IN THE COURT OF ARBITRATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

No. 33 of 1959.

Between Federated Miscellaneous Workers' Union of Australia, West Australian Branch, Union of Workers, Applicant, and Guildford Grammar School, and others, Respondents.

WHEREAS an industrial dispute existed between the abovenamed parties, and whereas the said dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of dispute was referred into Court for the purpose of hearing and determination, and whereas the said reference of industrial dispute was remitted by the Court to the Conciliation Commissioner, and whereas the parties subsequently met and con-ferred and have arrived at agreement on all matters in difference, and whereas the parties have this day appeared before the Conciliation Commissioner by their respective representatives and requested the Conciliation Commissioner to make the said Agreement an Award of the Court: Now, therefore, the Conciliation Commissioner, pursuant to section 65 of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, and all other powers therein enabling him, hereby declares the memorandum hereunder written to have the same effect as and be deemed an Award of the Court. of the Court.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT.

(Note.—Wherever the word "Award" occurs herein, it shall be taken to mean and include 'Agreement''.)

1.—Title.

This Award shall be known as the Independent Day and Boarding Schools Award.

2.—Area.

This Award shall have effect over the whole of the State of Western Australia.

3.—Scope.

This Award shall apply to domestic workers, groundsmen and yardmen employed at boarding schools, and groundsmen and yardmen employed at day schools.

5.—Hours.

(i) Other Than Groundsmen:

- (a) Forty (40) hours shall constitute a week's work.
- (b) Subject to clause 7 Overtime, the spread of shift in any one day shall not exceed twelve and a half $(12\frac{1}{2})$ hours.
- (c) If a worker is at liberty to leave the premises of the employer for any time but elects to remain thereon, the time he remains on the premises shall not be in-cluded in his or her working time.

- (ii) Groundsmen:
 - (a) The ordinary hours of work shall not exceed forty (40) hours per week to be worked in five (5) days of eight (8) hours vided that work performed up to noon on Saturdays on watering duties and marking of playing fields which cannot be per-formed Mondays to Fridays, may be re-garded as ordinary hours of duty with a corresponding time off during the following week.

6.-Breaks in Shifts.

(Kitchen and Dining Room Workers.)

In addition to breaks of at least half an hour, but not more than one hour each for meals, there may be two breaks of at least two hours during each shift. Such breaks may include a meal break.

7.—Overtime.

(a) All work done outside the daily spread of hours provided in clause 5, or beyond eight (8) hours in any one day or beyond forty (40) hours in any one week shall be deemed overtime.

(b) Overtime shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half, provided that all time worked outside the daily spread of hours referred to in clause 5 (b) hereof shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

(c) Provided that in respect of groundsmen all time of duty after noon on a Saturday, or on a Sunday or the holidays prescribed by this Award (except as provided in subclause 11 (b)) shall be paid for at the rate of double time, provided further that all time worked on such days on watering duties shall be paid for at the rate of time and one half. time and one half.

(d) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award–

- (i) an employer may require any worker to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such worker shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement;
- accordance with such requirement;
 (ii) no organisation, party to this Award, or worker or workers covered by this Award, shall in any way, whether directly or indirectly be a party to or concerned in any ban, limitation or restriction upon the working of overtime in accordance with the requirements of this subclause.

8.—Days Off.

(a) Subject to subclause 5 (ii) all workers shall be granted one full day and one half day off duty each week.

(b) The half day off shall commence not later than 2 p.m.

(c) An employee required for duty on his or her (c) An employee required for duty on his of her rostered day off shall be paid at overtime rates with a minimum payment as for four (4) hours at time and a half. Provided that in lieu of pay-ment at overtime rates time off equivalent to the time worked may be granted when overtime is occasioned through the failure of another worker to report for duty or due to private arrangement between the workers themselves.

9.-Meals.

A break of at least one half hour but not more than one (1) hour shall be allowed for each meal. The midday meal shall be between the hours of 11.30 a.m. and 2 p.m.

10.—Meal Money.

A worker required to work overtime for more than two (2) hours, without being notified on the previous day or earlier that he will be so required to work, shall be supplied with a meal by the employer or paid five shillings (5s.) for a meal.

No such payment need be made to workers liv-ing in the same locality as the place of their em-ployment who can reasonably return home for such meals.

If a worker in consequence of receiving such notice has provided himself with a meal or meals and is not required to work overtime or is required to work less overtime than notified, he shall be paid the amounts above prescribed in respect of the meals not then required.

11.—Holidays and Annual Leave.

- 1. Groundsmen:
 - (a) The following days, or the days observed in lieu shall subject to subclause 7 (c) and subclause (b) hereof, be allowed as holidays without deduction of pay, namely, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, State Foundation Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.
 - (b) All work performed on Australia Day, Anzac Day and Labour Day prescribed in subclause (a) hereof shall be paid for at the rate of double time or at the option of the employer shall be paid for at ordinary rates and an additional day on full pay shall be added to the amount of annual leave to which the worker is entitled under this clause for each day or part of a day so worked.

Provided that if as a result of the worker's own default only part of the days named in this subclause are worked by the worker on any such day, an addition shall be made to such annual leave equivalent to the time actually worked on such day.

