) Shift workers called on to work shifts without having been previously rostered shall be deemed "casual shift workers" and shall be paid an allowance for the first week only of fifteen shillings (15s.) per week in addition to their ordinary rate of pay.

(f) The additional allowances mentioned in sub-clauses (d) and (e) hereof shall be taken into consideration when calculating overtime rate for any overtime for work done beyond eight (8) hours per day on Mondays to Fridays inclusive. Except as day on Mondays to Fridays inclusive. aforesaid the above allowances shall not be included for purposes of calculating any other penalty rates under this Agreement.

#### 5.—Overtime.

(a) The following overtime shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half: All time worked over eight hours per day on Mondays to Fridays inclusive. All time worked outside the starting and finishing times mentioned in clause 3 (a) and before the starting times of 5 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. mentioned in clauses 3 (b) and 3 (c) respectively. All Saturday work.

6.—Tea Money. Tea money shall be paid at the rate of two shillings (2s.) where notice of overtime is not given at least twenty-four hours previously.

7.—Lunch Intervals. The lunch interval of 60 minutes shall be taken between 12 o'clock noon and 1 p.m. or between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m.

#### 8.-Snioko.

Ten minutes shall be allowed at 10 o'clock a.m. and again at 3 o'clock p.m. This concession, however, does not apply to men working on shifts.

9.—Casual Hands. Casual hands shall be paid by the hour at the rate of ordinary pay plus two shillings (2s.) per day.

# 10.—Record.

Each employer shall keep a record of the name of Each employer shall keep a record of the name of each worker except stablemen, the time he starts and finishes each day, total number of hours worked, overtime worked, and wages paid to each worker, and such record shall be open to the inspection of the secretary of or any other person appointed by the Union during working hours. Each worker shall sign the record kept for all moneys received by him.

#### 11 .- Sundays.

All work performed by workers in any department on Sunday and Easter Saturday shall receive payment for same at the rate of double time. All workers required to work on Sundays shall be allowed one Sunday off per fortnight: Provided that the employer may, in an emergency, require such workers to work on consecutive Sundays.

12.—Holidays. All work performed by workers in any department on the undermentioned holidays shall be paid for on an hourly basis at a rate equal to one and one half (14) times the ordinance performents of the basis.  $(1\frac{1}{2})$  times the ordinary rate of pay per hour with a minimum of four (4) hours' pay and in addition such workers shall be paid one (1) day's pay for the holiday. All holiday shifts shall rotate. One ordinary day's pay shall be paid for the undermentioned holidays to workers who do not work that day.

The days to be observed as holidays according to the provisions of this Agreement are Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Anniversary Day (in January), Annual Picnic Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day (in June), Show Day, and Sovereign's Birthday. In case any of the above holidays falls on a Saturday or a Sunday the following Monday shall be observed in lieu thereof in lieu thereof.

#### 13.—Annual Leave.

Each employee on completion of 12 months' service Each employee on completion of 12 months' service shall be granted three (3) weeks' annual leave, two (2) weeks on double pay, and one (1) week on single pay, such leave to be taken at times to be nutually agreed upon between the workers and the employers. The annual leave shall be in addition to the holidays mentioned in clause 12 hereof.

On termination of service (other than by dismissal for misconduct) of a worker who has been continuously employed for more than three months, he shall receive a pro rata payment in lieu of leave on the basis of two and one-twelfth (2 1/12th) days' pay for each completed month of service.

On termination of service (other than by dismissal for misconduct) of a worker who has been continuously employed for more than one month, but less than three months, he shall receive a pro rata payment in lieu of leave on the basis of one and one-quarter  $(1\frac{1}{4})$ days' pay for each completed month of service.

#### Annual Bonus. 14.-

The employer shall pay each employee receiving wages under this Award, a week's pay by way of bonus in the last week in December in each year. Any employee leaving the employer's service for reasons other than misconduct, dishonesty, or neglect of duty

before the payment of such bonus in any year shall, when leaving, be paid a pro rata payment in lieu thereof; any employee who shall not have been in the employ of the employer for a year in the first week in December shall receive a part of his week's pay bearing the same proportion to a week's pay as the period of his service bears to a year.

15.—Under-Rate Workers. (a) Any worker who by reason of old age or in-firmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the Board of Refer-

ence for determination. (c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for or be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

(d) The provisions of regulation 92 of the regula-tions made under the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1941 shall be deemed to apply to any Board of Reference appointed hereunder.

16.—Engagement. The engagement between employer and worker, except casual hands, shall be weekly, and may be terminated by a week's notice from either party, except in the case of the worker absenting himself without leave, not obeying lawful commands or being guilty of other misconduct, or of the works of the employer being stopped, through fire or tempest, when such engagement may be terminated immediately engagement may be terminated immediately.

17.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker who is unable through sickness. accident to attend his duties, shall notify the em-ployer not later than 10 a.m. on the day he first absents himself from duty.

absents himself from duty. (b) A worker shall be entitled to sick pay in respect of any period of absence on account of sickness after the 1st day of January, 1948, on the basis of one half day's pay for each completed month served with the employer between the said 1st day of January, 1948, and the date of the commencement of such because consider the in collection for another the amount due absence provided that in calculating the amount due to a worker in respect of any particular period of absence through sickness there shall be deducted therefrom any sum or sums previously paid to him hereunder.

(c) The term "sickness" shall not include any case where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(d) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of (d) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof of his sickness satisfactory to the employer. This proof shall be in the form of a medical certificate if the absence is for three days or more. The employer shall have the right at any time to have the worker examined by a doctor on behalf of the employer.
(e) Except as aforesaid, a worker shall not be entitled to payment for time lost through sickness or accident

accident.

#### 18.—Contractors.

All work of any employee in the capacity as mentioned in this Agreement in or about a brewery or bottling works, or in connection with the business of botting works, or in connection with the business of brewing or beer bottling, shall be carried out depart-mentally by bona fide brewery employees engaged and paid direct by the brewery proprietors and not by agents or contractors. This clause shall not apply to contractors erecting, repairing, or making alterations to buildings or machinery or to carriers being engaged for the delivery of goods other than beer as has been the practice or custom prior to this date. But when contractors energy delivering here the brewery contractors are employed delivering beer the brewery company shall undertake to see that whilst employed on such work the contractors pay to both the drivers and offsiders the same wages and work under the same conditions as is provided in this Agreement.

