3.—Scope.

4.—Term.

This Award shall operate for a period of three (3) years from the date hereof.

(2) A female junior entering the industry in her 18th year or later shall receive the foregoing rate appropriate to her experience, and not less than 20s. per week extra until she reaches the age of 21 years, and then she shall be paid the minimum wage prescribed for females for the class of work which she is doing.

(3) In the above provisions as to work performed by females, "experience" means experience in a branch of the industry including experience in the employ of more than one employer, and any female employee mentioned in such provisions on leaving or being discharged from her employment shall be entitled to a certificate from her employer stating the date when such employment began, and the date of its termination, duly signed or authenticated by the employer. Such certificate shall be the property of the employee. The proportion of juniors to seniors shall not exceed two juniors to one senior. In assessing this proportion the establishment shall be considered as a whole excluding the Reading Room: Provided that any dispute in regard to this clause shall be referred to the Board of Reference.

(e) Additional Allowance.

In addition to the margins herein prescribed, adult male employees, other than storemen, assistant storemen, roller makers and metal workers, and machine room assistants shall be paid according to their years of continuous service as an adult during the operation of this Award allowances as follows:—

Service up to and including five (5) years as at the date of this Award shall count for the purpose of assessing the above allowances.

6.—Hours.

(a) The ordinary hours of work for all employees covered by this Award shall not exceed 40 hours per week.

(b) Day work shall mean work done between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. daily; night work shall mean work done between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m.: Provided that the time of starting work of a linotype mechanic or other male person who attends to arrange the heat of linotype or like metal pots may be 7 a.m.

(c) Any employee called upon to work night work shall have his weekly hours of work reduced by two (2): Provided that the minimum number of hours per week shall not be reduced below thirty-eight (38).

(d) Each shift shall stand by itself, and all time worked in excess of the usual working hours shall be paid for at overtime rates hereinafter set forth.

(e) Liberty is reserved to either party to this Award to apply for amendment to this clause in the event of the Australian standard for hours of work for machine compositors or employees engaged on night shift being reduced below the hours prescribed hereunder.

7.-Meal Period.

(a) The minimum time allowance for meals shall be three-quarters of an hour, and the maximum allowance one hour.

(b) No employee shall be compelled to break shift except for meals, and no shift shall exceed five (5) hours without a break for meals.

(c) Where an employee is required to work during his usual meal hour, he shall be paid one-half extra on the hourly rate of his weekly wage for the time so worked and be allowed his usual meal period as soon as it can be arranged, but no extra payment shall be made for periods worked of less than fifteen (15) minutes.

(d) The lunch period of any employee shall be between the hours of noon and 2 p.m.

8.—Roster of Hours.

(a) A roster of daily and weekly hours of shift is to be prominently displayed in the various sections of the factory.

(b) Work performed outside the rostered hours shall be paid for at overtime rates in accordance with clause 9 (overtime).

9.—Overtime.

(a) Overtime shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first three (3) hours, and double time thereafter.

(b) An employee starting before his usual rostered shift shall be paid time and a half.

(c) Each day shall stand by itself.

(d) Work done on Saturday afternoon, or Sunday and all holidays shall be paid for at double time rates.

(e) When employees, without being notified on the previous day, are required to continue working after their rostered finishing time for more than one hour, they shall be paid tea money of three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) (f) An employer shall not permit any female employee to work overtime after 6 p.m. unless at least one other female is present in the same department in which she is required to work.

(g) The employer shall not require or permit an employee to work overtime in a department using power driven machinery unless he works in company with at least one other person in the same department.

10.-Classes of Labour.

Only two classes of labour, journeymen and apprentices, shall be employed in any branch of the industry to which the apprenticeship clauses apply.

11.—Casual Employees.

"Casual worker" shall mean a worker employed for less than one week and shall receive twelve and a half per centum $(12\frac{1}{2}\%)$ per day in addition to the rates prescribed in this Award.

12.—Holidays.

Public holidays shall be in accordance with those granted by the State Government to the employees of the Government Printing Office and observed over a period of years.

13.—Annual Leave.

