THE Court of Arbitration of Western Australia doth hereby make the following Award in connection with the industrial dispute between the abovenamed parties:-

#### Award.

#### 1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Watchmakers and Jewellers' Award" and replaces Award No. 58 of 1947, as amended.

## 3.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to workers employed as watchmakers, clockmakers, watch and clock repairers, jewellers, setters, general jewellers' trades-men and engravers connected with the jewellery trade and workers using a watch cleaning machine.

## 4.—Area.

This Award shall operate over the area comprised within the South-West Land Division of the State of Western Australia and within an area of five (5) miles from the Post Office, Kalgoorlie.

## 5.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of three (3) years from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

## 6.-Hours.

(a) Within a radius of fifteen (15) miles from the G.P.O. Perth:-

Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work to be worked between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday to Friday inclusive.

(b) Remainder of area covered by this Award:-Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work to be worked between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. on five (5) days of the week, excluding Sunday, and between 8 a.m. and 12 o'clock noon ou the weekly half holiday. Provided that where any establishment is at present working a five-day week such arrangement shall not be altered because of this sub-clause.

#### 7.—Overtime.

(a) All time worked before the usual starting time or after the usual finishing time shall be deemed to be overtime and paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter. In the calculation of overtime, each day shall stand alone.

- (b) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award:-
  - (i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.
  - accordance with such requirement.

    (ii) No organization, party to this Award, or worker or workers covered by this Award shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation, or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this sub-clause.

## 8.-Meal Hours.

Not less than forty-five (45) minutes nor more than sixty (60) minutes shall be allowed to any workers for a meal break. Such meal break shall be taken between the liours of 12 noon and 2 p.m. unless the employer and the worker concerned otherwise mutually agree.

- (d) Leading Hands.—Any jeweller or watch-maker placed in charge of three (3) and not more than ten (10) jewellers or watchmakers shall be paid fifteen shillings (15s. 0d.) per week extra; more than ten (10) and not more than twenty (20) jewellers or watchmakers, thirty shillings (30s. 0d.) per week extra; more than twenty (20) jewellers or watchmakers, forty-five shillings (45s. 0d.) per week extra week extra.
- (e) Tool Allowance.—Watchmakers and apprentices to watchmaking shall have a tool allowance of three shillings (3s. 0d.) per week.

## 10.-Payment of Wages.

All wages shall be paid weekly and not later than Friday in each week.

## 11.—Record.

- (a) The employer shall keep or cause to be kept a record showing:
  - (i) the name and classification of each worker;
  - (ii) the starting and finishing times on each day:
  - (iii) the hours worked;
  - (iv) the wages and overtime (if any) paid.
- (b) Such record (if correct) shall be signed by the worker each week, and shall be open for inspection by the secretary or other duly accredited representative of the union during working hours and such person may take extracts therefrom.

## 12.—Sunday and Holiday Work.

All time worked on Sundays or the holidays prescribed in Clause 14 (a) shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

#### 13.-Meal Money.

When a worker without being notified on the when a worker without being notined on the previous day is required to continue working after the usual knock-off time for more than one (1) hour or after 6 p.m., whichever is the later, he shall be provided with any meal required or shall be paid three shillings (3s. 0d.) in lieu thereof: Provided that such payment need not be made to workers who can reasonably return home for a meal.

#### 14.—Holidays and Annual Leave.

- (a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu shall, subject to Clause 12 hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely:

  New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.
- (b) On any public holiday not prescribed holiday under this Award the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done ordinary rates of pay shall apply.
- (c) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.
- (d) If any prescribed holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one (1) day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as
- (e) If after one (1) month's continuous service (e) If after one (1) month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period, a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth (1/6th) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous services. continuous service.
- (f) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.
- (g) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to sub-clause (e) of this clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.
- (h) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.
- (i) Annual leave shall be granted within two (2) months of becoming due, except when mutually agreed between the worker and the employer and unless otherwise agreed between the worker and the employer one (1) month's notice of commencement of annual leave shall be given to each worker.
- (j) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

## 15.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for (a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service: Provided that, subject to sub-clause (g) hereof, payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week's pay in each calendar year.

- (b) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.
- (c) This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.
- (d) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.
- (e) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.
- (f) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (e) hereof, a worker who in any calendar year has already been allowed paid sick leave shall not be entitled to payment for any further absence unless he produces to the employer a medical certificate stating that he was unable to attend for duty on account of personal ill-health.
- (g) As from the date of this Award, sick leave shall accumulate from year to year so that any balance of the period specified in sub-clause (a) of this clause which has not been allowed in any year to any worker by his employer as paid sick leave may be claimed by the worker and, subject to the conditions hereinbefore prescribed, shall be allowed by his employer in any subsequent year without diminution of the sick leave prescribed in respect of that year: Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this sub-clause shall be available to the worker for a period of two (2) years but no longer from the end of the year in which it accrues.
- (h) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to payment under this clause.

## 16.—Apprentices.

- (a) The employment of apprentices shall be governed by the Apprenticeship Regulations, 1953.
- (b) Apprentices may be taken to the following trades:
  - (i) Watch and clock repairing.
  - (ii) Jewellery (as defined in Clause 17).
- (c) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to any employer shall be in the proportion of one (1) apprentice to every two (2) or fraction of two (2) journeymen employed by him in the jewellery trade and in the watchmaking trade respectively: Provided that the fraction shall not be less than one (1).
- (d) The Apprenticeship Agreement shall be for a period of six (6) years.

#### 17.—Definitions.

- (a) "Jeweller, setter and/or engraver" shall mean any worker employed wholly or partly:
  - (i) in the manufacture or repair of new or second hand jewellery;
  - (ii) in engraving in any metal by hand where such engraving is associated with jewellery, watchmaking, and gold and silversmith's work; or
  - (iii) designing jewellery and/or engraving in the jewellery or watchmaking trade, including silversmith's work.
- (b) "Watchmaker, clockmaker, watch and clock repairer" shall mean any worker employed wholly or partly in the manufacture or repair of new or secondhand watches, clocks or timepieces, and shall also include any worker operating a watch cleaning machine.

#### 18.-Tools, etc.

The employer shall supply destructible tools such as files, saws, scorpers, gravers, broaches and brushes for the use of workers.

#### 19 .- Board of Reference.

- (a) The Court hereby appoints for the purpose of this Award a Board of Reference.
- (b) The Board shall consist of a Chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.
- (c) There are assigned to such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of:
  - (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time except such as involve inter-pretation of the provisions of the Award or any of them:
  - (ii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.
- (d) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

#### 20.—Representative Interviewing Workers.

In the case of a disagreement existing anticipated concerning any of the provisions of this Award, an accredited representative of the union shall be permitted to interview the workers during the recognised meal hour on the business premises of the employer, but this permission shall not be exercised without the consent of the employer more than once in any week.

## 21.--Under-rate Workers.

- (a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the union and the employer.
- (b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.
- (c) After application has been made to the Board, and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

#### 22.—Engagement.

- (a) Except in the case of casual workers who may be put off or leave at any time, one (1) week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the engagement: Provided that an employer may at any time dismiss a worker for refusal or neglect to obey orders, or for misconduct, or if, after receiving one (1) week's notice, he does not carry out his duties in the same manner as he did prior to such notice.
- (b) Any worker dismissed through no fault of his own before the expiration of one (1) week of his employment shall be considered casual and shall receive ten per cent. (10%) above the rate specified, for the work performed.

## 23.-Breakdowns, etc.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

## 24.—Notices and Posting of Award.

Every employer shall allow union notices, except those which on reasonable grounds he considers objectionable, and a copy of this Award to be posted up by the union in a place accessible to the workers and approved by the employer.

## 25.—Liberty to Apply.

Liberty to the parties to apply is hereby reserved with respect to the inclusion of a peicework clause.