- (c) On any public holiday not prescribed as a holiday under this Award, the employer's establishment or place of business may be closed, in which case a worker need not present himself for duty and payment may be deducted, but if work be done, ordinary rates of pay shall apply.
- (d) Except as hereinafter provided, a period of two (2) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his employer after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.
- (e) If any award holiday falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day there shall be added to that period one (1) day being an ordinary working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.
- said.
 (f) If after one (1) month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment, or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-sixth (1/6th) of a week's pay at his ordinary rate of wage in respect of each completed month of continuous service.
- 2. Others:
 - (a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of four (4) weeks' leave, with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker after a period of twelve (12) months' continuous service with such employer.
 - (b) Such leave may be granted during the recess periods to suit the convenience of the employer provided that two (2) weeks of such leave shall be allowed consecutively.
 - (c) If after one (1) month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve (12) monthly period a worker lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the worker, the worker shall be paid one-third $(\frac{1}{3})$ of a week's pay in respect of each completed month of continuous service.
- 3. General:
 - (a) Any time in respect of which a worker is absent from work, except time for which he is entitled to claim sick pay, or time

spent on annual leave as prescribed by this Award, shall not count for the purpose of determining his right to annual leave.

- (b) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled, subject to subciauses 1(f) and 2(c) of this Clause, to such leave on full pay as is proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer, and if such leave is not equal to the leave given to the other workers, he shall not be entitled to work or pay whilst the other workers of such employer are on leave on full pay.
- (c) A worker who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service shall not be entitled to the benefit of the provision of this clause.
- (d) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

12.—Sick Leave.

(a) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal illhealth at the rate of one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service: Provided that subject to subclause (f) hereof, payment for absence through such ill-health shall be limited to one (1) week's pay in each calendar year.

(b) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service of the employer, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(c) This clause shall not apply when the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(d) A worker shall not be entitled to receive any wages from his employer for any time lost through any accident not arising out of or in the course of his employment or for any accident wherever sustained arising out of his own wilful default or for sickness arising out of his own wilful default.

(e) No worker shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause unless he produces proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness, but the employer shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) days or more.

(f) Sick leave shall accumulate from year to year so that any balance of the period specified in subclause (a) of this clause which has in any year not been allowed to any worker by his employer as paid sick leave may be claimed by the worker and, subject to the conditions hereinbefore prescribed, shall be allowed by his employer in any subsequent year without diminution of the sick leave prescribed in respect of that year: Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this subclause shall be available to the worker for a period of two (2) years but no longer from the end of the year in which it accrues.

(g) For the purpose of assessing a worker's entitlement to accumulated sick pay subclause (f) hereof shall be deemed to have become operative as from the date of the delivery of this Award.

13.—Contract of Service.

(a) Except in the case of casual workers, who shall be engaged on an hourly contract of service, the contract of employment of every worker shall be a weekly contract terminable by one week's notice on either side.

(b) In the event of an employer or a worker failing to give the required notice one week's wages shall be paid or forfeited.

(c) Provided this shall not affect the right of an employer to dismiss an employee without notice for misconduct.

(d) With the exception of Groundsmen the foregoing provisions shall not affect the right of an employer to stand down workers without pay during the summer recess when no work is available.

Provided that the maximum period of such stand down shall be four (4) weeks in any one year. Provided further that this maximum period of stand down shall not apply where other arrangements are agreed upon between the employer and the worker.

14.--Payment of Wages.

Wages shall be paid once weekly or once fortnightly at the option of the employer.

15.—Mixed Functions.

(a) Employees employed at work for which a higher rate is fixed shall be paid such higher rate whilst so employed.

(b If employed for four (4) hours or more on the higher class of work he shall be paid the higher rate for the whole of that day.

16.—Right of Entry.

(a) Accredited representatives of the Union shall be permitted to interview workers on the business premises of the employer during non working times and meal breaks (except between the hours of 1 p.m. and 2 p.m.).

(b) In cases of dispute between the Union and an employer such as involve the inspection of the employees in the course of their employment, such Union representative shall have the right of entry into the business premises at any time during which the employees concerned are in employment.

(c) Frovided that the duly accredited representative shall notify the employer beforehand of his intention to exercise his rights under this clause.

17.-Board and Lodging.

(a) No employer shall be compelled to board and/or lodge any worker but where board and/or lodging are provided the employer shall be entitled to deduct in respect of all workers the following amounts:----

- (i) For full board of twenty-one (21) meals per week—an amount equal to 18.5% of the male basic wage.
- (ii) For lodging—an amount equal to 7% of the male basic wage.

(b) Where, by mutual consent, full board is not provided, the deductions referred to in subclause (a) hereof shall be reduced proportionately.

(c) An employer shall be entitled to deduct from all workers other than groundsmen where they provided their own meals a proportionate amount of board for two (2) meals each working day, unless other arrangements are mutually agreed upon between the employer and the worker.

18.—Uniforms.

Where a worker is required to wear a special uniform such uniform shall be provided and laundered by the employer at his expense.

19.—Time and Wages Records.

(a) The employer shall keep or cause to be kept a record or records containing the following particulars:---

- (i) Name of each worker.
- (ii) The nature of his work.
- (iii) The hours worked each day and each week.
- (iv) The wages and overtime (if any) paid each week.
- (v) The age of each junior worker.

Any system of automatic recording by machines shall be deemed to comply with this provision to the extent of the information recorded.

(b) The record shall be open to inspection by a duly accredited representative of the Union once in each week, at the office of the employer, on days other than Saturday and Sunday between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. (except from 12 noon to 2 p.m.).

20.—Board of Reference.

The Court hereby appoints, for the purpose of this Award, a Board or Boards of Reference. Each such Board shall consist of a chairman and two other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties, as prescribed by regulations. There are assigned to each such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Award, the functions of:—

- (a) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise from time to time except such as involve interpretations of the provision of the Award, or any of them;
- (b) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

21.—Term.