(a) Each employee, other than a casual, shall be entitled to two (2) consecutive working weeks' annual leave each year on full pay, or should the period of continuous employment be less than one year the worker shall be paid holiday pay in proportion as his length of service is to the full year's employment.

(b) Annual leave will be taken during a period to be arranged between the employer and the Chapel, or, failing agreement, between the employer and the Union.

(c) All holidays shall be drawn for and a holiday roster posted in each section, but the employer shall be allowed to change the draw of individuals to suit the convenience of his business prior to posting of the annual leave roster, and thereafter the roster shall remain unchanged except with the approval of the Government Printer: Provided the Government Printer shall have the right to amend, vary, or cancel the roster to meet a change of circumstances that could not reasonably be foreseen.

14.—Long Service Leave.

Long service leave shall be granted to all employees in accordance with the conditions applying to Government full-time wages employees generally.

15.—Sick Pay.

Sick pay shall be paid in accordance with the conditions granted to the employees of the Government Printing Office by the State Government on the 14th April, 1927, and at present existing in the Government Printing Office: Provided no worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to the Government Printer of sickness, but the Government Printer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three days or more.

16-Record Book.

The employer shall keep at his office a record of—

- (a) the names of all workers employed by him and to whom this Award applies; and
- (b) the class of work performed, the hours worked (including overtime) and the wages paid to each such worker.

On notifying the officer in charge, the secretary of the Union may inspect such record at any time during ordinary business hours and he shall have power to enter and inspect during working hours any part of the printing factory and to interview all employees in regard to rates and conditions of employment, provided that he shall not hamper or otherwise hinder the workers in the carrying out of their work. The officer in charge shall determine whether workers are being hampered or hindered in their work.

17.—Higher Duties.

(a) Any employee performing a duty for which a higher rate than his ordinary rate is prescribed, shall be paid such higher rate for the time actually worked: Provided that an employee appointed to relieve a foreman, assistant foreman, deputy foreman, working foreman, operator in charge, 01 leading hand, shall not receive a higher rate than his ordinary rate unless he so relieves for more than one (1) day: Provided further that for the purposes of this clause the foreman's rate shall be deemed to be his minimum rate.

(b) An employee shall not be reduced to a lower classification without one (1) week's notice.

18.—Contract of Service.

(a) The contract of service shall be by the week and shall be terminable by one week's notice on either side: Provided that the employer may pay or the employee forfeit, as the case may be, one (1) week's pay in lieu of such notice.

(b) Nothing herein contained shall affect the employer's right to dismiss for misconduct without notice and in such cases wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (a) hereof, but subject to clause 15 (Sick Pay), the employer shall be under no obligation to pay for any day not worked upon which the employee is required to present himself or herself for duty.

(d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct (d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which a worker (including an apprentice) cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or Union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

19.—First Aid Chest.

(a) The employer shall provide a first aid chest which shall be a suitable dust-proof receptacle, made of either metal or wood, for the use of the employees, in some accessible place. Such chest shall be equipped and supplied with the following articles, namely:

Quantities to be kept in Ambulance Chest in:-

- Factories and Workshops in which Not More Than 30 Persons Are Employed.
 - Antiseptic solution-1 bottle.
 - Bandages, cotton and gauze $-\frac{1}{2}$ doz. (assorted sizes).

Castor oil—½ ounce.

Iodine, tincture of—1 ounce.

- Manual, first aid petrolatum carbonised—1 jar.
- Picric acid solution, made according to the following prescription: 1½ teaspoonsful of powdered picric acid, 2 ounces of absolute alcohol, and 2 pints of distilled water. Flavine—1 bottle (1 in 1,000).

Tannic acid jelly. Pins, safety—1 packet. Sal-volatile—1 ounce.

Scissors—1 pair.

Tourniquet—1 only. Tweezers—1 pair.

- Cotton, absorbent; Gauze, sterilised, plain lint, absorbent plaster, adhesive-An adequate assortment.
- Factories and Workshops in which More Than $30\ {\rm Persons}\ {\rm Are}\ {\rm Employed}.$
- Antiseptic solution-1 bottle.

