IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF
WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

Nos. 7, 12, 21, 22 and 23 of 1958.

Between Australian Workers' Union, Westralian Branch, Industrial Union of Workers; Amalgamated Engineering Union of Workers, Perth Branch; Australasian Society of Engineers Industrial Union of Workers, Perth, W.A.; Electrical Trades Union of Workers of Australia (Western Australian Branch), Perth and The Boilermakers' Society of Australia, Union of Workers, Coastal Districts, W.A., Applicants, and BP Refinery (Kwinana) Limited, Respondent.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination and whereas the parties subsequently met and conferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Court by their respective representatives and requested the Court to make the said agreement an Award of the Court now therefore the Court pursuant to Section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, and all other powers therein enabling it hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court:—

Memorandum of Agreement.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein it shall be taken to mean and include "Agreement".)

1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the "Oil Refinery Workers' Award." It replaces Award No. 51 of 1955.

3.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to the workers employed in the classifications set out in Clause 29 hereof in the Oil Refinery Industry and shall include such workers employed at the Refinery Switching Station at Fremantle.

4.—Area.

This Award shall operate over the area comprised within the South-West Land Division of the State of Western Australia.

5.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of two (2) years from the beginning of the first pay period commencing after the date hereof.

6.—Definitions.

(a) "Tradesman" means a worker, not being an apprentice who in the course of his employment works from drawings or prints, or makes precision measurements or applies general trade experience.

(b) "Toolmaker" means a tradesman making and/or repairing any precision tool, gauge, die or mould to be affixed to any machine, who designs or lays out his work and is responsible for its proper completion.

(c) "First-class machinist" means a tradesman who is partly or wholly engaged in setting up and operating the following machines—Lathe, boring machine, milling machine, planing machine, shaping machine, slotting machine and grinding machine.

(d) "Second-class machinist" means an adult not engaged as a tradesman and who is not required to work from drawings or prints required to be scaled and/or measured from drawings or prints, or to make precision measurements, but who is engaged in operating or in the setting up and operating of machines enumerated in the definition of "first-class machinist"; or who is engaged operating a key-setting machine, or a second-class brass finisher or as a pipe fitter on low pressure work.

(e) "Third-class machinist" means a machinist, not being a process worker, who operates any machine set up by a tradesman or any machine the setting up of which does not require the knowledge or skill of a second-class machinist.

(f) "Motor mechanic" means a worker engaged in making, repairing, altering, assembling (except assembling for the first time in Australia) and/or testing the metal parts (including electric) of the engines and/or chassis on motor cars or other motor vehicles, except motor cycles.

(g) "Electrical fitter" means a worker employed in making, repairing, altering, assembling, testing, winding, or wiring electrical machines, instruments, meters, or other apparatus, other than wires leading thereto, but a worker whose duty consists of placing electrodes in "neon" tubes sealed by the worker shall not be deemed for that reason to be an electrical fitter. Provided, however, that a worker employed as a meter tester shall not be classed as an electrical fitter.

(h) (i) "Boilermaker" means a tradesman as defined in paragraph (ii) hereof who is employed in the fabrication, erection and/or repairing of steel or iron ships or of boilers or other vessels subject to greater pressure than the weight of their contents, but does not include drilling by stationary machines.

(ii) "Tradesman" means an adult worker who is required to develop work from scaled drawings or prints, or to make templates, or to apply general trade experience without the guidance of a foreman or other tradesman, and includes riveting by hand or machine, caulking, chipping, and working rivet busters.

(i) "Steel Construction Tradesman" means an adult worker who is required to develop work from scaled drawings or prints, or to make templates, or to apply general trade experience without the guidance of a foreman or other tradesman and includes riveting by hand or machine, caulking, chipping, and working rivet busters.

(j) "Welder—First Class" means a worker using electric arc or acetylene, petrol or coal gas blow pipe on any work other than—

- (a) filling castings, or
- (b) cutting scrap metal, or
- (c) welding with the aid of jigs, or
- (d) operations specifically mentioned as being the work of a second-class welder in the definition of that term hereunder.

(k) "Welder—Second Class" means a worker who—

- (a) uses any of the foregoing types of welding apparatus in filling castings, or
- (b) welds with the aid of jig, or
- (c) operates automatic welding machines for the setting up of which he is not responsible, or

(d) operates a profile cutting or a straight line cutting machine.

(l) "Casual Worker" means a worker whose employment is terminated through no fault of his own before the expiration of one week.

(m) "Junior Worker" means a male worker under the age of twenty-one (21) years and who is not employed as an apprentice.

7.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of casual workers, the contract of service shall be by the week and shall be terminable by one week's notice given on either side on any day. If the employer or a worker fails to give the required notice one week's wages shall be paid or forfeited.

(b) The employer shall be under no obligation to pay for any day not worked upon which the worker is required to present himself for duty, except such absence from work is due to illness and comes within the provisions of Clause 19 or such absence is on account of holidays to which the worker is entitled under the provisions of this Award.

