(a) a fine that is not more than \$2 500 and not less than—

- (i) in the case of a first offence, \$250;
 - (ii) in the case of a second offence, \$500;
 - (iii) in the case of a third or subsequent offence, \$1 250;
- and

(b) if that offence is a continuing offence, a daily penalty which is not more than \$250 and not less than \$125.

(2) A person who is required by any provision of these by laws, other than a provision of Part IV or Part VII, to do anything or refrain from doing anything and who fails to comply with that provision commits an offence and is liable to—

(a) a fine that is not more than \$1 000 and not less than—

(i) in the case of a first offence, \$100;

(ii) in the case of a second offence, \$200;

(iii) in the case of a third or subsequent offence, \$500;

and

(b) if the offence is a continuing offence, a daily penalty which is not more than \$100 and not less than \$50.

2. Any expense incurred by the Local Authority in consequence of a breach or non observance of these by-laws or in the execution of work directed to be executed by a person and not executed by him shall be paid by the person committing the breach or non observance or failing to execute the work.

Directions to Licensing Officers

PURSUANT to section 17 of the Act I hereby direct all Licensing Officers regarding the granting and renewal of Professional Fishermen's Licences and Fishing Boat Licences for the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery.

1. All Professional Fishermen's Licences issued for the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery shall be endorsed as follows—

“The holder of this licence is authorised to engage in the taking of fish for sale in the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery.

Fishing Unit No”
Owner fisherman/part owner fisherman/assistant fisherman.

2. All Fishing Boat Licences issued for the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery shall be endorsed as follows—

“The boat described herein is licensed to be used for taking fish for sale in the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery.

Fishing Unit

3. The number of fishing units and the number of fishermen and fishing boats making up those units which may be licensed to take fish in the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery shall be restricted to those listed in the schedule excepting as is provided hereunder.

4. A fishing unit shall consist of—

- (a) Not more than four netting dinghies;
- (b) No person other than the fishermen listed in the attached schedule.

5. Licences for fishermen additional to those described in Clause 3 above and listed in the schedule may be issued on the written approval of the Director of Fisheries in such cases where the Director of Fisheries in such cases where the Director considers it equitable that an established fishing unit may have additional fishermen to assist with the operations of the fishing unit.

6. Units and fishermen described in Clause 3 above and listed in the schedule may be reduced by—

- (a) not replacing owner or part owner fishermen upon their retirement or other withdrawal from the fishing industry; or
- (b) not renewing inactive licences.

7. A professional fisherman who has been authorised to engage in the taking of fish for sale in the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery and who wishes to engage in professional fishing in another fishery for a period of time shall first obtain the approval of the Director of Fisheries who may specify conditions relating to the entitlement to return to the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery as a professional fisherman.

8. The holder of an endorsed licence who relinquishes the licence or endorsement or retires from the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery shall not be replaced by any other fisherman except with the approval of the Director of Fisheries who may grant or refuse such approval after investigating the potential of the fishery and other relevant factors.

9. The holder of an endorsed licence for any of the fisheries listed hereunder shall not hold an endorsed licence to fish in the Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery—

- (i) Shark Bay Beach Seine and Mesh Net Fishery;
- (ii) Swan/Canning Estuarine Fishery;
- (iii) Mandurah Estuarine Fishery;
- (iv) Leschenault Estuarine Fishery;
- (v) Hardy Inlet Estuarine Fishery;
- (vi) South Coast Estuarine Fishery;

For the purposes of these instructions the “Exmouth Gulf Beach Seine Fishery” means the commercial fishery by means of nets in the waters of Exmouth Gulf lying south of a line drawn from Point Murat on North West Cape to the southern shore of the mouth of the southern arm of the Ashburton River.

BUSH FIRES ACT 1954

Shire of Lake Grace

Notice to all Owners and Occupiers of Land in the Shire of Lake Grace.

PURSUANT to the powers contained in section 33 of the above Act, you are hereby required on or before the 1st day of November 1989, to plough, cultivate, scarify, burn or otherwise clear upon the land, firebreaks free of all inflammable materials at least three metres wide, according to the following directions and in the following circumstances, on all rural and townsite land owned or occupied by you, and thereafter up to and including the 31st day of March 1990, to maintain the firebreaks clear of all inflammable materials.