#### 19.—Area.

This Agreement shall apply to the area comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth.

20.—Term. This Agreement shall be for a term of twelve (12) months from the 29th day of November, 1948.

Industrial Agreement No. 9 of 1948 (Registered 16th April, 1948) between the employers and the Globe Brewery Limited of the one part and the Union of the other part is hereby cancelled.

# INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT. b. 20 of 1949. (Registered 8/7/49.) No. 20 of 1949.

THIS Agreement made pursuant to the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1948, of Western Australia, this first day of July, 1949, between the Commissioners of the State Electricity Commission of W.A. (hereinafter referred to as "the Commissioners") of the one part and The State Electricity Commission of W.A. Salaried Officers' Association (Union of Workers) (hereinafter referred to as "the Associa-tion") of the other part witnesseth as follows:—

# 1.—Scope.

This Agreement, which supersedes Agreement No. 23 of 1948, shall apply to all salaried officers in the employ of the Commission with the exception of Shift Engineers, Boiler Control Engineers and Control Room Operators.

#### 2.—Definitions.

For the purposes of this Agreement, unless the contrary intention appears :-

(a) "Metropolitan Area" shall be taken to include all places within a radius of 20 miles from the General Post Office.
(b) "Basic rate" shall mean in the case of :---

- (i) Male or female officers employed in the metropolitan area; the nearest f to the result obtained by multiplying the male or female basic wage respectively for that area as declared from time to time by the Industrial Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, by fifty-two and one-sixth (52 1/6th).
- Male or female officers whose headquarters are in an area for which an independent basic wage is declared; the nearest f to the result obtained

(c) "Service" where used in clauses 28, 31 and 32, in addition to meaning service with the State Electricity Commission shall include—

- (i) That period of continuous service with any Government Undertaking or Government De-partment to the credit of an officer at the date immediately preceding the date he was taken over from the W.A. Government Tramways, Electricity Supply and Ferries by the Commission, or transferred from any Government De-partment and appointed to the staff of the Commission or on loan to the Commission provided that he was taken over, or was transferred and appointed or was on loan prior to the 1st September, 1946, and
- (ii) In the case of the Commission taking over any undertaking including the City of Perth Elec-tricity and Gas Department and absorbing the employees of such undertakings into the Com-employees of such undertakings into the Com-tinue of the such and the complexity of the such as the suc mission's salaried staff, that period of continuous service with the undertaking taken over, which the officer may have to his credit at the date immediately preceding the date he was taken over by the Commission. This provision shall only apply in cases of employees being transferred from an undertaking to the Commission without break in continuity of service.

3.-Classification of Offices and Officers.

(a) The classification of offices and officers employed by the Commission and the fixing of salaries of officers shall be vested in the Commissioners subject to the right of appeal as provided in clause 37 of this Agreement.

(b) In making a classification under this clause the Commissioners shall classify an officer in either the Professional, Clerical or General Section according to the class of work required to be performed and shall adhere to the salary scales provided in this Agreement.

(c) The various marginal allowances referred to in clauses 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11 of this Agreement are those applicable as at 1st July, 1949. These marginal allowances shall be automatically varied to conform to variations in marginal allowances which may be made from time to time in the equivalent salary rates applicable to officers who are employed under the Public Service Act, 1904-1947.

#### 4.—Professional Officers.

(a) The following classes and grades therein shall apply to officers classified in the Professional Section subject to the provisions of clause 5 in respect of Draftswomen :--

(c) In making a classification in Group II, the Commissioners may:-

(i) Amalgamate any two or more classes.

(ii) Fix a limit at the following places :-Within Class 6 at the minimum and intermediate grade; Within Class 5 at the intermediate grade;

Within Class 2 at the intermediate grade.

(iii) Require from the head of the branch a certificate of good conduct, efficiency and ability to perform higher duties before engineers and draftsmen proceed to a rate of pay exceeding a margin of £319 and £195 per annum respectively, over the basic rate.

(d) A draftsman who obtains a diploma of the Perth Technical College for electrical, mechanical or structural engineering, or an equal or higher qualification approved by the Commissioners shall be paid an allowance of £14 per annum whilst in receipt of a rate of pay not exceeding a margin of £237 per annum over the basic rate.

(c) Pending promotion to a vacant position of 1st class draftsman, personal allowance will be paid to a 2nd class draftsman in accordance with the following conditions :-

- (i) If an officer classified 2nd class draftsman, class 6/9 Group 2, has not received promotion to a higher grading after two years on the maximum of his existing classification than a personal allowance may be paid equivalent to the salary increases which would accrue had such officer been promoted to a position of 1st class draftsman.
- (ii) Payment of the allowance will be subject to a certification by the head of the section that if there were a vacancy in the higher grading the there were a vacancy in the higher grading the officer would be recommended for promotion on the grounds of efficiency, good conduct and ability to perform higher duties and the approval of the Commission in each case.
  (iii) On an officer's promotion to a higher position any allowance received by him in accordance with the provisions of this subclause will be converted to salary.

#### 12 .- Persons Temporarily Employed.

Notwithstanding the provisions of clause 1 hereof, a person temporarily employed in a salaried capacity shall be paid at a rate of pay equivalent to the rate that would be payable in accordance with this Agreethat would be payable in accordance with this Agree-ment to a permanent officer of not more than equal efficiency should he or she be engaged on similar duties, provided that in no case shall the provisions of subclauses 4 (d), 5 (c), 5 (d), 7 (c), 9 (c), 9 (d), 10 (c) and 11 (b) and clauses 25, 26, 27, 30 and 37 of this Agreement apply in respect of a person so temporarily employed.

#### 13.—Annual Increments.

Subject to the receipt by the Commissioners of a report from the head of the branch regarding good conduct, diligence and efficiency, officers classified in the classes referred to in subclause 4 (a) of this Agreement shall proceed from the minimum to the maximum of respective classes by annual increments according to the grades in such classes. In the case of all other officers, progression from year to year shall be subject to the submission of a similar report.