## 3.-Hours of Duty.

- (a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work. The daily hours of duty shall not exceed eight (8) per day, and shall be worked on any five (5) days of the week between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. Subject to Clause 4 (i) no shift between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. shall consist of more than two periods of working time.
- (b) Excepting during such periods as employees shall be on authorised leave, or absent for any other reason, each employee shall be rostered to have two (2) days off in each week, such days off to be consecutive where the convenience of the work permits.
- (c) The employers may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates, and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.
- (d) The Union or employee or employees covered by this Award shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be party to, or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

#### 4.—Overtime.

- (a) Overtime shall mean and include all time worked-
  - (i) in excess of eight (8) hours on any working day;
  - (ii) outside of the daily spread of hours prescribed in Clause 3 of this Award;
  - (iii) in excess of forty (40) hours in any one week.
- (b) Overtime worked consecutively with ordinary hours of duty shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter: Provided that where employees are kept on duty under circumstances where payment would ordinarily be made in accordance with the foregoing, and actual work does not commence within thirty (30) minutes of the completion of the tea break, such additional time from the tea break shall be regarded as a recall and paid for in accordance with the following subclause.
- (c) Employees recalled to duty outside of the prescribed spread of hours shall be paid overtime at the rate of double time for the period of recall, with a minimum of two (2) hours.
- (d) Where there is a second call back on any night, and the break from the time of actually ceasing duty in respect of the first call back to the time of recommencement of duty is less than two (2) hours, overtime shall be allowed continuously as if no break had occurred.
- (e) An employee required for duty on his rostered day off shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter, with a minimum payment as for four (4) hours at time and a half: Provided that for all work performed between noon on Saturday and midnight on Sunday, he shall be paid a minimum of four (4) hours at the rate of double time: Provided further that where an employee is required for duty before noon on a Saturday and such duty extends beyond noon, he shall be paid a minimum of four (4) hours at time and a half, but double time shall be paid for all work actually performed after 12 noon.
- (f) Employees called on to start work prior to the starting time shall be paid at the following rates:—
  - (i) All time prior to 6 a.m., double time.
  - (ii) From 6 a.m. to the starting time, time and a half.
- (g) Employees who, having been instructed to make themselves available at their homes for the purpose of being in attendance at a stated time, and who are subsequently informed at their homes that their services are not required, shall be paid two (2) hours' pay at ordinary rates.
- (h) An employee who has done continuous duty for twenty-four (24) hours shall not be required to do further duty until he has had, for the purpose of rest, a period of eight (8) consecutive hours off duty, exclusive of any meal hours: Provided that for work performed during such eight (8) hour rest period, the employee shall be paid overtime at the rate of double time in addition to the rate otherwise payable.

For the purpose of this subclause "continuous duty" shall mean any period of twenty-four (24) hours during which the employee has not been free of duty for a period in excess of four (4) consecutive hours which may include one meal time

(i) All time in excess of two periods of working time during ordinary hours shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

## 5.—Saturday and Sunday Work.

(a) The time worked on Saturdays up to a maximum of eight (8) hours shall be included as part of the ordinary week's work, but employees required to work on Saturdays, other than those finishing Friday's work, shall be paid an extra quarter day's pay in addition to the week's earnings.

(b) The time worked on Sundays up to a maximum of eight (8) hours shall be included as part of the ordinary week's work, but employees required to work on Sundays, other than those finishing Saturday's work, shall be paid an extra half day's pay in addition to the week's earnings.

#### 6.-Meal Hours.

- (a) The recognised meal times shall be:-
  - Breakfast: One hour between 7 a.m. and 9 a.m.
  - (ii) Lunch; One hour between 12 noon and 2 p.m.
  - (iii) Tea: One and one-half hours between 5 p.m. and 8 p.m.
- (b) Employees who cannot be released for the appropriate meal time within the hours specified in subclause (a) and/or subclause (c) (i) (ii) and (iii) of this clause shall be paid at the rate of double time until the full period for a meal is allowed: Provided that the provisions of subclause (a) of this clause, so far as they relate to breakfast, shall not apply to employees called upon to commence work for the day at 6 a.m. or later: Provided further that such extra rate shall not be payable to employees who commence or resume work at or during a specified meal time.
- (c) Notwithstanding anything contained in subclause (a) of this clause, there shall be no obligation on the part of employees to work for more than five (5) consecutive hours without a meal, except in the following circumstances:—
  - (i) Where work commences for the day at 6 a.m., lunch shall be taken not later than 12 noon.
  - (ii) Where work commences for the day at 6.30 a.m., lunch shall be taken not later than 12.30 p.m.
  - (iii) Where work commences for the day at 7 a.m., lunch shall be taken not later than 1 p.m.

## 8.—Engagement and Dismissal.

All regular employees shall be deemed to be engaged upon a weekly basis, and one (1) week's notice on either side shall be necessary to terminate the services of any employee: Provided that an employee may be instantly dismissed or suspended for insobriety, misconduct or neglect of duty.

## 9.—Casual Employees.

- (a) A casual employee is one for whom work over a continuous period of forty (40) ordinary time hours in five (5) consecutive days is not provided by the employers. Such employees, whose engagement shall be hourly, shall be entitled to the rate prescribed for an ordinary hand in Clause 7 (b) hereof, plus 10%, with a minimum engagement as for three (3) hours.
- (b) The conditions of Clauses 3, 4 and 6 only shall apply to casual employees: Provided that for work performed on Saturdays the rate of pay shall be time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter; double time to apply to all work after 5 p.m.: Provided further that for all work performed on Sundays and holidays the rate of pay shall be double time.
- (c) Casual employees shall, where practicable, be engaged at the Union "pick up" place during the usual "pick up" hours.
- (d) The time of duty of casual employees shall be calculated from the time at which such employee is ordered to report for duty at the Pilot Office to the time of discharge either at the Pilot

Office or at the job, at the discretion of the employers: Provided that where the work for which a casual employee was engaged is completed at the North Wharf, the hours of duty of such employee shall continue until he is transported by the employers to Victoria Quay, unless such employee, at his option, requests to be released at the North Wharf, when his services will be terminated upon the completion of the job.

#### 10.-Annual Leave.

Employees who serve continuously for twelve (12) months shall be granted annual leave on full pay for a continuous period of twenty-nine (29) days. Where the period of service is less than twelve (12) months, but is not less than one (1) week, the period of leave shall be reduced pro rata to the period of service. Annual leave shall at all times be taken at the convenience of the employers.

### 11.-Sick Leave.

- (a) A regular employee who is incapacitated through sickness or injury, other than that arising out of or in the course of his employment, may, except as provided in subclause (b) of this clause, be granted sick leave with pay for a period of or periods not exceeding in the aggregate four (4) weeks in any year, upon production, within forty-eight (48) hours of the commencement of any such period of absence, of a medical certificate showing the nature of the illness and the probable duration.
- (b) In the event of the full period of sick leave as provided in subclause (a) hereof not being taken in any year, the balance of such sick leave up to a maximum of one (1) week for each calendar year, shall be allowed to accumulate, and such accumulation may be applied against periods of absence on account of sickness in excess of that provided in subclause (a) hereof, occurring during the next or any succeeding year: Provided that in respect of any worker employed under the terms of this Award at the date of its commencement, the accumulation of such leave specified herein shall be regarded as operating retrospectively from the 1st January, 1945, or at the date the employee entered the service, if employment commenced after that date.
- (c) Where such incapacity arises through the wilful act or misconduct of the employee, or a medical certificate is not furnished as required, or where the employee has already had sick leave with pay in accordance with the provisions of subclauses (a) and (b) hereof, the employee shall not be entitled to any pay for the period he is absent from duty.
- (d) Upon the period or periods of absence exceeding four (4) weeks in the case of paragraph (a) hereof, or upon the happening or occurrence of any of the events specified in paragraph (c) hereof, immediately such absence commences or such event happens or occurs, the contract of service shall be deemed to have been terminated without requiring further notice by the employers, who shall thereby be relieved of any further obligation to the employee: Provided that any such period of incapacity may, at the discretion of the employers, be regarded as leave without pay.

## 12.—Sickness and Accident Arising Out of Duty.

(a) A regular employee who, while on duty or acting under the instructions of the employer, receives an injury arising out of, or in the course of his employment, or contracts an illness due to the nature of and attributable to such employment, and is thereby incapacitated from duty in circumstances which entitle him to the benefits prescribed under the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1954, shall be entitled to receive in addition to such benefits, a weekly sum equal to the difference between the compensation provided for under that Act and the wages prescribed in this Award, from the date of the commencement of his said

incapacity up to and including the date of his recovery as certified by his medical attendant: Provided that the employer's liability hereunder shall in no case exceed thirty (30) days in respect of each separate injury or illness.