The term of this Award shall be for a period of three (3) years as from the beginning of the first pay period commencing on or after the date hereof.

22.-Under Rate Workers.

(a) Any worker who by reason of old age or infirmity is unable to earn the minimum wage may be paid such lesser wage as may from time to time be agreed upon in writing between the Union and the employer.

(b) In the event of no agreement being arrived at, the matter may be referred to the Board of Reference for determination.

(c) After application has been made to the Board and pending the Board's decision, the worker shall be entitled to work for the employer at the proposed lesser rate.

(d) For a period of two (2) months from the date hereof this clause shall not affect any arrangements between an employer and a worker existing at the date of operation of this Award.

23.-Part-Time Workers.

(a) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Award workers may be regularly employed to work less hours per week than are prescribed in Clause 5 hereof, and such workers shall be remunerated at a weekly rate pro rata to the rate prescribed for the class of work on which they are engaged in the proportion which their hours of work bear to the hours fixed by Clause 5 hereof for their class of work.

(b) When a worker is employed under the provisions of this clause, he shall receive payments for wages, for annual leave, for holidays and for sick leave on a pro rata basis in the same proportion as the number of hours regularly worked each week bears to forty (40) hours.

(c) The Secretary of the Union shall be advised within twenty-eight (28) days of the date of this Award of all employees employed in a part time capacity.

(d) The secretary of the Union shall be advised within seven (7) days of any part time position created after the date of this Award.

(e) Any dispute as to whether a part time position is necessary shall be referred to the Board of Reference.

(f) Liberty is reserved to either party to apply to delete or amend this clause at any time.

24.—Junior Workers' Certificate.

(a) Junior workers upon being engaged shall furnish the employer with a certificate containing the following particulars:—

(i) Name in full.

(ii) Age and date of birth.

(b) No worker shall have any claim upon an employer for additional pay in the event of the age of the worker being wrongly stated either on the certificate, or, if no such certificate is furnished, verbally to the employer. If any junior worker shall wilfully misstate his age either verbally to the employer or in the certificate, he alone shall be guilty of a breach of this Award, and in the event of a worker having received a higher rate than that to which he was entitled he shall make restitution to the employer.

25.—Breakdowns.

The employer shall be entitled to deduct payment for any day or portion of a day upon which the worker cannot be usefully employed, because of any strike by the Union or Unions affiliated with it, or by any other association or Union, or through the breakdown of an employer's machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause which the employer cannot reasonably prevent.

26.—Roster

(a) A roster of the working hours shall be exhibited in the office of each establishment and in such other place as it may be conveniently and readily seen by each worker concerned.

- (b) Such roster shall show—
 - (i) The name of each worker.
 - (ii) The hours to be worked by each worker each day and the breaks in shifts to be taken.

(c) (i) The roster in the office shall be open for inspection by a duly accredited representative of the Union at such times and place as the record book is so open for inspection.

(ii) A duly accredited representative of the Union shall be permitted to inspect the roster aavilable to the workers not more than once in any week during the times the record book is so open for inspection.

Provided that the duly accredited representative must notify the employer before entering the place where the roster is kept.

(d) Such roster shall be drawn up in such manner as to show the hours of each worker for one week in advance of the date of the roster, and may only be altered on account of the sickness or absence of a worker, or on account of any contingency that the employer could not reasonably foresee, or due to private arrangement between the workers themselves.

27.-Notices and Posting of Award.

Every employer shall allow Union notices, except those which on reasonable grounds he considers objectionable, and a copy of this Award to be posted up by the Union in a place accessible to the workers and approved by the employer.

28.-Long Service Leave.

(a) Right to Leave.—A worker shall as herein provided be entitled to leave with pay in respect of long service.

(b) Long Service.

- (1) The long service which shall entitle a worker to such leave shall, subject as herein provided, be continuous service with one and the same employer.
- (2) Such service shall include service prior to the coming into operation hereof if it continued until such time but only to the extent of the last 20 completed years of continuous service.
- (3) (i) Where a business has, whether before or after the coming into operation hereof, been transmitted from an employer (herein called "the transmittor") to another employer (herein called "the transmittee") and a worker who at the time of such transmission was an employee of the transmittor in that business becomes an employee of the transmittee—the period of the continuous service which the worker has had with the transmittor (including any such service with any prior transmittor) shall be deemed to be service of the worker with the transmittee.
 - (ii) In this subclause "transmission" includes transfer, conveyance, assignment or succession whether voluntary or by agreement or by operation of law and "transmitted" has a corresponding meaning.
- (4) Such service shall include-
 - (a) Any period of absence from duty on any annual leave or long service leave.

- (b) Any period of absence from duty necessitated by sickness of or injury to the worker but only to the extent of 15 working days in any year of his employment.
- (c) Any period following any termination of the employment by the employer if such termination has been made merely with the intention of avoiding obligations hereunder in respect of long service leave or obligations under any award in respect of annual leave.
- (d) Any period during which the service of the worker was or is interrupted by service—
 - (i) as a member of the Naval, Military or Air Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia other than as a member of the British Commonwealth Occupation Forces in Japan and other than as a member of the Permanent Forces of the Commonwealth of Australia except in the circumstances referred to in section 31 (2) of the Defence Act, 1903-1956, and except in Korea or Malaya after June 26, 1950;
 - (ii) as a member of the Civil Construction Corps established under the National Security Act, 1939-1946;
 - (iii) in any of the Armed Forces under the National Service Act, 1951 (as amended).

