IN pursuance of the provisions of section 10 of the Fisheries Act, 1905-1951, I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Western Australia, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby prohibit all persons from taking any fish whatsoever by means of fishing nets in that portion of Western Australian waters described in the Schedule to this Proclamation during the periods commencing at 6 o'clock in the forenoon of Friday in each week and ending at 6 o'clock in

the forenoon of the Sunday next following from 1st February, 1953, until 1st June, 1953, both dates inclusive.

The whole of the waters of Peel Inlet and Harvey Estuary.

WHEREAS by section 166 of the Factories and Shops Act, 1920-1951, it is enacted that the Governor may by Proclamation temporarily suspend the operations of the said Act, in so far as it applies to the closing time fixed or appointed for any shop or shops, either generally or in any specified locality or district: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, do by this Proclamation temporarily suspend the operations of the Factories and Shops Act, 1920-1951, for the period the 30th day of March to the 2nd day of April, 1953, inclusive, in so far as the said Act applies to the closing time of shops situated in those districts throughout the State which would normally observe the weekly half-holiday during that period between the usual hour of closing of such shops and 6 p.m. on the said days.

WHEREAS by section 208 (3) of the Road Districts Act, 1919-1951, it is enacted that the Governor may at any time and from time to time, by Proclamation, declare that in any district or portion of a district it shall be lawful to use wood or other structural material in the construction of the external and internal walls of any building intended for use as a dwelling house, and notwithstanding that the provisions of the Second Schedule to the Act have been extended to and are in operation in the district or portion of a district, and until the Proclamation is revoked any of the provisions of the Second Schedule to the Act and of any by-laws made thereunder which are deemed to be inconsistent with or repugnant to the authority granted by the Proclamation shall be suspended and have no force or effect in relation to any such building aforesaid; and whereas Proclamations dated the 4th day of October, 1945, and the 14th day of January, 1948, were published in the *Government Gazette* dated the 5th day of October, 1945, and the 16th day of January, 1948, respectively, in respect of portion of the Melville Road District: Now, therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the Proclamations.

## ORDER IN COUNCIL.

P.W.W.S. 942/47.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 6 of the Water Boards Act, 1904, that for every Water Area constituted under that Act, there shall be a Water Board constituted by the Governor by Order in Council; and whereas it is enacted by section 3 of the Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Act, 1912, that the Governor may revoke any Order in Council made before or after the commencement of the said last mentioned Act, for the constitution of a Water Board under the Water Boards Act, 1904-1951, aforesaid, and dissolve the Water Board constituted pursuant to any Order so revoked; and whereas by an Order in Council dated the 25th day of November, 1947, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 28th day of November, 1947, the Governor, acting in exercise of the power conferred by section 6 of the Water Boards Act, constituted the Three Springs Road Board a Water Board to administer

the Water Boards Act, 1904, in the Three Springs Water Area as constituted under that Act; and whereas it is now deemed desirable and expedient that the Water Board constituted pursuant to the said Order in Council should be dissolved. Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and in exercise of the power conferred by section 3 of the Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Act, 1912, doth hereby as from and after the 1st day of May, 1952, revoke that portion only of the said Order in Council dated the 25th day of November, 1947, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 28th day of November, 1947, relating to the appointment of the Three Springs Road Board as a Water Board and dissolve the said Three Springs Road Board as a Water Board constituted for the Three Springs Water Area pursuant to the said Order in Council.

A By-law Relating to Long Service Leave.

L.G. 39/52.

A By-law of the Municipality of Albany made under Section 180 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1906-1951, and numbered thirty-five, for regulating Long Service Leave.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the said Act, the Mayor and Councillors of the Municipality of Albany order as follows:—

1. In the interpretation of this by-law, the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them hereunder:—

"Council" means the Council of the Municipality of Albany.

"Employee" means any officer of the Council whose salary and conditions of service are defined by the Industrial Award No. 41 of 1947 in the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, or the Health Inspectors (Western Australia) Award, 1951, in the Court of Conciliation and Arbitration of the Commonwealth of Australia.

"Continuous service" means service in the employment of the Council during which an employee has not been absent from the service of the Council for a period of more than two days or an aggregate period of more than 10 days without leave of absence being granted by the Council, provided that an employee who was employed by the Council on a permanent basis immediately prior to entering full-time service with the Armed Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia, or who has been granted leave to attend one annual training camp and one annual school or course of instruction in the Citizen Military Forces, or to undergo National Service training, shall have such services counted as continuous service with this Council.

2. All present and future employees of the Council shall, after each period of 10 years' continuous service as permanent full-time employees thereof, commencing from the 1st day of January, 1947, be entitled to three months' long service leave. Long service leave shall be taken at the convenience of the Council, which will, as far as possible, meet with the wishes of the employee, but the Council may require the employee to take leave by giving not less than three months' notice.

3. Absence on account of sickness shall not be deemed to be a break in continuous service, provided the period of absence shall not exceed three months in any year, unless otherwise decided by the Council.

4. Leave without pay for a period in excess of two weeks shall not be deemed a break in continuous service, but shall not be counted as qualifying service for long service leave purposes.

5. The Council may grant long service leave to an employee of the Council who has been granted long service leave for 10 years' continuous service, if, before a further 10 years' continuous service is reached, such employee retires from the Council's service owing to having reached retiring age, or because of permanent inability to continue his employment, in which case the long service leave may be adjusted *pro rata*.

The long service leave which may be granted under this by-law shall be for a period not exceeding 1 3/10ths weeks for every completed year of continuous service since the conclusion of the period which qualified the employee for his previous long service leave, and shall be on full pay.

6. In the event of the resignation, retirement or death of an employee, the Council may pay to such employee (or, in the case of death, to his personal representatives, or if there be none, to his dependants), a sum of money equal to his wages or salary for the period of long service leave which the Council was empowered under this by-law to grant to such employee at the date of his resignation, retirement or death, or, if the Council, after consideration of all circumstances, direct that the death of an employee be presumed, the Council may authorise the payment to the dependants of the employee of a sum equivalent to the amount of wages or salary which would, under this by-law, have been granted the employee immediately prior to the date of his death, such date to be determined by the Council.

7. An employee dismissed by the Council, except in the matter of retrenchment, shall not be paid any sum in pursuance of the preceding paragraph.

8. (a) Employees due to take long service leave shall be paid their salary or wage for the period thereof at the rate equivalent to the salary paid in the week immediately preceding the taking of long service leave.

(b) The Council may, at its discretion, either—

- (i) pay to the employee his wages or salary periodically during long service leave, or
- (ii) pay to the employee in advance a sum equivalent to the amount of his wages or salary for the period of his long service leave.

9. All annual leave to which an employee is entitled or will become entitled before the expiration of his long service leave shall be taken by the employee in conjunction with his long service leave, but any public holidays which may occur during the taking of his long service leave are not to be paid for over and above the long service leave, but are to form part of such long service leave.

10. Long service leave shall be considered as a special period of recuperation after a lengthy term of service, with a view to fitting the employee for a further term, and during such leave no employee shall undertake any form of employment for hire or reward, unless by special permission of the Council.

Any contravention of this clause shall entitle the Council to dismiss the employee from its service, and to cease paying or to recover any amounts paid in advance on account of long service leave.

## INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT.

No. 4 of 1953.

Registered 28th January, 1953.

THIS Agreement, made in pursuance of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, this 12th day of January, 1953, between the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia, Industrial Union of Workers, W.A. Branch, of the one part, and the Honourable Minister for the North-West, of the other part, whereby it is mutually agreed as follows:—

## 1. Title.

This Agreement shall be known as the "North-West Clerks (Wharfingers) Agreement," and shall replace Agreement No. 13 of 1942, as amended.

## 3.—Scope.

This Agreement shall apply to all workers engaged as wharfingers and/or clerks at the ports under the control of the Harbour and Light Department on the North-West coast of Western Australia.