(b) All amounts payable under this clause shall be paid in the manner provided for the payment of wages.

#### 13 .-- Uniforms.

Employees shall be provided with uniforms consisting of a double-breasted coat and two (2) pairs of trousers each eight (8) months. In addition, there shall be provided to each employee, as and when the Trust deems reasonably necessary, one (1) waterproof coat of rubberised material, a Soutwester hat, a pair of gum boots, a pair of gloves, a cap and a greatcoat. Cap badges will be renewed when necessary. Uniforms shall be kept neat and tidy by employees and must be worn by them when on duty. All articles supplied under this clause shall be of good quality and shall remain the property of the Trust.

#### 14.--Rest Room.

A rest room equipped with an electric radiator, shall be provided by the employers for the use of employees. Employees must provide their own rugs, etc., and must keep the room clean and tidy.

#### 15.—Telephones.

Each regular employee shall be provided with a telephone at his place of residence, the rental and a reasonable amount of calls to be paid by the employers.

#### 16.-Use of Bicycles.

Regular employees, who are required by the employers to use their own bicycles during the course of their duties, shall receive a special allowance of four shillings (4s.) per week as compensation for wear and tear. Such allowance, which shall be payable monthly, will not accrue while the employee is absent from duty for any cause whatsoever for a period of a complete week or longer.

#### 17.-Long Service Leave.

Employees shall be granted long service leave after each seven (7) years' service, but periods of absence on long service leave shall not count as service qualifying towards the next grant of such leave.

#### 18.—Preference.

Preference of employment shall be given to members of the Federated Ship Painters and Dockers' Union of Australia (West Australian Branch) Union of Workers, qualified and available to perform the work to be done. Liberty is reserved to either party to apply to amend or delete this provision at any time.

### 19.-Board of Reference.

Should any dispute arise between the employers and the employees under this Award, the matter shall be referred to a Board of Reference, consisting of a representative of the employers, a representative of the employees, and the Registrar of the Court of Arbitration of Western Australia, who shall act as chairman. The decision of the Board shall be final and binding.

#### 20.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be three (3) years from the beginning of the first pay period following the delivery of this Award.

This Award shall apply to workers prescribed herein employed by The General Manager of West-ern Australian Government Tramways and Ferries within a radius of twenty-five (25) miles from the Perth Town Hall, under the power conferred upon him by the Western Australian Government Tramways and Ferries Act, 1948-1954.

#### 5.—Definitions.

"Casual worker" shall mean a worker employed for less than one (1) week continuously, but does not include a worker who, when work is available, leaves his employment before the expiration of one

"Temporary worker" shall mean a worker employed for a full week or more continuously, but not appointed to the permanent staff.

"Permanent worker" shall mean a worker who has been appointed to a position on the regular staff.

"Drivers and conductors" shall include all "Drivers and conductors" shall include all workers operating tramway cars or buses in the service for passengers, and taking any such vehicle from and returning it to the car barn, but does not include shedmen when shunting or running vehicles for test purposes, or changing vehicles or any other operations necessary to provide drivers and conductors with a car or bus in good running condition condition.

"Car starter" shall mean a worker performing duty in the regulation of cars running in traffic.
"Points oiler and cleaner" shall mean an adult worker in charge of keeping rails, points and curves free from sand and other obstructions, and who oils same.

"Pitmen" shall mean the workers responsible under the shed foreman for the work of chang-ing motors, adjusting brakes, putting in or taking out bearings, wheels, pinions, gears and all similar work in connection with the cars.

"Controller attendant" shall mean a worker cleaning, greasing, adjusting or replacing contacts, or other parts of controller, but does not include work done on the lathe or fitter's bench.

"Leading hand" shall mean a worker in charge of work who directs four (4) or more workers.

"Platelayer" shall mean a worker who handles materials used in the construction or repair of tram tracks, who curves, rails, bonds, links in, fastens, instals fish-plates, adzes or squares sleepers, spaces sleepers, uses the jigger, gauge, cut rails, and uses the ratchet borer.

"Track repairer" shall mean a worker engaged renewing or repairing worn or broken rails, who bonds, instals new fish-plates, sleepers, who lifts and packs and straightens roads and keeps the roadway or street surface in repair.

"Fettler" shall mean a worker who lifts, packs and ballasts tram roads.

"Storeman" shall mean a worker employed supplying materials, goods, etc., on receipt of orders from foreman and leading hands, maintains stocks, and is responsible for the receipt of and/or the distribution of tools, materials, etc.

"Assistant storeman" shall mean a worker who supplies materials, goods, etc., on the instructions of the storeman.

"Shunter" shall mean a worker required to drive all types of vehicles including tractor for the purpose of shunting.

#### Part II.-Traffic Section.

#### 6.-Hours of Duty.

- (a) Forty (40) hours divided into not more than five (5) shifts shall constitute the ordinary hours of duty of each weekly period for drivers and conductors.
- (b) The minimum time to be paid for each day's work shall be six (6) hours for shifts worked from Monday to Friday (inclusive) except public liolidays and five (5) hours for shifts worked on Saturday, Sunday or a public holiday.
- (c) No daily shift shall be rostered to exceed a spread of twelve (12) hours.
- (d) Drivers and conductors shall be paid not less than two (2) hours for any portion of a rostered shift.

#### 7.—Day Off.

- (a) (i) Drivers and conductors shall be rostered off on two (2) days in each rostered week. Fortyeight (48) hours' notice of cancellation of a day off shall be given. If so called upon to work they shall be paid for all time worked at the rate applicable to the day plus one half, with a maximum of double time.
- (ii) If after receiving notice of cancellation of day or days off, a driver or conductor is not given work he shall be given an allowance of four (4) hours' time at ordinary rates for each day so cancelled.
- (b) If after posting of the rostered weekly work as per Clause 11 (a), a driver or conductor's day off is cancelled, but another day is substituted therefor, he shall be paid at the rate applicable to the day plus one quarter (with a maximum of double time) for all time worked on his originally rostered day off.
- (c) No driver or conductor shall be called upon a second time for duty on his day off until all other available drivers or conductors in his division have been called upon to perform a similar duty in the same year.

## 8.—Call Backs and Meal Allowance.

- (a) All time from end of second portion to commencement of third portion of shift, with the exception of one (1) hour, shall be paid for at ordinary rates and shall stand alone and not be included in the forty (40) hour week.
- (b) From commencement of work of the third portion of shift, a minimum of two (2) hows shall be paid for at the rate of time and a lialf, except on Sundays, Saturdays and public holidays, when the rate shall be double time. Call backs shall be included in the week's work of forty (40) hours.
- (c) When called upon during the performance of a shift to do a call back and the interval between time of finishing shift and commencing time of call back is less than one and a half  $(1\frac{1}{2})$  hours, a meal allowance of three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) shall be paid.
- (d) Where on any day through alteration of rostered shift without previous notice, the meal relief time of a driver or conductor is reduced below one and a half (1½) hours, or the time of taking such meal relief is substantially altered, meal allowance of three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) shall be granted.

#### 9.—Sunday Time and Overtime.

- (a) The time worked on Sunday up to a maximum of eight (8) hours forty (40) minutes shall be included in the week's work of forty (40) hours, but the extra rate prescribed for Sunday time shall stand alone, and be paid for in addition to the week's earnings.
- (b) All time worked in excess of eight (8) liours forty (40) minutes per day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half, such time not to be included in the week's work of forty (40) hours.

