### PROCLAMATION

WESTERN AUSTRALIA, } By His Excellency Lieutenant-General Sir Charles

WHEREAS it is provided by the Local Courts Act, 1908-1938, that the Governor may by Proclamation order that Courts to be called Local Courts shall be held at such places as he thinks fit, and may, in like manner, alter the place for the holding of a court or order that the holding of any court be discontinued; and whereas it is deemed expedient to discontinue the holding of a Court at Laverton: Now, therefore I, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby order that the holding of a Local Court at Laverton shall be discontinued, and that all proceedings pending in the said Laverton Local Court shall be transferred to and continue in the Local Court at Leonora, and that all records of the said Local Court at Laverton (the holding of which is discontinued) shall also be transferred to the said Local Court at Leonora, as from the 19th day of January, 1952.

The destruction must be done to the satisfaction of the Boards or their inspectors, and failure to comply with this order will lead to action being taken against all offenders.

Means to be Adopted.—Laying of poison baits in furrows, baits to contain any phosphorus or strychnine poisons, the breaking up of burrows by ploughing or deep tyning and/or by fumigation. Trapping or the use of myxomatosis will not be recognised as an effective means of destroying or suppressing rabbits.

Badges and buttons will be renewed when necessary.

(b) Employees in Plain Clothes.—Employees required to perform duty in plain clothes shall be supplied with two (2) pairs of trousers each eight (8) months.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION

No. 36 of 1951.

Between Hospital Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and the St. John of God Hospital, Mount Hospital, and others, as per Schedule attached, Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties, and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the said reference of industrial dispute was remitted by the Court to the Conciliation Commissioner, and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference, and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Conciliation Commissioner by their respective representatives and requested the Conciliation Commissioner to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Conciliation Commissioner, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, and all other powers therein enabling him hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein, it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Private Hospital Employees' Award" and shall supersede Award No. 3 of 1945 as amended.

3.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to all hospitals and workers employed therein (other than hospitals and employees already covered by Industrial Awards or Agreements) performing work for the public and where patients are received for medical, surgical observation, rest or other treatment or care.

4.—Area.

Subject to subclause 6 (d) hereof, this Award shall have effect throughout the State of Western Australia.

5.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for three (3) years commencing as from the beginning of the first pay period after the date hereof.

6.—Hours.

(a) Laundry Workers.—Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work and shall be worked on not more than five and a half (5½) days per week and on not more than nine (9) hours per day.

(b) All Other Workers.—Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work and shall be worked on any five and a half days of the week; provided that eighty (80) hours may be worked in eleven (11) days each fortnight at the option of the employer.

(c) Any worker who is not on duty and elects to remain on the employer's premises shall not be paid for such time.

(d) (i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to hospitals where the daily average of occupied beds does not exceed six, in which case there shall be no fixed hours.

(ii) For the purpose of ascertaining the daily average of occupied beds the average shall be taken for the six (6) months ending June 30th and December 31st in each and every year, and such average shall relate to the succeeding half year.

(iii) Babies receiving attention shall be included in calculating the daily average. Provided however, that no new born baby shall be included in making the calculation for the first seven (7) days in the hospital.

7.—Rosters.

(a) A roster shall be posted in a convenient place where it can be readily seen by the workers concerned.

(b) Such roster shall denote the hours to be worked by each worker and shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited representative of the Union, at such times as the record is open for inspection.

(c) Such roster shall be posted at least forty-eight (48) hours before it comes into operation, and shall only be altered in the case of sickness or absence from work, or if any contingency that the employer cannot reasonably foresee arises.

8.—Overtime.

(a) All work performed in excess of the hours prescribed in clause 6 hereof shall be deemed overtime and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter for the first four (4) hours, time and a half for the next four (4) hours, and double time thereafter.

(b) Workers required to work on any day on which they are rostered off duty shall be paid at the rate of double time for all time worked.

(c) Provided that where the overtime is occasioned through the failure of another worker to report for duty, equivalent time off duty may be granted in lieu of paying for overtime.

(d) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award:—

(i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(ii) No organisation, party to this Award, or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

- (iii) This subclause shall remain in operation only until otherwise determined by the Court.

#### 9.—Record.

(a) The employer shall keep or cause to be kept on the premises a time and wages book, where there shall be entered the name, occupation, and, in the case of junior workers, the age on his or her last birthday; the time the worker commences and finishes work each day; the total hours worked each day and the wages paid to each worker.