## 4.—Definitions.

"Wharfinger" shall mean and include any worker employed in charge of a berth or jetty.

"Wharfinger, Public Works supervisor," shall mean and include any worker employed in charge of a berth or jetty, and also acts as Public Works supervisor.

"Union" shall mean the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia, Industrial Union of Workers, W.A. Branch.

"Minister" shall mean the Minister for the North-West.

## 5.—Hours of Duty.

(a) The maximum number of hours to constitute a week's work shall not exceed forty (40) and shall be worked as mutually agreed upon by the Minister and the Union.

(b) (i) The Minister may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates, and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(b) (ii) The Union or worker or workers covered by this Agreement shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

## 6.—Overtime.

Overtime shall mean all time worked outside the ordinary hours of duty, and shall be paid for as follows:—

(a) Week Days.—For time worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day—time and a quarter from ordinary finishing time until midnight.

Time worked between midnight and normal starting time shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(b) Saturdays.—Where forty (40) hours' work for the week has been completed, excess time worked on Saturday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter for the first four (4) hours and time and a half thereafter. Provided that time worked on Saturday, which is necessary to complete the ordinary working week of forty (40) hours shall be paid for at the rate of ordinary time.

(c) Sundays.—All work performed on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(d) Public Holidays.—All work performed on public holidays as prescribed in clause 9 hereof shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

## 7.—Wages.

The basic wage hereinafter referred to shall be as determined from time to time by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, but at the date of operation of the Agreement was £12 4s. 2d.

## 8.—Higher Duties.

Where a worker is called to relieve a wharfinger or wharfinger Public Works Supervisor for a period exceeding one (1) week he shall be paid an additional 30s. per week.

## 9.—Holidays.

The following days or the days observed in lieu thereof shall be observed as holidays and be paid for, namely, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

## 10.—Annual Leave.

Each worker shall be granted leave of absence on full pay for three weeks in each year, same to be accumulated and taken every two years. Where the period of service is less than twelve months the worker shall be entitled to holiday pay in proportion as the period of service is to the full period of twelve months.

## 11.—Long Service Leave.

(a) A worker who has completed 10 years' continuous service shall be entitled to three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months on half pay.

(b) For each subsequent period of seven years' continuous service a worker shall be entitled to an additional three calendar months' long service leave on full pay or six calendar months' on half pay.

(c) The provisions of subclauses (a) and (b) shall apply as from the 1st January, 1953, provided that previous continuous service up to that date since the date the worker's last period of long service leave became due shall only be counted in full where the conditions prescribed in relation to that previous service provide for three months' long service leave on full pay on the basis of seven years' continuous service.

Where such previous service would only entitle the worker to three months' long service leave on full pay on the basis of 10 years' continuous service then the first 18 months of such previous service shall not be counted.

(d) Continuous service shall not include the period during which a worker is on long service leave or any period exceeding two weeks a worker is absent on leave without pay or any service a worker may have had before reaching the age of 18 years.

(e) A worker who resigns or is dismissed shall not be entitled to long service leave or payment for long service leave other than the leave that had actually accrued to him prior to the date on which he resigned or the date of the offence for which he was dismissed.

(f) Any public holidays occurring during the period in which a worker is on long service leave will be treated as part of the long service leave, and extra days in lieu thereof shall not be granted.

(g) Long service leave shall be taken as it falls due at the convenience of the department, but the employer may approve the accumulation of long service leave not exceeding six months in any particular case.

(h) A lump sum payment for long service leave accrued in accordance with this clause and for pro rata long service leave shall be made in the following cases:—

(i) To a worker who retires at or over the age of 60 years, or who is retired on the grounds of ill health, provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the worker has completed not less than 12 months' continuous service.

(ii) To a worker who is retired for any other cause provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the worker had completed not less than three years' continuous service before the date of his retirement.

(iii) To the widow of the worker or to such other person as may be approved by the employer in the event of the death of a worker: Provided that no payment shall be made for pro rata long service leave unless the worker had completed not less than 12 months' continuous service prior to the date of his death.

(i) The calculation of the amounts due for long service leave accrued and for pro rata long service leave shall be made at the rate of salary of a worker at the time of retirement, resignation or death, whichever applies. No such payment shall exceed the equivalent of 12 months' salary.

#### 12.—Sick Leave.

A worker shall be entitled to payment of wages for any absence from his employment on the ground of personal ill health for one-sixth (1/6th) of a week's pay per month during each year of service. Any absence through such ill health, except as hereinafter provided, shall be limited to two (2) weeks' wages in each calendar year: Provided that a worker with at least two (2) years' of service who produces to his employer a medical certificate that absence from his employment on the ground of personal ill health necessitates a longer absence than the period allowed shall be entitled to the equivalent of four (4) weeks' wages in each calendar year.

Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer or his representative of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) consecutive working days or more. No payment will be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect or misconduct.

This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

#### 13.—Engagement.

The engagement of any worker shall be terminated by one month's notice on either side, excepting that a worker, being guilty of gross misconduct or neglect of duty may be instantly dismissed or suspended and shall not be entitled to any such notice or payment in lieu.

#### 14.—Preference of Employment.

All workers shall be members of the Union: Provided that any worker who at the time of engagement is not a member of such union shall become a member thereof within 14 days of such engagement, and provided also, that the union shall not refuse to accept as a member any such worker who is eligible, and applies in the manner prescribed, under the rules of the union to become a member thereof.

#### 15.—District Allowance.

District allowance as specified below shall be paid to workers stationed at—

#### 16.—Time and Wages Record.

Records shall be kept by the department showing the name of each worker under this Agreement, the nature of the work performed, the hours worked each day, and the amount of wages received each pay. The said record shall be open to the inspection of an accredited representative of the union during working hours.

#### 17.—Accrued Rights.

No privileges or concessions at present enjoyed by the workers shall, unless expressly provided herein, be varied or cancelled solely by reason of the provisions of this Agreement.

#### 18.—Area.

The area covered by this Agreement shall be the whole of the premises controlled by, vested in, or for the time being occupied by the Harbour and Light Department at the ports on the North-West coast of Western Australia.

#### 19.—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of three years from the date hereof.

THE Court of Arbitration doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the industrial dispute between the abovenamed parties:—

Award.

1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Building Trades Award 1953" and replaces Awards numbered 65 of 1947, 16 of 1947, 28 of 1946, 63 of 1947, 73 of 1947, 15 of 1948, and 25 of 1947, as amended.

## 3.—Definitions.

(a) "Bricklayer" means a worker engaged in bricklaying, brickcutting, firework (including kiln work), furnaces or furnace work of any description, setting cement bricks, cement blocks and cement pressed work, setting coke slabs or coke bricks, or plaster partition blocks, or any other work which comes or which may be adjudged to come within the scope of brick work generally.

"Rubble waller" means a worker who does all or any of the following classes of work whether hammer dressed or sawn:—

- (i) Foundation work.
- (ii) Building random rubble uncoursed; or building squared rubble in courses or regular coursed rubble; and dressing quoins or shoddies in connection with any such work;

but this definition shall not of itself be taken to prejudice or affect the right of any other classes of tradesmen or workers to do any class or kind of work they have hitherto been accustomed to do.

(b) "Builders' labourers." For the purpose of this Award, builders' labourers are divided into three (3) classes as follows:—

## Class 1—

- (a) Scaffolders, riggers, dogmen, gear hands.
- (b) Workers engaged in underpinning and timbering basements.
- (c) A worker engaged in the finishing of granolithic surfaces which can be completed by him in sixteen (16) hours' working time or less.

