I, THE said Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint you, Leslie Charles Diver, Eric Michael Heenan, Frederick Richard Hugh Lavery, Charles Herbert Simpson and Leslie Arthur Logan, all Members of the Legislative Council, to be an Honorary Royal Commission without payment of remuneration, to do the following things namely: do the following things, namely:

In relation to "motor spirits," "wholesalers" and "retailers" as respectively defined in the Bill for an Act to be cited as the Retailing of Motor Spirits Act, 1955, introduced into the Legislative Council during the Fourth Sersion of the Twenty first Deduring the Fourth Session of the Twenty-first Par-liament of the State, to inquire into and report upon-

- (a) the policy or policies of wholesalers in relation to the marketing by or through retailers of motor spirits within the State, including the erection or provision of service stations, petrol pumps (as defined in the said Bill) or other facilities for the sale by retail of motor spirits, and including the selection, appointment, financing and assisting of retailers;
- (b) the business dealings, relations and activities between wholesalers and retailers, the forms, classes and main provisions of contracts, leases or licenses made or granted by wholesalers for or in relation to the supply, distribution, sale, disposal or mar-keting of motor spirits to or by retailers and the premises from which motor spirits are sold to consumers, including the powers,

sanctions and controls reserved, held, exercised or exercisable by wholesalers over retailers with respect to the sale of motor spirits or of tyres, batteries or accessories;

- (c) the reasons for and the implications and considerations involved in or arising from the foregoing matters in relation to whole-salers, retailers and consumers of motor spirits, to efficiency in and the economics of the retailing of motor spirits, to the availability and costs of motor spirits of various kinds or brands, to restraint of trade, to reasonable security for and freedom and opportunities of or to retailers, to fair competition, to town planning and to land values in close proximity to petrol pumps and service stations; pumps and service stations;
- (d) the provisions of the said Bill and the matters dealt with therein, and whether or not the Bill, with or without amendment, would, as an Act, be in the public interest;
- (e) any legislative amendments recommended.

And I hereby appoint you, the said Leslie Charles Diver, to be Chairman of the said Royal Commission.

And I declare that you shall, by virtue of the Commission, be a Royal Commission within the Royal Commissioners' Powers Act, 1902, as re-printed in the Appendix to the Sessional Volume of the Statutes for the year 1928, and that you shall have the powers of a Royal Commission or the Choismen the year of under that Act Chairman thereof under that Act.

And I hereby request you as soon as reasonably may be to report to me in writing the result of this your Commission.

Wheat Products (Prices Fixation) Act, 1938-1939. PROCLAMATION

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WHEREAS it is enacted, *inter alia*, by section 15 of the Wheat Products (Prices Fixation) Act, 1938-1939, that the Governor may from time to time, on the recommendation of the Wheat Products Prices Committee constituted pursuant to the Act, by Proclamation fix the minimum and the maxi-mum price at which substances included in the definition of wheat products, may be sold in the definition of wheat products, may be sold in the

State, or in any specified part of the State, by the manufacturer thereof or by any person, and that the Governor may from time to time revoke or vary any Proclamation under the section by a subsequent Proclamation; and whereas the Governor by Proclamation dated the 31st day of August, 1955, and published in the Government Gazette on the 2nd day of September, 1955, fixed the prices at which bread, being a wheat product within the meaning of the Act, may be sold by any person in the various parts of the State specified in that Proclamation; and whereas it is deemed necessary and expedient to revoke that Proclamation: Now, therefore I, the Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and on the recommendation of the Wheat Products Prices Committee, and in exercise of the power in this behalf conferred upon me by the Act, do hereby—

- (a) revoke the Proclamation dated the 31st day of August, 1955, and published in the Government Gazette on the 2nd day of September, 1955; and
- (b) fix the prices at which bread, being a wheat product within the meaning of the Act, may be sold by any person in the various parts of the State specified in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Schedules to this Proclamation.

For the purposes of this Proclamation, unless inconsistent with the context-

- "Perth Metropolitan Area" means that portion of the State comprised in an imaginary circle having a radius of 25 miles from the General Post Office at Perth;
- "South-West Land Division" means that portion of the State defined in the Land Act, 1933-1954, as the South-West Land Division, excluding the Perth Metropolitan Area;
- "Kalgoorlie-Boulder Area" means all that area of the State comprised in an imaginary circle having a radius of eight miles from the principal post office at Kalgoorlie;
- "bread" means white bread, wholemeal bread, wholewheatmeal bread and brown bread;
- "delivery town" means a townsite in which a door to door delivery of bread to consumers is made within the boundary of that townsite, by one or more bakers operating a bakery or bakeries in that townsite;
- "non-delivery town" means a townsite in which no door to door delivery of bread to consumers is made within the boundary of that townsite by any baker operating a bakery in that townsite;
- "cash sale" means in relation to a sale of bread, a sale where payment is made for the bread so sold within seven days of the sale;
- "booked sale" means a sale where payment is not made for the bread so sold within seven days of the sale;
- "placed on public transport" means the delivery of bread packaged and labelled, to rail, carrier or public transport;
- "freight paid" means any charge or payment which is paid or payable by any person, other than a consumer in the transportation or delivery of bread by rail, carrier or public transport from any town in the South-West Land Division or any town specified in the Fourth Schedule to this Proclamation in which that bread is baked, to any place beyond the boundaries of such towns;
- "prescribed margin" in relation to the sale of bread, means, in respect of a 1 lb. loaf of bread, a margin of one half-penny and in respect of a 2 lb. loaf of bread, a margin of one penny;
- "1 lb. loaf" means a No. 1 loaf within the meaning of section 4 of the Bread Act, 1903-1949;
- "2 lb. loaf" means a No. 2 loaf within the meaning of section 4 of the Bread Act, 1903-1949.

For the purposes of this Proclamation-

- (a) where 1 lb. loaves of bread are sold by retail to the same purchaser by cash sale to the extent that the total number sold is two or a multiple of two, two 1 lb. loaves of bread shall be deemed to be a 2 lb. loaf;
- (b) where any maximum price calculated in accordance with the provisions of the Proclamation is not an exact multiple of one half-penny, then such maximum price shall be computed to the nearest upward half-penny.

3.-Scope.