- (1) (a) Immediately inside all external boundaries of the property or as is practicable, firebreaks of not less than 3 metres wide and;
- (b) Where buildings, haystacks, fuel ramps, fuel tanks and stored fuel drums are situated on the land, firebreaks of not less 2.5 metres wide within 33.5 metres of the perimeter of such buildings, haystacks, fuel ramps, fuel tanks and stored fuel drums in such a manner as to completely encircle the buildings, haystack, fuel ramps, fuel tanks and stored fuel drums and;
- (2) Where land is in crop and adjoins the railway line reserve, a firebreak of not less than 3 metres wide encircling the crop and;
- (3) (a) Immediately surrounding an aerial landing ground situated on the land, a firebreak of not less than 6 metres wide and;
- (b) Any aerial landing ground used as the motor start up, refueling and maintenance area to be completely cleared of inflammable materials for a radius of 18 metres and;
- (4) Maintain clear of all inflammable materials all townsite blocks and;

(5) Where bush or land has been bulldozed chained or prepared in any similar manner for clearing by burning (whether intended to burn the bush or not), provide a firebreak of not less than 13 metres wide immediately inside the external boundaries of the land so prepared. If you become owner or occupier of land after the 1st day of November, 1989, the requirements of this notice are varied so as to require you to comply with the terms of this notice within 14 days of the date of your becoming owner or occupier of such land, instead of on or before the 1st day of November, 1989. The firebreaks required by this notice are to be maintained clear of inflammable materials up to and including the 31st day of March 1989.

If it is considered to be impracticable for any reason to clear firebreaks as required by this notice, you may apply to the Council or its duly authorised officer for permission to provide firebreaks in alternative positions on the land. If permission is granted by Council or its duly authorised officer, you shall comply with the requirements of this notice. The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is a fine, not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1 000.00) and a person in default is also liable, whether prosecuted or not, to pay the cost of performing the work directed in this notice if it is not carried out by the owner or occupier before the date required by this notice.

If the requirements of this notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bush Fires Act.

BUSH FIRES ACT 1954

Esperance Shire Council

Notice to Owners and Occupiers of Land

PURSUANT to the powers contained in section 33 of the above Act, you are hereby required on or before 1 November 1989 to plough, scarify, cultivate, burn, chemically spray or otherwise clear and thereafter maintain free of flammable material until the 31st day of March 1990, firebreaks of the following dimensions and in the following positions on land owned or occupied by yourself.

1. Rural Land.

- (a) On cleared land—clear firebreaks not less than three metres wide along the whole of the inside of the property within 100 metres of the external boundaries.
- (b) On uncleared land—clear firebreaks not less than 20 metres wide on the inside and along the whole of any portion of the external boundaries of the property, where that portion abuts cleared land of an adjoining landholder.
- (c) Around any buildings, group of buildings, hayshed or haystack—clear firebreaks not less than three metres in width within 20 metres of the perimeter of any buildings, group of buildings, hayshed or haystack.

- (d) Where the total area of property exceeds 2 000 hectares, additional firebreaks not less than three metres in width must be provided in such positions as to divide the property into areas not exceeding 2 000 hectares, each area being completely surrounded by a firebreak.
- (e) Where the bush on land owned or occupied by you has been bulldozed, chained or prepared in any similar manner for clearing by burning (whether you intend to burn the bush or not), you shall forthwith clear a firebreak not less than 20 metres wide immediately inside the external boundaries of land on which bulldozed, chained or otherwise prepared bush is situated.

2. Townsite Land.

- (a) Where the land is 2 000m² or less:—
- A firebreak is not required but
 - Such land is required to be made safe from fire by the reduction of existing fire hazards.
- Compliance with such requirements need not require the removal of all flammable material.
- (b) Where the land is 2 000m² or greater clear firebreaks not less than three metres wide along the whole of the external boundaries of the property and also immediately surrounding all buildings and haystacks situated on the land.

3. Bulk Fuel/Gas/Chemical Storage.

In respect of any Rural or Townsite Land upon which there is situated any container/drum/installation used to store flammable liquids, chemicals or gas fuel (be they empty or not) including any ramp or support so constructed, you shall have the said land clear of all flammable materials for a minimum distance of six metres from the site perimeter.

4. Application to vary the above requirements.

If, because of the terrain or other natural features or to prevent erosion, it is considered impracticable or unnecessary to carry out works as required by this notice, you may apply to the Council or its duly authorised officer for permission to provide firebreaks in alternative positions or to abate fire hazards on the land in any other way.

It should be noted that this provision accommodates the construction of strategic firebreaks encompassing a number of adjoining small semi-rural holdings.

Approval for such alternatives will only be considered if submitted with the endorsement of the bush fire brigade for the area concerned. Applications must be submitted to the respective brigade on or before 30 September, annually.