# 14.-Hours of Duty.

The hours of duty of officers shall be  $37\frac{1}{2}$  hours per week exclusive of Saturday and Sunday time with the exception of :--

(a) Substation operators whose hours of duty shall be 80 hours per fortnight exclusive of Sunday time; and

(b) Electrical foreman, mechanical foreman, foreman carpenter, district engineers, supervisors (Mid-land Junction and Cottesloe), high tension supervisor and district supervisors, whose hours of duty shall be 40 hours per week exclusive of Saturday and Sunday time; and

(c) Coal foreman whose hours of duty shall be 40 hours per week exclusive of Sunday time.

(d) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to three shift workers.

# 15.—Overtime.

(a) Overtime shall mean all time worked in excess of or outside recognised working hours of the officer and which is worked by direction of the head of the branch, or secretary of the Commission.

(b) Whenever it is possible to do so time off on the basis specified herein for the period worked shall be recommended by the head of the branch in lien of overtime payment. In the event of time off not being granted for overtime worked within 14 days of its performance, payment shall be made forthwith, nuless the officer elects in writing to make such overtime allowance cumulative to his annual leave.

(c) Overtime as provided in subclause (f) hereof shall apply only to officers whose salary does not exceed a margin of £371 per annum over the basic Officers whose salary exceeds a margin of £371 rate. per annum but does not exceed a salary of £865 per annum, shall be allowed equivalent time off, such time off to be cumulative to annual leave.

(d) Officers not working under close supervision or those whose hours of duty are not definitely defined shall not be entitled to claim overtime as provided for in subclause (f) hereof, except as approved by the secretary of the Commission.

(e) (i) Except in the case of a "Call Out," no claim for payment or time off shall be allowed for a period of less than one hour or for less than a quarter of an hour after the first hour: Provided that if the total additional time worked in any week exceeds 21 hours then such periods of less than one hour on any day shall be counted towards the completion of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours in a week.

(ii) Subject to the provisions of sub-clauses (a), (b), (c) and (d) of this clause, an officer called out for duty on any public holiday or between the recog-nised finishing time on one working day and the recognised starting time on the next working day shall be paid a minimum of two hours' pay at overtime rates: Provided that, if he is called out more than once within a period of two hours from the start of a previous call out, he shall not be entitled to any further payment for time worked within that period of two hours.

(f) When overtime is paid for it shall be at the following rates:-Week Days:

For first 5 hours in any week-time and a quarter. For excess of 5 hours in any week-time and a half.

Saturday mornings up to 11.30 a.m. when not part

of the normal hours of duty—time and a half. After 11.30 a.m. on Saturdays until midnight on Sundays—double time.

Public Holidays:

Occurring on a non-working day: Double time for all time worked on a public holiday.

For the purpose of subclause (f) of clause 15 of the Agreement "Salary" shall not include any personal allowance, qualifications allowance, and/or allowance for performing special duties unless otherwise ap-proved by the Commissioners.

Public Holidays:

When occurring on an ordinary working day: Payment for all work performed on a public holiday shall be computed on the basis of ordinary time and shall be paid in addition to the day's pay which the officer would ordinarily receive in respect of such holiday.

The hourly rate for the purpose of these computa-tions shall be calculated at the amount received as at the date of commencement of overtime. Provided that such amount shall not include any personal allow-ance, qualifications allowance, and/or allowance for performing special duties unless otherwise approved by the Commissioners.

(g) When time off is allowed for instead of payment as herein provided the same formula shall apply except as is prescribed in subclause (c) hereof in respect of officers whose salaries exceed a margin of £371 per annum over the basic rate.

(i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to three shift workers.

#### 16.-Meal Allowance.

Where special circumstances necessitate an officer working during or over a meal hour, he shall be paid an allowance of 2s. 6d. per meal, provided he could not conveniently have his meal in the usual way. The meal allowance shall only be paid in addition to overtime when the total overtime worked before and after a meal break exceeds two hours.

#### 17.—Travelling.

(a) The following shall be the scale of allowances payable to officers when travelling:-

- (i) Between their headquarters within the metropolitan area and a place outside the metroolitan area; or
- (ii) between their headquarters outside the metropolitan area and a place within the metropolitan area; or
- (iii) between their headquarters outside the metropolitan area and a place outside the metro
  - politan area:— Up to the first 14 days in one place, officers with a classified salary at the time travelling begins, equivalent to-
  - Officers classified in Group I .. 18/- per day All other officers . . . . . . 15/6 per day After 14 days in one place— Officers classified in Group I . . 14/6 per day .. 15/6 per day
  - .. 13/- per day All other officers ... ..

(b) In the case of officers in charge of field work, and those whose travelling involves the use of both camp and hotel accommodation, a reduction of 20 per cent. shall, unless otherwise approved by the Com-

cent, shall, unless otherwise approved by the Com-missioners be made in the above scale. (c) The daily rate shall represent in equal portions the expenses for three meals and a bed. For the purpose of computing expenses, in the case of arrival at or departure from the town in which the officer's headquarters are located, breakfast shall be allowed for if the arrival is later or departure earlier than 8 a.m., lunch if arrival is later or departure earlier than 1 p.m., tea if arrival is later or departure earlier than

6 p.m., and bed if arrival is later than 11 p.m. (d) When a sleeping berth is provided the bed allowance will not apply, except when a bed has been paid for elsewhere for a portion of the night and a certificate is made to that effect.

(e) When an officer stays at any Government institution for which a charge is not made, one-fourth deduction will be made from the above allowances for each item of expense mentioned in subclause hereof not incurred in any day. (c)

(f) Reasonable incidental expenses, such as tram and bus fares, and where these are non-existent motor fare may be paid, provided in the opinion of the Commissioners the distance warrants it.

(g) If on account of lack of suitable regular transport facilities any officer necessarily engages lodging for the night prior to commencing travelling in order to traved by an early morning train, he shall be paid the allowance for such lodging in addition to the other allowances authorised by this Agreement. (h) First class railway and steamer fares shall be allowed to all officers when travelling on departmental business. Railway sleeping berths shall be provided if available

if available.