Provided that the worker as soon as reasonably practicable on the completion of any such service resumed or resumes employment with the employer by whom he was employed immediately before the commencement of such service.

- (5) Service shall be deemed to be continuous notwithstanding—
 - (a) the transmission of a business as referred to in paragraph (3) hereof;
 - (b) any interruption of a class referred to in paragraph (4) hereof irrespective of the duration thereof;
 - (c) any absence from duty authorised by the employer;
 - (d) any standing-down of a worker in accordance with the provisions of an Award, Industrial Agreement, or Determination under either Commonwealth or State law;
 - (e) any absence from duty arising directly or indirectly from an industrial dispute if the worker returns to work in accordance with the terms of settlement of the dispute;
 - (f) any termination of the employment by the employer on any ground other than slackness of trade if the worker be re-employed by the same employer within a period not exceeding two months from the date of such termination;
 - (g) any termination of the employment by the employer on the ground of slackness of trade if the worker is re-employed by the same employer within a period not exceeding six months from the date of such termination;
 - (h) any reasonable absence of the worker on legitimate union business in respect of which he has requested and been refused leave;
 - (i) any absence from duty after the coming into operation of this clause by reason of any cause not specified in this clause unless the employer.

during the absence or within fourteen (14) days of the termination of the absence notifies the worker in writing that such absence will be regarded as having broken the continuity of service, which notice may be given by delivery to the worker personally or by posting it by registered mail to his last recorded address, in which case it shall be deemed to have reached him in due course of post.

Provided that the period of any absence from duty or the period of any interruption referred to in placita (c) to (i) inclusive of this paragraph shall not (except as set out in paragraph (4) hereof) count as service.

- (c) Period of Leave:
 - (1) The leave to which a worker shall be entitled or deemed to be entitled shall be as provided in this subclause.
 - (2) Where a worker has completed at least 20 years' service the amount of leave shall be—
 - (a) in respect of 20 years' service so completed—13 weeks' leave;
 - (b) in respect of each 10 years' service completed after such 20 years—six and a half weeks' leave.
 - (3) Where a worker has completed at least 15 years' service since its commencement and his employment is terminated—
 - (a) by his death;
 - (b) in any circumstances otherwise than by the employer for serious misconduct;

the amount of leave shall be-

- (i) if such determination takes place before the worker has become entitled to leave under placitum (a) of paragraph (2) hereof such proportion of 13 weeks' leave as the number of completed years of such service bears to 20 years;
- (ii) if such termination takes place after the worker has become entitled to leave under placitum (a) of paragraph (2) hereof the leave due under such placitum and in addition such proportion of 13 weeks' leave as the number of completed years of such service after the accrual of such entitlement bears to 20 years.
- (4) Where a worker has completed at least 10 years' service but less than 15 years' service since its commencement and his employment is terminated—
 - (i) by his death; or
 - (ii) by the employer for any reason other than serious misconduct; or
 - (iii) by the worker on account of sickness of or injury to the worker or domestic or other pressing necessity where such sickness or injury or necessity is of such a nature as to justify or in the event of a dispute is, in the opinion of the Special Board of reference, of such a nature as to justify such termination;

the amount of the leave shall be such proportion of 13 weeks' leave as the number of completed years of such service bears to 20 years.

- (5) In the cases to which paragraphs (3) and
 (4) hereof apply the worker shall be deemed to have been entitled to and to have commenced leave immediately prior to such termination.
- (d) Payment for Period of Leave.
- (1) A worker shall subject to paragraph (3) hereof, be entitled to be paid for each week of leave to which he has become entitled

or is deemed to have become entitled the ordinary time rate of pay applicable to him at the date he commences such leave;

- (2) Such ordinary time rate of pay shall be the rate applicable to him for the standard weekly hours which are prescribed by this Award, but in the case of casuals and parttime workers shall be the ordinary time rate for the number of hours usually worked up to but not exceeding the prescribed standard;
- (3) Where by agreement between the employer and the worker the commencement of the leave to which the worker is entitled or any portion thereof is postponed to meet the convenience of the worker, the rate of payment for such leave shall be at the ordinary time rate of pay applicable to him at the date of accrual or, if so agreed, at the ordinary time rate of pay applicable at the date he commences such leave;
- (4) The ordinary time rate of pay—
 - (a) shall include any deductions from wages for board and/or lodging or the like which is not provided and taken during the period of leave;
 - (b) shall not include shift premiums, overtime, penalty rates, commissions, bonuses, allowances or the like.
- (5) In the case of workers employed on piece or bonus work or any other system of payment by results payment shall be at ordinary time rates.
- (e) Taking Leave.
 - (1) In a case to which paragraph (2) of subclause (c) applies—
 - (a) Leave shall be granted and taken as soon as reasonably practicable after the right thereto accrues due or at such time or times as may be agreed between the employer and the worker or in the absence of such agreement at such time or times as may be determined by the Special Board of Reference, having regard to the needs of the employer's establishment and the worker's circumstances.
 - (b) Except where the time for taking leave is agreed to by the employer and the worker or determined by the Special Board of Reference the employer shall give to a worker at least one month's notice of the date from which his leave is to be taken.
 - (c) Leave may be granted and taken in one continuous period or if the employer and the worker so agree in not more than three separate periods in respect of the first 13 weeks' entitlement and in not more than two separate periods in respect of any subsequent period of entitlement.
 - (d) Any leave shall be inclusive of any public holidays specified in this award occurring during the period when the leave is taken but shall not be inclusive of any annual leave.
 - (e) Payment shall be made in one of the following ways—
 - (i) in full before the worker goes on leave;
 - (ii) at the same time as his wages would have been paid to him if the worker had remained at work, in which case payment shall, if the worker in writing so requires, be made by cheque posted to an address specified by the worker; or
 - (iii) in any other way agreed between the employer and the worker.