5. Definitions for the Purpose of Section 1—4 of this Notice.

Bush—includes trees, bushes, plants, stubble, scrub and undergrowth of all kinds whatsoever alive or dead and whether standing or not standing and also a part of a tree, bush, plant or undergrowth, and whether severed therefrom or not so severed excluding plantations.

Haystack—means any collection of hay including five round fodder bales or more stacked or placed together.

Flammable Material—includes bush, timber, boxes, cartons, paper and like flammable materials, rubbish and also any combustible matter, but does not include green standing trees or growing bushes and plants in gardens or lawns.

Safe from fire—means that the vegetation shall be controlled in such a way that it cannot carry or sustain the passage of fire. On uncleared land this means the use of either a firebreak, a fuel reduction cool burn or both.

The establishment of permanent green grass and treed areas is allowable provided that the grass has a summer growth phase, e.g. couch or kikuyu. The use of cereal grasses can cause high risk fire areas. Trees should be evergreens of the fire resistant variety with no foliage within 1.2m of the ground in summer. Paperbark, tamarisks, wattles and pines are fire prone and should not be used in fuel reduced zones.

6. Private Hardwood/Softwood Plantations.

Minimum Firebreak Standards.

The following firebreak standards apply for plantations—

Firebreaks constructed 15 metres wide (as per definition below) on the boundaries of plantation or on such other location as may be agreed between Council and the plantation owner.

Firebreaks six metres wide should surround compartments of approximately 30 hectares.

All firebreaks must be maintained in trafficable condition and trees on both sides of breaks progressively pruned to a minimum height of four metres to allow unrestricted access of maintenance and fire fighting equipment and so as to maintain an effective width of firebreak.

Where power lines pass through plantation areas firebreaks as per S.E.C. specifications must be provided.

Equipment Standards—

The Bush Fires Board recommends the following equipment for protection of plantation areas.

N.B. One heavy unit is the equivalent of two medium tanker units.

7. Definitions for the Purpose of Section 6 above.

Plantation—Any area of planted Pines or Eucalyptus species exceeding three hectares except areas planted as salt reclamation projects and areas planted as windbreaks not exceeding 15 metres in depth.

Firebreaks—15 metres Boundary Break—The first row of trees must be at least 15 metres from the outside edge of the break. The firebreak must be maintained clear of all flammable material over the outer three metres and then in a low fuel condition for the next 12 metres and have a 10 metre vertical clearance, i.e.: with no overhanging branches.

8. Penalty.

Persons who fail to comply with the requirements of this order may be issued with an infringement (penalty \$40) or prosecuted with an increased penalty of up to \$1 000 and additionally, Council may carry out the required work at the cost to the owner or occupier.

Firebreak Order

Notice to all Owners and/or Occupiers of land within the Shire of Wyalkatchem.

PURSUANT to all the powers contained in section 33 of the above Act, you are hereby required on or before 1 November 1989 to plough, scarify, spray, cultivate or otherwise clear and thereafter, maintain free of all inflammable material until 1 March 1990, firebreaks in the following position and of the following dimensions, on the land owned or occupied by you.

1. Rural Land—Construct—

- Firebreaks of not less than 3 metres in width around the boundary of all standing crops and that the maximum area of standing crop to 200 hectares and around the external boundary of each property, such break to be not more than 20 metres inside the boundary fence.
- Clear and maintain firebreaks at least 3 metres wide within 20 metres of the perimeter of any building or group of buildings or hay stacks, in such a manner as to completely encircle the building or hay stack.

2. Townsite—All Townsite Lots within the Shire of Wyalkatchem are required to be cleared and maintained free of all inflammable material.

For the purpose of this section inflammable material means dead grass and timber, boxes, cartons, paper and any combustible material or rubbish but does not include living trees and bushes and shrubs and plants in gardens.

3. Fuel Dumps and/or Depots—All grass or inflammable materials to be cleared from areas where drum ramps are located and where drums, full or empty are stored and such areas are to be maintained free of grass and similar inflammable material until 1 March 1990.

For the purpose of this section inflammable material means dead grass and timber, boxes, cartons, paper and any combustible material or rubbish but does not include living trees and bushes.

Prohibited burning period from 1 November 1989 to 7 February 1990.

Restricted burning from 19 September to 31 October 1989 and 8 February to 22 March 1990.

General Provisions

If it is considered to be impracticable for any reason to provide firebreaks in the position or adhere to the provisions required by this notice, the approval of the Council must be obtained to prepare such firebreaks in an alternative position. Approval to any such variation will only be granted where the Bush Fire Control Officer for the area has first signified his approval for the variation.