(i) When officers travel by steamer or other vessel the fare paid includes subsistence, an allowance equal to 15 per cent. of the passage money, calculated on single fare, shall be paid in lieu of the ordinary travelling allowances.

(j) Officers stationed in Western Australia who travel on official business beyond the limits of the State but within the Commonwealth shall be re-imbursed at the rate of 30/- per day for expenses incurred in capital cities and at the rate of 25/- per day elsewhere; the computation of the rate to be on the basis laid down in subclause (c), provided that:

- (i) for the period when at sea or on rail between Perth and Adelaide at the rate equal to 15% of the passage money calculated on single fare;
- (ii) for the period whilst travelling by aircraft reimbursement shall be at the rate of 15/6 per day for officers classified in Group II and at the rate of 18/- per day for officers classified in Group I;
   (iii) reimbursement of reasonable incidental ways
- (iii) reimbursement of reasonable incidental expenses in accordance with subclause (f) shall apply.

(k) No certifying officer shall pass for payment to any officer, travelling allowance exceeding 14 days in any one month, until the endorsement of the head

of the branch has been obtained on the account. (1) Subclauses (e) to (i) under clause 18 shall also apply to this clause.

# 18 .- Transferred and Relieving Officers.

(a) When an officer is transferred, allowances under (a) when an omcer is transferred, allowances under clause 17, subclause (a), may with the approval of the head of the branch be paid for a period of fourteen days after arrival at the new locality, which shall then be considered the officer's headquarters, and thereafter such allowance shall cease. Should an officer's claim be refused by the head of the branch he may appeal to the Commissioners who shall determine the merits of the claim.

(b) For the purpose of this clause the headquarters of an officer engaged on more than one work shall be considered to be the place in which the principal work is located as defined by the head of the branch, and while at such headquarters the officer shall not be entitled to any travelling allowance.

(c) When an officer is relieving another or is on special work away from his usual headquarters, and in consequence has in addition to his own maintenance to maintain an establishment elsewhere, he shall-

- (i) be reimbursed in respect of his living expenses at the rate of 15/6 per day for a period up to 14 days after arrival at the new locality;
- (ii) if the period at the new locality;
  (iii) if the period at the new locality exceeds 14 days, be reimbursed at the rate of 7/- per day if married and 3/6 per day if single for the period in excess of 14 days, provided that if the latter period exceeds four weeks, the approval of the Commissioners shall be obtained to the continuance of the reimbursement.

An officer who cannot claim to maintain an establishment elsewhere but who is put to expense which otherwise it would not be necessary for him to incur, shall, on satisfactory proof to the Commissioners, be granted an allowance to reimburse such expenses at a sum per day not exceeding the above amount.

(d) Where it is considered advisable to do so an (a) which is considered advisable to do so an officer's headquarters may be changed to a new locality, in which case the allowance under subclause (a) may be granted for a period up to 14 days. In cases where the officer is put to expense on return to his former headquarters the allowance may also be paid up to 14 days.

(e) Officers shall travel by railway or State steamship, unless otherwise directed by the Commissioners.

(f) Whenever an officer does not travel by railway or State steampship as per subclause (e) he shall be repaid the actual cost of the necessary and most economical means of conveyance upon furnishing re-ceipts for such payment. Receipts shall not be required for any amounts under five shillings, but in lieu thereof a certificate on the account form must be made as actually expended by me on official service."

(g) No officer shall engage other vehicles when there are public conveyances available when required.(h) When circumstances necessitate the hire of a motor car, or other special means of transit, a special

report shall accompany the account. (i) Unless specially authorised by the head of the branch, taxi fares will not be allowed when the distance can be traversed by the ordinary modes of conveyance by rail, tram, motor or omnibus.

# 19.—Allowance for Vehicles, etc., Owned by Officers.

(a) The Commissioners may authorise a commuted allowance for the keep, or hire, of horses, traps, motors, bicycles or any other conveyance belonging  $\tilde{x}$ to officers.

(b) Officers who are required to maintain a motor car or motor cycle for travelling on official business, and who are not in receipt of a commuted allowance in which the whole or portion of the cost of locomotion is included, shall, for journeys approved by the head of the branch be paid a mileage allowance to cover all expenses in connection with the car or motor cycle in accordance with the table hereunder :--

(c) The Commissioners may increase the rates prescribed in subclause (b) in any case in which they are satisfied that the rates are inadequate.

#### 20.-Camp Allowance.

(a) Officers while in camp provided by a Government Department shall be paid an allowance of 4s, per day if married and 2s, a day if single.

(b) In special cases the above scale may be increased by the Commissioners.

(c) A single man in camp on satisfactory proof being supplied that he is the main support of those related to him and who resides in the State may, on the certificate of the Commissioners for the purposes of camp allowance, be considered a married man.

(d) A married man with his wife and family in camp for a longer period than one month in any one year shall be paid during such period the allowance for a single man.

(c) A married man whose wife resides outside the State shall be regarded as a single man.

(f) Camp allowance shall not be paid during any period in respect of which travelling expenses were reimbursed in accordance with clause 17 or during any period for which expenses were reimbursed in accordance with clause 18.

(g) The Commissioners shall provide camping accommodation where officers are detailed for duty by the Commissioners at a place where no accommodation is available.

#### 21.-Travelling Time.

Officers, who in the course of their duty, are called upon to travel after their usual office hours may, on special occasions and at the discretion of the Commissioners, be granted such time off in respect of such time spent in travelling as is authorised by the secretary of the Commission.

#### 22.-Higher Duties Allowauce.

(a) An officer, other than one classified as a relieving officer, who is performing the duties of a position higher than that in which he himself is classified shall be paid higher duties allowance on the following basis:—

- (i) When acting in a higher position for a continuous period exceeding three weeks, the minimum of which exceeds his own margin over the basic rate, the minimum of such position for the whole time he is acting.
- (ii) When acting in a higher position for a continuous period exceeding three weeks, the minimum of which does not exceed his own margin over the basic rate, at the rate such officer would be receiving had he been permanently appointed to such higher position for the whole time he is acting:

Provided (i) that an allowance under this clause shall not be payable to a male or female officer classified as a junior or to a female officer classified as a junior or to a female officer when acting in a male position classified within the male clerical automatic range.