Bandages, cotton and gauze $-\frac{1}{2}$ doz. (assorted sizes).

Castor oil—2 ounces.

- Iodine, tincture of-2 ounces.
- Manual, first aid petrolatum carbonised-1 jar.
- Picric acid solution, made according to the following prescription: $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonsful of powdered picric acid, 2 ounces of absolute alcohol, and 2 pints of distilled water.

Flavine.

Tannic acid jelly.

Pins, safety—1 packet. Sal-volatile—1 ounce.

Scissors-1 pair.

Tourniquet-1 only.

Tweezers—1 pair.

Cotton, absorbent; Gauze, sterilised, plain lint, absorbent plaster, adhesive-An adequate assortment.

(b) First aid officer, holding necessary St. John's certificate, and appointed as such by Government Printer, shall be paid an allowance of five shillings (5s.) per week above his usual classification.

20.-Bronze Work.

(a) All workers employed on bronze work shall be paid double time rates while so employed. Milk shall be provided before commencing, and occa-sionally during the progress of the work. The work shall be done in a room or place devoted solely to this operation.

(b) No female shall be permitted to do bronzing or dusting-off work.

21.—Morning and Afternoon Tea.

Existing custom in regard to morning and afternoon tea for female employees shall continue.

22.—Artificial Light.

In the basement of the Confidential Room, whilst present conditions continue in regard to artificial light, the worker shall be paid sixpence (6d.) per hour increase on the rates hereinbefore prescribed during the time he is so engaged: Provided that this provision shall not apply during the time overtime rates apply, nor to occasions in other rooms upon which dullness of natural light through weather conditions makes artificial light necessary.

23.-Miscellaneous.

The employer shall provide suitable washing facilities for his workers and a suitable place for each worker to keep clothes. Where the floors are composed of materials known as granolithic, or concrete, or combinations of cement, stone or asphalt, employers shall provide some suitable materials upon which the workers may stand whilst at work.

A copy of this Award shall be kept in a con-venient place in each workroom.

24.—No Reduction.

It is understood and agreed by both parties to this Award that nothing contained in this Award shall be construed so as to destroy or undermine any existing condition or privilege at present exist-ing in the Government Printing Office; neither shall it be the medium of reducing any employee below the rate he or she is at present receiving or be the means of increasing his or her hours.

Any condition or circumstance arising that is not covered by this Award shall be dealt with by the Government Printer and the Union, and failing agreement, it shall be referred to a Board of Reference for decision.

25.—Board of Reference.

For the purpose of this Award, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a Chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute the functions of—

- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of this Award or any of them;
- (b) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time;
- (c) classifying and fixing wages, rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Award.

26.—Pay Day.

Pay day shall be Friday of each week and on that day employees covered by this Award shall be paid for all time worked up to the finishing time of the usual shift on the preceding Wednesday. This clause over-rides any privileges, etc., claimed under clause 24.

27.—Protective Clothing.

(a) Protective clothing shall be supplied by the employer as follows:—

Gloves:

Photo-Lithographic Room:

Males—Two (2) pair of heavy rubber gloves per person annually.

Females—Two (2) pair of light rubber gloves per person annually.

Printing Down Room:

Two (2) pair light rubber gloves per person annually.

Camera Operating Room:

- Two (2) pair light rubber gloves per person annually.
- Overalls—Plate grainer, machine room assistant and metal melter—one (1) pair annually. Rubber Boots—Rubber boots will be supplied as required to the plate grainer only.

(b) The Government Printer may, where he deems it necessary, supply protective clothing additional to that prescribed in subclause (a) hereof.

28.—Preference to Unionists.

Preference of employment shall be given to members of the applicant Union, provided that any employee or applicant for employment who is a member of another recognised Union and who produces proof of such membership shall be entitled to equal preference.

Provided also that any employee or applicant for employment who is not a member of the applicant Union shall within 14 days of commencing employment under this Award make and complete an application for membership of the applicant Union and provided further that any employee who is a financial member of another Union shall upon the expiration of his current membership with such other Union, within 14 days of such expiry, make and complete an application for membership of the applicant Union.