## Class 2—

- (a) Hod carriers, mortar mixers, persons wheeling to and from the lift or engaged in filling boxes with materials to be lifted with winch, hoist, elevator or crane required for serving bricklayers, plasterers or masons.
- (b) Workers engaged in the erection of steel stanchions, girders, principals and the erection of steel structural work when such work is part of the contractor's contract and under his direct control.
- (c) Workers engaged on furnace work and bakers' ovens.
- (d) Workers engaged in mixing, preparing and delivering of materials used hot, such as bitumen, Trinidad and other similar patented materials.

- (e) Workers engaged in the setting and jointing of pipes for sewerage or storm water drainage.
- (f) Drainage workers engaged in connection with building operations.
- (g) Workers engaged in the timbering of shafts, pits or wells in or around buildings.
- (h) Workers engaged in the preparation of granolithic surfaces.
- (i) Workers engaged in the mixing of plastic materials and the cleaning up of floors and woodwork after the application of such materials.
- (j) Workers engaged in preparing or bending or placing into position steel reinforcements in concrete in connection with building operations.
- (k) Workers engaged in using a jackhammer.

## Class 3—

Workers engaged in:—

- (a) mixing, preparing or delivering or packing of concrete in connection with the erection of structures or buildings;
- (b) the demolishing and removing of buildings;
- (c) clearing, excavating or levelling off of sites for buildings when such work is under the building contractor's contract and under his direct control;
- (d) road construction work in connection with approaches to buildings inside the building line (other than road construction work governed by any Award of the Court of Arbitration or Agreement registered with that Court);
- (e) general labouring comprising men engaged as builders' labourers not included under the two (2) previous classifications.

## (c) Carpentry and joinery—

(i) "Carpenter and joiner" means a worker engaged upon the erection, repair, ornamentation, and demolition of work in wood for re-erection, or of any form of construction work in wood, and upon the work usually done by carpenters and joiners in any engineering or millwright shop or yard, the building of bridges, jetties and/or wharves, or the fixing of any other work in wood, metal or plastic usually done by carpenters and joiners in hospitals, mills, freezing works, cool stores, and all other places where carpenters and joiners are usually employed, and upon the making, preparing and fixing of any other material usually used in joinery or construction necessitating the use of carpenters' tools or machines in lieu thereof, including—

- (a) metal ceilings, the fixing of the following asbestos products—plain and corrugated sheets, gutters, downpipes, ridgings, rain heads, ventilators and skylights, fascia and barge-boards.

- (b) metal shop fronts and fittings;
- (c) the setting out and laying of wood blocks or parquet flooring;

- (d) all prefabricated buildings in wood construction in factories or on site.

(ii) "Setter out" means a carpenter and joiner who sets out work (other than wood blocks or parquet flooring) for three (3) or more other carpenters and joiners.

(iii) "Detail worker" means a carpenter and joiner who sets out and works upon staircases, bar, kitchen or office fittings or any similar detail work from architects' plans or blue prints.

## (d) Painting—

(i) "Painter" means a worker engaged in any manner whatsoever in connection with—

- (a) the painting of buildings of any nature, fences, petrol or oil containers of over fifty (50) gallons' capacity, bridges (whether constructed of iron or wood, or partly of iron and partly of wood), wireless masts or flagpoles when erected; or

- (b) graining, paperhanging, decorating, glazing, marbling, gilding, putty-glazing, kalsomining, distemping, colour washing (but not lime washing, except where the lime wash is mixed with colour), staining, varnishing, plastic relief, stripping off of old papers, removing of old paint or varnish; and
- (c) the preparation of all work connected with any of the above branches of the trade, and of all materials required for any of the above branches of the trade;

but the term shall not include one worker, who is employed for the purpose of mixing plastic material with its necessary vehicle and cleaning up floors and wood work after the application of plastic relief, and such worker shall be classed as a builders' labourer.

"Lime washing" means the application to surfaces by means of a spray or brush of lime which has been slacked down with water or binder.

(i) "Glazier" means a worker who—

- (a) fits and fixes leadlights and stained windows into prepared positions; or
- (b) cuts glass or any of its kindred products, including vitrolite, and/or fits and fixes it either with putty or beads (either nailed or screwed) into any place prepared for its inception by a tradesman;
- (c) masks and/or cuts and/or sandblasts, but does not include a worker engaged as a designer, who also performs the work hereinbefore referred to in this paragraph.

Provided that nothing in this definition shall apply to work done by shop salesman, picture frame or furniture makers, or to any other worker who is at the date of this Award bound by any Industrial Award of the Court of Arbitration or Industrial Agreement made under the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, and registered in the Court of Arbitration.

(iii) "Signwriter" means a worker who, besides having a knowledge of painting, kalsomining, staining, varnishing, and limewashing, does any of the following work:—

- (a) Lettering of every description, size or shape applied by brush on any surface or material which, without limiting its meaning, shall include stone, wood, iron, metal, brick, cement, glass (plain or fancy), canvas, paper, calico, sheeting, bunting, silk, satin, wire blinds.
- (b) Designing for windows, posters, show window and theatre displays, honour rolls, illuminated addresses, neon signs, stencils, display banners.
- (c) Gilding, i.e., the application of gold, silver, aluminium or any metal leaf to any surface.
- (d) Designing and laying-out of cut-out displays of all descriptions, either pictorial, scenic or lettering.
- (e) Screen process work, i.e., the designing, setting up and the operation for duplication of signs on any material whether of paper, fabric, metal, wood, glass or any similar material.

(e) Plastering—

"Plasterer" means a worker employed or usually employed on plastering work.

"Plastering work" shall mean—

- (i) All internal and external plastering and cementing, including hard wall plaster and texture work where the materials used in such texture work consist only of plaster or cement or both.
- (ii) Wood lathing and metal lathing or any similar or other substitute which may be used as a ground for plastering work; and
- (iii) the fixing of precast plaster or any other kind of plaster required to be finished off with plastered joints.
- (iv) The fixing of pressed cement work and ornaments and plaster partition blocks.
- (v) Plastering in sewers, septic tanks, water channels, and relining of pipes.

- (vi) The fixing of plain and ornamental tiles on walls or floors.
- (vii) The top dressing of concrete work finished in cement, granolithic, or patent colouring, and all cement composition work and plain or fancy paving where such work is done by workers engaged or employed as plasterers.
- (viii) The fixing and laying of cork or substitutes such as solomit in cool chambers and in refrigeration chambers.
- (ix) The working of fiintcote where used with sand cement and/or granulated cork, and/or sawdust.

The following work is not included in the foregoing definition:—

- (1) Work authorised to be done by workers under any other Award or Industrial Agreement.
- (2) Work done by plumbers.

(f) Plumbing—

"Plumber" means a worker employed or usually employed in executing any plumbing, gas fitting, pipefitting, or domestic engineering work, or who executes any work in or in connection with—

- (i) sheet lead, galvanised iron or other classes of sheet metal generally used by plumbers;
- (ii) the fixing of lead, wrought, cast or sheet iron, copper, brass or other classes of pipe work including earthenware pipes, ventilating or air-conditioning appliances;
- (iii) water (hot or cold), steam (other than for power purposes), gas, air, oil for heating or cooking purposes, vacuum systems and sewerage installations;
- (iv) house, ship, sanitary, chemical and/or general plumbing;
- (v) fire service work;
- (vi) fitting and fixing asbestos corrugated sheets, guttering, down pipes, ridging, rain heads, ventilators, skylights, fascia and barge boards;
- (vii) irrigation installations.

(g) Stonemasonry—

"Stonemason" means a worker who cuts by hand and/or fixes all classes of natural stone that has to be cut to a mould or template, or which has to be proven by a square or straight edge or set to a level or line.

The term "stonemason" shall also include a worker who fixes manufactured stone to the facade of a building.

"Natural stone" includes granite, trachite, slate, bluestone, limestone, marble and sandstone.

#### 4.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to all employers in the industries carried on by the respondents as set out in the Schedule of Respondents attached hereto in respect of workers coming within the classifications set out in clause 9 hereof and of apprentices in the trades to which apprenticeship is provided. Provided that it shall not apply to the painting of ships.