- (c) (i) Overtime shall be paid on all time worked beyond the final rostered finishing time of shift as posted or notified on the day previous, and shall be paid for at time and a half with a minimum of one (1) hour. Such time shall not be included in the week's work of forty (40) hours. On Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays and cancelled days off the rate applicable to the day shall be added with a maximum payment of double time.
- (ii) Drivers and conductors instructed to commence work on any day ten (10) minutes or more before the first rostered commencing time of their shift, shall be paid a minimum of one (1) hour at time and a half of the rate applicable to the day. If circumstances do not permit of his being placed back on his original shift, he shall complete the shift he is engaged upon without further penalty, except where the rostered finishing time of the shift worked is extended.
- (d) The minimum of one (1) hour in subclause (c) shall not apply in the case of accident or in respect of any member of the crew who is required to remain on duty owing to the rostered relief not reporting for duty at the proper time.
- (e) (i) Traffic workers employed on Sundays shall be paid for all work performed, at the rate of double time. Provided that this subclause shall not apply to drivers and conductors who finish duty by 1 a.m. Sunday. Provided further that traffic workers rostered and actually attending for duty and who are not given work shall receive an allowance of two (2) hours at the rate applicable to the day. The extra rate prescribed for Sunday shall stand alone and be paid for in addition to the week's earnings.
- (ii) Traffic workers employed on Saturdays shall be paid at the rate of time and a half, provided that the extra rate shall not apply to traffic workers who finish duty by 1 a.m. on Saturday. Provided further that traffic workers rostered and actually attending for duty and who are not given work shall receive an allowance of two (2) hours at the rate applicable to the day. The extra rate prescribed for Saturday shall stand alone and be paid for in addition to the week's earnings.
- (f) No shift shall be rostered to exceed a spread of twelve (12) hours, but if in actual operation it be found that an extension up to thirteen (13) hours is necessary to deal with excessive traffic, the shift may be so extended on payment of double ordinary rates for all time in excess of five (5) minutes worked over twelve (12) hours, with a minimum of one (1) hour: Provided that any shift so extended shall include the allowance for signing on and off within the spread of duty of thirteen (13) hours and shall apply to each man not more than once per year. In case of accident, breakdowns, or repairs to track, this overtime rate shall not apply.
- (g) All time worked in excess of forty (40) lours in any one week shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half; provided that time on which overtime rates as per subclauses (b), (c), (e) and (f) are payable will not be subject to the extra rate provided for in this subclause.
- (h) Drivers and conductors when required to work special passenger cars between the hours of midnight and 5 a.m. shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours' pay at double time rates, the time worked not to be included in the week's work of forty (40) hours. This subclause shall not apply to drivers and conductors employed on the night staff
- (i) Drivers and conductors continuously employed on night shift and commencing duty after 10 p.m. shall be paid two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per shift in addition to the rates paid for the class of work performed.

## 10.--Meal Relief.

(a) Drivers and conductors shall not work longer than five (5) hours fifteen (15) minutes between meal relief, but if a delay occurs beyond the control of the Department the driver and/or conductor shall take his vehicle to the nearest stowing point before booking off duty. Where any worker is required to work longer than five (5) hours fifteen

- (15) minutes without meal relief, for the purposes of this subclause, he shall be paid double time until relieved from duty. This subclause shall not apply to drivers and conductors employed on the car barn night staff whose daily hours of duty shall be worked consecutively.
- (b) Drivers and conductors, when relieved at the car barn, shall have a minimum of forty-five (45) minutes for meal relief, but if relieved elsewhere, the minimum relief shall be one (1) hour.

Boiling water shall be provided by the General Manager at the car barn during meal reliefs.

#### 11.-Duty Rosters.

- (a) Rosters shall be posted on Friday before 1 p.m. showing the shifts of drivers and conductors for the following week's work; provided always that such roster may be suspended or varied in the case of sickness, or on holidays and special occasions caused by abnormal circumstances and conditions.
- (b) A list showing alterations to rostered shifts for the following day, shall be posted at Head Office and car barn not later than 1 p.m. each day. Should further alterations be necessary, the worker concerned shall be personally notified on the day prior to such alterations taking place (if practicable). This list shall be known as No. 3 Allotment.
- (c) Drivers and conductors may be called upon to do car body cleaning or other work in the car barn.
- (d) Rostered shifts shall be made to rotate as far as practicable.
- (e) Drivers and conductors shall be signed on and off duty at the car barn or at such other places as may be appointed after agreement between the parties.
- (f) Drivers and conductors shall not be booked up for duty until they had had twelve (12) hours off duty, except where necessary to facilitate the rotation of shifts, or on a public holiday, or the day following a public holiday; provided that no man will be called upon in such circumstances more than once in each year except to facilitate the rotation of shifts, and that in all cases there shall be a minimum of eight (8) hours off duty. The change of shifts shall take place on the Sunday of each week. A driver or conductor who, under the provisions of Clause 7 (a) has worked on his day off, shall not be brought on duty again without twelve (12) hours rest.
- (g) Drivers and conductors required for Sunday work shall be rostered in rotation, with the exception of staff rostered for duty on No. 3 Allotment.
- (h) Workers may, on obtaining approval from the officer-in-charge, exchange shifts or days off, provided there is no gain or loss to the Department.
- (i) All ordinary and holiday duty rosters may be inspected by the union officials before becoming operative, to ensure that such rosters are framed in compliance with the terms of this Award.
- (j) Drivers and conductors arriving late for duty shall report to the inspector or, in his absence, to the car despatcher on duty, who shall instruct whether they will be required or not. If detained for duty the worker may be allowed at the first opportunity to take up his rostered shift, the time actually lost to be deducted from the day's minimum. Should a shift other than the worker's rostered shift be worked, he shall be paid for the actual time worked.
- (k) Drivers and conductors when required by the Department to train for the positions of tram drivers, trolleybus drivers or omnibus drivers, shall be rostered to perform such duties as part of the rostered weekly work and shall be paid at the rate applicable to their designated positions.

#### 12.-Holiday Roster.

(a) Drivers and conductors shall ballot for the order in which their annual leave is to be taken out.

- (b) (i) The Department, not later than the 31st July in each year, shall post a roster showing the names of workers who will be booked off duty in each of the succeeding twelve (12) months, this roster shall not be departed from except for reasons of sickness, accident or traffic requirement, or other circumstances not foreseeable at the date of preparing the roster.
- (ii) A further roster shall be posted monthly showing the dates on which workers shall be booked off on holiday leave for the ensuing two (2) months. There shall be no alteration to the dates posted in this roster except with the consent of the worker concerned, or in the case of accident or sickness.
- (c) Subject to the approval of the General Manager, any worker may exchange dates with another.
- (d) Subject to the approval of the General Manager, holidays may be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years.
- (e) When surplus staff is available, the Department shall have the right of booking additional staff off on annual leave, provided the worker concerned is agreeable to clear the leave.

#### 13.-Allowances.

- (a) Drivers and conductors shall be granted an allowance of ten (10) minutes when first signing on duty and a similar allowance when finally signing off duty. These allowances shall apply irrespective of the point at which drivers and conductors commence or cease duty and shall count as portion of the week's work.
- (i) Drivers or conductors required to travel to the car barn to deposit revenue and chits shall be paid allowances as follows:—

- (ii) Conductors required to assist in stowing trolleybuses on completion of shift shall be paid an allowance of ten (10) minutes.
- (iii) Omnibus drivers when operating one man buses shall be paid an allowance of ten (10) minutes daily to compensate for time occupied in obtaining, preparing and/or stowing omnibuses.
- (iv) A tram and/or trolleybus driver when required to perform the second and/or third portion of a shift as a conductor shall be paid an allowance of ten (10) minutes for the purpose of obtaining a conductor's outfit prior to commencement of required duty.
- (v) Conductors and/or drivers required to enter records of chits on Revenue Journals at commencement of shift shall be paid an allowance of five (5) minutes.
- (vi) Queue collectors shall be paid an allowance of five (5) minutes daily for the purpose of making up each day's revenue.
- (vii) Allowances as shown in subclauses (i), (ii), (iii), (iv), (v) and (vi) shall stand alone and not be considered as affecting any other clause in this Award, excepting where less than daily minimum and/or the guaranteed week of forty (40) hours is worked, when such allowances may be included wholly or in part in such minimum time to be paid for or, where the time worked during any week exceeds forty (40) hours, shall be included for the purpose of calculating the time to be paid at overtime rates.
- (b) Drivers when working one-man vehicles shall be paid three shillings (3s.) per shift in addition to their ordinary wage, irrespective of whether they work a full shift or not; provided that, if not required to collect fares, this allowance shall not be paid.

- (c) (i) Drivers and conductors instructed to attend head office or elsewhere on the Department's business, or to answer complaints or supply in-formation at times other than when on duty, shall be paid for such attendance at ordinary rates, with a minimum of one (1) hour, such time to stand alone; except where the worker is called upon to give an explanation in case of misconduct or carelessness, failure to supply reports, or when incomplete reports have been submitted.
- (ii) For making each report in his own time as to an accident or any incident which he is required to report, or any report he may be called upon by the Department to make, each employee shall be paid ninepence (9d.)
- (d) For work performed by drivers and conductors outside the spread of nine (9) hours forty (40) minutes, payment shall be made at the following rates-

Between the spread of nine (9) hours forty (40) minutes and ten (10) hours forty (40) minutes: time and a half rates.