(b) The record shall be entered up at least once weekly.

(c) The employer and the worker shall be jointly and severally responsible for the proper entering of the record, which shall be initialed, if correct, by the worker.

(d) The record shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited representative of the Union, during the ordinary office hours, at the employer's office or other convenient place.

#### 10.—Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of four (4) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(b) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leave his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-third (1/3rd) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(c) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(d) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefits of the provisions of this clause.

(e) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

#### 11.—Payment for Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to leave of absence with pay on the ground of personal ill-health, for one-sixth (1/6th) of a week for each completed month of service. Provided that absence through such ill-health shall be limited to two (2) weeks in each calendar year.

(b) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(c) The foregoing paragraphs of this clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(d) If the absence exceeds one week, the employment shall be deemed to have terminated after the expiration of the first week's absence.

(e) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless she produces proof satisfactory to the employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

#### 12.—Uniforms.

(a) All uniforms, i.e., uniformity of dress, shall be supplied free of cost to all workers required to wear them.

(b) Aprons shall be provided for all female workers on the kitchen staff.

#### 13.—Laundry.

All clothing forming part of a uniform shall be laundered free of cost to the worker.

#### 14.—Accommodation.

(a) Resident employees shall be provided with suitable healthy accommodation. The union secretary or his nominee shall be permitted to inspect the accommodation at reasonable times and in the event of a dispute arising with respect to the suitability of the accommodation it shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

(b) Whether an employee lives in or not shall be left to the decision of the employer.

(c) A sitting-room suitably furnished and sufficiently large to accommodate the resident staff shall be provided for their common use, provided that this shall apply only where there are four (4) or more domestics employed and living in.

(d) Laundry facilities shall be available to all resident staff for the laundering of private clothes.

(e) Suitable dressing-rooms shall be provided for all non-resident staff.

#### 15.—Payment of Wages.

(a) Wages shall be paid at least weekly.

(b) Subject to clause 25 hereof any worker engaged for less than one week shall be deemed a casual worker and shall be paid whilst so employed at the rate of ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates prescribed in clause 18 hereof for his or her class of work.

#### 16.—Contract of Service.

(a) One hour's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the contract of a casual worker.

(b) Casual workers shall not be engaged for less than four (4) hours. Provided that this provision shall not apply where a casual is summarily dismissed for misconduct.

(c) For all workers other than casuals the contract of service shall be by the week, and one week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the contract of service. Provided that where a worker illegally severs his contract of service, or is dismissed for misconduct, the employer shall be under no obligation to make any payment in respect of an incomplete week's work and the worker shall lose all rights under clause 11 hereof.

#### 17.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which carries a higher rate of pay than that which he or she usually performs shall be entitled to the higher rate whilst so engaged.

#### 18.—Wages.

The minimum rates of wages payable to workers covered by this Award shall be:—

(a) Basic Wage—Per Week: Within a 15-mile radius of the G.P.O., Perth, Males £10 5s. 8d., Females £5 16s. 3d.; outside a 15-mile radius of the G.P.O., Perth, but within the South-West Land Division, Males £10 4s. 7d., Females £5 15s. 8d.; rest of State, Males £10 10s. 11d., Females £5 18s. 11d.

(f) It is hereby expressly agreed and declared that the rates prescribed herein by this amendment for junior and adult females have been arrived at without regard for the skill involved or the nature of the work performed, and cannot be compared as between themselves or with the rates of pay prescribed in this Award for males or with the rates of pay prescribed in any other Award.

(g) In the event of the Court of Arbitration increasing the ratio of the female basic wage to the male basic wage, the margins herein prescribed for adult females shall be automatically reduced by the same amount as the basic wage is so increased and in the case of junior female workers the percentage of the female basic wage and the margins prescribed herein shall be automatically reduced by a sum and/or percentage sufficient to enable the rates to remain constant.

## 19.—Deductions and Allowances.

(a) (i) Where full board and lodging is provided for a worker, a deduction equal to thirty-seven (37%) per cent. of the female basic wage shall be deducted from the wages of all workers other than junior females.

(ii) In all cases the ratio of the value of board to that of lodging shall be two to one.