This Award shall apply to the industries con-ducted by respondents and similar industries con-ducted by other persons, firms, or companies in respect of workers following the vocations men-tioned herein: Provided always, that it shall not apply to workers who are at present provided for in any award of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia or in any Industrial Agreement registered ill accordance with the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, to which another Industrial Union of Workers is a party.

4.—Area.

This Award shall be limited in its effect to the area comprised within a radius of twenty-five (25) miles from the Post Office, Kalgoorlie.

5.--Term.

This Award shall operate for a period of three (3) years as from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

6.—Definitions.

(a) "Shop Assistant" shall mean a worker employed in a retail establishment receiving and/or selling and/or assembling or preparing goods for sale by delivery. The term "shop assistant" shall include cashiers and storemen.

(b) "Casual Hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the hour and who may be put off or leave the employer's service at any moment without notice: Provided that a casual hand may be employed for not less than three (3) hours in any one day. A worker engaged and not permitted to commence work shall receive two (2) hours' pay at the prescribed rate.

(c) "Adult" shall mean a worker twenty-one (21) years of age and over or a worker who is in receipt of the prescribed adult rate of pay.

"Weekly Hand" shall mean a worker engaged by the week and whose employment shall be terminated by not less than one (1) week's notice on either side. Such week's notice cannot be continued from week to week's house tailing that any worker employed for a period of four (4) consecutive weeks or less shall be classed as a casual hand and paid not less than the minimum rate of wages herein prescribed for a casual hand, but this proviso shall not apply in cases where the services of a worker employed as a weekly hand have been dispensed with for incompetence or unsuitableness or any cause referred to in clause 14 hereof, or where the worker himself severs his own contract of service.

(e) "Wholesale establishment" shall mean any warehouse or place where goods are exclusively or principally sold for resale and/or where goods are sold for consumption and/or use in another business.

(f) "Canvasser" shall mean a worker who collects or requests orders by retail for goods in places other than the employers' establishments, but shall not include motor vehicle salesmen or van salesmen.

(g) "Collector" shall mean a worker whose principal duties consist of collecting money for his employer in places other than the employer's establishment. The duties of a canvasser or col-lector may be analgamated to suit the convenience of the employer's purpose of the employer's business.

(h) "Part-time workers": Part-time workers who are to be regularly employed for a period of less than forty (40) hours but for not less than twenty (20) hours per week may be employed by agree-ment between the employer and the Union.

Should the Union object to the worker's employment, the employer must be notified of such objection within twenty-four (24) hours from the time of the Union receiving such application.

In the event of no agreement being arrived at between the employer and the Union, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for decision.

Where a worker is employed under the provisions of this clause he shall receive payments for wages, for annual leave, holidays, and sick leave on a pro rata basis in the same proportion as the number of hours regularly worked each week bears to forty (40) hours.

7.—Chemists' Shops.

Any worker employed in a chemist's shop shall be subject to the terms of this Award up to the time he or she becomes indentured to the profession.

8.—Hours.

Except as provided hereunder the ordinary hours of work shall be as follows:—

(a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work.

(b) Except as provided in subclauses (c) and (d) hereof, the hours shall be performed between 8.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on five (5) days of the week, excluding Sunday, and between 8.30 a.m. and 12 o'clock noon on the weekly half holiday.

(c) The hours of workers employed in shops comprised in the Fourth Schedule of the Factories and Shops Act shall be worked to suit the convenience of the employer: Provided that the worker shall be notified of the half-day (which shall be granted to and taken by the worker on an afternoon in each week), upon which his or her services shall not be required.

(d) The hours of workers employed in wholesale establishments shall be worked as follows:—

- (i) Between 7.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on five (5) days of the week, excluding Sunday.
- (ii) Between 7.30 a.m. and 12 o'clock noon on Saturday, which is the day upon which the half-holiday in wholesale establishments shall be observed.

9.-Meal Times.

(a) Shops (other than Fourth Schedule shops and wholesale establishments):—One hour shall be given and taken for meals; lunch hour shall be between 11.30 a.m. and 2.30 p.m.

(b) Fourth Schedule Shops:—Meal hours in Fourth Schedule shops will be taken at the times most convenient to the employer's business: Provided that one hour shall be given and taken for each meal and that no more than five (5) or less than three (3) hours' interval shall be worked without an interval for a meal being taken.

(c) The meal hours referred to in this clause shall be taken in one continuous period.

(d) Notwithstanding anything contained in this clause, the lunch hour for workers in retail establishments other than Fourth Schedule shops shall, during the first two (2) days of each of three (3) sales per annum and during Christmas week, be given and taken between the hours of 11.30 a.m. and 2.30 p.m.

(e) In retail establishments a break of ten (10) minutes shall be allowed in the morning to any worker whose lunch hour shall commence not earlier than 1.30 p.m. A break of ten (10) minutes shall be allowed in the afternoon to any worker whose lunch hour shall commence earlier than 12 o'clock noon.

10.-Meal Money.

Workers who are subject to the starting and finishing times prescribed in subclauses (b) and (d) of clause 8 of this Award, and who are required to continue working after the prescribed finishing time for more than one (1) hour without being notified on the previous day, shall be provided with any meal required or be paid two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) in lieu thereof.

11.—Overtime.

(a) Excepting as provided hereunder, all overtime worked shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter. In the computation of overtime, each day shall stand by itself. (b) Where overtime is worked in Fourth Schedule shops the worker shall be paid overtime as provided in subclause (a) after the prescribed weekly hours of work have been exceeded. Work performed on Sundays and/or prescribed holidays shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) All time worked in establishments other than those referred to in subclause (b) hereof before the prescribed starting time or after the prescribed finishing time shall be paid for at overtime rates. Work performed in the afternoon of the day on which the weekly half-holiday is observed, on Sundays and/or prescribed holidays, shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

- (d) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award—
 - (i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.
 - (ii) No organisation, party to this Award or worker or workers covered by this Award shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

12.-Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall, subject to clause 11 hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely— New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Kalgoorlie or Boulder Cup Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

(b) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.

(c) Except as hereinafter provided a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(d) If any Award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(e) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(f) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(g) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subclause (e) of this clause to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.

(h) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or dereliction of duty, or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(i) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(j) Where a worker is entitled to annual leave under this clause, he shall receive at least two (2) weeks' notice from his employer of the date when it will be convenient to the employer that such worker should take his annual leave.

13.—Higher Duties.