(c) This clause does not affect the right to dismiss for misconduct.

8.—Breakdowns.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which a worker cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Union or unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or union, or through the breakdown of the employer's machinery, or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

9.—Higher Duties.

A worker engaged for more than half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If employed for not more than half of one day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked.

10.—Special Rates and Provisions.

(a) Height Money—Workers engaged in the erection of steel frame buildings, bridges, and gasometers at a height of fifty feet (50 ft.) or more above the nearest horizontal plane shall be paid at the rate of two shillings (2s.) per day extra.

(b) Dirt Money—Threepence (3d.) per hour extra shall be paid to workers when engaged on work of an unusually dirty nature, where clothes are necessarily unduly soiled or injured or boots are unduly injured by the nature of the work done.

(c) Confined Space—Eightpence (8d.) per hour extra shall be paid to workers when working in "confined space" which means:—A compartment or space the dimensions of which necessitate a worker working in a stooped or otherwise cramped position, or without proper ventilation.

(d) Hot Places—Working for more than one hour in the shade in places where the temperature is raised by artificial means to 115 degrees Fahrenheit or more—6d. per hour extra.

Where the work continues for more than 1 hour in temperatures exceeding 130 degrees Fahrenheit, employees shall also be entitled to 10 minutes rest after each hour's work without deduction of pay.

(e) Protective Equipment—

(1) The employer shall have available a sufficient supply of protective equipment (as, for example, hand screens, goggles, glasses, gloves, aprons, leggings and gum boots) for use by his workers when engaged on work for which some protective equipment is reasonably necessary. It shall be a defence to an employer charged with a breach of this subclause if he proves that he was unable to obtain either the item of equipment the subject of the charge or a suitable substitute.

(2) Every worker shall sign an acknowledgment on receipt of any article of protective equipment and shall return same to the employer when he has finished using it or on leaving his employment.

(3) No worker shall lend another worker any such article of protective equipment issued to such firstmentioned worker, and if the same are lent, both the lender and the borrower shall be deemed guilty of wilful misconduct.

(4) Before goggles, glasses or gloves or any such substitutes which have been used by a worker are re-issued by the employer to another worker, they shall be effectively sterilised.

(5) During the time any article of protective equipment is on issue to the worker, he shall be responsible for any loss or damage thereto, fair wear and tear attributable to ordinary use excepted.

(f) When working pneumatic riveter of the percussion type and other pneumatic tools of the percussion type, workers shall be paid fourpence (4d.) per hour extra whilst so engaged.

(g) Breathing Apparatus—workers whilst required to wear breathing apparatus other than dust masks shall be paid at the rate of eightpence (8d.) per hour extra whilst so engaged.

(h) Apprentices and junior workers shall be deemed to be included in the foregoing provisions of this clause.

(i) Only subclauses (b), (c), (e) and (g) of this clause shall apply to the workers in the classifications covered by the Australian Workers' Union, Westralian Branch, Industrial Union of Workers.

(j) The work of an electrical fitter shall not be tested by a worker of a lower grade.

(k) A tradesman (not employed as a first class welder) who, in addition to his employment as such, is also required to do welding, shall be entitled to receive one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day in addition to his ordinary rate of pay whilst so engaged.

11.—Hours (other than Continuous Shift Workers).

(a) The ordinary working hours shall not exceed forty (40) in any one week and shall not exceed eight (8) hours in any one day Monday to Friday inclusive and except in the case of shift workers, shall be worked between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m.

(b) The meal interval shall not exceed one (1) hour.

(c) Where three shifts are worked, the ordinary hours shall then be inclusive of crib time for such shift workers.

(d) Rest periods shall be allowed to all workers in accordance with the arrangement in operation at the date of this Award.

12.—Overtime (other than Continuous Shift Workers).

(a) Except as hereinafter mentioned, all work performed in excess of or outside the ordinary working hours Monday to Friday inclusive and all work performed on Saturday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter. Provided that all work performed after noon on Saturday shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(b) All work performed on Sundays or on the holidays prescribed in subclause 17 (a) hereof shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) Overtime on shift work shall be based on the rate payable for shift work.

(d) (i) When a worker is recalled to work overtime after leaving his employer's business premises (whether notified before or after leaving such premises) he shall be paid for at least three hours at overtime rates; provided that, except in the case of unforeseen circumstances arising, a worker shall not be required to work the full three hours if the job for which he was recalled is completed within a shorter period but if such worker

is subsequently recalled to work within the period of three hours for which payment has been made, an additional payment shall not be made nor shall any extra overtime be paid in respect of any period covered by such minimum payment.

(ii) This subclause shall not apply in cases where it is customary for a worker to return to his employer's premises to perform a specific job outside his ordinary working hours or where the overtime is continuous (subject to any reasonable meal break which may be allowed) with the completion or commencement of ordinary working time.

