IN pursuance of the provisions of section 10 of the Fisheries Act, 1905-1951, I, the Governor of the State of Western Australia, do hereby prohibit all persons from taking any fish whatsoever by means of fishing nets in any of the portions of Western Australian waters specified in the Schedule hereto from 1st June, 1953, until 31st May, 1958, inclusive.

### Schedule.

All that portion of the Indian Ocean and Edwards Island bounded by lines starting at the closest extremity of reserve 21760 to Edwards Island, a point on the high water mark of the Indian Ocean and extending generally Northerly along that high water mark for a distance of 20 chains; thence West for a distance of 40 chains; thence South to a point in prolongation West of the starting point, and thence East to the starting point. (Public Plan 30/80.)

Corres. No. 5783/52—Reserve No. 23756 (Murray Locations 1487 and 1488), containing about 1,937 acres, for the Preservation of Flora and Fauna. (Plans 380D/40, AB4, and 383A/40, AB1.)

Now, therefore I, the Governor, with the advice of Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation classify as of Class A the above reserves.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has been pleased to approve of the amendment by the Minister for Education, in the manner set forth in the Schedule hereunder, of the Education Act Regulations, 1949, made by the Minister under the provisions of section 28 of the Education Act, 1928-1952, and published in the *Government Gazette* on the 26th day of July, 1949.

#### Schedule.

The abovementioned regulations are amended as follows:—

1. Regulation 53 is amended by adding a new subparagraph (vii) to the proviso to paragraph (b), as follows:—

(vii) In the case of service in the Department which is not continuous—

- (a) where the services of a teacher are temporarily not required by the Department because of Departmental exigencies, the suspension of the services of the teacher shall not constitute a break in continuity of service, subject to subparagraph (d) of this proviso;
- (b) where leave without pay has been granted the leave shall not—
  - (i) break continuity of service, subject to subparagraph (d) of this proviso;
  - (ii) count as service;
- (c) where the break in service is due to reasons personal to the teacher, the break shall be considered as a break in continuity of service and all previous service shall be cancelled;
- (d) any break in service of three months duration or longer, howsoever caused shall be considered as a break in the continuity of service;
- (e) the aggregate of ten years continuous service shall be completed within a total calendar period of eleven years or fifteen years continuous service within a total calendar period of sixteen years.

2. Regulation 234 is amended by deleting subregulation (2) and inserting in lieu thereof a new subregulation (2) as follows:—

- (2) The weekly tour of duties shall be the daylight equivalent of 30 hours, at times approved by the Superintendent of Technical Education, but in the case of classes which commence after 5.30 p.m., or are held on Saturdays, each hour of duty shall count as 1½ hours daylight equivalent in the weekly total, adjustment to be made in increments of one half hour only.

This Award shall be known as The Coal Mining Industry (Miners' Western Australia) Award No. 4 of 1953, and shall replace Award No. 50 of 1944, as made pursuant to the provisions of the Coal Production (War time) Act, 1944, and as amended pursuant to the provisions of the National Security (Coal Mining Industry Employment) Regulations made under the Defence (Transitional Provisions) Act, 1946-1950, and pursuant to the provisions of the Mining Act Amendment Act, No. 84 of 1948, Division 1, Part XIII, and Attendance Allowance Order No. 16 of 1951, made and as amended pursuant to the provisions of the said National Security (Coal Mining Industry Employment) Regulations.

3.—Area.

This Award shall operate over the South-West Land Division of Western Australia.

4.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for three (3) years from the date hereof, excepting as otherwise prescribed in clause 113, and subject to amendment made pursuant to the provisions of Part XIII of the Mining Act.

5.—Scope.

The provisions of this Award shall apply to all workers herein specified engaged in the coal mining industry.

6.—Wages.

(a) The rates herein are based on the basic wage of £12 0s. 6d. per week as fixed by the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, which took effect from midnight on the 26th January, 1953, being a minimum of £2 3s. 8-8/11ths per shift for an adult worker based on the standard of eleven shifts per fortnight.

(b) (i) The rates prescribed in subclauses (c) and (e) hereof shall be increased or diminished, as the case may be, by an amount equal to 2/11ths of the increase of diminution in the weekly basic wage from time to time declared by the said Court; provided that the rates for junior workers prescribed in subclauses (e) hereof, where less than the basic wage so declared from time to time and computed per shift on the basis of eleven shifts per fortnight, shall be varied according to the proportion which such rates bear to the basic wage when so computed.

(ii) The total daily earnings to be paid to piece-workers (otherwise referred to as contract workers) shall be increased or diminished as the case may be, by an amount equal to 2/11ths of the increase or diminution in the weekly basic wage from time to time declared by the said Court calculated notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (a) hereof on the basic wage which took effect from the beginning of the first pay period which commenced in August, 1943, representing £5 0s. 3d. per week being a minimum of 18s. 2-8/11ths per shift based on the standard of eleven shifts per fortnight.

(iii) Persons driving motor vehicles or other mechanical equipment owned by them, and hired by the employer shall be deemed "workers" so far as wages and any conditions of work which are applicable under this Award are concerned.

The matter of hiring and the conditions of the hiring of such motor vehicles or mechanical implements, is left entirely between the owner and the employer.

Should any owner-driver be unable to arrive at a mutual arrangement for the hire of his vehicle or mechanical implement each person shall have an appeal to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal whose decision shall be final.

(c) (i) Workers of the age of 21 years and upwards shall be paid not less than the following margin per shift in addition to the rate per shift prescribed in subclause (a) hereof as adjusted pursuant to paragraph (i) of subclause (b) hereof.

	(d) Any groom in charge of more than fifteen (15) horses shall be provided with assistance. Where there are more than thirty (30) horses an adult assistant shall be employed.				

No junior shall bring waggons from the dead end to the screens unless under the direction and control of the screenman. No junior water baler shall be required to commence work before 8 a.m., unless under the supervision of an adult worker. No youth under the age of fifteen (15) years shall be employed underground.

(f) (i) For all time worked on any day (including Sundays and holidays) during ordinary working hours on afternoon or night shift 7½ per cent. shall be added to the day shift rates. All time worked on any day (including Sundays and holidays) outside the ordinary working hours on afternoon or night shift, shall be paid for at the rate of 7½ per cent. of the day shift rate in addition to the penalty rates prescribed herein.

(ii) Where a colliery is hauling and tipping coal on two shifts, 10 per cent. shall be added to the day shift rates for employees who work on the afternoon and midnight shifts.

(iii) Employees at open cut workings and at all bins into which open cut coal is tipped, who ordinarily are entitled to a shift allowance of 10 per cent. for all work done on afternoon or night shift shall in addition to that allowance be paid at the rate of 2s. per shift for all work done on afternoon shift and for all work done on night shift at the rate of 4s. per shift.

(g) When two shifts are being worked, each worker shall have day shift every alternate week, and, where three shifts are being worked, the shifts shall be taken in rotation. Provided that, in the case of pumpmen, where one shift only is being worked and it is not practicable to work day shift, afternoon shift may be worked. Where two shifts are being worked and it is not practicable to work day shift, afternoon and night shifts may be worked. Subject to this proviso pumpmen shall rotate in the same manner as other workers. Provided also, that if the management desires a pumpman to work night shift only, a special contract may be made.

(h) Any worker required to use cement underground shall be paid 6d. per shift while so doing, in addition to the rates herein prescribed.

If any worker in receipt of a rate of pay less than that of a coal-boring machineman has to use poppers or jack hammers he shall be paid an allowance for the shift in which the popper or jack hammer is used to bring the rate payable for the shift up to the rate payable per shift to a coal-boring machineman.

Any worker engaged in roof bolting shall be paid a special allowance of 2s. per shift for any shift in which he is called upon to operate or assist in the operation of a hand-held or hand-worked boring machine.

All employees holding third-year First Aid Medallions shall receive 1s. per shift extra; this payment being without prejudice to any compensation which they may receive for time or tonnage lost whilst rendering first aid.

(i) An additional amount of 1s. per shift shall be paid to men timbering, and preparing coal for miners in any section working bottom coal at the Stockton Mine.

(j) Special additional rates of 2s. and 1s. per shift shall be paid to adult workers and juniors respectively employed as gantry hands at the Proprietary Mine while open cut coal is going over the gantry.

(k) An additional amount of one shilling per shift shall be paid to a tipper who is called upon to weigh coal in addition to his ordinary duties.

(l) An additional amount per shift equal to one half hour's pay at shiftman's rate shall be paid to contract workers at the Proprietary mine and at the Stockton mine, where distances actually walked by them, that is, exclusive of transport, from the surface to the working places exceed one mile.