- (f) No worker shall, during any period when he is on leave, engage in any employment for hire or reward in substitution for the employment from which he is on leave, and if a worker breaches this provision he shall thereupon forfeit his right to leave hereunder in respect of the unexpired period of leave upon which he has entered, and the employer shall be entitled to withold any further payment in respect of the period and to reclaim any payments already made on account of such period of leave.
- (2) In a case to which paragraph (3) or paragraph (4) of subclause (c) applies and in any case in which the employment of the worker who has become entitled to leave hereunder is terminated before such leave is taken or fully taken the employer shall, upon termination of his employment otherwise than by death pay to the worker, and upon termination of employment by death pay to the personal representative of the worker upon request by the personal representative, a sum equivalent to the amount which would have been payable in respect of the period of leave to which he is entitled or deemed to have been entitled and which would have been taken but for such termination. Such payment shall be deemed to have satisfied the obligation of the employer in respect of leave hereunder.

(f) Granting Leave in Advance and Benefits to be Brought into Account.

- (1) Any employer may by agreement with a worker allow leave to such a worker before the right thereto has accrued due, but where leave is taken in such a case the worker shall not become entitled to any further leave hereunder in respect of any period until after the expiration of the period in respect of which such leave had been taken before it accrued due.
- (2) Where leave has been granted to a worker pursuant to the preceding paragraph before the right thereto has accrued due, and the employment subsequently is terminated, the employer may deduct from whatever remuneration is payable upon the termination of the employment a proportionate amount on the basis of 13 weeks for twenty years' service in respect of any period for which the worker has been granted long service leave to which he was not at the date of termination of his employment or prior thereto entitled.
 (2) An loave in the properties a proportional of the date of the service in the service in the service has been granted long service leave to which he was not at the date of termination of his employment or prior thereto entitled.
- (3) Any leave in the nature of long service leave or payment in lieu thereof under a State law or a long service leave scheme not under the provisions hereof granted to a worker by his employer in respect of any period of service with the employer shall be taken into account whether the same is granted before or after the coming into operation hereof and shall be deemed to have been leave taken and granted hereunder in the case of leave with pay to the extent of the period of such leave and in the case of payment in lieu thereof to the extent of a period of leave with pay equivalent to the amount of the payment and to be satisfaction to the extent thereof of the entitlement of the worker hereunder.
- (4) An employer shall be entitled to offset any payment in respect of leave hereunder against any payment by him to any long service leave scheme, superannuation scheme, pension scheme, retiring allowance scheme, provident fund, or the like or under any combination thereof operative at the date hereof.
- (g) Records to be Kept.
 - (1) Each employer shall during the employment and for a period of 12 months thereafter, or in the case of termination by

death of the worker a period of three years thereafter, keep a record from which can be readily ascertained the name of each worker and his occupation, the date of the commencement of his employment and his entitlement to long service leave and any leave which may have been granted to him or in respect of which payment may have been made hereunder.

- (2) Such record shall be open for inspection in the manner and circumstances prescribed by this award with respect to the time and wages record.
- (h) Special Board of Reference.
 - (1) There shall be constituted a Special Board of Reference for the purpose hereof to which all disputes and matters arising hereunder shall be referred and the Board shall determine all such disputes and matters.
 - (2) There shall be assigned to such Board the functions of—
 - (a) the settlement of disputes on any matters arising hereunder;
 - (b) the determination of such matters as are specifically assigned to it hereunder.
 - (3) The Board of Reference shall consist of one representative or substitute therefor nominated from time to time by the Western Australian Employers' Federation (Incorporated) and one representative or substitute nominated from time to time by the West Australian Trade Unions Industrial Council (A.L.P.) together with a chairman to be mutually agreed upon by the organisations named in this paragraph.
- (i) State Law:
 - (1) The provisions of any State law to the extent to which they have before the coming into operation hereof conferred an accrued right on a worker to be granted a period of long service leave in respect of a completed period of 20 or more years' service or employment or an accrued right on a worker or his personal representative to payment in respect of long service leave shall not be affected hereby and shall not be deemed to be inconsistent with the provisions hereof.
 - (2) The entitlement of any such worker to leave in respect of a period of service with the employer completed after the period in respect of which the long service leave referred to in paragraph (1) hereof accrued due shall be in accordance herewith.
 - (3) Subject to paragraphs (1) and (2) hereof, the entitlement to leave hereunder shall be in substitution for and satisfaction of any long service leave to which the worker may be entitled in respect of employment of the worker by the employer.
 - (4) An employer who under any State law with regard to long service leave is exempted from the provisions of that law as at the date hereof, shall in respect of the workers covered by such exemption be exempt from the provisions hereof.

(j) Exemptions.—The Special Board of Reference may subject to such conditions as it thinks fit exempt any employer from the provisions hereof in respect of its employees where there is an existing or prospective long service leave scheme which, in its opinion is, viewed as a whole more favourable for the whole of the employees of that employer than the provisions hereof.

(k) Liberty to Apply.—Liberty is granted to any party to this award to apply to the Court at any time for an appropriate variation of this clause if any of the terms and conditions operating under the code of Long Service Leave being negotiated between the Australian Council of Trade Unions and Federal Employers' Organisations is varied in any way. This Award shall be known as the Caretaker-Watchmen's (State Electricity Commission) Award No. 29 of 1959 and replaces Agreements Nod. 10 of 1949, 16 of 1953 and 24 of 1955.