(b) Where workers are provided with meals by the employer, a deduction shall be made at the rate of one twenty-first (1/21st) of the value for board for each meal provided.

(c) Any license fees either annual or otherwise which are required to be paid by a worker in connection with any duties he is called upon to perform shall be paid direct by the employer.

(d) Subject to subclause (b) hereof, if, as a result of a mutual agreement between an employer and a junior female worker, such worker does not lodge with the employer, then such worker shall

be entitled to receive the amount provided in subclause (a) of this clause as a deduction for lodging adult females in addition to the junior rates as prescribed by subclause (c) of clause 18 hereof.

## 20.—No Reduction.

Nothing contained herein shall in itself operate to reduce the wage of any worker who is at present being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum rate prescribed for his or her class of work.

## 21.—Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum rate of wage prescribed herein for his or her class of work, may be paid such lesser wage as may be agreed upon, in writing, between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

(c) In the event of the matter being referred to the Board of Reference and pending the Board's decision, the worker may be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

## 22.—Certificate of Service.

The employer shall, at the request of a worker leaving his service, give to the worker a certificate containing the following particulars:—

(a) Length of service.

(b) Capacity in which employed.

Provided that a worker who illegally severs his contract of service, or who is dismissed for misconduct shall not be entitled to any such certificate.

## 23.—General Clauses.

(a) No female worker shall be called upon to clean male lavatories in or about an institution.

(b) A worker required to take a day off duty not already shown on the roster for such day must be informed before booking off on the day previous.

(c) Space shall be provided in the workers' diningrooms or lunch rooms for the purpose of posting Union notices.

(d) The person in charge of each institution shall cause a copy of the Award to be posted in a conspicuous position where it can be readily seen by each worker concerned.

## 24.—Board of Reference.

The Court appoints, for the purposes of the Award, a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

There are assigned to each such board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of—

(1) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award, or any of them;

(2) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

## 25.—Part-time Workers.

(a) "Part-time worker" means a worker regularly employed for less than forty (40) hours each week.

(b) When a worker is employed under the provisions of this clause, he shall receive payments for wages, for annual leave, for holidays and for sick leave on a *pro rata* basis in the same proportion as the number of hours regularly worked each week bears to 40 hours.

(c) When a worker has been engaged under the provisions of this clause, the employer shall notify the Union in writing of the name of the worker and the number of hours that the worker is required to work each week.

## 26.—Week-end Penalty Rates.

When work performed on Saturdays or Sundays is part of a worker's ordinary hours of duty, he shall be paid for all time worked between midnight on Friday and midnight Saturday at the rate of twenty-five (25) per cent. extra, and for all work performed between midnight Saturday and midnight Sunday he shall be paid at the rate of fifty (50) per cent. extra.

I certify, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, that the foregoing is a copy of the agreement arrived at between the parties mentioned above.

THIS Agreement, made pursuant to the provisions of Part X of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, of Western Australia, this 7th day of December, 1951, between the Civil Service Association of Western Australia (Incorporated) (hereinafter called the Association) of the one part, and the Public Service Commissioner of Western Australia (hereinafter called the Commissioner) of the other part, witnesseth as follows:—

## 1.—Area and Scope.

This Agreement shall apply to all permanent female officers employed within the State of Western Australia under the Public Service Act, 1904, in the professional, clerical and general divisions whose maximum margins over the basic rate are less than six hundred and thirty-one pounds (£631) per annum.

## 2.—Interpretation.

In this Agreement, the following expression shall, unless the contrary intention appears, have the meaning hereby applied to it, namely:—

"Basic rate" means in the case of—

(a) Female officers employed in the metropolitan area; seventy-five per cent. (75%) to the nearest £ of the result obtained by multiplying the male basic wage for that area as declared from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, by fifty-two and one-sixth (52 1/6th).

(b) Female officers whose headquarters are in an area for which an independent basic wage is declared; seventy-five per cent. (75%) to the nearest £ of the result obtained by multiplying the male basic wage for that area as declared from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia by fifty-two and one-sixth (52 1/6th).

(c) At the date of operation of this Agreement the "basic rate" for respective areas was as follows:—

(d) An adult within the automatic range shall be paid an allowance of £15 per annum provided that—

(i) in the case of a clerk-typist or typist she passes an efficiency examination in shorthand writing at the rate of 100 words per minute and typewriting;

(ii) in the case of a machinist she passes an examination in typewriting and the operation of ledger-posting machines.

