WHEREAS it is is enacted, inter alia, by Section 15 of the Wheat Products (Prices Fixation) Act, 1938-1939, that the Governor may from time to time, on the recommendation of the Wheat Products Prices Committee constituted pursuant to the Act, by Proclamation fix the minimum and the maximum price of which substances included in the definition of wheat products, may be sold in the definition of wheat products, may be sold in the State, or in any specified part of the State, by the manufacturer thereof or by any person, and that the Governor may from time to time revoke or vary any Proclamation under the section by a subsequent Proclamation; and whereas the Governor by Proclamation dated the 21st day of December, 1955, and published in the Government Governor on the section of the content of the section of the content of the section of and published in the Government Gazette on the 20th day of January, 1956, fixed the prices at which 20th day of January, 1956, fixed the prices at which bread, being a wheat product within the meaning of the Act, may be sold by any person in the various parts of the State specified in that Proclamation; and whereas that Proclamation was varied by further Proclamations dated the 13th day of March, 1956, and the 6th day of July, 1956, published in the Government Gazette on the 23rd day of March, 1956, and the 6th day of July, 1956, respectively: Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor and Administrator, acting with the advice Governor and Administrator, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and on the recommendation of the Wheat Products Prices Committee, and in exercise of the power in this behalf conferred upon me by the Act, do hereby

- (a) revoke the Proclamations dated the 21st day of December, 1955, the 13th day of March, 1956, and the 6th day of July, 1956, published in the Government Gazette on the 20th day of January, 1956, the 23rd day of March, 1956, and the 6th day of July, 1956, respectively; and
- (b) fix the maximum prices at which bread, being a wheat product within the meaning of the Act, may be sold by any person in the various parts of the State specified in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Schedules of this Proclamation.

For the purposes of this Proclamation, unless inconsistent with the context-

- "Perth Metropolitan Area" means that portion of the State comprised in an imaginary circle having a radius of 25 miles from the General Post Office at Perth;
- "South-West Land Division" means that portion of the State defined in the Land Act, 1933-1954, as the South-West Land Divi-sion, excluding the Perth Metropolitan Area:
- "Kalgoorlie-Boulder Area" means all that area of the State comprised in an imaginary circle having a radius of eight miles from the principal post office at Kalgoorlie;
- "Bread" means white bread, wholemeal bread, wholewheatmeal bread and brown bread;

- "delivery town" means a townsite in which a door to door delivery of bread to consumers is made within the boundary of that townsite, by one or more bakers operating a bakery or bakeries in that townsite;
- "non-delivery town" means a townsite in which no door to door delivery of bread to con-sumers is made within the boundary of that townsite by any baker operating a bakery in that townsite;
- "cash sale" means in relation to a sale of bread, a sale where payment is made for the bread so sold within seven days of the sale:
- "booked sale" means a sale where payment is not made for the bread so sold within seven days of the sale;
- "placed on public transport" means the delivery
- "placed on public transport" means the delivery of bread packaged and labelled, to rail, carrier or public transport; "freight paid" means any charge or payment which is paid or payable by any person, other than a consumer in the transportation or delivery of bread by rail, carrier or public transport from any town in the South-West Land Division or any town specified in the Fourth Schedule to this Proglamation in which that bread is baked Proclamation in which that bread is baked, to any place beyond the boundaries of such
- "Prescribed margin" in relation to the sale of bread means, in respect of a 1 lb. loaf of bread, a margin of three farthings and in respect of a 2 lb. loaf of bread, a margin of three half-pence;
- "1 lb. loaf" means a No. 1 loaf within the meaning of section 4 of the Bread Act, 1903-1949;
- "2 lb. loaf" means a No. 2 loaf within the meaning of section 4 of the Bread Act, 1903-

For the purposes of this Proclamation-

- (a) where 1 lb. loaves of bread are sold by retail to the same purchaser by cash sale to the extent that the total number sold is two or a multiple of two, two 1 lb. loaves of bread shall be deemed to be a 2 lb. loaf;
- (b) where any maximum price calculated in accordance with the provisions of the Proclamation is not an exact multiple of one half-penny, then such maximum price shall be computed to the nearest upward half-penny.

WHEREAS by the Water Boards Act, 1904-1953, it is provided that before undertaking the construction of works in the water area the Minister shall submit plans, descriptions, books of reference; and estimates of the proposed works to the Governor for approval; and if they are approved by the Governor he may forthwith make an order empowering the water board to undertake the construction of the works: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and Administrator, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby approves of the Busselton Water Board Plan No. 7, descriptions, books of reference and estimates for the construction of water works within the Busselton Water Area, which were duly submitted for approval, and hereby empowers the Busselton Water Board to undertake the construction of the said works.

Clause 5.—Definitions.

clause and insert in lieu Delete existing thereof:-

"Handyman" is a worker performing maintenance duties and/or minor repairs and/or who assists the tradesmen and/or attends to the firing of boilers.

"Head or senior orderly" means a worker not covered by any other Award, performing the duties of an orderly who is appointed to direct the activity of four or more other orderlies. This definition shall not apply to the Metropolitan Infectious Diseases Hospital or to "Sunset" where existing conditions will continue to apply existing conditions will continue to apply.

"Kitchenman" is a male person other than a cook, who is employed in or about the kitchen and/or in conveying food to the wards or dining rooms.

"Laundress" means a female who is required to do washing and/or ironing and any other function in a laundry.