(iii) Overtime worked in the circumstances specified in this subclause shall not be regarded as time worked for the purposes of Clause 16 of this Award where the actual time worked is less than three hours on such recall or on each of such recalls.

(e) When a worker is required to hold himself in readiness for a call to work after ordinary hours, he shall be paid at ordinary rates for the time he so holds himself in readiness.

(f) When a worker without being notified on the previous day is required to continue working after his usual knock-off time for more than two hours or in the case of a day worker or worker employed on day shift after 6.30 p.m., he shall be provided with any meal required or be paid five shillings in lieu thereof. Provided that such payment need not be made to workers living in the same locality as their place of employment who can reasonably return home for a meal.

(g) A worker shall not be compelled to work for more than six (6) hours without a break for a meal.

(h) When a worker, other than a shift worker, is required for duty during the meal interval, whereby his meal time is postponed for more than one (1) hour, he shall be paid at overtime rates from the time he usually commences his meal interval until he gets his meal.

(i) (i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(ii) No organisation party to this Award, or worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

(j) In the calculation of overtime rates, each day shall stand alone. Provided that, when a worker continues working beyond midnight on any day, the hours worked after midnight shall be counted as part of the previous day's work for the purpose of calculating the rates to be paid.

(k) These overtime rates shall not apply to excess time worked due to private arrangements between the workers themselves or owing to a relieving man failing to come on duty at the proper time or where such time is worked to effect the periodical rotation of shifts. The time for which any worker may be paid at ordinary rates instead of overtime due to a relieving man failing to come on duty at the proper time shall not exceed two (2) hours after the expiration of which overtime rates shall apply for the whole of the extra time worked.

13.—Continuous Shift Workers.

(a) The ordinary working hours shall not exceed forty in any week to be worked in five shifts of eight hours each inclusive of a twenty minute crib time which shall be taken in relays at such time as not to cause a stoppage of work. For the purpose of this clause a week means the pay week.

Liberty is reserved to the parties to apply for the provision of an eighty-hour fortnight.

(b) All time worked in excess of or outside the ordinary working hours as prescribed shall be paid for at the rate of double time except where a worker is called upon to work a regularly rostered overtime shift when the rate shall be time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

(c) These overtime rates shall not apply to excess time worked due to private arrangements between the workers themselves or owing to a relieving man failing to come on duty at the proper time or where such time is worked to effect the periodical rotation of shifts. The time for which any worker may be paid at ordinary rates instead of overtime due to a relieving man failing to come on duty at the proper time shall not exceed two (2) hours after the expiration of which overtime rates at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours and double time thereafter shall apply for the whole of the extra time worked except that when the employer has received at least twelve (12) hours' notice of such absence double time shall be paid.

(d) Overtime on shift work shall be based on the rate payable for shift work. This shall not apply to the weekend penalty rates prescribed in subclause (j) hereof.

(e) (i) When a worker is recalled to work overtime after leaving his employer's business premises (whether notified before or after leaving such premises) he shall be paid for at least three hours at overtime rates; provided that, except in the case of unforeseen circumstances arising, a worker shall not be required to work the full three hours if the job for which he was recalled is completed within a shorter period but if such worker is subsequently recalled to work within the period of three hours for which payment has been made, an additional payment shall not be made nor shall any extra overtime be paid in respect of any period covered by such minimum payment.

(ii) This subclause shall not apply in cases where it is customary for a worker to return to his employer's premises to perform a specific job outside his ordinary working hours or where the overtime is continuous (subject to any reasonable meal break which may be allowed) with the completion or commencement of ordinary working time.

(iii) Overtime worked in the circumstances specified in this subclause shall not be regarded as time worked for the purposes of Clause 16 of this Award where the actual time worked is less than three hours on such recall or on each of such recalls.

(f) When a worker without being notified on the previous day is required to continue working after his usual knock-off time for more than two (2) hours or in the case of a worker employed on day shift after 6.30 p.m., he shall be provided with any meal required or be paid five shillings in lieu thereof. Provided that such payment need not be made to workers living in the same locality as their place of employment who can reasonably return home for a meal.

(g) A worker shall not be compelled to work for more than six (6) hours without a break for a meal.

(h) (i) An employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

(ii) No organisation, party to this Award, or worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly, be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

(i) All work performed on any of the holidays prescribed in subclause 17 (a) or on Sundays in excess of the hours prescribed in subclause (a) shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(j) All work performed during the ordinary working hours on Saturdays, Sundays or the holidays prescribed in subclause 17 (a) shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

These rates shall be paid in lieu of the shift allowances prescribed in Clause 14 hereof.

(k) In the calculation of overtime rates, each day shall stand alone. Provided that, when a worker continues working beyond midnight on any day, the hours worked after midnight shall be counted as part of the previous day's work for the purpose of calculating the rates to be paid.

14.—Shift Work.