#### 5.—Area.

This Award shall operate throughout the State of Western Australia, except the land and premises occupied or used by any Government Department, trading concern or instrumentality.

#### 6.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of three (3) years from the commencement of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

#### 7.—Contract of Service.

One (1) day's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the contract of service of any worker, other than a casual worker (where the notice shall be one (1) hour) or an apprentice.

#### 8.—Preference to Unionists.

(1) In this clause the term "unionist" means a worker who is a member of the applicant union and the term "non-unionist" means a worker who is not a member of the applicant union.

(2) Unionists shall be given preference of employment and an employer who employs a "non-unionist" commits a breach of this Award if during such employment there are unionists competent to do the work and available and ready to perform it.

(3) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (2) hereof, it shall not be a breach of this clause for an employer to employ a non-unionist if the latter, within 14 days of the commencement of his employment, makes application to join the union, and thereafter, if accepted, completes such application.

(4) Any party bound by this Award may apply to cancel or amend this clause after the expiration of six (6) calendar months from the date of the Award, but not more than one (1) such application on behalf of the applicant and one (1) on behalf of the respondent shall be entertained in any period of six (6) months from the date of its commencement.

(5) If during the continuance of this Award the Union, or the majority of the members of the Union, shall be concerned in or take part in anything in the nature of a strike the benefit of this clause shall ipso facto cease and determine.

(6) If any employment subsist or continue to subsist in breach of this clause both the employer and the worker concerned shall be liable to a penalty for the breach.

(7) This clause shall not apply to an employer (or the workers employed by him) whose principal business is not the construction, demolition, maintenance, renovation or repair of buildings.

#### 9.—Wages.

The minimum rate of wages payable to workers under this Award (other than duly registered apprentices) shall be:—

The employer shall supply all necessary tools for the use of stonemasons except when engaged on building construction, when the worker, if required to supply his own tools, shall receive a tool allowance at the rate of four shillings (4s.) per week.

(f) Casual workers. Any worker who is employed for a period of less than one (1) week (exclusive of hours of overtime worked) shall be classed as a casual worker and shall be paid five per cent. (5%) extra for the time employed.			

\*Note.—1: The allowance for lost time, etc., shall be increased or decreased by 7% of any increase or decrease in the wage (i.e., basic wage and margin).

2: Workers usually employed in or about the employer's business premises shall not be entitled to the allowance prescribed for lost time, etc., or to the disabilities allowance, when working therein, or when sent out from there to outside work.

#### 10.—Payment of Wages.

(1) When a worker is discharged he shall then be paid all wages due to him.

(2) An employer shall not keep more than one (1) day's pay in hand.

(3) Payment of wages shall be made on or before Friday of each week at or before the usual finishing time on the normal pay day of each week: Provided that on country work, this and the preceding subclause may be varied by mutual agreement in writing between the employer and any worker, but no payment shall be delayed for more than one (1) month.

(4) Wages shall not be paid in the meal time.

#### 11.—Piecework.

No work coming under this Award shall be performed by any worker at piecework or labour only rates or at the rates for labour and material unless the rates for such work shall have been fixed by the Court.

No person who is a member of the applicant union shall, except in the capacity of a servant or worker, enter into any contract to execute any works involving service of a kind for which the rates and conditions are fixed by this Award.

#### 12.—Terms of Service.

(a) Each worker shall faithfully serve his employer on the work in which he is employed, in compliance with the terms and conditions of this Award.

(b) A worker employed by an employer shall not without the express consent of such employer and the union accept temporary or other employment with any other employer whilst in such employ, nor shall such worker undertake a contract or sub-contract to perform any other work whilst his employment by the first mentioned employer continues.

#### 13.—Leading Hands.

(a) Any worker referred to in paragraphs (i) and (ii) of subclause (b) of clause 9 hereof who is placed in charge for not less than one (1) day of—

(i) not less than three (3) and not more than six (6) other workers referred to in the said paragraphs shall be paid two shillings and ninepence (2s. 9d.) per day extra;

(ii) more than six (6) and not more than twelve (12) other workers referred to in the said paragraphs shall be paid four shillings (4s.) per day extra;



- (iii) more than twelve (12) other workers referred to in the said paragraphs shall be paid five shillings and ninepence (5s. 9d.) per day extra.

Where the leading hand works under the supervision of a foreman or of the employer for the major portion of the day, the extra rates set out in this subclause shall be halved.

(b) Builders' labourers: A worker who is in charge in a shop or on a job of three (3) or more other labourers in his trade or calling for at least one (1) day shall, whilst in charge, be classed as a "leading hand labourer" and be paid one shilling and threepence (1s. 3d.) per day extra.

#### 14.—Special Rates and Provisions.

(1) Workers employed on the following work shall be paid at the rate of twopence (2d.) per hour in addition to the prescribed rate whilst so employed:—

- (a) Working for more than one (1) hour continuously in the shade in places where the temperature is raised by artificial means to between 115 and 130 degrees F.
- (b) Bricklayers employed on chimney shafts over fifty (50) feet from the ground. For every additional fifty (50) feet or fraction thereof an additional twopence (2d.) per hour shall be paid.
- (c) Stonemasons renovating or cleaning down old stone work on buildings.

(2) Workers employed on the following work shall be paid at the rate of fourpence (4d.) per hour in addition to the prescribed rate whilst so employed:—

- (a) Working on a boat-type or swinging scaffold. "Swinging scaffold" means any scaffold suspended from overhead gear and not supported from the ground and which, by reason of the operations carried out on it or by reason of wind force or vibration is likely to swing or sway. (No employer shall permit an apprentice who has served less than two (2) years to work on a boat-type or swinging scaffold and no such apprentice shall work on any such scaffold).
- (b) Excessively dirty work which is likely to render the worker or his clothes dirtier than the normal run of work (with a minimum payment as for four (4) hours when employed on such work).
- (c) Insulating work in an average temperature of forty-five (45) degrees F. or under.
- (d) Working for more than one (1) hour continuously in the shade in places where the temperature is raised by artificial means to exceed 130 degrees F.
- (e) Working in dust-laden atmosphere caused by the use of materials for insulating, deafening or pugging work (as, for instance, pumice, charcoal, silicate of cotton or any other substitute).
- (f) Working in any confined space in and around a building. "Confined space" means one of which the dimensions are such that the workman must work in an unusually stooped or cramped position or without adequate ventilation or where confinement within a limited space is productive of unusual discomfort to him.
- (g) Engaged in repairs to sewers.
- (h) Builders' labourers carrying tools or materials which exceed thirty pounds (30lb) in weight or which are by their nature or size awkward to carry on a ladder or stair run exceeding twelve (12) feet.
- (i) Plumbers doing sanitary plumbing work on repairs to sewer drainage or wastepipe services in any of the following places—
  - (i) Infectious and contagious diseases hospitals or any block or portion of a hospital used for the care of, or treatment of patients suffering from any infectious or contagious diseases.
  - (ii) Morgues.

(3) Workers employed on the following work shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the prescribed rate whilst so employed:—

- (a) While working in any place where water is continually dripping so that the worker's clothing becomes wet with soakage, or where there is water under foot so that the worker's feet become wet. This shall not apply to natural surfaces made wet by rain.
- (b) Repairs to ovens or furnaces or on underpinning.

(4) Plasterers using flintcote shall be paid threepence (3d.) per hour extra, except when flintcote is applied by hawk and trowel to walls and ceilings when the rate shall be sixpence (6d.) per hour extra.

(5) Stands for plasterers' mortar boards—Stands for mortar boards not less than two feet six inches (2ft. 6in.) from the ground, or where practicable and safe from a scaffold level, shall be provided for the plasterer by the employer when requested.