(m) A constant additional amount of 6d. per shift shall be paid to clippers, adult and junior, on account of the abnormally dirty nature of their work.

(n) (i) Where shiftmen are called upon to work at a height in excess of 16 feet taking down stone roof or floaters, trimming the rib sides or lips of top coal, preparing a canch, or erecting cross timber or sets of timber to secure the roof, such shiftmen shall, in addition to the recognised shift rate of wage, be paid 4s. per shift during the time they are necessarily occupied on such work.

(ii) Where shiftmen are called upon to erect scaffolding in places of a height in excess of 16 feet, such shiftmen shall, in addition to the recognised shift rate of wage, be paid 2s. 6d. per shift during the time they are necessarily occupied on such work. The payment herein prescribed shall be in addition to the payment prescribed under paragraph (i) hereof.

(o) (i) The management shall have the right of free selection of motor truck drivers provided that in filling vacancies consideration shall be given to licensed motor truck drivers already employed whether in the classification of motor truck drivers or otherwise.

(ii) The driver of a motor truck with crane-hoist attachment shall be paid in accordance with item 19 of clause 6 (c) one grade higher than the rate fixed according to the carrying capacity of the vehicle.

#### 7.—Definitions.

"Manager"—The term "manager" or "management" shall mean the mine manager and/or his subordinate officials.

"Deputy"—The term "deputy" shall mean a person in charge of a district in the mine and classified as such in the pay sheet.

"Union"—The term "union" shall mean the Coal Miners' Industrial Union of Workers of Western Australia.

"Shiftman"—The term "shiftman" shall mean an adult employee experienced in underground work competent and required to do any class of skilled work in the repair and maintenance of a mine or in any development work in a mine.

When vacancies occur in the "shiftman" classification, selection shall be made from applicant employees, who if competent shall be selected in order of their seniority at the mine.

In the event of a dispute arising as to whether vacancies exist or an applicant employee is competent, the matter shall be referred to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal for determination.

#### 8.—Hours of Work.

(a) For all underground workers (except pumpmen) the working shift shall consist of seven hours bank-to-bank including crib time, which shall not exceed one half-hour's duration. Crib time shall be taken at a time to be mutually agreed upon between the manager and the men concerned.

(b) For all surface workers, except the groom, the working shift shall consist of seven hours, including crib time, which shall be of one half-

hour's duration. Crib time shall be taken at a time to be mutually agreed upon between the management and the men concerned.

(c) For grooms, eight hours shall constitute a working shift, to be worked within a spread of twelve hours, with such breaks as are agreed upon between the employer and the workers concerned, and the contract of service of such workers shall be a weekly one of seven days.

(d) If workers desire to accustom themselves to the darkness before proceeding any distance underground they shall leave the surface at such time as shall allow them to become so accustomed and to move onwards with the other workers at the required starting time.

#### 9.—Overtime.

(a) Overtime shall only be worked when it is absolutely necessary. Except for pumpmen and grooms, for all time worked in excess of that time prescribed by clause 8 hereof the following rates shall apply:—

(i) During the first five hours, at the rate of time and one half.

(ii) For all time beyond the first five hours or on Sundays, double the ordinary rates.

(iii) The rate for all work performed on a recognised holiday for employees not engaged upon contract shall be time and one quarter in addition to a sum equal to the amount of the payment prescribed in sub-clause (c) of clause 6. Any employee engaged upon contract and employed on a recognised holiday shall be paid, in addition to his contract earnings for that day, a further sum equal in amount to one and one quarter times the daily sum to which he is entitled under the Award in respect of each day of annual leave.

(b) Pumpmen shall be paid at the following overtime rates:—

(i) For all time in excess of eight hours, at the rate of time and one half.

(ii) For all time worked on Sundays or on a recognised holiday prescribed by clause 13 (a) hereof, double time.

(iii) For all time worked on a pay Saturday, time and one half.

(c) Grooms shall be paid at the following overtime rates:—

(i) For all time worked in excess of eight hours in any one day, time and one half.

(ii) For all time worked outside a spread of twelve hours, time and one half.

(iii) For all time worked on holidays prescribed by clause 13 (a) hereof when a mine is worked for the production of coal, double time.

(iv) For all time worked on holidays prescribed by clause 13 (a) hereof when a mine is not worked for the production of coal, time and one half.

(d) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to workers who are required to work in the case of an emergency causing or threatening loss of human life.

(e) In the case of outbreak of fire, time and a quarter shall be paid after the first hour.

(f) An employee required to work overtime in excess of three hours after the completion of a shift shall be allowed at least twenty minutes for a meal without deduction of pay and, unless notified the previous day that he will be required to work overtime, shall be either supplied with a meal by the employer or be paid 4s. in lieu thereof provided that this payment need not be made to an employee who can reasonably go home for a meal. After each four hours of such overtime following a meal break an employee shall be allowed a further twenty minutes without deduction of pay and be either supplied with a meal by the employer or be paid 4s. in lieu thereof.

#### 10.—Absence from Duty.

(a) Any worker who shall absent himself from his work without leave or without reasonable cause shall be subject to immediate dismissal.

(b) In the event of a worker being absent from work through any cause, he shall notify the management before 3 p.m. on the day prior to his intended resumption that he is returning to his work the following day. Failing such notification there shall be no obligation on the part of the management to provide him with work for the day on which he returns.

#### 11.—Notice of Work.

The employer shall post a notice at the office of the particular mine before the time for ceasing work (3 p.m. day shift) on the preceding day that men will be required for work on the succeeding day. Provided that, if through breakdown of machinery or other cause beyond the control of the management, or if the waggons are ordered the previous day and through no fault of the mine management they are not available for filling, there will be no obligation to pay the workers.

#### 12.—Pay Saturday.

The general custom of observing pay Saturday as a holiday shall be the rule under this Award. Provided always that the worker shall, if required by the management, work on that day, but it must be distinctly understood that this provision shall not be taken advantage of by the management in making a practice of working the mine on pay Saturday. If at any time it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal that any employer has unnecessarily called upon his workers to work on pay Saturday, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach of the Award. In the case of an underground worker working on pay Saturday, five hours from the time he commences to descend the mine until he returns to the surface shall be deemed to be equivalent to the full shift and shall be paid accordingly, and, in the case of a surface worker, five hours actual work shall be equivalent to and be paid for as a full shift. Should the worker be required to work less than five hours, then such time as he has worked shall be deemed to be full time. Should the worker cease work of his own accord, he shall be paid at the ordinary rate for such time as he actually worked.

#### 13.—Holidays.

(a) The following days shall be observed as paid holidays:—New Year's Day, Australia Day (January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day (June), Christmas Day, Boxing Day, or any day, excepting Easter Saturday when such holiday falls on a back Saturday, observed by the public in Western Australia in lieu thereof, together with all other days gazetted from time to time as public holidays which are observed generally by the public in Western Australia—provided that any employee who without good and sufficient reason fails to work on the working day immediately preceding a holiday or the first working day following such holiday, shall not be entitled to payment for such holiday. Easter Saturday, when such holiday falls on a back Saturday, shall be deemed to be an unpaid holiday.

(b) Each worker shall be entitled to sixteen and a half days' annual leave on full pay at his rate of wages per shift payable at the time he takes such holiday; provided that the worker has worked the full number of shifts which his mine has worked for the production of coal and which he would have normally worked during the preceding twelve months, and should he have worked less than the said number of shifts when the said holiday is taken, or at the termination of his employment, he shall receive or be paid for a proportionate number of holidays; provided further, that where the worker is dismissed for wilful misconduct he shall not be entitled to the benefits of the provisions of this subclause. Annual holidays for each year shall be granted and taken between 1st October and 30th April next ensuing. For pumpers and grooms who usually work seven days per week annual leave entitlement shall be calculated on the basis of sixteen and a half days per annum, plus .25 of a day for each completed month of service in the year in that classification.

(c) A contract worker shall be entitled to be paid, when on holidays, the minimum rate for his grade.

(d) Shifts lost on account of compensatable accidents sustained during the course of employment (not exceeding one month at a time) shall be regarded, for the purpose of calculation of the extent of annual leave, as shifts of actual attendance during those days for which the mine has worked for the production of coal.

(e) Any employee not required to work on a recognised holiday who changes his employment from one employer to another after the working day immediately preceding but before the first working day following such holiday, shall, subject to provisions of subclause (a) hereof, receive payment for such holiday from the employer by whom he is employed on the first working day following the holiday and the said employer shall have the right to recover from the employer by whom the employee was employed on the working day immediately preceding the holiday 80 per centum of the amount of the payment made to the employee.

