#### THE INDUSTRIAL ARBITRATION ACT, 1912-1950.

#### IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

In the matter of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, and in the matter of Part VII of the said Act—Basic Wage.

The 29th Day of January, 1952.

Basic Wage.

IN pursuance of the provisions of the above Act and subject to the conditions therein prescribed, the Court of Arbitration hereby adjusts and amends the basic wage declarations made on the 7th day of December, 1950, and the 28th day of November, 1951, so as to read and have effect as follows:—

#### Adults.

(1) Metropolitan Area, which for this purpose shall be taken to be that portion of the State comprised within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the General Post Office, Perth—

#### Apprentices and Junior Workers.

(4) The wages being paid to these workers will be altered proportionately, if and when necessary, to the alterations in the basic wages above declared by the application of the percentage where percentages are fixed in the Award or Industrial Agreement and by direct proportion where the amount and not percentage is prescribed.

#### Contract of Employment.

(5) Payment shall be pro rata where the term of employment is for less than one (1) week.

This Order shall take effect from and inclusive of the date hereof: Provided that payment of the amounts by which the basic wages have been increased by virtue of this Order may at the employer's option be delayed until the end of the first pay period which commences after this date.

Rudderham on behalf of the respondents, and by consent, the Court, in pursuance of the powers contained in section 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, doth hereby order and declare that Award No. 24 of 1948, as amended, be and the same is hereby further amended in the manner following:—

## Clause 4.—Rates of Pay.

(c) Where a deckhand is called upon for any reason to perform the work of a fireman for a period of two hours or more in any shift, he shall be paid at fireman's rates for the whole of that shift. Where the period is less than two hours, he shall be paid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.

(d) All wages due shall be payable at 2.30 o'clock p.m. on Friday in each week.

(e) Wages may be payable on the written order of the employee to the person named in such order, and the Commissioners by paying to such order shall be relieved of all responsibility on obtaining the signature of the person named in the said order.



## Clause 5.—Overtime.

Delete this clause and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

(a) Overtime shall mean and include all time worked outside of, or in excess of, the ordinary working hours in any shift, and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) For the purposes of this clause, overtime shall be calculated on the basis of the basic wage plus margin, but excluding the allowance referred to in clause 4 (a) hereof.

Between Boilermakers' Society of Australia Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, W.A.; Federated Moulders (Metals) Union of Workers, Perth, Coastal District Committee Amalgamated Engineering Union Association of Workers, State Executive, Australasian Society of Engineers' Industrial Association of Workers and Electrical Trades Union of Workers of Australia (Western Australian Branch), Perth, Applicants, and Millars Timber and Trading Co. Ltd., Bunning Bros. Pty. Ltd., The Minister Controlling State Saw Mills and Kauri Timber Co. Ltd., Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties, and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the said reference of industrial dispute was remitted by the Court to the Conciliation Commissioner, and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference, and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Conciliation Commissioner by their respective representatives and requested the Conciliation Commissioner to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Conciliation Commissioner, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, and all other powers therein enabling him, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein, it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement".)

1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Metal Trades (Timber Industry) Award, 1951" and replaces Award No. 56 of 1947, as amended.

3.—Area.

This Award shall apply to workers employed in the Timber Industry carried on in the South-West Land Division of the State.

4.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of one (1) year from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

5.—Hours.

(a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked in five or five and one-half days at the option of the employer.

(b) The ordinary hours of work shall not (without payment of overtime) exceed eight (8) hours, Monday to Friday, inclusive, and four (4) hours on Saturday.

(c) Lunch interval shall not exceed one (1) hour.

(d) Work shall finish not later than at noon on Saturdays.

6.—Overtime.

(a) For all work done beyond the hours of duty on any week day other than a holiday, payment shall be at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) All work done on Sunday or the holidays named in clause 7 (a) or (j) hereof shall be paid for at the rate of double time, except in the case of workers effecting repairs to or renewals of plant and/or machinery necessary to enable work to be safely resumed on Monday or the earliest working day, in which case payment shall be made at the rate of time and a half. This exception shall not apply to the installing of new machinery.

(c) When a worker is recalled to work after leaving the job, he shall be paid for at least two (2) hours at overtime rates.

(d) When a worker is required to hold himself in readiness for a call to work after ordinary hours, he shall be paid at ordinary rates for the time he so holds himself in readiness.

(e) When a worker is required for duty during any meal time, whereby his meal time is postponed for more than one hour he shall be paid at overtime rates until he gets his meal.

(f) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—

(i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(ii) No organisation, party to this Award or worker or workers covered by this Award shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

7.—Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu shall, subject to clause 6 hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award, the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done, ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(c) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of 12 months' continuous service with such employer.