29.—Promotions.

For the purpose of determining the relative seniority of employees in appeals under the Government Employees (Promotions Appeal Board) Act, 1945-1956—

- (a) a leading hand/journeyman shall be deemed to be senior to a journeyman, irrespective of the rates of pay received.
- (b) as between employees who occupy positions of leading hand or higher, the rate of wage shall be deemed to be that portion of the employee's margin which is in excess of the rate of wage for journeymen of his type.

30.—Apprentices.

The following conditions shall apply to all apprenticeships under this Award:----

(1) An employer shall be deemed to undertake the duty which he agrees to perform as a duty enforceable under this Award.

(2) The Board of Reference constituted under this Award shall also act as the Apprenticeship Board.

(3) Apprentices shall be allowed to any one of the following trades:—

- (a) Hand composing.—An apprentice to hand composing shall be required to prove that he has passed the highest examination provided for in the primary school, or an equivalent examination, or to produce a certificate that he has attained that standard before being registered.
- (b) Hand and machine composition with instruction in the mechanism of slug casting or type setting machines:—

An apprentice to hand and machine composition with instruction in the mechanism of slug casting or type setting machines shall be taught and instructed in hand composition and all things incidental thereto for the first three (3) years and in addition shall be taught and instructed in machine composing and the mechanism of slug casting or type setting machines during the last two (2) years of his period of apprenticeship.

- (c) Letterpress machining.
- (d) Lithographing.
- (e) Bookbinding and finishing.
- (f) Paper ruling.
- (g) Stereotyping.
- (h) Linotype and/or monotype mechanic.
- (i) Lithographic art and/or lithographic camera operator.

Apprentices to the above trades shall be taught in accordance with the syllabus of training approved by the Perth Technical College.

(4) Prior to the registration of the probationary period the employer shall obtain a written report on the prospective apprentice's possibility of success in the trade from the Psychological and Counselling Service of the Technical Education Division. A copy of the report shall be forwarded to the Registrar of the Court of Arbitration together with the application for registration of the probationer.

Before completing such probationary period, the probationer shall submit himself to an eyesight test and obtain a certificate of fitness to be apprenticed to the trade, and a copy of such certificate shall be attached to the notice of registration of the apprenticeship.

(5) Every apprentice shall attend a Government technical school, vocational classes, or classes of instruction, where provided, for instruction in such subjects as are deemed necessary for his branch of the trade. He shall be allowed the necessary time off without loss of pay during his ordinary working hours to attend such classes. Any apprentice failing to attend such classes when given time off for that purpose shall be deemed to have unlawfully absented himself from his employment and may have his wages reduced accordingly.

(6) The period during which apprentices are to attend such technical school or classes shall be eight (8) hours per week for four (4) years of the apprenticeship period or, where the training facilities for apprentices at the Technical School attended by such apprentices make it impracticable for their attendance to be for eight hours every week, or for a period of four (4) years, then for the number of hours and for the period of any prescribed course (with a minimum of eight (8) hours per fortnight), as is approved by the Apprenticeship Board constituted hereunder.

(7) The examiners shall be persons skilled in the industry; one shall be nominated by the employer and one by the workers, for each particular branch of the trade. Failing such nomination or nominations the Court may appoint such person or persons as it may deem fit. In the event of a disagreement between the examiners, the matter in dispute shall be referred to the Apprenticeship Board, at the request of any one of the examiners, and the decision of the Apprenticeship Board shall be final and conclusive.

(8) It shall be the duty of the examiners to examine the work, inquire into the diligence of each apprentice, and, where any apprentice fails to show satisfactory progress, to inquire as to the opportunities provided by the employer for such apprentice to learn, and to submit a report to the Court in writing as to the result of the examination within 14 days from the date of holding the examination.

(9) Examinations shall be conducted in June and November of each year:—

(a) (i) The terminal (June) examination shall be for theory only, and shall be conducted by the instructors during the last week in June. The questions shall be set by the instructors, and the written answers checked, and the deserved marks allotted. These, with a report on the practical progress shown by each apprentice, shall be handed to the examiners for their approval or otherwise.