(6) All work done by plumbers on a ship of any class shall be paid for at the rate of ninepence (9d.) per hour in addition to the rates set out in clause 9—

- (a) whilst under way; or
- (b) in wet places or confined spaces; or
- (c) in a ship which has done one trip or more, in a fume or dust laden atmosphere, in oil fuel tanks, in bilges, under engine-rooms or stokeholds or when cleaning blockages in soil pipes or waste pipes or repairing brine pipes.

For the purpose of this paragraph "wet place" means one in which the clothing of the worker necessarily is wetted to an uncomfortable degree or one in which water accumulates underfoot.

(7) Well work: A plumber required to enter a well thirty feet (30ft.) or more in depth for the purpose in the first place of examining the pump, pipe, or any other work connected therewith, shall receive an amount of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) for such examination, and one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per hour extra thereafter for fixing, renewing, or repairing such work.

(8) Permit work: (a) Any licensed journeyman plumber called upon to use his license for his employer on work for which a permit from the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Department is necessary in the first instance, shall for such time as he is himself actually engaged upon such work, pursuant to such permit, be paid three shillings (3s.) per hour extra.

(b) Where a licensed plumber is not called upon to use his license for the full number of hours in the week he shall be paid an allowance of three pounds (£3) per week in addition to the rate prescribed in clause 9.

(9) Plumbers on sewerage work: Plumbers, or apprentices in their third, fourth and fifth year, on work involving the opening up of house drains or wastepipes for the purpose of clearing blockages or for any other purpose, or work involving the cleaning out of septic tanks and dry wells, shall be paid a minimum of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per day in addition to the prescribed rate whilst so employed.

(10) Stonemasons putting in foundations for memorials in cemeteries shall be paid seven shillings and sixpence (7s. 6d.) extra for each foundation. Provided that this shall not apply where concrete piers are put in with post hole diggers.

(11) Stonemasons working on the wall (cottage work and foundation work in coastal stone excepted) shall be paid twopence (2d.) per hour extra.

(12) Setter out—A "setter out" in a joiner's shop shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per day extra above the minimum rate hereinbefore prescribed for his trade, but where a worker qualifies for an allowance under this paragraph and also under clause 13, he shall be entitled to whichever allowance is the higher, but not to both.

(13) Detail worker—A joiner engaged on detail work shall be paid one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per day extra above the minimum rate hereinbefore prescribed for his trade, but where a worker qualifies for an allowance under this paragraph and also under clause 13, he shall be entitled to



whichever allowance is the higher but not to both.

(14) Grinding facilities—The employer shall provide a suitable grinding stone, together with the required power (hand or driven) where such grinding is reasonably necessary for the use of workers other than casual workers (and where an emery stone is supplied it shall be not less than one and one-quarter inches in width), or at the option of such workers, pay the sum of one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per week extra where there is no such grinding stone on the job available for the use of workers.

(15) Chemical and manure works—In chemical and manure works journeymen and builders' labourers engaged in all repairs and renewals on superphosphate mixing plants and pyrites furnaces shall receive two pence (2d.) per hour additional to the rate prescribed.

(16) Glaziers cutting masks—Glaziers cutting masks shall be paid sixpence (6d.) per day extra. When employed on sandblasting, glaziers shall be paid one shilling (1s.) per day extra. A glazier who cuts masks and sandblasts on the same day shall receive one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per day extra.

(17) Lead paint surfaces not to be dry-rubbed, etc.—No surface painted with lead paint shall be rubbed down or scraped by a dry process.

(18) Width of brushes—All paint brushes shall not exceed five (5) inches in width and no kalsomine brush shall be more than seven (7) inches in width.

(19) Meals not to be taken in paint shop—No worker shall be permitted to have a meal in any paint shop or place where paint is stored or used.

(20) Spray painting (painters)—(a) lead paint shall not be applied by a spray to the interior of any building.

(b) All workers (including apprentices) applying paint by spraying shall be provided with overalls and respirators by the employers.

(c) Where from the nature of the paint or substance used in spraying, a respirator would be of little or no practical use in preventing the absorption of fumes or materials from substances used by a worker in spray painting, the worker shall be paid a special allowance of one shilling and three-pence (1s. 3d.) per day.

(21) Water and Soap—Water and soap shall be provided in each shop or on each job by the employer for the use of painters.

(22) First Aid Outfit—Where ten (10) or more workers are employed on a job the employer shall provide a supply of bandages and antiseptic dressing for use in cases of accident.

(23) Provision of Boiling Water—The employer shall, where practicable, provide boiling water for the use of his workers on each job at lunch time.

(24) Attendants on Ladders—No worker shall work on a ladder at a height of over twenty (20) feet from the ground when such ladder is standing in any street, way or lane where traffic is passing to and fro without an assistant on the ground.

(25) Sanitary Arrangements—The employer shall comply with the provisions of section 102 of the Health Act, 1911-1952.

#### 15.—Inclement Weather.

Notwithstanding the provisions of clause 31 (Breakdowns, etc.) each worker (other than a casual worker) shall be paid an allowance at ordinary rates for time lost through inclement weather, subject to the following conditions:—

(a) That such allowance shall not exceed the equivalent of eight (8) hours' pay in any one week;

(b) that weather shall not be regarded as inclement for the purposes of this clause unless the employer, or his representative on the job, and the employee, or a representative of the employee, agree that it shall be so regarded. Failing such agreement, weather shall not be regarded as inclement and work shall continue;

(c) that any intermission of work owing to inclement weather, regarded as such aforesaid, shall immediately cease and work shall be immediately resumed on the employer or his representative calling for a resumption of work;

(d) that an employee shall not be entitled to payment as provided for in this clause unless he remains on the job until a decision to cease work for the day has been made by agreement between the employer or his representative and the employee or his representative;

(e) that the intermission of work by employees who would be exposed to or working in inclement weather, so regarded in accordance with this clause, shall not be a ground for intermission of work in places where employees are not so exposed to or are not called upon to work in such inclement weather.

#### 16.—Change Room.

Where no other reasonably suitable place is available, the principal contractor shall (unless it is impracticable to do so) provide on each job a suitable and convenient change room where the workers may change their clothes. The change room shall not be used for storing lime, cement or other similar materials.

#### 17.—Protection of Workers' Tools.

(a) Carpenters and Joiners.—The employer shall provide a waterproof and reasonably secure place where the workers' tools (when not in use) may be locked up apart from the employer's plant or material.

(b) Other Workers Except Builders' Labourer.—The employer shall, when practicable, provide a reasonably secure place on each job for the safe-keeping of the workers' tools when not in use.

(c) The employer shall indemnify a worker in respect of any tools of the worker stolen, if the employer's failure to comply with this clause is a material factor contributing to the stealing of the tools.

#### 18.—Excess Fares and Travelling Allowance.

(a) The employer shall pay all fares actually and reasonably incurred by a worker in excess of one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per day and which are incurred in travelling from his usual place of residence to a job and from the job to his residence. This and the next paragraph of this clause shall not apply to a worker employed in a shop or mill, or on or about the employer's business premises, or a worker usually required to report to his employer's business premises when so required.

(b) In addition to the foregoing fares, the worker shall be paid a daily travelling allowance at the rate of fourpence (4d.) per mile for all distance necessarily travelled by him from his residence to the job and return in excess of twelve (12) miles per day: Provided that the maximum daily allowance under this subclause shall be four shillings (4s.): Provided further that if the employer provides a conveyance for more than one-half of the distance travelled, the allowance payable shall be reduced by one-half.

(c) Allowances for fares in country districts where public transport is not available shall be as mutually agreed upon between the employer and his workers and, failing such agreement, the matter may be referred to a Board of Reference for decision.

(d) Where the worker uses any kind of conveyance (including a push cycle but not including a public conveyance or a conveyance provided by the employer) the amount of fares for which the employer would have been liable in accordance with subclause (a) of this clause, if the worker had used a public conveyance, shall be paid by the employer to the worker.

