DETERMINATION OF THE SALARIES AND ALLOWANCES TRIBUNAL (10 JANUARY 1984)

INTRODUCTION

1. Since our last Determination of 22 September 1982 there have been three developments which have affected several of the provisions of that Determination. First, the Salaries and Wages Freeze Act 1982 prevented the basic salary of a Member of the W.A. Parliament being increased from 1 January 1983 to 90 per cent of the basic salary payable to a Member of the House of Representatives and also the payment from 20 February 1983 of increased salaries to Officers of Parliament. Second, the Temporary Reduction of Remuneration (Senior Public Officers) Act 1983 resulted in the payment from the commencement of the first pay period on or after 1 September 1983 of lower salaries to Members of Parliament, officers in the Special Division of the Public Service and persons holding Prescribed Offices, than those specified in our last Determination. Third, as a result of the September 1983 National Wage Decision, the Minister for Industrial Relations approved an increase of 4.3 per cent from 7 October 1983 in the annual salary rates of all persons within the ambit of the Salaries and Allowances Act.

MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT BASIC SALARY

2. With the expiration of the Salaries and Wages Freeze Act on 23 December 1983 the basic salary of a Member of the W.A. Parliament automatically increased to \$36 140 p.a. being 90 per cent of the Federal basic salary then payable. However, in view of the provisions of the Temporary Reduction of Remuneration (Senior Public Officers) Act, the actual amounts payable on and from 1 January 1984 are as follows:—

4. We consider a basic salary for a Member of the W.A. Parliament of \$36 140 per annum (90 per cent of the Federal rate) to be minimal in the light of payments to Members of other Australian Parliaments.

ADDITIONAL SALARIES OF MINISTERS OF THE CROWN, OFFICERS OF PARLIAMENT AND THE PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY OF THE CABINET

5. As mentioned in paragraph 1, the enactment of the Salaries and Wages Freeze Act prevented the payment of increased salaries awarded to Officers of Parliament by the Tribunal in its Determination of 22 September 1982. The expiration of this Act allowed payment at the higher rates on and from 24 December 1983.

6. Additional salaries and the actual amounts payable from 1 January, 1984 because of the provisions of the Temporary Reduction of Remuneration (Senior Public Officers) Act, are as follows:—

ELECTORATE ALLOWANCES AND MOTOR VEHICLE REPLACEMENT SUBSIDY

- 7. Electorate allowances for the purpose of meeting expenses incurred by Members in the performance of their parliamentary duties have been eroded since they were last assessed in September 1982, by increases in costs particularly in the operation, maintenance and replacement of motor vehicles. For this reason the Tribunal has decided to introduce a motor vehicle replacement subsidy of \$2 000 per annum in supplementation of electorate allowances but such subsidy is only to be paid to Members who do not have the regular use of a Government owned vehicle. Electorate allowances other than those attached to metropolitan seats, have been increased by amounts ranging from \$125 to \$1 700 per annum.
- 8. If the Tribunal were to adhere to its normal practice, the Motor Vehicle Replacement Subsidy and the increased electorate allowances would apply from 1 January, 1984 but in view of the State's 1983-84 budgetary problems which resulted in certain salaries being reduced for a period of 12 months commencing September 1983, the Tribunal has decided to defer payment of the subsidy and the increased allowances until 1 July 1984.

AIR CHARTER AND CAR HIRE

9. The existing provision for Members representing certain electorates to use charter transport at Government expense up to a maximum of \$1 250 per quarter, has been varied from 1 January 1984 by bringing five other electorates within the scope of the provision and by fixing the maximum payment at \$2 500 for the period of six months commencing 1 January 1984 and by increasing the maximum payment thereafter to \$3 000 for each period of six months commencing 1 July and 1 January.

EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

10. As expense allowances have not been varied since 1 October 1981 they have been reviewed in the light of increased costs since that date and as a result the Tribunal has decided to increase them by 10 per cent but to defer payment of the new rates until 1 July 1984.

TRAVELLING ALLOWANCES

11. Because of higher travel costs particularly for hotel accommodation, the Tribunal has lifted the allowances payable to Ministers and certain other Members when travelling within Australia on official duty but again, the new rates are not to apply until I July 1984.

OFFICERS IN THE SPECIAL DIVISION OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE AND PERSONS HOLDING PRESCRIBED OFFICES

- 12. Following a recommendation from the Public Service Arbitrator, the Minister for Industrial Relations approved a salary increase of 5.96 per cent with effect from 30 December 1983 to persons in the administrative and clerical divisions of the W.A. Public Service including those whose remuneration to date has been identical with that for officers in the Special Division of the Public Service and persons holding Prescribed Offices both of which groups come within the ambit of the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal. As a result, it has been necessary in order to prevent serious inequities, for the Tribunal to award a salary increase of 5.96 per cent from 1 January 1984 to the public servants and statutory office holders within its jurisdiction. The salaries and allowances attached to a number of positions have also been re-assessed.
- 13. Annual salary rates and the actual amounts payable on and from I January 1984 because of the provisions of the Temporary Reduction of Remuneration (Senior Public Officers) Act are:—

14. Expense allowances which at present range from \$750 to \$2000 per annum, were last assessed in January 1982. As increased costs since that date have eroded these allowances it has been decided to lift them by 10 per cent but payment at the increased rates is to be deferred until 1 July 1984.