- (ii) The examiners, shall, during the month of June, make their annual visit of inspection to each factory where apprentices are employed, and personally interview the employer (or foreman) and also the apprentice, and shall satisfy themselves as to the assiduity of the apprentice in his daily work, and especially as to the facilities afforded him to enable him to make the required progress in his particular branch of the trade.
- (iii) The examiners shall present a report to the Court as to the progress made by the students during the period under review with relevant information covering their inspection of factories.
- (b) The annual examination shall take place in November. The test papers shall be set by the examiners in collaboration with the instructors. The practical work set during the year shall be checked and, where necessary, a special practical test shall be given to those apprentices who have not shown the required progress in their normal class work. This test will be performed under the examiners' direct supervision, at the Printing Trades Classes, during the second week of the examination. From these results the examiners shall draw up their annual report and submit same to the Court before the commencement of the summer vacation period.
- (c) (i) Marks shall be awarded for these examinations as follows: An honours certificate shall be granted to all who gain 90 per cent. and over. A merit pass shall be awarded to those who secure 75 to 89 per cent. marks, while 60 to 74 per cent. shall entitle an apprentice to a pass. Less than 60 per cent. of marks shall necessitate an apprentice continuing his studies another period.
 - (ii) Should the apprentice attain a standard approved by the State Technical Education Authority he shall for the first annual examination he passes at that standard receive the sum of 5s. a week in addition to the prescribed weekly wage; for the second annual examination he passes he shall receive an additional 5s. a week, or 10s. in addition to the prescribed weekly wage; for the third annual examination he passes he shall receive a further 5s. a week, or 15s. in addition to the prescribed weekly wage; for the fourth annual examination he passes he shall receive a further sum of 5s. a week, or £1 in addition to the prescribed weekly wage. He shall receive such additional amounts on and from the beginning of the first pay period commencing in January following the examination.

(10) At the conclusion of the apprentice's technical training course he shall sit for his final examination, which shall be conducted entirely by the examiners. An apprentice securing marks totalling 90 per cent. and over shall be entitled to have the word "honours" added to his final certificate. The word "merit" shall be added to the final certificate to all who gain 75 to 89 per cent. Marks of 60 to 74 per cent. shall entitle the apprentice to have the word "pass" added to his final certificate. Less than 60 per cent. of marks shall necessitate an apprentice continuing his studies another period.

(11) Any apprentice claiming to have cause for complaint regarding instruction, either in Technical School or workshop, shall have the right of appeal to the Apprenticeship Board.

(12) Such fees shall be paid by the Registrar to the examiners as the Court shall allow. (3)-12013 (13) (a) The maximum number of apprentices allowed to the employer shall be in the proportion of one to every three or fraction of three journeymen in the hand composing branch, and one to every four or fraction of four journeymen in any other branch.

(b) For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices allowed to be taken at any time, the average number of journeymen employed on all working days of the 12 months immediately preceding such time shall be deemed to be the number of journeymen employed.

(14) In all other matters not expressly provided for herein the Apprenticeship Regulations made under the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912 and gazetted on the 6th November, 1953, shall apply to all apprenticeships under this Award.

The Tribunal hereby awards, orders and prescribes that Award No. 104 of 1955 of the W.A. Coal Industry Tribunal be amended in the following manner:—

1.-Clause 2:

Insert the following new paragraphs-

(xii) Notwithstanding anything elsewherc contained in this Award an employee who has left a mine to act as General Secretary or other executive officer of the Union and who is employed full time in such capacity, shall be entitled to 13 weeks' long service leave with pay upon accumulation by him of 65 shifts of entitlement, irrespective of whether such shifts are accumulated by him as an employee of an employer respondent to the Coal Mining Industry Award No. 4 of 1953, as amended in the Coalmining Industry, or as General Secretary or other executive officer of the Union. Any portion of the 13 weeks long service leave accumulated to him during his service with the Union, as a full time officer shall be paid for by the Coal Miners' Industrial Union of Workers of Western Australia, Collie.