(f) An employee not required to work on a recognised holiday who through the operation of Mine Workers' Pensions Legislation is required to vacate his employment after the working day immediately preceding but before the first working day following such holiday shall be entitled to payment for such holiday unless without good and sufficient reason he fails to work on the working day immediately preceding the holiday.

#### 14.—Sick Leave.

As from the first day of October, 1946, any employee who is absent from his work with an employer on account of personal illness, or on account of injury sustained without his own default or wilful act shall be entitled to paid leave of absence subject to the following conditions and limitations:—

- (a) Each worker shall be entitled to sick leave on full pay on the basis of one day for each completed month of service.
- (b) Where a worker has worked less than the full number of shifts which his mine has worked for the production of coal he shall be allowed to accumulate sick leave only on the proportion of days worked by him to the number of days worked by the mine for the period over which the sick leave has accumulated.
- (c) Leave allowable under this clause which is not availed of by an employee during the time it accrues shall be allowed to accumulate to a period of sixty days.
- (d) Any sick leave taken shall be deducted from the sick leave accumulated, the balance, if any, remaining to the credit of the employee and to commence to accumulate again upon his resumption of work.
- (e) Where practical within twenty-four hours but not later than seventy-two hours of the commencement of such absence the employee shall inform the employer of his inability to attend for duty and, as far as practicable, state the nature of the injury or illness and the estimated duration of the absence.
- (f) The employee shall prove to the satisfaction of his employer (or in the event of a dispute, of the appropriate industrial authority) that he was unable on account of such illness or injury to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed.
- (g) An employee shall not be entitled to paid sick leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation.
- (h) The employee shall be paid for each day of leave allowable under this clause at the appropriate rate for his class of work or in the case of a contract miner, the minimum rate for his grade.
- (i) For the purpose of calculation of sick leave any absence from work on account of authorised leave shall be regarded as shifts of actual attendance.

- (j) Provided that any employee who changes his employment and maintains continuity of employment in the Coal Mining Industry shall only be entitled to credit by his new employer of up to five days for leave accumulated but not availed of by him in his former employment.

#### 15.—Fair Share of Work.

(a) All workers shall have an equitable share of the work in their respective grades.

(b) Subject to the provisions as to any special circumstances herein contained no worker, irrespective of grade or class shall be sent home when the mine is working, if he has not been notified at or before the time for ceasing work the previous day that he will not be employed.

#### 16.—Afternoon and Night Shift.

Except in case of necessity, the ordinary work of procuring coal by miners in a mine (other than coal-cutting and special places) shall not be carried on on afternoon or night shifts, unless the mine has worked nine shifts in the preceding normal working fortnight or 27 shifts in the preceding normal working six weeks. If any dispute arises as to a case of "necessity" the matter shall be determined by the Board of Reference.

#### 17.—Cavil.

(a) Two senior adult workers (grooms excepted) shall be entitled to cavil each quarter: Provided that they find experienced miners as suitable mates to take them on the coal, and provided further that there are more places than miners employed on the coal; and provided further, that the mine has worked nine shifts in the preceding fortnight, or 27 shifts in the preceding six weeks. Preference shall be given to the senior adult worker who has been longest employed at the mine in respect of which the cavil is being taken.

(b) In the event of the work at the mine falling below nine shifts in the preceding fortnight and 27 shifts in the preceding six weeks, then when not inconsistent with clause 22, the senior workers so advanced shall revert to their former positions, and any other workers who were advanced in grade as a result of such workers going on the coal shall likewise revert to the grade formerly worked by them prior to such advancement.

(c) Should either of the two senior adult workers mentioned in subclause (a) of this clause refuse to accept their claim to go on the coal or should a worker already on the coal forfeit his place to undertake other work in the mine, the worker concerned shall for the purpose of cavilling revert to the back of the seniority list, and shall have no claim to the coal until their turn comes round: Provided however, that should a worker through incapacity, require a period of relief from the coal, or should a worker on the coal by reason of some special qualification, be required to do special work for the management, a period of release may be arranged by mutual agreement between the Manager and the Union or, failing mutual agreement the matter may be arranged by the Board of Reference.

#### 18.—Lights.

The employer shall supply all underground workers with sufficient carbide to provide them with artificial light on each shift they work. The worker shall provide his own lamp.

#### 19.—Deductions from Wages.

The employer may deduct from the worker's wages the amounts agreed upon on account of contributions for medical benefits, contributions to the Accident Relief Fund, the Aged and Infirm Coal Miners' Superannuation Fund and any other contribution agreed to by both parties.

#### 20.—Payment for Wet Work.

(a) If any worker, whether on the surface or underground, be compelled to work in water, or if water or rain drips on him in sufficient quantity to inconvenience him in his work, or if through any other circumstances in the ordinary course of his employment he should come into contact with water which would cause him to become sufficiently wet to inconvenience him in his work, he

shall be paid 2s. 6d. per shift extra. Should any dispute arise hereunder, it shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

(b) The employer shall keep the pumps in good condition in order to remove any water from the working places prior to the men commencing work; but should the removal of water be impracticable, and the quantity of water is such that the men are prevented from working, then there shall be no liability on the part of the employer to find other places for the men so affected; subject, however, to the special provisions hereinafter contained in Part II, Clause 52.

(c) Should, however, men have to work for a shift in excessively wet places, from which the water cannot reasonably be removed, then a five (5) hours' straight shift shall constitute a full day's work, and the worker shall be paid a full shift's pay for the work so performed.

Any time less than five (5) hours that a worker is required to work in such excessively wet place, he shall be paid an amount ascertained in accordance with the following formula:—

$$\frac{\text{Time so worked}}{5 \text{ hours}} \times \text{Rate for the full shift.}$$

(d) If any difference arises as to what constitutes an excessively wet place within the meaning of subclause (c) it shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

(e) If a worker who has worked in an excessively wet place for less than five (5) hours, either before or subsequent to such work, during the shift works in a place for which 2s. 6d. per shift is paid according to subclause (a) of this clause, he shall be paid an allowance ascertained according to the following formula:—

$$\frac{\text{Time so worked}}{7 \text{ hours}} \times 2s. 6d.$$

#### 21.—Higher or Lower Duties.

(a) In the event of a worker being called upon to work temporarily in any one day in a grade lower than that in which he is usually employed, he shall suffer no reduction in his wages.

For the purpose of this subclause the term "wages" shall not include wet work allowance, afternoon or night shift allowances, or any other special allowances unless the conditions of work in the grade to which the worker is transferred entitled him to such allowance or allowances.

(b) An employee who performs mixed functions on any shift shall be paid for the whole shift at the rate prescribed for the highest of such functions.

(c) The term "grade at which he is usually employed" shall mean the rating of the worker in the employer's books at the commencement of the pay fortnight.

(d) If a worker is permanently transferred from one grade of work to another during the currency of the pay fortnight, then he shall be paid the rate for the class of work to which he is so transferred from the date of such transference.

(e) If there be any dispute as to the grade at which a worker was employed, it shall be referred to the Board of Reference.

#### 22.—Minimum Number of Days.

In the event of workers being required under Part II "A," in addition to the quotas specified hereunder for each mine, namely—

they shall be engaged on the distinct condition that their employment terminates when the work at the mine falls below nine shifts in the preceding fortnight and 27 shifts in the preceding six weeks, and each worker shall be so informed when engaged. However, should any worker be absent from work through any cause whatsoever, the manager shall have the right to maintain the quota by filling vacancies of either a permanent or tem-

porary nature, but any such appointment shall terminate on the return of the worker so absent as aforesaid, or, in any event, at the termination of the cavil in which the vacancy occurs.

In calculating the number of shifts worked for the purpose of applying this clause, any shifts not worked through strikes, holidays, breakdowns of machinery, or proved shortages of railway wagons, shall be allowed as having been worked.

Notwithstanding anything contained in this clause, the manager may reduce hands at any time below the quota.

#### 23.—Temporary Advancement.

In the event of any workers being temporarily advanced on to the coal to meet the requirements of the trade, other than those advanced to fill vacancies as provided for in clause 22 of the General Conditions, they shall revert to their respective grades when the time worked by the mine is reduced below nine shifts in the preceding fortnight and 27 shifts in the preceding six weeks.

Any other workers who were advanced in grade as a result of such workers going on the coal shall likewise revert to the grade formerly worked by them prior to such advancement.

Provided that where this clause is inconsistent with the provisions of clause 27, the latter clause shall prevail.

#### 24.—Employment of Juniors.

The employer shall not be obliged to retain the services of the worker when he arrives at the age of twenty-one years, unless he be senior in length of service to any other worker in the mine whose place he is capable of filling.