(a) The employer may if he so desires, work any of his employees on shifts, but before doing so shall give notice of his intention to the Union.

(b) (i) A worker who does not work at least one week on day shift out of each consecutive three weeks shall be paid for each shift other than day shift at the rate of time and one-quarter. Provided that if he is required to work for more than one week consecutively on afternoon shift or for more than one week consecutively on night shift, such a worker shall be paid at the rate of time and one-quarter for each shift other than day shift in the consecutive second and subsequent weeks of afternoon shift or of night shift.

(ii) This subclause shall not apply to workers employed on what is known as the Standard Refinery Roster nor to workers to whom this subclause would only otherwise apply because of a change of shift due to private arrangements with another worker.

(c) A worker employed on any shift other than day shift shall be paid for afternoon shift seven and a half per cent. (7½%) and for night shift ten per cent. (10%) in addition to his ordinary rate.

(d) (i) Where any particular process is carried out on shifts other than day shift, and less than five (5) consecutive afternoon or five consecutive night shifts are worked on that process, then workers employed on such afternoon or night shifts shall be paid at overtime rates.

(ii) The sequence of work shall not be deemed to be broken under the preceding paragraph by reason of the fact that work on the process is not carried out on a Saturday or Sunday or on any public holiday.

(e) (i) A worker who replaces a regular shift worker who is absent for any reason beyond the control of the employer, on afternoon or night shift, shall be paid at the rate of time and one-quarter if he does not work for five (5) consecutive shifts and the appropriate shift work rate if he works five or more shifts consecutively.

(ii) A worker who replaces on afternoon or night shift a regular shift worker who is absent by reason of a direction of the employer shall be paid at overtime rates unless he works the number of consecutive shifts prescribed in the next preceding paragraph.

(iii) The sequence of consecutive shifts shall not be deemed to be broken under paragraph (i) by reason of rostered days off in respect to workers employed on continuous process work or by a Saturday or Sunday in respect to other workers or by any public holiday or any other reason beyond the control of the employer.

(iv) A worker who does not work five (5) consecutive shifts for any reason beyond the control of the employer shall not be entitled to payment under the provisions of this subclause.

(f) Where a shift commences at or after 11 p.m., then the whole shift shall be paid for at the rate which applies to the major portion of the shift.

15.—Maximum Rate.

Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award to the contrary, no time of duty whatsoever shall be required to be paid for at more than double time rate.

16.—Rest Period after Overtime.

(a) When overtime work is necessary it shall, wherever reasonably practicable, be so arranged that workers have at least eight (8) consecutive hours off duty between the work of successive days.

(b) A worker (other than a casual worker) who works so much overtime between the termination of his ordinary work on one day and the commencement of his ordinary work on the next day that he has not at least eight (8) consecutive hours off duty between those times shall, subject to this subclause, be released after completion of such overtime until he has had eight (8) consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring during such absence.

(c) If, on the instructions of his employer, such a worker resumes or continues work without having had such eight (8) consecutive hours off duty, he shall be paid at double rates until he is released from duty for such period and he shall then be entitled to be absent until he has had eight (8) consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring during such absence.

17.—Annual Leave and Holidays.

(a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu, shall, subject to clauses 12 and 13 hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

Any worker absenting himself from work without reasonable cause, proof of which shall lie upon him, on the whole or any portion of the working day succeeding a holiday provided for herein, shall not be entitled to payment for such holiday.

(b) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.

(c) Seven-day shift workers, that is, shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed one (1) week's leave in addition to the leave prescribed in subclause (b) hereof. Where a worker with twelve (12) months' continuous service is engaged for part of a qualifying twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the period of two (2) consecutive weeks' annual leave prescribed in subclause (b) hereof increased by one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week for each completed month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

(d) If any prescribed holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which, in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one (1) day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(e) If after one (1) month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth (1/6th) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.

(f) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, or time spent on holidays or annual leave as prescribed by this Award, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

(g) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of this clause.

(h) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

18.—Long Service Leave.

(a) Right to Leave:

A worker shall as herein provided be entitled to leave with pay in respect of long service.

(b) Long Service:

- (1) The long service which shall entitle a worker to such leave shall, subject as herein provided, be continuous service with the one and the same employer.
- (2) Such service shall include service prior to the 1st April, 1958 if it continued until such time but only to the extent of the last 20 completed years of continuous service.