3.---Term.

The term of this Award shall be three (3) years from the date hereof.

4.-Scope.

This Award shall apply to the designation of workers specified in this Award and employed by The State Electricity Commission of Western Australia.

5.—Definitions.

(a) "Caretaker-Watchman" shall mean a male person required to watch and/or guard and/or patrol the premises of his employer and/or carry out the duties customarily performed by the Com-mission's workers of this classification.

(b) "Casual worker" shall mean a worker who is engaged intermittently for a period not exceeding six (6) consecutive days.

Casual workers shall be paid ten per cent. (10%) above the ordinary rate provided for their class of work; provided that a casual caretaker-watchman shall be paid a minimum amount of four (4) hours' pay for each engagement when such engagement does not exceed four (4) hours and a minimum of eight (8) hours' pay for any engagement exceeding four (4) hours engagement exceeding four (4) hours.

6.—Hours.

(a) The ordinary working hours of a caretaker-watchman shall be forty (40) hours a week. Such hours may be worked in not more than eight (8) hours in any one shift and not more than one shift in every twenty-four (24) hours. The employer may fix the number and duration of such shifts and the worker shall be given forty-eight (48) hours' notice of any change of such shift.

(b) The ordinary working hours of a casual caretaker-watchman shall not exceed eight (8) hours on any one day or night without payment of overtime.

8.—Overtime.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, all time worked in excess of or outside the usual hours shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four (4) hours after the usual time for ceas-ing work and double time thereafter: Provided that workers called upon to start within an hour and a half prior to the usual starting time shall be paid at the rate of time and one half until the usual starting time.

(b) When a worker, without being notified on the previous day, is required to work overtime for more than one (1) hour after his usual knock off time, he shall be paid an allowance of five shillings (5s.) for the first meal and an allowance of three shillings and sixpence (3s. 6d.) after each four (4) hours of overtime if he continues to work after such meal time.

9.—Shifts Worked on Saturdays and Sundays.

Time and a half shall be paid for shifts worked between the hours of midnight on Friday and midnight on Sunday.

10.—Holidays.

All time worked on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, Foundation Day, Sovereign's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day, shall be paid at the rate of double time, i.e., twice ordinary rate.

11.—Annual Leave.

(a) A period of three (3) consecutive weeks' leave with payment of ordinary wages as prescribed shall be allowed annually to a worker by his em-ployer after a period of twelve (12) months' con-tinuous service with such employer.

(b) If any holiday under this Award falls within a worker's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that worker would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day being an ordinary working day, for each such holiday observed as working day for each such holiday observed as aforesaid.

(c) (i) Subject to paragraph (ii), when comput-ing the annual leave due under this clause, no deduction shall be made from such leave in respect of the period that a worker is on annual leave and respectively. or holidays. Provided that no deduction shall be made for any approved period a worker is absent from duty through sickness with or without pay unless the absence exceeds three (3) calendar months, in which case deduction may be made for such excess only.

(ii) Approved periods of absence from work caused through accident sustained in the course of employment shall not be considered breaks in continuity of service, but the first six (6) months only of any such period shall count as service for the purpose of computing annual leave.

(d) In the event of a worker being employed by an employer for portion only of a year, he shall only be entitled to such holidays on full pay as are proportionate to his length of service during that period with such employer.

(e) Any worker who may resign or be dismissed (e) Any worker who may fession or be dismissed from the service for any cause, other than for peculation or theft, shall be entitled to receive payment for any annual leave which may have been due up to the time of leaving the service: Provided always that if the worker has been dis-missed for peculation or theft, no claim for annual leave shall be recognised. Misconduct herein re-ferred to shall be recognised. ferred to shall not affect accumulated annual leave or payment therefor.

(f) When work is closed down for the purpose of allowing annual leave to be taken, workers with less than a full year's service shall only be entitled days' leave due to them.

(g) The provisions of this clause shall not apply to casual workers.

12.-Time and Wages Sheets.

The wages time sheets and cards for workers working under this Award shall be open for in-spection by the Secretary of the Union upon reasonable notice of his desire to inspect same.

13.-Notices.

The Secretary or an authorised person may paste notices on the Wages Notice Board after obtaining permission from the General Manager.

14.—Long Service Leave.

The conditions relating to full-time Government wages workers generally as in force as at the date of this Award and as may be amended from time to time, shall apply to all workers employed under the provisions of this Award.

15.-Sick Leave.

(a) (i) A worker shall be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal illhealth for one-twelfth (1/12th) of a week's pay for each completed month of service.

(ii) The liability of the Commission shall in no case exceed one (1) week's wages during each calendar year in respect of each worker, but the sick leave herein provided shall be allowed to accumulate and any portion unused in any year may be availed of in the next or any succeeding year.

(iii) Payment hereunder may be adjusted at the end of each calendar year or at the time the worker leaves the service, in the event of the worker being entitled by service subsequent to the sickness to a greater allowance than that made at the time the sickness occurred.

(b) This clause shall not apply where the worker is entitled to compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(c) No worker shall be entitled to the benefit of this clause unless he produces proof to the satisfaction of the Commission or its representative, of sickness, but the Commission shall not be entitled to a medical certificate unless the absence is for three (3) consecutive working days or more.

(d) No payment will be made for any absence due to a worker's own fault, neglect, or misconduct.

16.—General Conditions.

