Health Act, 1911-1953. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

Ex. Co. No. 1061.

WHEREAS it is enacted by section 273 of the Health Act, 1911-1953, that the Governor may from time to time by order published in the Government Gazette set apart any suitable place for the reception and medical treatment of lepers: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the power conferred by section 273 of the Act, doth hereby set apart an area of land more particularly described in the Schedule hereunder to be a suitable place for the reception and medical treatment of lepers.

- (c) That Raymond Arthur Clarke, Michael Shine, Thomas Haldane Talbot, Alex Miller and Robert Claude Charles Ganfield shall represent the South Ward until the said 16th day of April, 1955.

Road Districts Act. 1919-1951. Rockingham and Kwinana Road Districts. Adjustment of Accounts. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the Kwinana Road District Act, 1953, a portion of the Rockingham Road District was severed therefrom and constituted a road district under the name of the Kwinana Road District; and whereas section 3 of the Kwinana Road District Act, 1953, provides that section 10 of the Road Districts Act applies to the severance; and whereas under the provisions of section 10 of the Road Districts Act it is provided that the Governor may adjust and finally determine all questions relating to the adjustment and sharing of property, debts and liabilities, etc., of any local authority affected by the severance of any part of a district; and whereas it is desirable that certain property of the Rockingham Road Board as well as certain debts and liabilities shall be transferred and adjusted as between the Rockingham Road District and the Kwinana Road District: Now, therefore, in exercise WHEREAS by the Kwinana Road District Act, 1953, Kwinana Road District: Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 10 of the Road Districts Act, the Governor, acting with the advice Districts Act, the Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby apportion and allocate the assets and liabilities in respect of the area now known as the Kwinana Road District by declaring that the Rockingham Road Board shall transfer to the Kwinana Road Board the assets and liabilities specified in Schedules 1, 2 and 3 hereunder, and doth also further determine that in respect of all loans raised by the Rockingham Road Board on or before the 15th the Rockingham Road Board on or before the 15th day of February, 1954, the said Rockingham Road Board shall remain liable to repay the whole to the debenture holders.

- 1. These regulations may be cited as the Derby Leprosarium Regulations.
- 2. In these regulations-

"institution" means the Derby Leprosarium set apart by order of the Governor under the provisions of the Health Act, 1911-1953, as a suitable place for the reception and medical treatment of lepers and published in the Government Gazette on the 11th day of June, 1954.

- 3. The officer who receives a patient into the institution shall explain to the patient the necessity for his detention therein and instruct the patient that he is not permitted to go beyond the boundaries of the institution without the prior consent of the officer for the time being in charge of the institution.
- 4. A patient who escapes or attempts to escape from the institution may with such necessary force as the case may require, be removed or brought back to the institution.
- 5. Detention of a patient in the institution may include confinement of the patient in locked accommodation or in special detention quarters or may include such other forms of restraint as may be necessary.
- 6. For purposes of segregation or internal security, a patient may be kept in locked accommodation during the night or, if necessary, for varying periods of the day.
- 7. A mental patient or other patient whose conduct is likely to cause injury to other persons or damage to property in the institution, may be confined to detention quarters or otherwise forcibly restrained as necessary.
- 8. A patient convicted in any Court and sentenced to a term of imprisonment who is sent to the institution may be confined to the detention quarters provided in the institution for the purpose, for the period of his sentence of imprisonment.
- 9. All spears or other weapons or articles which when used are likely to cause injury or bodily harm to any person or property shall be taken into safe custody and may be issued to a patient from time to time as the officer for the time being in charge of the institution thinks fit.
- 10. All firearms and ammunition issued to any officer of the institution and within the confines thereof when not in the actual possession of that officer shall be kept by him securely locked away from any patient in a room or other place.
- 11. A person, other than a patient or a member of the staff of the institution, shall not enter within the boundaries of the institution without the prior consent of the Commissioner of Public Health or the officer for the time being in charge of the institution.
- 12. A person who commits a breach of these regulations is liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds (£20).

A By-law of the Bunbury Water Board made under Section 141 of the Water Boards Act, 1904-1953, for granting Long Service Leave to Employees.

In pursuance of the powers conferred by the said Act, the chairman and members of the Bunbury Water Board order as follows:—

- 1. In the interpretation of this by-law the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them hereunder:—
 - "Board" means the Bunbury Water Board.

"Continuous service" means service in the employment of this Board during which an employee has not been absent from the service of the Board for a continuous period of more than two days or an aggregate period of more than 10 days without leave of absence being granted by the Board, provided that an employee who was employed by the Board on a permanent basis immediately prior to entering continuous full-time service with the Armed Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia, or who was directed by the Manpower Directorate to serve elsewhere, between the 3rd day of September, 1939, and the 3rd day of March, 1947, shall have such service counted as continuous service with this Board provided the requisite proof is produced.