(e) During the hours of work all travelling time from and to the employer's place of business or from one job to another shall be paid for by the employer at ordinary rates. The employer shall pay all fares in connection with such travelling.

(f) When a conveyance is provided by the employer and such conveyance is regularly used for the transport of workers to and from work, such conveyance shall be provided with suitable seating accommodation and weatherproof covering.

(g) Excess fares and travelling allowance shall not be payable unless notified by the worker to his employer within fourteen (14) days of their being incurred.

## 19.—Country Work.

(a) Where a worker is sent by his employer or is engaged by his employer to go to a job at such distance that he cannot return to his home each night, the employer shall provide board and lodging, or shall pay the expenses reasonably incurred by the worker for board and lodging: Provided that where the employer provides board and lodging, except that the worker is required to provide bedding, an allowance of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per week shall be paid by the employer.

(b) When any worker is required to travel at night, sleeping berth accommodation shall be provided by the employer.

(c) Time occupied in travelling (including waiting for transport connections) up to a maximum of eight (8) hours each day shall be paid for at ordinary rates. Time occupied after arriving at the destination awaiting commencement of work during ordinary working hours shall be deemed to be time occupied in travelling.

(d) The employer shall pay all fares in connection with such travelling and shall pay a meal allowance of four shillings (4s.) for each ordinary meal actually and reasonably required during such travelling. Provided that fares shall not be payable when a worker severs his own contract of service.

(e) The employer shall provide free transport for the worker's tools. Provided that free transport for tools shall not be provided when a worker severs his own contract of service.

(f) Where a worker uses any kind of conveyance of his own in travelling, the amount of fare that would have been reasonably incurred had the worker used a public conveyance shall be paid by the employer to the worker.

(g) If a worker elects to return to his home at the week-end after three (3) months' continuous service away from home in the employ of the one employer and thereafter at the end of each three-monthly period, he shall be paid a second-class return fare on the pay day which immediately follows the date on which he returns to the job, unless travelling facilities are provided. This shall not apply where the worker has visited his home during the three-monthly period.

(h) When a worker has been engaged by the one employer for six (6) months to work at a distant place from where it was not practicable to return to his home at the end of three (3) months he shall be entitled to return at the end of six (6) months and any second-class return fares incurred by the worker shall be paid by the employer on the pay day following the worker's return to work at such distant place.

## 20.—District Allowance.

(a) In addition to the wages prescribed in clause 9 hereof, allowances shall be paid at the rates set out below to workers employed in the following areas, with the exception of the districts contained therein which are situated within a radius of ten (10) miles of Kalgoorlie, Boulder and Southern Cross, viz:—

Provided that where the employer provides or pays for board and lodging pursuant to clause 19 of this Award, the above allowances shall be halved.

(b) Camp allowance: Where workers are required to live in tents at or in the neighbourhood of the job, a tent allowance at the rate of five shillings and threepence (5s. 3d.) per week shall be paid.

(c) Pitching and striking camp: In cases where the nature of the work necessitates the pitching of a temporary camp, and when such camp is shifted to suit the requirements of the work, then the employer shall allow full pay for the actual time reasonably taken in striking and pitching camp and the erection of bunks. The employer or his representative shall decide as to what is a reasonable time for the striking and pitching, and payment shall be made accordingly. In the event of any dispute arising under this subclause, the same may be decided by the Board of Reference.

## 21.—Hours.

(a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work.

(b) Subject as hereinafter provided, such hours shall be worked on the first five (5) days of the week and eight (8) hours shall be worked on each day between the hours of 7.30 a.m. and 5 p.m., with an interval of not less than forty-five (45) minutes for lunch.

Provided however that in the case of repairs and renovations to shops or business premises where the work is likely to cause discomfort and inconvenience to the users of the premises, the foregoing hours may be altered to 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. on the first five (5) days of the week, but a shift shall not be broken except for the duration of the meal period. Where the employer avails himself of the proviso to this subclause he shall notify the union in writing within forty-eight (48) hours of the commencement of the job.

Provided further that in the case of emergency work a worker in the plumbing industry may be rostered to work on Saturday morning and such work may be counted as part of his forty-hour week. The altered starting and finishing times necessitated by such an arrangement shall be as agreed between the worker and the employer.

## 22.—Overtime.

(a) Any worker who is called to work overtime for more than two (2) hours shall be paid an allowance of three shillings (3s.) for a meal or shall be supplied by the employer with a reasonable meal in lieu of such payment.

(b) Any worker who has left the premises at which he is employed and is recalled to work after the usual ceasing time for less than one (1) hour shall receive payment for one (1) hour at overtime rates.

(c) If a worker is required to work during the recognised meal period so that the commencement of the meal period is postponed for more than half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) an hour, that worker shall receive payment at double time rates until he gets his meal.

(d) Subject to the preceding subclause, if a worker who is required to work during the recognised meal period does not in consequence obtain during the shift the full continuous meal period, or loses any portion of the meal period, he shall be paid at double time rates for the period not obtained or any portion lost.

(e) The expression "recognised meal period" means the period customarily observed as the meal period between fixed times on the job, or at the works, as the case may be, except where the time of commencement of the customary period is altered by mutual consent of the employer and the workers on a job to suit the convenience of the workers or the building proprietor, in which case the altered times shall be the basis of any rights under the preceding subclauses (c) and (d).

(f) A worker who commences work between midnight and 6 a.m. shall be paid at the rate of double time until his usual starting time and, subject thereto, all work performed outside the normal limits of the hours of labour shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first two (2) hours and double time thereafter.

Subject to the provisions of subclause (b) of this clause, for the purpose of this subclause, the normal limits of the hours of labour shall be ascertained by reference to the time of commencement and time of finishing generally observed in regard to the worker in question for the particular job on which he is engaged.

(g) Notwithstanding anything contained herein—

- (i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime and such worker shall work the overtime in accordance with such requirement.
- (ii) An organisation, party to this award, and/or a worker or workers covered by this award, shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with (i) above.
- (iii) The provisions of this subclause shall remain in operation only until otherwise determined by the Court.

#### 23.—Holidays.

(a) The following shall be regarded as holidays, but not paid holidays: The days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Annual Picnic Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

Provided that where the "Allowance for lost time, etc." is not paid in accordance with the provisions of clause 9 hereof, the holidays set out above shall be without deduction of pay.

(b) All workers required to work on the days named in subclause (a) hereof, or on any Sunday shall be paid double time rate for all time worked on any such day.

(c) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty, and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(d) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(e) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one (1) day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(f) (i) Workers receiving lost time allowance:— If after one (1) week's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period, a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-twenty-sixth (1/26th) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed week of continuous service.

(ii) Other workers: If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period, a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth (1/6th) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(g) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this award, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(h) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to sub-clause (f) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(i) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(j) "Picnic Day" shall be the fourth Monday in November of each year.

(k) For the purpose of this clause "double time rate" shall be the rate which is payable to the worker on any ordinary working day (including all allowances paid in accordance with the provisions of clause 9 hereof) multiplied by two (2).

(l) Payment for holidays and annual leave shall be at the ordinary rate as prescribed in clause 9, plus the allowances shown therein paid in accordance with the provisions of clause 9 hereof.

(m) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

#### 24.—Absence through Sickness.

This clause shall only apply where a worker is not paid the "Allowance for lost time, etc." in accordance with the provisions of clause 9 hereof.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health at the rate of one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week's pay in each calendar year.

(b) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(c) This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(d) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through any accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(e) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(f) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (e) hereof, a worker, who in any calendar year has already been allowed paid sick leave, shall not be entitled to payment for any further absence unless he produces to the employer a medical certificate stating that he was unable to attend for duty on account of personal ill-health, if such certificate is demanded by the employer.

#### 25.—Board of Reference.

(1) For the purpose of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute, the functions of:—

(a) Adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of this Award or any of them.