(xiii) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Award an employer may require any employee who has qualified for long service leave to take such leave at any time provided he is given one month's notice of the date of commencement of such leave.

2. These amendments shall take effect forthwith.

3.—Area.

This Agreement shall apply to the buildings and land of the Plant Engineer's Workshop, Jcwell Street, East Perth.

4.—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of 12 months from the date hereof.

5.—Definitions.

(a) "Painter"—A painter shall include any skilled worker handling a paint brush or spray on to a motor car or any other vehicle in the coach and car building trade: Provided that polishing in connection with all pyroxylin materials shall be considered the work of painters' labourers and junior workers.

(b) "Painter's Labourer"-A painter's labourer (b) "Painter's Labourer — A painter's labourer shall include any worker engaged in stripping, rubbing down, cleaning undergears, and all pre-paratory work connected with painting, other than using a paint brush or a spray, except for blacking underparts and applying all lead and filling coats other than the finishing coat: Provided, however, that any worker operating a paint machine or energy chell be paid full tradesmaps rates whilst spray shall be paid full tradesman's rates whilst so employed.

(c) "Trimmer"—A trimmer shall include anv male worker who does any trimming or leather work in connection with motors or any vehicle in the coach and car building trade.

(d) "Casual Worker"-Casual worker means a worker employed for less than one week.

6.-Contract of Service.

(a) The contract of service shall be by the day and shall be terminable by one (1) day's notice on either side, except in the case of a casual worker, when one (1) hour's notice shall suffice.

(b) The employer shall be under no obligation to pay for any day not worked on which the worker is required to present himself for duty, except such absence from work is due to illness and comes within the provisions of clause 14, or such absence is on account of holidays to which the worker is entitled under the provisions of the Agreement.

(c) This clause does not affect the right to dis miss for misconduct, and in such case wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

(d) The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day on which the worker cannot be usefully employed, because of any strike by the Union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machin-ery, or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent. the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

(e) The rate of payment in the wages clause is, for the purpose of convenience, expressed in weekly amounts.

(f) Wood workers, on discharge, shall be allowed one hour to sharpen tools and pack up, such time shall be included in the notice required under this clause

7.—Preference.

Preference of employment shall be given to financial members of the Union: Provided the de-partment shall be under no obligation to com-municate with the Union officers to ascertain whether a member is financial.

A "junior worker" is a person other than an apprentice under twenty-one years of age engaged in any of the following classes of work:-

Grinding paint, cleaning paint pots, washing down vehicles, taking off and putting on wheels, cleaning old ironwork, running mesoiling up leather work, cleaning up shop, and carrying and stacking timber in short lengths, holding up panels or guards and generally assisting in all branches other than using tools of trade.

Junior workers engaged in teasing hair or fibrc shall be supplied with respirators.

Junior workers shall not be engaged until the employer's quota of apprentices, if any, has been exhausted.

In the event of a junior worker becoming apprenticed, the provisions hereinafter mentioned under the heading of apprentices shall apply.

In shops where the employer is not in a position to train apprentices, junior workers may be em-ployed in the proportion of one junior to each three or fraction of three journeymen employed.

9.—Payment of Wages.

When a worker is discharged before the usual pay day, he shall be paid his wages when he ceases work, or it shall be forwarded to his address the day after, by registered post, at the employer's risk, unless the worker desires to collect at the office.

10.—Hours.

(a) The week's work shall consist of forty (40) hours.

8.—Wages.

(b) The normal hours of work shall be eight (8) hours from Monday to Friday inclusive, and shall be worked between 7.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m.

(c) Lunch interval shall not exceed one (1) hour.

(d) The Minister may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirements.

The Union or worker or workers covered by this Award shall not in any way, whether directly of indirectly, be party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause

11.—Overtime.

1. (a) All time worked (other than shift work) in excess of or outside the usual working hours on Monday to Friday inclusive shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours after the usual stopping time and double time thereafter: Provided that all work (other than shift work) after 10 p.m. on Monday to Friday inclusive shall be paid at double time up to the usual starting time: Provided also that workers called upon to start work (other than shift work) within on how and a half of the usual starting within an hour and a half of the usual starting time shall be paid at time and a half until the usual starting time.