After a spread of ten (10) hours forty (40) minutes: double rates.

On Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays the maximum payment shall be double rates from the spread of nine (9) hours forty (40) minutes.

(e) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Award, all time worked after 7 p.m. on shifts that commence duty before 9 a.m. daily shall be paid for at double time. Such time shall stand alone and be paid for in addition to the daily and weekly minimum.

#### 14.—Shortages and Surpluses.

- (a) A list of all shortages and surpluses shall be posted at the car barn, and head office each week.
- (b) Conductors with shortages posted against them shall be allowed to check their revenue and running journals and, if desired, any previous revenue and running journal of the same series.
- (c) All shortages to be paid by the conductor by deduction of the amount from any wages due. All accountable surpluses to be paid to the conductor concerned.
- (d) All unaccountable surpluses to be paid to any fund which has for its purposes the welfare of members of the Union. Such fund to have the approval of the Union and the General Manager.
- (e) Where a worker is required to visit the head office to rectify shortages deducted from his pay, and then found to have been wrongfully deducted, he shall be paid one-half  $(\frac{1}{2})$  hour's pay at ordinary rates.

#### 15.—Uniforms.

The following uniforms shall be supplied to drivers and conductors after three (3) months' service:

Two (2) suits in each eighteen (18) months, comprising -

One heavy serge for winter wear.

One lightweight material for summer wear.

One overcoat every three (3) years.

One cap every year.
One waterproof cap cover every three (3) vears.

Bus drivers to be supplied with a dust coat every nine (9) months.

In the event of circumstances beyond the control of the General Manager precluding the issue of any suit abovementioned, due under this Award, a sum of money equalling the cost to the General Manager of such issue shall be paid to the worker concerned.

#### Part III.—Car Barn Section.

## 16.-Hours of Duty.

- (a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work.
- (b) (i) The ordinary hours of duty in the car barn, other than for shift work, shall be between 7 a.m. and 4.45 p.m. Monday to Friday and shall not exceed eight (8) hours on any day.

- (ii) The meal interval shall be forty-five (45) minutes.
- (iii) When a worker is required for duty during any normal meal time whereby such meal time is postponed for more than one (1) hour, he shall be paid at overtime rates until he gets his meal.
- (c) Where shifts are worked the same shall rotate as far as practicable.
- (d) Workers employed on night shift and commencing duty after 10 p.m. shall be paid ten percent. (10%) in addition to the ordinary rate.
- (e) Workers shall start and finish their work at the car barn.

## 17.—Overtime and Sunday Time.

Overtime outside the usual working hours shall be paid for as under:-

- (a) First four (4) hours, time and a half; thereafter, double time.
- (b) All time worked on Sundays shall be paid for at the rate of double time excepting those workers whose Sunday work is included as part of the working week, when the rate for Sunday work shall be time and a half.
- (c) Any worker brought on duty for any purpose, outside his ordinary working hours, shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at overtime rates, provided such work, exclusive of meal times, is not continuous with his shift, and provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the two (2) hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.
- (d) When a worker is required to continue working for more than one (1) hour after knock-off time, without being notified on the day previous, he shall be provided with a meal or paid three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) in lieu thereof.
- (e) All time worked on Saturdays by workers in this section who are rostered to perform shift work shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

For the purpose of this subclause "shift work" means work other than work which is always commenced and completed in the ordinary hours of work during the period of 7 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.

(f) Where overtime is worked, the penalty rates provides shall be on the rates applicable to the day, with a maximum of double time.

## 18.—Uniforms.

Oilskin coats and Sou'-Westers are to be kept available at the car barn for the use of workers in breakdowns. Pitmen, trolley bus attendants and bus attendants shall be supplied with two (2) suits of overalls annually.

Car washers shall be supplied with rubber boots. Renewals of new boots shall be made when boots are unserviceable. Aprons shall be available to car washers when required.

## Part IV.—Track Section.

## 19.-Hours of Duty.

- (a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work.
- (b) (i) For other than shift workers the ordinary working hours shall be Mondays to Fridays, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. (with one (1) hour for a meal), with the exception of the points oiler and adjuster whose ordinary hours shall be Monday to Friday 8.45 a.m. to 5 p.m. (with one (1) hour for a meal), Saturdays 7.45 a.m. to 11.30 a.m.
- (ii) When a worker is required for duty during any normal meal time whereby such meal time is postponed for more than one (1) hour, he shall be paid at overtime rates until he gets his meal.
- (c) Workers required to commence duty after 10 p.m. on any night shift shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter, excepting a night shift which follows on a day shift.

- (d) Workers required to work during week-ends shall receive forty-eight (48) hours' notice, excepting in case of emergency.
- (e) Where shifts are worked the same shall rotate as far as practicable.

#### 20.-Overtime and Sunday Time.

Overtime outside the usual working hours shall be paid for as under:-

- (a) First four (4) hours, time and a half; thereafter, double time.
- (b) Sunday time shall be paid for at the rate of double time.
- (c) Any worker brought on for duty for any purpose, outside his ordinary working hours shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at overtime rates; provided such work, exclusive of meal times, is not continuous with his shift. and provided that the worker shall not be obliged to work for the two (2) hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time less time.
- (d) When a worker is required to continue working for more than one (1) hour after knock-off time, without being notified on the day previous, he shall be provided with a meal or paid three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) in lieu thereof.

#### 21.-Depots.

- (a) Workers shall start and finish their day's work at the depot.
- (b) "Depot" shall mean, for workers engaged on tramway construction work, the nearest point on an existing tramway line to such work.
- (c) "Depot" shall mean, for track repairers, the point at which a worker is instructed to commence work Such point shall be within the limit of the city boundary as under:

  - East—Bay Street.
     West—Thomas Street.
     North—Vincent Street or Loftus Street.
     South—Esplanade.

The permanent way depot at East Perth shall be deemed to be within the above limits.

(d) All time taken up in travelling outside the specified limits shall be included in the forty (40) hours' work for the week.

#### 22.-Uniforms.

Track hands shall be supplied with oilskin coats and Sou'-Wester hats every two (2) years.

Bitumen attendants at East Perth depot shall be supplied with two (2) suits of overalls annually. A suit of overalls to be made available to the worker oiling the roller when the rolling of bitumen is in progress.

## Part V.-Tradesmen's Section. 23.-Tradesmen.

Except as hereinafter set forth, the provisions relating to hours of duty, overtime, and other conditions, shall be the same as are set forth under the heading of the car barn section-

(a) Overtime: When a worker is required for duty during any meal time, whereby his meal time is postponed for more than one (1) hour, he shall be paid at overtime rates until he gets his meal.

(i) Tool allowance shall be paid to tradesmen as follows:-

- (2) Apprentice carbuilders and carpenters shall be paid a tool allowance of ninepence (9d.) per week.
- (3) Tool allowance shall not be paid to the abovementioned tradesmen or apprentices when absent on extended, annual or sick leave.

- (ii) Painters, when using Taxite or paint remover, shall be provided with rubber gloves and, in addition, with goggles, when working on ceilings.
- (iii) Painters working on ladders at a height of over twenty-five feet (25ft.) shall be paid an allowance of one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day whilst so employed. Painters shall not be called upon to work over live wires.

#### 24.—Apprentices.

- (a) The employment of apprentices shall be governed by the provisions of the Apprenticeship Regulations, 1953.
- (b) Apprentices may be taken to the following trades or callings:

Car building, Carpentry, Painting, Coach trimming, Panel beating,

in the proportion of one (1) apprentice for every three (3) or fraction of three (3) tradesmen, provided that the fraction of three (3) shall not be less than one (1).

## Part VI.—General. 25.-Guaranteed Week.

(a) The General Manager shall normally guarantee to each employee, other than a casual or part-time worker, a full week's work, but if during any period, by reason of any action on the part of any section of his workers or for any cause beyond his control, he finds himself unable to carry on either wholly or partially the complete running of tramway services, workshops or other normal operations, the General Manager shall be entitled, notwithstanding any implication arising from the provisions of section 45 of the Western Australian Government Tramways and Ferries Act, 1948-1954, to employ only such employees (if any) as he considers can be usefully employed and for such hours only as he considers necessary and during such period no employee shall be paid except for such time as shall be actually worked by him.