(d) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day, being an ordinary working day, for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(e) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(f) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(g) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (e) or subclause (j) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(h) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(j) In the area outside a radius of fourteen (14) miles from the General Post Office, Perth, the following provisions shall apply:—

(i) Subclause (a) hereof shall not apply, except in the case of Anzac Day and Labour Day.

(ii) Subclause (c) hereof shall not apply, but, except as hereinafter provided, a period of two consecutive weeks' leave at Christmas time and also the day immediately preceding Good Friday, Good Friday, Easter Saturday and the week immediately succeeding such days, with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed, shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve months' continuous service with such employer.

(iii) Subclause (e) hereof shall not apply, but, if after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid eleven and one-third (11 1/3rd) hours' pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(iv) Workers engaged on essential work during the period or periods referred to in paragraph (ii) hereof, shall be allowed equivalent time off at such time as may be mutually agreed upon between the employer and the worker.

(v) In all other respects, the provisions of this clause shall apply.

#### 8.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except as to casual workers, the employment is terminable on either side by one week's notice given on any day, or, if the employer terminates it, by payment of one week's pay; but for the first month of employment the hiring shall be from day to day, and during this period a day's notice or a day's pay shall be sufficient.

(b) If a weekly worker absents himself from duty without reasonable cause a sum proportionate to his time of absence may be deducted from his pay, that is to say, one-fifth or one-sixth of the week's pay, as the case may be, for each day of absence, and a proportionate part of one-fifth or one-sixth for a shorter absence.

(c) This does not affect the employer's right to dismiss for misconduct, incompetence, or negligence, and in such case wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

#### 9.—Breakdowns, Etc.

The employer may deduct payment for any day or portion of a day on which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by or

participation in any strike by the Union, by any branch of the Union, or by any members or member of the Union employed by the employer, or because of any strike by or participation in any strike by any other Union, branch of any other Union, or members or member of any other Union employed by the employer, or because of any breakdown of machinery, or because of any other stoppage of work for any other cause for which the employer cannot be held responsible. Provided that no deduction shall be made unless such stoppage exceeds two (2) hours.

#### 10.—Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default, or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

Provided that where an apprentice is 21 years of age or over at the commencement of his fifth year he shall be paid the full basic wage, and that when an apprentice becomes 21 years of age in the course of his fifth year he shall be paid the full basic wage for the period following his twenty-first birthday. Provided further that the foregoing proviso shall not apply where the apprenticeship has been revived under the Re-establishment and Employment Act, 1945, and the apprentice is in receipt of the tradesman's rate through Government supplementation.

## 12.—Special Rates and Provisions.

(a) Dirt Money.—Twopence (2d.) per hour extra shall be paid to workers when engaged on work of an unusually dirty nature, where clothes are necessarily unduly soiled or injured or boots are unduly injured by the nature of the work done.

(b) Confined Spaces.—Sixpence (6d.) per hour extra shall be paid to workers when working in "confined space" which means: A compartment or space the dimensions of which necessitate a worker working in a stooped or otherwise cramped position, or without proper ventilation.

(c) Hot Places.—Workers required to work in a boiler which has not been cooled down, shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for each hour so worked, in addition to any dirt and confined space money payable. Any broken time of less than one (1) hour shall be paid for as one (1) hour.

(d) Apprentice patternmakers shall be paid the sum of four shillings (4s.) per week in addition to the rates herein prescribed.

## (e) Protective equipment—

- (a) The employer shall have available a sufficient supply of protective equipment (as, for example, hand screens, goggles, glasses, gloves, aprons, leggings and gum boots) for use by his workers when engaged on work for which some protective equipment is reasonably necessary. It shall be a defence to an employer charged with a breach of this subclause if he proves that he was unable to obtain either the item of equipment the subject of the charge or a suitable substitute.
- (b) Every worker shall sign an acknowledgment on receipt of any article of protective equipment and shall return same to the employer when he has finished using it or on leaving his employment.
- (c) No worker shall lend another worker any such article of protective equipment issued to such first-mentioned worker, and if the same are lent, both the lender and the borrower shall be deemed guilty of wilful misconduct.

(d) Before goggles, glasses, or gloves or any such substitutes which have been used by a worker are re-issued by the employer to another worker they shall be effectively sterilised.

(e) During the time any article of protective equipment is on issue to the worker, he shall be responsible for any loss or damage thereto, fair wear and tear attributable to ordinary use excepted.

(f) Apprentices and junior workers shall be deemed to be included in the foregoing provisions of this clause.

(g) Leading Hands.—A leading hand placed in charge of—

(a) not less than three (3) and not more than ten (10) other workers shall be paid eleven shillings (11s.) per week extra;

(b) more than ten (10) and not more than twenty (20) other workers shall be paid twenty-two shillings (22s.) per week extra;

(c) more than twenty (20) other workers shall be paid thirty-two shillings (32s.) per week extra.

