DETERMINATION OF THE SALARIES AND ALLOWANCES TRIBUNAL (6th JULY, 1981)

INTRODUCTION

1. For the purposes of a review by the Tribunal of the remuneration attached to offices within the ambit of the Act, a notice was inserted in the *Government Gazette* and an advertisement placed in the *West Australian*, inviting submissions by 15 May 1981 from interested persons, organisations and associations. Letters of invitation to make written submissions were addressed to the President of the Legislative Council, the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, all other Members of Parliament, the Secretaries of Parliamentary Parties, Supreme and District Court Judges, the Master of the Supreme Court, Stipendiary Magistrates, officers of the Public Service holding offices in the Special Division of the Public Service and the persons holding the offices prescribed in the regulations to the Act.

2. Submissions were received from the Parliamentary Liberal Party, the Parliamentary Labor Party, the Stipendiary Magistrates Society and the Civil Service Association. Fourteen submissions were received from Members of Parliament, three on behalf of Judges, nine from Stipendiary Magistrates, eleven from Special Division Officers of the Public Service and fourteen from persons holding prescribed offices. Only one submission was received from a member of the general public by the due date but a further 13 were received after 15 May 1981.

MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT BASIC SALARY

3. Both the Parliamentary Liberal Party and the Parliamentary Labor Party have suggested that the practice in Victoria of fixing the basic salary of a member in that State at the rate from time to time payable to members of the House of Representatives less \$500, could be applied in Western Australia.

4. Although we believe there is merit in linking the W.A. basic salary to the Federal rate, the method used in Victoria is not favoured. In this respect it is to be noted from the following table that there has been a progressive narrowing of the percentage gap between the salary of a Federal Member and the salary of a Victorian Member since 1973:

5. We consider that a basic salary equal to 90% of the basic salary of a Federal member as at 1 August 1980 increased in line with the national wage case decisions handed down on 9 January 1981 and 8 May 1981, would be appropriate for a member of the W.A. Parliament on and from 1 October 1981. The resultant basic salary for a W.A. Member of \$29 032 is \$1 055 p.a. higher than the current salary of \$27 977 and represents an increase of 3.77%.

6. It has been noted that the Commonwealth Remuneration Tribunal in its 1981 Review of the remuneration of members of the Federal Parliament, has determined a basic salary for a Federal member of \$36 000 effective from 1 July 1981. This rate exceeds by \$3 742 the basic salary which would have applied from that date if the adjustment had been confined to the increases awarded by the national wage case decisions of 9 January 1981 and 8 May 1981.

7. The Remuneration Tribunal's determination effective from 1 July 1981 has to be tabled before each House of the Federal Parliament within 15 sitting days of that House after the determination is received by the Minister and may be disallowed by either House of the Parliament pursuant to section 7(8) of the Remuneration Tribunals Act 1973 within 15 sitting days of tabling.

8. Annual basic salaries of Members of Lower Houses in Australian Parliaments as adjusted in order to take into consideration differences in treatment of salary variations, are as follows:

(a) Salary as at 1 August 1980 (Federal) and 1 July 1980 (Queensland) with the addition of the January and May 1981 National Wage increases of 3.7% and 3.6%.

9. Although the basic salary determined for a W.A. Member as from 1 October 1981 is less by considerable amounts than the adjusted salaries for members of the Federal, Queensland and Victorian Parliaments we consider that the approved increase in the W.A. rate of only 3.77% is appropriate at this time having regard to the continuing need for wage restraint.

REMUNERATION OF MINISTERS OF THE CROWN

10. The increase of 3.77% in the basic salary of a member is also to apply to the additional salaries paid to Ministers of the Crown and we determine accordingly with effect on and from 1 October 1981.

REMUNERATION OF OFFICERS OF PARLIAMENT AND THE PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY OF THE CABINET

11. Several submissions were received claiming that the additional salaries paid to certain officers were inadequate when compared with extra payments to Ministers and that they also compared unfavourably with relativities in other Australian Parliaments.

12. Our review indicates that there is a case for lifting existing salaries by varying amounts and we therefore approve of the application of the following scale on and from 1 October 1981:

ELECTORATE ALLOWANCES

13. A number of submissions referred to electorate allowances and sought increases to cover rising motor vehicle, accommodation and other travel costs. Although these categories of expense have been reviewed at regular intervals by the Tribunal, continued increases in costs require a further updating of these allowances and new rates operative from 1 October 1981 have been determined accordingly.