DETERMINATION—FIRST SCHEDULE

Pursuant to the provisions of the Salaries and Allowances Act 1975 as amended, the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal determines the remuneration to be paid to Ministers of the Crown, the Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet, Officers and Members of the Parliament, as hereunder with effect on and from 1 January 1984 except where specified otherwise.

PART I—REMUNERATION OF MEMBERS GENERALLY

Section 1-Basic Salary

There is payable to each Member an annual salary calculated at the rate of \$36 140 per annum but this rate shall be varied as and when required in order to maintain it at 90 per cent of the basic salary payable from time to time to a Member of the House of Representatives in the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia.

Section 2-Electorate Allowances

1. In addition to the basic salary payable to him, there is payable to a Member, in respect of the expenses of discharging his duties, an electorate allowance as follows:—

2. A Member of the Legislative Council representing an electoral province in the Agricultural, Mining and Pastoral Area, elected prior to 19 February 1983 and a Member elected on or after that date to a province of the same name, shall both be paid allowances at the rates specified in paragraph 1 for the province of that name.

Section 3-Motor Vehicle Replacement Subsidy

Members using their private motor vehicles on Parliamentary and/or electorate business shall be paid a motor vehicle replacement subsidy from 1 July 1984 at the rate of \$2 000 per annum but such subsidy shall only apply where a Member does not have the regular use of a Government owned vehicle.

Section 4-Motor Vehicle Allowance

- 1. A Member representing an electorate in the Metropolitan Area or the Agricultural, Mining and Pastoral Area who maintains a residence in or adjacent to his electorate and who uses his private vehicle to travel between such residence and Perth, shall be paid a motor vehicle allowance at current Public Service rates for the shortest practicable route provided such travel:—
 - (a) is not less than 50 kilometres return, and
 - (b) is for the purpose of attending-
 - (i) a sitting of Parliament or a meeting of his parliamentary political party, or
 - (ii) a meeting of a parliamentary standing committee of which he is a member, or
 - (iii) an official government, parliamentary or vice regal function

but such allowance shall be limited to kilometres travelled in excess of 50.

- 2. Where in the opinion of the President of the Legislative Council or the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly as the case may require, a scheduled commercial air service could have been used for the travel referred to in paragraph 1, the motor vehicle allowance payable under this section shall not exceed the value of the commercial air fare.
- 3. A Member who uses his private vehicle to travel between his residence and the nearest airport in order to fly to Perth for the purposes listed in subparagraph (b) of paragraph 1 shall be paid an allowance under this section for kilometres travelled to and from the airport in excess of 50.

Section 5-Air Charter and Car Hire

1. Members representing the undermentioned electorates shall be entitled at Government expense to use charter transport within their electorates for the service of such electorates, up to a maximum of \$2500 for the period of six months commencing 1 January 1984 and thereafter up to a maximum of \$3000 for each period of six months commencing 1 July and 1 January:—

Electoral Provinces-

Central, Lower North, North, South East, South and Upper West

Electoral Districts-

Esperance-Dundas, Gascoyne, Kimberley, Murchison-Eyre, Pilbara, Mt Marshall, Katanning-Roe and Greenough.

2. "Charter transport" includes charter aircraft, drive yourself vehicles and such other modes of transport as may be approved as appropriate in the circumstances by the President of the Legislative Council or the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly as the case may require.

PART II—REMUNERATION OF MINISTERS OF THE CROWN

- 1. In addition to the remuneration payable by virtue of Part I of this Determination, there is payable—
- (a) to a person for the time being holding the office of Premier in conjunction with a ministerial office, a salary calculated at the rate of \$39 284 per annum.
- (b) to the person for the time being holding the office of Deputy Premier in conjunction with a ministerial office, a salary calculated at the rate of \$29 892 per annum.
- (c) to the person for the time being holding the office of Leader of the Government in the Legislative Council in conjunction with a ministerial office, a salary calculated at the rate of \$26471 per annum.
- (d) to each person, not being a person referred to in subparagraph (a), (b) or (c) of this paragraph, for the time being holding a ministerial office a salary calculated at the rate of \$22203 per annum.
- 2. If a person holds more ministerial offices than one, he shall be paid a salary under this Part in respect of one only of those offices.