#### 25.—Incapacitated Workers.

In the event of any day wage or contract worker being so incapacitated by accident, illness or old age as to be unable to adequately perform the work specified in subclause (c) of clause 6 hereof, or earn the minimum wage at that grade of work at which he is so employed, he may be allowed, after receiving the sanction of the Union, to perform any work which may be agreed upon between the employer and the Union, and his rate of pay shall be fixed by mutual agreement between the employer, the Union and himself. In the event of these three parties being unable to agree, the matter shall be referred for settlement to the Board of Reference.

#### 26.—Pit Top Meetings.

Should pit-top meetings be held, such meetings shall be terminated or adjourned in time to permit workers to proceed to their work at the appointed time. No pit top meeting shall be held during the hours of any shift at any mine which is working, except with the consent of the manager of such mine.

#### 27.—Reduction of Hands.

(a) In the event of a reduction of hands in a mine, the last worker employed shall be the first to be dismissed; but this provision shall not apply to any worker dismissed for gross misconduct or refusal to obey lawful orders: Provided that in the application of this subclause adult workers and junior workers shall be kept distinct and separate: Provided, further, that with regard to employees of the Griffin Coal Mining Co. Ltd., such workers shall retain their common seniority in Griffin, Wyvern and Phoenix Mines irrespective of which mine they are employed in.

Provided also that with regard to employees of Amalgamated Collieries of W.A. Ltd., such workers shall retain their common seniority in the Cardiff and Neath Mines, and in the Stockton Mine and Stockton Open Cut respectively.

(b) 1. (i) It is agreed that for the purpose of installing mechanical loading units in the Collie mines, all employees on the books of each mine at the 30th June, 1943, shall be regarded as permanent employees for the duration of the war and shall be retained by the Company for that period subject to the terms of this clause.

(ii) After the cessation of hostilities, the men on the books of each mine at 3rd December, 1939, or at the 30th June, 1943, as decided upon by the

Minister for Mines, shall be recognised as permanent employees on service with the Armed Forces whether employed at the 3rd September or any subsequent date.

2. It is agreed that should trade conditions cause any mine to work less than nine shifts in the preceding fortnight and 27 shifts in the preceding six weeks, the company concerned shall have the right to transfer the permanent employees from that mine to any other mine of its group in order of seniority. If there is still a fall below nine shifts in the preceding fortnight and 27 shifts in the preceding six weeks, the mechanical loaders shall cease to operate until trade conditions are sufficiently improved to ensure continuity of employment of permanent employees.

3. Any men engaged by the employers after 30th June, 1943, are engaged on the distinct understanding that the use of mechanical units will have no bearing whatever on their term of employment, and they may be retrenched in accordance with the trade fluctuations even though the mechanical units are in operation at that mine.

4. The companies undertake that mechanical loaders at any mine will operate only on the days that such mine is working for the production of coal and will not operate on the days that such mine is idle through lack of trade.

(c) Should any dispute arise with regard to the operation of this clause, or in the reversion of any worker as the result of any reduction of hands, it may be referred for settlement to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal.

#### 28.—Contract Work other than that Provided for in this Award.

No work may be performed by contract unless the contract be approved by the Delegate Board of the Union, and every such contract shall contain, or be deemed to contain, a covenant that the worker shall receive at least the minimum wage provided by this Award for the particular class of work to which the contract relates.

Provided further, that if the Delegate Board of the Union refuses to approve of the contract, the matter may be referred for determination to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal.

#### 29.—Board of Reference.

There are assigned to a Board of Reference appointed pursuant to section 322 of the Mining Act Amendment Act, No. 84 of 1948, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of—

- (i) deciding matters specifically referred to in the Award as being the subject-matter of a decision of the Board;
- (ii) deciding all matters and questions referred to in the Award as being the subject of mutual agreement if not agreed upon;
- (iii) deciding any matter remitted by the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal pursuant to section 321 of the Mining Act Amendment Act, No. 84 of 1948.

#### 30.—Pay Day.

The wages shall be paid to all workers on every alternate Friday.

They shall be paid on the same date at each mine in the Collie District.

#### 31.—Members of the Union.

All workers engaged by the employers shall make application to become members of the Union within three weeks of their engagement.

The Union shall accept them as members provided that they are persons of good character and tender the entrance fees and subscriptions in accordance with the rules of the Union.

These provisions shall not apply to officials and deputies or members of the mechanical staff of the mine.

#### 32.—Union Officials and Deputies.

In the event of a worker leaving the mine to act as general secretary or other executive officer of the Union, or, in the event of a worker being appointed as a deputy, he shall retain his seniority within the meaning of this Award, in the grade of

work and at the mine in which he was employed at the time of so leaving, or of being so appointed as deputy.

### 33.—Union Officials—Annual Leave.

Any employee actually engaged in the industry being a Union official bona fide absent from his employment to attend proceedings before any Industrial Tribunal or Commission in which the parties to this Award are interested parties shall for the purpose of the computation of shifts for annual leave be credited with one shift in respect of each day of actual attendance before such Industrial Tribunal or Commission.

### 34.—Mechanical Units.

(a) The term "mechanical unit" includes any mobile loader, rope scraper loader or other type of loader, shuttle car, continuous miner, and any coal-cutting or coal-boring machine used in conjunction therewith.

(b) The following conditions shall apply in respect of mechanical units:—

- (i) The management shall have the right to select the personnel for positions on mechanical units. Provided that an employee who, by reason of length of service at a mine, or group of mines where common seniority applies, thinks that he should have been selected for such appointment, shall have the right to apply to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal for an order directing his appointment.
- (ii) Upon the hearing of the application the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal shall have regard to the age, length of service, nature of experience, record as regards reliability and attendance for work and aptitude for machine work of the applicant.
- (iii) If, having regard to the above matters, the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal is satisfied that the appointment of the applicant would not interfere with safety, or the efficient working of the mine the Tribunal may direct his appointment or may make such order as it thinks fit.

Provided however that should the appointee prove in the opinion of the management unsuitable in carrying out the duties of the position, he may be transferred to another position without reduction in pay pending the decision of the Tribunal on an application by the management to review its previous decision.

- (iv) The person employed performing the work usually performed by a wheeler only shall be paid wheeler's rates.
- (v) Should any worker mentioned in paragraphs (i), (ii) or (iii) of this subclause refuse to accept the offer of either a temporary or permanent vacancy on mechanical units, or should a worker already on the mechanical units forfeit his place to undertake other work in the mine, the worker concerned shall, for the purpose of his turn on mechanical units, revert to the back of the seniority list and shall have no claim to the mechanical units until his turn comes round provided, however, that should a worker through incapacity require a period of relief from the mechanical units, or should a worker on the mechanical units by reason of some special qualification be required to do some special work for the management, a period of release may be arranged by mutual agreement between the manager and the union, or failing mutual agreement the matter may be arranged by the Board of Reference.
- (vi) The management shall, without prejudice to any other right, have the right of transferring a worker from one classification to another within the mechanical unit group, without reduction of the prescribed rate per shift.

### 35.—Sanitary Attention.

Should any worker be required to change a sanitary pan underground, he shall be paid an allowance of two shillings.

### 36.—Prevention of Disputes.

(a) Workers shall at all times endeavour to maintain continuity of production and shall co-operate with the management of their respective mines for this purpose. The manager of each mine shall as soon as practicable fully investigate any matter or grievance concerning any worker or group of workers that is placed before him.

(b) Where any worker or group of workers is aware of the existence of any industrial matter which may lead to the occurrence of a strike, or stop work meeting, or any other interruption of work, he or they shall immediately report such matter to the Secretary or President of any branch of the Union. Any report of a dispute to any branch official shall be forthwith communicated by the branch official to the General Secretary of the Union.

(c) Where the General Secretary of the Union or the Manager of any mine is aware of the existence of any industrial matter which may lead to the occurrence of a strike, a stop work meeting, or any other interruption of work he shall forthwith notify in writing the Chairman of the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal.

## Part II "A"—Mining Machine-Cut Coal.

### 37.—Duties in Particular.

The duties in particular of the men working under this Part, and hereinafter referred to as the miners, shall include shooting down coal after it has been undercut by the coal-cutting machine, filling such coal into skips in such a manner and to such a capacity as has been customary, and performing all other duties as hereinafter provided.

### 38.—Tonnage Rates.

Parties of miners and miners working singly on tonnage rates, shall be paid at the undermentioned mines the following rates, while existing conditions as to boring are observed:—

39. On and from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after 1st November, 1947, the sum of three shillings and tenpence (3s. 10d.) for every shift worked shall be added to the contract rates payable to employees engaged upon contract work.