A worker who is required to do work which is classified at a higher rate under this Award than that which he or she usually performs, shall be entitled to payment at the higher rate while so employed.

14.—Engagement.

One week's notice on either side shall be neces-sary to terminate the engagement: Provided that an employer at any time may dismiss a worker for refusal or neglect to obey orders or for mis-conduct. or if, after receiving one week's notice, such worker does not carry out his or her duties in the same manner as he or she did prior to such notice.

15.-Time and Wages Record.

The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause The employer shall keep and enter up, or cause to be kept and entered up, a record containing the names of each of his workers to whom this Award applies, the class of work performed by and the wages paid to each worker, the age of each junior worker and the time during which each worker has been employed. Such record shall be cpen to inspection by a representative of the Union between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on any working day from Monday to Friday inclusive and shall be kept in the establishment or shop where the worker is usually employed the worker is usually employed.

16.—Junior Worker's Certificate.

(a) Junior workers shall furnish the employer with a certificate showing the following particulars:-

(i) Name in full.

(ii) Age and date of birth.

(b) The certificate shall be signed by the worker. (c) No worker shall have any claim upon the employer for additional wages in the event of his age being wrongly stated on the certificate.

17.-Proportion of Junior Workers.

Two (2) junior workers may be employed for every adult worker employed. Provided that where no adult worker is employed, one (1) junior may be employed.

18.-Board of Reference.

(a) The Court appoints, for the purpose of the Award, a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived to the parties to the Award the functions at between the parties to the Award, the functions of-

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpreta-tions of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
- (ii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are em-bodied in this Award.

19.—Change Room.

Where an employer usually has more than six (6) workers engaged at the same time under the terms of this Award, he shall provide his workers with a suitable room for keeping their hats and clothing and to use as a room for taking their meals. Such room shall be situated within a reasonable distance of his place of business and shall be kept in a proper state of cleanliness and shall be kept in a proper state of cleanliness and shall be equipped with coathangers, tables and chairs.

20.-Uniforms and Overalls.

Should any dispute arise between the parties as to the wearing of uniforms and overalls, if such are required to be worn, the dispute, howsoever originating and any matter arising thereout, including the matter of the laundering of uniforms and overalls, shall be determined by the Board of Reference.

21.-Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who, by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

22.-Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week for each completed month of service: Provided that pay-ment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one week in each calendar year. Pay-ment hereuwder may be adjusted at the end of be limited to one week in each calendar year. Pay-ment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

23.-Exclusions.

Provided always, and it is hereby expressly agreed and declared, that nothing in this Award shall apply to workers in any wholesale business (ex-cepting wholesale hardware) other than the fol-lowing:—Adult and junior, storemen, despatch hands, packers and messengers.

24.—Wages.

The minimum rates of wages payable to workers covered by this Award shall be as follows:-Don wool

(e) Where a canvasser or collector provides his own bicycle, he shall be paid an allowance of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per week, or pro-vides his own motor cycle, he shall be paid at the rate of twopence (2d.) per mile covered in the course of his employer's business.

(f) Any person, whether a junior or adult, employed as a canvasser and/or collector, shall be paid the full adult minimum rate. This sub-clause shall not apply in cases where an adult canvasser is absent from his employment on account of sickness, accident, or the holidays to which such adult canvasser is entitled under this Award Award.

(g) Casual Hands: Whilst so engaged, casual hands shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates herein prescribed.

25.-No Reduction.

Nothing herein contained shall of itself entitle an employer to reduce the wage of any junior female worker who at the date of this Award was being paid a higher rate of wage than the minimum herein prescribed for her class of work.

Between West Australian Branch, Australasian Meat Industry Employees' Union, Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and Mid-land Junction Abattoir Board, the Hon. Minister for Agriculture, Respondents.

THE Conclusion Commissioner, in pursuance of the powers and duties conferred upon him by section 108B of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, and in pursuance of a remission made to him by the Court of Arbitration, doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the industrial dispute between the abovenamed parties.

1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the Metropolitan District Abattoir (Local Consumption) Award and supersedes Agreement No. 6 of 1943, as amended, Agreement No. 11 of 1954, as amended, and Agree-ment No. 12 of 1954, as amended.

3.-Area and Scope.

(a) This Award shall apply to workers employed by the Midland Junction Abattoir Board at Midby the Minister for Agriculture at Robb's Jetty on the killing and dressing of sheep. lambs, cattle and pigs for local consumption.

(b) Pigs (Midland Junction): Not withstanding anything else contained in this Award, pigs slaughtered on the solo system shall be governed by the conditions, rates and tallies prescribed in Award No. 10 of 1939.

(c) Cattle (Robb's Jetty): Notwithstanding anything else contained in this Award whilst the present system of solo slaughtering of cattle operates at Robb's Jetty Abattoirs, Award No. 10 of 1939, as amended, shall continue to apply in respect of such work.

4.—Term.

This Award shall operate for a period of one (1) year from the commencement of the first pay period after date hereof.

5.—Preference.

(a) In engaging and/or retaining labour, preference of employment shall be given to financial members of the West Australian Branch of the Australian Meat Industry Employees' Union In-dustrial Union of Workers, Perth, providing there are members offering who are competent to perform the work to be done.

(b) Upon a non-member of the Union being engaged, such person shall within fourteen (14) days make and complete an application for mem-bership of the Union, but if he is a financial member of another Industrial Union he shall not be required to make such application as above until the expiration of his current membership with such other Union.

(c) If during the continuance of this Award, the members of the Union or a majority of the members of the Union employed under the terms of this Award shall be concerned in or take part in anything in the nature of a strike, the benefit of this clause shall *ipso facto* cease and determine.

6.--Time and Wages Records.

A record or time book shall be kept by the employer in which record or time book shall be entered the name of each worker, the nature of the work he is doing, the hours worked each day and the amount of wages received by him.

The said record or time book shall be open to inspection by the secretary of the Union or any other person authorised in writing by him at any time during the usual office hours and he shall be allowed to take necessary extracts therefrom.

Any system of automatic recording of times by machine shall be deemed to comply with these provisions to the extent of the information recorded.