The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is a fine of not less than \$40 nor more than \$400 and a person in default is also liable, whether prosecuted or not, to pay the cost of performing the work directed in this notice if it is not carried out by the owner or occupier and by the date required by this notice.

If the requirement of this notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bush Fires Act.

Notice to All Owners and/or Occupiers of Land in the City of Geraldton

If it is considered to be impracticable for any reason to clear firebreaks or to remove inflammable material from land as required by this notice, you may apply to Council or its duly authorised officer, no later than 15 November 1989, for permission to provide firebreaks in alternative positions or to take alternative action to abate fire hazards on the land. If permission is not granted by Council or its duly authorised officer, you are to comply with the requirements of this notice.

Inflammable material is defined for the purpose of this notice to include bush, timber, boxes, cartons, paper and like inflammable materials, rubbish and also any combustible matter, but does not include green standing trees or growing bushes and plants in gardens or lawns.

The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is either a \$40.00 infringement fine or a court fine to a maximum of \$1 000. A person in default is also liable, whether prosecuted

or not, to pay the cost of performing the work directed in this notice if it is not carried out by the owner or occupier by the date required by this notice.

If the requirements of this notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bush Fires Act prior to the prohibited burning period commencing 1 December 1989.

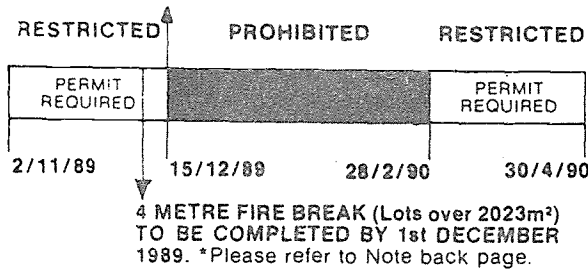
In respect of land owned by you on which is situated any container normally used to contain liquid or gas fuel, including the land on which any ramp or support is constructed, you shall clear the land of all flammable materials.

Bush Fire Precautions

This Graph indicates the periods during which burning is prohibited and those in which burning may be undertaken with a permit.

Please note also the dates upon which land owners must complete control measures previously detailed in this notice.

Residential Fire Breaks (Lots under 2 023 m² to be completed by 15 December 1989).



These dates are subject to slight variation, according to seasonal conditions. Alterations will be published in the "West Australian" and "Coastal District Times" Newspapers.

BUSH FIRES ACT (Summary)

1. Permits to burn are required for the whole of the Restricted Burning Times as previously listed. Permits can only be obtained from the Town Office of the area Fire Control Officers mentioned below.
2. Any special conditions imposed by the Fire Control Officer when issuing permits must be strictly adhered to.
3. The permit holder shall give notice of his intention to burn as per burning permit requirements.
4. Period of Notice to owners or occupiers prior to burning cannot be more than 28 days or less than 4 days although a lesser notice may be determined by mutual agreement of all neighbours.
5. Your attention is drawn to the conditions on the back of the permit.
6. Garden refuse or rubbish burnt on the ground may be lit only between 6.00 pm and 11.00 pm and must be completely extinguished with water or earth by midnight. All flammable matter is to be cleared within 5 metres at all points of the site of the fire, and a person must be in attendance during the whole time a fire is burning.
7. Any incinerator used to burn rubbish must be of an approved construction. An open drum with or without a lid is NOT an appropriate incinerator.
8. It is in the interests of all residents to be registered members of the Bush Fire Brigade covering the area wherein they own land. Membership of a brigade is the safest way to ensure cover under the Town Councils fire insurance policy which covers personal injury and damage to equipment resulting from fighting bush fires.

Special Notice to Land Owners and Occupiers

The Council forwards a copy of this Firebreak Order with assessments each year. The notice is also published in the "West Australian" and "Coastal District Times" newspapers and additional copies are obtainable at the Town Council Office.

The aim of the Council is to eliminate destructive bush fires and to this end all areas of the Town are subject to an overall District Fire Protection Plan, where large scale hazard removal is carried out by the Town Councils Bush Fire Brigades.

The requirements of this order are considered to be the minimum standard of the fire prevention work required to protect not only the individual properties but the district generally. In addition to the requirements of this order, Council may issue separate special orders on owners or occupiers if hazard removal is considered necessary.

 - 5.3.1 Precinct Pemberton 1.

Council's objective, recognising the Precinct's historic and townscape significance and the recreational and tourist importance of the precinct to Pemberton, is to ensure retention of the character of the Precinct as a whole and the buildings within it.

In order to achieve this objective, Council policy is that—

- demolition or removal of buildings,
- works which affect the external appearance of a building,
- construction of additions, outbuildings and fences,
- development of new buildings,

will require the planning approval of Council, and in considering approval Council will have regard to development guidelines which have been adopted to assist in retention of the established and recognisable character of the Precinct.