Such allowance to be converted to salary on promotion to a higher position or to cease should the officer refuse to accept promotion.

(e) An adult who has passed the examination referred to in sub-clause (d) and who has been retained on the maximum of the automatic range (excluding allowance) as a permanent officer for four (4) years, shall be paid an allowance to bring total remuneration to a margin of £120 per annum increasing to a margin of £135 per annum after a further year's service: Provided the permanent head certifies as to the good conduct, efficiency and ability of the officer to perform higher duties; such allowance to be converted to salary on promotion to a higher position or to cease should the officer refuse to accept promotion.

(f) An adult retained on the maximum of the automatic range as a permanent officer for five (5) years and who is not in receipt of the allowance referred to in subclause (d) or (e) shall be paid an allowance of fifteen pounds (£15) per annum: Provided the permanent head certifies that such officer is eligible and would be recommended for promotion on the grounds of efficiency and good conduct; such allowance to be converted to salary on promotion to a higher position or to cease should the officer refuse to accept promotion.

(g) An officer who is over the age of 21 years on appointment may be appointed at a minimum rate of pay based on years of service and not on age.

## 7.—Females—General Division.

(a) Classes and grades for females in the general division, except as provided for laboratory assistants, telephonists and assistants in clauses 8 and 9 of this Agreement shall be those set out in clause 3, subclause (a) of this Agreement.

## 11.—Annual Increments.

(a) Subject to the receipt by the Commissioner of a report from the permanent head regarding the good conduct, diligence and efficiency of the officers as provided for by Public Service Regulations, officers classified in the classes referred to in the following clauses of this Agreement shall proceed from the minimum to the maximum of respective classes by annual increments according to the grades of such classes:—3 (a), 4 (b), 6 (b), 7 (a).

(b) In the case of all other officers, progression from year to year shall be subject to the receipt of a similar report from the permanent head.

## 12.—Adjustment of Rates of Pay.

(a) Clause 15 of the Agreement dated the 20th day of December, 1950, between the Civil Service Association of Western Australia (Incorporated) and the Public Service Commissioner of Western Australia as published in Government Gazette No. 3 of the 12th January, 1951, defines the manner of adjustment of rates of pay for male officers.

## IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 64 of 1951.

Between the Hotel, Club, Caterers, Tearoom and Restaurant Employees' Industrial Union of Workers, Perth (Applicant) and the Hon. Chief Secretary (as Minister Controlling State Hotels) (Respondent).

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the above-named parties, and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the said reference of industrial dispute was remitted by the Court to the Conciliation Commissioner, and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference, and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Conciliation Commissioner by their respective representatives and requested the Conciliation Commissioner to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Conciliation Commissioner, pursuant to Section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, and all other powers therein enabling him, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

## Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein, it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement.")

## 1.—Title.

This award shall be known as the State Hotels Domestic Award, and shall replace Award No. 14 of 1933 (as amended).

## 2.—Arrangement.

## 3.—Area.

This award shall have effect over all hotels within the jurisdiction of the State Hotels Department.

## 4.—Term.

This Award shall remain in force for a term of three (3) years, and shall operate as from and including Monday, the 10th day of December, 1951.

## 5.—Hours.

(a) The ordinary hours for all workers shall not exceed forty (40) in any one week and shall not exceed eight (8) hours in any one day. Any worker (except as provided by clause 21) who works a lesser number of hours per week shall be paid a full week's wage.

(b) (i) The employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates, and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(ii) The Union or worker or workers covered by this Award shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this sub-clause.

(iii) This sub-clause shall remain in operation until otherwise determined by the Court.

## 6.—Spread of Shifts.

(a) Subject to clause 10, the longest spread of shift in any one day shall not exceed twelve (12) hours.

(b) Daily spread of shift shall mean the time which elapses from the worker's starting time to the worker's finishing time for the day.

(c) Weekly spread of shift shall mean the aggregate number of hours contained in the daily spreads for a week.

(d) The weekly spread of shifts shall not exceed seventy-two (72) hours.

(e) In addition to one break for meal hour there shall be not more than one break in any shift, such break to be not less than two (2) hours.

(f) Night shift shall mean when the worker finishes work for the day after 8 p.m. Any work done after twelve o'clock midnight and before five o'clock a.m. shall be paid at treble time rates in the case of females and time and a half in the case of male workers.