Provided that employees who are required to attend for work and do so attend on any day shall be paid a minimum of one (1) day's pay at ordinary rates.

- (b) An employee stood down in accordance with the foregoing provision shall not lose any sick leave or other rights or privileges to which such employee would ordinarily be entitled, provided that this provision does not entitle an employee to payment for any public holiday falling during such period of stand down.
- (c) The guaranteed period may be reduced in respect of any employee under suspension: Provided that any worker suspended on a charge which is not sustained shall be entitled to the benefit of the guarantee during the period of his suspension.

## 26.—Payment of Wages.

- (a) All wages shall be paid weekly.
- (b) Wages shall be available to other than traffic workers each Wednesday, to traffic workers on Thursdays, or on such other day as may be agreed upon between the Union and the General Manager, continuously between the following hours:-

Head Office: 9 a.m. to 3.45 p.m. Car Barn: 4 p.m. to 5 p.m.

#### 27.-Maximum Overtime Payment.

Double time shall be the maximum for ordinary overtime payable under any of the provisions of this Award.

## 28.-Mixed Functions.

(a) Any worker called upon to perform work carrying a higher minimum than his regular pay, for one (1) hour in any day, shall be paid such higher minimum for the whole of that day. Provided that acting time less than one (1) hour in any one shift shall not be counted.

(b) Should any worker be required to perform work in a lower grade for any portion of a day, his wage shall not be reduced whilst employed in such capacity for that day.

## 29.—Promotion.

Promotion shall be made on capability, suitability, seniority and record. Due notice shall be posted at the car barn when any position under this Award and also when any position of ticket inspector becomes vacant. Every consideration shall be given, all things being equal, to members of the Union.

## 30.-No New Designation.

No new designation shall be introduced during the currency of this Award so as to reduce the status of any worker covered thereby.

#### 31.—Free Transit.

- (a) All existing privileges regarding free travel on departmental vehicles shall apply to workers, other than casuals, subject to the worker being in possession of and exhibiting a current free pass issued for the purpose.
- (b) A duplicate of a pass lost or otherwise not accounted for may be issued at the absolute discretion of the General Manager.

## 32.—Charges Against Employees.

- (a) Where any charge is brought against a worker by an officer of the Department, which charge may result in dismissal, regression or fine in excess of ten shillings (10s.), such worker shall have particulars of such charge served upon him personally on a charge form, within fourteen (14) days of the officer's first knowledge of the occurrence.
- (b) The worker concerned shall submit in writing a defence to, or an admission of, such charge within twenty four (24) hours of receipt of the charge form.
- (c) Upon receipt of a notice of defence and whether or not the worker concerned has the right to approach the Appeal Board constituted under the Western Australian Government Tramways and Ferries Act, 1948-1954, an inquiry shall be held by the General Manager or such officer appointed by him
- An official of the Union may represent the worker upon any inquiry, and shall be entitled to call evidence on his behalf. The inquiry shall be commenced within seven (7) days of receipt of the defence to the charge, unless by agreement between the parties the term is extended.
- (d) Any worker charged hereunder shall be supplied, if he so requests, with a copy of such complaint, and shall be either furnished with, or allowed to take, a copy of supporting statements (including any statement by the worker himself but not including reports or statements submitted or obtained by departmental officers).
- (e) If a final decision in any case where the charge has been made against a worker be not given within three (3) calendar months of the occurrence of the offence, the charge shall lapse.
- (f) Nothing herein contained shall limit the right of the departmental officers to conduct preliminary inquiries from the worker or workers concerned, into complaints received, for the purpose of establishing the bona fides of such complaint.
- (g) A worker who is suspended from duty for any reason shall not be kept under suspension in excess of five (5) days, excluding Sundays or holidays, following the date on which he was suspended. Except in cases where dismissal follows suspension, a worker shall be paid for any time under suspension in excess of the five (5) days referred to above.
- (h) The General Manager may deduct from any wages due the amount of any fine inflicted.

#### 33.—Records

The secretary of the Union or his nominated deputy shall be entitled at all reasonable times to inspect the General Manager's records of the hours worked by, and of the amounts paid to the various workers covered by this Award.

#### 34.-Contract of Service.

- (a) Except in the case of workers entitled to the benefit of subclause (c) and of apprentices, the contract of hiring shall be deemed to be by the day, and when the services of such workers are terminated, wages shall be paid accordingly.
- (b) Workers discharged for misconduct shall not be entitled to the benefit of subclause (c) hereof
- (c) No worker, after six (6) months' continuous service, shall leave the Department until the expiration of fourteen (14) days' written notice of his intention so to do, without the approval of the General Manager. Fourteen (14) days' written notice shall be given by the General Manager to any such worker whose services are no longer required, and the reason for dismissal shall be given.
- (d) In the event of either the General Manager or the employee failing to give the prescribed notice, wages shall be paid or forfeited, as the case may be, to the extent by which the actual written notice given falls short of the fourteen (14) days' notice. Wages so forfeited by the employee may be deducted from any wages due to such employee at the time of his leaving the service of the General Manager. Provided that, where both parties agree to the acceptance of notice of less than fourteen (14) days, no penalty shall be imposed.

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- (d) A leading hand tradesman placed in charge of:
  - (i) not less than three (3) and not more than ten (10) other workers shall be paid fifteen shillings (15s.) per week extra;
  - (ii) more than ten (10) and not more than twenty (20) other workers shall be paid thirty shillings (30s.) per week extra;
  - (iii) more than twenty (20) other workers shall be paid forty-five shillings (45s.) per week extra.
- (e) Drivers of motor lorries (except tractors) drawing a loaded trailer shall be paid one shilling and fourpence (ls. 4d.) per day extra
- (f) Drivers and conductors with not less than three (3) months' service who are retired or resign, and who are re-employed within twelve (12) months, shall be paid the maximum margin applicable to such position.
- (g) Casual workers shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rates specified. A casual worker notified for duty on any day and who reports for duty and is not required, shall be granted an allowance of two (2) hours' pay at ordinary rates.
- (h) Any worker employed on concrete work shall be paid one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day in addition to his ordinary wage.
- (i) Any worker other than a worker on the bitumen plant employed as tar or bitumen hand or engaged in removing, chipping or fitting tarred blocks shall be paid one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day extra.
- (j) Wet pay.—All workers working in water over their ankles shall be paid one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day in addition to their ordinary wage.
- (k) The worker using the pneumatic beater and packer shall be allowed one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day in addition to the minimum rate.
- (1) A student when learning the duties of a conductor shall be paid the basic wage, provided that he completes the period of studentship and accepts employment in a designated position.

- (m) Workers whose contract of hiring is on a daily base shall be paid pro rata to the rates hereinbefore set forth.
- (n) Traffic workers shall be paid-
  - (i) Ninepence (9d.) per hour extra in the case of drivers training student tram drivers or trolleybus drivers; and
  - (ii) Ninepence (9d.) per hour in the case of conductors on the days when they are actually employed instructing student conductors.

#### 36.—Watchmen.

- (a) For watchmen the week's work shall consist of forty-five (45) hours spread over five (5) or six (6) days per week at the option of the General Manager.
- (b) All time worked in excess of forty-five (45) hours in any one week or twelve (12) hours in any one shift shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter.
- (c) The time on which penalty rates has been paid for on a daily basis shall not be subject to the penalty rate on a weekly basis.
- (d) Time worked on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

## 37.-Board of Reference.

- (a) The Court appoints for the purpose of the Award, Boards of Reference. The Boards shall each consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives nominated by the parties. There are assigned to such Boards, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of:—
  - (i) classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any machine, occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award;
  - (ii) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
  - (iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.
- (b) Separate boards may be appointed for different sections corresponding to the occupations, callings, or avocations referred to in this Award, and/or for different districts.
- (c) The provisions of regulation 106 of the Regulations under the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952 (Appeal from Board) shall be deemed to apply to any Board of Reference appointed hereunder.

## 38.—Penalty Rates Not Cumulative.

Where there is more than one ground for extra payment for any duty the employer shall not be liable to pay more than double the ordinary rate.