7.--Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of casuals, the employment shall be weekly and a week's notice on either side shall be given to terminate engagement or a week's wages paid in lieu. However, this shall not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct. and in such cases, wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

(b) The employer shall be under no obligation to pay for any day not worked on which the worker is required to present himself for duty except when such absence from work is due to illness and comes within the provisions of the "Sick Leave" clause, or such absence is on account of believe the such absence is on account "Sick Leave" clause, or such absence is on account of holidays to which a worker is entitled under the provisions of this Award. Provided further that the employer shall be entitled to deduct pay-ment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it, or by any other Association or Union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

8.-Settlement of Disputes.

In the event of any dispute arising in connection with any work performed under this Award, it is mutually agreed that the work will be carried on without interruption and the employer or the Union whose members are bound by this Award, in the event of no agreement being reached between the parties to the dispute, either party may make application for the matter to be referred to a Board of Reference, which shall consist of a chairman mutually agreed upon or alternatively appointed by the Court, and two other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

The said Board shall have assigned to it the functions of adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of this Award.

9.—Provision of Grindstone.

A power driven grindstone shall be installed where necessary.

10.-First Aid Equipment.

A first aid room with all necessary equipment for same shall be provided, with qualified first aid personnel available to administer same.

11.---Holidays.

(a) Subject to conditions hereunder, each of the following day or days observed in lieu thereof following day of days observed in heu thereof shall be allowed as holidays to all workers without deduction of pay, namely:—New Year's Day, Aus-tralia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and Queen's Birthday, provided that Union Picnic Day may be taken as a holiday by average the neutrics in lieu of Queen's arrangement between the parties in lieu of Queen's Birthday.

(b) If any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day, he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday.

(c) In the case of workers working a five day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Any employee absent from employment on the working day before or the working day after the holiday without reasonable excuse or without the consent of the employer shall not be entitled to payment for the holiday.

(e) For the purpose of subclause (b) the rate of pay for a slaughterman on a public holiday shall be the minimum daily rate as prescribed in clause 28.

12.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive week's leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed, shall be allowed annually to a worker by the employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with the employer. Providing that such leave shall be granted within three (3) months of such leave accruing due.

(b) A worker may be rostered off and granted annual leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed prior to his having completed a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service, in which case should the services of such worker terminate or be terminated prior to the completion of twelve (12) months' continuous service, the said worker shall refund to the employer the difference between the amount received by him for wages in respect of the period of his annual leave and the amount which would have accrued to him by reason of the length of his services.

(c) When computing the annual leave due under this clause, no deduction shall be made for such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/or holidays.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by the employer for a portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with the employer.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft, no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment thereof.

(f) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

(g) The rate of payment for annual leave shall be the employee's normal rate of pay at the time of taking such leave, with the exception of slaughtermen whose rates of payment shall be the rate prescribed in clause 28. Minimum rate shall not include cases where employees have been relieving at higher rates of pay immediately prior to taking leave. Provided that such relieving time does not exceed four (4) consecutive weeks.

(h) No deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case the deductions may be made for such excess only.

(i) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six (6) months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(j) The employer shall give workers one month's notice of the date on which a worker is to commence his leave.

(k) If any holiday under this Award falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

13.—Sick Leave.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth $(1/1^{\circ}th)$ of a week for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week in each calendar year in respect to each worker, but the sick leave herein provided shall be allowed to accumulate and any portion unused in any year may be availed of in the next or any succeeding year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of any accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) In the case of slaughtermen payment for sick leave shall be at the minimum daily rate prescribed in clause 28.

14.—Hours.

(a) Day Workers: Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work to be worked in five (5) daily periods of eight (8) hours, Monday to Friday inclusive, in consecutive shifts, excluding meal periods.

(b) Shift Workers: (i) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work and the normal hours of work shall be eight (8) hours per day from Monday to Saturday inclusive.

(ii) Workers called upon to perform shift work shall be paid a penalty rate of ten per cent. (10%) in excess of their normal daily wage.

(c) General: The employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirements.

The Union or any worker, or workers covered by this Award shall not in any way directly or indirectly, be party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

15.—Overtime.

(1) Day Workers.

(a) Overtime shall be paid for as follows:—For all time worked within one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ hours before the worker's usual starting time, time and one half for the time worked within such one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ hour period.

(b) For all time worked after the worker's usual ceasing time to midnight, time and one half for the first four (4) hours and thereafter double time.

(c) For all time worked in the period commencing from midnight or commencing before one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ hours of the worker's usual starting time, double time up to the worker's usual starting time.

(d) When employees are required during their recognised meal hour or any portion of their recognised meal hour, as agreed between the parties, overtime rate shall be paid: Provided that all workers shall have a meal hour within five (5) hours of commencing duty.

(e) For all work performed on Saturdays, time and one half for the first four (4) hours, thereafter double time with a minimum payment for two (2) hours.

(f) For all work performed on Sundays and holidays, double time with a minimum payment for two (2) hours.

(2) Slaughtermen.

(a) Sheep and Lambs: Slaughtermen engaged on work as detailed in clause 26 (a), when required to kill in excess of 74 head per man per day, shall be paid rate and one half for such excess.

(b) Cattle: Slaughtermen engaged on work as detailed in clause 26 (b), when required to kill in excess of 13 head per man per day, shall be paid rate and one half for such excess.

(c) Calves: Slaughtermen eugaged on work as detailed in clause 26 (c), when required to kill in excess of 26 head per man per day, shall be paid rate and one half for such excess.

Pigs: Slaughtermen engaged on work (\mathbf{b}) detailed in clause 26 (d) when required to kill in excess of 36 head, shall be paid rate and one half for such excess.

(3) Shift Workers.

(a) All time worked by shift workers in excess of the hours rostered in any one day shall be paid for at the rate of time and one half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.

(b) All work performed on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at the rate of double time with a minimum payment for two (2) hours.

(4) General.

For the purpose of calculating overtime, each day shall stand alone.

16.-Meal Hours.

(a) Time allowed under this Agreement for a meal shall not exceed one (1) hour and shall be taken between the hours of 11.30 a.m. and 1.30 p.m.

(b) When a worker without being notified on the previous day, is required to continue work after the usual knock off time for more than one (1) hour or in the case of a day worker after 6 p.m., whichever is the later, he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid three chilling and cincence (2c (d) in hour bound shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) in lieu thereof.

17.—Smoko.

Workers under this Award shall be allowed a sinoko of 15 minutes each forenoon and a further smoko of 15 minutes each afternoon.

18.---Starting and Finishing Time.