## 13.—Outside Work.

(a) All time reasonably occupied by a worker in travelling to or from work outside the shop or mill stations and outside ordinary hours, shall be treated as time of duty and paid for at ordinary rate up to a maximum of twelve (12) hours for the journey.

(b) All fares and reasonable travelling expenses incurred by a worker in such travelling, together with reasonable cost of board and lodging, if the worker has to be away from his home for a night, shall be paid to the worker.

## 14.—Casual Worker.

A casual worker shall be paid ten per centum increase on the prescribed rates for the particular class of work he is required to perform. Provided, however, that if a man be dismissed for incompetence or misconduct within the first week of his employment, he shall not be entitled to the ten per cent. increase for casual work.

## 15.—Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for or be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

## 16.—Record Book.

A record or time book shall be kept by each employer, in which record or time book shall be entered the name of each worker, the nature of the work he is doing, the hours worked each day, and the amount of wages received by him each week; the said record or time book shall be open to the inspection of the accredited representative of the Union at any time during the usual office hours, and he shall be allowed to take necessary extracts therefrom.

Any system of automatic recording by means of machines shall be deemed to comply with this provision to the extent of the information recorded.

## 17.—Representative Interviewing Workers.

In the case of a disagreement existing or anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the Union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal hour on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer more than once in any one week.

## 18.—Tools.

The employer shall provide for the worker, excepting patternmaker, all necessary tools, including micrometer (where used), but excluding other measuring or precision tools of less than thirteen inches, but the worker shall replace or pay for any tools so provided, if lost through his negligence. This clause does not apply to patternmakers, who are to provide their own tools.

Each patternmaker at the end of his employment shall be allowed an hour at ordinary rate for the purpose of grinding his tools.

## 19.—Mixed Functions.

A worker engaged for more than half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) of one (1) day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If employed for less than half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) of one (1) day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked.

## 20.—Extra Rates.

Extra rates in this Award prescribed are not cumulative so as to exceed the maximum of double the ordinary rates.

## 21.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court hereby appoints for the purpose of this Award a Board of Reference.

(b) The Board shall consist of a chairman, to be appointed by the Court and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

(c) The Board is hereby assigned the following functions in the event of a disagreement between the parties bound by this Award:—

(i) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of this Award or any of them.

(ii) Deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(d) The provisions of regulation 92 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1950, shall be deemed to apply to any Board of Reference appointed hereunder.

## 22.—Definitions.

(a) "Casual worker" means a worker employed for less than one week.

(b) "Blacksmith" means a tradesman working as a blacksmith who is employed making or repairing sawmilling or log-hauling plant, locomotive railway rolling stock, or whims, or is employed in or upon any other engineering work, but shall not mean making or repairing road vehicles, nor farriers, nor bush blacksmiths.

(c) "Striker" or "Blacksmith's striker" means the striker associated with the blacksmith described in the preceding definition.

(d) "Process Worker" means a worker engaged on repetition work on any automatic, semi-automatic, or single-purpose machine, or any machine fitted with jigs, gauges, or other tools rendering operations mechanical or in the assembling of parts of mechanical appliances or other metallic articles so made, or any repetitive hand processes.

(e) "Junior" means a male worker under the age of 21 years and who is not employed as an apprentice.

(f) "Patternmaker" means a tradesman engaged in the making of patterns in wood.

(g) "Electrical Fitter" means a worker employed in making, repairing, altering, assembling, testing, winding or wiring electrical machines, instruments, meters, or other apparatus other than wires leading thereto. The work of an electrical fitter shall not be tested by a worker of a lower grade.

(h) "Electrical Linesman" means a worker engaged (with or without labourers assisting) in erecting poles for electric wires or erecting wire or cables in poles or over buildings or tying it or them to insulators or joining, or insulating it or them, or doing any work on electric poles off the ground, but no linesman shall be allowed to work on live wires without any assistant.

(i) "Electrical Installer" means a worker engaged in the installation of electric lighting, electric meters, bells, telephones, or motors, and apparatus used in connection therewith, and includes a worker engaged in the running, repairing and testing of wires used for lighting, heating or power purposes. The term does not include a worker who fixes a motor on a concrete bed or who erects metal frames for the support of apparatus used in connection with the generation or distribution of electricity.

(j) "Motor Mechanic" means a worker engaged in making, repairing, altering, assembling (except assembling for the first time in Australia) and/or testing the metal parts (including electric) of the engines and/or chassis on motor cars or other motor vehicles, except motor cycles.

(k) "First Class Welder" means a worker using electric arc or acetylene, petrol or coal gas blow pipe on any work other than—

- (a) filling castings, or
- (b) cutting scrap metal, or
- (c) welding with the aid of jigs, or
- (d) operations specifically mentioned as being the work of a second, third or fourth-class welder in the definitions of those terms hereunder.