14. We have made a relatively minor adjustment to the allowance structure following submissions from several members and as a result, the South-West Electoral Province and the electoral districts of Kalgoorlie, Vasse and Avon have been placed in higher categories.

AIR CHARTER AND CAR HIRE

15. In several submissions an allowance was sought to cover air charter and car hire for members representing large electorates. Such an allowance applies to specified members of the Commonwealth, Queensland, Victorian and South Australian Parliaments.

16. In our opinion the additional time and cost factors associated with travel within electorates of 90 000 square kilometres or more in area, justify the use at government expense of charter aircraft/drive yourself vehicles up to a maximum amount of \$1 000 in each period of 3 months commencing 1 January, 1 April, 1 July and 1 October and we have provided accordingly with effect from 1 January 1982.

MOTOR VEHICLE ALLOWANCE

18. Under existing arrangements a motor vehicle allowance is payable in certain circumstances to a member who uses his private vehicle to travel between his residence and Perth on parliamentary business provided such travel is not less than 100 kilometres return. This results in a member who lives less than 50 kilometres from Perth not being entitled to an allowance for any part of such travel whilst a member living 50 or more kilometres from Perth is paid for every kilometre travelled.

19. As most members would incur some expense in travelling to and from the city it is considered that the prescribed motor vehicle allowance should be limited to kilometres travelled in excess of 50 return and we have provided accordingly.

20. Provision has also been made in our Determination for payment of an allowance to a member who uses his private vehicle to travel between his residence and the nearest airport in order to fly to Perth on parliamentary business. The allowance is only to apply to kilometres travelled in excess of 50 return.

EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

21. As expense allowances have not been varied since April 1978 we have reviewed them in the light of increased costs since that date and as a result, have decided that they be increased on and from 1 October 1981.

TRAVELLING ALLOWANCES

22. Allowances payable to Ministers and certain other Members of Parliament when travelling within Australia on official duty have remained unchanged since January 1980 and in view of the increase in travel expenses since that date we have lifted the rates which are to apply on and from 1 October 1981.

POSTAGE ALLOWANCES

23. After a review of present allowances it has been decided with effect on and from 1 October 1981, to increase the payment to the Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Council by \$210 per annum and in the case of other members of that House by \$150 per annum.

TELEPHONE RENTAL AND CALLS

24. Two members sought total reimbursement of charges for telephone calls from electorate offices but the conclusion was reached by the Tribunal that the existing arrangement under which only 85% of the cost of such calls was reimbursed should not be varied at this time.

MISCELLANEOUS

25. Application has again been made for payment of an additional salary to parliamentary party secretaries but we adhere to an earlier decision of the Tribunal (27 February 1976) that this is a matter for consideration by the Government.

26. A request was received for payment of a stamp allowance to Ministers to cover the cost of posting mail from electorate offices but having regard to the level of other ministerial allowances we have decided not to make such a provision.

27. Consideration was requested of the expense incurred by a country Minister who maintains two residences; one in his electorate and the other in Perth. As electorate allowances for country members contain a substantial provision to meet the accommodation costs of these members when on parliamentary duties in Perth, it follows in effect, that this provision becomes an allowance to help meet the cost of maintaining a second residence in those cases where such accommodation is so used.

28. It was suggested that we investigate the possibility of determining as a component of electorate allowances, a payment to assist in meeting election expenses but we have declined to do so in the belief that such a provision would be inappropriate at this time.

29. Several submissions were received relating to matters which we consider should not be dealt with by the Tribunal at this time. They include:

- (a) Allowances for research assistance.
- (b) Travelling allowances for electorate secretaries.
- (c) Additional electorate offices for some members.
- (d) Excess baggage allowance for members travelling by air.

These items relate to subjects administered by the Government in the past and we believe it would be preferable for the Government to continue adjudicating on them.

OFFICERS IN THE SPECIAL DIVISION OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE AND PERSONS HOLDING PRESCRIBED OFFICES

30. We do not consider major variations in the salary structure to be justified at this time and we have therefore limited changes to the addition of one class to the existing scale. A number of re-alignments have been made following a general review of duties and responsibilities.

31. The placement of officers in the salary scale which is to apply on and from 1 October 1981, is set out in the Second Schedule to the attached Determination.

32. Expense allowances have not been re-assessed since January 1979 and we have therefore reviewed them having regard to increases in costs since that date. The new rates to apply on and from 1 October 1981 range from \$375 to \$1 500 per annum as listed in the Second Schedule.

