AN ACT to amend the Stock Diseases Act,
1895.

[Assented to 1st October, 1906.]

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Western Australia, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the *Stock Diseases Amendment Act*, Short title.
1906, and shall be read as one with the Stock Diseases Act, 1895,
hereinafter referred to as the principal Act.

2. Section four of the principal Act is hereby amended by Amendment of
striking out the interpretation of the word "Disease," and inserting 59 Vict., No. 34,
in place thereof the following:— s. 4.

"Disease" shall mean any contagious or infectious disease to which any animal is subject, and includes ticks, lice, or any parasite, except the disease of scab in sheep.

3. Section eleven of the principal Act is hereby repealed, and the following is enacted in place thereof:—

11. Every owner of infected stock, or of stock suspected to be infected, shall, as soon as he has discovered that they are infected, forthwith give written notice thereof to the nearest inspector, and shall thenceforth keep such infected or suspected stock from coming into contact with other stock until otherwise ordered by an inspector.

Amendment of s. 12.

4. Section twelve of the principal Act is amended by striking out the words “the principal officer of Customs,” and inserting in place thereof the words “an inspector.”