(b) Dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(2) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

#### 26.—Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

#### 27.—Provision of Appliances.

(a) Builders' Labourers: Employers shall provide all necessary plant and tools free of charge.

(b) Carpenters: The employer shall provide the following tools when they are required on the job—Dogs and cramps of all descriptions, bars of all descriptions, augers of all sizes, bits not ordinarily used in a brace, all hammers except claw hammers, glue pots and brushes, dowel plates, trammels, hand and thumb screws, soldering irons, spanners from three-quarters of an inch ( $\frac{3}{4}$ " ) upwards, steel tapes, asbestos cutters, and all power driven tools and machines on construction jobs.

(c) Painters: (i) The employer shall provide all tools in connection with the painting trade, excepting putty knife, strippers, scissors, duster, paper-hanging brush, roller, two (2) lining fitches, a two-foot (2') rule, hammer and hacking knife.

(ii) Signwriters shall provide themselves with a full set of pencils and fitches, rest stick, wash leather and a two foot (2') rule.

(d) Plasterers: The employer shall supply all floating rules, darbies, trammels, centres, buckets and sieves.

(e) Plumbers: (i) The following tools shall be provided by the employer—metal pots, plumbing irons, mandrils, long dummies, stocks and dies for iron and brass pipes, cutters, all tongs over twelve inches (12in.), vyces, hack saw blades, taps and chisels for brick and concrete, and the employer shall also supply all tools required for work to be performed on wrought iron and lead pipes over two inches (2in.) in diameter, and a worker shall supply only the usual kit bag of tools and blow lamp.

(ii) Plumbers shall supply themselves with all the tools set out hereunder—

Lead dresser, bending stick, bossing stick, bossing mallet, 1 set of 1½in. bobbins, 1 set of 2in. bobbins, 1 bent pin, two 1½in. mandrils, 2 2in. mandrils, 1 set 12in. snips, 1 set 10in. bent snips, 1 square, 12in., carpenter's, 1 set wiping cloths, 1 brace (ratchet), 1 set wood bits, 1 steel compass, 8in. or 9in., 1 2ft. rule carpenter's, 4in. bobbins, cane handled dummy, panel saw, ladle, hammer, bricklayer's, caulking tools, rasp, file, hack saw, gas pliers, steel float, rivet set, groover, 1 shave hook, 1 claw hammer, 1 spirit level, 1 pair pliers, cold chisel 6 to 9, plumb bob, 60ft. chalk line, wall drills, footprints 7in., footprints 12in., pointing trowel, screwdriver 10in. and 14in., bevel carpenter's, 1 crescent wrench, 10in. blowlamp, nest of keyhole saws.

(f) Bricklayers: The employer shall supply scratch combs and blades when required.

(g) A worker in receipt of a tool allowance shall provide himself with all necessary tools, kept in suitable condition for the performance of his work (other than those tools to be provided by the employer in accordance with this clause). A worker who fails to provide all such tools when required shall be guilty of a breach of this Award and shall not be entitled to the tool allowance prescribed in this Award until he complies with this clause.

#### 28.—Representative Interviewing Workers.

(a) The secretary or any authorised officer of the union or association shall be allowed free access to any job or shop at any time during the meal period, and with the consent of the employer or his foreman at any other time, to interview any of the workers if he desires to do so.

(b) The secretary or any authorised representative of the union or association shall have the right to visit and inspect any factory or works or any part thereof during the time that work is being carried on outside the ordinary working hours and to interview workers therein.

#### 29.—Record Book.

(a) The employer shall make and keep a record or records showing—

- (i) the name of each worker;
- (ii) the starting and finishing times on each day;
- (iii) the hours worked;

(iv) the wage and overtime (if any) paid;

(v) the amount of fares and travelling time paid;

(vi) taxation deductions.

(b) Such record shall be signed by the worker or a receipt completed by the worker upon receipt of his wages and such record or receipt shall be open for inspection by the secretary or other duly accredited representative of the union during working hours at the employer's business premises, and such person may take extracts therefrom.

(c) Any system of automatic recording by machines shall be deemed a record for the purposes of this clause.

#### 30.—Posting of Award and Union Notices.

No employer shall prevent an official of the workers' union from posting a copy of this Award, or any union notice, not exceeding fourteen inches (14in.) by nine inches (9in.) in a suitable place on any job.

#### 31.—Breakdowns, etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

#### 32.—Cadets.

(a) Notwithstanding anything herein contained or implied, a bona fide employer shall be permitted to appoint one (1) son (or any other nominee) as a cadet to learn all branches of the trade or calling of such employer.

(b) Only one (1) such cadet at any particular time shall be permitted any employer.

(c) This clause shall apply only to an established business employing four (4) or more journeymen.

(d) The employer of a cadet shall notify the Industrial Registrar within fourteen (14) days of his engagement. Upon receipt of such notification the Registrar shall give the unions fourteen (14) days in which to object to the employment of the cadet.

(e) On receipt of an objection, the matter shall be referred to the Court and the Court, after hearing the parties, may make such order as it thinks fit.

#### 33.—Apprentices.

(a) The term of apprenticeship shall be five (5) years.

(b) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to any employer in any branch shall be in the following proportions:—

Bricklaying, stonemasonry, plastering—As allowed under the Building Trades Apprenticeship Regulations.

Carpentry and Joinery, Plumbing—One (1) apprentice to every two (2) or fraction of two (2) journeymen employed by him provided the fraction shall not be less than one (1).

Painting, Signwriting, Glazing—One (1) apprentice to every three (3) or fraction of three (3) journeymen employed by him in that branch.

(c) Wages:

	Per cent. of the basic wage.
First six months	20
Second six months	25
Second year	35
Third year	55
Fourth year	80
Fifth year	95

Provided that where an apprentice is twenty-one (21) years of age or over at the commencement of his fifth year he shall be paid the full basic wage and that when an apprentice becomes twenty-one (21) years of age in the course of his fifth year he shall be paid the full basic wage for the period following his twenty-first birthday. Provided further that the foregoing proviso shall not apply where the apprenticeship has been revived under the Re-establishment and Employment Act, 1945 and the apprentice is in receipt of the tradesman's rate through Government supplementation.

(d) The employment of apprentices in the brick-laying, stonemasonry and plastering trades shall be governed by the provisions of the Building Trades Apprenticeship Regulations.

(e) The employment of apprentices in all other trades under this award shall be governed by the Court's 1941 Standard Apprenticeship Regulations, subject to the following amendments:—

(i) Delete all words after the word "served" in line 3 of regulation 31.

(ii) Add to regulation 37 the following sub-clause:—

(c) An apprentice shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident or sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(iii) Delete regulation 40.

(f) The employer shall be under no obligation to teach an apprentice to carpentry and joinery any work in connection with metal ceilings where that work is not performed by such employer.

(g) A tool allowance of the same amount as is payable to tradesmen shall be paid to apprentices (except in the stonemasonry trade) in their third, fourth and fifth years of apprenticeship.

(h) The employer shall provide each apprentice in the painting, signwriting and glazing trades with tools as set out in the Arbitration Court's Syllabus of Training during the first year (i.e., putty knife, stripper and duster).

(i) No apprentice to the painting or signwriting trades shall be registered in accordance with the provisions of this award until such time as he has lodged with the Registrar a certificate to the effect that he does not suffer any disability by reason of colour blindness.

#### 34.—Liberty to Apply.

Liberty to apply at any time is granted—

- to all parties in respect of apprentice's wages;
- to the employers to delete glaziers from the award;
- to the employers to apply to vary the provisions to paragraph (b) of clause 21 (Hours);
- to the Painters' Union for an increase in the margins and allowances payable to glaziers;
- to all parties in respect of travelling allowance (clause 18 (b)).