- (3) (i) Where a business has, whether before or after the coming into operation hereof, been transmitted from an employer (herein called "the transmitter") to another employer (herein called "the transmittee") and a worker who at the time of such transmission was an employee of the transmitter in that business becomes an employee of the transmittee—the period of the continuous service which the worker has had with the transmitter (including any such service with any prior transmitter) shall be deemed to be the service of the worker with the transmittee.
- (ii) In this subclause "transmission" includes transfer, conveyance, assignment or succession whether voluntary or by agreement or by operation of law and "transmitted" has a corresponding meaning.
- (4) Such service shall include—
- (a) Any period of absence from duty on any annual leave or long service leave.
 - (b) Any period of absence from duty necessitated by sickness of or injury to the worker but only to the extent of fifteen working days in any year of his employment.
 - (c) Any period following any termination of the employment by the employer if such termination has been made merely with the intention of avoiding obligations hereunder in respect of long service leave or obligations under any award in respect of annual leave.
 - (d) Any period during which the service of the worker was or is interrupted by service—
 - (i) as a member of the Naval, Military or Air Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia other than as a member of the British Commonwealth Occupation Forces in Japan and other than as a member of the Permanent Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia except in the circumstances referred to in section 31 (2) of the Defence Act, 1903-1956, and except in Korea or Malaya after June 26, 1950.
 - (ii) as a member of the Civil Construction Corps established under the National Security Act, 1939-1946;
 - (iii) in any of the Armed Forces under the National Service Act, 1951 (as amended).

Provided that the worker as soon as reasonably practicable on the completion of any such service resumed or resumes employment with the employer by whom he was employed immediately before the commencement of such service.
- (5) Service shall be deemed to be continuous notwithstanding—
- (a) the transmission of a business as referred to in paragraph (3) hereof;
 - (b) any interruption of a class referred to in paragraph (4) hereof irrespective of the duration thereof;
 - (c) any absence from duty authorised by the employer;
 - (d) any standing-down of a worker in accordance with the provisions of an Award, Industrial Agreement, order or Determination under either Commonwealth or State law;
 - (e) any absence from duty arising directly or indirectly from an industrial dispute if the worker returns to work in accordance with the terms of settlement of the dispute;
 - (f) any termination of the employment by the employer on any ground other than slackness of trade if the worker be re-employed by the same employer within a period not exceeding two months from the date of such termination;
 - (g) any termination of the employment by the employer on the ground of slackness of trade if the worker is re-employed by the same employer within a period not exceeding six months from the date of such termination;
 - (h) any reasonable absence of the worker on legitimate union business in respect of which he has requested and been refused leave;
 - (i) any absence from duty after the coming into operation of this clause by reason of any cause not specified in this clause unless the employer during the absence or within fourteen days of the termination of the absence notifies the worker in writing that such absence will be regarded as having broken the continuity of service, which notice may be given by delivery to the worker personally or by posting it by registered mail to his last recorded address, in which case it shall be deemed to have reached him in due course of post.
- Provided that the period of any absence from duty or the period of any interruption referred to in placita (c) to (i) inclusive of this paragraph shall not (except as set out in paragraph (4) hereof) count as service.
- (c) Period of Leave:
- (1) The leave to which a worker shall be entitled or deemed to be entitled shall be as provided in this subclause.
 - (2) Where a worker has completed at least 20 years' service the amount of leave shall be—
 - (a) in respect of 20 years' service so completed—13 weeks' leave;
 - (b) in respect of each 10 years' service completed after such 20 years—six and a half weeks' leave.
 - (3) Where a worker has completed at least 15 years' service since its commencement and his employment is terminated—
 - (a) by his death;
 - (b) in any circumstances otherwise than by the employer for serious misconduct;

the amount of leave shall be—

 - (i) if such determination takes place before the worker has become entitled to leave under placitum (a) of paragraph (2) hereof such proportion of 13 weeks' leave as the number of completed years of such service bears to 20 years;
 - (ii) if such termination takes place after the worker has become entitled to leave under placitum (a) of paragraph (2) hereof the leave due under such placitum and in addition such proportion of 13 weeks' leave as the number of completed years of such service after the accrual of such entitlement bears to 20 years.