Except where otherwise provided or mutually agreed upon between the Union and the employer, the ordinary starting time for workers other than shift workers shall not be earlier than 7.30 a.m. and the ordinary ceasing time shall not be later than 5 p.m. Monday to Friday inclusive. Provided that where agreement cannot be reached between the matties on any proposed alteration to the the parties on any proposed alteration to the times herein stated the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

19.-Number of Employees.

(a) The number of employees to be employed in any day or gang shall be regulated by the employer, provided that where sufficient experienced labour is available the following minimum number of slaughtermen employed by the Midland Junction Abattoir Board shall be designated as slaughter-men (regular) and shown as such in the wages record and on the worker's pay envelope:---

Beef Hall—14. Sheep and lamb chain—30.

Pig section-

(b) The employer may employ up to the maximum number of slaughtermen (regular) who are available, irrespective of the size of the day's kill, provided that slaughtermen, other than slaughter-men (regular), shall not be employed if their employment would reduce the tally per man per day unreasonably below the numbers referred to in clause 15 (2).

(c) Robb's Jetty: As soon as is reasonably practicable after the date of this Award a number of workers for each section shall be similarly designated as slaughtermen (regular) following which all provisions relating to such classification shall similarly apply.

(d) The number of slaughtermen (regular) so designated may be varied at any time by the Board of Reference.

20.-Mixed Functions.

(a) Subject to subclause (b) and (c) hereof, (a) Subject to subclause (b) and (c) hereon, where in any one (1) day any employee performs functions of a mixed character each carrying a different rate of pay, he shall be paid for the day's work at the higher rate, providing that such higher class of work constitutes at least two hours of his dayie actual work otherwise he shall be of his day's actual work, otherwise he shall be paid for the time actually worked at the higher rate with a minimum of one (1) hour; provided

an employee working both as a time worker and a slaughterman on any day, shall be paid time worker and rates for the period he has worked as a time worker in addition to his earnings as a slaughtermail and shall be permitted, if working on slaughtering work when such work ceases for the day, to cease work for the day upon the com-pletion of the slaughtering task on which he is engaged.

engaged. (b) Slaughtermen (regular) if available at the ordinary starting time shall, irrespective of the duties performed, be paid not less than the mini-mum rate for a slaughterman; provided that where any such slaughterman, except at his own request, is required to perform other duties and a position in the team is occupied by a worker other than a slaughterman (regular), he shall be paid the amount he would have earned if employed in his normal capacity as a slaughterman (regular) on normal capacity as a slaughterman (regular) on that day. But where a slaughterman (regular) reports for duty after the usual starting time, he shall be paid only the rates for the work actually performed.

(c) Slaughterman, other than slaughterman (regular):

- (i) Who is notified by the foreman on the previous day, or before starting time, that his services will not be required as such, shall be paid only the rates for the work actually performed.
- (ii) Who is notified within one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ hours of commencing work that he is to be transferred to other duties, shall bbe paid at the slaughterman's rate up to the time of the transfer and at the appropriate rate for such other duties for the time worked at such other duties.
- (iii) Who is notified of transfer after one and a half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ hours of commencing work, shall be paid the minimum rate for a slaughterman as contained in clause 28 for that day.

(d) The foregoing provisions shall be subject to subclause (b) of clause 7 (Contract of Service).

(e) "Slaughterman" means a worker coming within any of the provisions of subclauses (a), (b), (c) and (d) of clause 26.

21.—Transfer.

Subject to clause 20 (Mixed Functions) the employer may transfer employees from one department to another at the prescribed rates of pay for the work performed.

22.-Junior Workers.

(a) The minimum rate of wage to be paid to junior workers shall be:-

(b) Junior workers may be employed on all classes of work covered by this Award; provided that if employed as slaughtermen or in group A or B of the chain system they shall be entitled to be paid in accordance with the adult rates for that class of work; provided further that no junior under the age of eighteen (18) years shall be employed in the chain system.

(d) Junior workers shall be allowed to operate the head splitting machine and the rate of wage for this work shall be 75 per cent. (75%) at least of the male basic wage.

23.—Apprentices.

(1) The employment of apprentices shall be governed by the statutory Apprenticeship Regulations, 1953.

(2) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to any employer shall be in the proportion of oue (1) apprentice to every four (4) or fraction of four (4) journeymen employed.

(3) The period of apprenticeship shall be five (5) years, providing, however, in the case of youths who have already had experience in the industry, the period may be reduced with the consent of the Court or by agreement with the Union as to the allowance to be made out of the set period of five (5) years for the experience already gained in the industry.

24.—Casual Hands.

All or any casual workers starting any time during the day shall be paid the full rate for the day. The casual rate shall be paid unless the worker shall be notified by the foreman before 5 p.m. on the day of the engagement that he is to be employed as a weekly hand. Casual workers shall receive twenty per cent. (20%) in addition to ordinary wages, based on *pro rata* per day of wages for the class of work performed.

25.—Under-rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After aplication has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

26.-Work of Employees.

(a) "Sheep and lamb slaughtering": Group A shall include catching, sticking and shackling. Group B shall include skinning hind legs, removing hind trotters, placing long hooks and removing shackles, skinning forelegs and removing trotters, snackles, skinning torelegs and removing trotters, removing tongue and sweetbread, cheeking, tying weasands, punching, cleaning brisket, splitting skins, flanking out and thumbing up, clearing tail and rectum gut, punching off skins, scalping and removing heads, gutting, removing paunches and plucks, trimming neck and splitting down briskets.

(b) "Slaughtering and dressing cattle": The work of slaughtering and dressing cattle under work of slaughtering and dressing cattle under the present team system shall include lowering to bed from dropper rail, returning "G" hook, pritch-ing up, removing feet, opening up, siding, pulling caul fat, sawing brisket and H. bone and thoroughly wiping up on ground, hook up and hoist, and thoroughly wipe up at half-hoist, remov-ing insides, thoroughly wipe up at full-hoist, remov-ing and flaying hides, neck off and wipe up, splitting carcases with power saw.

(c) "Killing and dressing of calves" shall include grounding, removing feet, skinning if required, removing tail if required, removing insides, remov-ing pluck, sawing through rump bone and brisket, wiping up and cleaning, trimming and hanging off, and attach sweetbreads as directed.