This clause shall apply to all contract workers engaged on mining, wheeling, coal-cutting and coal boring.

### 40.—Day Wages.

(a) Where tonnage rate is in operation in any mine, no coal shall be got on day wages other than that from the main dips, back headings, and their connections, places deemed deficient by the scrutineers and the management, and work done for the purpose of development, maintenance, and upkeep: Provided that this subclause shall not apply to coal won by mechanical units.

(b) The management may work the places mentioned in subclause (2) hereof on contract rates and conditions: Provided that such rates and conditions are approved by the Union, or, in the event of agreement not being arrived at, determined by the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal.

(c) In the event of any dispute or difference as to what constitutes the places mentioned in subclause (a) hereof, the question shall be referred to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal.

### 41.—Undercutting Coal.

The employer shall undercut the coal with coal-cutting machines. The term "undercutting" shall mean leaving a clear space of not less than three inches underneath the coal when cut by the machine. If the coal should fall after having been undercut, and thus impede the miner in his work, he shall be paid such a sum, not exceeding 4s. per bord, as may be agreed upon by the

manager and himself as compensation for the disability caused by the coal so falling. Or should the miner be impeded by reason of an abnormal break in the floor underneath the seam he shall be paid a sum to be mutually agreed upon. In the event of the parties being unable to agree as to the amount of compensation to be paid, the matter shall be referred to the Board of Reference for settlement.

#### 42.—Elimination of Refuse.

(a) Where stone comes down from the roof through no fault of the miner, or up from the floor, and the manager directs the miner to eliminate it from the coal, payment shall be made at a rate to be mutually agreed upon by the miners concerned and the manager, or, in the event of disagreement between them at a rate to be determined by the Board of Reference.

(b) If in any mine there is any refuse in the seam worked and the manager directs the miner to eliminate it from the coal, rate to be paid for eliminating it and placing it in the gob shall be 1½d. per ton for the first three inches or part thereof in thickness, and ½d. per ton per inch thereafter, up to 12 inches, and ¾d. per ton per inch over 12 inches, in addition to the rates provided in clause 38.

#### 43.—Penalty for Filling Refuse.

Any miner filling 20 lb. of refuse into his skip, or 112 lb. in any one day shall be dealt with as follows:—

First offence—Caution.

Second offence—He (or they) shall be suspended for the next working day following his notification of the offence.

Third offence or any subsequent offence during the succeeding six weeks, or until termination of the cavit: He (or they) shall be suspended for a week, or less, as the manager may direct.

#### 44.—Narrow Work.

Places worked on tonnage rates less than 24 feet wide shall be paid extra rates as follows:—

#### 45.—Height of Seam.

The rates set out in clause 38 shall be payable in all places where the seam is not less than five feet from floor to roof. In all places in which the seam is less than five feet and more than four feet, the sum of 1d. per ton for every inch below five feet and down to four feet shall be paid. Where the seam is less than four feet in thickness, the place shall be deemed to be deficient, and the rates shall be as agreed upon by the Union and the manager, and, in the event of their being unable to agree, the rate shall be as fixed by the Board of Reference.

Where directed by the management to drive places over nine feet in height, 1½d. per ton shall be paid in addition to the rates set out in clause 38.

#### 46.—Measurement of Places.

If any dispute arises as to the width of working places, three measurements shall be taken, one on the floor, one at the roof, and one half-way between floor and roof, and the mean of the three measurements shall be deemed to be the width of the place.

#### 47.—Measurement of Stone Band.

In each working place of the respective parties of miners, measurements of any stone bands in the seam shall be taken, one in the centre and one at each rib, and the average of the combined measurements of such working places shall be the basis of payment for such refuse.

#### 48.—Places Working to the Dip of the Seam.

In any places being worked to the dip of the seam on a grade of one in ten or steeper, double yardage shall be paid.

When the grade of a place becomes steeper than one in five, an extra amount (in addition to double yardage) shall be paid. Such amount shall be as agreed upon by the manager and the Union, or, in the event of disagreement, shall be as fixed by the Board of Reference.

Where eight-yard bords are driven to the dip of a seam on a grade of one in ten or steeper, 5s. per cut shall be paid in addition to the rates mentioned in clause 38 hereof. When the grade becomes steeper than one in five an extra amount (in addition to 5s. per cut) shall be paid. Such an amount shall be as agreed upon by the manager and the Union, or, in the event of disagreement, shall be as fixed by the Board of Reference.

#### 49.—Places to be Left in Fit Condition.

The miners shall clean and square up their working place ready for the machine-men to proceed with their duties. Where refuse is present, the miner shall place it in the gob: Provided that the miner shall not be responsible for the removal of standing timber or laid rails.

#### 50.—Assisting the Wheelers.

(a) Miners shall assist the wheeler to cope and push skips to the face if the grade in any part of the road measured over the steepest two pair of connecting six-foot rails is ascertained to be equal to or greater than one to 13 and the miner or miners (if more than one miner assists) shall be paid one penny farthing (1¼d.) per ton in addition to the rates set out in clause 37, while such assistance is given to the wheeler, irrespective of the fact as to whether one or two miners assist the wheeler.

(b) Miners shall, in those places where instructed to do so, assist the wheeler with the skip at the cope-over and in pushing the skip from the cope-over to the place where it stands to be filled. Where a cope-over is not used, the miners shall when instructed to do so assist the wheeler with the skip at the turn or place where the skip is changed and in pushing it from such place to the place where the skip stands to be filled. In every case in which instructions are so issued on account of the grade of the road the insufficiency of room to cope, or for any other reason, the miner or miners (if more than one miner assists) shall be paid one penny farthing (1¼d.) per ton in addition to the rates set out in clause 37 while such assistance is given to the wheeler, irrespective of the fact as to whether one or two miners assist the wheeler. Where a cope is provided it shall not be more than eight yards from the place where the skip stands to be filled, unless the conditions of the roof renders it unreasonable and impracticable to so provide it.

(c) In the event of the management and the wheelers being unable to agree as to whether assistance should be provided the matter shall be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

#### 51.—Rails and Timber.

The employer shall lay the rails up the working face. If the miner requires a six feet pair of rails thereafter he shall lay it himself. The miner shall have regard to the safety of the working place, and, when necessary, he shall erect slabs for which he shall be paid 1s. 10d. for each slab.

The term "slab" shall mean a piece of timber not exceeding 10 feet in length, nine inches in width, and three inches in thickness. Slabs shall be supplied by the management sufficiently dressed. "Working place" shall mean a distance of not more than 12 feet back from the miner's working face.

All slabs over 10 feet long or special timber shall be erected by the management or arrangements may be made between the miner and the management for a price therefor; provided that where such price cannot be agreed between the miner and the management such price shall be determined by the Board of Reference.

#### 52.—Regular Turn of Skips.

It shall be the duty of the employer to provide a regular and fair turn of skips for all miners on the coal, having regard to the interests of the



mine and the worker; and neither the employer nor the worker shall do anything to violate the spirit of this clause. In the event of any miner not being ready for an empty skip when available, his turn shall pass to the next miner ready to take it: Provided that no miners shall have in their working places, more than two skips at a time, unless under special circumstances which have been approved by the management and the Union officials at the mine. There shall be no obligation on a miner to accept more than one skip at a time.

#### 53.—Places Rendered Unfit for Ordinary Work.

If, on presenting himself for work on any day on which the mine is working, any miner on tonnage rates cannot proceed with his ordinary place by reason of a fall of ground or sudden inflow of water or any other cause that the manager cannot reasonably foresee or prevent, then the miner shall be employed at shift work rates for the balance of the current pay fortnight, or be provided with another working place on those days when the mine is worked, but if the miner is prevented from proceeding with his work at his ordinary place through any cause that the manager could have reasonably foreseen and prevented, then the miner shall be paid at his average daily rate for the preceding pay fortnight, or be provided with another working place for the balance of the current pay fortnight on those days on which the mine works.

#### 54.—Quarterly Cavil.

(a) There shall be a cavil for working places at the close of the months of February, May, August and November of each year.

(b) The manager shall supply to the lodge officers, not later than fourteen days before the end of a cavil, a list of all places to be cavilled for the succeeding quarter, places to be cavilled as specials to be clearly shown on the list.

(c) If in any of the places to be cavilled there exist any disabilities other than those provided for by the Award, the amount of compensation being paid and/or to be paid shall be shown on the list mentioned in subclause (b).