- (4) Where a worker has completed at least 10 years' service but less than 15 years' service since its commencement and his employment is terminated—
- (i) by his death; or
 - (ii) by the employer for any reason other than serious misconduct; or
 - (iii) by the worker on account of sickness of or injury to the worker or domestic or other pressing necessity where such sickness or injury or necessity is of such a nature as to justify or in the event of a dispute is, in the opinion of the Special Board of Reference, of such a nature as to justify such termination;
- the amount of leave shall be such proportion of 13 weeks' leave as the number of completed years of such service bears to 20 years.
- (5) In the cases to which paragraphs (3) and (4) hereof apply the worker shall be deemed to have been entitled to and to have commenced leave immediately prior to such termination.
- (d) Payment for Period of Leave:
- (1) A worker shall subject to paragraph (3) hereof, be entitled to be paid for each week of leave to which he has become entitled or is deemed to have become entitled the ordinary time rate of pay applicable to him at the date he commences such leave;
 - (2) Such ordinary time rate of pay shall be the rate applicable to him for the standard weekly hours which are prescribed by this award, but in the case of casuals and part-time workers shall be the ordinary time rate for the number of hours usually worked up to but not exceeding the prescribed standard;
 - (3) Where by agreement between the employer and the worker the commencement of the leave to which the worker is entitled or any portion thereof is postponed to meet the convenience of the worker, the rate of payment for such leave shall be at the ordinary time rate of pay applicable to him at the date of accrual or, if so agreed, at the ordinary time rate of pay applicable at the date he commences such leave.
 - (4) The ordinary time rate of pay—
 - (a) shall include any deductions from wages for board and/or lodging or the like which is not provided and taken during the period of leave;
 - (b) shall not include shift premiums, overtime, penalty rates, commissions, bonuses, allowances or the like.
 - (5) In the case of workers employed on piece or bonus work or any other system of payment by results payment shall be at ordinary time rates.
- (e) Taking Leave:
- (1) In a case to which paragraph (2) of subclause (c) applies—
 - (a) Leave shall be granted and taken as soon as reasonably practicable after the right thereto accrues due or at such time or times as may be agreed between the employer and the worker or in the absence of such agreement at such time or times as may be determined by the Special Board of Reference, having regard to the needs of the employer's establishment and the worker's circumstances.
 - (b) Except where the time for taking leave is agreed to by the employer and the worker or determined by the Special Board of Reference the employer shall give to a worker at least one month's notice of the date from which his leave is to be taken.
 - (2) Leave may be granted and taken in one continuous period or if the employer and the worker so agree in not more than three separate periods in respect of the first 13 weeks' entitlement and in not more than two separate periods in respect of any subsequent period of entitlement.
 - (3) Any leave shall be inclusive of any public holidays specified in this award occurring during the period when the leave is taken but shall not be inclusive of any annual leave.
 - (4) Payment shall be made in one of the following ways—
 - (i) in full before the worker goes on leave;
 - (ii) at the same time as his wages would have been paid to him if the worker had remained at work, in which case payment shall, if the worker in writing so requires, be made by cheque posted to an address specified by the worker;
 - (iii) in any other way agreed between the employer and the worker.
 - (5) No worker shall, during any period when he is on leave, engage in any employment for hire or reward in substitution for the employment from which he is on leave, and if a worker breaches this provision he shall thereupon forfeit his right to leave hereunder in respect of the unexpired period of leave upon which he has entered, and the employer shall be entitled to withhold any further payment in respect of the period and to reclaim any payments already made on account of such period of leave.
- (2) In the case to which paragraph (3) or paragraph (4) of subclause (c) applies and in any case in which the employment of the worker who has become entitled to leave hereunder is terminated before such leave is taken or fully taken the employer shall, upon termination of his employment otherwise than by death pay to the worker, and upon termination of employment by death pay to the personal representative of the worker upon request by the personal representative, a sum equivalent to the amount which would have been payable in respect of the period of leave to which he is entitled or deemed to have been entitled and which would have been taken but for such termination. Such payment shall be deemed to have satisfied the obligation of the employer in respect of leave hereunder.
- (f) Granting Leave in Advance and Benefits to be Brought into Account.
- (1) Any employer may by agreement with a worker allow leave to such worker before the right thereto has accrued due, but where leave is taken in such a case the worker shall not become entitled to any further leave hereunder in respect of any period until after the expiration of the period in respect of which such leave had been taken before it accrued due.
 - (2) Where leave has been granted to a worker pursuant to the preceding paragraph before the right thereto has accrued due, and the employment subsequently is terminated, the employer may deduct from whatever remuneration is payable upon the termination of the employment a proportionate amount on the basis of 13 weeks for twenty years' service in respect of any period for which the worker has been granted long service leave to which he was not at the date of termination of his employment or prior thereto entitled.