2. Where work (other than shift work) is done on Saturdays, it shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter, but if work is performed in any period after 5 p.m. on Saturday the worker shall be paid double time for all time worked after that hour.

(b) Systematic overtime shall not be worked. Overtime shall be considered systematic when two weeks' continuous overtime has been worked: Proweeks continuous overtime has been worked. Pro-vided that this subclause shall not apply to cases where, after application to the Union has been made, extra labour is not forthwith available. No worker shall be required or permitted to work more than eighteen (18) hours overtime in any one week, except in the case of a breakdown of the exception to the case of a breakdown of the employer's plant.

(c) For all work done on Sunday, double time shall be paid, with a minimum of two (2) hours.

(d) A worker called back after completing a day's work, or called out on a Sunday, shall be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at overtime rates, but if he is called out more than once within any period of two (2) hours of a call, he shall not be entitled to any further payment for time worked within the period of two (2) hours from the time work of a call a call a call be a compared work in response to his first when he commenced work in response to his first call.

(e) When a worker is required to continue work-ing after knock-off time for more than one (1) hour, without being notified the previous day, he shall be supplied with any meal required, or be paid three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) for such meal.

(f) When any worker is required for duty during any meal time, he shall be paid at overtime rate until he is allowed the usual length of time for a meal.

(g) Workers required to start work at 12 mid-night until 6.30 a.m. and ordered back to work at 8 a.m. the same day, shall be paid three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) for breakfast.

12.—Annual Leave.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of 12 months' continuous service with such emplover.

(b) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) (i) Subject to paragraph (ii), when com-puting the annual leave due under this clause no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the paried that a worker is an annual leave and of the period that a worker is on annual leave and/

or holidays. Provided that no deductions shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.

(ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service. Provided always that if the worker has been dis-missed for peculation or theft no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein re-ferred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave ferred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled to payment during such period for the number of days' leave due to them. Provided that nothing herein contained shall deprive the Minister of his right to retain such workers at work during the close-down period as may be essential.

(g) "Ordinary wages" for the purpose of sub-clause (a) hereof shall mean the rate of wage the (h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply

to casual workers.

13.—Public Holidays.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, each of the following days, or the day observed in lieu thereof, shall be allowed as a holiday to all workers and be paid for, namely: New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Founda-tion Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boying Day Boxing Day.

Boxing Day. (b) Whenever any holiday falls on an employee's ordinary working day and the employee is not required to work on such day, he shall be paid for the ordinary hours he would have worked on such day if it had not been a holiday. If he is required to work on a holiday, he shall be paid for the time worked as if it was an ordinary working day and shall, in addition, be allowed a day's leave with pay to be added to the annual leave or to be taken at some subsequent date if the worker so agrees. (c) In the case of workers working a five-day

(c) In the case of workers working a five-day week, no payment or a day in lieu shall be granted for any public holiday falling on a Saturday.

(d) Payment for holidays shall be in accordance with the usual hours of work.

(e) When a worker is off duty owing to leave without pay or sickness, including accidents on or off duty, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, any holiday falling during such absence shall not be treated as a paid holiday. Where the worker is on duty or available on the working day immediately preceding a holiday, or resumes duty, or is available on the working day immediately following a holiday, as prescribed in this clause, the worker shall be entitled to a paid holiday on all such holidays.

(f) A casual worker shall not be entitled to payment for any holiday referred to in this clause.

14.—Sick Leave.

(a) (i) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth of a week for each completed month of service.

(ii) The liability of the employer hereunder shall in no case exceed one (1) week's wages during each calendar year in respect of each worker.

(iii) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event

of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(b) This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits to his employer, or his representative, of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) con-secutive working days or more.

(d) No payment will be made for any absence due to the workers' own fault, neglect, or misconduct.

15.—Higher Duties.

(a) A worker engaged for more than one-half (a) A worker engaged for more than one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ of one (1) day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the righer rate for such day or shift; if employed for one-half or less than one-half of one (1) day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time actually worked: Provided, how-ever, that acting time of less than twenty (20) minutes in any one (1) day or shift shall not be counted counted.