- (a) Unless the prior Planning Approval of Council has been applied for and obtained—
 - partial or complete demolition or removal of a building,
 - or
 - works which affect the external appearance of a building,
 - or
 - construction of additions, outbuildings and fences,
 - or
 - construction of new buildings,

are not permitted and are contrary to the provisions of the Scheme.

- (b) Council will adopt, following advertisement thereof and consideration of any submissions, a statement of Policy and Development Guidelines for the precinct and these shall be kept and made available at the offices of the Council.
- (c) Council will require that development or works which are the subject of an application for planning approval adhere as closely as possible to the intent of the Policy statement and to the Development Guidelines, and Council when considering the application may negotiate with the applicant any alternative means of carrying out the development in order to achieve Council's objective.
- (d) Where Planning Approval is granted under the provisions of this Clause, Council will require that buildings or other structures are of design and materials compatible with other buildings in the Precinct and the intent of Council's Objective.
- (e) The provisions of this clause will apply in addition to any other scheme requirement applying to zones in the scheme, and where any provision of this clause is inconsistent with any other requirement of the scheme, the provisions of this clause shall prevail.
- (f) Notwithstanding the provisions of the Residential Planning Codes, Council may vary the front building setback within the Precinct in order to achieve a consistent structure in keeping with the original streetscape.

- “the district” means the Nyabing-Pingrup Land Conservation District constituted by clause 3 of the Schedule to this order.

Nyabing-Pingrup Land Conservation District

3. All that portion of land described in the Schedule to this order, is hereby constituted the Nyabing-Pingrup Land Conservation District.

Establishment of the committee

4. Pursuant to section 23 (2) of the *Soil and Land Conservation Act 1945* there is hereby established for the district a land conservation district committee to be known as the Land Conservation District Committee for the Nyabing-Pingrup Land Conservation District.

Constitution of the committee

5. (1) It is hereby determined, on the recommendation of the Minister, after consultation with the Shire of Kent and producer organizations, that the committee shall comprise 13 members of whom—

- (a) one shall be the Commissioner for Soil Conservation or his nominee;
- (b) 2 shall be appointed by the Minister on the nomination of the Shire of Kent;
- (c) 2 shall be appointed in accordance with subclause (2);
- (d) one shall be appointed in accordance with subclause (3); and
- (e) 7 shall be appointed by the Minister and shall be actively engaged in, or affected by or associated with, land use in the district.

(2) The Western Australian Farmers Federation (Inc.) shall submit to the Minister a panel containing the names of persons willing to be appointed as members of the committee and, where such a panel is submitted in accordance with this order, 2 persons whose names appear on the panel submitted by the Western Australian Farmers Federation (Inc.) shall be appointed by the Minister.

(3) The Pastoralists and Graziers Association of Western Australia shall submit to the Minister a panel containing the names of persons willing to be appointed as members of the committee and, where such a panel is submitted in accordance with this order, one person whose name appears on the panel submitted by the Pastoralists and Graziers Association of Western Australia shall be appointed by the Minister.

(4) Subject to this clause, each appointed member shall hold office for such period not exceeding 3 years as is specified in the instrument of his appointment and is eligible for reappointment.

(5) The Minister may grant leave of absence to an appointed member on such terms and conditions as the Minister determines.

(6) The Minister may terminate the appointment of an appointed member for inability, inefficiency or misbehaviour.

(7) If an appointed member—

- (a) is or becomes an undischarged bankrupt or person whose property is subject to an order or arrangement under the laws relating to bankruptcy;
- (b) has his appointment terminated by the Minister, pursuant to subclause (6);
- (c) is absent, except on leave duly granted by the Minister, from 3 consecutive meetings of the committee of which he has had notice; or
- (d) resigns his office by written notice addressed to the Minister,

the office of that appointed member becomes vacant.

Proceedings of the committee

6. (1) The committee shall hold its meetings at such place on such days and at such intervals as the committee shall from time to time determine.

(2) At any meeting of the committee—

- (a) a majority of the members constitute a quorum;
- (b) the Chairman shall preside and where he is absent from the meeting the members may appoint one of their number to preside at that meeting;
- (c) each member present is entitled to a deliberative vote; and
- (d) where the votes cast on any question are equally divided the Chairman, or the presiding member in terms of paragraph (b), shall have a casting vote.

(3) The committee shall cause accurate minutes to be kept of the proceedings at its meetings.

(4) To the extent that it is not prescribed, the committee may determine its own procedure.