(d) The miners, shall, if they so desire, appoint two scrutineers, whose duty it shall be to inspect the working places. Should such scrutineers consider the conditions existing in any particular place to be of such a nature that they should be excluded from the cavil, and the manager fails to agree with them, the matter in dispute shall be referred to the Board of Reference. The management shall pay half the cost of the first inspection at the daily minimum rates.

(e) Should the manager desire to work any place or places as "special places" the cavil for such special places shall precede that for the other places. Persons cavilling for special places shall be subject to the approval of the manager and the scrutineers appointed by the men. On the completion of the cavilling for the special places the cavil for the remaining places shall be proceeded with.

(f) For the purpose of this clause, the term "special place" shall be deemed to include any place which is being driven for the purpose of winning out working places; any place driven for the purpose of ventilation (other than an ordinary cut through) any place driven for water lodgment, and bords being broken off special headings, until such bords are driven in a distance of 10 yards.

(g) No place shall be included in a cavil unless it has been broken away and has everything in readiness for the men to proceed with their work on the first day of the new cavil.

(h) In the case of a place working to the dip and in which a pump operates, the pump will be so placed and operated for the beginning of the cavil as to ensure that the place is adequately drained.

(i) The provisions of clause 53 shall apply to special places.

(j) If work at any place be stopped at any time and re-started during the cavil, the men working in such place at the time of stopping shall have the option of going back to work the place.

55. (1) Where on the first shift of the mine in a new cavil a contract miner remains at his working place for the whole of the shift he shall be paid in addition to his contract earnings for that shift a sum equal to the rate payable to a shiftman (but less any wartime loading) as for one-third of a shift.

(2) A contract miner absent on the first shift of a mine in a quarterly cavil and who on the first shift worked by him in the same cavil complies with the conditions set out in the preceding subclause shall be paid in respect to that shift the amount required to be paid under clause 1 hereof provided that his working place has not been worked previously during his absence.

(3) A contract miner who leaves the mine early with the approval of the management because of injury, mechanical breakdown, unsafe conditions, sickness or other reason shall be entitled to payment under clauses 1 or 2 hereof.

#### 56.—Tools and Stores.

Miners shall provide, at their own expense, all tools, explosives, and any other stores required for use in connection with their work, except carbide for light.

#### 57.—Cross-cut and End Work in Bords.

All bords driven 13 to 77 degrees from a right angle to the cleavage of the coal shall be deemed to be on the cross, and shall be paid the sum of 1½d. per ton in addition to the tonnage rate.

All bords driven more than 77 degrees but not exceeding 90 degrees from a right angle to the cleavage of the coal shall be deemed to be on end, and shall be paid the sum of 1½d. per ton in addition to the tonnage rates.

#### 58.—Headings on the Cross.

Heading and cut-throughs driven 13 degrees or more from a right angle to the cleavage of the coal shall be paid 9d. per yard in addition to the extra rate provided in clause 44 hereof.

All headings and cut-throughs driven 77 degrees but not exceeding 90 degrees from a right angle to the cleavage of the coal shall be deemed to be on end and shall be paid the sum of 9d. per yard in addition to the tonnage rates.

#### 59.—Minimum Wage.

The minimum daily rate payable to miners shall be as provided in clause 6 of the General Conditions. In addition 7½ per cent. shall be added to the ordinary rate per shift for afternoon shift or mid-night shift. Should the aggregate of their contract earnings for any week be less than the minimum mentioned for the number of shifts worked in that week, they shall, nevertheless, be paid an aggregate amount equal to the minimum for that number of shifts.

### PART II (B) PILLAR WORK MINING.

#### 60.—Duties.

The duties of workers working under this part and referred to hereinafter as pillar miners shall be extracting or drawing pillars, and shall include:—

- (a) holing the pillars with picks according to coal mining practice, or grunching the coal in the solid unless the pillar is undercut by machine;
- (b) boring with hand-boring machines unless bored by the employer;
- (c) shooting and filling the coal into skips and performing other duties, as hereinafter provided.

The manager shall determine whether pillars shall be holed with picks, grunched, undercut by machines, hand-bored by the pillar miners, or bored by the employer.

#### 61.—Day Wages.

If it be deemed necessary by the management to do any pillar work mining on a daily contract of service, the wages shall be as provided by clause 6 in the General Conditions of this Award; and all the other provisions of this Award appropriate to pillar work mining shall likewise apply.

## Part III.—Wheeling.

## 62.—Duties.

(a) The duties in particular of the men working under this part shall include the wheeling of empty skips from the flats to the working faces, and loaded skips from the working faces to the flats, such flats being those nominated by the management. The wheeler shall remove any skips from the working faces prior to the coal-cutting machine men being required to go in to cut the place.

(b) Wheelers, if required to open and close three or more doors between the flat and the face, shall be paid 1s. per shift extra. This provision shall apply to contract wheelers only.

## 63.—Cavil.

For the purpose of cavilling, the wheelers may choose their own mates and cross mates.

The mine shall be divided into districts which shall be cavilled for by the parties of wheelers at each quarterly cavil, such cavil to coincide with that conducted by the miners, under Clause 54, Part II ("A") of this Award.

The wheelers shall be at liberty to arrange the work in each district to their own satisfaction: Provided that the miners are given a fair distribution of skips. Provided further, however, that the management and the branch officials of the Union shall have the right to change wheelers around in a particular section within two weeks of the commencement of the cavil should such change in their opinion be beneficial to all concerned.

Where two or more wheelers are wheeling on one flat each wheeler shall retain his own earnings unless the wheelers decide to work as a party and share their earnings.

If any difference arises as to the number of pairs of miners from which a wheeler is required to wheel under abnormal conditions of work, the matter may be submitted for adjudication to the Board of Reference.

## 64.—Supply of Sprags.

The employer shall supply on each flat all sprags required by the wheeler.

## 65.—Regular Turn.

The employer shall provide a fair turn of skips to each flat in proportion to the number of miners working on that flat. The wheeler shall refrain from any action which is likely to nullify the efforts of the manager to carry out his obligation under this clause: Provided that no wheeler shall wheel more than two skips at a time to the working place of each pair of miners, unless under special circumstances which have been approved by the management and the Union officials at the mine. There shall be no obligation on a wheeler to wheel more than one skip at a time to the working place.

## 66.—Excessive Number of Wheelers.

If on any particular day there are more wheelers than are required in the mine through any cause that the management could not reasonably foresee or prevent, then the wheeler shall be employed at the adult minimum wage for the particular class of work provided for him, but if on any particular day a wheeler is prevented from working in his usual place from any cause that the management could have reasonably foreseen and prevented, then the wheeler shall be employed on those days that the mine works during the balance of the current pay fortnight at the average rate of wages earned by him during the preceding pay fortnight.

## 67.—Rates.

Parties of wheelers, and wheelers wheeling singly, shall be paid at the following rates per ton:—

In all places, not including flats, being wheeled by horse or hand upwards or downwards, where the grade is 1 in 6 or steeper, wheelers shall, subject as hereinafter provided, receive 1d. per ton in addition to the abovementioned rates. This extra rate shall be inclusive of any allowance for using a rope or tackle. Such extra rate shall not be paid unless the grade of 1 in 6 or steeper, is in the aggregate, 1 chain in length or greater, but this minimum length shall not apply to cut-throughs or turns: Provided that in the event of the grade of 1 in 6 or steeper being in the aggregate 2½ chains or more in length then such extra amount as may be agreed between the Union and the management shall be paid, and if such extra amount cannot be so agreed upon it shall be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

No wheeler wheeling from one pair of miners shall be on contract rates except under the provisions of Clause 28, Part I.

Where necessary for a contract wheeler to assist another wheeler to re-rail a loaded skip he shall be paid for so doing one half-hour at shift work rates.

Where it is necessary for a contract wheeler to assist a set-rider to re-rail a loaded skip or skips he shall be paid for the time occupied in so doing at shift work rates with a minimum of one half-hour for each occasion.

Where a wheeler is called upon to take a horse from the horse-breaker, a leader shall be provided the first five days. If at the end of that period the wheeler and the management disagree as to the suitability of the horse, the question of whether the horse should be retained by the wheeler or returned to the horsebreaker shall be determined by the Board of Reference.

## 68.—Measurement of Distances.

The distances referred to in Clause 67 of this Part shall be measured from the centre of the flat to which the coal is wheeled to where the skip stands to be filled.

A measurement of the distances shall be taken when requested by the local Union officers.

## 69.—Method of Payment.

The employer shall record the gross tonnage filled by the miners in the various districts in which the wheelers operate and the wheelers shall be paid for the tonnage so recorded. No payment shall be made for coal filled from roadways unless such coal is wheeled by the wheelers.