(g) Not more than three (3) night shifts shall be worked in any one week, or, as an alternative, day and night shifts alternate weeks.

## 8.—Board and Lodging.

For all workers where full board and/or lodging is provided and availed of, the employer shall be entitled to deduct for board an amount equal to 18.5 per cent. of the male basic wage per week and where lodging is provided the employer shall be entitled to deduct an amount equal to 7 per cent. of the male basic wage per week.

If full board is not provided and/or availed of by the worker, the employer shall be entitled to deduct from the wage of the worker a sum proportionate to the board availed of.

Full Board shall mean three (3) ordinary meals a day.

Workers sleeping in shall be provided with a common sitting room apart from their bedrooms, and shall also have access to bathrooms provided for them.

Not more than two (2) workers shall be required to share a bedroom.

If the worker shall consider the accommodation unsuitable, any party to this Award may refer the matter to a Board of Reference for decision, as provided in clause 25.

## 9.—Meals.

(a) Workers shall be provided with three (3) meals per day as per menu.

(b) One clear hour in every six (6) consecutive working hours shall be allowed each worker for meal time.

## 10.—Overtime.

(i) All work done outside the daily spread provided in clause 6, or beyond (8) hours in any one day or beyond forty (40) hours in any one week shall be deemed to be overtime.

(ii) Overtime shall be paid at the rate of time and one-third for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(iii) When computing overtime the district allowance shall not be computed as an addition to the day's pay.

## 11.—Weekly Holidays.

All workers shall be entitled to one full day off per week.

## 12.—Public Holidays.

All work done on Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Labour Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

Provided that any worker whose ordinary day off falls on any of the aforesaid public holidays, he or she shall be entitled to an extra day off during that week, or as compensation, one extra day's pay.

## 13.—Annual Holidays.

On the completion of twelve (12) months' service each worker shall be entitled to three (3) weeks' holiday on full pay, including board and lodging allowance.

The annual holiday shall be granted within three (3) months of its becoming due.

Provided that any worker who shall have served one month or over, and whose contract of service shall have been terminated by either party for any cause other than misconduct before the annual holiday becomes due, such worker shall be entitled to receive a proportionate allowance of holiday pay for the time actually served.

Holiday pay shall not accrue during a worker's absence from his or her employment for any cause whatever.

## 14.—Weekly Wage.

Wages shall be paid weekly.

Except for casual workers, the contract of service shall be on a weekly basis: Provided that one day's notice of termination shall be given on either side.

## 15.—Record.

The employer shall keep or cause to be kept at his business premises, or at each one of them if more than one, a time and wages book, wherein shall be entered the name and occupation of each worker, the time he or she commences and finishes work each day, the hours worked each day, and the wages paid to each worker each week. Such book shall be entered up from day to day, and shall be initialed daily, if correct, by each worker.

The book shall be open to inspection by a duly authorised representative of the Union, who shall be permitted to take extracts therefrom, on a portion of the employer's premises, during all working hours.

## 16.—Roster.

A roster of the working hours of all workers shall be exhibited in each establishment in the kitchen or pantry, in such a place as may be conveniently seen by each worker concerned; such roster to be compiled weekly, and shall denote the hours to be worked by each worker for the week ahead, and shall be open for inspection by Union officials during all working hours.

## 17.—Change and Rest Room.

Adequate change and rest rooms shall be provided by the employer, in cases where the workers do not reside on the premises. In case of complaint, the matter may be referred by either party to a Board of Reference for decision.

## 18.—Uniforms.

The wearing of head bands is prohibited.

Where female workers are required to wear white aprons, stiff white cuffs and/or collars, or male workers to wear white coats, the employer shall provide and launder them. They shall remain the property of the employer.

If the employer requires workers to wear coloured uniforms, other than plain black, he shall provide and launder same.

## 19.—Women Climbing Ladders.

Female workers shall not be permitted to perform any work requiring the climbing of ladders.

## 20.—Preference of Employment.

Preference of employment shall be given to members of the Hotel, Club, Caterers, Tea Rooms, and Restaurant Employees' Industrial Union of Workers: Provided that any worker or applicant for employment who is a member of another recognised Industrial Union, and who produces proof of such membership, shall be entitled to equal preference. Provided that such worker or applicant shall, within fourteen (14) days of the expiry of his current ticket with the other Union, make and complete an application for membership with the Hotel, Club, Caterers, Tea Rooms and Restaurant Employees' Industrial Union of Workers.