(l) "Second Class Welder" means a worker who—

- (a) uses any of the foregoing types of welding apparatus in filling castings, or
- (b) welds with the aid of jig, or
- (c) operates automatic welding machines for the setting up of which he is not responsible, or
- (d) operates a profile cutting or a straight line cutting machine.

(m) "Third Class Welder" means a worker who uses any of the foregoing types of welding apparatus in tacking preparatory to the completion of work by any other worker.

(n) "Fourth Class Welder" means a worker using an electric spot or butt-welding machine, or cutting scrap with oxy-acetylene blow pipe, petrol or coal gas blow pipe.

(o) "First Class Machinist" means a tradesman who is partly or wholly engaged in setting up and operating the following machines:—Lathe, boring machine, milling machine, planing machine, shaping machine, slotting machine and grinding machine.

(p) "Second Class Machinist" means an adult not engaged as a tradesman and who is not required to work from drawings or prints required to be scaled and/or measured from drawings or prints, or to make precision measurements, but who is engaged in operating or in the setting up and operating of machines enumerated in the definition of "First Class Machinist"; or who is engaged operating a key-seating machine, or a second class brass finisher or as a pipe fitter on low pressure work.

(q) "Third Class Machinist" means a machinist, not being a process worker, who operates any machine set up by a tradesman or any machine the setting up of which does not require the knowledge or skill of a second-class machinist.

(r) "Jobbing Moulder" means a metal moulder engaged in floor moulding, loam moulding, strickle moulding, or moulding from loose patterns.

(s) "Jobbing Coremaker" means a moulder engaged in making cores for metal moulds by the use of loam or strickle boards, or by loose boxes, other than loose boxes used for repetition production of cores requiring little or no skill to produce.

(t) "Plate or Machine Moulder" means an adult worker engaged in moulding on the plate system or by machines where the pattern is either a fixture to the plate or the spray system is used.

(u) "Machine Coremaker" means an adult worker making cores by machines where the core box is a fixture to or part of such machine, or making repetition cores requiring little or no skill to produce.

## 23.—Junior Workers.

Unapprenticed male juniors may be employed in all occupations for which apprenticeship is not provided.

## 24.—Cadets.

(a) Notwithstanding anything herein contained or implied, a *bona fide* employer shall be permitted to appoint one (1) son (or any other nominee) as a cadet to learn all the branches of the trade or calling of such employer. Only one (1) such cadet at any particular time shall be permitted any employer. Where a cadet is employed in the work of a motor mechanic or motor cycle mechanic, he shall, whilst so employed, be counted as an apprentice for the purpose of regulation 42 of the Apprenticeship Regulations annexed hereto.

(b) The employer of a cadet shall notify the Industrial Registrar within fourteen (14) days of his engagement. Upon receipt of such notification the Registrar shall give the union fourteen (14) days in which to object to the employment of the cadet.

(c) On receipt of an objection the matter shall be referred to the Court and the Court, after hearing the parties, may make such order as it thinks fit.

(d) University Students.—Provision may be made by agreement between the parties as to terms and conditions of employment, but any such agreement shall be submitted to the Court for approval within one (1) month after making thereof.

## 25.—Apprentices.

(a) The provisions of the Schedule hereto marked "Apprenticeship Regulations" are hereby embodied in and form part of this Award.

(b) Apprentices shall be allowed to the following trades:—

- (1) Pattern-making.
- (2) Motor Mechanics.
- (3) Coppersmithing.
- (4) Blacksmithing.
- (5) Turning.
- (6) Fitting.
- (7) Electrical Fitting.
- (8) First Class Machining.
- (9) Electrical Installing.
- (10) First Class Welding.
- (11) Boilermaking.
- (12) Jobbing Moulding and Coremaking.

(c) The proportion of apprentices to journeymen shall not exceed the proportion of one apprentice to every two (2) or fraction of two (2) journeymen: Provided that the fraction of two (2) shall not be less than one (1). Provided further that in an "approved" shop or factory the proportion shall be one (1) apprentice for every one (1) journeyman. For the purpose of this proviso an "approved" shop or factory shall be one to which approval (as regards one or more particular trades) has been given by the Board of Reference appointed under clause 21 hereof.

The Court's Standard 1941 Apprenticeship Regulations with the following amendments:—

22. Subject to regulation 38, time lost by the apprentice through sickness or any other cause whatsoever may, with the consent of the Court on the application of any party, be added to the original term in the Apprenticeship Agreement at the end of the year of service in which the time has been lost or at the termination of the apprenticeship period.

(2) Add to regulation 37 new subclauses as follows:—

(c) An apprentice shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident or sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(d) Liberty is reserved to the respondents to apply for the deletion of this regulation.

(3) Delete regulation 40.