"Laundry Hand, female", means a female employed in a laundry whose major employment is not washing and/or ironing. "Laundry Hand,

"Nursing Orderly" is a male worker not covered by any other Award who is required to supervise, care for or give attention to the patients or inmates of a hospital or home covered by this Award.

"Orderly" shall be any male worker not covered by any other Award employed in and/or around a hospital or other institution who is not otherwise classified in this Award.

"Orderly (Lemnos)" means a male engaged in caring for and/or working with insane or mental patients, in addition to the ordinary duties of a hospital orderly.

"Rostered Worker" means a worker for whom the ordinary hours of work may include work on Sunday.

"Seamstress" shall be a worker making up and repairing clothes and linen and/or employed in the general sewing of hospital equipment or material, and/or supervising the work of patients.

"Seamstress who cuts out and fits garments" shall be a worker who cuts out and fits uniforms or dresses to measure or pattern.

"Steward, mental hospital," is a worker engaged in apportioning, serving and preparing food, but not cooking, and in supervising the patients engaged on this work and in washing and cleaning utensils and dining rooms and furniture.

"Storekeeper, Sunset," is a worker in charge of

a store and who is responsible for keeping accounts of goods received and despatched.

"Storeman" shall be a person employed in a store handling, weighing and preparing stores for delivery and performing any other store duties. "Washhouse woman" means a female whose

major employment is that of washing whether by hand or machine.

Clause 6.—Hours.

Delete existing clause and insert in lieu thereof:-

- (a) For workers specified in this subclause the week's work shall consist of forty (40) hours to be worked eight (8) hours per day Monday to Friday inclusive-
 - (i) Wooroloo: Laundry staff.
 - (ii) Mental Hospitals: Laundry, Garden and Maintenance staff other than Handyman. Heathcote.
 - (iii) Royal Perth and Princess Margaret Hospi
 - tals: Laboratory Attendants.
 Provided that when Laboratory Attendants are periodically required to work on Saturday, the time so worked up to 12 noon shall be included in the working week of forty (40) hours.
- (b) For laundry workers, not elsewhere specified, the week's work shall consist of forty (40) hours to be worked in five and one half $(5\frac{1}{2})$ days from Monday until Saturday at 12 noon.

Provided that at the option of the employer, the week's work of forty (40) hours may be worked in any five (5) days of the week at metropolitan Maternity Hospitals.

- (c) For workers specified in this subclause the working hours shall be one hundred and sixty (160) in each four (4) weeks with eight (8) consecutive days off in each four (4) weekly period:—
 - (i) Wooroloo: All staff not elsewhere specified.(ii) Whitby Falls: Cook.
- (d) The hours of the following workers shall remain substantially as at present:
 - shall receive six (6) days off in each cycle of twenty-eight(28) days. (i) Farm Hands, Wooroloo.
 - (ii) Farm Attendants, Mental Hospitals. These workers shall in every seven (7) consecu-tive days be granted two (2) full days off
 - (iii) Lazaret Attendents, Wooroloo. There shall be no fixed hours of duty for these workers.
 - (iv) Cook-housekeeper at Nurses' quarters.
 These workers shall be granted two (2) consecutive days off in each week. quarters.

(c) For all workers not elsewhere specified the week's work shall consist of forty (40) hours to be worked on any five (5) days of the week.

Provided that eighty (80) hours may be worked in ten (10) days each fortnight at the option of the employer.

(f) There shall be no fixed hours of duty in hospitals where the daily average of occupied beds does not exceed four (4). The daily average of beds occupied will be calculated on the actual inpatient days only. Out-patients and babies will not be included.

Clause 9.—Overtime.

Delete existing clause and insert in lieu thereof ·-

- 1. (a) In the case of rostered workers overtime shall mean:-
 - (i) All work performed beyond the spread of shift, and/or
 - (ii) All time worked in excess of or outside of the hours prescribed in Clause 6, and/or
 - (iii) All time worked in excess of fifty-six (56) hours in any one week.
- (b) In the case of all other workers, overtime shall mean all time worked outside of or in excess of the week's work as prescribed in Clause 6.
- (1) (c) Overtime shall be paid for at the following rates:-
 - Wooroloo and Mental Hospitals.—Time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter.
 - -Time and a half for the All other Hospitals.first two (2) hours and double time there-

Provided that in lieu of payment time off equivalent to the time worked may be granted when overtime is occasioned through the failure of another worker to report for duty and, at the Mental Hospitals, when the overtime is necessitated through the attendance of the staff at concerts, picture shows, or other amuse-ments within the institution for the patients.

- (2) All work performed by rostered workers on any day on which they are rostered off duty shall be paid for at the rate of double time.
- Where a worker is required to work overtime for a period of at least two (2) hours in excess of the required daily hours of work without being informed before booking off on the previous day, he or she shall be provided with a meal free of cost or shall be paid the sum of three shillings (3s.) as meal money.
- (4) A worker who has completed his usual hours of duty and has left the job and who is recalled to work after the usual ceasing time shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at overtime rates.
- (5) A worker who reports for duty at the rostered time and who is then advised that the commencing time for such duty has been altered shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at the ordinary time rate.
- (6) (a) The employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.
- (b) The Union or worker or workers covered by this Award shall not in any way whether directly or indirectly be party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.
- (c) This subclause shall remain in operation until otherwise determined by the Court.
- (7) Double time, i.e. twice the ordinary rate, shall be the maximum rate payable under this Award.