- 2. All employees of the Board shall, after each period of 10 years continuous service as permanent full-time employees thereof, commencing from the 1st day of November, 1951, be entitled to three months long service leave, providing that there shall be credited to each employee who was employed by the Board prior to the 1st day of November, 1951, two-fifths (§) of the total number of months which they have served in continuous service in the employment of Board and that the 10 year qualifying period mentioned in this paragraph shall wherever applicable be reduced accordingly by the number of months which is determined by such credit. Long service leave shall be taken at the convenience of the Board, which will, as far as possible, meet with the wishes of the employee, but the Board may require the employee to take leave by giving not less than three months' notice.
- 3. Absence on account of sickness shall not be deemed to be a break in continuity of service, provided the period of absence shall not exceed three months in any year, unless otherwise decided by the Board.
- 4. In the event of the resignation, retirement, or death of an employee, the Board may pay to such employee (or in the case of death, to his personal representatives, or if there be none to his dependants) a sum of money equal to his wages or salary for the period of long service leave which the Board was empowered under this by-law to grant to such employee at the date of his resignation, retirement, or death, or if the Board, after consideration of all the circumstances, direct that the death of an employee, be presumed, the Board may authorise the payment to the dependants of the employee a sum equivalent to the amount of wages or salary which would under this by-law have been granted the employee immediately prior to the date of his death, such date to be determined by the Board.
- 5. An employee dismissed by the Board, except in the matter of retrenchment shall not be paid any sum in pursuance of the preceding paragraph.
- 6. (a) Employees due to take long service leave shall be paid their salary or wage for the period thereof at the rate equivalent to the salary paid in the week immediately preceding the taking of long service leave.
- (b) The Board may, at its discretion, either (i) pay to an employee his wages or salary periodically during long service leave, or (ii) pay to the employee in advance a sum representing the amount of his wages or salary for the period of his long service leave.
- 7. All annual leave to which an employee is entitled or will become entitled before the expiration of his long service leave shall be taken by

the employee in conjunction with his long service leave, but any public holidays which may occur during the taking of his long service leave are not to be paid for over and above the long service leave, but are to form part of such long service leave.

- 8. Long service leave shall be considered as a special period of recuperation after a lengthy term special period of recuperation after a lengthy term of service with a view to fitting the employee for a further term, and during such leave no employee shall undertake any form of employment for hire or reward, unless by special permission of the Board. Any contravention of this subclause shall entitle the Board to dismiss the employee from its service, and to cease paying or to recover any amounts paid in advance on account of long service leave. Provided however, that the Board may grant long service leave to an employee of the Board if leave. Provided nowever, that the Board may grant long service leave to an employee of the Board if, before a period of 10 years continuous service is reached, such employee retires from the Board's service owing to having reached the retiring age, or who because of circumstances beyond his control such as illness, accident, death or retrenchment, is unable thereby to carry on his employment, in which case the long service leave may be adjusted pro rata.
- 9. The long service leave which may be granted under this by-law shall be in the ratio of not exceeding 1 3/10ths weeks for every completed year of service which qualified the employee for such long service leave, and shall be on full pay.
- 10. The Board hereby expressly reserves the right to either retard or advance by a period of one year, the date on which any employee may be required to take his or her long service leave.

- The fee for the registration of a veterinary medicine is one guinea (£1 Is.) for the first veterinary medicine registered under the Act and five shillings (5s.) for each succeeding veterinary medicine registered by the same applicant with the maximum sum which an applicant is required to pay of five guineas (£5 5s.) in the case of any one applicant in any one year irrespective of the number of veterinary medicines registered under the Act in that year, by the applicant.
- 5. The notice required to be given by a dealer in accordance with section 16 (1) of the Act shall be in Form B in the Appendix.
 - 6. The register of veterinary medicines shall be in Form C in the Appendix.
- An appeal made by a primary dealer to the Minister under the provisions of section 11 (4) of the Act shall be-

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- (a) in writing;(b) lodged within twenty-one (21) days after the receipt by the primary dealer of the decision of the Committee.
- 8. A veterinary surgeon selected by the Western Australian division of the Australian Veterinary Association and nominated by the Minister who is appointed a member of the Committee shall be paid three guineas (£3 3s.) for each meeting of the Committee he attends.

EDUCATION ACT, 1928-1952.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has been pleased to approve of the amendments by the Minister for Education, in the manner set forth in the Schedule hereunder, of the Education Act Regulations, 1949, made by the Minister under the provisions of the Education Act, 1928-1952, and published in the Government Gazette on the 26th day of July, 1949, and amended from time to time thereafter.

(1) The teaching staff of the Technical Division shall comprise principals and deputy principals of technical institutions, heads of subject departments, senior lecturers, lecturers, assistants, trainee assistants, cadets, instructors and such other teachers as may from time to time be approved by the Director.
 - (2) The establishment of positions in a technical institution or in a subject department shall be determined by the Director.
 - (3) Promotion to a higher position shall be dependent upon there being a vacancy in that position and on the teacher having the qualifications specified in these Regulations.
 - (4) Subject to the approval of the Director, a lecturer or senior lecturer may be appointed in charge of a subsection of a department where the duties are such that he is responsible for the teaching and administration of subjects leading to a separate Diploma.

 - A teacher whose service is not reported as satisfactory within three years of appointment may have further increase in salary withheld.