- (3) Any leave in the nature of long service leave or payment in lieu thereof under a State law or a long service leave scheme not under the provisions hereof granted to a worker by his employer in respect of any period of service with the employer shall be taken into account whether the same is granted before or after the coming into operation hereof and shall be deemed to have been leave taken and granted hereunder in the case of leave with pay to the extent of the period of such leave and in the case of payment in lieu thereof to the extent of a period of leave with pay equivalent to the amount of the payment and to be satisfaction to the extent thereof of the entitlement of the worker hereunder.
- (4) An employer shall be entitled to offset any payment in respect of leave hereunder against any payment by him to any long service leave scheme, superannuation scheme, pension scheme, retiring allowance scheme, provident fund, or the like or under any combination thereof operative at the first day of April, 1958.
- (g) Records to be Kept:
- (1) Each employer shall during the employment and for a period of 12 months thereafter, or in the case of termination by death of the worker a period of three years thereafter, keep a record from which can be readily ascertained the name of each worker and his occupation, the date of the commencement of his employment and his entitlement to long service leave and any leave which may have been granted to him or in respect of which payment may have been made hereunder.
- (2) Such record shall be open for inspection in the manner and circumstances prescribed by this award with respect to the time and wages record.
- (a) Special Board of Reference:
- (1) There shall be constituted a Special Board of Reference for the purpose hereof to which all disputes and matters arising hereunder shall be referred and the Board shall determine all such disputes and matters.
- (2) There shall be assigned to such Board the functions of—
- (a) the settlement of disputes on any matters arising hereunder;
- (b) the determination of such matters as are specifically assigned to it hereunder.
- (3) The Board of Reference shall consist of one representative or substitute therefore nominated from time to time by the Western Australian Employers' Federation (Incorporated) and one representative or substitute nominated from time to time by the West-Australian Trade Unions Industrial Council (A.L.P.) together with a chairman to be mutually agreed upon by the organisations named in this paragraph.
- (i) State Law:
- (1) The provisions of any State law to the extent to which they have before the coming into operation hereof conferred an accrued right on a worker to be granted a period of long service leave in respect of a completed period of 20 or more years' service or employment or an accrued right on a worker or his personal representative to payment in respect of long service leave shall not be affected hereby and shall not be deemed to be inconsistent with the provisions hereof.
- (2) The entitlement of any such worker to leave in respect of a period of service with the employer completed after the period of which the long service leave referred to in paragraph (1) hereof accrued due shall be in accordance herewith.
- (3) Subject to paragraphs (1) and (2) hereof, the entitlement to leave hereunder shall be in substitution for and satisfaction of any long service leave to which the worker may be entitled in respect of employment of the worker by the employer.
- (4) An employer who under any State law with regard to long service leave is exempted from the provisions of that law as at the first day of April, 1958, shall in respect of the workers covered by such exemption be exempt from the provisions hereof.
- (j) Exemptions:
- The Special Board of Reference may subject to such conditions as it thinks fit exempt any employer from the provisions hereof in respect of its employees where there is an existing or prospective long service leave scheme which, in its opinion is, viewed as a whole, more favourable for the whole of the employees of that employer than the provisions hereof.
- (k) Liberty to Apply:
- Liberty is granted to any party to this award to apply to the Court at any time for an appropriate variation of this clause if any of the terms and conditions operating under the code of Long Service Leave being negotiated between the Australian Council of Trade Unions and Federal Employers' Organisations is varied in any way.

19.—Absence Through Sickness.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week for each completed month of service; Provided that payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week in each calendar year. Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year, or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred. This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(b) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through the result of an accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment, or for any accident, wherever sustained, arising out of his own wilful default, or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(d) Sick leave shall accumulate from year to year, so that any balance of the period specified in subclause (a) of this clause which has in any year not been allowed to any worker by his employer as paid sick leave may be claimed by the worker and, subject to the conditions hereinbefore prescribed, shall be allowed by his employer in any subsequent year without diminution of the sick leave prescribed in respect of that year. Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this subclause shall be available to the worker for a period of two (2) years but no longer from the end of the year in which it accrues.

20.—Representatives Interviewing Workers.

The Secretary or other full-time representative of the Union, authorised in writing by the President or Secretary of the Union, shall be allowed to enter the Refinery not more than once in any week for the purpose of inspecting working places and shall be permitted to interview workers during the recognised meal period and at the change of shifts. Such secretary or representative may, if he so desires, be accompanied by any other member of the Union employed by the respondent, not actually on duty.

21.—Shop Stewards.

Subject to the recognition of properly constituted authority Shop Stewards to be appointed by the Union shall continue to be recognised by the Company. The Company shall be notified in writing by the Union of the Shop Stewards appointed.

22.—Notice Boards.

Notices previously approved by the employer may be posted by representatives of the Union at approved points in the Refinery.

23.—Board of Reference.

(a) The Court hereby appoints for the purpose of this Award a Board of Reference.

(b) The Board shall consist of a Chairman, to be appointed by the Court and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

(c) The Board is hereby assigned the following functions in the event of a disagreement between the parties bound by this Award:—

(i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretations of the provisions of this Award or any of them.

(ii) Deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to the Board from time to time.

(d) The provisions of Regulation 106 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, shall be deemed to apply to any Board of Reference appointed hereunder.

24.—Record.

(a) The employer shall keep a time and wages record showing the name of each worker, and the nature of his work, the hours worked each day, and the wages and allowances paid each week. Any system of automatic recording by means of machines shall be deemed to comply with this provision to the extent of the information recorded.

(b) The time and wages record shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited official of the Union during the usual office hours, at the employer's office or other convenient place, and he shall be allowed to take extracts therefrom. The employer's works shall be deemed to be a convenient place for the purpose of this paragraph, and if for any reason the record be not available at the works when the official calls to inspect it, it shall be made available for inspection within twelve (12) hours either at the employer's office or at the works.

25.—Apprentices.

Apprentices may be taken to electrical fitting, fitting and/or turning and/or first class machining, first class welding, motor mechanics, blacksmithing, scientific instrument maker and/or maintainer and boilermaking and/or steel construction work and/or first-class welding, in the proportion of one (1) apprentice for every two (2) or fraction of (2) journeymen; provided that the fraction of two shall not be less than one. Provided further that in an "approved shop" or factory the proportion shall be one apprentice for every one journeyman. For the purpose of this proviso an "approved" shop or factory shall be one to which approval (as regards one or more particular trades) has been given by the Board of Reference appointed under clause 23 hereof.