## 39.—Holidays.

- (a) In addition to their annual leave, all workers, other than casuals, shall be granted the following holidays:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Sovereign's Birthday, Xmas Day, Boxing Day, and any other day proclaimed as a general public holiday.
- (b) (i) When any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and an employee is not rostered for duty, payment for the day shall be made as if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work, payment at ordinary rates shall be made and in addition a day's leave shall be added to the annual leave or be taken at some subsequent date suitable to the employee, excepting that in the case of workers employed in accordance with Clause 40 (a) (i) and who would have normally worked but are not required for duty, the payment for the day shall be one-fifth (1/5th) of the working week of forty (40) hours, provided that where a straight shift was ordinarily rostered, payment shall be made for the time of such straight shift only. For working on any holiday these employees shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for all time worked.

- (ii) If a worker, other than a member of the traffic running staff, is rostered for a short shift on a holiday but is not required to work on that day he shall be paid for such rostered hours only.
- (c) (i) When any holiday falls on a Sunday, workers shall not be granted a paid holiday except where that holiday is observed on the following Monday.
- (ii) In the case of workers working a five-day week no payment or day in lieu shall be granted for any holiday which falls on any day on which the worker would not normally have been on duty.
- (d) A holiday which falls on a day on which a worker is on paid annual leave shall be treated as if it fell on the worker's ordinary working day. Excepting that in the case of workers employed in accordance with Clause 40 (a) (i) any holiday which falls whilst the worker is on paid annual leave shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half, subject to the conditions of subclause (c) (i) and (ii) applying.
- (e) (i) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. When the worker, however, is available to resume his normal duties on a public holiday and whether he is given work or not on such holiday, he shall be entitled to a paid holiday for such holiday.
- (ii) In accordance with the long service leave agreement, any holiday occurring during the period in which a worker is on long service leave shall be calculated as portion of the long service leave and extra days in lieu or extra payment for the holiday shall not be granted.

## 40.—Annual Leave.

(a) (i) After twelve (12) months' continuous service in the employ of the General Manager, all workers who are required to regularly rotate from day to afternoon and/or night shift shall be allowed three (3) weeks' leave which shall be paid for at the ordinary rate of one hundred and twenty (120) hours.

Traffic running staff including drivers and/or conductors employed on the regular depot night staff shall be considered as complying with this subclause.

- (ii) For all other workers, two (2) weeks' leave shall be allowed, after twelve (12) months' continuous service in the employ of the General Manager, which shall be paid for at the ordinary rate of eighty (80) hours.
- (b) All workers, other than casuals, after one (1) month's continuous service, shall be entitled to the annual leave set out in the preceding subclause, in proportion as the length of service is to the full number of holidays for the twelve (12) months.
- (c) Annual leave may, subject to the approval of the General Manager, be allowed to accumulate for two (2) years.
- (d) Workers shall be paid for annual leave at their graded rates of pay when such annual leave is taken. Provided that if within two (2) weeks before such annual leave is taken the worker is acting in a higher capacity and has been so acting for a period of not less than two (2) months continuously, the annual leave shall be paid for at the rate applicable to such higher capacity position.
- (e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause other than for peculation or theft shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service. Provided always that, if the worker has been dismissed for peculation or theft, no claims for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein referred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

## 41.—Absence from Duty.

(a) Any member of the traffic section, being unable to attend to his duty through sickness, shall notify his foreman or other officer-in-charge at least three (3) hours before the time he is booked for duty, and he shall also satisfy such foreman or officer that he is unfit to attend his duties.

- (b) Any worker so absent shall not again be booked up for duty unless he notifies such foreman or officer, not later than noon on any day, that he is fit to resume.
- (c) Any other worker losing time through sickness or injury shall, as soon as possible, notify his foreman or other officer-in-charge in sufficient time to permit of arrangements being made for the performance of his duties. Any such worker who fails to do so shall be treated as absent without leave.
- (d) Subject to the provisions of Clause 42 (payment for sickness) any worker losing time through sickness or special leave shall be reduced in wages only to the extent of the time actually lost through sickness or actually granted as special leave.

#### 42.—Payment for Sickness.

- (a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health at the rate of one-twelfth (1/12th) of the guaranteed week's work for each completed month of service: Provided that payment for such absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week in each calendar year, but the sick leave herein provided shall be allowed to accumulate and any portion unused in any year may be availed of in the next or any succeeding year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.
- (b) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof to the satisfaction of the General Manager, or his representative, of sickness, but the General Manager shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.
- (c) No payment will be made for any absence due to a worker's own fault, neglect, or misconduct.

#### 43.—Overtime.

- (a) The General Manager may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at the overtime rates provided under the Award and workers shall work overtime in accordance with such requirements.
- (b) No organisation, party to this Award, worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way whether directly or indirectly be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements as shown in subclause (a) above.
- (c) The above provisions shall remain in operation only until otherwise determined by the Court.

## 44.—Increments for Service.

- (a) In addition to the amounts set out in Clause 35 hereof, adult male employees shall be paid an additional amount of two shillings (2s.) per week after ten (10) years' continuous service and an additional one shilling (1s.) per week after each subsequent five (5) years' continuous service.
- (b) This clause shall not apply to employees employed as car builders, carpenters, painters, coach trimmers, panel beaters, sheet metal workers, or tradesmen's assistants.

#### IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

#### No. 13 of 1956.

Between the Seamen's Union of Western Australia Industrial Union of Workers, Perth. Applicant, and Fremantle Harbour Trust Commissioners, Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties, and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the said reference of industrial dispute was remitted by the Court to the Conciliation Commissioner, and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all materials. whereas the parties subsequently met and con-ferred and have arrived at agreement on all mat-ters in difference, and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Conciliation Com-missioner by their respective representatives and requested the Conciliation Commissioner to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Conciliation Commissioner, pursuant to Section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, and all other powers therein enabling him, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court.

### Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein, it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement".)

## Area and Scope.

This Award shall apply to all employees directly engaged or acting as deck hands firemen or deckboys on any of the employer's vessels, and the area covered shall be the sea and coastline within a radius of twenty (20) miles from the North Mole Lighthouse, and in addition, the Swan River to and including Perth Water and the Canning River to Lower Canning Bridge.

#### 4.—Definitions.

"Employers" means the Fremantle Harbour Trust Commissioners.

"Union" means the Seamen's Union of Western Australia, Industrial Union of Workers, Fremantle.

"Employee" means any person employed under the provisions of this Award.

"Wages" includes payment for overtime.

"Harbour Master" means the Harbour Master for Fremantle appointed by the Fremantle Harbour Trust Commisisoners.

"Shift" or "Shifts" means a period of eight (8) consecutive hours worked in reliefs of two or three as may be required by the employers.

## 5.—Board of Reference.

Should any dispute arise between an employee and the employers, the service concerned shall be continued without any cessation and the matter referred to a Board of Reference consisting of one representative each of the employees and employers and a chairman, to be mutually agreed upon by those representatives; failing their agreement the Registrar of the Court of Arbitration shall act as chairman. The decision of the Board shall be final and binding.

#### 6.-Term.

The term of the Award shall be for a period of twelve (12) months as from and including the date hereof.

## Part II.

## Deckhands and Firemen on Shift Work. 7.-Hours of Duty.

- (a) 1. Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work. Except as provided in paragraph (c) hereof the ordinary working hours shall not exceed eight (8) hours per day on five days of the week.
- 2. The employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates, and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.
- 3. The Union or employee or employees covered by this Award shall not in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be party to, or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this cubicause. quirements of this subclause.
- 4. This subclause shall remain in operation until otherwise determined by the Court.
- (b) The hours per week may be worked on any day of the week at the discretion of the employers, and during the continuance of the present system of shifts shall be worked as under:-

Day shift: 7 a.m. - 3 p.m. Afternoon shift: 3 p.m. - 11 p.m. Night shift: 11 p.m. - 7 a.m.