(b) Should any worker be required to perform work in a lower grade, his wage shall not be reduced whilst employed in such capacity.

16.—Painters—Special Provisions.

(a) Dry Rubbing Down.—No surface painted with lead paint shall be rubbed down or scraped by dry process.

(b) Washing of Hands.—The employer shall provide for workers in the painting branch of the industry, washing facilities and soap suitable as a solvent for paint mixtures in some convenient place for the use of workers before meals and after knocking off work.

(c) Spray Painting.—Where painters sprays are employed, adequate protection for their health shall be provided by the employers. They shall also be provided with respirators.

It shall be considered a breach of this Award for spray painting operations to be carried on con-trary to any orders or regulations made under or pursuance of the Factories and Shops Act, 1920-1956.

(d) Painters shall be allowed five minutes each day before ceasing work at end of shift for the purpose of washing and cleaning up.

17.--Blowers.

Where practicable, blowers shall be installed in and around wood-working machines where dust is created and likely to affect the health of the employees.

18.—Tools.

(a) Woodworkers and other branches requiring files and hacksaw blades, bench vyces, cramps (above four inches) and rasps for the execution of their work, to be supplied with same by the employer.

(b) Where the apprentice to woodworking pro-vides his own tools other than those mentioned in subclause (a) hereof, he shall be paid an allowance of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per week in his third, four and fifth years.

(c) Where the woodworker provides his own tools other than those mentioned in subclause (a) hereof, he shall be paid an allowance of five shillings (5s.) per week.

(d) A weekly tool allowance of two shillings (2s.) shall be paid to trimmers, and one shilling (1s.) to apprentice trimmers in first to fifth years inclusive.

19.—Place for Meals.

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No worker shall be permitted to have a meal in any paint shop, or in such close proximity to any place where painting operations are being carried on as are likely to cause injury to his health.

20.-Shop Stewards.

Subject to the recognition of properly constituted authority, shop stewards, to be appointed by the Union, shall be recognised by the management. The management shall be notified in writing by the Union of the stewards appointed.

21.-Notice Boards.

A notice board shall be provided by the employer where, in the opinion of the officer in charge, it is considered that notices are essential to meet the convenience of the Union concerned.

22.--- Under-rate Workers.

Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed in writing between the employer and the Union

23.—Right of Entry to Works.

On notifying the officer in charge, any officer of the Union, authorised in writing by the president and secretary of such Union, shall have the right to enter any place or premises during ordinary working hours, wherein members of such Union covered by this Agreement are engaged, for the purpose of conversing with or interviewing the workers in such place or premises.

Provided that such officer shall not hamper or otherwise hinder the workers in the carrying out of their work. The officer in charge shall deter-mine whether workers are being hampered or hindered in their work.

24.-Board of Reference.

(1) For the purpose of this Agreement, a Board of Reference. (1) For the purpose of this Agreement, a Board of Reference is hereby appointed, which shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties. The said Board shall have assigned to it, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the dispute, the functions of: (a) adjusting one matter of difference which

- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time, except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of this Agreement or any of them;
- (b) dealing with any other matter which the Court may refer to the Board from time to time;
- (c) classifying and fixing wages, rates, and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Agreement.

(2) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Agreement.

25.—Apprentices.

(a) The Apprenticeship Regulations under the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, shall apply to all apprenticeship agreements under this Agreement.

(b) Apprentices shall be allowed to the following trades: 1, Smithing; 2, bodymaking, 3, wheelwrighting; 4, machining; 5, painting; 6, trimming; 7, panelbeating (including oxywelding); 8, farriery.
(c) The proportion of apprentices to journeymen shall be one apprentice to two or fraction of two provides of the properties of the proper

two journeymen.

(d) In the case of a youth who has had previous experience in the industry as a junior worker, the five years course of apprenticeship specified in the Schedule may be reduced to such period as the examiners, taking into consideration the age and previous experience of the youth, may determine. The rates of wages to be paid in such case shall be the rates hereinafter prescribed for the years of service which the youth has yet to serve.