26.—Junior Workers.

Unapprenticed male juniors may be employed in all occupations for which apprenticeship is not provided, at the rates of wages as set out in Clause 29.

27.—Junior Worker's Certificate.

Junior workers, upon being engaged shall if required furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

(i) Name in full.

(ii) Age and date of birth.

No worker shall have any claims upon an employer for additional pay in the event of the age of the worker being wrongly stated on the Certificate. If any worker shall wilfully misstate his age in the above Certificate he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award.

28.—Under-Rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who, by reason of old age or infirmity, is unable to earn the minimum wage, may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for and be employed at the proposed lesser rate.

29.—Wages.

(ii) An employee working overtime shall be allowed a meal time of twenty (20) minutes without loss of pay after each four hours of overtime if the employee continues work after such meal time and where the employee has not been notified the day before that he will be required for overtime he shall be paid Meal Allowance of three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) for each such meal time.

(iii) Where a worker has been notified the previous day to work overtime which necessitates the provision of a meal or meals and has provided a meal or meals and is not required to work overtime, or is required to work less than the amount advised, he shall be paid three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) for each meal supplied and which is surplus.

Delete existing subclause (e) and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

(e) A worker recalled to work overtime after leaving his employer's premises and who returns to his home on completion of such overtime work shall be paid a minimum of three (3) hours' ordinary pay, or at overtime rates for the time actually worked, whichever is the greater; and in such circumstances time reasonably spent in

getting to and from work shall be regarded as time worked at ordinary rates. The worker shall not be obliged to work for the three (3) hours if the job for which he has been brought on has been completed in less time.

Delete existing subclause (f) (i) and (ii) and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

(f) (i) Rest period after overtime. When overtime work is necessary it shall, wherever reasonably practicable, be so arranged that workers have at least eight (8) consecutive hours off duty between the work of successive days.

(ii) A worker (other than a casual worker) who works so much overtime between the termination of his ordinary work on one day and the commencement of his ordinary work on the next day that he has not at least eight (8) consecutive hours off duty between those times shall, subject to this subclause be released after completion of such overtime until he has had eight (8) consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring during such absence.

(iii) If, on the instructions of his employer, such a worker resumes or continues work without having such eight (8) consecutive hours off duty, he shall be paid at double rates until he is released from duty for such period and he shall then be entitled to be absent until he has had eight (8) consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring during such absence.

Clause 21 (formerly Clause 22)—Payment for Travelling Time.—Delete existing subclause (e) and insert in lieu thereof the following:—

(e) A worker residing in the suburban area who is required to start work at some place other than his usual workshop or place of employment shall, if the time taken in travelling from his place of residence to the job and return exceeds the time normally taken in travelling from his usual place of residence to his usual workshop or place of employment and return, be paid for such excess travelling time at ordinary rates; and if the fares actually and reasonably incurred in such travelling exceed the fares normally paid by the worker in travelling from his place of residence and return, the employer shall pay the amount by which such fares exceed those usually paid for travelling to and from his usual workshop or place of employment.

- No worker shall lend another worker any protective equipment issued to such first mentioned worker, and if the same are lent both the lender and the borrower shall be deemed guilty of misconduct.

(e) Before any protective equipment which has been used by a worker is re-issued by the employer to another worker, it shall, where necessary, be effectively sterilised.

5. (i) Tradesmen and/or apprentices in the 4th and 5th year of their apprenticeship, under the direct control of the Power Production Engineer employed in operating Power Houses of installed capacity of 12.5 megawatts or more, on maintenance and operation of such Power Stations, shall be paid twenty shillings (20s.) per week extra and apprentices other than in their 4th and 5th year of apprenticeship, ten shillings (10s.) per week extra provided this shall also apply to other workers of similar classifications who are on the regular staff and employed in a similar capacity to those in receipt of such allowance as prescribed above.

(ii) Any worker (including an apprentice in his fourth or fifth year) employed on maintenance at the gas works, shall be paid five shillings (5s.) per week extra. Apprentices other than those in their fourth and fifth year shall be paid three shillings (3s.) per week extra.

(iii) The allowances prescribed in subclauses (i) and (ii) hereof shall be deemed to include all allowances contained in Clause 27.

Add new subclause 6 as follows:—

6. A tradesman (not employed as a first class welder) or an apprentice in his final year, who in addition to his employment as such is also required to do welding (as distinct from heating and cutting of a minor nature) shall be entitled to receive one shilling and fourpence (1s. 4d.) per day in addition to his ordinary rate whilst so engaged.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefit of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to the employer or his representative of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) consecutive working days or more.

(d) No payment shall be made for any absence due to the worker's own fault, neglect or misconduct.