(a) (i) Subject to Clause 11 (f) and to Clause 15, any regular worker on a weekly engagement who may not have worked the maximum number of ordinary working hours in any one week, shall be paid not less than the minimum weekly rate of wages specified herein for his particular class of work: Provided that such worker has been available to work the maximum number of ordinary working hours.

(ii) For the purpose of this subclause, time worked on statutory holidays within the limitations set out, shall be deemed hours in which a worker was available to work ordinary working hours.

(b) In the case of regular workers, one (1) week's notice must be given on either side when it is desired to terminate the engagement. The Commission may pay a week's wages in lieu of notice and, in the case of a worker leaving without notice or before such notice expires, he shall forfeit all wages accruing due to him for the current week's service. Such week's notice cannot be continued from week to week. Provided that this shall not apply in the case of misconduct when a worker shall be subject to instant dismissal and entitled only to the wages due to him up to the hour of dismissal. Provided also that the engagement of a casual hand may be terminated at any time.

(c) Where a worker is required by the employer to work in the rain, suitable protective clothing shall be provided free by the employer.

(d) (i) Travelling Time.—When a worker is sent to work from the depot to which he is attached, he shall be paid for travelling time from the depot to the job and if he is required to return to his depot on the same day, he shall be paid travelling time for such return journey.

(ii) A worker sent for duty to a place other than his regular place of duty shall be paid his excess travelling expenses.

(e) Change Room.—Where practicable, suitable dressing accommodation shall be provided with facilities for boiling water.

(f) Notwithstanding anything herein contained, the practice concerning the employment of watchmen-cleaners at the Electricity and Gas Branch of the State Electricity Commission shall continue.

17.-Board of Reference.

(a) The Court hereby appoints for the purpose of this Award, a Board of Reference.

(b) The Board shall consist of a chairman and two (2) other representatives, one to be nominated by each of the parties.

(c) There are assigned to such Board, in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to the Award, the functions of:—

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time, except such as involve interpretation of the provisions of the Award or any of them;
- (ii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(d) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Award.

18.—Preference.

Preference of employment shall be given to members of the Union party to this Award; provided that any worker or applicant for employment who is a member of another recognised industrial union and who produces proof of such membership shall be entitled to equal preference. Provided also, that any worker or applicant for employment who is not a member of the applicant Union shall, within fourteen days of commencing employment under this Award, make and complete an application for membership and provided that any worker who is a financial member of another industrial union shall, upon the expiration of his current membership with such other union, within fourteen days of such expiry, make and complete an application for membership with the Union party to this Award.

INDUSTRIAL AGREEMENT. No. 26 of 1960.

Registered 4th April, 1960.

THIS Agreement, made pursuant to the provisions of the Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, of Western Australia, this 5th day of February, 1960, between the West Australian Local Government Officers' Association Union of Workers (hereinafter called "the Association") of the one part and the Kalgoorlie Road Board (herinafter called "the Local Authority") of the other part, witnesseth that for the consideration hereinafter appearing, the parties hereto mutually covenant and agree the one with the other as follows:-

1.--Title.

This Agreement shall be known as the Kalgoorlie Road Board Officers' Agreement, 1959.

3.—Area.

This Agreement shall extend over and include the boundaries of Kalgoorlie Road Board and any premises or land upon which any undertakings of the Local Authority are being carried on.

4.-Scope.

This Agreement shall apply to all officers in the employment of the Kalgoorlie Road Board but shall not include health inspectors.

5.—Definitions.

(a) "Officer" shall mean an employee eligible to be a member of the Association.

(b) "Permanent Officer" for the purpose of this Agreement is one who is appointed by resolution of the local authority and is given notice of such appointment in writing under the hand of the Secretary.

(c) "Temporary Officer" shall mean a worker engaged by the day and paid subject to the provisions of clause 19.

(d) "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of the Board, Local Board of Health, Vermin Board, Water Board, Sanitary or Drainage Board, or the person who may combine the duties of all of these positions.

(e) "Engineer" shall mean an officer of the Local Authority (excepting a works supervisor) who is required to prepare estimates and/or specifications and/or to set out, supervise or control and/or inspect the outside work of the Local Authority.

(f) "Works Supervisor" shall mean an Officer who supervises, directs and controls outside work.

(g) "Foreman" shall mean an officer other than an engineer who supervises work under the direction of an Engineer or Works Supervisor.

(h). "Assistant Secretary" shall mean the Officer who is responsible to and deputises for the Secre-tary in the carrying out of his duties or part of his duties.

(i) "Senior Typist" shall mean an officer em-ployed as a typist who is over the age of 21 years.

(k) "Board" shall mean and include the Kal-goorlie Road Board, Board of Health and Vermin Board.

(l) "Association"—Association shall mean the West Australian Local Government Officers' Association.

6.-Resignations and Dismissals.

Terms of Appointment.

Subject to the provisions of the relevant Act or Acts for the time being in force, the following provisions shall apply:-

- (a) An Officer being a Secretary or Engineer shall not without the approval of the Board, resign from his position until the expiration of one month's notice of his intention so to do. All other Officers shall be required to give one week's notice.
- (b) One month's notice shall be given by the Board to an officer whose services are no longer required, provided that this para-graph shall not apply to cases for sum-mary dismissal for misconduct of any nature, including criminal misconduct.

7.-Hours of Duty.

(a) Except as provided in subclauses (b) and (c) the hours of duty shall be from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Monday to Friday both inclusive with a break of one hour for lunch between 12 noon and 2 p.m.