DETERMINATION

33. Our attached Determination which is in two Schedules comes into operation on 1 October 1981 except for Part I Section 4 of the First Schedule which is to operate from 1 January 1982.

Salaries and Allowances Tribunal

DETERMINATION—FIRST SCHEDULE

Pursuant to the provisions of the Salaries and Allowances Act 1975, as amended, the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal determines the remuneration to be paid to Ministers of the Crown, the Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet, Officers and Members of the Parliament, as hereunder.

PART 1—REMUNERATION OF MEMBERS GENERALLY

Section 1—Basic Salary

There is payable to each Member an annual salary calculated at the rate of \$29 032 per annum.

Section 2—Electorate Allowances

In addition to the basic salary payable to him, there is payable to a Member, in respect of the expenses of discharging his duties, an electorate allowance at the appropriate rate specified in the second column of the table set forth hereunder opposite the name of the Electoral Province or Electoral District that the Member represents in the House of which he is a Member, namely:—

Section 3—Motor Vehicle Allowance

1. A Member representing an electorate in the Metropolitan Area or the Agricultural, Mining and Pastoral Area who maintains a residence in his electorate and who uses his private vehicle to travel between such residence and Perth, shall be paid a motor vehicle allowance at current Public Service rates for the shortest practicable route provided such travel:—

(a) is not less than 50 kilometres return, and

(b) is for the purpose of attending—

- (i) a sitting of Parliament or a meeting of his parliamentary political party, or
- (ii) a meeting of a parliamentary standing committee of which he is a member, or
- (iii) an official government, parliamentary or vice regal function

but such allowance shall be limited to kilometres travelled in excess of 50.

2. Where in the opinion of the President of the Legislative Council or the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly as the case may require, a scheduled commercial air service could have been used for the travel referred to paragraph 1, the motor vehicle allowance payable under this section shall not exceed the value of the commercial air fare.

3. A Member who uses his private vehicle to travel between his residence and the nearest airport in order to fly to Perth for the purposes listed in subparagraph (b) of paragraph 1 shall be paid an allowance under this section for kilometres travelled to and from the airport in excess of 50.

Section 4—Air Charter and Car Hire

1. As from 1 January 1982 a Member who represents an electorate of 90 000 square kilometres or more in area shall be entitled at Government expense to use charter transport within his electorate for the service of such electorate, up to a maximum of \$1 000 in each period of three months commencing 1 January, 1 April, 1 July and 1 October.

2. "Charter transport" includes charter aircraft, drive yourself vehicles and such other modes of transport as may be approved as appropriate in the circumstances by the President of the Legislative Council or the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly as the case may require.

PART II—REMUNERATION OF MINISTERS OF THE CROWN

1. In addition to the remuneration payable by virtue of Part I of this Determination, there is payable—

- (a) to a person for the time being holding the office of Premier in conjunction with a ministerial office, a salary calculated at the rate of \$32 000 per annum.
- (b) to the person for the time being holding the Office of Deputy Premier in conjunction with a ministerial office, a salary calculated at the rate of \$24 350 per annum.
- (c) to the person for the time being holding the office of Leader of the Government in the Legislative Council in conjunction with a ministerial office, a salary calculated at the rate of \$21 564 per annum.
- (d) to each person, not being a person referred to in subparagraph (a), (b) or (c) of this paragraph, for the time being holding a ministerial office a salary calculated at the rate of \$18 086 per annum.

2. If a person holds more ministerial offices than one, he shall be paid a salary under this Part in respect of one only of those offices.

PART III—REMUNERATION OF OFFICERS OF PARLIAMENT AND THE
PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY OF THE CABINET

1. In addition to the remuneration payable to him by virtue of Part I of this Determination there is payable to the person for the time being holding the office specified in the first column of the table hereunder a salary of the amount and at the rate specified in the second column thereof, namely:—

2. Where the Legislative Assembly is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time, a person who is the Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet or immediately before the dissolution or expiry by effluxion of time was the Chairman of Committees in that House or is the holder of the office of:—

- (a) Leader of the Opposition in that House;
- (b) Deputy Leader of the Opposition in that House;
- (c) Government Whip in that House; or
- (d) Opposition Whip in that House

is entitled to receive the salary payable to him by virtue of paragraph 1 of this Part and the allowance, if any, payable to him under Part IV of this Determination until:

- (i) he ceases to be a Member by reason of an event other than the dissolution or expiry by effluxion of time of the Legislative Assembly; or
- (ii) another person is elected or appointed to the office held by him.

whichever event shall first occur.