(d) "Killing and dressing of pigs" shall include stunning, shackling and hoisting to bleeding rail, sticking, handling into and in scalding tank, handling out of scalding tank, scraping, shaving and thoroughly cleaning, opening up and removing insides, and chopping or sawing down, washing and hanging off, singeing if required and handling into or out of dehairing machine.

(e) "Cattle-boner's work" shall include quartering, breaking down, boning out whole carcases, as required, removing briskets, and cleaning up when not provided with a full day's work on actual boning.

(f) "Calf-boner's work" shall include breaking down, boning out, and cleaning up when not provided with a full day's work on actual boning.
(g) All work to be done in a workmanlike manner

and to the satisfaction of the foreman.

27.—Payment of Wages.

Wages shall be paid on Friday of each week or on the last working day, as the case may be. Times shall be made up to the previous Wednesday (inclusive).

28.—Minimum Rate.

For the purpose of holidays, annual leave, sick leave and clause 20, the minimum daily wage (on a basic wage of £12 12s. 5d.) for slaughtermen shall be as follows:---

- Pigs—£3 7s. 8d. per day representing a weekly margin of £4 6s. 3d.
- All others—£3 10s. 9d. per day, r a weekly margin of £5 1s. 4d. representing

29.—Rates.

(1) **Basic** Wage:

(a) The wage rates contained in this Award are made on a basic wage of £12 12s. 5d.

(b) Notwithstanding any alteration in the basic wage the slaughtering rates herein prescribed shall remain constant; provided, however, that should the basic wage rise or fall, the total daily earnings of a slaughterman shall be reduced or increased to the extent of one-fifth (1/5th) of the variation of the basic wage, Monday to Friday.

(2) Slaughtermen:

A.—Cattle.

(i) All cattle, other than calves, bulls and genuine stags—6s. per head. For the purpose of clause 15 (2) (b), all cattle shall be paid for at 9s. per head.

(ii) Calves—3s. per head. For the purpose of clause 15 (2) (c) all calves shall be paid for at the rate of 4s. 6d. per head.

(iii) Tubercular and/or gangrenous cattle, i.e., where one quarter or more of a beast is condemned on account of tuberculosis and/or gangrene double rates.

(iv) Bulls and genuine stags, 300 lb. or over-double rates. "Genuine stag" means a fully grown animal that exhibits characteristics of a bull including a definite neck crest.

(v) Tubercular, injured or septic calves (foreman to decide whether injury or infection is sufficient to justify additional rates)—double rates.

B-Sheep and Lambs-Chain System.

All sheep and lambs for domestic supplies (i) not otherwise specified :-

Group A-9s. 4.2d. per hundred.

Group B-£5 0s. 7.8d. per hundred.

When more than one chain is operating, those shall divide 9s. 4.2d. per hundred between them and the balance, namely, $\pounds 5$ 0s. 7.8d. shall be equally divided between the workers employed in Group B as defined in clause 26 (a).

When only one chain is in operation, the composite rate of $\pounds 5$ 10s. per hundred will be divided equally amongst the team, namely, those workers employed in Groups A and B.

(ii) Injured, maggoty, daggy, downer, objectionably crippled, objectionably wet or dirty sheep or lambs, full wool sheep, sheep over 62lb. chilled weight as shown on the scales—rate and a half.

(iii) All rains (including ram lambs 50lb, and over) and genuine stags—double rates. "Genuine stag" means any animal that has been castrated late or after maturity and which fully exhibits ram characteristics but does not include wethers, that have been burdizzod.

(iv) In all cases of extra rates, the foreman to decide whether the extra rate is justified.

(v) Learner Slaughtermen: Learner slaughtermen who have attained the age of 18 years may be employed and shall be taught to be proficient in at least three operations of a chain slaughterman before being adjudged competent.

No learner shall be engaged as a slaughterman on the chain until he has been adjudged com-petent by the foreman or, in the event of any dispute as to his competency, has passed a com-petency test to the satisfaction of a majority of members of a Board of Examiners consisting of one representative of the Union, one representative of the employer and a competent person agreed upon by the parties as chairman.

Necessary equipment will be issued to learners at the commencement of trial period, such equip-ment to be returned to the management on completion of a period or the cost of same may be deducted from any wages due to such worker.

Learner slaughtermen shall be paid the rate prescribed for slaughterhouse labourers. (viii) "Chain-Setter-Rover" shall be paid an amount equivalent to the weekly earnings of slaughtermen on the chain, but shall not in any case be paid for any day less than the minimum daily wage as prescribed for a mutton slaughterman in clause 28.

C.--Pigs.

30.—General Conditions.

(a) Mounted stockman who supplies and uses his own dog shall be paid five shillings (5s.) per week extra.

(b) The employer shall supply free of charge to each employee engaged in handling carcasses of meat or edible offal, singlets or flannels and denim trousers, or overalls or blue coats and denim trousers to suit the circumstances of the particular position. The clothing shall remain the property of the employer and the employee shall take all reasonable care of same.

The issue shall be two (2) complete sets per annum. If the employee wilfully damages or fails to return them on demand, the employer may recover from the employees concerned the cost of replacing such singlets, flannels, trousers and/or overalls so damaged or not so returned, or may deduct such cost from all moneys payable to such employee.

(c) Legging material shall be supplied where the customary use of such material is required.

(d) Waterproof Clothing: Waterproof boots and waterproof aprons shall be provided by the em-ployer free of charge to employees engaged as washers and scrubbers. Canvas aprons shall be provided to employees treating offal. Such boots and aprops shall remain the property of the and aprons shall remain the property of the employer.

(e) Handling Condemned Carcasses: The employer shall provide ample quantities of hot water, soap and disinfectant such as cyllin ixol, etc., for the use of employees required to handle carcasses and animals condemned by meat inspectors as unfit for human consumption because of disease.

(f) Employees engaged in handling dead stock and who are in the regular dead stock gang shall be paid an additional 5s. per week.

31.-Tally Board.

The employer shall cause to hang in a conspicuous place a board on which shall be recorded the daily tally of the number of men in each gang or cliain.

IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 41 of 1955.

Between The Royal Australian Nursing Federation (Western Australian Branch) Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, Applicant, and Alexandra Home for Women (Incorp.), Respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties; and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination; and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference; and whereas the parties have this day appeared before whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Court, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum here-under written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include (Agreement.")

l.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Mothercraft Nurses Award" and replaces Industrial Agreement No. 26 of 1949.