THE Court of Arbitration doth hereby make the  
 following Award in connection with the industrial  
 dispute between the abovenamed parties:—

#### Award.

##### 1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Roof Tile  
 Fixers' Award, 1953," and replaces Award No. 9  
 of 1945 as amended.

##### 3.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to all workers employed  
 to do work on or in connection with the laying  
 and fixing of roofing tiles or slates, also battens,  
 the bedding and laying of hips, ridge capping and  
 roof accessories and the necessary wiring or nailing  
 of such tiles or slates.

##### 4.—Area.

This Award shall apply throughout the South-  
 West Land Division.

##### 5.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of  
 three (3) years from the commencement of the  
 first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

##### 6.—Contract of Service.

For the purpose of convenience, the wages set  
 out in clause 7 hereof are stated on a weekly basis,  
 but it shall be understood between the parties  
 that the contract of service shall be a daily one,  
 terminable on either side by one (1) day's notice  
 and the worker shall, in the event of notice, be  
 entitled to payment up to the hour when such  
 notice expires.

(d) A worker commencing in the industry after  
 his eighteenth (18th) birthday shall, after serving  
 three (3) years in the industry, become entitled  
 to submit himself for a qualifying test by his  
 employer and on passing the test shall become  
 entitled to the tile fixer's margin. A worker com-  
 mencing in the industry before his eighteenth  
 (18th) birthday shall become entitled to the test  
 after having attained the age of twenty-one (21)  
 years, provided he has then served at least three  
 (3) years in the industry. Any adult worker who  
 has not passed the qualifying test shall be classed  
 as an improver and paid accordingly.

##### 8.—Excess Fares and Travelling Allowance.

(a) The employer shall pay all fares actually  
 and reasonably incurred by a worker in excess  
 of one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) per day  
 and which are incurred in travelling from his  
 usual place of residence to a job and from the job  
 to his residence. This and the next paragraph of  
 this clause shall not apply to a worker on any day  
 on which he is required to report for work to  
 his employer's business premises.



(b) In addition to the foregoing fares, the worker shall be paid a daily travelling allowance at the rate of fourpence (4d.) per mile for all distance necessarily travelled by him from his residence to the job and return in excess of twelve (12) miles per day: Provided that the maximum daily allowance under this subclause shall be four shillings (4s.): Provided further that if the employer provides a conveyance for more than one-half of the distance travelled, the allowance payable shall be reduced by one-half.

(c) Allowances for fares in country districts where public transport is not available shall be as mutually agreed upon between the employer and his workers and, failing such agreement, the matter may be referred to a Board of Reference for decision.

(d) Where the worker uses any kind of conveyance (including a push cycle but not including a public conveyance or a conveyance provided by the employer) the amount of fares for which the employer would have been liable in accordance with subclause (a) of this clause, if the worker had used a public conveyance, shall be paid by the employer to the worker.

(e) During the hours of work all travelling time from and to the employer's place of business or from one job to another shall be paid for by the employer at ordinary rates. The employer shall pay all fares in connection with such travelling.

(f) When a conveyance is provided by the employer and such conveyance is regularly used for the transport of workers to and from work, such conveyance shall be provided with suitable seating accommodation and weatherproof covering.

(g) Excess fares and travelling allowance shall not be payable unless notified by the worker to his employer within fourteen (14) days of their being incurred.

#### 9.—Country Work.

(a) Where a worker is sent by his employer or is engaged by his employer to go to a job at such distance that he cannot return to his home each night, the employer shall provide board and lodging, or shall pay the expenses reasonably incurred by the worker for board and lodging: Provided that where the employer provides board and lodging, except that the worker is required to provide bedding, an allowance of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per week shall be paid by the employer.

(b) When any worker is required to travel at night, sleeping berth accommodation shall be provided by the employer.

(c) Time occupied in travelling (including waiting for transport connections) up to a maximum of eight (8) hours each day shall be paid for at ordinary rates. Time occupied after arriving at the destination awaiting commencement of work during ordinary working hours shall be deemed to be time occupied in travelling.

(d) The employer shall pay all fares in connection with such travelling and shall pay a meal allowance of four shillings (4s.) for each ordinary meal actually and reasonably required during such travelling. Provided that fares shall not be payable when a worker severs his own contract of service.

(e) The employer shall provide free transport for the worker's tools. Provided that free transport for tools shall not be provided when a worker severs his own contract of service.

(f) Where a worker uses any kind of conveyance of his own in travelling, the amount of fare that would have been reasonably incurred had the worker used a public conveyance shall be paid by the employer to the worker.

(g) If a worker elects to return to his home at the week-end after three (3) months' continuous service away from home in the employ of the one employer and thereafter at the end of each three-monthly period, he shall be paid a second-class return fare on the pay day which immediately follows the date on which he returns to the job, unless travelling facilities are provided. This shall not apply where the worker has visited his home during the three-monthly period.

(h) When a worker has been engaged by the one employer for six (6) months to work at a distant place from where it was not practicable to return to his home at the end of three (3) months he

shall be entitled to return at the end of six (6) months and any second-class return fares incurred by the worker shall be paid by the employer on the pay day following the worker's return to work at such distant place.

#### 10.—Hours.

Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work to be worked in five (5) days.

#### 11.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in any week beyond the hours referred to in clause 10 hereof shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) Any worker who is called to work overtime for more than two (2) hours shall be paid an allowance of three shillings (3s.) for a meal or shall be supplied by the employer with a reasonable meal in lieu of such payment.

(c) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—

(i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(ii) No organisation, party to this Award or worker or workers covered by this Award shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

(iii) This subclause shall remain in operation only until otherwise determined by the Court.

#### 12.—Holidays and Annual Leave.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall, subject as hereinafter provided, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Union Picnic Day (on a date to be agreed upon between the employers and the Union), Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) All workers required to work on the days named in subclause (a) hereof, or on any Sunday, shall be paid double time rate for all time worked on any such day.

(c) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(d) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(e) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(f) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth ( $\frac{1}{6}$ th) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(g) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(h) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (f) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(i) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

#### 13.—Absence through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health at the rate of one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week's pay in each calendar year.

(b) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(c) This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(d) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through any accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(e) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(f) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (e) hereof, a worker, who in any calendar year, has already been allowed paid sick leave shall not be entitled to payment for any further absence unless he produces to the employer a medical certificate stating that he was unable to attend for duty on account of personal ill-health, if such certificate is demanded by the employer.

#### 14.—Board of Reference.

(a) For the purpose of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute, the functions of—

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve the interpretation of the provisions of this Award or any of them;
- (ii) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

#### 15.—Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

#### 16.—Record Book.

(a) The employer shall make and keep a record or records showing—

- (i) the name of each worker;
- (ii) the starting and finishing times on each day;
- (iii) the hours worked;
- (iv) the wage and overtime (if any) paid;
- (v) the amount of fares and travelling time paid;
- (vi) taxation deductions.

(b) Such record shall be signed by the worker or a receipt completed by the worker upon receipt of his wages and such record or receipt shall be open for inspection by the secretary or other duly accredited representative of the Union during working hours at the employer's business premises, and such person may take extracts therefrom.

(c) Any system of automatic recording by machines shall be deemed a record for the purposes of this clause.

#### 17.—Breakdowns, etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it or by any other association or Union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause, other than wet weather, which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

#### 18.—Proportion of Juniors.

Junior workers may be employed in the proportion of one (1) junior to one (1) adult worker.

#### 19.—Refund of Disbursements.

The employer shall refund to a worker any out-of-pocket expenses incurred on behalf of the employer in respect of telephone calls and purchase of materials.

#### 20.—Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers upon being engaged shall be required to furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

- (a) Name in full.
- (b) Age and date of birth.
- (c) Length of service with each previous employer.

No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay in the event of the age of the worker or his length of service with another employer being wrongly stated on the certificate. If any worker shall wilfully mis-state his age or length of service with another employer on the above certificate, he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.