PART IV—EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

In addition to the remuneration payable under Parts I, II, and III of this Determination there shall be payable to the holders for the time being of the following offices the following allowances, namely:—

PART V—TRAVELLING ALLOWANCES

1. There shall be payable to the Premier, a Minister of the Crown, an Honorary Minister and the Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet, when travelling within Australia on official duty, but not when travelling to, from and within his own electorate, who actually incurs expense in securing overnight accommodation at a place situated outside a radius of 50 kilometres from Perth, by way of reimbursement a travelling allowance at the following rate:—

Other Minister, Honorary Minister and Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet	\$67 per day

Provided that in lieu of the above allowances:—

- (a) When travelling in a ministerial railway coach, all costs reasonably and properly incurred shall be reimbursed.
- (b) When travelling by train (not in a ministerial coach) or by ship, the allowance shall be twenty dollars (\$20) per day.

Provided further that where the costs of such travelling reasonably and properly incurred exceed the above allowance the actual costs shall be reimbursed.

2. The Deputy Premier when travelling within Australia on duty representing the Premier but not when travelling to, from and within his own electorate, shall be entitled to the same allowances as the Premier.

3. The Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Council, and the Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly, when (in either case) travelling within Australia on duty as such Leader but not when travelling to, from and within their own electorates, shall be entitled to the same allowances as a Minister; and so also shall the Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly when travelling within Australia on duty whether for and in the place of the Leader, or as such Deputy Leader only.

4. A Member (not being a Minister), when travelling on duty within Australia as an official representative of the Government or the Parliament, or as an official Member of a Government or Parliamentary committee or delegation including a Member of a Select Committee of a House or a Joint Select Committee of Houses but not when travelling to, from and within his own electorate, shall be entitled to the same allowances as a Minister.

PART VI—POSTAGE ALLOWANCES

There shall be payable to Members of Parliament and to the undermentioned Officers of Parliament (except Ministers and any others whose mail is sent free of charge to them in a manner similar to the mail of Ministers) a postage allowance as follows:—

Provided that each of the above allowances is to be adjusted proportionately in accordance with any percentage variation after 1 October 1981 in the basic minimum first class letter rate as fixed by Australian Post; such increase to operate from the date on which such increased postal rates commence.

PART VII—TELEPHONE RENTAL AND CALLS

1. Every Member of Parliament (other than Ministers, the President of the Legislative Council, the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, the Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly and the Chairmen of Committees, and any others whose private telephone rentals and calls are paid in full from public funds) shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement, of the full rental and 85 per centum of all charges for calls incurred by him in respect of a telephone in his private residence, or, where he reasonably maintains more than one residence by reason of his membership of Parliament, in each such residence.

2. Every Member of Parliament provided with an electorate office shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement, of the full rental and 85 per centum of all charges for calls incurred by him in respect of a telephone in his electorate office and an extension of the same telephone to his private residence.

3. Where a Member of Parliament at his expense, arranges the installation of a second telephone in his electorate office, he shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement, of the full rental and 85 per centum of all charges for calls incurred by him in respect of that second telephone.

4. Insofar as a Member of Parliament pays or is charged with any telephone calls made by him from Parliament House, he shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement of all such charges.

5. In this Part, "calls" include all charges (other than international calls or telegrams) as usually included on Telecom Australia accounts rendered to subscribers.

PART VIII—PAYMENT OF REMUNERATION

1. The remuneration payable to a Member under Parts I, VI and VII of this Determination shall be calculated from the day on which the Member is elected as a Member, and except as provided by paragraph 2 of this Part, cease to be payable as from the day on which he ceases to be a member.

2. Where a Member of the Legislative Assembly ceases to be a Member thereof by reason of the dissolution of that House or the expiry thereof by effluxion of time, he is notwithstanding his cessation of membership, entitled to continue to receive the remuneration provided in Parts, I, VI and VII of this Determination until the day fixed for the taking of the poll next following the dissolution or expiry of that House.

3. Remuneration payable under Parts I (Sections 1 and 2) II, III, IV and VI of this Determination shall be paid by equal instalments on the last day of each month.

Salaries and Allowances Tribunal.

DETERMINATION—SECOND SCHEDULE