3.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to registered nurses and registered mothercraft and student nurses em-ployed by the respondent.

4.---Term.

This Award shall be for a period of three (3) years with the right of any party hereto to apply to the Court of Arbitration for amendment after twelve (12) months.

5.—Definitions.

(a) "Sister" shall mean a nurse with general certificate who has had not less than two years' experience after registration.

(b) "Senior Sister" shall mean the nurse appointed to be next in charge to the matron.

Note.-For the purpose of this clause, experience in hospitals, institutions of homes covered by Award No. 24 of 1955 shall count as experience under this Award.

(c) "Mothercraft Nurse" is one who is registered or entitled to be registered as such in Western Australia under the Nurses Registration Act, 1921-1953.

(d) "Trainee" shall mean a pupil undergoing training as a mothercraft nurse.

(e) "Federation" shall mean the Royal Australian Nursing Federation (Western Australian Branch) Industrial Union of Workers, Perth.

6.—Hours.

(a) The ordinary hours of work shall be forty (40) hours per week exclusive of meal times, pro-vided that for trainees the hours worked shall be in straight shifts of eight (8) hours each.

(b) Morning and afternoon tea shall be pro-vided by the employer, to be taken as convenient, without deduction of the time involved.

(c) Those on day duty shall be allowed at least one and a half (l_2^{\perp}) days' continuous time off duty ber week, and those on night duty shall be allowed at least one and a half (l_2^{\perp}) days' continuous time off duty per week or three (3) days' continuous time off duty per fortnight.

7.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked in excess of the normal hours of duty shall be paid for at the rate of-

(i) Time and a half for the first eight hours;(ii) Double time thereafter.

(b) Less than thirty (30) minutes overtime per week or one (1) hour's overtime per fortnight as the case may be, shall not be paid for.

8.—Holidays.

(a) Every employee covered by this Award, where not otherwise provided for, shall be entitled to four (4) weeks' leave on full pay for each twelve (12) months' service: Provided that a fortnight shall be taken during the first twelve (12) months and the balance to be taken on completion of training.

(b) An employee with more than one (1) months' service, and in the case of a trainee, three (3) months' service, who may resign or be dismissed, except the dismissal is due to misconduct, shall be entitled to pay for holidays pro rata up to the time of her leaving the service in such proportion as her period of employment bears to the number of days in the year.

(c) In addition to her salary, the employee on leave shall, where board and lodging allowance as prescribed by clause 18, is not included in the salary, be entitled to receive such allowance for the period of her leave.

(d) Leave shall be paid for in advance at the rate of salary the employee was receiving at the time of taking such leave.

9.—Sick Leave.

(a) Sick leave with pay will be granted on the following scale on the production of an adequate medical certificate or, in regard to leave not exceeding two (2) days, other evidence of ill-health satisfactory to the employer:-

- (i) Under three (3) years' service, one and a quarter (11) days for each calendar
- month of continuous service with the home. (ii) Over three (3) years' service, two (2) months on full pay. The employee must furnish proof of continuous service.

(b) Sick leave may be granted in one or more periods, but the aggregate amount of leave on pay shall not in any one triennial period exceed the time provided for in the foregoing scale.

(c) A "triennial period" shall be three (3) years preceding the date of the commencement of absence through illness in respect of which leave is claimed.

(d) If sickness is due to the wilful neglect or default of the worker, the proof whereof lies upon the employer, it shall, if granted, be without pay.

10 .- Termination of Service.

(a) Except in the case of dismissal for misconduct an employee's services shall not be terminated unless she has received fourteen (14) days' previous notice or pay for such period in lieu thereof.

(b) No employee shall, without the consent of her employer, resign without first having given fourteen (14) days' previous notice of her intention so to do; and in the absence of such notice the employer may withhold holiday or other pay up to the amount of fourteen (14) days' wages: Provided that this shall not apply in the case of a nurse who has received a summons for duty with any of the armed forces of Australia.

(c) An employee dismissed for misconduct shall have the right of appeal against such dismissal to an Industrial Magistrate or Police or Resident Magistrate, or such person as may be agreed upon by her with her employer, and such employee shall be entitled to a written statement as to reason for her dismissal from her employer within fourteen (14) days of the said employer's having received a written request for such statement.

(d) This clause shall not apply to casual employees.

11.—Trainees.

(a) Every trainee shall be given the opportunity of securing by experience a knowledge of all duties essential to her calling performed in a mothercraft training school.

(b) The period of training shall be such as is prescribed in the regulations issued by the Nurses Registration Board.

(c) Any employer taking a trainee on probation shall, within fourteen (14) days thereafter, register such probationer by giving notice thereof to the Registrar in writing.

(d) Within one (1) month from the end of the period of probation an agreement in writing as required by the Act shall be executed and signed by the employer, the trainee, and, where the trainee is under twenty-one (21) years of age, the parent or legal guardian of the probationer. There shall be three (3) executed copies of such agreement, of which one copy shall be held by the employer, one by the trainee or her parent or guardian, and one shall be lodged with the Registrar.

(e) Trainees shall be employed for a period of four (4) months on probation; such period shall count as part of the term of service.

(f) The agreement may be cancelled by initial consent of the parties, but notification of such cancellation must be forwarded to the Registrar within fourteen (14) days from the date thereof.

(g) The employer, with the consent of the Court, may discharge a trainee from service and cancel the agreement for misconduct or wilful disobedience or any other cause which the Court may deem sufficient: Provided, however, the employer shall be entitled to impose any other disciplinary measures as are provided in the indentures.

(h) Lecture Times: Any lectures or examinations which occur normally during duty hours shall be computed as part of the working time of the trainees whose duty it is to attend such lectures or examinations, and there shall be no reduction in salary in respect thereto.

(i) Trainees who do not pass their final examinations may be retained until such examinations are passed, and during such period they shall be paid at the rate provided for trainees in their final year. But such extended period shall in no case exceed twelve (12) months. (j) The employer shall report to the Court in writing the result of all examinations immediately the result is available, showing---

- (i) the names of the candidates sitting;
- (ii) the training school attended;
- (iii) the result of the examinations.

This report shall be available for inspection by the Union secretary or her authorised nominee.