(c) For the purpose of this Award the week's work shall be deemed to commence at 3 p.m. on work shall be deemed to commence at 3 p.m. on Sundays, and to conclude at 3 p.m. on the following Sunday. The weekly change of shifts shall take place at the completion of the day shift on Sundays, when the watch which finished night shift that morning shall resume on the afternoon shift that day, and shall in turn be relieved by the watch which performed the day shift that day: Provided that the extra shift thus worked on Sundays to employ the potential of shifts shall not be days to enable the rotation of shifts shall not be regarded as overtime, but as part of the ensuing week's ordinary work: Provided further that the present arrangements of shifts to which this paragraph solely relates may be altered by agreement between the parties.

(d) Employees shall be allowed to relieve one another to suit their convenience to catch trains or trams, so long as the full shift is maintained at all times.

#### 8 -Rates of Pay.

(a) The rates of pay for deckhands and firemen shall be as follows:—

Plus an allowance, payable weekly, for shift work, week-end work and holiday work, the amount of such allowance being equal to 20 per centum of the weekly wage.

- (b) Wages shall be payable weekly.
- (c) Where a deckhand is called upon for any reason to perform the work of a fireman for a period of two hours or more in any shift, he shall be paid at fireman's rates for the whole of that shift. Where the period is less than two hours, he shall be paid his ordinary rate for the whole shift.
- (d) All wages due shall be payable at 2.30 o'clock p.m. on Friday in each week.
- (e) Wages may be payable on the written order of the employee to the person named in such order, and the employers by paying to such order shall be relieved of all responsibility on obtaining the signature of the person named in the said order.

#### 9.—Overtime.

- (a) Overtime shall mean and include all time worked outside of, or in excess of, the ordinary working hours in any shift, and shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.
- (b) For the purposes of this clause, overtime shall be calculated on the basis of the basic wage plus margin, but excluding the allowance referred to in clause 8 (a) of this Award.

#### 10.—Contract of Employment.

- (a) Except for casual employees, all employment shall be by the week, and a week's notice on either side shall be given to terminate such employment, or the employers shall pay one week's wages in lieu of such notice.
- (b) The engagement of employees shall be made by the Harbour Master or his deputy at the recognised Union pick up place between the hours of 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. on any week day. Should it be necessary to fill any vacancy urgently and outside the above hours, the man or men required shall be engaged by mutual arrangement between the Harbour Master or his deputy and the Secretary of the Union. In the event of suitable competent labour not being available at any time, the man or men required may be picked up at any place convenient to the Harbour Master or his deputy.
- (c) The employers shall not discriminate, without just cause, against any member of the Union who bears good conduct record, and who agrees to continue to work under the terms of this Award, and for whom there is a vacancy, and the employers shall consider any representations made to them by the Secretary of the Union.
- (d) In cases where an employee misconducts himself, the employers shall have the right to dismiss him instantly.

## 11.—Crib Time.

The pilot service shall operate continuously (or as directed by the employers) during each shift without cessation for a recognised meal hour provided that each employee shall be allowed twenty (20) minutes between 4½ hours and 6 hours after

the commencement of a shift in which to have his meal: In the event of the requirements of the service being such that the break for crib cannot be taken during the appropriate period specified herein, the employees shall receive a special payment of 5s.

#### 12.-Change Room.

A change room shall be provided, as heretofore, by the employers to allow of employees changing their clothes or taking their meals when ashore.

### 13.—Annual Leave.

- (a) An employee who serves the employers continuously for a period of 12 months shall be allowed leave of absence on full pay, as soon thereafter as convenient to the service, for a continuous period of 30 days.
- (b) If he serves continuously for one month or more and not for one year, he shall be entitled to payment in lieu of leave, at the rate of two and a half days for each completed month of service
- (c) The employers shall give at least 24 hours' notice to each employee of their intention to give the employee his leave of absence, and his wages for the leave period shall be paid, together with all other moneys due, prior to his going on leave.

#### 14.-Sickness and Accident When on Duty.

- (a) If in the course of his employment an employee engaged under this Award, whilst on duty or whilst acting under the instructions of the employers, receives an injury or contracts any sickness arising out of or in the course of his employment he shall be entitled to receive the wages prescribed in this Award from the date of his said incapacity up to and including the date of his recovery, as certified by his medical attendant. Provided that the maximum period of payment under this clause shall not exceed three months of 30 days each.
- (b) The illness or injury which so entitles the employee to the benefits provided for in this clause shall be suffered while on duty and shall be:—
- 1. Such as wholly to incapacitate him from performing his duty.
- 2. So far as can be ascertained, an illness or injury contracted or sustained whilst on duty in the service of the employers: Provided that, if the illness or injury is due to his own wilful act or to his misbehaviour, the employee shall not be entitled to the benefits provided in this clause.
- (c) In the case of an accident suffered while on duty the expenses of providing the necessary medicines, surgical and medical advice and attendances shall be paid by the employer without any deduction from the wages on that account until the employee is certified as recovered by his medical attendant: Provided that the aggregate amount so paid shall not exceed the amount that would have been paid had such payment been made under the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act, 1912-1952.
- (d) All wages payable under this claim to the employee while sick or injured shall be paid on Fridays of each week and as provided for in Clause 8.

## 15.—Payment for Sickness.

- (a) An employee who is incapacitated through sickness or injury, other than that arising out of or in the course of his employment, may, except as provided in subclause (b) of this clause, be granted sick leave with pay for a period of or periods not exceeding in the aggregate, four weeks in any year, upon production, within 48 hours of the commencement of any such period of absence, of a medical certificate showing the nature of the illness and the probable duration.
- (b) In the event of the full period of sick leave as provided in subclause (a) hereof not being taken in any year, the balance of such sick leave up to a maximum of one week for each calendar year, shall be allowed to accumulate, and such accumulation may be applied against periods of absence on account of sickness in excess of that provided in

subclause (a) hereof, occurring during the next or any succeeding year: Provided that in respect of any worker employed under the terms of this Award at the date of its commencement, the accumulation of such leave specified herein shall be regarded as operating retrospectively from the 1st January, 1945, or at the date the employee entered the service if employment commenced after that date.

- (c) Where such incapacity arises through the wilful act or misconduct of the employee, or a medical certificate is not furnished as required, or where the employee has already had sick leave with pay in accordance with the provisions of subclauses (a) and (b) of this clause, the employee shall not be entitled to any pay for the period he is absent from duty.
- (d) Upon the period or periods of absence exceeding four weeks in the case of paragraph (a) of this clause, or upon the happening or occurrence of any of the events specified in paragraph (c) of this clause, immediately such absence commences or such event happens or occurs the contract of service shall be deemed to have been terminated without requiring further notice by the employers, who shall thereby be relieved of any further obligation to the employee: Provided that any such period of incapacity may at the discretion of the employers, be regarded as leave without pay.

## 16.-Long Service Leave.

Employees shall be granted three months' long service leave after each seven years' service, but periods of absence on long service leave shall not count as service qualifying towards the next grant of such leave.

#### 17.-Rate of Pay When on Leave, etc.

Employees on annual, long service or sick leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 13, 15 and 16 of this Award, or absent from duty during a period of incapacity resulting from sickness or accident arising out of or in the course of employment in circumstances provided for in Clause 14 of this Award shall receive the same weekly remuneration as is payable for the usual week's work of 42 hours.

### 18.—Uniforms.

The employers shall provide for the use of each employee, free of cost, one cap and one serge suit, on the completion of each eight months' continuous service, one oilskin coat and sou'-wester hat each year, one duffie coat each four years and when the employers deem reasonably necessary, one pair of sea boots. One suit of dungarees (coat and trousers if procurable) shall also be supplied on the completion of the following periods of service, viz., deck hands—each eight months; firemen—each six months. Uniforms shall belong to the employers to be worn on service, and shall be kept clean and tidy. Should the service of any employee terminate within one month of the date of issue of uniforms or any portion of same, all the issue last made shall be returned to the employers before the employee is paid any moneys which may be due to him.

## 19.—Casual Employees.

- (a) A casual employee is one who is engaged in the temporary capacity, and the contract of service in respect of such employee shall be a daily one. The services of casual employees may be terminated at any time without previous notice.
- (b) The daily rates of pay for casual employees shall be:—(1) for the first fourteen consecutive working days—one fifth of the rates prescribed in Clause 17 of this Award, plus 10 per cent.; (2) Thereafter—one fifth of the rates prescribed in Clause 17.
- (c) A casual employee shall be entitled to annual leave in accordance with Clause 13 hereof, but shall not be entitled to any issue of uniform.