PART III—REMUNERATION OF OFFICERS OF PARLIAMENT AND THE PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY OF THE CABINET

1. In addition to the remuneration payable to him by virtue of Part I of this Determination there is payable to the person for the time being holding the office specified in the table hereunder a salary of the amount and at the rate specified, namely:—

- 2. Where the Legislative Assembly is dissolved or expires by effluxion of time, a person who is the Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet or immediately before the dissolution or expiry by effluxion of time was the Chairman of Committees in that House or is the holder of the office of:—
 - (a) Leader of the Opposition in that House;
 - (b) Deputy Leader of the Opposition in that House;
 - (c) Government Whip in that House; or
 - (d) Opposition Whip in that House

is entitled to receive the salary payable to him by virtue of paragraph 1 of this Part and the allowance, if any, payable to him under Part IV of this Determination until:—

- (i) he ceases to be a Member by reason of an event other than the dissolution or expiry by effluxion of time of the Legislative Assembly; or
- (ii) another person is elected or appointed to the office held by him whichever event shall first occur.

PART IV—EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

In addition to the remuneration payable under Parts I, II and III of this Determination there shall be payable to the holders for the time being of the following offices the following allowances, namely:—

PART V-TRAVELLING ALLOWANCES

1. There shall be payable to the Premier, a Minister of the Crown, an Honorary Minister and the Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet, when travelling within Australia on official duty, but not when travelling to, from and within his own electorate, who actually incurs expense in securing overnight accommodation at a place situated outside a radius of 50 kilometres from Perth, by way of reimbursement a travelling allowance at the following rate per day:—

Provided that in lieu of the above allowances:-

- (a) When travelling in a ministerial railway coach, all costs reasonably and properly incurred shall be reimbursed.
- (b) When travelling by train (not in a ministerial coach) or by ship, the allowance shall be twenty five dollars (\$25) per day.

Provided further that where the costs of such travelling reasonably and properly incurred exceed the above allowance the actual costs shall be reimbursed.

- 2. The Deputy Premier when travelling within Australia on duty representing the Premier but not when travelling to, from and within his own electorate, shall be entitled to the same allowances as the Premier.
- 3. The Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Council, and the Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly, when (in either case) travelling within Australia on duty as such Leader but not when travelling to, from and within their own electorates, shall be entitled to the same allowances as a Minister; and so also shall the Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly when travelling within Australia on duty whether for and in the place of the Leader, or as such Deputy Leader only.
- 4. A Member (not being a Minister), when travelling on duty within Australia as an official representative of the Government or the Parliament, or as an official Member of a Government or Parliamentary committee or delegation including a Member of a Select Committee of a House or a Joint Select Committee of Houses shall be entitled to a travelling allowance at current Public Service rates.

PART VI—POSTAGE ALLOWANCES

There shall be payable to Members of Parliament and to the undermentioned Officers of Parliament (except Ministers and any others whose mail is sent free of charge to them in a manner similar to the mail of Ministers) a postage allowance as follows:—

Provided that each of the above allowances is to be adjusted proportionately in accordance with any percentage variation after I January 1984 in the basic minimum first class letter rate as fixed by Australia Post; such increase to operate from the date on which such increased postal rates commence.

PART VII—TELEPHONE RENTAL AND CALLS

- 1. Every Member of Parliament (other than Ministers, the President of the Legislative Council, the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, the Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly and the Chairmen of Committees, and any others whose private telephone rentals and calls are paid in full from public funds) shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement, of the full rental and 85 per centum of all charges for calls incurred by him in respect of a telephone in his private residence, or, where he reasonably maintains more than one residence by reason of his membership of Parliament, in each such residence.
- 2. Every Member of Parliament provided with an electorate office shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement, of the full rental and 85 per centum of all charges for calls incurred by him in respect of a telephone in his electorate office and an extension of the same telephone to his private residence.
- 3. Where a Member of Parliament at his expense, arranges the installation of a second telephone in his electorate office, he shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement, of the full rental and 85 per centum of all charges for calls incurred by him in respect of that second telephone.
- 4. In so far as a Member of Parliament pays or is charged with any telephone calls made by him from Parliament House, he shall be entitled to receive, as an allowance or emolument, payment to him by way of reimbursement of all such charges.
- 5. In this Part, "calls" include all charges (other than international calls or telegrams) as usually included on Telecom Australia accounts rendered to subscribers.

PART VIII—PAYMENT OF REMUNERATION

- 1. The remuneration payable to a Member under Parts I, VI and VII of this Determination shall be calculated from the day on which the Member is elected as a Member, and except as provided by paragraph 2 of this Part, cease to be payable as from the day on which he ceases to be a Member.
- 2. Where a Member of the Legislative Assembly ceases to be a Member thereof by reason of the dissolution of that House or the expiry thereof by effluxion of time, he is notwithstanding his cessation of membership, entitled to continue to receive the remuneration provided in Parts I, VI and VII of this Determination until the day fixed for the taking of the poll next following the dissolution or expiry of that House.
- 3. Remuneration payable under Parts I (Section 1, 2 and 3), II, III, IV and VI of this Determination shall be paid by equal instalments on the last day of each month.