(ii) That a female officer acting in a male position classified above the male clerical automatic range shall be granted higher duties allowance on the basis of the female basic rate plus the male margin relative to the position in which she is acting.

(b) Where an officer classified as a relieving officer acts or relieves in a position one class higher than his own for a continuous period exceeding one month in the same position, then higher duties allowance on the basis set out in subclause (a) shall be paid for the period in excess of one month; where a relieving officer acts or relieves in a position classified two or more classes higher than his own then the full provisions of subclause (a) shall apply.

(c) An officer acting in a higher position shall be entitled to receive an increased allowance equivalent to the annual increments he would have received had he been permanently appointed to such higher position for the whole time he is acting, provided that in the case of a relieving officer acting or relieving in a position one class higher than his own, the first month of service in the higher position shall not be taken into account.

(d) An allowance granted under this clause shall continue to be paid during periods of annual leave and sick leave not exceeding three weeks, provided that the officer had qualified for payment of the allowance by serving the required continuous period before taking such leave, and further that he resumes after such leave in the position in respect of which he was paid higher duties allowance. No payment of higher duties allowance shall be made for any period of long service leave or for any part of a period of annual leave or sick leave exceeding three weeks.

(c) Where an officer is required to act in a position lower than that in which he himself is classified, his salary shall not be reduced for the period during which he is so employed.

#### 23.-Dirty Work.

A special allowance shall be paid to an officer when engaged in any dirty work (including moving or sorting old books and documents), which is not part of the usual duty of the officer concerned, and which, in the opinion of the head of the branch, could be classed as dirty work; such allowance to be assessed by the Commissioners.

#### 24.-Officers Paying Wages.

(a) An officer away from his headquarters, other than one whose classified duties include the payment of wages, shall when paying wages outside the metropolitan area, or at construction works within the metropolitan area or at such other works as may be approved by the Commissioners be paid an allowance of 5s. per day or part of any day whilst so engaged in recognition of the added responsibilities provided that—

- (i) The allowance shall not exceed 10s. in any one week.
- (ii) No allowance shall be paid to an officer when in receipt of higher duties allowance for relieving or acting in a position, the classified duties of which include the payment of wages.
- (iii) No allowance shall be paid to an officer whose margin over the basic rate exceeds the maximum margin prescribed for Class 7 by clause 4, subclause (a) of the Agreement dated the 18th April, 1948, between the same parties hereto and any amendments thereto or any new Agreement made in substitution thereof.

(b) An officer employed in the metropolitan area when paying wages outside that area, shall be paid an allowance of 5s, per day or part of any day whilst so engaged in compensation for damage to clothing and disabilities encountered in addition to any allowance payable in accordance with subclause (a).

#### 25.—Qualifications Allowances—Clerical.

(i) A male adult clerical officer who obtains a Diploma of Commerce at the University of W.A., or passes the final examinations of a recognised Institute of Accountants or Secretaries or Cost Accountants, or passes in five units (including English I) of a degree

course in Arts, Science or Law at the University of W.A. or obtains an equal qualification approved by the Commissioners, shall be paid, whilst in receipt of a rate of pay not exceeding a margin of £237 per annum, an allowance equivalent to the difference between his rate of pay and the next higher grade in the incremental scale.

(ii) An allowance granted under the provisions of subclause (i) hereof shall date from the 1st day of the month following the date of the examination from which the officer obtained the prescribed qualification.

#### 26.-Qualification Allowances-Professional.

(i) A draftsman who passes the Associate membership examination of the Institution of Engineers, Australia, or who obtains an equal qualification approved by the Commissioners, shall be paid an allowance equivalent to the difference between his rate of pay and the second higher grade in the incremental scale, whilst he is in receipt of a rate of pay not exceeding a margin of  $\pounds 265$  per annum. Whilst in receipt of a rate of pay exceeding a margin of  $\pounds 265$ per annum but not exceeding a margin of  $\pounds 275$  per annum, he shall be paid an allowance equivalent to the difference between his rate of pay and the next higher grade in the incremental scale.

(ii) An officer who qualifies for one of the abovementioned allowances must make application for same and submit evidence of having obtained the qualification to the Secretary of the Commission.

(iii) An allowance granted under the provisions of subclause (i) hereof shall date from the 1st day of the month following the date of the examination from which the officer obtained the prescribed qualification.

#### 27.-Married Men's Allowance.

An officer in the clerical section who is a married man or who is the support of those related to him, on the approval of the Commissioners, shall be entitled to an allowance equivalent to the next higher grade than the rate of pay according to age, with a maximum margin of £125 per annum over the basic rate. This allowance shall not be treated as part of salary when determining a recipient's seniority position as a member of the staff.

#### 28.-Annual Leave on Holidays.

(a) The following days shall be observed as paid holidays: New Year's Day, Anniversary Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Foundation Day, Labour Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Show Day and other days which may be proclaimed as public service holidays.

(b) A period of two weeks' annual leave with pay shall be granted annually to an officer after a period of twelve months' continuous service.

(c) Annual leave shall be calculated at the close of each financial year and shall be paid for at the salary the officer is in receipt of immediately prior to the time such annual leave is taken.

(d) Annual leave is to be applied for and shall be taken out at a time convenient to the Commissioners not later than the 30th June following the year for which it falls due unless such leave is deferred by the Commissioners or the approval of the Commissioners has been obtained for its accumulation.

(c) Should any of the holidays referred to in subclause (a) hereof occur during the period an officer is on annual leave, a day in licu of any holidays shall be added to the period of annual leave.

(f) An officer with more than six months' service who may resign from the service, shall be entitled to receive payment for pro rata annual leave to the date of resignation from the service.

(g) The next of kin of a deceased officer shall be granted payment for pro rata annual leave to the date of the decease of the officer.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to three shift workers.

# 29.-Leave Without Pay.

(a) On the application of any officer the Commissioners may grant to him leave of absence without pay for any period not exceeding twelve months. (b) The period during which any officer is absent on leave granted pursuant to subclause (a) hereof shall not for any purpose be included as part of such officer's period of service.