(k) The proportion of trainees in a mothercraft training school aproved by the Nurses Registration Board shall be not more than eight (8) trainees to each certificated nurse.

12.—Laundry and Uniforms.

(a) Each employee shall be entitled to all reasonable laundry work at the expense of the employer, but where the uniform of any employee cannot be laundered at the home an allowance of three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) per week shall be paid to that employee.

(b) The employer shall provide all uniforms, which shall at all times remain the property of the employer, provided that—

- (i) trainees shall pay an amount of three guineas (£3 3s.) towards the cost of initial uniforms at the commencement of their training, but on completion of the first twelve (12) months of training the amount of three guineas (£3 3s.) shall be refunded to the trainee.
- (ii) In lieu of providing uniforms the employer may pay an allowance of 4s. per week.

13.—Rosters.

A roster of the working hours shall be exhibited in such place as it may conveniently and readily be seen by each employee concerned. The roster shall be posted not less than forty-eight (48) hours preceding the day on which the roster commences. The roster shall be available to the Union secretary for inspection at all reasonable times. Rosters may be altered at any time if the centre exigencies render any alteration necessary.

14.—Time and Wages Book.

(a) A time book shall be open for inspection at all reasonable times by the Union secretary, or her nominee, appointed in writing under the seal of the Union. Each employee must record daily in such book the exact time on which she starts and finishes duty and also time booked off for meals.

(b) The salary sheets shall, upon reasonable notice being given, be open for inspection at the office of the centre by the Union secretary or her nominee appointed as aforesaid.

(c) Any system of automatic recording by means of a machine shall be deemed a compliance with the provisions of subclause (a) so far as the particulars actually recorded are concerned.

15.---Interviews.

The Union secretary shall be entitled to interview members of the Union on the centre's premises at reasonable times.

16.-Notices.

If the Union so requests, a copy of this Award shall be posted on a board of reasonable size in a place where it may be conveniently and readily seen by every employee concerned. The Union secretary may also post thereon such other notices relating to Union matters as are reasonable.

17.—Preference.

All other qualifications being equal, preference in employment and promotion shall be given to members of the Federation. This provision shall not apply to the engagement of trainees.

18.—Living Allowance.

(a) Where board and lodging are provided the employer shall be entitled to deduct from the wages of the worker an amount equal to thirty-three and one-third per cent. $(33\frac{1}{3}\%)$ of the female basic wage. Provided that student nurses who are paid a percentage of the basic wage shall receive free board and lodging assessed at the above rate.

(b) In all cases the ratio of the value of board to that of lodging in the board and lodging allow-ance shall be two to one.

(c) The Federation secretary or her nominee duly appointed in writing under the seal of the Federation shall be entitled to inspect such food and accommodation at reasonable times.

(d) Where an employee is required to live out a payment of fifteen shillings (15s.) per week shall be made by the employer in approved cases. Provided that any dispute between the Federation and the employer shall be referred to a Board of Reference for determination.

(e) Where employees who are paid on a living out basis are provided with meals by the em-ployer, deduction shall be made from their wages at the rate of one twenty-first (1/21) of the allow-ance for board in accordance with subclause (b) hereof for each meal provided.

19.—Casuals.

A mothercraft nurse employed for a period of less than two (2) weeks shall be deemed a casual employee and be paid ten per cent. (10%) over the rate specified in this Award.

If a casual employee is still required at the end of two (2) weeks, she may be re-employed as a casual with payment as aforesaid for another two (2) weeks.

20.-Other Provisions.

(a) Trainees sitting for the examination held by the Nurses' Registration Board, shall be taken off night duty at least four (4) weeks, as far as practicable, before the examinations are held.
(b) For Nurses' Registration Board examina-

tions, as far as practicable, three (3) consecutive days off, i.e., one and one-half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ days to be days off for the week, and one and one-half $(1\frac{1}{2})$ days of examinations.

(c) Trainees shall not be placed on more than two (2) consecutive months on night duty in any one year.

21.-Board of Reference.

(a) The Court appoints for the purposes of the Award a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Agreement, the functions of-

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of the Agreement, or any of them;
- (ii) deciding any other matters that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Agreement.

22.—Salaries.

(a) Definitions:

(i) "Mechanical Unit"—subject to para-graph (ii) hereof the term "Mech-anical Unit" includes any mobile loader, rope scraper loader or other type of loader, shuttle car and con-tinuous miner.

(ii) "Personnel"----the "nersonnel" term means employees on mechanical units, means employees on mechanical units, employees on coal cutting or coal-boring machines working in a mine, or group of mines where common seniority applies, wherein coal is pro-duced wholly or in part by mechanical units; and any other employee pro-vided for in item 23 of Clause (6) (c) working in conjunction with mechanical units.

(b) Appointments:

The following conditions shall apply to the appointment of personnel to positions and for the filling of vacancies where it is known that such vacancy will exist for a longer period than two consecutive working days:

- (i) The management shall have the right to select the personnel for positions on mechanical units. Provided that an employee who, by reason of length of service at a mine, or group of mines where common seniority applies, thinks that he should have been selected for such appointment, shall have the right to apply to the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal for an order directing his appointment.
- (ii) Upon the hearing of the application the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal shall have regard to the age, length of service, nature of experience, record as to reliability and attendance for work and aptitude for machine work of the applicants.
- (iii) If, having regard to the above matters, the Western Australian Coal Industry Tribunal is satisfied that the appointment of the applicant would not interfere with safety, or the efficient work-ing of the mine, the Tribunal may direct his appointment or may make such order as it thinks fit. Provided however that should the ap-pointee prove in the opinion of the management unsuitable in carrying out the duties of the position he may out the duties of the position, he may be transferred to another position without reduction in pay pending the decision of the Tribunal on an application by the management to review its previous decision.
- (iv) The person employed performing the work usually performed by a wheeler only shall be paid wheeler's rates.
- (v) Should any worker refuse to accept the Should any worker refuse to accept the offer of an appointment as personnel on mechanical units or should any personnel on mechanical units forfeit his place to undertake other work in the mine he shall, for the purpose of selection, revert to the back of the seniority list. Provided that, should any personnel on mechanical units through incapacity require a period of relief or by reason of some special qualifications be required to do some special work for the management, a period of release may be arranged by mutual agreement between the manmutual agreement between the manager and the union, or failing mutual agreement the matter may be determined by the Board of Reference.