## 70.—Delivery of Materials.

All ordinary timber or mining materials required for delivery along his ordinary wheeling road shall be delivered from the flats to the required places by the wheeler, without additional remuneration; but any extraordinary timber or materials taken in for the use of shiftmen shall be paid for as lost time, at the wheeler's day wage rate, as shown in Clause 6 of the General Conditions.

Skips of sand, rails, laths, sleepers or lids, and loads of timber required to be unloaded by the wheeler at the places appointed by the manager, shall be paid for at the rate of 9d. per skip or load. Skips or props and slabs shall be paid for at the rate of 3d. for every five props or slabs so unloaded. When timber is unloaded by a wheeler such timber shall be stacked by him.

## 71.—Wheeling of Refuse.

Where a wheeler is required to wheel skips of refuse from the seam, each skip shall be deemed to contain a ton, and the wheeler shall be paid at the rates provided in Clause 67 of this Part for each skip wheeled.

## 72.—Filling of Road Coal.

If directed by the management road coal shall be filled by the wheelers and shall be paid either at the tonnage rate of the particular mine, as provided in Clause 38, Part II ("A"), or at the minimum daily rate of pay provided in Clause 73 of this Part.

## 73.—Minimum Wage.

A wheeler who on any day and through no fault of his own fails to wheel sufficient coal to earn the daily rate provided in Clause 6 of the General Conditions shall have his earnings for that day made up to such rate provided that he has worked seven hours bank to bank on the said day. In addition  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. shall be added to the ordinary rate per shift for afternoon or midnight shift.

## 74.—Wheeler's Horses.

(i) The employer shall provide wheelers on contract rates with horses properly broken in to pit work, so that such wheelers shall not be hindered in their work; but if such wheelers are so hindered in their work they shall be compensated for the same.

In the event of a horse losing a shoe, or breaking his harness or limbers, the wheeler shall be compensated for the tonnage loss.

(ii) The wheeler shall, if instructed by the management, take his horse from the stables to the mouth of the mine travelling road before the commencement of any shift, and at the completion of the shift return the horse to the stables without extra remuneration: Provided, however, that when the distance to be travelled exceeds 100 yards and is less than one mile the sum of 6d. per shift in addition to his appropriate rate shall be paid: Provided further, that when instructed by the management to water and unharness his horse on returning to the stables, the wheeler shall be paid the sum of 6d. per shift extra.

## 75.—Stacking of Timber.

Where timber is required to be stacked, sufficient suitable places shall be provided, suitable for all length of timber, such places to be easily accessible to the wheeler. Timber shall not be left lying around on the flats. Should any dispute arise as to whether a place is "suitable" and/or "accessible" it shall be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

## 76.—Draining Roads.

The employer shall keep the roads reasonably clean and drained, wherever it is practicable to do so.

## 77.—Miners Taken out of Wheelers Cavil.

In the event of a miner being taken out of a wheelers cavil for any other reason than to supply the place of another worker, who is absent from work without notice, then such wheeler shall be paid at the rate of the average tonnage that the miner would have filled for that day if he had worked in the ordinary course.

## 78.—Wheeling by Hand or Winch or Under Abnormal Conditions of Work.

Should any question arise as to the detriment to a contract wheeler's earnings, in connection with wheeling by hand or winch, or through any changed circumstances that may from time to time arise, the rates and conditions of such wheeler may be revised by mutual agreement, or be referred to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal for review.

## Part VI—Coal-cutting.

## 79.—Duties.

The duties in particular of the coal-cutting machine men shall include the undercutting of the coal with electric coal-cutting machines, the travelling of the machines to and from the various places and preparing the machines for operation.

## 80.—Machine Cut.

(i) In undercutting the coal the machine man shall leave a clear space of not less than three inches between the top of the machine cuttings, or "buck dust," and the top of the cut made by the coal-cutting machine. Every coal-cutting machine man shall leave each place in this condition, except in cases specified hereunder, namely—

- (a) when the machine cuts into a stone pack; or
- (b) in places carrying water in such quantity that the clearance cannot be given without interference with the normal operation of the machine; or

(c) in places where, from any other cause, it is unreasonable and impracticable to compel the machine men to leave a clear space of three (3) inches as provided in the first paragraph of this clause; or

(d) where the coal sits down after being cut.

(ii) If a machine man is impeded in his work by reason of the machine cutting into stone, or "brass" in the seam, or on account of the machine becoming jammed through no negligence or lack of skill on the part of the machine man, then he shall be paid such extra remuneration as may be mutually agreed upon by the manager and the machine man concerned. In the event of any dispute arising in the operation of this clause, it may be referred for settlement to the Board of Reference.

## 81.—Bits, Lubricating Oil, Etc.

The employer shall keep the coal-cutting machines in good working order. He shall supply sufficient cutting bits, lubricating oil, and sand in the most convenient position in each district operated by the coal-cutting machine man. Electric supply cables shall be kept within a convenient distance of the working faces.

## 82.—Lubrication and Care of Machine.

The machine men shall take proper care of the machine and tools and the trailing cable and machine rope. They shall keep the machine in a reasonable state of cleanliness. A "reasonable state of cleanliness" shall, for the purpose of this clause, include keeping all oil wells clean and with sufficient oil in them, and keeping all accessible parts of the machine clean, but shall not include dismantling any part of the machine for cleaning.

## 83.—Tools.

The employer shall supply all tools required by the machine man in the course of his duties, and the machine man shall be responsible for the safe keeping of them while in his custody; provided that it shall only be obligatory on the employer to supply a pick and shovel once in twelve months, unless the same be destroyed by accident.

## 84.—Cavil.

A cavil shall be conducted quarterly in every mine, should any number of coal-cutting machine men desire it. The date of such cavil shall coincide with the general quarterly cavil of the mine, as arranged by the manager and the scrutineers. Machine men when on tonnage rates shall have the right to choose their own mates prior to the drawing of the cavil. If a vacancy should occur during the course of the cavil, the remaining machine men shall have the right to choose any available machine man at the mine, but if no such machine man be available, any other man in the mine. If the manager objects to any man so chosen, the matter in dispute shall be referred to the Board of Reference.

## 85.—Situation of Machines and State of Places.

The management shall acquaint the coal-cutting machine man at the commencement of or during the course of each shift, of the situation of the machine and the places which are already undercut, and those that require undercutting.

## 86.—Places to be in Fit Condition.

Any place to be undercut by the coal-cutting machine man shall be in a fit and proper condition therefor as regards the removal of refuse and skips. The obligation for such condition being on the employer.

## 87.—Places to be Cut to the Satisfaction of the Management.

The coal-cutting machine men shall undercut each place, in strict accordance with the instructions as to cut issued by the management.

## 88.—Picking Up Bottoms.

The coal-cutting machine men shall undercut the coal at such position in the seam as shall be directed by the management, and when so

desired, they shall keep the cutting as near as practicable to the floor of the seam. In the event of the machine men not keeping the cutting as near as practicable to the floor of the seam, then they shall take up that portion of the seam which by reason of their neglect is left on the floor of the places undercut without further remuneration. They shall under no circumstances cut below the position in the seam directed by the management. Any dispute under this clause shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

#### 89.—Machines or Places Rendered Unfit for Ordinary Work.

If on presenting himself for work on any day on which the mine is working, any coal-cutting machine man on tonnage rates cannot proceed with his ordinary work on account of no places being ready or on account of a breakdown of his machine, or a fall of ground or inflow of water, or any other cause that the manager cannot reasonably foresee or prevent, then the machine man shall be employed at shift work rates at such work as the manager may direct for the balance of the current pay fortnight on those days when the mine is worked; but if a machine man is prevented from proceeding with his work through any cause that the manager could have reasonably foreseen and prevented, then the machine man shall be paid at his average daily rate for the preceding pay fortnight, or be provided with another working place for the balance of the current pay fortnight on those days on which the mine works.

#### 90.—Safety of Working Places.

The deputy shall inspect every working place before instructing a machine man to cut the place.

If it be necessary for a coal-cutting machine man to remove timber or rails (other than the six feet rails at the face), or put in additional timber, he shall be compensated by the payment of average wage for the time lost.

If any dispute arises as to the necessity, or otherwise, for the removal, or erection, of the timber, or removal of the rails, it shall be referred to the Board of Reference.

#### 91.—Method of Payment.

The employer shall record the gross tonnage of all coal filled by the miners in the various districts in which the coal-cutting machine men operate, and the coal-cutting machine men shall be paid for the tonnage so recorded. All road coal filled shall be paid for at cutting rates, the money to be equally divided between the machine men after allowance has been made for upsets.

