WHEREAS it is enacted by section 100 of the Factories and Shops Act, 1920-1937, that the closing time for all shops (except those mentioned in the Fourth Schedule and expert registered small shops) shall be in every shops (except those mentioned in the Fourth Schedule and except registered small shops) shall be in every week, on one week day, one o'clock; on the five other week days, six o'clock; and that all shops (except as aforesaid) shall be closed on those days not later than the hours mentioned above, which shall be the hours after noon in each day, and shall continue closed until eight o'clock, or such earlier hour as may from time to time be fixed by Proclamation (in respect either of all to time be fixed by Proclamation (in respect either of all to time be fixed by Proclamation (in respect either of all shops affected or of any class or classes of such shops) in the morning of the week day next following: And whereas similar provision was made by section 4 of the Early Closing Act, 1902, as amended by the Early Closing Act Amendment Act, 1911, which last-mentioned Acts were repealed by the Factories and Shops Act, 1920-1937: And whereas, under the said last-mentioned Acts, Proclamations were issued and published in the Government Gazette on the 2nd day of February, 1912, and the 25th day of January, 1918, respectively, and are still in force, the effect of which, taken together is to permit butcher shops, wheresoever situate, to open at six o'clock in the morning of each week day (other at six o'clock in the morning of each week day (other than Saturday) and at five o'clock in the morning of each Saturday: And whereas it is now deemed desirable and expedient to cancel and revoke the said Proclama-tions and in lieu thereof to issue this Proclamation tions and in lieu thereof to issue this Proclamation making other provisions, as hereinafter mentioned: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by section 100 of the Factories and Shops Act, 1920-1937, and of all other powers in this behalf enabling me, do hereby cancel and revoke the two Proclamations hereinbefore mentioned which were issued under the Early Classing Act and revoke the two Proclamations hereinbefore mentioned, which were issued under the Early Closing Act, 1902, as amended by the Early Closing Act Amendment Act, 1911, and published in the Government Gazette on the 2nd day of February, 1912, and the 25th day of January, 1918, respectively, and also in lieu thereof do hereby fix the hour of six o'clock in the morning of each week day (other than Saturday) and five o'clock