#### 30.-Short Leave.

(a) The head of the branch may on sufficient cause being shown grant an officer leave of absence not exceeding two days but all such periods of leave shall be properly recorded and at the discrction of the head of the branch shall or shall not be deducted from the officer's next annual leave or accumulated leave.

(b) Provided that if the leave granted under subclause (a)-hereof exceeds three days in any one year the excess shall be deducted from the officer's next annual leave.

#### 31.-Long Service Leave.

(a) An officer who has completed seven years' continuous service in a permanent capacity or ten years' continuous service in a temporary capacity, or eight and one half years' continuous service, of which not less than eighteen months shall have been served in a temporary capacity or as a member of the wages staff and the balance in a permanent capacity, shall be entitled to three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.

(b) For each subsequent period of seven years continuous service in a permanent capacity, an officer shall be entitled to an additional three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.

(c) The provisions of subclauses (a) and (b) hereof shall, subject to the provisions of clause 31 (c) of Industrial Agreement, No. 23 of 1948, have effect as from the 1st July, 1946, for all officers with the exception of officers who were taken over from the City of Perth Electricity and Gas Department.

In the case of an officer who was taken over from the City of Perth Electricity and Gas Department on the 20th December, 1948, and who was qualifying under that Department's conditions for two months' long service leave after completing fifteen years continuous scrvice, he shall, before becoming due for long service leave, be required to serve a qualifying period with the Commission which on the basis set out in subclause (a) hereof, would entitle him to a period of long service leave which when added to the pro rata long service leave which when added to the pro rata long service leave. When such period of continuous service shall have been served the officer shall be entitled to three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay. For each subsequent period of seven years' continuous service in a permanent capacity such officer shall be entitled to an additional three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.

(d) Continuous service shall not include the period during which an officer is on long service leave, or any period exceeding two weeks an officer is absent on leave without pay or any service an officer may have had before reaching the age of eighteen years.

(e) An officer who resigns (except a female officer who resigns because of marriage or approaching marriage) or is dismissed, shall not be entitled to long service leave or payment for long service leave other than that leave that had actually accrued to him prior to the date on which he resigned or the date of the offence for which he is dismissed.

(f) Any public holidays occurring during the period in which an officer is on long service leave will be treated as part of the long service leave and extra days in lieu thereof shall not be granted.

(g) Long service leave shall be taken as it falls due at the convenience of the Commission but the Commissioners may approve the accumulation of long service leave not exceeding six (6) months in all in any particular case, provided that in the case of an officer who, on the 5th March, 1948, had accumulated or within five years of such date shall accumulate at least six months' long service leave on full pay the Commissioners may approve the accumulation of his long service leave entitlement (inclusive of the long service leave already accumulated) up to a maximum of 12 months. (h) A hunp sum payment for long service leave accrued in accordance with this clause and for pro rara long service leave shall be made in the following cases:—

- (i) To an officer who retires at or over the age of sixty years or who is retired on the grounds of ill-health, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the officer has completed not less than twelve months' continuous service.
- (ii) To a female officer who resigns on marriage or approaching marriage, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the officer had completed not less than three years' continuous service before the date on which her resignation becomes effective and provided further that she produces her marriage certificate before any payment is made.
- (iii) To an officer who is retired for any other cause, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the officer had completed not less than three years' continuous service before the date of his retirement.
- (iv) To the widow of an officer or to such other person as may be approved by the Commissioners in the event of the death of an officer, provided that no payment shall be made for prorata long service leave unless the officer had completed not less than twelve months' continuous service prior to the date of his death.

(i) The calculation of the amount due for long service leave accrued and for pro rata long service leave shall be made at the rate of salary of an officer at the date of retirement, resignation or death whichever applies and no such payment shall exceed the equivalent of twelve months' salary.

#### 32.—Sick Leave.

(a) An officer who is incapacitated for duty in consequence of illness or injury shall, as soon as possible, advise his superior officer in sufficient time to admit of arrangements being made for the performance of his duties. Any such officer who fails to do so shall be treated as absent without leave.

(b) An officer so incapacitated for duty shall also notify his superior officer in sufficient time of the date on which he will resume duty, to enable any necessary arrangements to be made.

(c) Should the absence be prolonged beyond two days, the officer shall forward to his superior officer as soon as possible thereafter, a certificate from any legally qualified medical practitioner, showing the nature of the illness and the probable duration.

(d) An officer who finds that he is unable to resume duty on the expiration of the period shown on the first certificate shall therenpon furnish a further certificate, and shall continue to do so upon the expiration of the period respectively covered by such certificates: Provided, however, that the maximum period between the dates of furnishing any two medical certificates shall be fourteen days.

(c) Any officer shall, if so directed, present himself for examination by a medical officer at such time and place as may be fixed. All expenses incurred by the officer undergoing such examination may be paid by the Commission.

(f) An officer employed in a permanent capacity who has conformed to the foregoing shall be granted sick leave (exclusive of annual and long service leave) on the following basis:—

- Under three years' service—one month on full pay, four months on half pay, and nine months on third pay.
- Over three years' service—three months on full pay, cight months on half pay and three months on third pay.

(g) Sick leave as above may be granted in one or more periods but the aggregate amount of leave on full, half and third pay should not exceed fourteen months in any one triennial period. A triennial period to be the three years preceding the date of the application under consideration.

(h) In exceptional cases such as where an officer in discharge of his duties sustains injuries of a nature as to incapacitate him for all duty the scale set out in subclause (f) hereof may be varied by the Commissioners to allow a greater period of sick leave on full pay.

(i) An officer employed in a temporary capacity may on production of an adequate medical certificate be granted sick leave as follows:—

- Continuous service not exceeding six months-three working days on full pay.
- Exceeding six months but not exceeding eighteen months-ten working days on full pay.
- Exceeding eighteen months but not exceeding three years—ten working days on full pay and ten working days on half pay.
- Exceeding three years and for each triennial period after the expiration of the first three years—one month on ful pay.