## 21.—Casual Workers.

(a) A casual worker shall mean a worker engaged on an hourly contract of service.

(b) Casual workers shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

(c) Casual workers shall not be engaged for less than three (3) hours.

(d) Fares to and from the place of engagement and the job shall be paid by the employer.

(e) The wages payable to a casual worker shall be handed to the worker immediately on completion of the engagement.

## 22.—Higher Duties.

Any worker engaged for one hour or more in any day in any work carrying a higher rate of wage shall receive such higher rate for the actual time worked.

## 23.—Under-Rate Workers.

Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed in writing between the Union and the employer, and in default of such agreement within twenty-four (24) hours after such worker shall have applied in writing to the secretary of the Union stating his desire that such wage shall be agreed upon, such wages as shall be fixed by the most convenient Resident or Police Magistrate, upon the application of such worker after twenty-four (24) hours' notice in writing shall have been given by him to the said secretary, who shall, if he so desires, be heard by the Magistrate upon such application. After having given notice to the secretary, and after lodging the application mentioned, and pending the Magistrate's decision thereon, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate. The determination of the Magistrate shall have effect for the period of six (6) calendar months from the date thereof and after the expiration of the said period until the wage shall have again been fixed at the instance of the said secretary in the manner prescribed. The secretary of the Union may by writing under his hand appoint an agent or substitute to represent the Union at the hearing of the application before the Magistrate.

## 24.—Payment for Sickness.

(a) (i) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service.

(ii) The liability of the employer shall in no case exceed one (1) week's wages during each calendar year in respect to each worker, but the sick leave herein provided shall be allowed to accumulate and any portion unused in any year may be availed of in the next or any succeeding year.

(iii) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(b) This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1944.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefit of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer or his representative of sickness but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) consecutive working days or more.

(d) No payment shall be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect, or misconduct.

(e) (i) Periods of service of less than one (1) month shall not be included as service for the computation of sick leave.

(ii) Periods of one (1) month and over shall be totalled and payment for sick leave computed on the total of such service during the year.

25.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court appoints for the purposes of this Award a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a Chairman, who shall be a person elected by the representatives of the parties, if such may be agreed upon, or, failing such agreement, appointed by the Court, and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by the employer and the other to be nominated by the Union. Either party may at any time by notification to the other party and the Registrar of the Court change such representative.

(b) There shall be assigned to such Board or Boards the functions of—

- (i) deciding matters specifically referred to in the Award as being the subject-matter of a decision of the Board ;
- (ii) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Award, or any of them ;
- (iii) deciding all matters and questions referred to in the Award as being the subject of mutual agreement, if not agreed upon ;
- (iv) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board or Boards from time to time ;
- (v) an appeal shall lie from any decision of a Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, which for this purpose are embodied in and form part of this Award (Regulation 92) ;
- (vi) there shall be no cessation of work pending the reference to and the settlement of any dispute by a Board.

26.—Long Service Leave.

The conditions governing the granting of long service leave to full time Government wages employees generally shall apply to workers covered by this Award.

Provided that (a) the Minister may, having regard to the special circumstances of each case, issue a permit authorising any maximum length prescribed in clauses (i), (ii) or (iii) of this regulation to be exceeded to such extent, on such conditions and for such routes and journeys as may be specified in such permit, and (b) where such a permit is issued in respect of any vehicle, then the maximum length prescribed as aforesaid may, in the case of such vehicle, be exceeded to the extent, on the conditions and for the routes and journeys, if any, specified in the permit.

## Schedule.

The abovementioned regulations are amended by adding after regulation 95 the following new regulation numbered 95A:—

95A. No person shall ride or travel in or upon any motor vehicle in such a position that any part of his body or limbs—

- (a) would be upon or in contact with any outer step or foot-board of the vehicle; or
- (b) extends or protrudes beyond or through any outer entrance, exit, window or other opening of such vehicle; or
- (c) extends or protrudes beyond or hangs over any side, or the front, rear or any other outer portion of the vehicle.

Provided that this regulation shall not affect the giving of any of the codified signals prescribed by these regulations.
