### EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

THE Government School Teachers' Tribunal, as a result of appeals heard by it in accordance with section 37 AF of the Education Act, has determined that the following salaries shall be paid to teachers in the Education Department. The new schedule of salaries shall replace that published in the *Government Gazette* on 7th August, 1967, and amended in the *Government Gazette* on 22nd September, 1967, 20th October, 1967 and 19th January, 1968, and shall operate from 1st July, 1968.

#### Salaries of Teaching Staff.

##### PART I.—GENERAL.

1. The salary scales set out in this schedule are fixed in relation to the annual equivalent of the weekly basic wage declared by the Industrial Commission of Western Australia, and the classification contained in the schedule is based on the annual equivalent of \$1,779 as on the first pay period after 1st July, 1967. \*1.

2. The salary scales for adult male teachers and officers set out in Part II of this schedule shall be subject to adjustment after that date either up or down to the nearest \$1 of the annual equivalent of the weekly basic rate declared from time to time by the Commission.

3. The salaries of male junior officers whose rates are less than the basic wage shall be adjusted *pro rata* with the adult male minimum rate calculated to the nearest \$1.

\* Note 1.—By amendment in the *Government Gazette* on 20th October, 1967, the Hon. Minister for Education has determined that the Schedule of Teachers' Salaries published in the *Government Gazette* on 7th August, 1967, shall operate from 1st July, 1967, and that the salaries in Part II, paragraph 13 of Part V, and Part VI, will be adjusted on the basis of a basic wage of \$1,748 per annum for males.

4. No male teacher of the age of 21 years shall receive less than the basic wage rate.

5. The salaries of female teachers (category A) have been calculated at the rate of 75 per cent. to the nearest \$1 of the male basic wage operating at 1st July, 1967, (\$1,748) plus \$31 special adjustment to operate from the first pay period in July, 1967.

The salaries of female teachers (category B) have been calculated at the rate of 80 per cent. to the nearest \$1 of the male basic wage operating at 1st July, 1967, (\$1,748) plus \$31 special adjustment to operate from the first pay period in July, 1967.

Female teachers (category B) are women teachers who are employed on "permanent" or "temporary" conditions and have completed or complete fifteen years' continuous full-time service as teachers with the Education Department of Western Australia (exclusive of periods spent in training). Female teachers (category A) are women teachers who do not possess such service qualification.

6. As from the 1st January, 1968, the difference between the male and female salaries shall be reduced by five annual instalments so that from the 1st January, 1972, there shall be no difference in male and female salaries. The present differences between male teachers and female teachers, category A (\$437) and between male teachers and female teachers, category B (\$350) will be reduced as follows:—

## PART III.—PLACEMENT ON AND PROGRESSION ALONG BASIC SCALES.

1. Except as provided in paragraphs 3 and 4 of this Part, progression along the salary scales shall be by annual increments and shall be dependent upon satisfactory service.

2. (a) Students who obtain the Teachers' Certificate at the completion of training at a Teachers' College are eligible in accordance with subregulation (3) of regulation 201 of the Education Regulations, 1960, upon their appointment, to salary grades as follows:—

Two-year trained—Scale B, Grade 4.

Three-year trained (Category 1)—Scale B, Grade 6.

Three-year trained (Category 2)—Scale B, Grade 6 or Grade 7 (at discretion of Director-General).

Four-year trained—Scale A, Grade 4.

Five-year trained—Scale A, Grade 5.

(b) Teachers who obtain the Teachers' Certificate (Conditional) shall be placed on grades lower than those specified above at the discretion of the Director-General.

(c) On first appointment to the Department, other than directly from a Teachers' College, teachers will be placed on the basic scale A or B, as determined by the Director-General, taking into consideration their qualifications and experience.

(d) (i) Trade instructors with five years' post apprenticeship experience will be placed on Grade 9, Scale B.

(ii) Trade instructors with special additional experience, or with higher technical qualifications, may be placed on grades higher than Grade 9, Scale B, at the discretion of the Director-General.

(iii) Trade instructors with less than five years' post apprenticeship experience will be placed on grades lower than Grade 9, Scale B. Such placement will be determined by the number of years by which the experience is less than five years.

3. A teacher may not advance further than three annual increments from his grade of appointment unless he has obtained an efficiency mark of not less than 77 in the final year or, if he is in the Technical Division, unless he has received from a superintendent a satisfactory report on his teaching skill.

4. (a) A teacher, other than a Trade Instructor, without the Teachers' Certificate or Teachers' Certificate (Technical) shall not proceed beyond:—

(i) Grade 9, if he is on Scale B; or

(ii) Grade 5, if he is on Scale A.

Notwithstanding subparagraphs (i) and (ii) of this paragraph, a teacher without the said qualifications appointed in accordance with regulation 61 of the Education Regulations, 1960, may advance two increments from his grade of appointment to the Department.

(b) A two-year trained teacher may not proceed beyond Grade 15 on Scale B.

(c) A three-year trained teacher who has fulfilled the service and teaching mark requirements for a Teachers' Higher Certificate may proceed to Grade 16 on Scale B.