(j) An officer whose permanent appointment to the staff of the Commission is subject to a period of probationary service shall for the purposes of this clause be regarded as being employed in a temporary capacity during his period of probationary service.

(k) Indisposition not necessitating confinement to the house shall not be regarded as illness in respect of which leave of absence may be granted under this clause excepting under special circumstances as may be approved by the Commissioners.

(1) Sick leave shall not be granted in respect of any absence due to an officer's own fault, neglect or misconduct.

(m) Where an officer is absent as the result of injuries sustained in the discharge of his duties and is paid compensation in accordance with the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act, half the period of absence shall be debited against sick leave entitlements.

#### 33.—Promotions.

(a) All promotions shall be subject to the provisions of the Government Employees (Promotions Appeal Board) Act.

(b) The selection of officers for promotion or to act in a position of higher classification shall be governed by relative ability, suitability, record and experience. If everything else is deemed equal, the senior officer shall be selected.

(c) Where the Commissioners consider it necessary in the interests of the Commission, a person from outside the service may be appointed to any position: Provided there is no officer in the service considered capable of filling such position.

(d) An officer promoted to a higher position shall serve a probationary period of six months. At the end of such period the head of the branch shall report to the Commissioners as to the fitness of the officer to fill the higher position. If the report is satisfactory the appointment shall be confirmed as from the date of taking up the duties, if unsatisfactory, the officer shall be provided for at the salary he was in receipt of prior to promotion to the higher position.

(e) Subject to the provisions of subclause (d) hereof, an officer promoted to a higher position shall be paid the minimum rate of salary prescribed for that position, provided that an officer who has been in receipt of a salary equivalent to such minimum rate for twelve months or over shall be paid on the basis of the next higher grade. If in receipt of such minimum salary for a period of less than twelve months then advancement to the next higher grade shall be made twelve months from the date the officer first received the salary equivalent to the minimum of his new position.

(f) All vacancies and new positions shall be notified to the staff by a notice exhibited on the salaried staff notice board in the head office and all depots where salaried officers arc employed for at least seven days prior to filling of such vacancies or new positions.

(g) The Association shall be notified of all promotions and new appointments within fourteen days of such promotions and new appointments.

# 34.-Resignations and Retirements.

Unless the Commissioners approve otherwise no officer employed in a permanent capacity shall leave the service until the expiration of one month's written notice of his intention to do so. One month's written notice of termination of engagement shall be given by the Commissioners to any such officer whose services are no longer required.

# 35 .-- Payment of Salaries.

(a) Salaries shall be paid fortnightly on each alternate Friday except where the usual pay day falls on a public holiday when payment shall be made on the previous Thursday.

(b) For an officer working a five-day week a day's salary shall be calculated as one two hundred and sixty-first of the annual salary rate; in the case of other officers as one three hundred and thirteenth of the annual salary rate.

(c) A fortnight's salary shall be computed by dividing the annual salary rate by two hundred and sixty-one and multiplying the result by ten or by three hundred and thirteen and multiplying the result by twelve as the case may require.

(d) The hourly rate of pay shall be calculated as one seventy-fifth of a fortnight's salary for those officers working a thirty-seven and a half hour week and one eightieth of a fortnight's salary for those officers working a forty hour week.

#### 36.—Channel of Communication.

The Association shall be recognised as the channel of communication within the ambit of this Agreement between the staff of the Commission and the Commissioners, and no complaint or other communication from any other organised body will be received.

#### 37.-Rights of Appeal.

(a) An Appeal Board consisting of a chairman, mutually agreed between the parties to this Agreement, and two other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties, shall be set up, as may be required from time to time, to hear and determine any appeal by a member of the Association against a decision of the Commissioners in respect of :--

- (i) The title, classification, reclassification or salary of such member of the Association;
- (ii) the interpretation or application of the provisions of this Agreement.

(b) The times within which written notice of appeal shall be lodged with the Commissioners shall be as follows:--

- (i) In the case of an appeal in respect of title, classification or reclassification, one month after the publication of such title, classification or reclassification.
- (ii) In the case of an appeal against any other matter, one month after the occurrence of the matter aforesaid.

(c) The decision of the Board shall be final and binding on all parties.

#### 38.-Taking Over of Employees.

The Commission reserves the right to absorb into its salaries staff employees of any undertaking which the Commission may at any time take over.

Should the Union not agree with the classification granted to any such new employee, it shall have the right of appeal to the Appeal Board.

99.—Special Provisions for Three Shift Workers.

(1) The following conditions shall apply to three shift workers only. For the purpose of this clause a "three shift worker" shall mean an officer who is required to work day, afternoon, and night shift on a rotating roster system and who is regularly rostered to work on Sundays, Saturdays and/or public holidays.

(2) Hours of Duty: The normal working hours for officers referred to in this clause shall be eighty (80) per fortnight to be worked in shifts of eight (8) hours each in accordance with a roster as mutually agreed upon.

(3) Overtime: (a) Overtime shall mean time worked in excess of the rostered hours of duty in any day. Overtime shall be paid for as follows:—

- (i) Monday to Friday inclusive, at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.
- (ii) Saturday or Sunday on which the officer is rostered for duty-at the rate of double time.

(iii) Saturday or Sunday on which the officer is brought on for duty when such day is his rostered day off duty—at the rate of time and a half between midnight Friday and 12 noon Saturday and at the rate of double time thereafter until midnight Sunday.

(b) In computing the number of hours worked time absent on sick leave and holidays, when paid for, shall be treated as time worked.

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (a) of this clause, any excess hours worked by an officer that is occasioned by late relief or as a result of arrangements between the officers themselves with the approval of the officer in charge shall not be recognised as overtime.

(d) Double time (that is to say twice the ordinary rate) shall be the maximum rate payable for overtime under any of the provisions of this Agreement.

(4) Saturday Time: (a) The time worked on Saturday up to a maximum of eight (8) hours only shall be included in the week's work, but the extra rate prescribed for Saturday time shall stand alone and be paid for in addition to the week's earnings, at the rate of time and a half.

(b) For the purpose of calculating the hourly rates, the year shall be deemed to consist of two hundred and sixty-one (261) days and the day in each case of the hours of the officer concerned.