Compensation for any refuse occasioned by a stone band coming in on the roof of the seam, which is worked as part of the seam, and for any refuse other than the regular stone band or stone from the roof which is ordered by the management not to be filled into skips by the miners, shall be paid by the employer to the coal-cutting machine men.

The amount of such compensation shall be calculated on the basis of one cubic yard to the ton in the solid.

#### 92.—Rates.

Coal-cutting machine men shall be paid the following rates:—

Where coal-cutting machine men are obliged to perform work under abnormal conditions not provided for elsewhere in this Award, they may be paid in addition to the rates herein prescribed an amount as may be agreed upon between the workers concerned and the management. In the event of disagreement as to the rate to be paid, liberty is reserved to the Union to apply at any time to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal for the fixation of such rate.

#### 93.—Adjustment of Places Cut.

At the end of the cavil the machine men shall arrange among themselves as to what allowance shall be made for coal cut and left in the cavil

they leave. Failing settlement among themselves being arrived at, the manager of the mine and the scrutineers shall decide the matter, and their decision shall be final.

#### 94.—Cutting in Main Dips or Similar Places.

Where machine men are required to cut in main dips (or similar places) with a grade of one in ten or steeper, the machine men shall be paid at shift work rates for such time as they are cutting in such place, or a special contract under the provisions of clause 28 of the General Conditions (Part I) may be entered into. Where it is necessary to lower or haul a coal-cutting machine into or out of such a place by means of a winch, then the machine men shall be paid such an amount for the compensation for lost time as may be agreed upon by the men concerned and the manager, or, in the event of disagreement, as may be determined by the Board of Reference.

#### 95.—Minimum Wage.

The minimum daily rate payable to coal-cutting machine men shall be as provided in clause 6 of the General Conditions (Part I). In addition 7½ per cent. shall be added to the ordinary rate per shift for afternoon shift or midnight shift. Should the aggregate of their contract earnings for any period be less than the minimum herein mentioned for the number of shifts worked in that period, they shall nevertheless be paid an aggregate amount equal to the minimum for that number of shifts.

#### Part V—Coal Boring.

##### 96.—Duties.

The duties in particular of the workers engaged under this Part and referred to hereinafter as boring machine men, shall include the boring of the coal faces with electric boring machines, the travelling of the machine to and from the various places, and preparing the machines for operation.

##### 97.—State of Machines.

The employer shall keep the coal-boring machines in good working order. They shall also keep the electric supply cable to within a convenient distance of the working face.

##### 98.—Lubrication and Care of Machines.

The boring machine men shall keep the machines effectively lubricated and in a reasonable state of cleanliness, and shall use every endeavour to minimise wastage of oil. They shall also exercise every care in the handling of the machines and cables and drills.

##### 99.—Tools.

The employer shall supply all tools required by the boring machine men in the course of their duties under this Part, and the boring machine men shall be responsible for the safe keeping and care thereof.

##### 100.—Cavil.

A cavil shall be conducted quarterly in every mine should any number of coal-boring machine men desire it. The date of such cavil shall coincide with the general quarterly cavil of the mine as arranged by the manager and the scrutineers. Coal-boring machine men when on tonnage rates shall have the right to choose their own mates prior to the drawing of the cavil. If a vacancy should occur during the course of the cavil the remaining coal-boring machine men shall have the right to choose any available coal-boring machine man at the mine, but if no such coal-boring machine man be available, any other man in the mine. If the manager objects to any man so chosen the matter in dispute shall be referred to the Board of Reference.

##### 101.—Situation of Machines.

The management shall acquaint the boring machine men at the commencement or during the course of each shift, the situation of the machines and the places which are already bored and those which require boring.

## 102.—Places to be in fit condition.

Any place to be bored by the boring machine man shall be in a fit and proper condition therefor, as regards the removal of refuse and skips. The obligation for such condition being on the employer.

## 103.—Places to be Bored to Satisfaction of Management.

The boring machine men shall bore each place to the mutual satisfaction of the miner and the management, particularly as regards the number of holes and the angle of same.

## 104.—Machine or Places rendered unfit for Ordinary Work.

If on presenting himself for work on any day on which the mine is working, any boring machine man on tonnage rates cannot proceed with his ordinary work on account of no places being ready, or on account of a breakdown of his machine, or a fall of ground, or inflow of water, or any other cause that the manager cannot reasonably foresee or prevent, then the boring machine man shall be employed at such work as the management may direct at shift work rates for the balance of the current pay fortnight on those days when the mine is worked; but if a boring machine man is prevented from proceeding with his work through any cause that the manager could have reasonably foreseen and prevented, then the machine man shall be paid at his average daily rate for the preceding pay fortnight, or be provided with another working place for the balance of the current pay fortnight on those days on which the mine works.

## 105.—Method of Payment.

The employer shall record the gross tonnage of all coal filled by the miners in the various districts in which the boring machine men operate, and the boring machine men shall be paid for the tonnage so recorded.

All road coal filled shall be paid for at boring rates, the money to be equally divided between the boring machine men after allowance has been made for upsets.

Compensation for any refuse occasioned by a stone band coming in on the roof of the seam, which is worked as part of the seam, and for any refuse other than the regular stone band or stone from the roof which is ordered by the management not to be filled into skips by the miners, shall be paid by the employer to the coal-boring machine men.

The amount of such compensation shall be calculated on the basis of one cubic yard to the ton in the solid.

## 106.—Rates.

Parties of coal-boring machine men shall be paid at the following rates:—

## 107.—Minimum Wage.

The minimum daily rate payable to boring machine men shall be as provided in clause 6 of the General Conditions (Part I). In addition 7½ per cent. shall be added to the ordinary rate per shift for afternoon shift or midnight shift when worked. Should the aggregate of their contract earnings for any pay period be less than the minimum herein mentioned for the number of shifts worked in that period they shall nevertheless be paid an aggregate amount equal to the minimum for that number of shifts.

## 108.—Adjustment of Places.

At the end of the cavel the machinemen shall arrange among themselves as to what allowance shall be made for coal bored and left in the cavel they leave. Failing a settlement among themselves being arrived at, the manager of the mine and the scrutineers shall decide the matter, and their decision shall be final.

## 109.—Additional Boring.

If the boring machine men have to return to bore other holes through no fault of their own, then they shall be paid their average wage for the time so occupied. Any dispute hereunder shall be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

## Part VI.—Attendance Allowance.

## 110.—Attendance Allowance.

(a) Each member of the Union who works for the eleven ordinary days comprising a pay period shall in respect of that period, if the colliery at which he works has been in production on each of the said days, be entitled (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment as for a shift at the appropriate rate for him.

(b) Each member of the Union who is absent from work for portion of a pay period, on paid sick leave or on workers' compensation, but who works on all other ordinary working days during the said period shall, in respect of that period, if the colliery at which he works has been in production on each of the eleven ordinary working days of the pay period, be entitled (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment of one-eleventh of a shift at the appropriate rate for him for each day worked by him.

111. (a) Where during a pay period the colliery has been out of production through the occurrence of a recognised holiday, a mechanical breakdown, a fire, a flood, or through a strike by members of another union, subject to it having worked for the production of coal on all other ordinary working days during the said period, each member of the Union, who on all of the working days comprising the said pay period attends for work and is available to perform such work as the management may reasonably require shall be entitled in respect of that period (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment of one-eleventh of a shift at the appropriate rate for him for each production day worked by him.

(b) Where during a pay period the colliery has been out of production through the occurrence of a recognised holiday, mechanical breakdown, a fire, a flood, or through a strike by members of another union, subject to it having worked for the production of coal on all other ordinary working days during the said pay period, each member of the Union, who is absent from work for portion of the said pay period on paid sick leave or workers' compensation but who on all other ordinary working days of the said pay period attends for work and is available to perform such work as the management may reasonably require shall be entitled to in respect of that period (in addition to his ordinary earnings) to payment of one-eleventh of a shift at the appropriate rate for him for each production day worked by him.

112. (a) Payment as for a shift at the appropriate rate referred to in Clauses 110 and 111, shall for the workers hereunder be as follows:—

- (i) Contract miners, 54s. 1d.
- (ii) Contract wheelers, 44s. 1d.

Plus or minus, in both cases, 2/11th of any increases or decreases, as applicable, in the weekly basic wage declared after the 29th day of August, 1951.

(b) For a contract machineman or borer employed during the fortnightly period for portion of the time on contract rates and portion of the time on day wage rates, payment shall be made in proportion at the rate of 54s. 1d., as adjusted from time to time for the time worked on contract and at the day rate as prescribed in the Award for the time worked on day wage rates.

## 113.—Term of Part VI.