(d) A trade instructor appointed prior to 31st December, 1967, may proceed beyond Grade 15, Scale B and transfer to Scale A and proceed by annual progression as shown hereunder provided he has obtained the Teachers' Certificate (Technical) and, as from 1st July, 1968, has obtained a diploma of the Technical Division or other equivalent qualification:—

Grade 16, Scale B.

Grade 12, Scale A.

Grade 13, Scale A.

Grade 14, Scale A.

(e) A four or five-year trained teacher shall not advance beyond Grade 11, or four increments from his grade on appointment to the Department if appointed in accordance with regulation 61 of the Education Regulations, 1960, unless he has obtained the Teachers' Higher Certificate.

(f) A two-year trained teacher may proceed to Grade 16, Scale B after completing ten years on Grade 15, Scale B.

5. (a) A teacher who obtains a promotion to a position, which carries additional responsibility shall continue his normal progression along a basic scale and shall receive in addition the appropriate responsibility allowance of his new position as detailed in Part IV of this schedule.

(b) A teacher who obtains promotion to a position carrying a higher salary range shall be placed on salary that will give him an increase in salary as a result of his promotion.

6. (a) Subject to the provisions of paragraph 4 (e), teachers at present proceeding along Scale A (as determined) shall convert to the new Scale A (as herein provided) as follows:—

(i) Teachers who on graduating from Teacher's College, were classified as four or five-year trained teachers.

(b) Teachers who have added to their qualifications after leaving a Teachers' College or after appointment to the teaching service where the appointment is not ex College may be given accelerated progression. Progression under this paragraph is governed by the restrictions imposed in paragraph 3 and 4 of this Part and can only be made once in respect to any particular qualification.

Special progression under this paragraph is made in addition to any annual increments to which a teacher is entitled.

Progression through qualifications is awarded as follows:—

- (i) A teacher proceeding along Scale A who obtains the Teachers' Higher Certificate shall advance one increment.
- (ii) A three-year trained teacher proceeding along Scale B who becomes a graduate teacher shall transfer to Scale A as follows:—

- (iv) A two-year trained teacher who obtains the qualifications of a three-year trained teacher shall advance one increment and may proceed to Grade 16, Scale B, if he has fulfilled the service and teaching mark requirements for a Teachers' Higher Certificate.

- (v) Teachers with the Teachers' Certificate (Conditional)—teachers who in their first year ex-college obtain the necessary teaching mark to complete the requirements for the Teachers' Certificate—one increment.

Teachers other than the above who obtain the Teachers' Certificate—one increment, except that teachers who obtain the Teachers' Certificate within a period of three years after leaving a Teachers' College shall receive two increments if they commenced two grades below the normal commencing grade and three increments if they commence three grades below the normal commencing grade.

Teachers of commercial subjects (other than those appointed from Teachers' College), whose first appointments are on Grade 3 or below on obtaining the Teachers' Certificate (Technical)—one increment.

- (vi) On obtaining a University Master's Degree, Doctoral Degree, a second Bachelor's Degree or its equivalent—one increment (except that only one increment can be obtained under this clause).

7. For purposes of this Part—

“two-year trained teacher” means a teacher who has successfully completed a minimum of two years' full-time tertiary training as a student of an approved teachers' college.

“three-year trained teacher (Category 1)” means a teacher who has successfully completed a minimum of three years' full-time tertiary training at least two of which were spent as a student of an approved teachers' college.

“three-year trained teacher (Category 2)” means a teacher who has completed more than three years of full-time tertiary training of which at least two years were spent as a student of an approved teachers' college but who has not the qualifications to become a four-year trained teacher.

For the purposes of this schedule only, a two-year trained teacher has the qualifications to become a three-year trained teacher when he obtains qualifications which exempt him from the two optional fields of study for the Teachers' Higher Certificate as set out in section 18.05 of the Teachers' Handbook and Administrative Instructions or such other qualifications as the Director-General approves for this purpose.

“four-year trained teacher” means a teacher who has had a minimum of four years' full-time tertiary training including at least one year spent in training at an approved teachers' college and either—

- (a) in addition, has obtained a degree of a recognised university for which the minimum requirements are three years' full-time study or other qualification accepted by the Director-General as of equivalent standard;

- or
- (b) concurrently, has obtained the Bachelor of Education Degree of the University of Western Australia.

“five-year trained teacher” means a teacher who has had a minimum of five years' full-time tertiary training including at least one year spent in training at an approved teachers' college and either—

- (a) in addition, obtained a degree of a recognised university, other than the Bachelor of Education degree of the University of Western Australia, for which the minimum requirements are four-years' full-time study; or

- (b) in addition obtained a degree of a recognised university for which the minimum requirements are three years' full-time study, and at the conclusion thereof passed at least one year's postgraduate study.

"tertiary training" means undertaking a course at an approved university, technical institution or teachers' college for which the pre-requisite is a Leaving Certificate or its equivalent.

"graduate" means a teacher who has obtained a degree of a recognised university, or who has an associateship or other qualifications approved by the Director-General for this purpose.

For the purpose of this schedule, a two- or three-year trained teacher who obtains the Teachers' Higher Certificate becomes a four-year trained teacher.

For the purpose of these definitions, the Teachers' Certificate (Technical) shall satisfy the conditions requiring "full-time tertiary training as a student of an approved teachers' college".