(5) Sunday Time: (a) the time worked on Sunday up to a maximum of eight (8) hours shall be included in the week's work, but the extra rate prescribed for Sunday time shall stand alone, and be paid for in addition to the week's earnings at the rate of time and a half.

(b) All time worked by an officer in excess of eight (8) hours in any rostered Sunday shift, or all time worked on a Sunday when such day is the officer's normal rostered day off duty shall be paid for at the rate of double time: Provided that double time (i.e., twice the ordinary rate) shall be the maximum.

(c) For the purpose of calculating the hourly rates the year shall be deemed to consist of two hundred and sixty-one (261) days, and a day in each case of the hours of the officer concerned.

(6) Holidays: (a) (i) After twelve months' continuous service all officers shall be granted three (3) consecutive weeks' annual leave on full pay, in addition to public holidays as gazetted by the West Australian Government.

(ii) Any officer required to work on any of the public holidays referred to in sub-paragraph (i) hereof shall be paid for the time so worked as if it was an ordinary working day, and shall in addition be allowed a day's leave, with pay, to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date if the worker so agrees.

(b) Annual leave shall be calculated at the close of each financial year, and shall be paid for at the salary the officer is in receipt of immediately prior to the time such leave is taken, but an officer occupying a higher position temporarily shall only be entitled to the higher rate whilst on annual leave, providing such officer resumes in the same or any higher position.

(c) Annual leave is to be applied for and shall be taken at a time convenient to the Commission, not later than the thirtieth of June following the year for which it falls due. At the expiration of that time the leave shall lapse, unless such leave is deferred by the Commission or the approval of the Commission has been obtained for its accumulation.

Each application for leave to accumulate must be supported by good and sufficient reason, and the granting of such shall be subject to the recommendation of the Officer in Charge and to the approval of the Commission.

(d) Should any of the public holidays referred to in subclause (a) (i) hereof occur during a period an officer is on annual leave a day in lieu of any such holiday may be added to the period of leave or taken at some future time if the Commission so approves.

(e) An officer who may resign from the service or whose services have been dispensed with shall be entitled to receive payment for pro rata annual leave

to the date of leaving the service : Provided any officer who for drunkenness, peculation, or any such irregu-larity has been dismissed shall forfeit all claim to annual leave.

40.-Term of Agreement.

This Agreement shall be for a term of three years commencing from the 1st July, 1949.

Provided that either party to this Agreement may at any time after the 1st July, 1949, negotiate with the other party to amend or add to this Agreement, and if both parties agree, such Agreement may be amended by a supplementary Agreement which shall be concurrent with this Agreement.

# Definitions and Interpretation.

3.

 In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
 "distributor" means a proprietor of a garage, service station or person engaged in his own usual trade and business of selling, distributing or dealing in tyres and tubes;

"'tyres'' means tyres intended for use, or capable of being used in con-nection with motor vehicles and "tubes" has a similar meaning; "motor vehicles" means motor or automotive vehicles of every type or

description and (without limiting the generality of the forcgoing) includes any motor cycle, motor cycle sidecar, motor car, motor track or motor tractor or caravan, or any trailer, semi-trailer or float used or capable of being adapted for use therewith; ''secondhand'' means used.

"retail price when new" means-

- (a) in relation to the sale of any secondhand tyres or tubes which are of the same type and size as any of the types or sizes set out in the Schedule to Prices Control Order No. 122, the price set out in that Schedule in relation to that type and size:
- (b) in relation to any secondhand tyres or tubes of any other type and size, the cost to the first user thereof.

Maximum Prices-Certain Secondhaud Tyres and Tubes.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any secondhand tyre of the same type and size as any of the types and sizes set out in the Schedule to Prices Control Order No. 122 may be sold to be :-

- (a) (i) Where such tyre is sold by a distributor and has not been recapped
- (ii) Where such tyre is sold by a distributor and has been recapped or retreaded that percentage of the retail price when new set out in the second column of the First Schedule to this Order.
  (ii) Where such tyre is sold by a distributor and has been recapped or retreaded and has been used since such recapping or retreading was done, that percentage of the retail price when new set out in the third column of the said Schedule, opposite to the quantity of non-skid tread then remaining on such tyre as set out in the first column of the said Schedule.
- (b) (i) Where such tyre is sold by any person other than a distributor and has not been recapped or retreaded that percentage of the retail price when new set out in the fourth column of the said Schedule.
- (ii) Where such tyre is sold by any person other than a distributor and such tyre has been recapped or retreaded and has been used since such recapping or retreading was done, that percentage of the retail price when new set out in the fifth column of the said Schedule, opposite to the quantity of non-skid tread then remaining on the tyre as set out in the first column of the said Schedule.

Maximum Prices-Certain Other Secondhand Tyres and Tubes.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any secondhaud tyre of the same type and size as any type and size set out in the Schedule to Prices Control Order No. 122, and which has been recapped or retreaded and has not been used since it was recapped or retreaded as aforesaid may be sold to be the sum of the following:-

(a) (i) If such tyre has not been previously retreaded or recapped  $12\frac{1}{2}$  per centum of the retail price when new.

- (ii) If such tyre has been previously recapped or retreaded 71/2 per centum of the retail price when new.
- (b) The maximum rate fixed by the provisions of this Order for the retreading or recapping of such tyre as the case may be.

# Maximum Prices-Secondhand Tubes.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any secondhaud tube of the same type or size as any type or size set out in the Schedule to Prices Control Order No. 122, may be sold to be:--

- (a) Where such tube is sold by a distributor, 50 per centum of the retail price when new.
- (b) Where such tube is sold by any person other than a distributor, 30 per centum of the retail price when new.

# Maximum Rates-Retreading and Recapping.

7. I fix and declare the maximum rate at which any person may supply the service of retreading or recapping any tyre of a type and size set out in the Second Schedule to this Order to be the rate set out in that Schedule for that size and/or type of tyre.

#### Fixation of Maximum Prices or Rates by Notice.

8. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any second-hand tyre or tube may be sold, or the rate at which the service of recapping or retreading any tyre may be supplied by any person to whom such notice is given, to be such price or rate as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.