(b) The hours mentioned in subclause (a) may be varied by agreement between the Board and the Association and where the duties appertaining to any officer cannot be efficiently carried out within the prescribed hours then in default of such agree-ment the hours of work shall be determined by the Board of Reference. Provided however, that the officer or officers concerned shall not be re-quired to work (except subject to the next follow-ing clause) a greater number of hours than those included in the hours specified in the said subclause (a).

(c) The hours of duty of Works Supervisor, and Stores Clerk who exercise control over non-clerical workers shall be the same as those of the men over whom they exercise control.

8.—Holidays.

8.—Holidays. The following holidays shall be granted and paid for, namely:—The days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labor Day, Anzac Day, State Foundation Day, Goldfields Cup Day, Queen's Birthday, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and any other days that may be proclaimed as a public holiday in the Board's District or may be proclaimed as a holiday for persons employed in the Public Service or under the Public Service Act of the Government of West-ern Australia. When an officer at the discretion of the Board, works on any of the prescribed holidays he shall have the equivalent time added to his annual leave. This accumulation is limited to five (5) days in one year. (5) days in one year.

9.—Annual Leave.

(a) All officers shall be entitled to and shall take a minimum of three weeks annual recreation leave (exclusive of intervening holidays) on full pay. The leave shall be taken at a time mutually convenient to the officer and the Board at any time within six months of it becoming due.

(b) By agreement between the Board and any of its officers leave may be allowed to accumulate up to and including a period not exceeding that allowed for two years' service.

(c) An officer not completing one year's service shall be granted pay in lieu of leave in proportion to the length of his service.

(d) Any officer, after proper inquiry at which he is represented, who is dismissed for misconduct or who illegally severs his contract of service, shall not be entitled to the provisions of this clause.

10.-Long Service Leave.

(a) An officer who has continued in the service of the Board for 10 years shall be granted long service leave for three months on full pay for each 10 years' service, and that pro rata leave be granted after three (3) years' service, should an employee be compelled to resign from service owing to some unforeseen reason.

(b) Any officer on military duty shall not have time spent in this capacity deducted from the aggregate time in ascertaining the total service for this clause.

(c) An officer on sick leave shall have the time off counted in each ten year term.

11,-Overtime.

(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b), all work done outside the hours specified in clause 7 hereof shall be paid for at the rate of time and half for the first two hours and double time thereafter.

(b) Executive Officers and heads of departments (a) only for work of a specified in paragraph (a) only for work of a special nature in excess of their normal duties. Provided the Assistant Secretary shall attend all Meetings the Secretary is required to attend.

(c) Where an officer other than a departmental head or executive officer is required to be on duty on any of the holidays mentioned in clause 8 or on Saturdays or Sundays, he shall be paid at the rate of double time.

(d) A minimum of two hours shall be paid when overtime is worked.

2.—Minimum Salary of an Officer Acting in a Higher Grade or in a Dual or Multiple Capacity. 12 -

When an Officer-

- (a) performs the duties of a position of a grade higher for a period of not less than one month than that to which he is appointed, he shall be paid whilst performing the duties of such position the salary awarded to such position. In the event of the absence of a departmental head, this paragraph shall apply to all classified officers who would be called upon as a matter of course to perform work of a higher grade;
- (b) carries out the duties of or occupies a dual office he shall be paid the salary per-taining to the higher office;
- (c) carries out the duties of or occupies more than two (2) positions he shall be paid in addition to the salary prescribed by sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof ten per centum of the salary of each of the other positions occupied whether the salary for such other position or positions is pre-scribed by this or another Agreement.

13 .- Sick Leave.

In the event of absence from duty on account of personal sickness all officers shall be entitled to payment for such absence on full pay as fol-lows:—Ten (10) days full pay for each year of service with a maximum of 60 days on production of a medical certificate that such leave is necessary.

14.-Travelling Allowances.

(a) All reasonable out-of-pocket and travelling expenses incurred by an officer in discharge of his duties shall be paid at least once a month by the Board. The method and mode of travelling or the vehicle to be supplied shall be mutually the venicle to be supplied shall be mutually arranged between the Board and the officer con-cerned: Provided however, that nothing herein contained shall impose an obligation on any officer to provide a method of conveyance at his own expense, nor shall it be a condition precedent to the appointment of an officer that he shall provide bis own conveyance his own conveyance.

(b) When by agreement an officer supplies his own means of conveyance he shall be recouped on a mileage basis or yearly allowance, same to be mutually agreed upon.

15.—Preference to Seniority on Promotion.

Whenever a vacancy occurs in any office preference to fill such vacancy may be given to the senior officer of that department regard being had to his efficiency and long service.

16.—Preference.

It shall be a condition of employment that all employees covered by this Agreement shall be members of the Association.

17.-Board of Reference.

(a) The Court may appoint for the purpose of the Agreement a Board or Boards of Reference. Each Board shall consist of a Chairman and two representatives one to be nominated by each of Industrial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952. There are assigned to each such Board in the event of no agreement being arrived at between the parties to this Agreement the functions of—

- (i) adjusting any matters of difference which may arise between the parties from time to time except such as involve an inter-pretation of the whole and/or any of the provisions in the Agreement;
- (ii) classifying and fixing wages rates and conditions for any occupation or calling not specifically mentioned in the Agreement.
- (iii) deciding any other matter that the Court may refer to such Board from time to time.

(b) An appeal shall lie from any decision of such Board in the manner and subject to the conditions prescribed in the regulations to the Indus-trial Arbitration Act, 1912-1952, which for this purpose are embodied in this Agreement.

18.—Term.

The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of three (3) years from the date hereof.

19.—Salaries.

The following shall be the minimum rate of salaries payable to Officers governed by this Agreement.
